

Label Communist Move 'Comintern'

British Foreign Office Tags Action Despite Denials By Organization; Manifesto Said Involves Deterioration Of International Relations

London, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The British Foreign Office today labeled creation of an international information bureau by the Communists of nine European states as "the official resuscitation of the Comintern."

The Communists have taken considerable pains to deny that the new organization formed in Poland last month is a revival of the Comintern, which was ordered out of business by Prime Minister Stalin in 1943.

A British Foreign Office spokesman, addressing a news conference today, said the meeting in Poland at which representatives of nine European Communist parties were present had "a highly official looking character."

He commented particularly on the presence of A. A. Zhdanov, a member of the Soviet Politburo.

In reply to a question, the spokesman said he knew of no British intention to protest to the governments of the nine countries represented against the attacks leveled at Prime Minister Attlee and Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin in the manifesto of the meeting, made public Sunday.

The spokesman added, however: "This pronouncement (the manifesto) involves a clear deterioration of the international situation."

A reporter asked whether there were any grounds for a British objection to the creation of the Comintern in view of the fact that the Communist parties of several European countries, including Britain, had themselves created a similar international organization, with offices in London.

The spokesman replied: "We find no fault with the creation of this international Communist organization. It is a matter for the Communist parties themselves. Indeed, we welcome the bringing into the open of activities which in the past we believed took place covertly."

He said the Comintern—a contraction for Communist International—appeared to have been reformed with a slight variation by the meeting in Poland. The variation, he said, was implied by the fact that there are only nine participating members at present.

Big Waves Pound Coast As Storm Moves Inland

Brunswick, Ga., Oct. 7.—(AP)—High waves pounded the Georgia coast today in the wake of an Atlantic born storm which swept inland during the night smashing fences, uprooting trees and flooding streets of seaboard cities.

The civil aeronautics station at the Brunswick airport reported winds of 60 miles an hour at the height of the storm.

Earlier the highest afternoon tide in the memory of local residents smashed against Jacksonville, Fla., beaches, but sandbag ramparts hastily thrown up by hundreds of volunteer workers, prevented a repetition of last week's million dollar damage.

The Weather Bureau here reported rainfall of four and a half inches. Water flooded streets in the lower sections of the city.

GRAIN MARTS HIKE MARGINS AS REQUESTED

Bow To Truman Demand As First 'Meatless Tuesday' Is Ushered In

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A hike in margins on the nation's big grain exchanges at the insistence of the government today ushered in the first of President Truman's "meatless Tuesdays" to save food for Europe.

The markets at Chicago, Kansas City and Minneapolis doubled the cash down payment on deals for future delivery, as demanded by the President to curb what he called "gamblers in grain."

As the President's "waste less" food program moved out of the planning stage and into operation there were these developments:

1. The National Restaurant Association pledged its members to serve no meat on Tuesdays and no poultry or eggs on Thursdays.

2. Representatives of the distilling industry gathered for a meeting here tomorrow to discuss the President's request for a 60-day shutdown.

3. The Agriculture Department, seeking to head off a "meat famine" a year from now, talked of asking farmers to plan for maximum hog production and gamble that big crops next season will relieve the feed grain shortage.

4. The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization predicted that more people will die of hunger next year than were killed in any year of the war, and that present shortages will continue beyond the 1948 harvest.

5. The Agriculture Department disclosed it stepped up wheat purchases for export to 23,963,674 bushels last week compared with 9,089,830 bushels the week before.

ROBOT PLANE FLIES AGAIN

"Mechanical Brain" Guiding Big Craft On Return To U.S.

Lyneham, Eng., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Guided only by the "mechanical brain" which piloted it to a safe landing in England two weeks ago, a Skymaster plane of the U.S. Army Air Force dropped its way westward across the Atlantic today on the return leg of a history-making flight.

The robot plane, which took off from the Royal Air Force field here at 6:05 a.m. GMT (1:05 a.m. EST), was expected to arrive at Stephenville, Newfoundland, at about 4 or 5 p.m. Eastern Standard Time if the weather remains good.

