

DE GAULLE TOP FIGURE AGAIN AFTER VOTING

Frenchmen Believe Changes Ahead Once RPF Consolidates Position

Paris, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Gen. Charles de Gaulle was the top political figure in France again today and Frenchmen believe there are going to be some changes made.

They're not sure whether the leader of the new anti-Communist rally of the French people (RPF), which swept the Paris municipal elections Sunday and rolled up 40 per cent of the popular vote in the provinces, would work for changes now or wait until the party gets its first crack at parliamentary elections next June—but they're sure changes are coming.

One change already was evident, and many Frenchmen attributed it to De Gaulle's victory. Parisians woke up to find their buses and subways running on schedule after having been strikebound for a week. The strike was settled last night.

This work stoppage had been depicted as a struggle between the non-Communist government of France and Communist-led labor unions. Positions of both the government and the Communists were said to have been weakened by De Gaulle's demonstration of strength, although the Communists did not actually lose any backing at the ballot boxes. And this was held by some to have been a factor in settlement of the strike.

The Communists, in an appeal published today in their party organ, L'Humanite, called for a merger of Communists and Socialists to save France from Caesarism and adventure and insure her full national independence.

Asserts Alcohol Not To Blame For Alcoholics

Chicago, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Alcohol is not the cause of alcoholism, says William D. Hall, professor of sociology at Yale University. He told a lecture audience at Roosevelt College last night.

"It's as wrong to say that it is to say that there are automobile accidents because there are automobiles or divorces because there are marriages."

He added: "Alcohol is not a cause, but simply a necessary condition to becoming an alcoholic."

He said one of the universal symptoms of alcoholism is an anti-social tendency.

CHOLERA TOLL SOARS

Cairo, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Egypt's cholera epidemic took 366 more lives in the 24-hour period up to yesterday, the Public Health Ministry announced, and the death toll from the disease now stands at 2,494 for the 27 days since the epidemic began.

Brazil Formally Severs Relations With Russia

Diplomats Speculate Break May Extend To Soviet Satellites; Cleavage Followed Press Attacks On Brazil, Dutra

Rio de Janeiro, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Brazil, second largest country in the Western Hemisphere, announced today she had severed diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia.

The announcement set diplomats to speculating that Brazil might eventually extend the break to countries in the Soviet sphere of influence. They recalled Chile's recent break with Yugoslavia.

The break with Russia formalized a situation already virtually in effect. Brazil resumed relations with Russia in 1945 but there have been no commercial or cultural exchanges. Rio's ambassador to Moscow

Mario Pimentel Brandao, has spent much of the time in Stockholm for reasons of health. Moscow's ambassador, Jacob Suritz, left Brazil following the official outlawing of the Communist party here several months ago.

Brazil took offense at Russian press attacks on this country and on President Eurico Gaspar Dutra. One of the Russian periodicals called Dutra an incompetent soldier and a fascist.

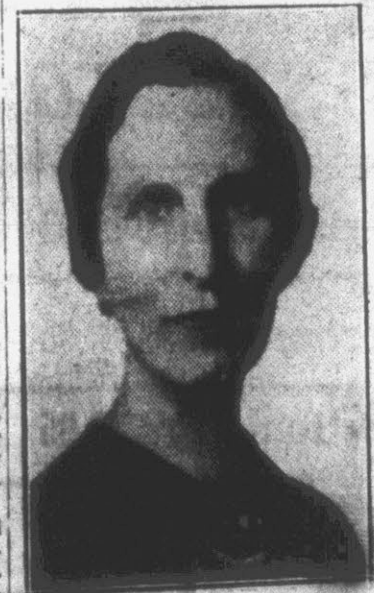
Vice President Nereu Ramos had declared the break was "imperative for national honor."

In Moscow yesterday, Pravda, anticipating the break, said that talk of the severance of relations showed "reactionaries" here had "lost all balance."

Some diplomats were inclined to interpret Brazil's action as a turning point in Latin American relations with Russia and Communism. They foresaw repercussions at the Inter-American Conference in January, scheduled to discuss the U.S. proposal for standardization of arms in this hemisphere.

