REFUGEE SHIP CAPTURED BY BRITISH NAVY

One Jew Shot, Nine Injured As Sailors Board Ship; 450 Aboard

Jerusalem, Sept. 27.—(AP)—One Jew was killed and nine others were injured today when British sailors boarded a refugee ship trying to crack the Palestine coastal blockade with approximately 450 persons aboard.

The Jew slain was shot by a British sailor who "had been surrounded by a party of Jews brandishing crowbars," a government spokesman said. Two other Jews were wounded by gunfire and a British sailor suffered a broken finger.

The ship, named "Despote," was intercepted about dawn off the coast. She was the first to try to run the coastal blockade since the interception in July of the "Exodus 1947" whose 4,300 visa-less passengers were ultimately returned to Germany. Plans were being made in Haifa for shipping the Jews aboard the "Despote" to detention camps on Cyprus.

Officials said resistance was quelled after a 20-minute battle. The ship was a converted LCT (Landing Tank Craft).

Jewish sources said she possibly was one of those recently reported to have left Italy. Because she was a hand-craft type it was believed the crew sought to beach her on Palestine shores.

British officials said the ship was being towed into Haifa under destroyer escort. Two department ships, the Empire Shelter and Empire Rest, already were in the harbor, waiting to tranship the refugees to Cyprus, where some 14,000 other Jews have been detained after failing to enter the country without immigration certificates.

Getaway Car May Be Stolen Auto

Koreans Predict Strife If Troops Are Withdrawn

Seoul, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Two south Korean political leaders predicted today that withdrawal of American and Russian occupation troops, suggested yesterday by the Soviets, would result in civil war and communication to the country.

The prediction came from two men who claim to speak for thousands of their countrymen—Syngman Rhee, rightist, and Kimmu Kwi Sie, chairman of the south Korean interim legislative assembly.

Russian Col. Gen. Terenty Shifkov, Soviet delegate to the joint commission which failed in attempts to prepare the way for a provisional government for all of Korea, proposed yesterday that occupation troops withdraw from Korea at the beginning of the year, leaving Koreans to form their own government.

Tragic Jewish-Arab Problem In Palestine Will Get No Permanent Solution When UN Takes Hand; Earlier British Promises; Past Differences; Difficulties

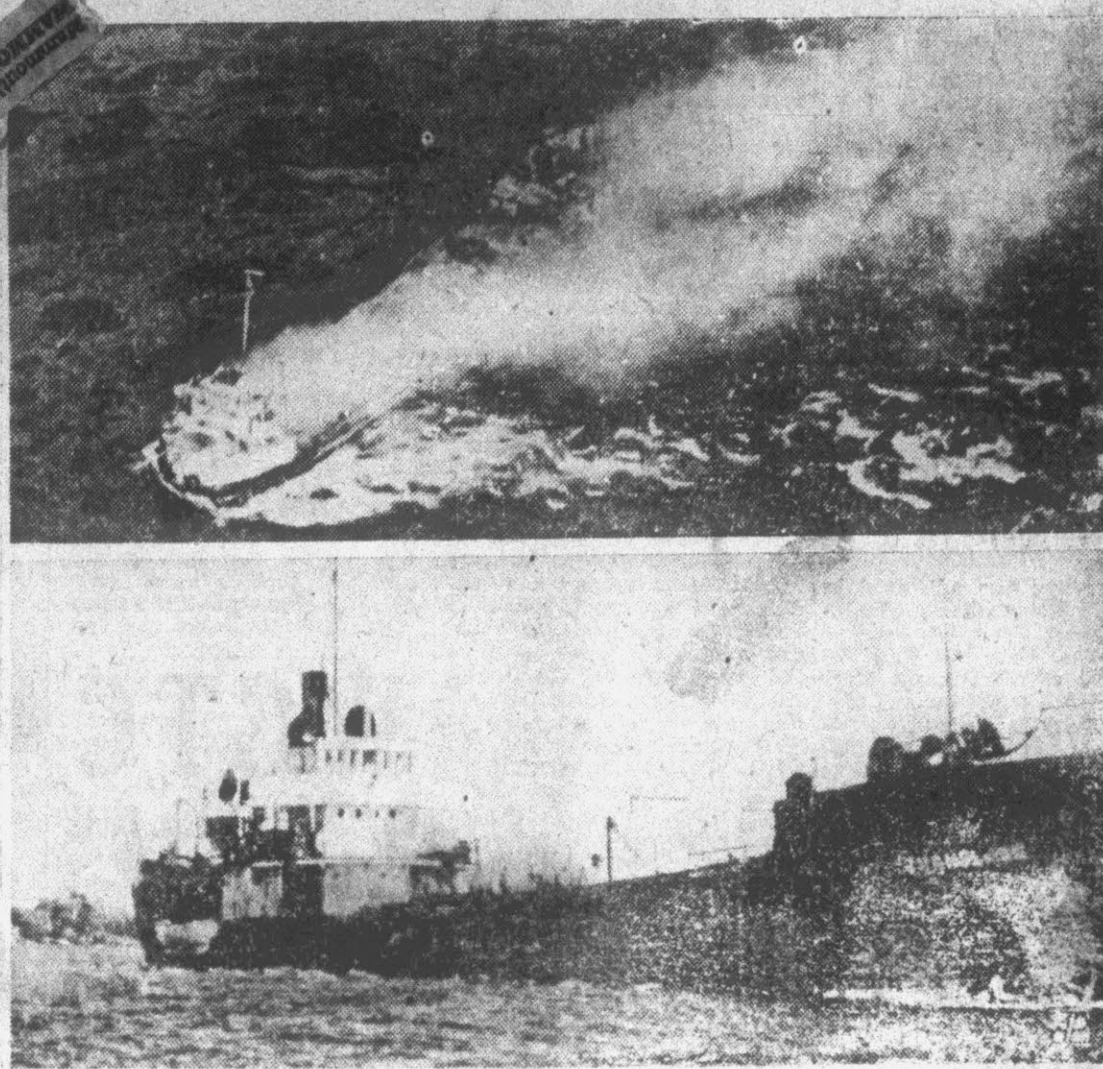
The tragic Jewish-Arab problem in Palestine may find temporary ease, but little which will contribute to a useful solution, in Britain's announcement that she will end her mandate if the United Nations doesn't work out a settlement satisfactory to both sides.

