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## TAFT BACKERS PLAN FINANCE '48 CAMPAIGN

### Ohioans Said Ready To Raise \$750,000 To Get Native Son Nominated

Washington, Oct. 6—(AP)—Ohio Republicans were reported today to be ready to raise \$750,000 for a "home grown" campaign to get Senator Robert A. Taft the Republican presidential nomination.

His announcement that he will be a candidate is expected at a meeting of the state GOP central committee October 24 in Columbus.

As soon as Taft agrees to become the state's favorite son at the national convention next June in Philadelphia, his campaign backers will signal for action all along the political front. They say their efforts will be financed almost exclusively with Ohio money.

The Ohio senator himself is said to be reluctant to accept contributions from outsiders. He also has stipulated that nobody will be permitted to put up more than \$500.

Taft's decision to run, on the basis of a six-state western tour he ended Sunday with his return to Cincinnati, was regarded as such a foregone conclusion that plans are said to be well advanced for an active drive on his behalf.

The Ohio senator goes on the radio tonight at 9:30 P. M. in a long range debate with Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) about which political party is to blame for high prices. Taft will be at the microphone in Cincinnati, O'Mahoney in Denver.

During more than a score of speeches in California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Wyoming, Taft contended the blame belongs to President Truman's administration.

Taft argued that Mr. Truman laid the basis for high prices by permitting a wage "bulge" and abandoning OPA controls "too soon."

## Chile Moves To Break Control By Communists

Santiago, Chile, Oct. 6—(AP)—The Chilean government moved today to break what it called a "communist dictatorship" over the nation's miners, striking in the coal fields for higher pay.

Military planes were sent to join troops and warships at Concepcion, a center of the strike. Fuel rationing was ordered. Censorship was imposed upon the Communist newspaper of Santiago, El Siglo.

An official statement said President Gonzalez Videla was "disposed to put a definite end to the control which the Communist party has maintained by means of violence over the salaried masses of the coal zone."

Some 18,000 miners were out. Their minimum wage has been 30 pesos (\$1.20) a day. The government has offered increases of 40 per cent for underground workers and 30 per cent for other employees.

## Polio Epidemic In Berlin Grows

Berlin, Oct. 6—(AP)—Thirty-four new cases of infantile paralysis were recorded in Berlin during the past 24 hours, bringing the total cases for Berlin's worst epidemic to 572. German health authorities announced today.

No new deaths were reported, leaving the total of fatalities at 131.

## Comintern Is Revived

Interpretations Vary, So Taft-Hartley Law May Have To Wait A Judge's Decision To See What Some Of It Means; Some Eventualities To Look Forward To

Well, now do the doubters finally understand that the Bolshevik world revolution for the establishment of communism is really under way?

If not, let them study Moscow's announcement of the Red conference in Poland and the establishment of a headquarters in Yugoslavia for coordination of the Bolshevik drive against American "imperialism." Call that organization by any name you will, and you still have the old Comintern—the Third International or general staff for world revolution—which Moscow in 1943 trumpeted had been abolished, thereby quieting the fears of a lot of ill-informed wishful thinkers abroad.

The meeting in Poland was attended by representatives of the Communist parties of the Soviet Union, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Italy and France. There you have the nations which either are communized and consequently are dominated by Russia or have strong Bolshevik parties. The new headquarters is being established in Belgrade, capital of Marshal Tito who breathes, eats and sleeps as Moscow directs.

## Self-Denial Program Set Before People By Truman

Washington, Oct. 6—(AP)—An unprecedented "self-denial" offensive against hunger in Western Europe was touched off today by President Truman's call for food sacrifices as an American "contribution to peace."

Mr. Truman asked all citizens to go without meat on Tuesdays, without eggs and poultry on Thursdays, and to save a slice of bread a day. He "demanded" of the grain exchanges the raising of the down-payment requirement on grain purchases to 33 1-3 percent to thwart what he called the inflationary operations of "gamblers in grain."

If the exchanges refuse, he warned in a nationwide broadcast last night, the government may step in

and "limit the amount of trading" in wheat and other grains.

A distiller described as a "bolt from the blue" another drastic White House request—that the liquor industry shut down for 60 days "at the earliest possible moment."

Two whiskey-makers predicted the answer would be yes.

