JAPS REPORT BIGGER CROPS

Utilities Official Warns Unless Usage Is Restrained Generators Will Break Down; Demand Now 1800 Kilowatts Over Limit

A Greenville Utilities Commission official warned today that the present capacity of the electric power plant is 4,200 kilowatts and the demand is for 6,000 kilowatts.

Increases of from 50 to 300 per cent over the normal yield were reported to Kyodo News Agency by Takeo Furuno, Japanese agricultural expert who is conducting experiments in the center of the blast zone "just" outside atom-bombed Nagasaki City.

In Chicago Dr. Austin M. Bruce called the report "interesting" and said "anything is possible." He added that he was acquainted with Furuno and considered him a competent agriculturist.

Dr. George Gamow, a Washington, D.C., scientist, said that normally radioactivity would hinder rather than help the growth of crops and added that the Nagasaki report "looks very strange."

Another Washington scientist, Dr. Ugo Fano said, "If it is true, it is a phenomenon not generally known to science or it would have been tried before."

Dr. Fano, a member of the Federation of Atomic Scientists, told a reporter: "Perhaps the explanation is that the decayed matter in abandoned ground around the blast area acted as a fertilizer."

UNIONS GIVEN NEW DEADLINE BY NLRB BOSS

Have Until October 11 To Certify Members Issued Financial Report

Washington, Sept. 25 (AP)—Labor unions will be given until Oct. 31 to certify to the National Labor Relations Board that they have furnished members with financial statements required by the Taft-Hartley act.

The new deadline came to light today following a ruling by Robert N. Denham, NLRB general counsel, that unions which fail to fill out forms he will provide will lose their standing before the board.

This means any cases the unions have pending may be tossed out and they will be unable to file new ones.

The ruling already has resulted in temporary suspension of cases involving the big machinists union, which previously had satisfied Denham's first two requirements: (1) Filing of a similar union financial statement with the Labor Department and (2) Filing with the NLRB of affidavits by union officers that they are not communists and do not hold communist views.

October 31 also is the deadline for the non-communist affidavits.

The machinists union, an organization independent of the AFL or CIO, won the first two union shop elections the NLRB has conducted under Taft-Hartley law terms.

But it was discovered that the union had not, as yet, distributed a financial report to its members. The machinists will do so, officials said today, by publishing the statement in their next monthly magazine in early October.

Meanwhile, however, Denham is refusing to go ahead with any further elections asked by the machinists international or its more than 1,000 locals. And he has set the October 31 deadline for these and all other unions to fulfill the requirement.

The White House announced late yesterday that Benton is quitting as assistant secretary of state in charge of information and cultural affairs, including the war-born radio program designed to counter anti-allied propaganda.

Benton, whose division's funds were slashed around 40 per cent by the last Congress, declared in his letter of resignation that the nation has not yet accepted "the outlay of brains, energy and dollars necessary to sustain the responsibilities of the State Department in the field of information."

Mr. Truman replied that he is aware of "the difficulties and frustrations" Benton encountered on the job, but said the assistant secretary "succeeded in building a solid foundation upon which this work can go forward."

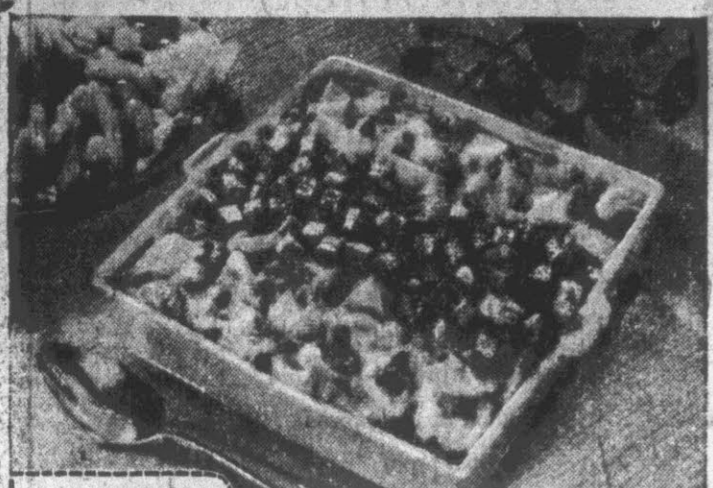

Mor Vegetable Casserole

Among those who joined the college faculty this fall are several heads of departments of instruction. Dr. Allen S. Hurlburt comes to Greenville from Cornell University, where he earned three degrees as a student and has recently served as graduate student supervisor in teacher training. He will head the department of administration at East Carolina.