There will be ease because the quarrel between British and Jews has grown increasingly bitter through the years until the presence of the mandate power in the Holy Land has become intolerable to the Jewish inhabitants. As things now stand it's better that the British clear out.

However, one of the world's most difficult questions will remain to be answered by the United Nations. That is how to fulfill Britain's Balfour Declaration of 1917 by providing "a national home for the Jewish people" without being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities (the Arabs) in Palestine.

In the generation which has elapsed since that pledge was given, the Holy Land has seen bloodshed and destruction develop out of the differences. The great goal has become a will-o'-the-wisp and many observers have come to believe that

Skepticism Greets Newest British Move On Palestine

Statement That Britain Willing To Surrender Holy Land Mandate And Ready To Withdraw Doubtfully Received By Arabs, Jews And Some Britons

London, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Arabs, Jews and some Britons greeted with skepticism today Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech Jones' statement that Britain was willing to surrender her Palestine mandate and ready to withdraw her troops from the Holy Land.

British press comment generally was favorable and some editorials expressed hope that the British stand might mean eventual peace for Palestine. In the Holy Land itself, however, the statement got a suspicious reception.

One British official in Jerusalem jokingly offered to "bet you five quid (five pounds or \$20) we are still here five years from now."

Emile Khoury, member of the Arab Higher Executive in Palestine, described the statement as "strange" like that by Mr. Creech Jones at our London conference when he told us Britain would take responsibility for a solution only if it was agreed to by Arabs and Jews. This will make our friends the Jews very happy since it tells them they can be even more radical in their demands, knowing if the Jews are displeased, Britain will stick by them.

"We, of course, welcome the 'solemn announcement' about the termination of the mandate and withdrawal of troops. But we wish we could be sure of the honesty of this solemnity, particularly in view of

Study Radioactive Treatment Of Soil

Increased Yields On Wallace Farm After Using Treated Fertilizer; Sterilization Of Ground Said Possible Cause

New York, Sept. 27.—The theory that radioactive substances might increase the yield of crops, reported recently from the scene of the atomic bomb blast at Nagasaki, Japan, was advanced today with a statement that a similar increase was noted when radioactive fertilizer was used on Henry Wallace's 118-acre farm in Westchester County, N. Y.

A spokesman for Wallace said that tomato plants treated with radio-active fertilizer showed a 30 per cent increase in weight yield over plants grown with ordinary fertilizer.

The radio-active substance used, obtained from a neighboring watch factory where it is a by-product in the manufacture of radium treated watches, constituted about one-trillionth of the total fertilizer used by Wallace.