Going direct to the people by radio and television, Mr. Truman joined his Citizens Food Committee chairman, Charles Luckman, in a grave and sometimes sharply voiced plea for conservation lest prosperity at home and peace in the world be "needlessly lost."

And—as Luckman today began mobilizing an organization, inside and outside the government, to wage

a campaign of near-war-time dimensions—at least one influential Republican legislator gave ungrudging endorsement.

"It's a good program," said Rep. Hope (R-Kan.), chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. "It is something tangible that the people can understand. It was well presented and should have the support of every American."

The President asked housewives to memorize this "simple and straightforward program":

"1. Use no meat on Tuesdays.

"2. Use no poultry or eggs on Thursdays.

"3. Save a slice of bread every day.

"4. Public eating places will serve bread and butter only on request."

## ARABS ATTACK ZIONIST MOVE

### Says Zionism "Aggressive And Violent" Political Movement

Lake Success, Oct. 5—(AP)—Renewing the Arab fight against proposed partition of Palestine, Foreign Minister Fadhil Jamali of Iraq today attacked Zionism as an "aggressive and violent" political movement. He said it was "very much like Nazism."

Jamali declared that Zionism "has nothing to do with Palestine except in its aim to penetrate the Middle East, using Palestine as a gate." He added that "it follows the same methods of propaganda and the same method of aggression and penetration as those of the Nazis."

Jamali also delivered a vigorous attack on the United States for what he called "interfering" in Palestine affairs. He said this interference was just as bad as interference of the Soviet satellites in Greece which the United States was trying to stop.

Jamali and Nuri Pasha Es Said, premier of Iraq, spoke before the 57-nation Palestine committee of the United Nations Assembly in a double-barreled appeal for an independent Arab state covering all of Palestine.

## Wife Of Senator Maybank Passes

Charleston, S.C., Oct. 6—(AP)—Funeral services were planned today (4:00 p.m.) at the Maybank residence here for Mrs. Elizabeth Myers Maybank, wife of South Carolina's senior senator, who died at Flat Rock, N.C., yesterday after a long illness.

Mrs. Maybank left a Philadelphia hospital this summer to attend her daughter's wedding at Flat Rock, but was too ill to attend the ceremony after arriving in a special railroad car.

## Truman Advises More Dispersal

Washington, Oct. 5—(AP)—A plan for scattering government science projects more widely around the country "against" the possibility of atomic warfare was distributed to government officials today by President Truman.

The proposal was contained in the third of five volumes of a report by John R. Steelman, presidential assistant, on "science and public policy."

## FEARS ARREST, SHOOTSELF

### Negro Questioned In Lovers Lane Murder Takes Own Life

Chester, S.C., Oct. 6—(AP)—A 32-year-old Negro, questioned in the "lovers lane" slaying of a white man, blew his head off with a shotgun early today while 200 officers and several hundred citizens assembled nearby. Sheriff William H. Peden reported.

Peden said the Negro, Dave Dunham, a farmer "undoubtedly" was the assailant who beat to death Clarence Wallis, 22-year-old war veteran, last night.

Wallis was slain while he fought valiantly to permit the escape of his attractive girl friend, Betsy Ross, from a Negro who had accosted them on a secluded road known as "Lovers Lane," Sheriff Peden said.

Peden said the Negro struck Wallis a terrific blow on the head and then dragged the girl from the car by the throat. Wallis recovered sufficiently to grapple with the attacker after shouting to the girl to "run," the sheriff related.

He said Miss Ross was hysterical when she was taken to a hospital but otherwise she was not seriously injured.

About 200 state, county and city officers converged quickly on the scene of the slaying. Peden reported, while several hundred citizens also gathered along the rural road three miles from this north-central South Carolina town.

## Goldsboro Opens "Century Week"

Goldsboro, N.C., Oct. 6—(AP)—Goldsboro's week-long observance of its 100th birthday, which began with church services yesterday, was officially opened in ceremonies at noon today.

The "Century Day" program also calls for a procession of airplanes, bearing centennial queens, to fly over the town. Tonight's program calls for an address by Josephus Daniels, editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, and the coronation of Mrs. W. G. Hood who will reign as "Miss Centennial."

## ACQUITTAL IN OVERELL CASE

### But Accused Pair Have Decided To Go On Separate Ways

Santa Ana, Calif., Oct. 6—(AP)—Passionate lovers of a few months ago, blond, buxom Louise Overell and George (Bud) Gollum are innocent of charges that they murdered their parents, a jury has decided, but their hearts no longer beat as one.

