U.S. Casualties Near Trieste 'Censored' Says Congressman

Washington, Oct. 28—(AP)—Rep. Marion T. Bennett (R-Mo.) declared today that "many" American soldiers have been killed or wounded by Communists in the Trieste area behind a "brass curtain of American military censorship."

can soldiers," Bennett added in a statement issued before he left for his home in Springfield, Mo. "I have the names and identifications of the incidents as furnished me by our military intelligence."

There have been no previous reports of any American casualties resulting from the long-standing tension between the predominantly Italian population of Trieste and the Yugoslavs.

DE GAULLISTS ATTACKED BY FRENCH HEAD

Ramadier Warns Of National Split In Seeking Vote Of Confidence

Paris, Oct. 28—(AP)—Socialist Premier Paul Ramadier delivered a blistering attack today against Gen. Charles de Gaulle, and declared to the National Assembly: "There are men who want to divide the country into two blocs. I warn you this can only result in economic ruin and civil war."

Agriculture Dept. Agrees To Enter Tobacco Markets

Washington, Oct. 28—(AP)—The Agriculture Department announced today it will enter the flue-cured tobacco auction markets in a move to stabilize grower prices.

Prices have sagged since the British government announced last week it will buy no more tobacco this year. Great Britain is normally the largest single foreign customer for American tobacco.

The department said no plans have been made for disposal of the tobacco which the government will buy. Officials said it is hoped that arrangements can be made to sell the tobacco to Britain. That hope is based largely upon the expectation that the United States will grant Britain additional financial assistance.

GRAIN SAVINGS GOAL DEPENDS ON SACRIFICE

Public's Self-Denial Relied Upon; 35 Per Cent Of Target Reached

Washington, Oct. 28—(AP)—The Citizens Food Committee today estimated that it is 35 per cent along the way toward President Truman's goal of saving 100,000,000 bushels of grain for the relief of winter distress in Europe.

Withdrawals In Korea Asked By Gromyko

Russian Demands American And Soviet Troops Be Ordered Out By January 1; U.S. Urges Approval Elections Plan

Lake Success, Oct. 28—(AP)—Russia called on the United Nations today to order withdrawal of all Russian and American troops from Korea by next Jan. 1.

The Soviet demand was laid before the General Assembly's 57-nation Political Committee after the United States had urged approval of a U.S. proposal for elections in the two zones of Korea by next March 31 under U.N. supervision.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and U.S. Delegate John Foster Dulles clashed sharply in the opening round of the Korean debate. Gromyko accused the United States of delaying negotiations for Korean independence while Dulles blamed Russia.

BAD WEATHER HAMPERS HUNT

Number Of Searchers For Missing Pan-Am Plane Grows

Ketchikan, Alaska, Oct. 28—(AP)—Plagued by continuing bad weather, a steadily growing fleet of air and surface craft set out again today in search of a missing Pan American World Airways clipper—spurred by two unconfirmed reports of smoke and flares near the Alaskan-British Columbia border.

As all earlier clues to the fate of the four-engine DC-4 which disappeared Sunday with 18 passengers and crewmen aboard proved unfruitful, the Coast Guard announced receipt of reports of smoke on Dundas Island, 55 miles southeast of Ketchikan, and of flares on Graham Island, just south of the Alaskan-British Columbia border. Rescue ships were assigned both areas.

The Weather Bureau forecast continuing low visibility and some rain, conditions which hampered considerably yesterday's search of higher mountain elevations along the coast.

Shuttling plane pilots and surface vessels alike brought back a discouraging "no clues" report after beating a blanket path over the 280 mile route from Ketchikan to Juneau and return.

Kashmir Joins India? There's More To It Than Meets The Eye When A Moslem State, Ruled By A Hindu Prince, Abandons Its Independence To Become Dependent On Hindu India

There is far more than meets the eye, we surmise, behind the official statement in New Delhi, India, that the famed state of Kashmir has abandoned its independence and joined the dominion of India because it needs aid to withstand the invasion of 2,000 Pathan tribesmen from the adjoining Northwest Frontier province, bent on raping, looting and murder.

The maharajah, by the way, is the Prince Hari Singh who was involved in a sensational law case a score of years ago in London when he was heir to the throne, then occupied by his uncle. The prince got mixed up in one of those "unhand my wife, you villain" blackmailing schemes, and paid hundreds of thousands of dollars before he became fed up and called in the authorities.