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The State Department announced today it has agreed to a Brazilian request to represent Brazil's interests in Russia and is so notifying the Soviet government.

Grand Jury Charges 'Vampire' With Intent To Kill

Lumberton, N.C., Oct. 21.—(AP)—A 33-year-old Indian today stood accused of slaying two men to the extent that their wounds required 126 stitches and sucking their oozing blood while he held a knife point at their necks.

Deputy Sheriff D. J. Jones of Pembroke said yesterday he was holding James Bledsoe in Robeson County jail on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon in the vampire case.

One of the victims, Lemar Locklear, whose mutilated back required more than 75 stitches told the sheriff that after he was assaulted Bledsoe

UNUSED GREEK RELIEF FOUND

Supplies Uncovered; Hint Conspiracy To Maintain Prices

Athens, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Dwight Griswold, chief of the American mission to aid Greece, said today the agency would save \$6,000,000 or more through discovery of \$75,000,000 worth of supplies in warehouses and on docks.

The undiscovered material is part of \$1,000,000 worth sent to Greece since the Germans departed. Griswold told a news conference he believed some consumer goods found had been deliberately kept off the market to maintain high prices.

Griswold said more than \$2,500,000 of medical supplies had been found, some of which had deteriorated. Thousands of cartons of cigarettes, also were uncovered and many were in bad condition. Griswold indicated these had been kept off use to maintain Greek tobacco prices.

He said there was some suspicion that some equipment, particularly farm machinery, had been withheld because of disputes about prices between Greek ministries.

TRUMAN CALLS CONGRESSMEN

White House Conference On Europe Is Slated For Thursday

Washington, Oct. 21.—President Truman today summoned congressional leaders to the White House for a conference Thursday on Europe's financial plight.

The White House said invitations are going out today for the meeting at 2:30 p. m. Thursday for what President Truman called a "discussion of emergency foreign aid."

The group is the same as the one which met with Mr. Truman Sept. 29. In addition to the Republican and Democratic leaders in both houses, it includes the chairman and ranking minority members of the foreign affairs and appropriations committees and Senator Taft (R-Ohio), chairman of the GOP policy group in the Senate.

"Presumably the conference will canvass the outlook for emergency stop-gap aid to Europe as well as the outlook for a European recovery plan based on Secretary of State Marshall's self-help proposal and the possibility of a special session of Congress."

Ross would not elaborate beyond his brief assertion that emergency foreign aid would be the topic.

Scottish Miners Stage Walkout

Edinburgh, Oct. 21.—(AP)—An unofficial strike among Scottish coal miners, seeking wage increases, was reported today to have spread to 52 pits employing 13,300 men.

The report came from the Scottish regional office of the National Coal Board, which said the number of men affected is now more than double the 6,000 who went out yesterday.

Tropical Storm Moves Nearer To Nova Scotia

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 21.—(AP)—A storm, which caused an estimated \$400,000 worth of damage on Bermuda yesterday, was moving in a northeasterly direction. Barring a sudden shift in the course of the swirling storm, this apparently meant that there was no possibility it would hit the United States.

When the storm hit Bermuda, the wind was clocked at 100 miles an hour, with gusts ranging up to 125 miles an hour. The hurricane, first to hit Bermuda since 1926, tore down trees, damaged homes, knocked down power and telephone lines and got at least two ships in trouble off the Bermuda coast.

Longer Work Week To Be Considered As A Step To Spur U.S. Production

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—A suggested lengthening of the 40-hour work week as a step to spur production will be considered in connection with a congressional study of the "wage-hour law." Rep. McConnell (R-Pa.) said today.

McConnell is chairman of a House labor subcommittee which heard the idea advanced by Peter Beardsley, an attorney representing the American trucking associations.

Saves Time

Detroit, Oct. 21.—(AP)—American court procedure proved a little puzzling yesterday to the Oriental mind of Lung Poon, although he has spent 24 of his 63 years in this country.

Arraigned on a narcotics charge, he understood only with difficulty when his interpreter explained that Federal Judge Ernest A. O'Brien would appoint him an attorney free of charge. Assured there would be no fee, he then demanded assurance that the lawyer would win the case.

That was impossible, the court pointed out, so Lung Poon reconsidered his plea.