Aboard the craft were Col. James M. Gillespie and a crew of 10, but he declared that—unless something went wrong—no human hands would touch the controls until the automatic pilot brings the ship in for a landing at Stephenville.

Russia Agrees To New Meeting Of 'Big Four'

London Parley Slated For November 25; Plan Attempt To Write German Peace Treaty; U.S. And France Accept Date

London, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The British Foreign Office announced today that Russia had agreed to a meeting of the Big Four foreign ministers in London on Nov. 25 to attempt to write a German peace treaty.

The United States and France already have indicated willingness to accept this date, which was suggested by Britain.

In a note delivered to the British embassy in Moscow Saturday, the Soviet Union also conveyed her agreement to attend a meeting of foreign ministers' deputies in London on Nov. 6, at which preliminary procedural and agenda arrangements for the later meeting will be made.

The Nov. 25 session would be the second held by the Big Four on the

German treaty. A session in Moscow last March failed to make any headway in writing a treaty either for Germany or for Austria.

Peace treaties for all the defeated belligerents except Germany, Austria and Japan have been completed and ratified.

A foreign office spokesman said all arrangements for the conference have been completed. The sessions are expected to take place in Lancaster House.

At the foreign ministers' meeting in Moscow it was decided to hold the next conference in London early in November but Britain proposed last month that the opening be deferred until Nov. 25 so as to avoid possible conflict with the United Nations Assembly in New York.

Another reason for the delay, according to authoritative British government sources, was that an acute shortage of accommodations was expected in London as a result of the Nov. 20 royal wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Lt. Philip Mountbatten.

VOTE TO HEED NLRB RULING

CIO Textile Workers Union Is First To Act On Affidavit

Boston, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The executive council of the Textile Workers Union of America has voted to reject requirements of the Taft-Hartley act relative to the filing of non-Communist affidavits—the first major CIO union to take such action.

"Our compliance with this section of the act," said Emil Rieve, president of the union, "is forced upon us and is in no way to be construed as an acceptable of our adherence to the un-American principles which underlie it."

The TWUA, fourth largest CIO union claiming a membership of 450,000 workers, took the action yesterday. National officers of the CIO recently declined to sign the non-Communist affidavits.

In a letter to Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the national labor relations board, the executive council said "the harmful effects of the act will be felt by our members whether we file or do not file."

"However," the letter added, "our failure to gain status before the national labor relations board by not complying with the affidavit requirement would be an open invitation to unaffiliated labor organizations and company unions to begin a campaign of riding that would disrupt the orderly process of collective bargaining. We have fought so hard to build."

Will Try Youth Accused Hold-Up

Charlotte, N.C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Seventeen-year-old Pete Belk of near Monroe is scheduled to be tried on a charge of attempting to rob the Bank of Peachland last Sept. 25 in district court here this week.

Charged with him is Walter Hammond, 16, who is in a Monroe hospital recovering from a pistol wound. No arrangements have been made to bring him to trial.

Of the \$13.94 taken in the robbery, all but 94 cents has been recovered.

UMSTEAD RAPS SOVIET POLICY

Charges Allies' Unity Broken By Russia's Obstructionism

Gastonia, N.C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The unity of power and purpose which made the allies' war efforts successful has disappeared in the current struggle to win the peace because of Russia's obstructionist tactics, Sen. William B. Umstead said today.

He told the Gastonia Kiwanis Club Russia "has consistently thwarted practically every effort made to assist in the rehabilitation of Europe. Russia has virtually prevented the United Nations from deciding anything."

Umstead described Europe as being in a state of economic chaos, political confusion and psychological fear—all three fostered and nurtured by Russia.

Growing Nation

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Census Bureau reported today that population growth in 1946 exceeded that of any year in history.

An increase of 2,279,000 last year boosted the total population of the U.S., including armed forces overseas, to 142,673,000 on Jan. 1, the bureau said.

Population growth since the last census of April 1, 1940 was described as "unusually great"—11,620,000 or 8.4 percent for the six and three-fourths year.