In order to protect his name, the British government ordered that he should be referred to simply as "Mister A." So he thus escaped direct publicity and in due course came to rule the vastly rich princely-land of wondrous scenery, exquisite flowers and romance ("pale hands I loved") which long has been the mecca of beauty lovers from the whole world.

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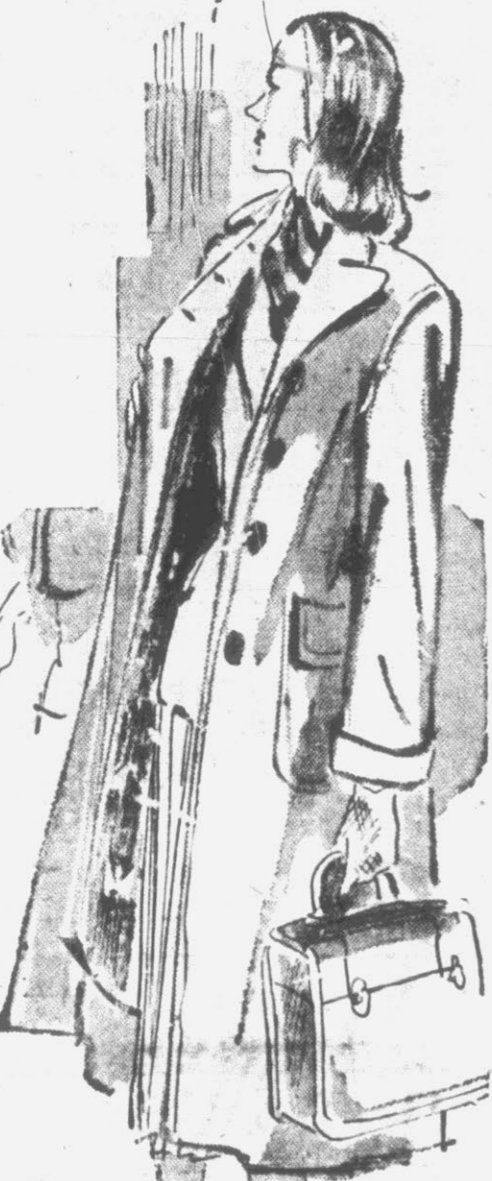

Nelson Family Held Reunion Last Sunday

 Nearly one hundred descendants of the late Barry D. Nelson and his wife, Piney Ann Rebecca Nelson, attended a family reunion at the old Nelson homestead in the Stokes community last Sunday. The homestead is still in the family. It is owned by W. Lawrence Nelson, the eldest son, and is occupied by Paul Nelson, his eldest son. Rev. D. W. Alexander, minister of Bethel, in an interesting address, paid tribute to the Nelson family and its fine traditions. A picnic dinner was served. Barry D. Nelson died at the age of 80 in 1934; his wife, Piney Nelson, died at the age of 59 in 1911. Both were born in the early 1850s. His father's father was the late Mc-Gilbert Nelson, who emigrated from Scotland and settled in Martin county. Mrs. Nelson's mother was Hannah Ross Overton, who came from England and settled in Pitt county in the late 1700s. Barry D. Nelson and his wife reared nine children, five girls and four boys and all nine of them are now living, their respective ages ranging from 50 to 70 years. The girls are Mrs. S. H. (Mary) Martin of Bethel, Mrs. W. C. (Annie) Reddick of Greenville, Mrs. G. E. (Susie) Page of Robersonville, Mrs. J. K. (Mattie) Briley, who lives between Stokes and Robersonville, and Mrs. C. H. (Mae) Briley of Robersonville.

The boys are W. Lawrence Nelson of Stokes, John S. Nelson of Greenville, Ira E. Nelson of Stokes, and Harley A. Nelson of Falkland. Thirty-nine of the couple's grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren are living. Eleven grandsons served in the armed forces in World War II. One of them, Norman Nelson, a son of W. Lawrence Nelson of Stokes, was killed in the Battle of the Bulge. His body arrived in New York Sunday for burial in this country. Another grandson, Ira E. Nelson of Stokes, was badly wounded and exposed to mustard gas. Two other grandsons, Harley O. Nelson and Hubert A. Nelson, sons of Harley A. Nelson of Falkland, were accidentally injured in the armed service.

ested in the work as time passes. She is scheduled to be graduated from East Carolina in June. At present she hopes to go into radio work.