No sooner had a six-man, six-woman jury decided late yesterday that the young college sweethearts were innocent of killing Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Overell, wealthy Pasadena socialite leaders than the resolute Louise declared she was through with Bud.

"I can assure you there will be no marriage," she said.

Her statement, given to reporters without hesitation, came after the weary jurors returned their verdict of acquittal, a verdict that climaxed two days of deliberation and 19 weeks of trial and brought a wild demonstration of cheering and whistling from the jam-packed courtroom and thousands of others in the streets below.

Sheriff's deputies and Trial Judge Kenneth E. Morrison were unable to keep order when spectators milled around, and pounded each other on the back in the courtroom as the longest criminal trial in American court history came to an end.

## Stabbing, Fight And Stoning Climax Strike

New Orleans, Oct. 6—(AP)—A stabbing, free-for-all fight and a stoning climaxed a weekend of violence in the 140-day-old strike of drivers for the Southern Bell Lines.

Seven persons were arrested yesterday at Jackson, Tenn., when fighting broke out at the bus station between striking drivers and non-union employees hired to replace them. Police Chief Robert Mainord reported. He said injuries were not serious.

New Orleans police said 26-year-old Charles Jones told them he was on his way to seek employment with the company last night when he was stabbed in the back by assailants he could not identify. Hospital attendants said Jones' condition was not believed to be serious.

At Hattiesburg, Miss., a rock whizzed through a glass window at the bus station yesterday.

## Saar Election Points To Eventual French Merger

Saarbruecken, Oct. 6—(AP)—Official returns showed today that Saarlanders—who 12 years ago voted to join Nazi Germany—had overwhelmingly elected a parliament pledged to make the coal-rich Saar Basin west of the Rhine an autonomous part of France.

The German speaking residents of the industrial area yesterday gave a vote of more than nine to one, returns indicated, for three political parties which have advocated merging the entire economic life of the 726-square-mile Saar with that of France.

Of the 50 deputies chosen 48 were from the three parties favorable to such a move—the Christian People's Party, Social Democrats and right wing Democrats.

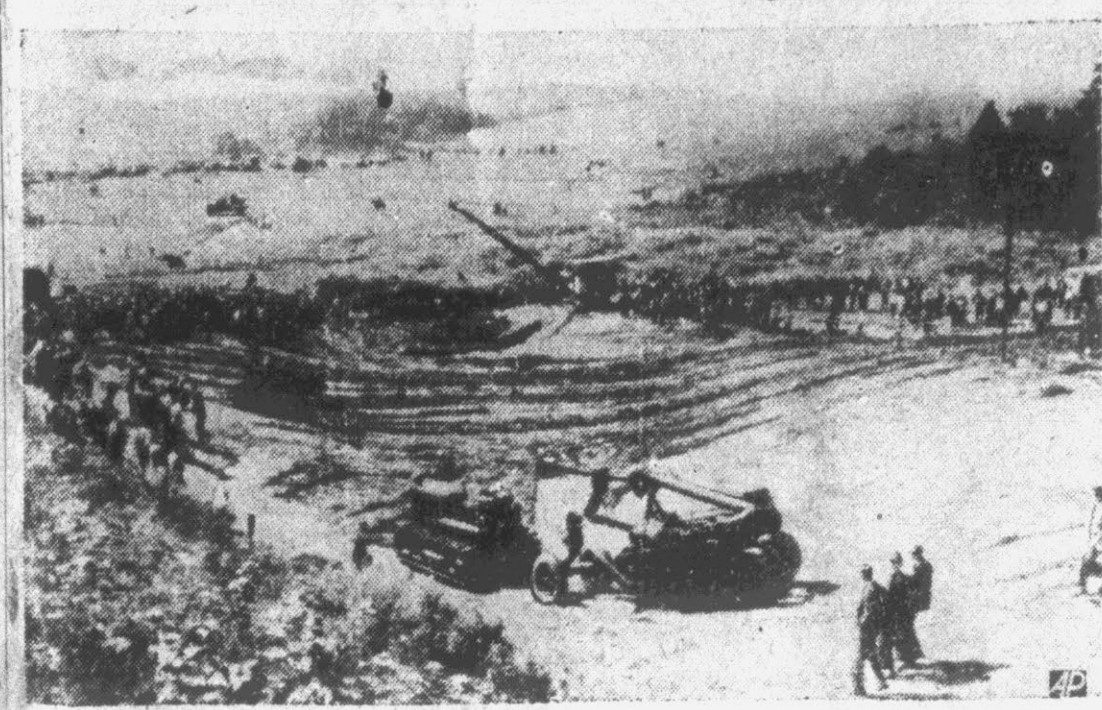
## N.C. Man Flees Britain With Child As Wife Refuses To Accompany Him

