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SEES END OF OVERLAPPING TAX PROBLEM

Senator Holds Out Hope For Taxpayer; Looks For Changes In Tax-Writing

Washington, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Senator O'Connor (D-Md.) held out hope today that taxpayers eventually will be relieved of some overlapping taxation by federal, state and local governments.

The Maryland senator told a reporter that Congress members who attended a recent Chicago conference with 11 governors "unanimously agreed" that the federal government "should take the first step by giving up certain tax fields to the states."

"We now have federal, state and local taxes pyramiding in certain fields," O'Connor said. "If we can get an agreement among these various tax bodies to operate in certain areas it will mean eventual tax reduction."

Governors representing the council of state governments and congressmen who are members of the Senate and House tax writing and government expenditures committees attended the Chicago meeting.

O'Connor said that some Congress members believe the federal government should step out of four tax areas where states and cities also operate. He listed these as levies on gasoline, certain amusements, local telephone calls and intrastate utilities.

The senator said that the annual tax burden is about \$60,000,000,000 which "takes about 30 cents or more out of every dollar of income even with a favorable \$180,000,000 income." This represents tax collections by federal, state, county and city governments.

He said so-called amusement taxes net about \$450,000,000 a year at state levels and these could best be collected and managed at the state and local levels.

Soviet-U. S. Clash Over Press Rights

Fight Over Freedom Of The Press Shapes Up In UN As Russia Presses "Warmongering" Accusations; Eleanor's Reply

Lake Success, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A head-on Soviet American clash over freedom of the press shaped up today as a sharp initial test of the determined Soviet campaign to get the United Nations Assembly to brand the United States as a hotbed of anti-Russian "warmongering."

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was leading the American fight against the Soviet drive, evidently as part of a carefully planned American delegation strategy to present the issue as one of democratic freedoms versus totalitarianism.

"We cling to the rights of criticism and disagreement" in the U. S., Mrs. Roosevelt told the United Nations Social Committee in a terse statement last night.

"In my country," she said to the other representatives of U. N.'s 57 member nations, "we have certain

Pulling Out

Rome, Oct. 4.—(AP)—American occupation troops will begin pulling out of Italy Monday, U. S. Mediterranean theater headquarters announced at Leghorn today. The last troops, except for small liquidating units, will sail December 2.

The troops are required to be out of the country within 90 days from September 15, the date Italy's peace treaty was ratified.

LANDOWNER TO SAVE HIS SOIL

Ex-Tenant Is First To Own Farm Under Recent Federal Law

Americus, Ga., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Now that ex-tenant farmer Robert A. Hale is a landowner—the nation's first through an insured farm ownership plan—he's going to do something about those gulleys and washing-away soil.

The 39-year-old Georgian got possession of 150 acres for himself, wife and two children at a big ceremony at the ball park yesterday. He was almost crowded out by speeches of two U. S. senators, a national representative and a governor, but his turn came and he said he was about the "most happiest man in the world."

Folks couldn't know how happy he was, he went on, unless they had been kicked around from farm to farm as he had.

"You hated to see the soil wash away and gulleys come into the land," he said, "but it would have been foolish to do something about it when you didn't know whether you were going to live there next year or not. I'll do something about it now."

Rep. Stephen Pace (D-Ga.) commented that this was one of the goals he had in mind when he introduced a bill at the last Congress to provide the loans.

News Briefs

Antwerp, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The bodies of 5,600 American soldiers who died in the second world war were sailed for home today from this ancient Belgian port. They are the first to be returned upon request of next of kin.

Washington, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The War Assets Administration has sold a major portion of Camp Butler, wartime troop training center near Durham, N. C., to the State of North Carolina. The sale announced yesterday, was for \$1,350,000.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Dr. Max Planck, 89-year-old German physicist and Nobel prize winner, died last night. The Goettingen University clinic announced today.

Dr. Planck, who originated the Quantum theory in 1900 after researches into the atomic structure of radiation, ranked with Albert Einstein as one of the world's foremost scientists.

Baltimore, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Three seamen convicted of murder for complicity in fire bombing of a rooming house where six Spanish American seafarers died at the height of a maritime strike were sentenced today to life imprisonment.