Dr. Neph M. Jorgensen has begun work as director of physical education. Trained at Utah State and at Oregon and Iowa Universities, he has taught and coached at the State Teachers College, Plattsburg, N.Y., and at Vallejo Junior College in California.

Dr. Rudolph M. Willman, head of the department of music, will teach at East Carolina and direct the college orchestra. He has taught at the Chicago Junior High School, and at Western Kentucky State Teachers College at Bowling Green.

Dr. Percy C. Scott, a native of Oxford, Mississippi, has joined the college faculty as head of the department of mathematics. He has taught at Tennessee Polytechnic Institute and, since 1936, at Louisiana State University.

Dr. Fred Irons, Greenville physician, will serve as college physician and Mrs. Blanche Cherry of Greenville, as superintendent of the college infirmary.

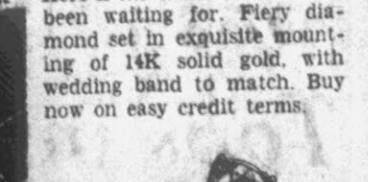

ATHEISM A RELIGION

The atheist usually maintains that he has emancipated himself from superstition. Yet actually the atheist has fallen into a superstition that is much deeper than that which he ascribes to Christians. All he accepts on faith a doctrine that has less rationality behind it than any religion the world has known. The central and most incredible tenet of this doctrine is the omnipotence of man.

In this the atheist denies the whole trend of modern science which is ever piling up additional evidence to prove, if proof is needed, the insignificance of man in the great cosmic scheme and the weakness of his perceptions. The great difference between the creed of the atheist and that of the Christian lies in the basis for their respective beliefs. The former base their faith on a theoretical conception of the powers of mankind. On the other hand, the Christian's knowledge of God is based on revelation confirmed by experience. Faith in Christ becomes a certainty when a man realizes that his religion is an experience which conforms to the fundamentals of human reason and fits the needs of life.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS

Washington—The nation is keeping in tune to a note that comes from 25 feet underground near Beltsville, Md., just outside Washington.

The note, precisely tuned to A above middle C, is the standard of pitch used by musicians and musical instrument manufacturers to tune their instruments accurately.

It is broadcast by the U.S. Bureau of Standards over its station WWV and can be picked up anywhere in the world by anyone tuning in on a radio.

It can be heard at 2,900, 5,000, 10,000, 15,000, 25,000 and 30,000 kilocycles or on short wave sets at 2.5, 5, 10, 15, 25 and 30 megacycles. If it can't be heard on one frequency it surely can be heard on another, thus insuring world wide service.

Music is measured by time. A musical note of any particular pitch represents so many vibrations per second of a violin string, a drumhead or the air volume in the tube of a trumpet or tuba. The more vibrations per second, the higher the pitch.

The musical note that the Bureau of Standards uses comes from a crystal kept in a sealed box in a cement vault under a one-story brick building at Beltsville that houses the Bureau's radio broadcasting station.

From this station, incidentally, also comes a click, tick or tick that however it sounds to you that gives out a highly accurate time interval signal every second around the clock. This signal also comes from the crystal.

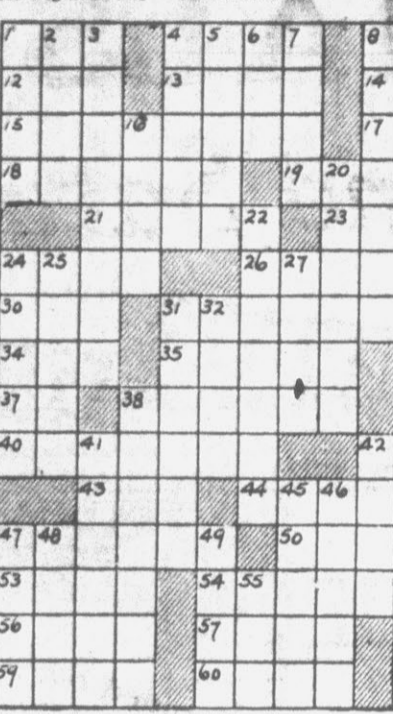
The crystal vibrates at 100,000 cycles a second. Experts take the radio energy it gives off when it vibrates and by some highly complicated method they divide it, getting almost any frequency they want.