"Something for nothing is never so good," he stated. "I think I plead guilty and save time."

PARTIES ARGUE 'M-DAY' PLANS

New Inquiry Into World War II Industrial Mobilization

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—A Republican-Democratic battle over why it took so long to get American plants producing full blast for the war appears likely this week at a senate committee inquiry into industrial mobilization plans.

Deflected momentarily today for a look into the progress of war contract negotiations, the senate war investigating committee tomorrow will begin questioning Secretary of Defense Forrestal about a "fast" mobilization plan.

Chairman Brewster (R-Me.) told reporters this plan involved three decades of work by the army and navy. It was capped, he added, by a polishing-up report made before the war by a citizens committee headed by Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., who later became secretary of state.

Evatt Raps Soviet Stand On Balkans

Terms Boycott Of Proposed 'Watchdog' Committee For Balkans An "Attack On Authority Of The United Nations"

New York, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Australia's minister for external affairs, Dr. Herbert V. Evatt, declared today that Russia's announced boycott of the proposed United Nations "watchdog" committee for the Balkans was an "attack on the authority of the United Nations."

Evatt severely criticized Russia's stand on the whole Balkan problem and defended the United States and Britain for aiding Greece. He charged Russia with "hypocrisy" for attacking American-British aid to Greece while she supplied aid to Poland, Yugoslavia and other countries in the Soviet orbit.

The Australian chief delegate spoke before the United Nations Assembly at Flushing Meadow Park as the 57 delegations approached final action on the Greek-Balkan dispute with all signs pointing to an overwhelming victory for the United States and its proposed "watchdog" committee.

Greek Foreign Minister Constantinos Tsaldaris joined the debate with a charge that an article in the Communist newspaper Pravda was a "libel and base slander" against him. The article had quoted a Hungarian general as saying Tsaldaris had collaborated with an axis agent during the war. Tsaldaris said the general ought to be handed over to allied authorities sifting war crimes in London.

Andrei Y. Vishinsky, Russia's chief delegate, keynoted the bitter Soviet opposition to the American plan with a 99-minute speech yesterday. He repeated the charges that the United States and Britain—not Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria—were responsible for conditions in Greece and renewed Soviet demands that American and British military personnel be withdrawn from Greece immediately.

Poland, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia joined Vishinsky in his attack.

NEW PROPOSAL FOR LUCKMAN

Poultry And Feed Men Try Eliminate 'Poultryless' Day

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Poultry and feed men came forward today with their second plan to eliminate poultryless Thursdays from the food campaign.

After working late into the night, industry spokesmen announced they were ready to bring the Citizens Food Committee a specific new proposal to save grain for Europe by taking it away from chickens.

"We think we've got something acceptable," said one official of the National Poultry Producers Federation, whose first suggestion was rejected last night by Charles Luckman, food committee chairman.

The federation, working in cooperation with the commercial feed industry, said the new plan would

Harriman Says Communists Believe Conflict Inevitable

Asheville, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Secretary of Commerce Harriman told 13 southern governors last night "it is not generally appreciated" that Russia's verbal attack on the United States "began shortly after V-J Day."

"Ever since that time," the former U. S. ambassador to Russia said at a formal dinner speech during the annual conference of southern governors, "the Soviet press and radio have constantly distorted our motives and misrepresented life in this country."

ACTOR TAKES STAND BEFORE FILM PROBES

Adolph Menjou Tells Impressions Of 'Un-American' Figures In Hollywood

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Adolphe Menjou told House investigators today he has "heard" that John Howard Lawson, film writer, is head of Communists in Hollywood but cannot prove it.

Between puffs on a cigarette, the dapper film actor also testified to the House Committee on Un-American Activities that he believes Herbert Sorrell, head of the Conference of Studio Unions, "is a Communist."

With a wave of his hand, he said he would question the loyalty of anyone publicly associating with Sorrell.

He was asked, as a member of the Screen Actors Guild, if he knows of any members who are Communists.

"No," he replied, "but I know a great many people who act an awful lot like Communists."

Before questioning Menjou, the committee made public testimony he gave a subcommittee in secret in Los Angeles last May 15.