Grasshopper Is Guilty In Wreck

Detroit, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Zygmunt Kobylke, 24, can thank a grasshopper, (deceased) for freeing him on a traffic negligence charge. The grasshopper was being chased as potential fish bait by 81-year-old James Durand when both were struck by Kobylke's car. Durand was injured slightly; the insect lost its life.

Traffic Referee John M. Wise ruled yesterday that the accident was the grasshopper's fault and dismissed the case.

OPEN BIDS ON BUILDING OF NEW VESSELS

Shipbuilders Make Offers For Post-War Round-The-World Liners

Washington, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The dream of a crack American passenger fleet moved forward today with the announcement that U. S. shipbuilders have bid about \$10,000,000 to \$17,000,000 per vessel to build five ships for round-the-world trade.

This is the first post-war price tag on the cost of turning out modern ships to compete on the waters of the world with foreign tonnage.

The government started ten years ago to revive the American Merchant Marine as (1) a means of livelihood for thousands of citizens and (2) a defense measure.

The war interrupted these plans and, when it ended, left this country with plenty of war shipping, but few top-car cargo ships, and even less passenger ships.

The American President Lines, San Francisco, applied to the Maritime Commission for a construction-differential subsidy to build five 60-foot passenger-cargo vessels. The subsidies make up for the higher cost of building ships in the United States than in foreign yards.

The Maritime Commission opened bids yesterday from four companies whose prices ranged from \$9,690,000 to \$16,881,000 per vessel. The Commission took no immediate action on the bids, but the and Drydock Co., apparently was low bidder for three of the ships—the maximum allowed one firm.

Snakes, Toads In Mass Migration

Jamestown, N.D., Oct. 4.—(AP)—St. Patrick was no where in sight, but thousands of snakes and toads are taking part in a great migration between Steele and Jamestown, a Fargo motorist reported.

Math J. Kraker, who drove the 60 miles between Jamestown and Steele yesterday, said that thousands of the reptiles were crossing U. S. Highway 10 and that hundreds of them had been killed by traffic.

Kraker said it appeared the snakes were slithering northward, while the toads were hopping to the south.

Dennis Day Asks To Resume Name

Los Angeles, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Now Singer Dennis Day wants his old name back.

Christened Owen Patrick McNulty, he adopted Dennis Day as a professional name, and had it legalized when he went into the navy in 1944.

Bigger, Better County Fair Here October 20

General repair and improvements combined with painting, fencing, new roofs for buildings, and overall plans for betterment are being pushed for the opening of the 12th annual Pitt County Fair to be held here the entire week of October 20 through 25.

In addition to the permanent buildings now on the fairgrounds, arrangements are being made for the erection of big tents to take care of the additional space required to house the extra exhibits for which space has already been requested of the fair officers.

A campaign to advertise the event all over the county is now under way and this week will see a corps of professional advertising men cover all parts of the surrounding territory with special advertising signs and posters. In addition, all newspapers in the county and the radio will be used to draw attention to a bigger and better fair.

Distribution of the official premium list for the event was undertaken and completed by mail some weeks ago. Cash premiums to be awarded will amount to more than \$1,200, an increase of some 25 per cent over that of any previous year.

New departments have been added, with special attention to home demonstration and 4-H clubs. Prize money for all departments has been increased, and with additional space for display, this year's entries of produce and products is expected to reach a new high.

Department heads and classes over which they will have charge are as follows: J. H. Mobley as superintendent in charge, all agricultural and horticultural products, livestock and poultry will be under his supervision. The junior department with W. E. Little as supervisor will embrace all bonafide club members and vocational education students' entries of farm and garden crops, swine, cattle, poultry, individual corn and tobacco exhibits.

The 4-H Clubs, whose entries will be in group form will be under the direction of Miss Lillian Hines. Mrs. Verona Joyner Langford will officiate as superintendent over all exhibits of home baked products, house furnishings, canned fruits and vegetables, canning and plants.

