Russian Enlarges 'Warmongers' List

Vishinsky Broadens Slashing Attack To Include Dulles, AUSTIN AND BRITAIN'S UN DELEGATE; CLAIMS CHARGES NOT MET BY ACCUSED

Lake Success, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Russia's Andrei Vishinsky asserted at a news conference today that John Foster Dulles and other prominent Americans he attacked as warmongers should be "enchained."

Vishinsky released at the news conference—his first in the U. S.—a 10-page statement fully renewing and strengthening his charges of a virtual war plot in the United States against the Soviet Union and naming Dulles, a ranking member of the American delegation all over again as he had in his original warmonger speech of Sept. 18 to the United Nations assembly.

The news conference was held in the Security Council chamber between committee meetings of the assembly now in session.

Vishinsky declared that his charges of warmongering had not been met by either Dulles or McNeill except by "abuse, defamation and lies" and that all the "specimens" he personally attacked as "warmongers" had failed to meet his accusations squarely.

The news conference was called on the initiative of the Russian delegation.

The conference was attended by the chief correspondents covering the assembly sessions.

McNeill, Vishinsky said in his hottest attack today, "resolutely disagrees that the instigators of a new war ought to be enchained because, he says, every citizen is free to express his thoughts and because it is necessary to tolerate views freely expressed by citizens of free states."

Vishinsky then continued: "This is not the first time we hear these songs about freedom to commit crimes, to excite beastly instincts, about freedom to instigate massacres, destructions, pillage, extermination of human beings."

"It is only unknown why, prohibition and prosecuting pornography and traffic in women and children and imprisoning those who commit such crimes, it is impossible to put into the same prison the warmongers, provocateurs and instigators of slaughter who are the most offensive criminals against freedom, progress and happiness of mankind."

Bust Of Truman Tied Up By Red Tape Valuation

Kansas City, Sept. 26.—(AP)—How much is a bronze bust of President Truman worth?

The bust, a gift from Mexico's President Miguel Aleman to the University of Kansas City, has remained crated in a U. S. customs storehouse here nearly three months waiting for someone to place a monetary value on it.

O. H. Garrison, customs appraiser, said it is duty-free but he still must have a reasonable value to enter in his records.

The bust, made by sculptor Alfredo Justo, arrived at the customs office June 30. Garrison asked the university for an estimate of its value.

Letters and telegrams began moving back and forth, including one from the sculptor in which he said "all this has greatly upset us."

USSR War Potential

War Talk Still Heard Among Higher Circles; Giant Strides Of Soviet Industry; Development Necessary For Peace—And War; Time Is Nothing In Long Run

The appalling question of whether another world war is brewing keeps turning up like a bad penny, even appearing in the councils of United Nations where we are hearing grim warnings that unless the breach between the Eastern and Western blocs is healed we shall have another conflagration—this time of atomic proportions.

This being a persistent topic of conversation, it is interesting to hear from Ernest G. Ropes, chief of the U. S. Commerce Department's Russian section, that "we don't need to worry about Russia as a potential enemy."

TAFT WINNING FEW VOTES ON WESTERN TOUR

Politicians Take Dim View; Senator Suggests UN Without Russia

En route with Taft to Portland, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Republican politicians of Washington and Oregon credited Senator Taft (R-Ohio) today with only an outside chance to obtain more than scattering support among the two states' 31 delegates to the GOP nominating convention next year.

Taft, who talks tonight at a Young Republican meeting in Gearhart, Ore., has been holding conferences with leaders of the two states in between a series of speeches topped by last night's proposal in Tacoma that the United States take the lead to perfect a United Nations without Russia.

His appearance in Tacoma was accompanied by the picketing to which he has become accustomed but without the noisy display encountered at Seattle. About 60 placard-bearing pickets marched in a circle, singing but orderly while Taft entered unannounced by the stage entrance.

He told the Tacoma World Affairs Council that if Russia continues to make it "difficult" to operate the present international organization in the interests of peace and justice, "I believe we should proceed without Russia to perfect a United Nations that will operate in a limited field."

"We have perfected such an organization with the Latin American nations which may serve as an example to the rest of the world," the Ohio senator declared in a speech setting out the full outline of his views on international affairs.