This disclosed that Menjou declared at that time that Hollywood "is one of the main centers of Communist activities in America."

He also expressed the opinion then that "it is the desire of the masters in Moscow" to use movies as a propaganda medium toward the ultimate end of an overthrow of the American government.

Menjou said he has no doubt that Communists in the United States are agents of Moscow and are engaged in "treasonable activity."

He urged that Congress outlaw the Communist party because "it is not a political party; it is a conspiracy to overthrow the government by force." He also suggested that Congress should "require propaganda pictures to be labeled as such."

"There has been an amazing change in Hollywood," since the House committee started its work, Menjou volunteered.

School Children In Near Panic Due To Explosion

Roxboro, N.C., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Explosion of a dynamite cap at Bethel Hill School near here yesterday resulted in injury to three pupils and near-panic among the other students.

After the explosion, girls screamed and students began rushing from the building and the nearby high school building. J. M. Wilburn, agriculture teacher, said that it was 20 or 30 minutes before order was restored and classes resumed.

Emery Hubbard, 11, who said that he was attempting to pick powder from the dynamite cap, lost two fingers of his left hand in the blast. Two other pupils were treated for face burns.

Hubbard said he found the dynamite cap near his home and did not know that it was dangerous.

Einstein Says World Doomed If Understanding Not Reached

Raleigh, Oct. 21.—(AP)—In a message to students of N. C. State College, Albert Einstein, world-famed mathematician and originator of the theory of relativity, today appealed for international understanding and declared that the peoples of the earth are doomed if the angry passions of a nationalistic world engulf us further.

Einstein, in a letter published in the open forum section of the technical

campus newspaper, said that atomic energy should be utilized for peacetime production to lift the world to a higher plane of living instead of being used for war. Speaking for the emergency committee of atomic scientists, he said:

"All about us we see the wreckage of great hopes which mankind held for the building of peace. The gulf between east and west which men of good will have worked to

close is widening daily. "Some people believe that no reconciliation is possible and that another world war must decide the issue; we scientists reply that it is no longer possible to decide any issue by such means—atomic war will bring no real decision but only unprecedented death and devastation on both sides."

"Such a time in history breeds defeatism and despair. But there are among us those who believe that man has within him the capacity to meet and overcome even the great tests of our times. What we must not lose, or we lose all, is our willingness to seek the truth and our courage to act upon the truth. If we maintain these, we cannot despair."

Asking for patience and international consideration, Einstein continued:

"Great ideas may often be expressed in very simple words. In the shadow of the atomic bomb it has become apparent that all men are brothers. If we recognize this as truth and act upon this recognition, mankind may go forward to a higher plane of development."

DeGaulle's Come-Back

Complete Results Of French Election Will Not Be Known For Some Time; Who Are DeGaulle's Backers? The Unexpected Move From Retirement; New Leadership

The French municipal election results still remain a grab-bag out of which further surprises may be extracted, but nothing is expected to change the sensational political comeback staged by General Charles de Gaulle through his call to the public to follow him in the new movement which he has designated "the rally of the French people" to combat communism and rehabilitate the stricken country.

The leader of the "Free French" during the dark days of the German occupation again is making a powerful bid for the generalship to lead them out of the wilderness. Naturally his votes haven't come from the Communist party, but rather from the Socialists, the Popular Republican Movement and various other parties. Thus we have the extraordinary circumstance of De Gaulle commanding a large public following which represents a new group that has not yet appeared in the national Parliament.

From this it is clear that a considerable portion of the anti-Communist section of the public—and this represents the majority of the

people—is seeking for additional leadership in France's life and death struggle. It isn't particularly surprising that they should call again on the man who during the bitter days of the war against Hitlerism became the symbol of French resistance. Appropriately of this it is interesting to note that election night, Sunday, the battle cry of the Free French in the World War was being chanted in the streets of Paris—"De Gaulle, De Gaulle, De Gaulle."

De Gaulle's bid for leadership is all the more remarkable because he had been in virtual retirement most of the time since he resigned the provisional presidency of France in January, 1946. He withdrew as a protest against leftist demands for a reduction in military expenditure. He held that military preparedness was essential.