Babson Discusses Home Building

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 4.—Next to specific questions about securities, the people out here, at the present time, seem most interested in problems concerning the residential building outlook. Many are asking whether they should build now or wait. Others want to know whether they should build at all or buy an older-type house. I shall discuss these problems today.

Shall I Build Now Or Wait? Specifically, I advise your waiting a little while longer if you can possibly do so. Pressure on building materials and building labor is still very strong. This means that your freedom to insist on quality is still restricted. Those of you who want the best should be in a better position to demand it next year than now.

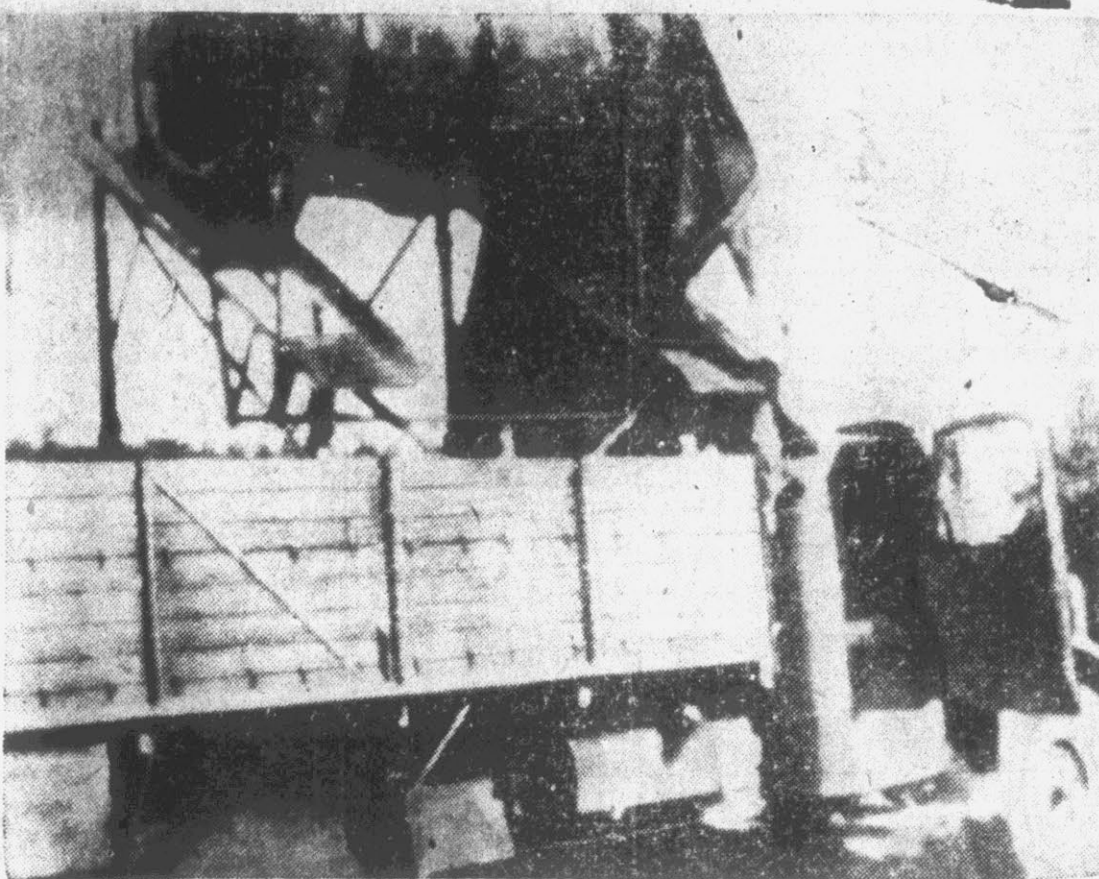
As far as price is concerned, I do not believe you will save any money by waiting until next year. Your saving will be in quality, which, after all, is most important when you are making a 20, 30 or 50 year investment. It also is wise to wait until you can get a firm contract price and build under an architect's supervision.

What About Demand? The years 1939 through 1946 saw a net increase in families of about 9,600,000. During that period, however, there were only 2,600,000 new dwellings added to the total. At the beginning of this year, I therefore estimate an accumulated demand for about 7,000,000 dwelling units. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that there were 359,000 units completed in the first half of 1947. During the last half of the year, there should be 700,000 more completions. Yet, 1,000,000 more completions will get married in 1947!