FOOD PRICES HALT SPIRAL

Scattered Cities Report Drops; Buyer Resistance Credited

Some high-flying food prices were losing altitude in scattered cities throughout the country today and buyer resistance was credited with halting the upward price spiral in several of the lines.

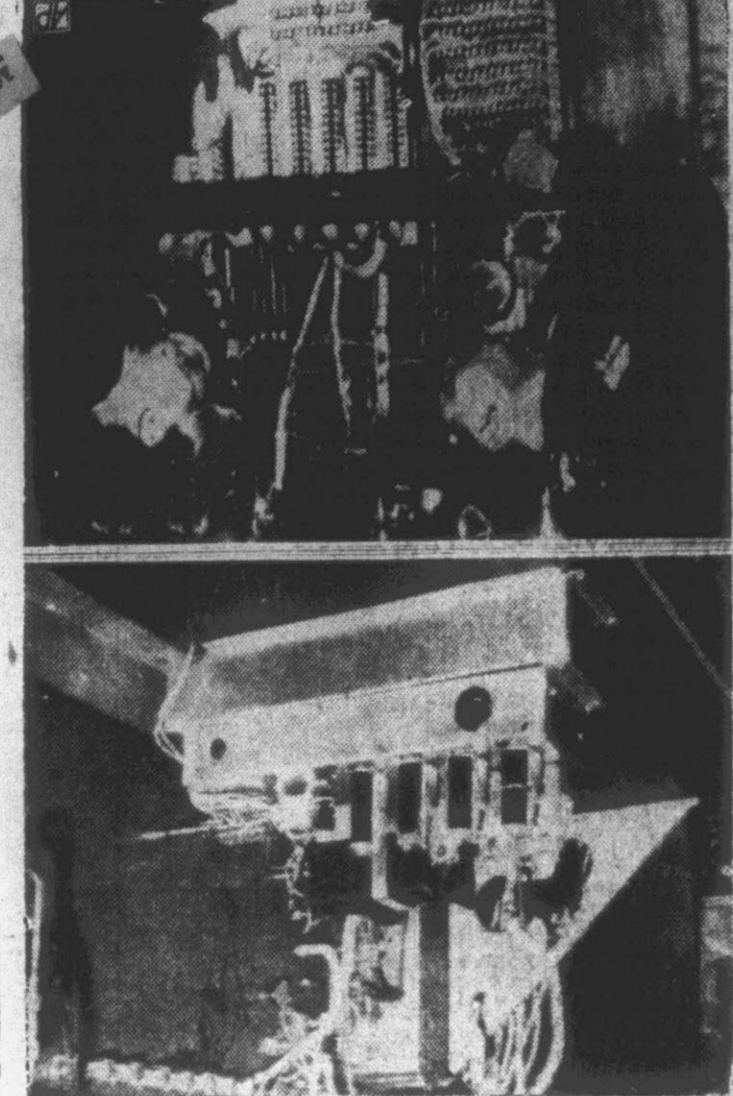
As Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, Kansas City, and Denver reported retail butter price drops from a week ago ranging up to 13 cents a pound, Dun and Bradstreet reported that buying of luxury items had decreased throughout the nation. There were also scattered reports of drops in the retail prices of eggs and fresh meats.

Dun and Bradstreet said that during the week ended Wednesday "discrimination against high priced goods increased; resistance was sporadic but generally strong enough to halt the spiral in some lines."

The business research firm said retail sales for the week were slightly higher than a year ago with a "large proportion" of consumer income spent on foods, which increased substantially in volume.

Poultry, cheese and inexpensive canned meats were in heavy demand while butter, eggs and fresh (Continued on Page Four)

Officials In Greenville Inspect Hospital Sites

U. S. Public Health Service And North Carolina Medical Care Commission Officials Confer With Site Committee

United States Public Health Service and North Carolina Medical Care Commission officials were in Greenville today to inspect sites for the proposed 145-bed hospital in Pitt County and to confer with the Hospital Site Committee.

The conference was held at Proctor hotel following luncheon. John G. Clark, general chairman of the Pitt County Hospital Committee, presided. C. S. Carr of Greenville is co-chairman.

The visiting officials were impressed with the sites, the good work of the committee and the general background in Pitt County. They will make their report and recommendations later.