Meanwhile, Hugo Gernsback, president of Raderath Publications, advanced the explanation that sterilization of the ground by the Nagasaki atomic bomb two years ago accounts for the increased crop yield.

Gernsback showed a prediction he made soon after explosion of the bomb that sometime in the future crop yields would be increased by 200 to 300 per cent by sterilizing the ground with radioactive rays that would kill all the crop pests.

Three Soldiers Are Released

Belgrade, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Three U.S. soldiers arrested at the Trieste frontier Monday were released last night, officials said today.

The U.S. embassy has forwarded a note to the Yugoslav foreign ministry requesting information on the incident.

The Foreign Office announced yesterday that an oral apology had been tendered the American ambassador, Cavendish Cannon, following a conference by Cannon yesterday with Assistant Foreign Minister Vladimir Velibit.

Sheriff Takes Mrs. Miller To Raleigh

Lumberton, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Mrs. David Miller, 24, today reported to Sheriff W. C. Britt of Robeson county and was driven to Raleigh to begin serving a sentence of four to eight years in Central Prison for secret assault in the hired shooting of her husband.

Her father and Deputy Sheriff Grady Jackson accompanied her. Sheriff Britt said Mrs. Miller, the mother of a young boy and girl, was neatly dressed and appeared composed.

SEN. TAFT TO PUSH SOCIAL LEGISLATION

Maps Plans For What May Be Part Of Platform For 1948 Nomination

Portland, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—A powerful campaign to force early action by Congress on so-called "social" legislation was mapped today by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) as an apparently integral part of his expected bid for the 1948 Republican presidential nomination.

Despite his forecast of opposition by other Republicans, the Ohio senator stood committed today to head a drive for legislation to expand old age assistance, increase unemployment compensation, construct public housing and provide state-administered federal aid for health and education.

All this, Taft told an audience of Republican club members at Gearhart, Ore. last night, may cost the federal government \$1,000,000,000 a year.

Conceding that the after-war budget situation may force a "modest beginning," nevertheless Taft said he believes "the Republican party will and should proceed with these measures in the next session."

The Ohio senator, who speaks at a meeting of Oregon State College students at Corvallis tonight after viewing the Oregon-Texas football game here today, made it plain he expects many Republicans to demand that action on welfare legislation be postponed until after the 1948 election.

He said that some of his party members "hesitate to undertake these additional activities if they are to be set up and administered by men who really do not believe in state or local control or independence."

"The answer to lower grain prices is to stop exporting grain," declared J. O. McClinton, president of the Chicago Board of Trade.

Daylight Saving Time Nears End

New York, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Millions of Americans who lost an hour of sleep last April 27 will even the score for another year when they push their clocks back one hour tomorrow to mark the end of Daylight Saving Time.

Daylight time will end in most communities where it has been observed at 2 a.m. tomorrow. Some 650 communities in the United States and Canada and 19 foreign countries observed daylight time this year.

STEEL FOR PIPELINE

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The Commerce Department, overriding a protest by Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.), last night authorized the export of 20,000 tons of steel to start a pipeline linking Saudi-Arabian oil fields with the Mediterranean.

Babson Discusses Farm Prices

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 26.—During the past 24 hours I have been flying over the great farming area of the Central West. I have not only seen things with my eyes, but also heard things with my ears.

Let me first say that farmers are not being fooled by these high prices. They know that \$2.90 for wheat and \$2.65 for corn is not going to hold. They remember that, throughout all U. S. history, only during and directly after wars, have farmers made much money. Moreover, the wise ones are now using their profits to get out of debt, to buy for cash new machinery, and lay up a good bank balance for the future.

They also tell me that although farm prices rise gradually during boom time, yet when prices fall, they collapse all at once. This is because farmers get panic-stricken when they see prices begin to fall and all farmers try to dump at once. They admit they are now playing the same game with wheat and corn as investors in 1929, played

Reasons For High Prices

(1) Exports to Europe. During 1946 more than 15,000,000 tons of food were shipped to Europe. Heavy movements of foodstuffs to Europe will continue due to its poor crop conditions.

(2) Poor U. S. Weather Conditions. The American grain harvest will be 15,000,000 tons under normal, due to spring floods and unsatisfactory growing conditions, with a constantly increasing population.

(3) Wasteful American Eating Habits. Americans have always been the most wasteful people in the world when it comes to food consumption. High consumer income has increased this wastefulness.