Hence, it can be seen that the pressure of demand remains extremely high. This prevents any sharp early decline in the cost of construction. I, however, would predict that during 1948 the price of building will remain close to present levels.

FBI JOINS IN BLAST PROBE

Officers Check For Fingerprints; Sheriff Says No Clues

Etowah, Tenn., Oct. 4.—(AP)—The FBI joined county and city police today in investigating a mysterious automobile explosion which mangled and killed T. Burkett Ivins, prominent figure in McMinn County's turbulent politics.

Ivins was a lieutenant in the Paul Cantrell political machine which was ousted in a bullet-ridden election in August, 1946, when veterans' group stormed the county jail where ballots were held.

The 65-year-old democratic leader was killed yesterday when a terrific explosion ripped his car to pieces and blew a fender through the garage roof as he stepped on the starter.

"We've got nothing to work on," said Sheriff Knox Henry shortly afterwards. He said the explosive charge had been attached to the fuel pump of the car with two wires connected to spark plugs.

Federal Bureau of Investigation officers were to assist Sheriff Henry in taking fingerprints from the car. Ivins was scheduled to go on trial Monday for the slaying of Charles Dunn, a nephew of Lake Dunn, a political enemy of Ivins. He had pleaded self defense.

OVERELL JURY IS STILL OUT

Tense Throng Packs Courtroom After Longest Murder Trial

Santa Ana, Calif., Oct. 4.—(AP)—The jury trying Louise Overell and George (Bud) Gollum for the yacht-blast deaths of her parents was continuing deliberations today after failing to reach a verdict last night while a tense throng packed the courtroom until nearly midnight waiting for a decision.

Twice during the evening the jurors called for exhibits, and then returned to court to ask for added instructions on the evidence in the longest murder case on record which they received from Judge Kenneth Morrison at 4:16 o'clock yesterday afternoon, 74 trial days after it began May 26.

The jury quit for the night at 11:53 p. m. Public interest in the trial, which has engrossed this orange belt area, continued last night. Auto-observers packed on both sides of the four blocks surrounding the red sandstone court house gave the city a gala Saturday night appearance, and the court room was packed with curious crowd that overflowed into the attorney's enclosure.

Proclamation

Grain For Food Relief Liquor Industry Pledges

Nine Charges

Allentown, Pa., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Erbor J. Worzeck, 23, was held without bail today after pleading guilty to nine charges in connection with the abduction of Allentown's police chief.

Worzeck pleaded guilty to assault with intent to kill, theft of an auto, robbery of a revolver, carrying firearms without a license and assault with threat to kill at his arraignment yesterday before Alderman Thomas M. Miller. An additional charge of kidnapping was dropped.

Will Stop Using Wheat And Cut Corn, Barley And Rye Consumption By Half; Luckman Turns To Brewers

Washington, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Armed with a pledge from more than half of the whiskey industry to cut its grain consumption 50 percent, President Truman's Citizens Food Committee today tackled the nation's brewers for a similar concession to Western Europe's distress.

The Distilled Spirits Institute, after a long session with Committee Chairman Charles Luckman and his aides, voluntarily agreed last night to stop using wheat and cut the use of corn, barley and rye by 50 percent. Luckman said the institute represents 60 percent of the industry.

He predicted the remaining 40 percent would follow suit, while an institute spokesman said enough whiskey is now on hand to maintain a "steady flow to the market" of good whiskey despite curtailed operations.

But Publicker Industries, Inc. said the cut "doesn't do enough" and offered to do more. The big beverage and commercial alcohol firm told Luckman its companies "stand ready to join immediately in continuing all use of grain of any kind in the manufacture of distilled spirits" wherever the government requests.

The agreement with the distillers, announced by Luckman at the White House, was the committee's first major move in support of Mr. Truman's voluntary "self-rationing" plan designed to save 100,000,000 bushels of grain to help feed Western Europe. This is the margin of difference between this area's estimated need—570,000,000 bushels—the supplies available.

