DE GAULLIST PARTY RIPPED BY RAMADIER

French Premier Says Party Attacks Will Of The People And Republic

Paris, Oct. 23—(AP)—Socialist Premier Paul Ramadier, his new streamlined cabinet facing an assembly test next week, assailed the party of Gen. Charles de Gaulle today as one which attacks both the will of the people and the Fourth Republic itself.

A member of Ramadier's staff said the premier would ask the National Assembly—to be reconvened Tuesday in an emergency session—for a vote of confidence in the cabinet from which he yesterday purged ministers suspected of De Gaullist leanings. The vote is expected to come next Thursday.

The premier lashed out at both the left and the right in France. He declared it had been necessary to recall the assembly from its vacation to consult with the deputies concerning "danger to the republic" which he held was inherent in both the De Gaullist and Communist ideologies.

He spoke with special sharpness of De Gaulle's proposal to rewrite the constitution of the Fourth Republic. Such a proposal, he said, is an attack on "the will of the people" and "an attack on the republic."

"Our constitution has been sealed by the will of the people," Ramadier told a news conference. "During the four years of German occupation the French people desired only a return to parliamentary government as soon as possible with as little change as possible in their traditional institutions."

De Gaulle has criticized the constitution of the Fourth French Republic, adopted by referendum on Oct. 13, 1946, on the ground that it gives too much power to the Legislature and too little to the executive.

State Accepts Second Degree Murder Pleas

Wilson, Oct. 23—(AP)—Joseph Edward (Jiggs) Ferrell and James Thomas Ham today entered pleas of guilty to second degree murder in a robbery-slaying, and the State accepted the reduced charges.

They and Jiggs' brother, Hubert Ferrell, had been charged with first degree murder, which carries the death penalty upon conviction. Maximum sentence for conviction of second degree murder in North Carolina is 30 years.

Solicitor George Fountain of Tarboro accepted the pleas, made by counsel for the two defendants.

The State charges that Hubert Ferrell beat William Robert Gill, 45, unconscious on October 6, robbed him of \$20 and left his body in a roadside ditch. Jiggs and Ham accompanied him the State alleges.

Says His Sister Too Protective

New York, Oct. 23—(AP)—A 40-year-old bachelor dentist, who said his unmarried sister was over-zealous in protecting him from the fair sex, charged her with disorderly conduct last night.

Dr. J. S. Chapin told police that sister Shirley, 32, and a pretty blonde, selected his female patients and ordered from the office women whom she thought were dressed inappropriately.

Seek Economic Chaos

Announce Russian Scheme To Precipitate Economic Crisis In U. S.; General Idea Is That Without European Market, American Surplus Will Glut Markets At Home