(4) Putting So Much Grain Into Liquor. The eight billion dollar liquor business consumes huge quantities of grain for brewing of alcoholic beverages. Despite starvation abroad, this "non-essential" industry continues uninterrupted in the production of liquor.

Russia Seen Ready To Force 'Warmonger' Attack On U.S.

Hannegan Announces He Will Resign Party Post

Chairman Of Demo Nat'l Committee To Quit October 29; Rhode Island Senator Hinted As His Probable Successor

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Postmaster General Robert E. Hannegan announced today he is resigning as chairman of the Democratic National Committee because of health, and that President Truman has indicated approval of Senator J. Howard McGrath of Rhode Island to be the new chairman.

Hannegan said he is giving up the chairmanship he took over in January, 1944, on the advice of physicians who urged that he limit his activities. He will stay on as postmaster general.

He called a meeting of the national committee for Oct. 29 and said his resignation will be effective

as of that date at 11 a.m. when the meeting starts.

Hannegan said he had suggested Senator McGrath's name to President Truman as his successor and the President has indicated his approval.

Simultaneously, the chairman announced that Gasi Sullivan, executive director and vice chairman of the committee, a former assistant postmaster general who has been exercising full power in Hannegan's absence, is resigning on the same date, Oct. 29.

It is expected that Senator McGrath would keep his Senate seat if he takes over as committee chairman. Others have done so in the past, including Cordell Hull who served as domestic chairman while a member of the House in the early twenties, and Senator Fess of Ohio remained in the Senate while heading the Republican committee.

McGrath is a former governor of Rhode Island and one time solicitor general of the United States. He is 43.

Another Appeal

Athens, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Informed sources said Premier Triumfopoulos would ask the U.S. aid mission today for an additional \$100,000,000 to finance an increase in forces to combat guerrillas.

The amount would be added to the \$300,000,000 already granted for Greek military aid and civilian relief purposes.

The informants said Sophoulis was expected to make his request at a conference with Dwight P. Griswold, chief of the U.S. aid mission.

YOUTH GIVES UP TO POLICE

Hunted In Bank Hold-up, Belk Surrenders In Sumter, S.C.

Sumter, S. C., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Robert Dillon Belk, 17, sought by police in both Carolinas for the alleged robbery of a Peachland, N. C. bank yesterday, gave himself up to police officers here early today.

Belk, known familiarly as Petes, was hunted as one of the two young gunmen who reportedly robbed the Bank of Peachland of \$13,944. His alleged accomplice, Walter Hamond, 16, was shot by Belk during the robbery.

According to Chief W. M. Hall of the city police force here, Belk stole into Sumter at 5 this morning to see his wife who goes under the name of Ida Mae Culp. Police had warned her to persuade him to give himself up and at 7 a. m. he calmly walked into police headquarters, identified himself and put himself in the hands of authorities.

In addition to participating in the bank robbery, Chief Hall said, Belk has admitted to the stealing of a 1937 Buick Chevrolet.

The 32 revolver reportedly used by Belk in the robbery and subsequent shooting was purchased, he told officers, from a Sumter man. Police are holding Belk pending arrival of FBI officers this afternoon.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Women must let their hair down if they want to look new on top. The National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association, which opened a convention today has created a "new look" to go with the longer fashions.

It will be flat and smooth and fairly short and will face forward instead of back and up, Mrs. Margaret Condos, of Hollywood, association president, said.

The updo, she added, is as dead as last year's short 'kirt.

Neatness and sleekness is the new password. In keeping with the 1890 elegance of today's fashions, she said.

Mrs. Condos explained that by describing the new hairdress as facing forward instead of back and up, she meant it would be similar to the "DIPLS" of yesterday, in which the waves were combed forward in soft loops over the edge of the face.

Quintuplets In USSR Announced

London, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The Soviet agency Tass reported today that a Russian woman had borne quintuplets, three boys and two girls. It said all five were developing normally and the young mother, Khondia Tsyrenzhapova, was in good health.

Tass added the mother was "of a Soviet Mongolian collective farm."

DIDN'T NOTICE FREAK WRECK

Train Engineer Travelled Mile Before Missing Cars

Salem, Ore., Sept. 27.—Two train men were injured early this morning when nine cars of the south-bound Pacific coast limited jumped the tracks in a freak derailment just south of Salem and the locomotive continued a mile before the engineer discovered he had lost his train.