Luckman estimated that the emergency will last anywhere from four to 12 months.

Adoption of the plan by all distillers would mean "a saving of 2,500,000 bushels of grain a month," Luckman said.

Our Grain Shipments

Even If U. S. Meets Goal, Europeans Will Eat Less Bread Than Last Year; Much Of Our Surplus Went To Feed Livestock; Large Amount Scattered Over U. S.

Washington, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The United States is hoping to supply about half of all the wheat imported by the world's hungry nations this year.

But the government is having a hard time scraping together that much wheat—about 14,000,000 bushels, or 570,000,000 bushels. So far it is almost 100,000,000 bushels short of this goal.

And even if it succeeds in exporting that much, the people of those nations will eat between 10 and 20 percent less bread than they did last year. And they didn't eat much then.

This is the picture: During the war, wheat harvest fell far below normal. Farmers were fighting instead of farming. Many farmlands became battlefields. Little farming equipment was manufactured.

Last year, when the wheat-growing countries were starting to rebuild their agriculture, grain crops were only about 75 percent as large as before the war.

And this year, when they were expected to increase, they were hit by the worst weather in years. As a result, the 1947 European wheat crop was about 18 percent smaller than the 1946 crop.

DRIVING REDS CUT OFF BIG CHINESE CITY

Mukden's Rail Lines Cut; Populace Panicky; Martial Law Is Imposed

Peiping, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Its rail outlets cut by a Communist offensive of increasing momentum, the big Manchurian industrial city of Mukden today was placed under martial law and panic-stricken civilians bid fabulous prices for plane tickets.

Press reports from Mukden, headquarters of Chief of Staff Cheng Chen's reorganized Manchurian command, told of spiraling food prices and a developing black market in plane tickets.

There appeared no immediate prospect of resumption of traffic on the Peiping-Mukden railway and the government supply ports of Hailuo and Yingkou on the Gulf of Liaotung were virtually cut off by the Communists.

The situation outside of Changchun, capital of Manchuria, was described as "rather tense," indicating a possible Communist advance beyond the previously reported position—10 miles south of the city.

However, the optimism of Nationalist commanders in their ability to hold the Manchurian cities was undimmed.

In Tientsin, the Catholic newspaper Social Welfare reported that only one of four troop-laden Government trains which left Changchun for Sipingkaik Thursday arrived safely. It said the others struck Communist land mines.

Earlier, Nationalist dispatches indicated a marked turn for the worse in the Government's military position in the sprawling northern territory.

Leeds, Ala., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Harry Walker, 1947 batting champion of the big leagues, came home today and was cheered by virtually every citizen of this little town of 3,000 in a celebration of "Harry Walker Day."

This hometown, looking forward for weeks for a chance to welcome back the star of the Philadelphia Phils, went all out for their native son with festivities which wound up during the evening with dancing in the street.

No Longer On Trial

British Conservatives Pledge To Retain Some Form Of Nationalized Industry If Returned To Power; Socialists Show Trend To Right; Middle-Of-The-Road

The British conservative party's sensational concession to socialism, in pledging to retain some form of nationalized industry if returned to power, means that England's daring experiment with this political creed has passed beyond the trial stage and that it has become an important part of the country's life.

Only 3 out of 3,000 delegates attending the annual meeting of the conservatives voted against a resolution which pledged the party to retain nationalization of coal mines and the Bank of England, and to keep some sort of public ownership of railroads. This promise (challenged by conservative opponents as "milk and water socialism") would of course be implemented if and when the public ousted the socialists and gave the "Tories" another chance. The latter are wistfully hopeful, if not exuberantly optimistic.

But striking as is this moderate swing to the left by the conservatives, it's only part of an intensely interesting development. The conservative Daily Telegraph said the other day that the Socialist government had been forced by the economic crisis to drop plans for further nationalization of industry for at least a year. The paper added that there might not be any more

nationalization until the Socialists had a fresh mandate from the country. This report must be coupled with the fact that the Socialist party platform calls for nationalization of only twenty percent of industry in any event.