London, Oct. 6—(AP)—Scotland Yard reported tonight that a 10-month-old baby, missing from his mother's home at Leeds, was taken aboard a New York-bound plane last night by his father, Curtis Elmer Vincent of Greensboro, N.C.

Vincent, who married in Leeds in December, 1945, returned to England six weeks ago to visit his wife, Madge, and his son, Van Melvin. Mrs. Vincent told the Post that she had learned Vincent arrived in New York with the child this morning.

## NAME SLAY TO COLLEGE POST

### Greenville Man Appointed Dean Of Trinity College

Durham, N.C., Oct. 5—The appointment of James M. Slay as assistant dean of Trinity College was announced by Herbert J. Herding, dean of the college, yesterday. Assistant Dean Slay, who has been working toward the Ph.D. degree from Harvard University for the past year and a half, will also be responsible for the supervision of the Bureau of Testing and Guidance at the university.

Entering Trinity College from the Greenville, N.C. High School in 1933, Slay received his A.B. degree in 1937 and in 1940 his master's degree in Romance Languages. He taught French and Spanish at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va., from 1938 until the fall of 1941 serving as commandant during his last year there.

From 1942 until 1944, Assistant Dean Slay served as an instructor in the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Va. He also served in the Pacific Theatre as assistant operations officer, Sixth Marine Division, being released from active duty in October 1945 with the rank of major.

Slay served as a part-time instructor in French and Spanish and part-time assistant to the dean of Trinity College from November 1945 until February 1946.

## Communist Leaders Of Nine European Nations Rally For Politico - Economic War On United States "Imperialism"

Moscow, Oct. 6—(AP)—Leaders of a new Communist international organization linking the Communist parties of nine European nations rallied their followers today for a no compromise fight against what they described as United States "imperialism."

Formation of the new organization—the first such group to be supported by the Russians since they declared the Comintern dead in 1943—was disclosed yesterday in a statement issued in its name.

In effect, the statement served notice of the Communists' intention to wreck, if possible, the Marshall Plan for European aid and the Truman Doctrine to combat totalitarianism. It proclaimed that the world had been divided into two camps—led by the Soviet Union and the United States—and called upon European Communists to defend the "national sovereignty of their peoples against U. S. aggression."

Pravda, Communist organ, said that formation of the new international organization was completed at a hitherto unheralded meeting in Warsaw last month, attended by Communist leaders from Russia, France, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Romania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Hungary.

To implement the work of the organization, an "information bureau" is to be established in the Yugoslav capital at Belgrade. To it will be assigned, the announcement said, the task of "exchanging experiences" and, if necessary, "coordinating the activities of the Communist parties on a basis of mutual agreement."

Russia was represented at the Warsaw conference by two of its top Politburo leaders—Col. Gen. Andrei Zhdanov and Georgi M. Malenkov.

The Politburo is the political bureau of the central committee of the All-Union Communist Party.)

## Mighty Typhoon Crosses Luzon

Manila, Oct. 6—(AP)—The mightiest typhoon of the 1947 season passed across the northern tip of Luzon today and headed toward the south China coast, disrupting shipping and damaging crops and dwellings.

The storm affected shipping within 300 miles of its churning center. The American President Lines' Gen. W. H. Gordon, bound for Manila with hundreds of passengers aboard, halted northeast of Luzon, electing to ride out the rough seas rather than risk crossing the path of the big blow.

## AFL MEETING OPENS; FEAR UNION SPLIT

### Two Powerful Leaders Pose Unspoken Threat Of Leading In Walkout

San Francisco, Oct. 6—(AP)—Start of the AFL's 66th convention today was enlivened by the unspoken threat that John L. Lewis and William L. Hutchesson might team up to lead more than 1,200,000 miners and carpenters in a "walk" out of the federation.