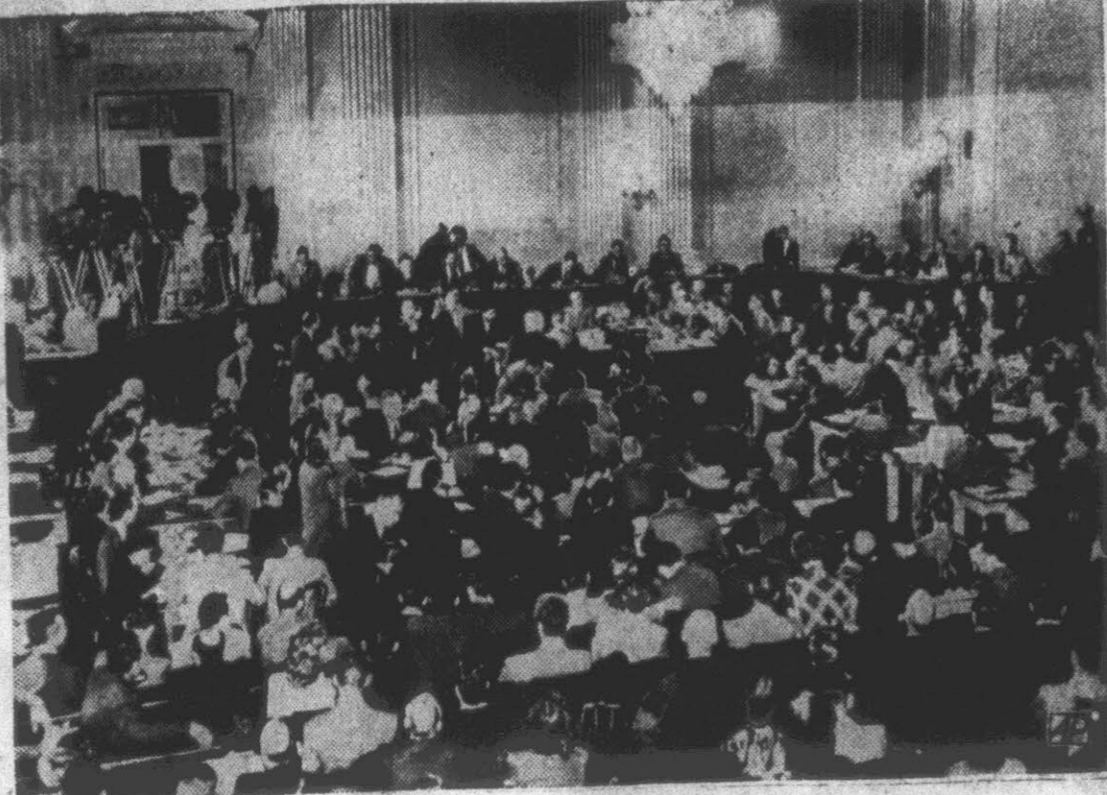

Soviet Russia has touched a new high in her aggression against democracy by boldly blazoning to the world a scheme whereby the Communists figure that an economic crisis can be precipitated in the United States—an interesting corollary to the persistent predictions in the Red capital that America is headed for a great depression.

The general idea is that if all European nations now affiliated with the Marshall Plan will gang up with the Soviet bloc, and be steadfast in "opposing American slave labor conditions," Americans will be faced with an economic crisis stemming from lack of foreign demand for their production. Then, to this extraordinary proposal goes, anti-capitalist Russia can cooperate with capitalist European countries indefinitely, on the basis of "reciprocity and mutual fulfillment of obligations."

This fresh method of attack on the U. S. was detailed in a speech by Andrei Zhdanov—one of Bolshevism's top figures—at the recent conference in Poland among representatives of Russia and her satel-

U.S. Replies To Warmonger Gag

Austin Tags Russian Move As Attempt To Apply Shackles To Minds Of Americans; Calls It A Menace To Free Speech

Lake Success, Oct. 23—(AP)—The United States today assailed Russia's attempt to curb alleged "warmongers" in this country as a move for "applying shackles" to the minds of the American people.

U. S. delegate Warren R. Austin declared that the Soviet resolution "would put shackles on the brain of man as well as a gag in his mouth."

Austin assailed the 57-member political committee of the United Nations assembly after Brig. Philippines had called the Soviet anti-"warmonger" measure a "hydra-headed monster" inspired "by an angry and spiteful motive."

Austin replied to yesterday's attack by Andrei V. Vishinsky, Soviet chief delegate, against former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes by saying that Vishinsky had given "a grossly distorted idea" of Byrnes' beliefs.

"The danger of investing magistrates with autocratic power of deciding what is war propaganda is illustrated by Mr. Vishinsky's attack on Mr. Justice Byrnes," Austin declared.

"If he had the power to jail Mr. Justice Byrnes, no doubt he would do that. In any case, he wants to gag him and others like him," Austin said.

"This most fundamental freedom of free speech—which is necessary for the maintenance of good government, would wither in the presence of the power of men to put shackles on the minds and tapes on the lips of such great statesmen as James F. Byrnes."

Austin assailed the Soviet resolution as a violation of the United Nations charter and declared: "It seeks to nullify and make meaningless our pledge to respect human rights."

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—Speaker Martin said today President Truman will call a special session of Congress to meet November 11 to consider emergency European aid.

Martin (R-Mass) made the announcement after an hour's conference with Mr. Truman and 11 congressional leaders of both parties.

He left the White House with other leaders just as newsmen entered the president's office for a news conference where other details are expected to be announced.

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—President Truman reviewed the European economic crisis today at a two hour and 35 minute cabinet session which laid the groundwork for his afternoon meeting with congressional leaders.

The cabinet members, who never say much about their talks with the President, were more silent than usual as they left the session. It was the longest cabinet meeting since Mr. Truman became President.

Secretary of Commerce Harriman told reporters that Mr. Truman would have a statement later.

Presumably he referred to a news conference, set tentatively for 3:30 p. m., an hour after the scheduled start of Mr. Truman's conference with the key Democratic and Republican members of both houses of Congress.

Emergency aid for dollar-short western European nations was the foremost problem under consideration by administration officials.

There was speculation whether Mr. Truman and the legislators might reach an agreement on the advisability of a special session of Congress to provide spot-gear aid.