TRY TO AVOID MEAT FAMINE

Agriculture Department Fears Grain-Saving May Hit Supply

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department is working on ways to keep the present grain emergency from creating a "meat famine" late next year and in 1949.

The plan as tentatively drawn calls upon farmers to produce large numbers of pigs next year on the gamble that bounteous crops will relieve the feed grain shortage.

The department is concerned over the possibility that the government's food conservation program, coupled with diminishing supplies and high prices of grain, may lead farmers to make a sharp reduction next year in the production of meat animals, particularly hogs.

At best, officials say, meat production next year will be down 10 to 15 percent. In 1949 supplies could be reduced so sharply that, given a continued high consumer demand, there would be acute shortages.

Beef production is declining because the nation is slaughtering cattle faster than they can be produced, and production is off sharply from wartime levels. Under these conditions a sharp increase in hog production next year would be needed to maintain a high level of meat production for 1949.

School System Is Starting Classes To Supplement On-the-Job Training

The Greenville school system in cooperation with the Veterans Administration is starting related training classes for those veterans who are taking on-the-job training under the GI Bill of Rights, according to J. H. Rose, superintendent of Greenville city schools. These classes will be directly related to the job which the veteran is doing and the job objective for which he is training.

Building Five of the vocational high school, which is the old N.Y. center, has been renovated and is now ready for the first classes. The first group to start related work will be the auto mechanics. The organizational meeting for this group will be held Thursday evening, October 9, at 7:30.

Dr. F. T. Vans, training officer of the Veterans Administration, urges every man who is training to become an auto mechanic to be present at the meeting on Thursday evening, and to bring some representative from the firm where he is working, if possible.

Under the rules and regulations of the Veterans Administration the job trainees are required to take four hours a week instruction in subjects related to their jobs. In addition to the instruction for auto mechanics, classes will be organized for related training in merchandising, plumbing and heating, electrical appliances and other work.

Qualified local instructors will be used for the classes.

In Greenville there are approximately 150 veterans getting on-the-job training. There are about seven additional ones in other parts of the county. These men are training for jobs which include those in industry, stores and other businesses, the skilled trades, etc.

STAGE DEBATE MILES APART

Taft And O'Mahoney Argue Causes Of High Prices On Radio Network

New York, Oct. 7.—(AP)—In a radio debate last night, Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) blamed monopolies for present high prices while his opponent, Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) blamed "the policies of the Roosevelt and Truman administrations."

O'Mahoney spoke from Denver and Taft from Cincinnati over the Mutual Broadcasting system.

"Congress gave the President power to limit exports, but by failing to exercise his power he has helped prices to climb higher," Taft declared.

"Furthermore, our government in buying for export has bought at the most inopportune times with the most blatant publicity."

Taft, giving high income as another reason for high prices, said "The administration insisted on a general wage increase pattern, adopting the extraordinary theory proclaimed by Henry Wallace's department of commerce experts and CIO that you could have a universal wage increase of 20 per cent without increasing prices."

"A democratic congress passed the OPA renewal bill in 1946," Taft said. "President Truman vetoed it."

O'Mahoney said that President Truman vetoed the first OPA extension bill because of an amendment which he said Taft recently had referred to as "the simple provision that increased costs must be reflected in increased prices."

"I have this 'simple provision' before me," O'Mahoney said. "It is the famous cost-plus-a-profit Taft amendment. It would take five minutes to read it and five hours to explain it, but it wrecked price control because it was an attempt to make the government guarantee a profit to manufacturers and processors."

DENHAM VIEW OVERRULED BY NLRB DECISION

Board Says Top AFL And CIO Officers Not Required Sign Affidavits

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board ruled today 4 to 1 that top AFL and CIO officers are not required by the Taft-Hartley law to sign non-Communist affidavits.

Overriding an interpretation by its own general counsel, Robert M. Denham, the board decided that as far as bargaining election procedures are concerned the law requires affidavits only from officers of individual unions and their locals.

While the board has the final say on elections to determine union representation rights, Denham has the last word on whether the board can ban a charge of an unfair labor practice. Thus the board can only impose its view of the law only in cases involving questions of union representation or bargaining rights.