Both have critical differences with their colleagues in the AFL which throws them together on the defensive in a new dispute endangering the federation's unity. However, the fight may or may not reach the convention floor before the final gavel two weeks hence.

The situation was so tense as the 750 delegates gathered that extra pains were being exerted by President William Green to settle the differences in advance.

The federation has about 7,600,000 members.

Lewis blocked the use of National Labor Relations Board facilities for all 105 AFL unions when he alone among the 15 executive council members refused to sign a Taft-Hartley affidavit disavowing communism.

His own United Mine Workers bars Communists from membership, but Lewis wants to fight the act in every provision. Others on the council are willing to swear they are loyal Americans in order to protect weak locals requiring protective features of the act.

Hutchesson is locked in a bitter controversy with several AFL unions over job jurisdictions in Hollywood movie studios.

## Four Gunmen Rob Ten In Predawn Raid On Club

Ambler, Pa., Oct. 6—(AP)—Four masked gunmen terrorized and looted 10 persons today in a predawn raid on the Oak Terrace Country Club. Their loot was estimated at \$7,000.

The robbers used telephone wires, neckties and bathrobe cords to truss up seven men and three women following a roundup in a room-to-room tour of the old-style mansion clubhouse.

Clarence Brieb, 56-year-old manager of the Country Club, said he was forced from his bed by the intruders and at gunpoint opened the safe which contained \$7,000 in week-end receipts. An additional \$700 was taken from pockets of the victims.

## Warnings Up On Atlantic Coast

Miami, Fla., Oct. 6—(AP)—Small craft warnings flew along the south Atlantic coast from Wilmington, N. C. to the Florida Keys today and the Weather Bureau said squally winds of 35 to 45 miles per hour covered a wide area.

In a special bulletin for small craft, issued at 10 p.m. (EST) last night, the Weather Bureau said the squally weather covers the Bahamas Islands region and a considerable area of the Atlantic to the north.

## TOO MUCH FOR HIM

Tokyo, Oct. 6—(AP)—Ex-Colonel Noriyo Harada, released for lack of evidence on war crimes charges, walked out of the gates of Sugama Prison toward the car of friends who had come to meet him.

As he reached the car, he fell dead, a victim of a heart attack.

## Labor Law To Court

No Room Left To Doubt Communism's Ultimate Goal With Moscow's Latest Announcement; A Declaration Of Ideological War To A Finish; Touch Of Background

Washington, Oct. 6—(AP)—The new labor law may have to go before a judge pretty soon to see what some of it means.

That's because of a difference of opinion between the people who have been appointed to carry out that new law, the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

They are, on one side, the members of the five man National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) and, on the other, the board's general counsel.

The difference between the board and the counsel, Robert L. Denham, is on just one point of the law. But it goes like this:

Denham says that—before any union can get any benefits under the law—this must be done:

1. The officers of the local union, and of the national union to which the local belongs, must swear they're not Communists.

2. In addition, the officers of the big organizations to which the locals and nationals belong—AFL and CIO—must swear they're not Communists.

But the board is expected to overrule Denham this week by saying only No. 1 is necessary and that the AFL and CIO officers don't have to swear.

But as of now no AFL or CIO of-

ficer has taken the oath. And, since Denham's ruling still stands, this is the result:

Not one of the 13,000,000 workers in the more than 140 unions which make up the AFL and CIO are now under the law's protection.

But something has happened which may bring the Denham-board difference of opinion to a test.

An AFL union, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, wants to bargain with an employer in Arlington, Va.

(Under the law an employer does not have to bargain with a union unless the board says it represents his employees and he must bargain with it.)

This union has asked the board to give its approval to the union's right to bargain with the Arlington employer.

The board is expected to give its approval to this union this week. As noted, this union is a member of the AFL and, so far, the AFL officers have not sworn they're not Communists.

If the board gives its blessing to this union by telling the Arlington man he'll have to bargain, the board will be overruling Denham.

Does that finish the whole business? Not necessarily.