The general's move was so unexpected that the public was flabbergasted, as your correspondent well knows, having been in Paris at the time. De Gaulle retired to his country home and sulked in his tent. (Continued on Page Four)

Greensboro, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The North Carolina Music Education Association has reduced from 11 to six the districts in the state where eliminations will be held next year for the annual music competition. Finals will be at the Woman's College here April 21-23.

District contests will be in Asheville, Charlotte, Fayetteville, Greenville, Raleigh and Winston-Salem. Robert Kelpser of Mooresville was named president of the association at a meeting here yesterday. Other officers chosen were James C. Prohl of Davidson College, vice-president; Miss Olga Schindler of Greenville, secretary, and Bernard Hirsch of Marion, treasurer.

George VI Announces Decision To Curb Power House Of Lords

London, Oct. 21.—(AP)—King George VI opened a new session of Parliament today and in a speech written by his Socialist ministers called for nationalization of the British gas industry and for a curb on the powers of the ancient House of Lords. He gave top priority, however, to economic recovery.

Both houses sat together in the lords' chamber for the ceremony starting the third legislative year under the Labor Government.

Seated on a gold throne, the king read his 15-minute speech slowly and deliberately with scarcely a pause. On his left sat the queen; on his right, Princess Elizabeth, attending her first state opening.

In 10 words the king announced the government's momentous decision to trim the authority of the lords:

"Legislation will be introduced to amend the Parliament Act, 1911" (Their authority is set out in that act).

A high government source confirmed that this cryptic statement was announcement of a cabinet decision, reached yesterday, to limit the power of the peers.

"A bill will be laid before you to

bring the gas industry under public ownership in the completion of the plan for the coordination of the fuel and power industries," the king said, giving a preview of the Socialist program for the coming year.

No mention was made of nationalization of the iron and steel industry, another Socialist objective. Political observers expressed belief that the government might be holding off on this until it could restrict

the lords' authority and thus make sure the lords could not obstruct such a move.

"The first aim of my ministers," the king declared, "will be to redress the adverse balance of payments, particularly by expanding exports."

He said his government would "continue to participate in the work of European reconstruction put in hand in the recent conference in Paris."

Education Experiment

Harvard College Trying To Solve Question Of 'Specialization' For Students; How Can A Man Specialize In Field And Come Out With A Broad Knowledge?

Boston, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Harvard College is experimenting in educating young men.

Since Harvard was founded 309 years ago it might seem that by this time it would know pretty well how to educate.

But this story deals only with Harvard College, not with Harvard University.

Included in the university are the business school, the medical school and other special training grounds for men who have graduated from college.

Harvard College is a four-year course for men looking for a bachelor of arts degree before going on to the university schools for graduates.

The university itself seems pretty sure that it knows exactly what is necessary for graduate students.

It's the college which is trying to prepare students for the life they'll have to lead once they leave college or go into the graduate schools.

engineering—is not necessarily an educated man. But how do you turn out a rounded-man who has a broader vision of the world than his own specialty?

Until 1869 Harvard College undergraduates weren't able to do much choosing about what they'd study in college. The courses were pretty rigidly fixed. They all had to take courses like these:

Greek, Latin, Hebrew, logic, some mathematics, a little science.

And it was the same in most other American colleges up until about that time. Gradually educators began to feel a need for a change particularly since science was becoming more and more important.

In 1869, Charles W. Eliot became president—he remained in office until 1909—and made a big change. He changed the tight, restricted course of learning and let it pretty much up to the students themselves to choose what they wanted to learn.

Under this system some students could concentrate in one field and come out knowing that one field well. Others could spread themselves

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—More than \$71,000,000 has gone into the National Art Gallery from the A. W. Mellon Educational and Charitable Trust, a recent report of the trust reveals. The gallery was given to the nation by the late Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the Treasury from 1921 to 1932, and is the largest gift ever made by an individual to the U. S. government.

The donation comprises works of art valued at more than \$50,000,000, the distinguished pink marble structure itself, together with its landscaping, \$16,037,433, and a \$5,000,000 endowment fund.

The National Art Gallery, believed to be the best attended in the world—close to 11,000,000 people have entered its great 12-ton bronze doors—was dedicated in March, 1941, and accepted by President Roosevelt.