This we find the conservative move to the left apparently being accompanied by a corresponding Socialist concession to the right. In short, the indications are that England is maneuvering into a middle-of-the-road position politically—a compromise which would seem to suit present-day ideas and ideals of Britons exceedingly well.

This lessening of the gap between the great political parties of course isn't an overnight development. The two world wars, in both of which England had to battle for her life, have been an enormous leveling-off force, not only politically but socially.

The political changes have been accompanied by a social metamorphosis in which the classes have been drawn closer together. The aristocracy of money has few notable representatives left, and they are on their way out by the taxation route. The aristocracy of birth also has been sweeping changes, though it would be foolish to imagine that

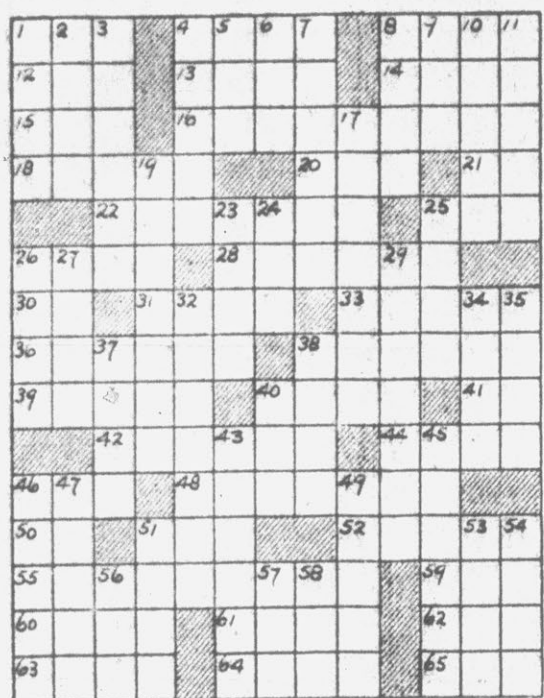

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING
THE CONSTRUCTION OF DRIVE-
WAYS ACROSS SIDEWALKS OF
THE CITY OF GREENVILLE, RE-
QUIRING THE SUBMISSION OF
PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS
THEREFOR TO THE BOARD OF
ALDERMEN; AUTHORIZING THE
ISSUANCE OF PERMITS; DEFIN-
ING OFFENSES AND PRESCRIB-
ING PENALTIES; AND PROVID-
ING THAT INVALIDITY OF
PART SHALL NOT AFFECT THE
VALIDITY OF THE REMAINDER
OF THIS ORDINANCE.**
WHEREAS, it is the practice of

many property owners in the de-
velopment of their property to re-
move the curb along the outer edge
of the sidewalk adjacent to their
property, and otherwise altering the
structure of the sidewalk, for the
purpose of providing drive-ways
across the sidewalk to any and all
points of their property; and

WHEREAS, such practice tends
to further impede traffic and, in
addition thereto, constitutes a con-
stant danger to the life, limb and
property of pedestrians, motorists
and others; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Alder-
men is of the opinion that the best
method by which the above condi-
tions may be remedied is by the
regulation of all drive-ways to be
constructed across side-walks as
provided in this ordinance, and by
virtue of the police power vested in
said Board and for the better pro-
tection of the life, limb and prop-
erty of pedestrians, motorists and
others, the said Board desires to
prohibit such practices and to other-
wise regulate the construction of
drive-ways across the side-walks of
the City;

NOW, THEREFORE,
The Board of Aldermen of the
City of Greenville Do Ordain:

Section 1. Any person, firm or
corporation desiring to construct
and/or to have constructed any
drive-way leading from any street
over and across the sidewalk to any
adjacent lot or building shall, be-
fore commencing the construction
thereof submit to the Board of Al-
dermen plans and specifications of
the proposed driveway, showing the
location thereof, its width, and the
materials to be used in its construc-
tion, and shall obtain from the
Board of Aldermen a permit for the
proposed construction thereof in
accordance with the provisions of
Section 2 of this ordinance.