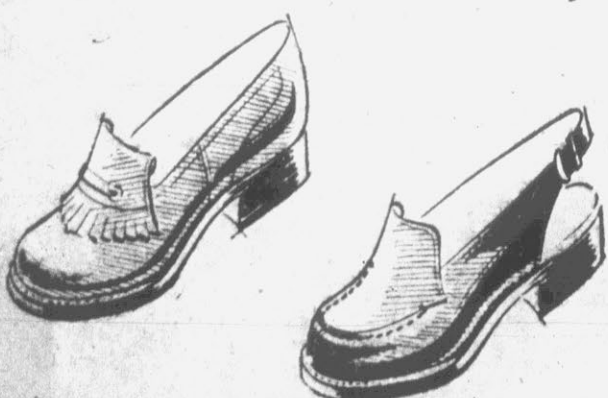

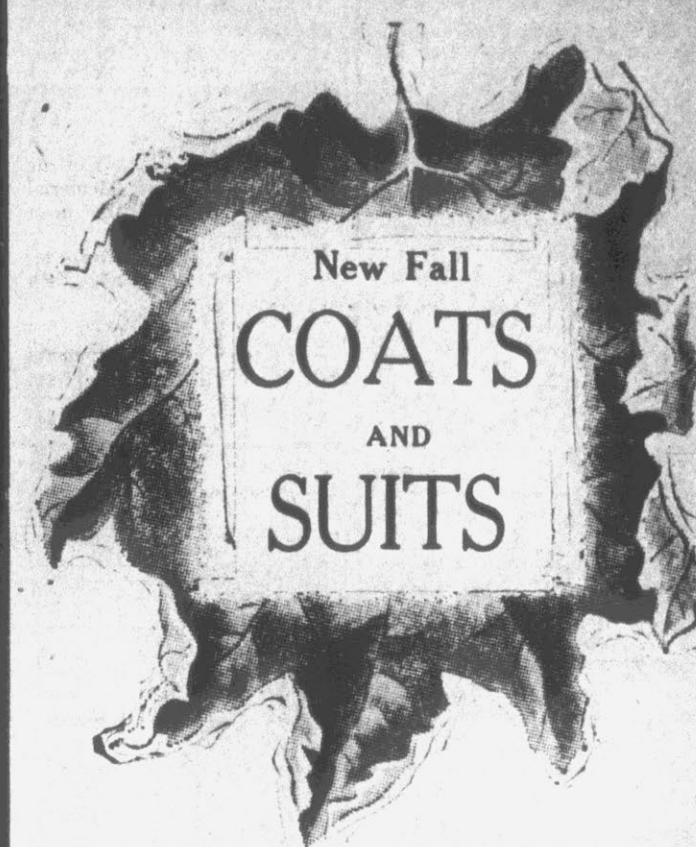

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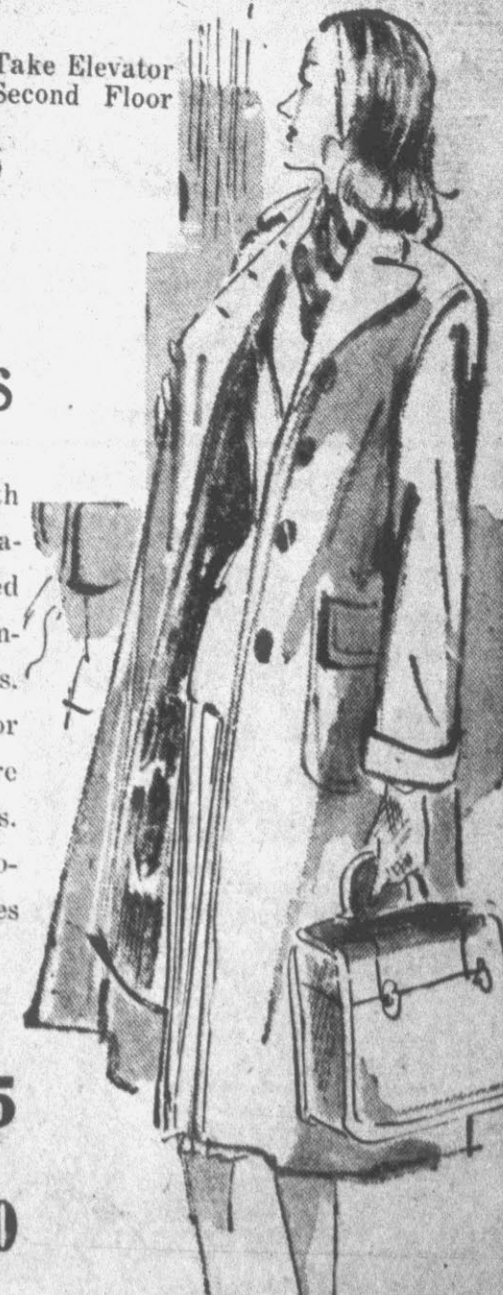

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## Strength FOR THE DAY

HAVE WE NEGLECTED HUMAN VALUES?