Union Indicates Pay Hike Drive

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—The AFL publication, "Labor's Monthly Survey," said today that "unions must seek upward wage adjustments" due to high living costs.

The monthly said that whether a "new upward price spiral will be started by a third round of wage increases" depends on "the stamensmanship of management and workers as they conduct negotiations."

The position set forth by the Survey is the strongest taken in the AFL so far for a new wage increase campaign. The organization itself failed to make any specific statement on wages at its recent convention in San Francisco.

Britain Bans Leaf Imports From U.S.

Announce Cuts In Food Imports; Warn Economic Collapse Will Probably Mean End Of Democracy In England

London, Oct. 23—(AP)—Britain banned tobacco imports from the United States today and announced new cuts in food imports as the government warned that economic collapse would probably mean the end of British democracy.

The new restrictions on imports, announced at the same time a cut of \$80,000,000 a year in government and private expenditures for new homes, new factories, and new plant machinery. He predicted an even deeper austerity for the British people.

Sir Stafford declared Britain may sacrifice some imperial preference in exchange for lower U. S. tariffs. The British immediately must decide to import less from the United States and export more goods to fend off collapse.

"If our economy and that of Europe should collapse," he said, "our democracy in all probability will collapse too and will disappear, and with it will go the last stronghold of western democratic civilization in Europe."

"Can we discipline ourselves to the task before us or are we going to invite the harsh discipline of events to impose some tragic solution upon us?"

"We have stopped all purchases of U. S. tobacco until further decision," the economics minister said. "This will save about 5,000,000 pounds (\$20,000,000) on this year's allocation, and before the tobacco sales start next summer we shall be able to decide whether and how far we are able to enter the market."

Trade sources said Britain has enough tobacco on hand for two years' consumption at the present rate.

Sir Stafford said Britain's dollar crisis was due not to inability to manufacture enough goods, but to inability to sell goods for dollars.

SAYS TIME TO ACT "IS NOW"

Marshall Asserts Europe's Needs "Real And Urgent"

New York, Oct. 23—(AP)—Declaring that America cannot "stand indifferent" to the fate of the war-ravaged countries "who are looking to us for assistance," Secretary of State George C. Marshall said today that the time for action on European aid was now at hand.

He made his statement at the closing session of the 6th annual Herald Tribune forum to which President Truman sent a message reaffirming America's aspirations for a peaceful and stable world.

The president's letter to Mrs. Reid, president of the New York Herald Tribune, Inc., said that on the decisions of the coming weeks and months "will depend in large measure the future pattern of our relations with Europe and indeed, with the world at large."

"But we must be very careful to see that the steps we take will really serve the end we have in view," the president added. "We must face the fact that we alone cannot rehabilitate Europe and that our efforts will be useful only if they are intended to supplement a sincere and effective efforts of the Europeans to help themselves."

"We must be sure, moreover, that what we are undertaking to do is within the limits of our own strength and does not run counter to the health of our own economic life."

Marshall told the forum that he did not consider it a matter for argument any longer that Europe's need of assistance was real and urgent.

Blaze Again Flares As Winds Fan Woods Area

Portland, Me., Oct. 23—(AP)—Strong winds fanned huge fires at Waterboro and on Mount Desert Island out of control again today and hundreds of weary firefighters sought to check the flames at the edge of North Waterboro Village.

Most of New England's other drought-induced forest fires which have caused two deaths and more than \$3,500,000 in property damage were under control, however, as thousands of firemen and volunteers continued their efforts to check the blazes completely.

Former Fire Chief Richard Richard Carl of Waterboro said firefighters were making a stand at the edge of North Waterboro Village in an effort to save the settlement of 15 houses, a church, school and store.

Waterboro and South Waterboro appeared out of danger as the wind shifted.

A call was sounded by Bar Harbor officials for additional help to fight the Mount Desert blaze which was moving toward Hull's Cove, three miles north of fashionable Bar Harbor. Hull's Cove is a small village of fine homes and cottages.

No end of the prolonged drought was seen but the U. S. Weather Bureau said scattered showers were possible tomorrow in Maine, where approximately 400 homes, cottages and farm buildings and more than 26,000 acres of woodlands have been blackened with an estimated loss of \$3,000,000.

There was no indication when Committee Chairman Charles Luckman would announce a final decision on either.

Announce Date

London, Oct. 23—(AP)—Britain plans to withdraw her troops and administration from Palestine by March of 1949 "at the very latest" if the United Nations fails to settle the Holy Land problem, an authoritative informant said today.