Engineer Victor Partipilo, of Portland, told reporters after the accident that the limited had reached a speed of only 35 miles an hour after pulling out of the Salem station shortly after midnight.

Partipilo said he heard no noise and felt no jar when the derailment near a siding a mile south of Salem wrenched the cars loose from the locomotive.

"The first I knew anything was wrong was when I looked back and saw I had no train. I backed up about a mile before I came on the wreckage," the engineer said. Neither he nor Southern Pacific officials offered any explanation of the cause of the accident.

Three refrigerator cars, three baggage cars, a mail car and two passenger coaches were derailed. Several of the cars directly behind the engine overturned, but the passenger coaches barely left the track and none of those aboard was injured or shaken badly.

Report On U.S. Crime

Notes On FBI Statistics; Crime Up In Rural Areas, Down In Cities And Towns; Fewer Auto Thefts; Tips To Vacationers; Overall Decrease In Lawbreaking

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Some notes on crime in the U.S.A.: The FBI issued a crime report the other day.

The report said crime in the first six months of 1947 was up 7.5 per cent in rural areas and down 2.3 per cent in the cities and towns, compared with the same period of 1946.

The FBI didn't give the totals for the whole country. But if you add the rural crimes and the city crimes together, you discover that crime in the whole country was down one per cent.

Now, that decline appears to be a glimmer of good news in the crime picture, because crimes increased sharply from 1945 to 1946, and many feared it was still going up. But the situation is summed up a bit by the fact that the slight decrease this year is more than accounted for by a 20 per cent drop in auto thefts.

If you omit auto thefts from the figures, you find that other major crimes increased nearly three per cent.

The big decrease in auto thefts is not wholly explained, but this may have something to do with it: Police are recovering about 95 per cent of all stolen cars these days. Another thing that isn't fully ex-

Evidence Increases Issue Will Be Pushed To Showdown To Stave Off Apparent Defeat On Greek And Veto Struggle; No Grounds Of Compromise Developing

Lake Success, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Fighting from a tough minority position, Russia showed every evidence today of forcing its warmonger attack on the U. S. to a complete showdown in the United Nations while staving off as long as possible apparent defeat on such American-backed issues as Greece and the veto.

Andrei Y. Vishinsky, Russia's deputy foreign minister, repeated and expanded at a news conference yesterday the warmonger charges he made before the assembly Sept. 18.

Moreover, there were indications that a firm Soviet position on Palestine may now be emerging which would be critical of British policies but not necessarily in disagreement with the final decisions of the U. S. on this issue, which is being handled by Secretary of State Marshall with extreme caution at the moment.

As the assembly's second week drew to a close one thing had become clear: Two weeks of debate and scores of speeches had produced no grounds for compromise on any of the major issues. The split between east and west was wider than ever. Among some delegates there was considerable uncertainty as to whether the United Nations could be made to work effectively on the principle of universality—inclusion of all "peace-loving nations."

Vishinsky made clear at his news conference yesterday that Russia intends to press its warmonger case to the limit. By what he said and did not say, Vishinsky brought his accusations closer to President Truman and Secretary Marshall, both of whom have recently been under attack in the Soviet press.

The Palestine situation was raised by Vishinsky in connection with Britain's earlier announcement to the U. N. Palestine Committee that the British were ready to give up their mandate for the Holy Land and that they definitely would withdraw if the United Nations proposed an Arab-Jewish solution which was unsatisfactory to either side. This was by way of warning the U. N. that the British would not necessarily enforce U. N. policy decisions.

Vishinsky said he did not know exactly what the British policy statement meant, but "I'm afraid the British proposal for ultimate withdrawal from Palestine should mean ultimate withdrawal of Jews from Palestine—if that is so our attitude is certainly negative."

Lange Condemns Marshall Plan

Lake Success, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Dr. Oscar Lange, of Poland, today attacked the Marshall Plan program, drafted at Paris as "inadequate" and harmful to United Nations prestige and effectiveness.

The Polish delegate told the U.N. Assembly's Economic and Financial Committee that the 16 nations participating in the Marshall Plan program "constitute no economic entity and have been artificially and haphazardly put together." The whole plan, he declared, was "an unstable arrangement."

Dear Consumer:

We have tried to tell you, through our local paper, radio, telephone and directly to some of you personally just how serious our present condition is, due to the failure of our large generator on Friday morning, the 19th.