Mr. Roger Babson in a recent report to clients on investments addresses a letter to these clients on the death of his grandson Michael and the lesson that the boy's death has taught him. This lad, eighteen years old, was drowned recently in Lake Sunapee, rescuing a girl who had fallen out of a speed boat.

Mr. Babson says that he is telling his personal troubles to his clients for two reasons: first, because his trouble has made him appreciate human values. He lost no near kin in either World War I or World War II, and he states that this is the first time he has really appreciated what the 350,000 families who did experience loss really suffered. Too much, he declares, are we forgetting human values. His second reason for mentioning his grandson's death is because he believes that in discussing the possibility of another world war he had thought too much of the money cost and too little of the human. The way out, he says, is for us to sacrifice with the rest of the world, accepting for a while lower standards of living and foregoing many privileges we now enjoy.

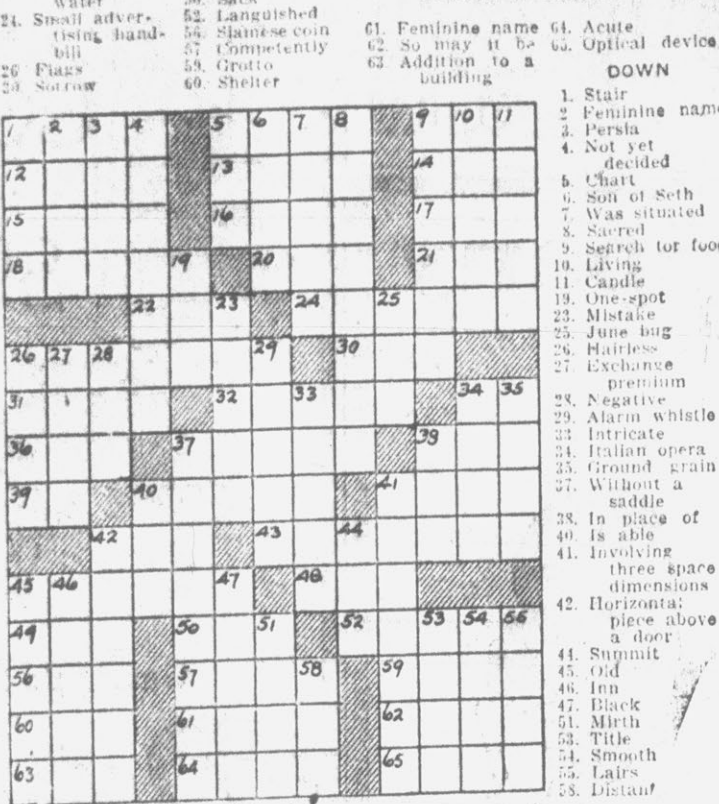
The business world has eagerly listened to Mr. Babson's utterances for more than a generation. It may well be that what he wrote about Michael may prove to be the most important thing he ever wrote and his wisest comment on economics.

resistance to all manifestations of United States policy. European Communists were told not to underestimate their own strength or to overestimate the strength of the "imperialist camp." England of course is coupled with America in the Red charge of imperialist aggression.

The old Comintern was established even before the Bolsheviks had Russia firmly in their hands in 1917, during World War I. They hoped that in the chaos following the war they could precipitate a revolution that would run around the globe. They tried it in Hungary and other countries, but it fizzled out and Stalin shelved the program until Russia could be made strong industrially and militarily, and a more propitious moment arrived.

Stalin was among those who early foresaw World War II and the widespread disorder which was bound to follow. Actually the war was precipitated when the Bolshevik leader signed the non-aggression pact with Hitler, and the fuhrer unleashed his mighty fighting machine on Poland.

So now the Bolsheviks are picking up where they left off after the first global conflict. This time, however, they have had strength to enforce their will on neighboring war-torn countries, and thus are encouraged to regard the whole world as their oyster.

## Labor Law . . .

Suppose the Arlington employer refuses to bargain with the union, in spite of the board's order to him. He might do it by saying something like this:

I think the board is wrong. I think Denham's interpretation of the law is right when he says no AFL union can get the law's protection unless the AFL officers, plus the union officers, swear they're not Communists.