Those from the North Carolina Medical Care Commission were: Dr. John A. Ferrell, executive secretary; George R. Berryman, architect; H. Grayson Brothers, assistant hospital administrator, and E. C. Hubbard, principal sanitary engineer, State Board of Health.

U. S. Public Health Service officials here were Dr. Samuel C. Ingraham II, surgeon; Larry Conway, architect, and W. H. Newell, construction engineer.

Members of the Hospital Site Committee are Alex Allen of Farmville, Mack G. Smith of Blarthur, David T. House of Bethel, Wayland Hunsucker of Winterville, W. I. Bissette of Grifton and L. B. Garrison and E. G. Flanagan of Greenville.

The people of Pitt county at a special bond election held recently voted for a bond issue to provide one-third of the funds for the hospital. The federal government will provide one-third and the state government the other one-third of the money.

It has been explained that the proposed hospital will be strictly a Pitt county institution. Plans are to locate it at a point central to the population and where it will render the best service to all of the people of the county.

General Chairman Clark was pleased with the impression the visiting officials received while here and their favorable comments. He said if all of the people of the county pull together harmoniously we are certain to get the hospital—an urgently needed institution.

PROPOSES U. S. AND RUSSIANS LEAVE KOREA

Simultaneous Withdrawal Offered By Soviet Delegate As Solution

Seoul, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Simultaneous withdrawal of American and Russian occupation forces from Korea at the beginning of 1948 was proposed today by Col. Gen. T. F. Shulov, chief Russian delegate to the joint commission on Korea.

The proposal, made at a commission meeting called at Shulov's request, was regarded by some Americans here as an attempt to avoid consideration of the Korean issue by the United Nations. The United States has placed the issue before the U. N.

American authorities here had no immediate comment on the proposal. Shulov said at the meeting that "the Soviet delegation believes we may give Koreans the opportunity to form themselves the government with the help and assistance of the allies, under the condition of withdrawal of American and Soviet troops from Korea."

"The Soviet delegation declares that if the American delegation agrees with the proposal regarding withdrawal of all foreign troops at

RATION WATER IN GREENSBORO

Seek Conserve Small Supply Left After Dam Breakeage

Greensboro, N. C., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Emergency water rationing, affecting all businesses, went into effect today as Greensboro officials sought to conserve a small supply left when the dam of Lake Brandt, the main municipal reservoir, broke under the impact of an eight-inch rain early yesterday.

Under emergency regulations ordered into effect by City Council, water shall be used for no purposes except food processing, cooking, drinking and essential sanitary measures.

Laundries, factories and every other operation depending upon city water in this city of 60,000 were shut down by the ordinance.

Public Works Director William Lybrook said the present water supply approximated 26,000,000 gallons. He estimated that with extreme rationing this supply would last until Monday.

"We expect to have pumps in operation by then and we will be able to supply users with water," Lybrook told a special session of City Council. He added that the stream flow into Lake Brandt is sufficient to meet the city's needs.

"But," he warned, "if we don't get started pumping by Monday, we will be in really bad shape."

Curious Cat, Sick Judge And Ex-GI Combat Crime

Hapeville Ga., Sept. 26.—(AP)—A curious cat, a sick judge and an ex-GI with judo training, plus a posse of 76 men, landed two youths and two girls before a U. S. commission on national auto theft charges after the two men had escaped jail by overpowering a policeman.

The whole business left this peaceful little city of Atlanta's western outskirts gasping with surprise and concluded only when the FBI rushed the four off for arraignment where they were bound over for a federal grand jury.

The four were docketed as Billy James Manis, 20, of Hazard, Ky.; Joseph Burr Fine, 20, of Greenville, Ohio; Zelma Beasley, 18, and Gloria Bennett, 18, both of Jacksonville, Fla. The men were held in lieu of \$7,500 bond each and the girls for \$2,500 each.

It all began early Thursday when Police Capt. J. P. Dunn noticed two cars laden with costly furs and coats and ordered the occupants held for investigation.

Export-Import Bank Funds In Spotlight

Takes On New Importance In Hunt For Emergency Aid For Europe Short Of Calling Special Session Of Congress

Washington, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The government's Export-Import Bank, with some \$850,000,000 in its till, took on new importance today in the hunt for emergency aid to Europe short of a special session of Congress.

Perhaps significantly there was increasing talk both within the Administration and on Capitol Hill of making use of the multi-billion dollar lending agency set up 13 years ago for the express purpose of stimulating American commerce.