Repairing this generator will take several weeks and we are not expecting it to be back in service until the latter part of October. This is not an unusual breakdown in power plant operation, but in the past, when we had a breakdown of this nature, our standby equipment was adequate to carry our entire load and you knew nothing about our troubles.

You must realize that we have had a seven year lapse in our improvement program, five years by reason of the war when no equipment could be purchased and after the war we were able to place our orders for equipment, however, on this particular type of equipment deliveries were and now are anywhere from 24 to 36 months. For example, the turbo-generator that has been ordered more than a year now will not be delivered until October 1948, and it takes this unit to make our standby equipment adequate, in order that our present load will be firm power. Our standby equipment today is 4200 K.W. and our demand is over 6,000 K. W., the difference between these two figures has to be discontinued. Some of us are doing a splendid job co-operating. Industrial motor load has been transferred from the day period when we cannot carry all the load, until the night period when we are able to carry more load. We have appealed to you to discontinue the use of all electric service except what is ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY. What we mean by this in the home is, turn on only one light at a time. If you have a fixture with several lights, turn out all the lights but one. In our stores and filling stations, and other commercial places, cut out every other light or more if possible. ALL SHOW WINDOWS, OUTDOOR LIGHTING, WHEATHER SIGNS OR OTHER DISPLAY LIGHTING, MUST BE LEFT OFF. If you will only do this, we will not have to pull any circuits at the plant, and we will get by until this generator has been repaired. If you don't help by cutting out as much as 50% of your lighting from 7 o'clock in the morning until 10 o'clock at night, the circuits in your neighborhood will be pulled. Everyone in your neighborhood will be inconvenienced. The picture shows will be dark, your refrigeration will be off and other essential uses of electricity will be discontinued.

Won't you please cooperate by keeping your lights off, and if you see any unnecessary lighting in your neighbor's home, please call him and ask him to cut off his lights. If you fail to cooperate we have no other alternative than discontinue your service at intervals of one hour or longer at such times as the load exceeds the capacity of our present equipment — 4200 K. W.

We are doing everything possible to restore adequate service as soon as possible. Won't you do your part by rendering your cooperation?

"Farmers who grow tobacco can't kid themselves, they have got to reduce the acreage planted to tobacco, but they should do it gradually and not make the tenant farmers suffer," J. Con Lanier, guest speaker at the Kiwanis Club's week-long supper meeting last night, said, with emphasis.

Lanier is a former state senator, a tobacco grower on a large scale, prominent attorney, and executive secretary for the Leaf Tobacco Exporters Association and the Tobacco Association of the U.S.

He discussed parity prices and said that parity for flue-cured tobacco has prevailed in 12 out of the last 14 years, and that the growers have made a profit during these years but he ominously warned that they must reduce the tobacco crop, plant small grain and other farm crops to come out even at the end of the year. The speaker pointed out that foreign countries cannot buy the flue-cured leaf while they are hungry, as they did in the past, and he passed along the warning that farmers must be ready to make the change in crops.

Pitt County Group Give Warning To Landowners; Timber's Valuable

Landowners, especially farmers, appreciate what N. S. (Kid) Tyson, county forest fire warden, and his associates are doing to prevent forest fires and to instruct landowners about the value of their timber land.

At a meeting of county and district forest fire wardens last night, representative men from all parts of Pitt County were there and discussed their problems. They pointed out that landowners are now co-operating to prevent woods fires and are cooperating with the department in its educational program to avoid taking chances of starting woods fires. It was stated that landowners are required by state law to get the consent of adjoining landowners to burn brush and advance notice should be given. There's a forest fire warden in all sections of the county—nine of them. They are doing a good job and making sacrifices to avoid the damaging woods fires.

District forest wardens at the meeting last night were Edward Ward, assistant forest warden, and Leslie Davis, district ranger, both of New Bern. Pitt County forest fire wardens present were "Potato King" James Edwards of Stokesboro, district warden; Connie Eagles, soil conservationist for the federal government, who made a good talk; Sam C. Winchester, county farm agent; J. H. Budy of Farmville, district forest warden; County Commissioner Brown Hodges of Grifton; Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson; Deputy Sheriff Leggett; Wilbur A. Garris of Ayden, district warden, and Chester Walsh.

During the talks by various members of the group, Connie Eagles gave special praise to the County Board of Commissioners, especially Chairman Jasper Smith of Bethel, for their cooperation and support.

The theme of the meeting might be marked down as: "Timber is as valuable as any farm crop. Save it by trying to prevent woods fires, and exterminating them when somebody's carelessness causes them."