They want 440 cycles per second, which musicians say is a perfect A above middle C on any musical scale. This A has been adopted by American musicians as a standard musical pitch. Orchestras traditionally have tuned up to the A above middle C. When they determine this note is right they get the pitch for all the other notes.

In some countries A above middle C has been interpreted at 435 cycles and some orchestras and bands in

The Bureau of Standards first broadcast the musical note in 1936 on an experimental basis. The first one to get interested was a maker of band instruments: who used it in adjusting wood wind instruments at the factory.

Then symphony orchestras and the piano tuners' association got back of the broadcasting, most of them now using the Bureau's broadcast A above middle C. Most musicians complain that tuning forks get out of tune. The modern piano tuner, turns on the radio.

To the average listener the note sounds like a steady hum, but if you have an ear trained for music, you hear it as a single note, interrupted one minute in every five.

Moscow (Continued from Page 1) Control Council in Berlin and that Eastern Germany (under Russian control) is well on the way to being Sovietized. The report fur-

ther says the "suspicion is now possible that the U.S.S.R. covets Austria, in order to isolate Czechoslovakia, and penetrate Italy and Germany, as well as other parts of Western Europe with Communist politics and economics." This coincides with the general

belief among western observers that the Soviet occupied part of Germany already is to all intents a Russian dominion and that Moscow is maneuvering for further westward expansion, in connection with such belief we have an intriguing side-light in the mystery surrounding the whereabouts of Dr. Rudolf Paul, missing premier of the state of Thuringia in the Soviet zone.

Paul has been reported to be, and not to be, in the American zone—a fugitive from the Communists. The French licensed New Kurier said he had escaped with all his documents, including a projected constitution for a Soviet republic of east Germany. In any event, whatever may be the truth about Dr. Paul, the fact remains that Russia has a firm grip on Eastern Germany.

The economic pressure has given a fillip to the trend towards a merger of the American, British and French zones into a unified nation. However, the French apparently are not yet ready for a complete merger, but will await development of the Marshall Plan for rehabilitation before casting the die. France is fearful that Germany may become strong enough to undertake military aggression again, but on that point both America and Britain are agreed that never again shall the Fatherland be in position to start another war.

Now, suppose you actually see or hear a burglar. The FBI said personal safety should be kept in mind above everything else. "You should presume that every burglar is armed and dangerous," the FBI said. "They are cowardly and nervous, and many of them who may not be killers in the strict sense of the word will kill in a frenzy of fear if suddenly surprised."

(A week ago here in Washington a 62-year-old woman saw a prowler in her back yard, got a pistol, went to the door and said, "Stand still or I'll shoot." The prowler shot and killed her.)

The FBI said if a burglar is trying to break in, "the best of all possible things to do is to get the police there before the burglar knows he has been discovered."

If this is impossible, the next thing—if it can be done "without risking your personal safety"—is to observe the burglar and note his clothing, physical characteristics, and which way he goes when he leaves.

The FBI said those suggestions also apply if the burglar is already in the house, but here "the situation is far more precarious for the family," and a "wrong move may cost a life."

If you can get to the telephone without the burglar knowing it, by all means do it.

If you are confronted by the burglar, "keep as calm as possible and do as he instructs; your life and that of your family are more valuable than your property."

Fix the burglar's description "indelibly in your mind." After he's gone, leave everything in the house "exactly as the burglar left it."

If you should return home after an absence and find that a burglar has been there, "do not make an amateurish crime scene search yourself." Don't touch anything. Let the police do all the searching. Don't let anyone walk in the yard because there may be footprints.

The FBI suggests that you not tell the neighbors about the burglary until the police have questioned them about suspicious persons in the neighborhood.

This is because the police will be "far more likely to get helpful and reliable information if they get to the neighbors before a hum of excitement has begun."

(Continued From Page One) The utilities official said they are doing everything possible to maintain a flow of current and that they do not cut off the current in a neighborhood unless indicators at the power plant show that that section of town is burning unnecessary lights.

"If consumers do not help by cutting out at least 50 per cent of their lights from 7 a. m. until 10 p. m., it will be urgently necessary at once to pull the switch of the circuits supplying that neighborhood," the official said.

It was suggested that individuals in homes and business places telephone neighbors when they see that they are not cooperating and burning unnecessary lights.

Another warning is, that if the use of unnecessary lights is not discontinued and the indicator at the plant shows an approaching overload on that circuit, the switch will be pulled. This will cause great inconvenience to refrigeration, picture shows, business and industrial places and others.