While emphasizing that a decision is yet to be reached, some top level administration officials said the idea may be broached formally at the conference President Truman has arranged with Republican and Democratic Congressional leaders next Monday.

Mr. Truman told reporters yesterday he would prefer to find a way of helping friendly European countries meet their dollar crisis without calling the lawmakers back into session this fall. But he added that he still is open minded on the subject.

The Chief Executive offered his comment in connection with his call for Americans to "waste less" food in order to help meet "the ex-

Jury Convicts Dr. Choate On Abortion Charge

Lobson, Sept. 26.—(AP)—A Surry county superior court jury returned a verdict of guilty of criminal abortion today in the case of Dr. B. O. Choate, 62-year-old Spartanburg physician. The jury returned to the court room at 10 a. m. after deliberating for only half an hour.

Each member of the jury was asked individually by Judge William H. Bobbitt of Charlotte if that was his verdict. Each juror answered in the affirmative.

Clarence W. Seagle, companion of Mrs. Annie Mae Anderson of Charlotte, who died August 25, 1946, following an abortion allegedly performed by Dr. Choate, was found not guilty of manslaughter. He was convicted of criminal abortion, however, and sentenced to one to three years in state prison.

The sentence was suspended and Seagle was placed on probation and taxed with the court costs.

Will Act If UN Fails Find Settlement Acceptable To Jews And Arabs; Enforcing Of Any Unpopular Settlement Will Be Left To UN

3c 36 reg—BRITAIN ANNOUNCES

Lake Success, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Britain announced today that she had decided to end her 25-year mandate rule over Palestine if the United Nations failed to find a settlement of the Holy Land problem acceptable to both Jews and Arabs.

Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech-Jones advised the General Assembly's 55-nation Palestine committee that the problem of enforcing any unpopular settlement would have to be handled by the U. N. itself—and not Britain.

Creech-Jones also declared that Britain was ready to surrender her League of Nations mandate over the strife-torn Holy Land regardless of the nature of the Assembly's final decision.

A British spokesman made it clear that the question of terminating the mandate and the question of withdrawing entirely from Palestine were separate matters. He explained that Britain would be willing to continue in Palestine a different status after the mandate was ended if Arab-Jewish agreement could be reached. This could take the form of a United Nations trusteeship administered by Britain in place of the mandate.

It was disclosed meanwhile that Secretary of State Marshall conferred this forenoon with Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, a leading spokesman for the Jewish Agency executive for Palestine. Marshall already had met Arab spokesmen and heard their views on the Palestine problem but the nature of their talks has not been disclosed.

Creech-Jones said his government had decided on an early withdrawal of British troops and the British administration from Palestine if no settlement was reached.

This was seen as a virtual declaration that Britain would be ready to pull out on a fixed date, since there appeared to be little chance of the U. N. finding a solution acceptable to both Jews and Arabs.

Hoover Claims Misquoted By Magazine Writer

New York, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover says that he was misquoted by a magazine writer who wrote that the former President told him this country "would never be attacked by the Japanese if we had not given them provocation."

Hoover, in a letter to Sumner N. Blossom, editor of the American magazine, suggested last night that since the article in the September issue of the magazine had been quoted in the press, the statement "requires specific correction."

The former president said that the writer, Sidney Shalet, "must have confused this with statements from interviews with someone else, as not only would I not have made such an indictment of a whole nation including myself, but also it is a contradiction to many other places where I am on public record."

HIGHER RADIO TOWERS

Skyscraper Era Has Ended But Antennae Are Going Higher And Higher; Tallest Rises 960 Feet; One Company Planning Tower To Rise 1,520 Feet

Washington, Sept. 26.—(AP)—America's era of building soaring skyscrapers has ended, and may not return.

But radio towers are pushing their steel spines higher and higher. Soon they may surpass office buildings as the tallest structures ever created by man.

The Empire State Building, 1,250 feet and 102 stories tall, has held the world championship for 16 1/2 years now, and among office buildings there are no rivals in sight.