Britain a week ago served a second notice on the United Nations that she would give up her League of Nations mandate in the Holy Land, but set no date for withdrawal. The British announcement had said merely that the withdrawal would occur "within a limited period."

Britain urged the U. N. not to delay "unduly" in reaching a final decision on the future of Palestine. British sources in New York said discussions already were underway in London and Jerusalem on the withdrawal and that a target date was to be announced.

Under this agreement, the Soviet Union would have been allowed to explore five northern Iranian provinces—including Azerbaijan—for oil to be exploited by a Russian-Iranian company whose control would have been 51 percent Soviet the first 25 years and 50 percent the next 25 and whose profits would have been split 50-50.

FDR NEW WAR COMING IN '38

Witness Says Two Cabinet Members Prevented Preparation

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—Louis C. Johnson, former assistant secretary of war, said today that he and President Roosevelt knew as early as 1938 "that war was coming and we could not stay out of it."

Johnson, who served as assistant secretary from 1937 until 1940, testified before the Senate War Investigation Committee which is trying to learn why a detailed industrial mobilization plan was discarded after Pearl Harbor.

At first Johnson asked that his account of pre-war moves in connection with the late President be "off the record," but Chairman Brewster (R-Maine) said the testimony should be open to the public.

Johnson said that his efforts to prepare this country for war were blocked by two former Cabinet members—former Secretary of Labor Perkins and former Secretary of War Woodring—and Gen. Brenton Somervell, wartime chief of the Army's supply service.

Johnson said that a detailed industrial mobilization plan "was ditched by brass hats because it did not suit the program of General Somervell."

At one time, Johnson testified, Somervell "even planned to get rid of General Marshall."

He referred to George Marshall, then Army Chief of Staff and the now secretary of state.

Egyptians Short On Burial Space

Cairo, Oct. 23—(AP)—Egyptian health authorities fighting desperately to break the back of a cholera plague which has taken 3,387 lives in the Nile Valley since it started 25 days ago, faced a new problem today—a shortage of burial space.

It often has been necessary to place as many as 10 bodies in one tomb. Some wealthy landowners are giving the government land for cemeteries.

Persons dying of cholera are buried without funeral immediately following disinfection of the corpse. From corpses come some of the greatest dangers of infection, the health authorities believe.

Ships Of Fleet To Visit Ports Navy Day

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—The Atlantic Fleet has assigned 205 ships to visit 41 ports on the East and Gulf Coasts for the observance of Navy Day on Monday.

The Navy said most of the vessels will be open for public inspection from Saturday through next Tuesday.

Rate War By Airlines

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—His latter group has won a temporary right to give scheduled cargo service. The airlines made a big move to meet the competition by reducing their rates to 20 cents a ton-mile Aug. 1. This compared with an average of about 18 cents for the un-certified operators, some of whom promptly cut their rates to an average of about 13 cents.

Three airlines—American, United and Capital—were most directly affected by that rate slash. They countered with a reduction to about 12 cents, and the independents began screaming to the CAB for help.

The independents asserted in general that the airline cargo rates are below cost and that the airlines are using mail pay "subsidy" to stage a rate war. They asked the CAB to refuse to let the new rates become effective. The board declined to interfere.

With respect to the independents' charge of "undercutting," it said the airlines' rates still are higher in many instances.

"Undercutting" as such is not an evil," the board said. "The public" (Continued on Page Four)

IRAN OIL PACT WITH RUSSIA IS NULLIFIED

Parliament Voids Agreement By 102-2; Urge Own Petroleum Explorations

Tehran, Iran, Oct. 23—(AP)—Premier Ahmed Qavam's oil agreement with the Russians was a dead letter today, voided by the Iranian Majlis (Parliament).

Over Qavam's protest, Parliament yesterday passed, 102 to 2, a resolution nullifying the understanding the premier reached with Soviet Ambassador Ivan Sadchikov in April, 1946.

In knocking this out, Parliament instructed the government to undertake oil exploration of the north through its own agencies and, in the event petroleum was found, then to discuss its sale to the Soviet Union.

In addition, the Majlis called upon the government to begin talks with the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company, partly owned by Britain, with a view to boosting Iran's share of profits from oil fields in the south.

In discussing the resolution to reject the deal with Russia before the vote was taken, Qavam said it was "not to Iran's advantage and we must not deal with the problems in haste." He added that "we are friends of Russia no matter what happens."

Last Sept. 10, Qavam's associates said Sadchikov had told the premier Russia would consider Iran a "bitter blood enemy" if Parliament did not approve the agreement.