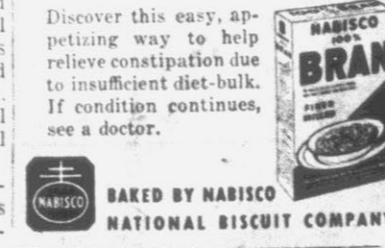
Womans Club To Honor Mrs. Buck, Officials

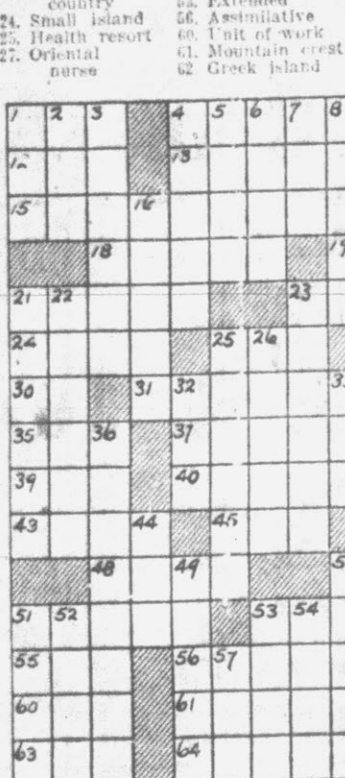

36-1 Russia on the north, and long has been much under Communist influence. Indeed, ever since the Bolsheviks came to power they have been trying to infiltrate India through Afghanistan, and at this delicate moment are reported to have a great number of "diplomatic" representatives in Kabul, Afghan capital.

Well, last summer when the British were organizing the two dominions of Pakistan and India, and were preparing to withdraw from the sub-continent, they received a note from Afghanistan. The Afghans—reportedly influenced by Moscow—claimed all the territory inhabited by the Pathans in northwest India, namely Baluchistan Province and the Northwest Frontier province. Kabul insisted that these areas be given the right to decide by plebiscite whether they wanted to join Afghanistan or be independent. British declined the proposition. Since then the Pathans—wild frontier tribesmen who live by killing and plunder—have been causing much trouble. True, they have been acting up for generations, and as far back as 1918 I rode with the British troops while they rounded up these chaps who were on the warpath near the Khyber. However, it's a striking coincidence—if it is a coincidence at all—that the Pathans should now be raiding Kashmir, adjoining the Northwest Frontier province. Kashmir of course also has a common northern frontier with Soviet Russia, and by virtue of her geographical position is important in that she is, or at least has been, one of the guardians of northwest India. Whatever the exact answer may be to this extraordinary situation, it's safe to predict that we shall hear much more from it before it is ironed out.

'Wheatlegger' Is New Outlaw Of Grain Country

Oklahoma City, Oct. 28—(AP)—The rough-and-western half of Oklahoma, which once produced a series of notorious bank robbers, has moved with the times and created the "wheatlegger."
Wheat, at \$3 a bushel, is the lure. In the last 30 days wheatleggers have hi-jacked up to \$30,000 worth of grain in nine western counties. "They've got a better racket than bank robbery this time," declared Jake Sims, State Bureau of Investigation director. "It's not only safer—there's more money in it."
The wheatleggers operate this way: First he "cases" a remote granary or wheat bin. Then on a quiet night—preferably Sunday—he backs a truck up to the wall. A hole is bored, and the wheatlegger inserts a power auger which effortlessly fills his truck.

Under your system, each state has as many votes in the electoral college as its total of senators and representatives.
When voting for president, a citizen does not vote for the candidate directly, but for electors who are pledged to vote for this candidate in the electoral college.
This is what will happen after the 1950 census:
1. The president, after being informed by the Census Bureau of the population changes by states, will tell Congress in January, 1951, how many members each state is entitled to under the new figures.
2. Fifteen days later the clerk of the House will mail certificates to the governor of each state relaying this information.
3. The new apportionment will be in effect at the next election.
Redistricting is a matter solely up to the states but until redistricting is accomplished, the law says:
1. If there is an increase in the number of representatives in a state the additional representatives shall be elected at large.
2. If there is a decrease, but the number of districts in the state is equal to the decreased number, election shall be from the existing districts.
3. If there is a decrease and the number of districts exceeds the decreased number, representatives shall be elected from the state at large.