It has become an institution for all the people, just as the former Pittsburgh financier said he hoped it would.

His own private art collection, assembled over a period of 50 years, formed the nucleus of what is now one of the greatest collections in the world.

Mellon adhered to three general standards to test his acquisitions: First, was the painting beautiful? Second, was it one of the artist's major, or most representative works? Third, was it in a good condition?

According to his associates, Mr. Mellon followed these procedures: 1. Each painting was brought to the Mellon residence and hung in suitable surroundings. 2. The advice of connoisseurs, or critics was sought. 3. The comments of casual visitors were carefully noted.

The purchase was completed only at the end of a suitable trial. As Mellon hoped, others have contributed to a great national collection. The gallery now houses more than 16,000 works of art.

The Mellon collection with 126 paintings and 25 pieces of sculpture covers the principal European schools from about 1200 A.D. to the early nineteenth century including a number of American masterpieces.

It includes Raphael's famed Alba Madonna, said to be the most expensive picture in the gallery. Mellon paid Soviet Russia more than \$1,000,000 for it, and congratulated himself on getting a bargain.

The collection of Samuel Kress, owner of a store chain, added from time to time, now includes 546 paintings and 52 pieces of sculpture, of the Italian schools, ranging from the fourteenth through the eighteenth centuries.

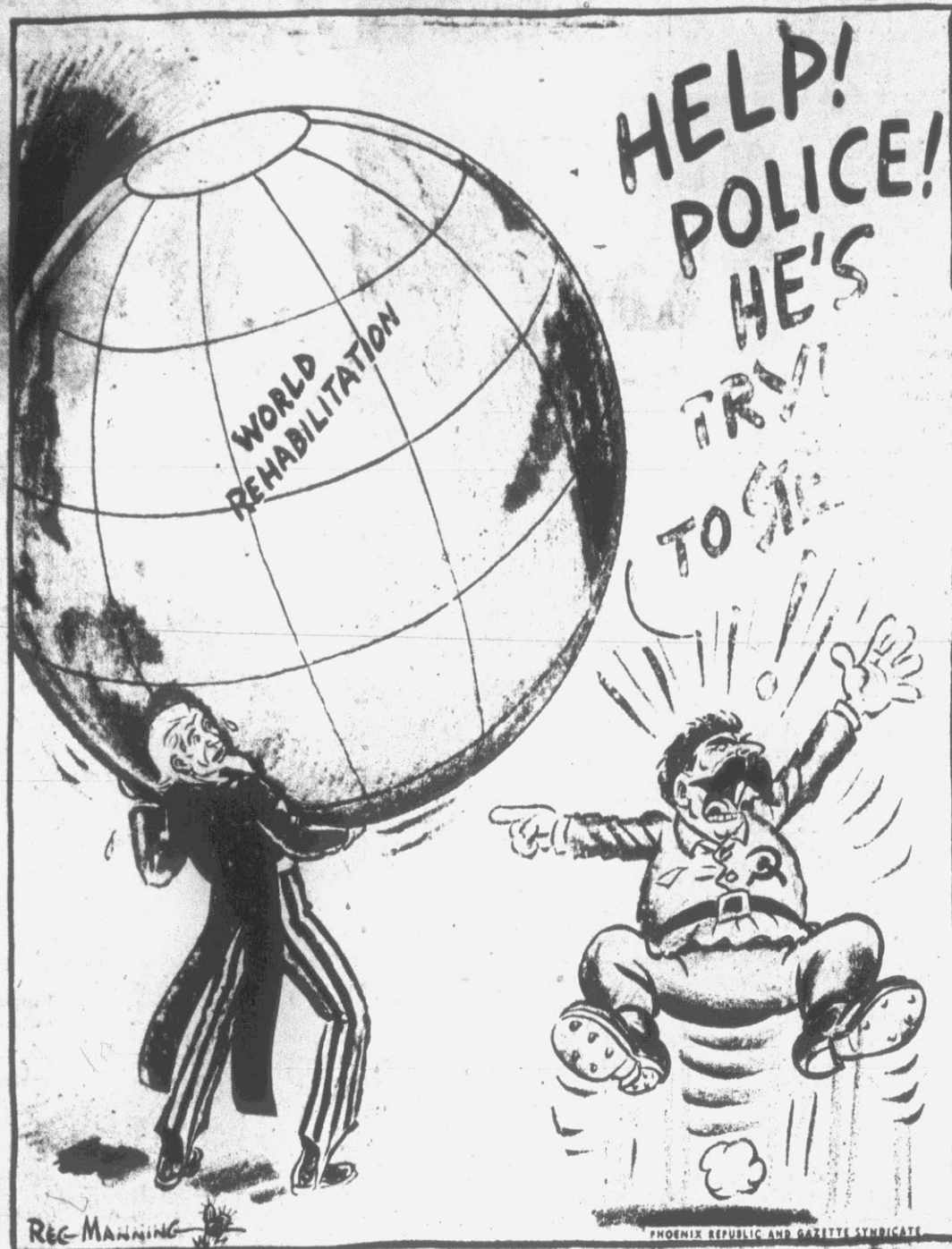
In 1942, Joseph E. Widener presented the paintings, sculpture and decorative arts collected by himself and his father, P. A. B. Widener. In addition, there are the Chester Dale Loan Collection and several collections of prints, including 10,000 works from Lessing J. Rosenwald.