Record Enrollment Seen For ECTC Fall Session

A record-breaking enrollment of approximately 1,400 students at East Carolina Teachers college is indicated by unofficial estimates made at the close of registration on Thursday afternoon. More than 1,300 students signed up for classes during the scheduled two-day period for registration. Late arrivals are swelling the number. Students may enter classes until October 9. By that time, according to information from the office of Registrar J. K. Long, the college will have the largest number of students to be enrolled for a quarter's work in its history.

The total enrollment for the fall quarter last year was 1,210 students, of whom 694 were women and 516 were men.

Previously the peak enrollment at the college was reached in the fall of 1940, when 1,250 students attended. Of these 182 were men and 1,068 were women.

Indications are that men and women students are attending the college this fall in about equal numbers. Since dormitory space for the spring quarter 1947 the men is inadequate, many men students are rooming in Greenville. The number of men students for the first time in the history of the college came near to equalling the number of women. At that time there were 542 men and 579 women.

Classes in many departments are at present crowded. Data on the large registration in such departments as history, mathematics, and English are being secured by President J. D. Messick. These will be submitted to the state budget office in an effort to get funds for additional teachers.

(Continued from Page 1) plans to strengthen the industries of the Soviet Union. Well, from 1925 to 1941 when Hitler lashed out at the Muscovites is only 16 years, but in that comparatively brief time Stalin had done wonders with what had been a relatively outmoded industrial structure. And he had built a powerful army, as he demonstrated on the battle field.

Much of the industrial strength which Stalin had created was smashed by the invading Germans. But even as the Hitlerites were driving into Russia, Moscow was busy creating a new, great industrial area in the fastnesses of the Urals, far from the ravages of war. The products from that new zone were being used long before the war ended.

Since peace came Stalin has inaugurated a new five year plan for the rebuilding and extension of industry. In this connection Elsworth Lester Raymond, former chief of the United States Army's Russian economic section, states in an article in the magazine "United Nations World" that the Soviet Union, unknown to the outside world, has built or is building 100 industrial centers. It also is creating an immense Siberian industrial region which will include a Russian "Oak Ridge" for atomic energy development. Raymond says that these new industrial centers "bear witness to the huge strides the U.S.S.R. is making toward rebuilding an industrial economy so terribly ravaged by war."

So, while it will take Russia long to repair the damage and equip herself with great striking power, yet we shall do well not to overlook potentialities. After all, what are 25 or even 50 years in the lives of nations.

Millions of the lads of today will still be young enough to go to war a generation hence. Don't forget that!

(Continued from Page One) the beginning of 1948, then Soviet troops will be ready to leave Korea simultaneously with American forces," he said.

If the withdrawal should be effected, the Russians would leave in north Korea a Communist government backed up by an estimated 200,000 trained, armed soldiers. The Americans would leave in south Korea—barring an election before withdrawal—a predominantly rightist interim legislative assembly and an estimated 50,000 policemen, constables and coast guardsmen.