Denham had taken the position earlier that an AFL or CIO union is barred under the law from using NLRB services unless the AFL or CIO leaders as well as individual union officers, signed statements disclaiming communism.

The board's majority decision was signed by three members, Chairman Paul M. Herzog and members John M. Houston and James J. Reynolds, Jr. A separate concurring opinion was submitted by member Abe Murdock.

The majority opinion said the fundamental purpose of Congress in requiring the affidavits was "to (Continued on Page Five)

Administration To Present Senate-House Agriculture Committees Long-Range Farm Policy; Plan Maintaining Farmers' Purchasing Power

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Administration presents to a joint session of Senate and House Agriculture Committees today its proposed long-range farm policy of "organized, sustained and realistic abundance."

The policy includes specific suggestions for revisions of the parity price formula, which is intended to keep farmers' purchasing power at a fair level.

In a preliminary statement, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said the farm program of the future should emphasize consumption of food rather than curtailed production as a means of avoiding price-depressing surpluses when America no longer is called upon to make large food shipments abroad.

An Agriculture Department spokesman told the committees yesterday that the nation "faces a possible deterioration, erosion and depletion" of its farm population, unless rural areas get "something approaching parity in living standards" with cities.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan made these eight suggestions for improving farm life:

1. Encouragement of rural industry; 2. Landlord responsibility for providing adequate housing for tenants; 3. Development of a national system of health insurance; 4. Improved rural education; 5. Government home loans to farmers; 6. Extension of social security to farmers; 7. Expansion of rural electrification and telephone services; 8. Extension of farm cooperatives.

Brannan said roughly one fifth of the country's citizens live on farms, but last year they received only one-ninth of the national income.

Back Home After Atlantic Flight With Young Son

Greensboro, N.C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Curtis Elmer Vincent arrived here early today after a trans-Atlantic flight with his 10-month-old son in the wake of an assertion by his English wife that she would fly to the United States herself to contest his claim to custody of the child.

The 24-year-old former U.S. infantry corporal said the plane ride across the Atlantic was "just fine" and that both he and his dark-haired brown-eyed son were in "fine shape."

He declined to discuss details of his departure from his estranged wife, Mrs. Madge Vincent, whom he married in Leeds, England, in December, 1945. He told newsmen however that he would "fight any action" his wife might take to regain custody of their child, Van Melvin.

Potato Growers To Map Program

Raleigh, N.C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Leading potato growers of six southeastern states are scheduled to meet here on Oct. 22 to discuss the possibility of undertaking a marketing program next year which would keep lower grades of potatoes off the market.

British Press Says Fuel Minister Shinwell Removed; Left-winger Aneurin Bevan Also May Be Shifted

London, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The London Star reported late today that Prime Minister Attlee had removed Fuel Minister Emanuel Shinwell, the chairman of the Labor Party, from his cabinet in a large scale governmental shakeup.

Shinwell will become war minister, a job which does not carry cabinet rank and oust him under the immediate supervision of the defense minister, the Star said.

Attlee saw King George VI this morning, apparently to go through with the formality of receiving the sovereign's assent to changes in the cabinet.

Newspapers of different political complexions had said that Attlee wanted to replace Shinwell, who was blamed by political opponents for last winter's fuel crisis. The report brought public objections from the leftwing.

Food Saving Program

"Waste Less" And "Eat Less"; Early Stages Of Plan Involves Semantics And Politics; Saving Of Grain Is Crucial Point; Use Of Substitute Foods

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—If you are a little puzzled at this point by some of the government's food-saving program, this writer is, too.

Several weeks ago Senator Taft, Ohio Republican, suggested we could save food for Europe if we'd "eat less."

About a week ago President Truman suggested we could save food if we'd "waste less." He called for a voluntary food-saving program.

At the same time he created a citizens committee to work out a food-saving program with Charles Luckman, Boston businessman, as chairman.

Sunday night, in a radio address, Luckman asked us to "eat less" to save food for Europe.

He asked us to "eat less meat"—none on Tuesdays—"eat less poultry and eggs"—none on Thursdays, and daily to save a slice of bread.