Section 2. Upon the submission
of the plans and specifications pro-
vided for in Section 1 hereof, it shall
be the duty of the Board of Alder-
men to give due consideration to the
matter particularly with reference
to (1) the necessity for the
proposed drive-way according to
the plans and specifications sub-
mitted, and (2) the hazard, if any,
to pedestrians, motorists and oth-
ers, which would be created by its
construction, and said Board shall
state and records its findings and
conclusions with respect thereto.

The Board of Aldermen, in ac-
cordance with its findings and con-
clusions, shall either (1) approve the
plans and specifications for the pro-
posed driveway as submitted, or (2)
alter, modify, amend or otherwise
change the said plans and specifi-
cations in accordance with their
findings so as to give the fullest
measure of protection to pedestri-
ans, motorists and others, and at the
same time give access of ingress and
egress to the said property or build-
ing, and shall issue to the party ap-
plying a permit to construct such
drive-way in accordance with the
plans and specifications finally ap-
proved by the Board of Aldermen,
and not otherwise, provided how-
ever, no property owner, lessee, or
tenant in possession shall be denied
a reasonable way of ingress and
egress to his said property under
any of the provisions of this ordi-
nance, provided further, that any
party aggrieved by any action of the
Board of Aldermen in refusing to
issue a permit in accordance with
the plans and specifications sub-
mitted, may apply to the Courts for
relief.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for
any person, firm or corporation to
remove, take up or otherwise dam-
age or destroy the curb along the
outer edge of any sidewalk, and/or
to alter or change the structure of
any sidewalk, paved or unpaved, for

the purpose of making or construct-
ing any drive-way across such side-
walk, without first obtaining from
the Board of Aldermen a permit
authorizing the construction of such
drive-way in the manner provided
in sections 1 and 2 of this ordi-
nance.

Section 4. Any person, firm or
corporation violating any of the
provisions of this ordinance shall
be guilty of a misdemeanor and
upon conviction by the Court shall
be fined \$50.00.

Section 5. If any section or pro-
vision, or part thereof in this ordi-
nance shall be adjudged invalid or
unconstitutional, such invalidity or
unconstitutionality shall not affect
the validity of the ordinance as a
whole or of any section or provision,
or part thereof.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be
in full force and effect from and
after its adoption.

documents, with which we hope every citizen is familiar, setting forth basic principles of freedom and democracy.

"But we know that a free press will inevitably interpret certain principles of democracy in different ways, as will the people themselves. We have, therefore, differences of opinion. Sometimes the government and certain people disagree, but we cling to the right of criticism and disagreement.

"It is the price one pays for freedom and for democracy that the government often has to wait for the enlightenment of the people. Totalitarianism may prove faster, for good or ill, but we believe that democracy and free people stand on a firmer foundation."

ent levels; but with improved quality of construction and less labor union interference. In fact, I expect

building costs to stabilize not far from current levels.

Should I Buy An Old House?

If your need for a house is imminent and pressing, you might consider buying an old house if the location is right. However, if you can wait, I suggest you wait and then build a new and modern home. In buying an old house, be doubly certain that needed repairs are not too extensive as renovation costs are now very expensive. In selecting an old house, be very careful to avoid extremes in size and architecture, as the "out-of-style" types will be the first to crash valuewise when the demand fades.

Bear in mind that the future value of your house will be governed by the price district in which you buy or build. Never build a \$15,000 home in a \$10,000 price district. If you do, you may be throwing away \$5,000 immediately. Generally, depreciation occurs on the house only, and appreciation occurs on the land only; while money spent on personal desires either on a new home or on remodeling an old one, must be charged off when reselling. Watch out for restrictions.

Mortgage Outlook

During the months ahead, I do not expect any change in the mortgage money situation. The pressure of savings seeking investment should continue low interest rates and an easy attitude on the part of bank appraisers. The biggest demand for mortgage money will be for multiple dwelling units. High costs of homes forces many in the lower-income groups to seek small rentals in apartment dwellings. Hence, the demand for such houses will reach a higher level and there will be more of some types of government housing subsidies.

The weather here in the central west is wonderful; most crops are bountiful and the people are su-

perly gracious. These great broad farms and rich natural resources and independent people make me want to stay here forever!

as England appears to be taking a middle-of-the-road course politically, so we see a similar—though naturally much slower—tendency socially.