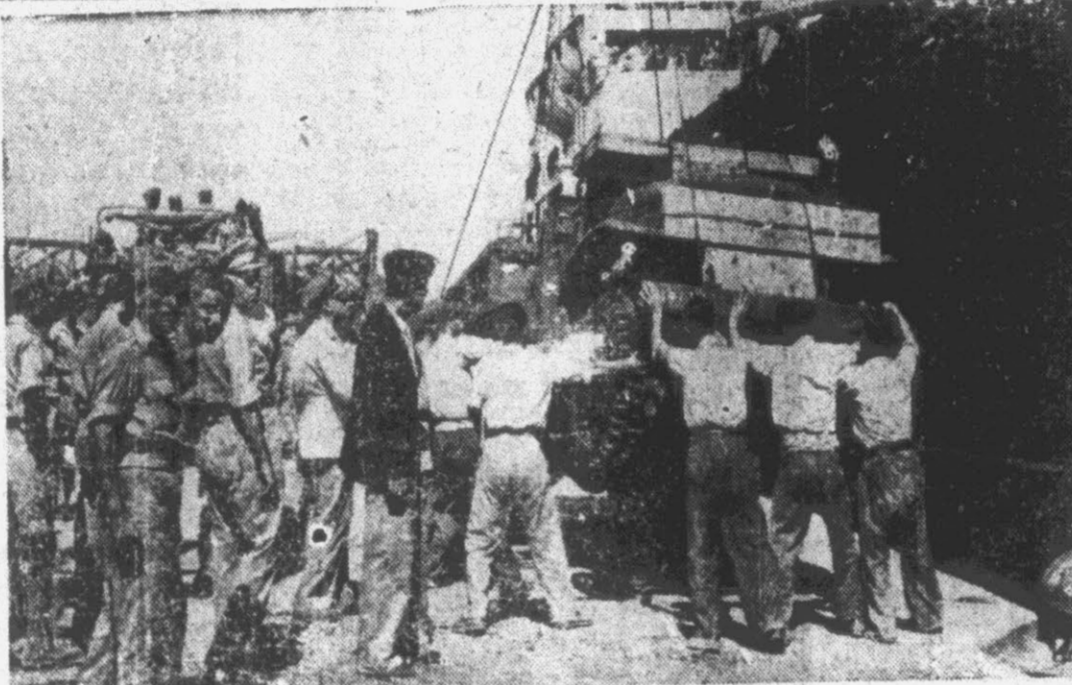
Kilgore Blames Big Speculators

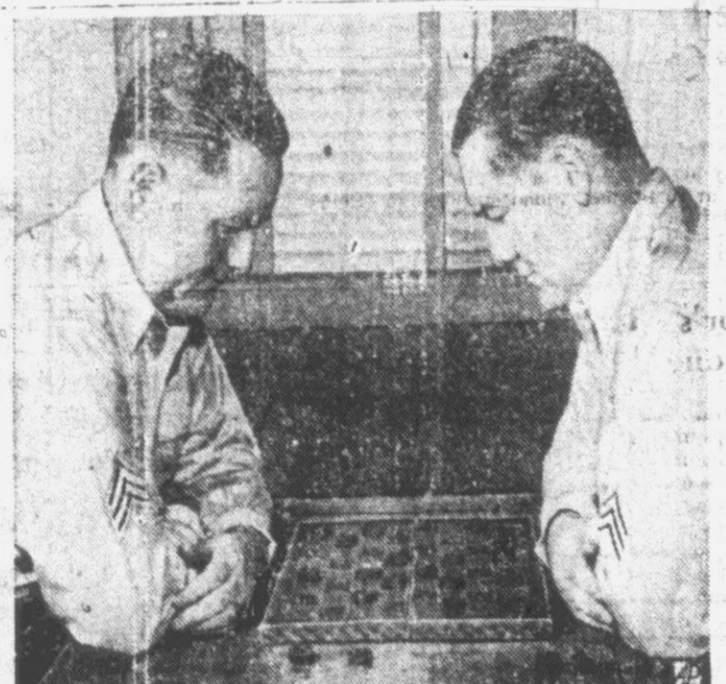
The senator said the "next eight or nine months will probably determine whether or not we will have a depression," and asserted that some industrialists and brokers are holding back commodities in order to bid up the price.

Grain Exchanges Cool Towards Raising Margin

Washington, Sept. 26—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson indicated today that representatives of the nation's three commodity exchanges had declined at a conference to raise margin requirements on speculative transactions in grain futures.

The department had asked the markets at Chicago, Minneapolis, and Kansas City to raise margin requirements to 33 1-3 per cent of the price of grain futures. This would be about double present margins.

The government does not have power to require higher margins. Anderson and commodity exchange authorities conferred for more than an hour with officials of the three markets who had requested the meeting.

(Continued From Page One) the military forces of various countries have built some high ones that have never been publicly announced.

New radio towers are coming in this country. New kinds of broadcasting — frequency modulation (FM) and television—are short in range but can extend their range greatly by using high towers.

The Cowles Broadcasting Company is planning an FM and television tower near Des Moines, Iowa, that will rise to the astonishing height of 1,500 feet.

That's more than a quarter of a mile, straight up. It's almost a hundred yards taller than the Empire State Building.

T. A. M. Craven, vice-president of the company, said today he hopes that work will begin early in 1948.

Glenn D. Gillett, the engineer who did the electrical designing for the WKY tower at Oklahoma City, says another company is showing interest in building an even taller antenna, around 1,800 feet, "somewhere in the Middle West."

So the race is on. The world's six tallest buildings, all in New York, are Empire State, 1,250 feet; Chrysler 1,046; Sixty Wall Tower 990; Bank of Woolworth 782.