Does "waste less" mean the same as "eat less"? Charles Ross, Mr. Truman's secretary, seems unwilling to agree to that.

Asked about it, he said Mr. Truman originally emphasized that his voluntary food saving program is a "waste less" program rather than one of voluntary rationing and of eating less.

But if voluntarily doing without meat on Tuesdays and poultry and

Bolshevist Strategy

Reorganization Of Comintern Reveals Secret; Attempt To Communize All Western Europe Will Be Started Before American Aid Arrives; Fight To The Finish

Bolshevism has seized upon a highly strategic moment for reorganization of the dread Comintern—that is, the general staff for world revolution—and for a formal declaration of ideological warfare on the democracies, headed by the U. S. A.

Eastern Europe, and part of the central continent, already are in Moscow's grip. Most of Western Europe is in the throes of a fierce economic depression which renders it vulnerable to political attack—for people who are suffering privation, even hunger and cold, grasp at straws to save themselves.

So Bolshevism will strike with all its might at Western Europe and try to communize it right through to the English Channel before American aid has a chance to become effective. The way it looks now, Italy and France—both of which have powerful Communist parties—will be the earliest prime objectives, with politically and economically chaotic Italy marked down as the first victim.

In opening this article I used the expression "ideological warfare," and on second thought that's too much of a euphemism. This is no time to mince words.

The Bolshevist offensive is for the purpose of establishing the Red flag, all right, but the Communists

have been employing force, including widespread liquidation of opponents, in both Europe and the Orient. We may expect to see these strong-arm methods intensified, for this is a fight to a finish.

And let none be unwise enough to believe that the conflict will be confined to the Eastern Hemisphere. Any nation in the Americas which dandles with that idea is playing little Red Riding Hood to the big bad wolf. It may be expected that the intensification of strikes, and the creation of other hazards to recovery in Europe, will be accompanied by an increase of Communist activities in the Western Hemisphere.

And supposing the Bolshevists are able to drive through to the English Channel and consolidate their grip on the whole continent? This column has said before, and says again, that such a situation must almost inevitably produce another world war.

There is only one barrier which will halt the Red drive, and that is a physical one. Public opinion among the democracies is no greater deterrent than a feather would be to a battle tank. Bolshevism must come up against a tangible barrier. That can only be provided by a quick rehabilitation of the nations (Continued on Page Four)