all over the lot and come out with a small knowledge in many fields but mastery in none.

The "clot" system—called the elective system—was changed a bit

when a Lawrence Lowell became president in 1909. He was on the job until 1933. Lowell put in another system.

This became known as the concentration system—other schools call it majoring—and it means this: A student should not be able to get out of Harvard College without knowing one field well. So each student had to pick a field of knowledge in which to specialize or concentrate.

If a man chose economics for concentration, he had to take at least six courses in that field. Then he was free to take three courses in any other field at all.

After a while educators began to wonder whether this was a good idea and for this reason:

A student, by concentrating, would get a broad knowledge of that field but still have a narrow view of the world, mostly limited to his specialty, because:

Outside his specialty he was free to pick such simple or elementary and unthinking studies that he wouldn't be getting a broad view.

So the problem became this: How can a man specialize in one field and still, through his other studies, get a broad knowledge? What was needed, according to the professors, was something along these lines:

A "general education" which would include "the cultivation of a sense of values, the development of clear thinking, and an understanding of the physical and social world in which we live."

Last year—other colleges started it years ago—Harvard tried to find an answer by this method:

Let a man concentrate in one special field but at the same time let him study things fairly general such as:

1. The humanities—studies of things like Homer's Iliad, the Old Testament, Plato—to give him a view of the ideas which helped shape western civilization.

2. The social sciences, which would include things like economic and philosophic and political thinking as it was developed in western civilization.

3. The natural sciences, which

would include the principles underlying sciences like physics and chemistry. A man taking the natural sciences wouldn't come out a scientist but he'd know the thinking behind science.

It would work like this: A man could specialize in engineering. But instead of taking a side study like economics alone, he'd take a general course which included economics but gave a broader view of the world than just economics.

So far, a student can still operate under the Lowell system. He doesn't have to take these general courses, as listed in 1, 2 and 3 above.

But these general courses started a year ago. Five hundred students tried them last year. This year 1,700 out of 5,600 in the college are taking them.

If, after several years of experiment, the professors decide all students should take the 1, 2 and 3 courses, all will have to.

The question then will arise whether De Gaulle can command the support of the other anti-Communist elements.

De Gaulle's strength also is his weakness. He is a lone wolf—top man or nothing—and because of this characteristic has drawn the charge from some of "his political foes" that he is seeking to establish a dictatorship. However, the vote shows that a host of Frenchmen trust him—and certainly these are

days when France needs the services of all her best men.

Tobacco Farmers Face Certain Cuts In Acreage Declares J. M. Broughton

Roxboro, Oct. 21.—Tobacco farmers are faced with the "inevitable prospect of a 20 to 30 per cent acreage reduction," next year because of reduced export markets, former Governor J. M. Broughton told a meeting of Person county Farm Bureau members here last night.

Broughton told the farmers that a 1 per cent reduction in the price of flue-cured tobacco this year cannot be justified when the cost of production is taken into consideration and presents a very grave problem to farmers of the state.