In the second game, which the Dodgers also won 5-2 in 10 innings, 21-game winner Branca held the Phils to five hits and one run before retiring at the end of five innings. Harry Taylor, the brilliant rookie right-hander, made his first appearance in a month and pitched one-hit ball for two shutout innings.

HOW TO KEEP A BOX SCORE

By FRANK ECK
AP Newsfeatures Sports Editor
Baseball has broken all attendance records during the past two seasons because the sport has attracted thousands of new fans. Many of them would keep a World Series box score if they knew how.

In order to record a play-by-play accurately, the scorer must know the players' numbers according to the position they play. These numbers are: 1—pitcher; 2—catcher; 3—first baseman; 4—second baseman; 5—third baseman; 6—shortstop; 7—left fielder; 8—center fielder and 9—right fielder.

When the batter strikes out and is thrown out at first base after the catcher drops the ball, the figures would be K2-3, showing that the catcher made an assist on the eventual putout.

FC indicates a fielder's choice, meaning the fielder elects to make a play on another base runner and not the batter. This is a time at bat for the batter as is everything except interference by the catcher, bases on balls, hit by pitcher and sacrifices. When a batter bunts and in the judgment of the official scorer would have beaten the throw to first if a throw had been made he is credited with a hit.

You must realize that we have had a seven year lapse in our improvement program, five years by reason of the war when no equipment could be purchased and after the war we were able to place our orders for equipment, however, on this particular type of equipment deliveries were and now are anywhere from 24 to 36 months. For example, the turbo-generator that has been ordered more than a year now will not be delivered until October 1948, and it takes this unit to make our standby equipment adequate, in order that our present load will be firm power. Our standby equipment today is 4200 K.W. and our demand is over 6,000 K. W., the difference between these two figures has to be discontinued. Some of us are doing a splendid job co-operating. Industrial motor load has been transferred from the day period when we cannot carry all the load, until the night period when we are able to carry more load. We have appealed to you to discontinue the use of all electric service except what is ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY. What we mean by this in the home is, turn on only one light at a time. If you have a fixture with several lights, turn out all the lights but one. In our stores and filling stations, and other commercial places, cut out every other light or more if possible. ALL SHOW WINDOWS, OUTDOOR LIGHTING, WHETHER SIGNS OR OTHER DISPLAY LIGHTING, MUST BE LEFT OFF. If you will only do this, we will not have to pull any circuits at the plant, and we will get by until this generator has been repaired. If you don't help by cutting out as much as 50% of your lighting from 7 o'clock in the morning until 10 o'clock at night, the circuits in your neighborhood will be pulled. Everyone in your neighborhood will be inconvenienced, the picture shows will be dark, your refrigeration will be off and other essential uses of electricity will be discontinued.

Won't you please cooperate by keeping your lights off, and if you see any unnecessary lighting in your neighbor's home, please call him and ask him to cut off his lights. If you fail to cooperate we have no other alternative than discontinue your service at intervals of one hour or longer at such times as the load exceeds the capacity of our present equipment — 4200 K. W.

We are doing everything possible to restore adequate service as soon as possible. Won't you do your part by rendering your cooperation?