And the employer might add: Therefore, I refuse to obey the board by bargaining with the union.

(Under the law an employer who refuses to bargain with a union, after the board has approved it, can be charged by the union with unfair labor practice.)

(That's the reason for the formality of getting board approval: to compel an employer to bargain or face a penalty.)

Suppose that happens in this case. To whom would the union go to make the charge of unfair labor practices: Denham or the board?

But suppose Denham sticks to his original position, refuses to be overruled by the board, and says:

You're an AFL union. Since AFL officers have not sworn they are not Communists, I say you have no

rights under the law.

Can the union then go over Denham's head to the board? No. But even if Denham bows to the board and abandons his original position on Communist-swearing, this probably will happen sooner or later.

Some employer will refuse to bargain with a union approved by the board on the grounds that the law really means top AFL and CIO

officers must swear they're not Communists.

If that happens, there'll be a court fight anyway.

Right now there's no indication that the AFL and CIO officers, who are opposed to the law, want to go along with the law by taking the no-Communist oath.

## What The LAW Requires

The question is sometimes raised as to what the law requires of retail beer dealers. Here are the principal requirements for those who sell malt beverages for consumption on the premises, as condensed from the North Carolina Beverage Control Act of 1939, as amended:

To obtain a retail beer license, one must show:

1. That he is over 21 years old and has been a resident of the State and a citizen of the United States for one year or more.
2. That he has not been convicted of a felony or other crime involving moral turpitude or adjudged guilty of violating the prohibition laws within two years.
3. That he intends to carry on the business for himself or under his immediate supervision and direction.

To keep his license, a retail dealer must not:

1. Knowingly sell malt beverages to anyone under 18 years of age. (Another act prohibits employment of minors under 18 years of age in places where beer is sold for consumption on the premises.)
2. Knowingly sell such beverages to intoxicated persons.
3. Sell such beverage outside the legal hours.
4. Permit disorderly conduct, improper or immoral entertainment, conduct or practices on premises.
5. Sell, offer for sale, possess or permit the consumption on the licensed premises of any alcoholic liquors not authorized under his license.

These are the fundamental points of the North Carolina code for beer dealers. This Committee heartily endorses every one of these requirements and through our Self-Regulation Program we feel that we have accomplished much toward bringing about their acceptance and observance by the great majority of beer dealers in North Carolina. For complete legal details regarding the sale of beer, one should refer to the law itself, a copy of which can be obtained free of charge from the Committee's Raleigh office.

**Pirates Topple ACC In Hard-Fought Scramble**

The ECTC Pirates gladdened the hearts of their followers Saturday night, as they came from behind to defeat the ACC Bulldogs of Wilson 12-7 for their first win of the season and their first victory as a member of the North State conference.

The win once again gave ECTC undisputed possession of the Bohunk Trophy, the old wooden bucket that goes to the winner of any ACC-ECTC clash. It was the game of the year for both teams, and it lived up to all expectations in being fast and furiously fought all the way.

The Bulldogs struck early in the first quarter as Allbrook heaved a pass, 18 yards long, to Bobbie Stott. ECTC converted and the score read 7-0.

With six minutes left to go in the first half, Stanly Peel, ECTC end, recovered an ACC fumble on the enemy's 17 yard marker. With Roger Thrift and Berry plunging into the line, the ball went to the one yard marker, where Berry bucked for the score. Andrews' conversion was wide and ACC led 7-6.

A minute later, Thrift, ECTC quarterback, intercepted a Bulldog pass on his own 12 yard line and behind perfect blocking went down the sidelines for 88 yards and another ECTC score. Andrews' conversion was low and the Pirates led 12-7.

The second half was scoreless. Both teams scored, but were penalized on the play, nullifying the touchdown. For ECTC it was Jack Davis scampering 75 yards to score, and for ACC it was the same passing combination that was nothing but trouble for ECTC all night, Allbrook to Stott.

ECTC outtrused ACC to 35 yards, but the Bulldogs completed 8 out of 16 passes for a total gain of 135 yards through the air. The Pirates completed 1 out of 4 for 7 yards. The feature of the game was the

kicking of ECTC's Bill Darby, whose punts averaged 43 yards per try from the line of scrimmage.

For the Pirates Peel, Sexton, Darby, and Smith looked good; and Jack Allbrook stole the show for ACC.
