

PHIL MURRAY TO GUIDE CIO ANOTHER YEAR

Union President Re-elected By Acclamation; Begins His Eighth Year In Office

Boston, Oct. 17—(AP)—Philip Murray, the man who keeps the CIO from flying apart, was re-elected president of the organization today by acclamation.

As secure in his power as ever, constantly praised as "our great leader" for the last five convention days, Murray begins his eighth year as CIO president.

The CIO convention on its final day staged the annual demonstration for Murray with cheering and band playing.

Jacob S. Potofsky, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers, called him "the greatest labor leader in the world," in a nominating speech.

The cheering, table-thumping and throwing of table cloths continued for 17 minutes and was halted only when a band began playing "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Last year he permitted rumors to persist for weeks that he would retire. And indeed he did seem weary and harassed at the 1946 convention in Atlantic City.

Today at 61 he looks better than he has in years. He has been in fine spirits all week as though a load were off his mind. No one has even hinted that he might quit.

Once more Murray has performed the interesting feat of managing the annual convention so that the delegates spoke and acted publicly as solid units.

Wednesday he gave a green light for right-wing leaders like Walter Reuther, George Baldanz, and Van Bittner to make speeches—fierce, reaching and caustic—criticizing the Communist line on the subject of American foreign policy.

This was an unmistakable blow at the Communist-line, left-wing minority of the CIO.

Hotel Undamaged By Fire Found In Ventilators

New Orleans, Oct. 17—(AP)—Scores of guests at the Roosevelt, New Orleans' largest hotel, left their rooms early this morning when fire was discovered in ventilator shafts from the kitchen.

Fifteen pieces of fire fighting equipment answered a three station alarm and fought the stubborn, spectacular, but apparently not dangerous blaze for an hour and a half.

Fire Chief Howard Dey said the fire started in the ventilator shaft over the first floor kitchen. The vents, which run up a service elevator shaft, carried the fire to the roof 14 stories above where grease on the elevator drums began to burn.

Seymour Weiss, manager of the hotel, said the fire started in the downtown section of the city, said damage was "negligible."

Flying Boat's Mishap Probed

New York, Oct. 17—(AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board pressed its inquiry today into the forced mid-Atlantic landing of the Bermuda Sky Queen as the 69 passengers and crew members of the giant flying boat were sped toward Boston aboard their rescue ship, the Coast Guard cutter Bibb.

George Gay, regional chief of the CAB Safety Division, said he would fly to Boston today to join other federal officials in questioning the survivors who are scheduled to reach port sometime Sunday.

Subjugated Countries

Small Nations Of Eastern Europe Liberty-Loving People; Communized By Force; All Feel Iron Hand Of Bolshevism; They Still Remember Taste Of Liberty

This column ventured the perhaps extreme view yesterday that the liberty-loving countries of Eastern Europe, which have been communized by force, won't indefinitely accept such regimentation—that either communism will purge itself of totalitarianism or its unwilling satellites will in due course take matters into their own hands in the cause of freedom.

Let's take another look at that today. The problem of these small nations which have been regimented by strong-arm methods was well epitomized by U.S. Secretary of State Marshall in his loudly applauded address before the CIO convention in Boston. Marshall wasn't speaking specifically of Eastern Europe but in more general terms, and his pungent comment provides an excellent definition of democracy.

The secretary declared that in his view the basic issue today is "whether or not men are to be left free to organize their social, political and economic existence in accordance with their desires; or

whether they are to have their lives arranged and dictated for them by small groups of men who have arrogated to themselves this arbitrary power."

That on the thumb-nail is the problem of the subjugated countries of Eastern Europe. If I weren't personally acquainted with these peoples (which I am), history would provide ample evidence for the statement that every one of them is prepared to risk life for freedom, as has been demonstrated through the centuries, going back even to the Middle Ages. A list of their names reads like a battle line for freedom: Finland, Poland, Rumania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Albania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia (the last name not "subjugated" but within the Russian zone of influence).

All of them have felt the iron heel of Bolshevism, and a couple—Finland and Poland—have bitter memories of Red assault. Tiny Finland was attacked and conquered by mighty Soviet Russia in 1939 and was forced to cede territory to the

Be It Ordained by the Board of
Commissioners of the Town of
Bethel:

Section 1. That the Town of