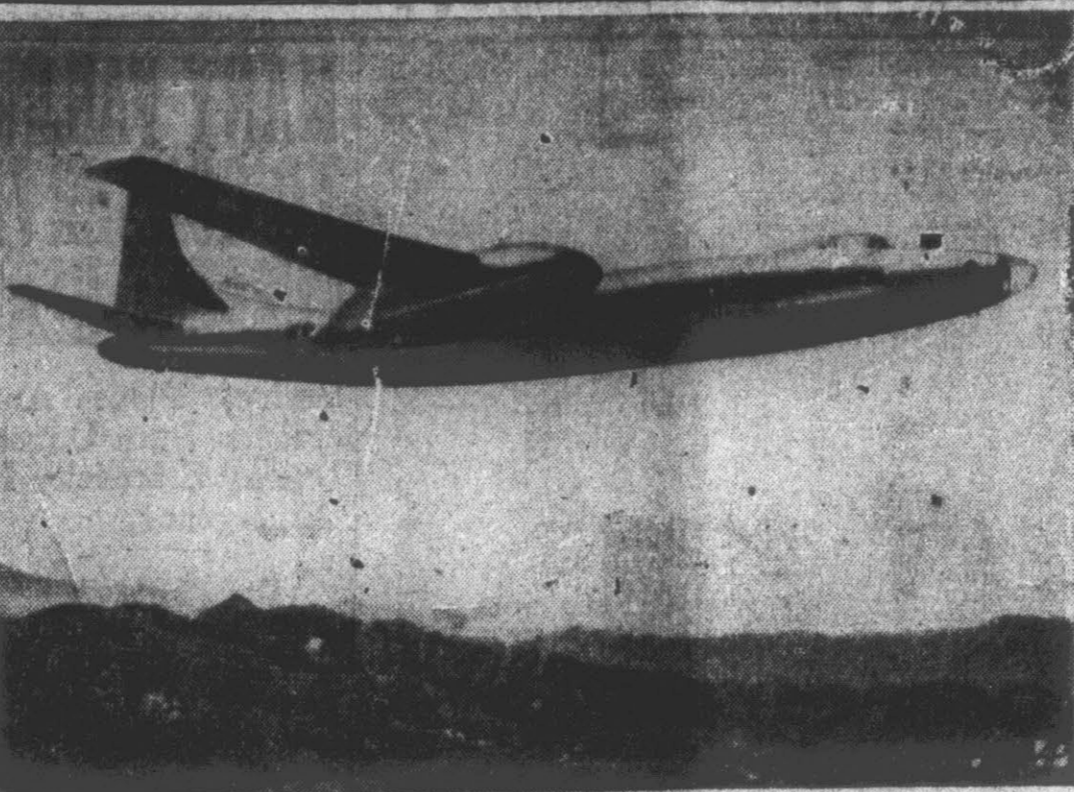

J. V. Taylor In Reminder To Peanut Growers

A last minute reminder to all Pitt County peanut growers was issued today by J. V. Taylor, chairman of the County Agricultural Conservation Committee. "October 1 is the deadline," the chairman said, "for returning the questionnaires on peanut acreages and production which were sent from the Agricultural Conservation office. Information needed by the county of

files for establishing peanut acreage allotments on each farm in 1948 will be taken from facts furnished by the farmers themselves. These questionnaires also establish each grower's right to vote in the coming referendum."

The chairman explained that if the county committee does not have complete information on a certain farm by the time allotments are established, that allotment must be made from the limited county reserve. Failure to file the questionnaires by October 1 may result in smaller allotments for some farms.

Whether marketing quotas and acreage allotments are to be in effect next year will depend upon the results of the referendum to be held later this year, the chairman points out. The referendum date will be announced shortly. The county office then will notify farmers of voting places, and provide other information about the referendum.

MANY FAILING TO CONSERVE CURRENT HERE

Business Places And Homes Burn Unnecessary Electricity In Emergency

By CHESTER WALSH

Much comment and criticism was heard today of stores and business places on Evans street and Dickinson avenue unnecessarily burning up their electric lights, thereby failing to cooperate with the Utilities Commission in its request that during the present emergency, businessmen and householders burn only "necessary" lights.

Last night—before 10 o'clock—many electric signs and display window lights were burning in spite of the urgency and importance of all electricity consumers conserving current until the damaged 5,000-kilowatt turbine generator can be repaired.

An out-of-town electrical engineer here today reminded a group of citizens that if the present generators at the power plant are overloaded they will break down. That would mean serious troubles, including the fact that without current, no water could be pumped and the health of the community would thereby be endangered.

If every electricity consumer will cut down on his lights the plant will be able to safely supply the urgently needed current until the damaged generator gets back into operation the latter part of next month. The utilities people are doing all that can be done under the circumstances. If consumers do their part, we will get by without another breakdown. An "overload" ruins any electrical machine.

Another timely suggestion came from a man who knows a lot about machinery. He suggested that power plant officials, when the load on the generators appears to be increasing to the danger point, send men out on a truck or car with a public address system and warn the public that a circuit may have to be cut off and to turn off unnecessary lights and signs.

It is a known fact that when a motorist is traveling along a highway at about 60 miles an hour, and a passenger in the car reminds, "There's a highway patrolman coming," that motorist will cut down on his gas consumption and the highway is safer.

A loud speaker traversing the city streets warning that excessive use of electricity is going to cause a circuit to be cut off might have the desired effect of causing consumers of unnecessary electricity to cut down on it, and safeguard the power plant.