To meet "these very serious economic developments" Broughton urged the farmers to wage a vigorous fight to preserve present farm legislation, including parity protection for tobacco, corn, peanuts, potatoes and other crops.

He also urged the farmers to give immediate consideration to wider diversification including planting of more grains and hay, increased dairy production and increased production of hogs, beef cattle and poultry.

Saturday Will Be "D-Day" For Duke's Wallace Wade

Richmond, Va., Oct. 21—(AP)—Saturday will be D-Day for Wallace Wade, Duke's "old master" of football, who is now in his thirteenth season as coach of the Blue Devils.

For Saturday afternoon Wade, who last year lost more football games than any other season since he began his coaching career back in 1919, sends the Dukes against the Demon Deacons at Wake Forest in the Southern Conference feature of the week—perhaps, the year.

Anxious to get his Blue Devils back to the gridiron prosperity they enjoyed in the pre-war years, Wade, who ground out six Southern Conference championships in his 12 previous campaigns as football boss at Duke, will be gunning for victory No. 93 since he took over at the Durham, N.C., university. His Duke teams have lost 24 and tied four.

So far, the 1947 Dukes, regarded in the pre-season predicting as one of the two conference dark-horses along with their opponent for Saturday—Wake Forest, have taken care of N.C. State, 7-0; Tennessee, 19-7; and Maryland, 19-7, and have tied Navy, 14-14.

Coach D. C. (Peahead) Walker's Deacons are unbeaten and untied. They just managed to squeeze by Georgetown, 6-0, in their opener and barely edged Clemson, 16-14. Then

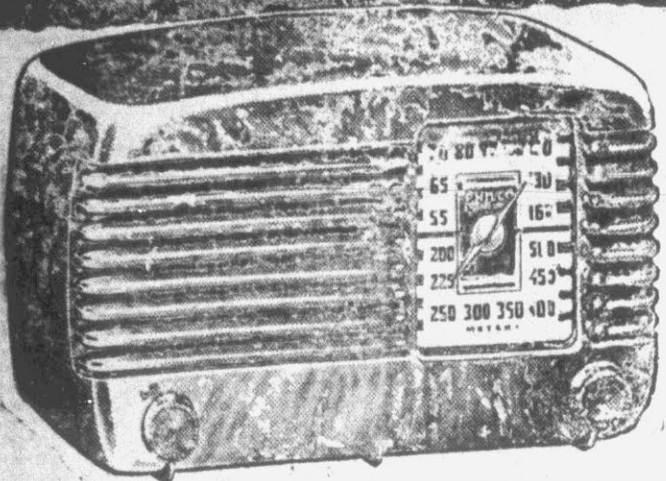

Roswell, N. M., Oct. 21—(AP)—Bob Crosby, who cheated death a thousand times on bucking broncs and wild-eyed steers, died from a jeep accident.

He died of head and chest injuries near here yesterday when his jeep plunged 30 feet into the dry river bed of the Pecos river.

The 50-year-old Crosby had been "king of the cowboys" to rodeo fans for a quarter of a century.

Fines Company For Employing Children

Wilmington, N.C., Oct. 21—(AP)—Federal Judge Don Gilliam has fined the Universal Fishing Company of Southport \$200 upon conviction of employing children aged 14 and 15 to head shrimp.

The company was found guilty of violating the child labor acts.

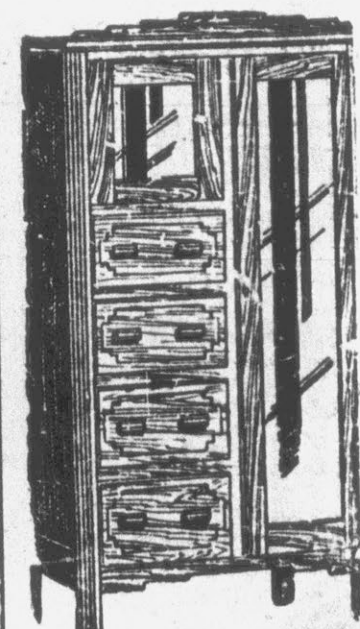