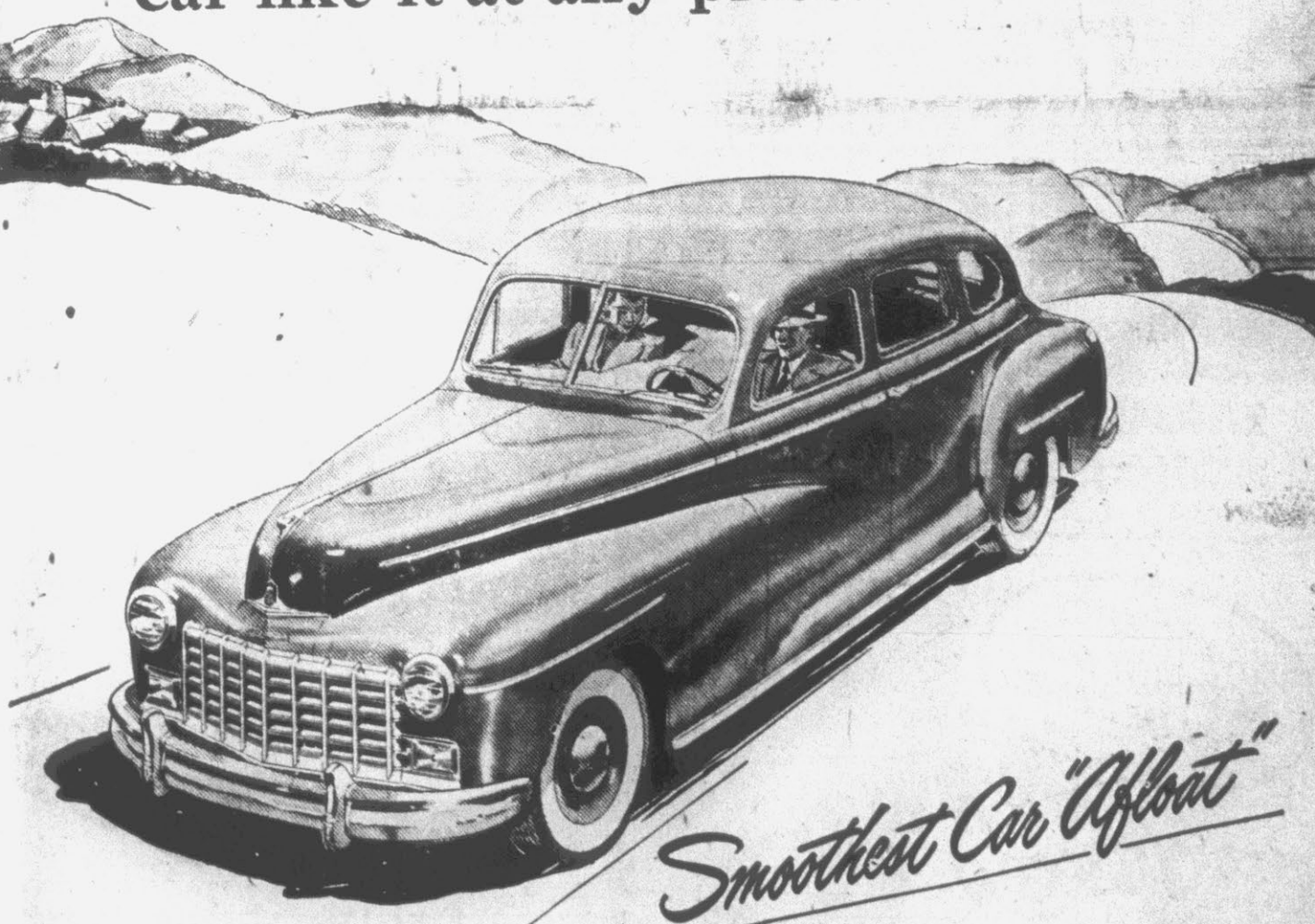

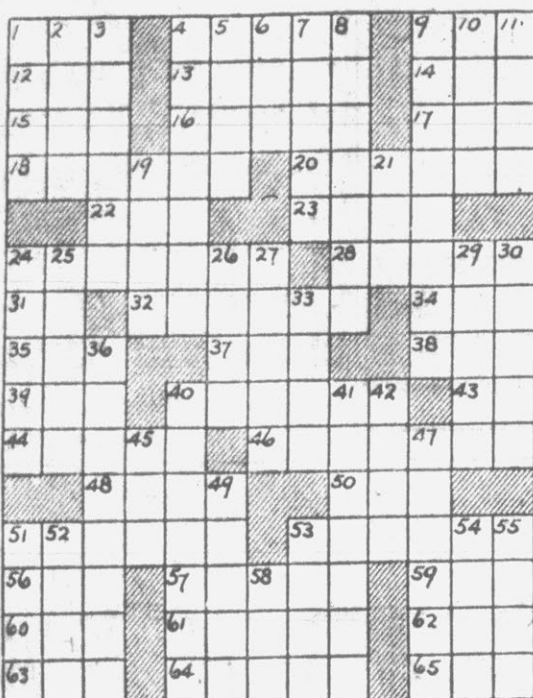
Strength FOR THE DAY

Noyes said he thought it would be enough, that after all this food saving at the table is only part of the grain-saving program which is going to get grain saving by farmers and industries which use grain.

Noyes was asked one other question: "If Americans are not to eat meat on Tuesdays or poultry or eggs on Thursdays, what should they eat on those days to help save on grain?"

Noyes said there was no answer to that yet. He said the main point now, since food is needed in Europe, is to get a food-saving program started.

Luckman said Sunday recipes for the use of substitute foods will be prepared and made public as the campaign goes along.

Noyes said everything can't be done at once, that time is short, and Luckman and his committee are working as fast as they can.