The next day, U.S. Ambassador George V. Allen said in an address here that "Iranians may meet" but "the American people will support fully their freedom to make their own choices."

Byrnes Declares Should Begin On German Treaty

Columbia, S.C., Oct. 23—(AP)—Regardless of Russia's attitude, the United States, France and Great Britain should act "now" in calling a full-dress German peace conference, former Secretary of State Byrnes declared last night.

He predicted that there could be no four-power agreement on a peace conference unless Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov has his way. After stating that Molotov has "delayed for more than a year" preliminary work on a treaty, Byrnes added:

"The United States, Britain and France will have to decide whether the chaotic conditions of Europe will indefinitely continue or whether they will proceed to do what I suggest they now do—call a peace conference regardless of the Soviet attitude."

Pepper Against Being Prepared

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—A suggestion that Congress pass war mobilization laws in peacetime to be well prepared for any new conflict was offered today by Senator Brewster (R-Me.).

But Senator Pepper (D-Fla) denounced the proposal, saying: "I am not in favor of setting up all machines for war when we are trying to keep the peace."

Friends Assert Taft Candidacy Due Tomorrow

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—His friends said today that Senator Robert A. Taft will formally announce his active candidacy tomorrow for the Republican presidential nomination.

This will place the 58-year-old Ohioan who heads his party's policy committee in the Senate in a race that already has drawn the formal entry of former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota and probably will have several other participants, including Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Taft's announcement will be made in a letter to the Ohio State Republican Committee. It will put him in a position to begin an active drive for the 347 delegates necessary to win the nomination at next June's GOP convention in Philadelphia.

Nobel Prize Winners

Stockholm, Oct. 23—(AP)—The Nobel Prize in medicine for 1947 has been awarded jointly to two Czech-American scientists, Dr. Carl F. Cori and Gerty Cori of Washington University, St. Louis, Mo., and to Dr. B. A. Houssov of Buenos Aires. It was announced here tonight.

Await Decision of Food Committee On Distillery And Poultry Questions

Washington, Oct. 23—(AP)—The Citizens Food Committee today faced decisions on whether to call off two major phases of its food conservation drive which are under fire.

1. The proposed 60-day shutdown of the distilling industry, which is scheduled to start at midnight Saturday and which the AFL Distillery Workers are seeking to block.

2. The appeal to eat no poultry on Thursdays, which poultrymen have attacked as unnecessary and inadvisable in view of the large flocks of poultry and cold storage birds on hand.

is what impelled Moscow to make public the Zhdanov effort to consolidate as much of Europe as possible against the "imperialistic camp" of which he declared the United States is "the principal leading force."

Well now, what Zhdanov labels as an "imperialistic camp" includes the democracies of Europe plus the entire Western Hemisphere. And while his plot for a concerted effort to create an economic crisis in the United States is new, it's no news either to the United States or the other democracies that Moscow has been doing its utmost to create chaos within their borders by the employment of Russian agents and with the assistance of fifth columnists and fellow travelers.

The United States authorities are moving energetically to eliminate the Red menace in America. And other countries of this hemisphere are house-cleaning. Canada has smashed a big hole in the Russian spy ring whose ramifications extended throughout the dominion and the United States.

On top of this come sensational moves by Brazil and Chile. The Brazilian government has severed diplomatic relations with Moscow on the ground that there has been "outrageous and even calumnious" Russian press criticism of Brazil. President Eurico Gaspar Dutra and her army that is the ostensible cause of the break, but many observers believe that Red activities in Brazil itself provided another reason. At the same time Chile severed diplomatic and consular relations not only with Russia but with Czechoslovakia because of "instigations of international Communists," and began a roundup of Communist leaders.

So the Soviet scheme for creation of economic chaos finds strong resistance moving in both the Western Hemisphere and among democracies like France and Britain.

interest is served by the lowest, economical tariff. That is both the theory and the virtue of competition. When the uncertificated carrier sought and were granted the right to compete on a scheduled common carrier basis with the uncertificated carriers, they asked and received the right to compete.

The contention is made that the disputed tariffs are aimed specifically at the uncertificated carrier. Admittedly this is the case. But what this proves is merely that the disputed tariffs are competitive tariffs.

The board commented that there is no substantial evidence as to the costs of flying cargo on the routes involved. It added that "all industry goes through the experience of promotional rates—of rates initially set below costs in the hope of attaining volume business."

"In the light of the vast potential market for air cargo, a reasonable promotional rate is not unjustifiable," the CAB said.

The board said "The argument that the tariffs filed by the certificated carriers (airlines) are supported by mail subsidies is wholly unsound."

The board noted that railroad mail rates are eight to nine times higher than carload freight rates. It said that a "purported offer" by the independents to carry the mail for 18 cents a ton-mile "is merely an unanalyzed offer having no relationship to costs and intended simply to confuse the issues in this proceeding."

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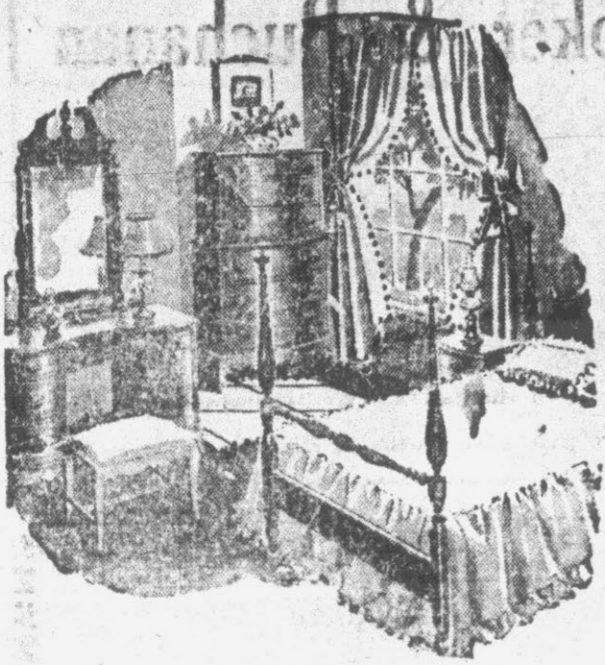

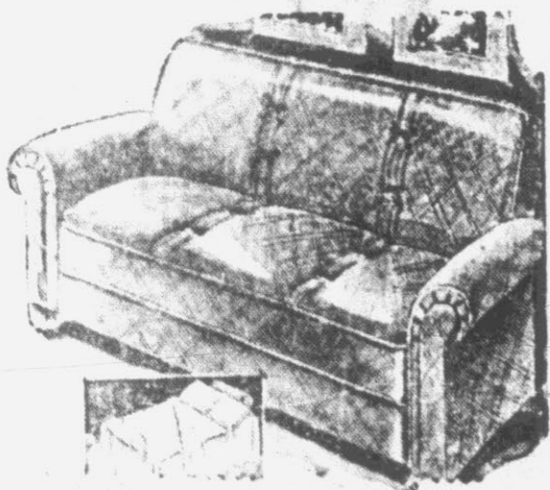

A non-suit was entered in the claim and delivery case of Harvey Bowen against Frank Wilkes, involving an automobile.

The court issued an order giving custody of Robert Ann Hart, a minor, to Mrs. Dessie Mayo Hart Brock against Eugene F. Hart of Williamston and authorized the sheriff to seize the child's belongings.

The following divorce decrees were issued on two years' separation: Ethel Nobles Fulcher against John B. Fulcher and A. D. James against Margaret Eilers James, and Peter Harris against Catherine J. Harris. The last named plaintiff and defendant are colored. Ben Sutton was granted a divorce from his wife, Charlotte Sutton, on the grounds of adultery.

Several cases were ordered set for trial at the special civil term of court the week of November 17. Judge Harris will preside over a one-week criminal term of court here next week. Some important cases are on the docket for trial.

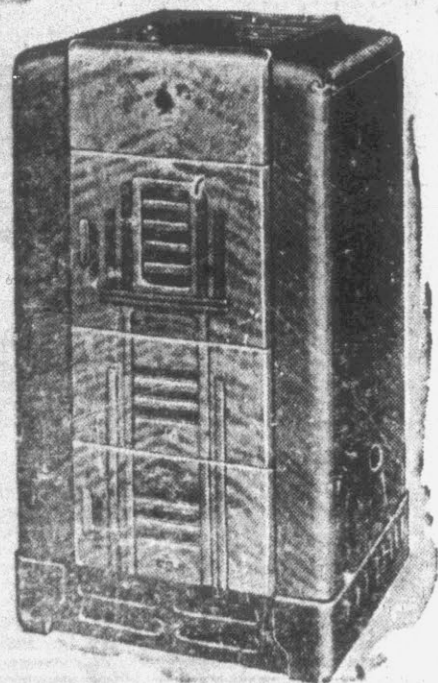
