

HARD-FOUGHT CAMPAIGN FOR SENATE SEAT

Broughton Enters Race Against Umstead; May Overshadow Other Contests

Raleigh, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Political observers predicted today a bitter hard-fought campaign for the U.S. Senate seat now held by William B. Umstead of Durham following the formal announcement by former Governor J. M. Broughton that he would seek the post.

Broughton yesterday formally entered the race that will not be settled until the Democratic primary is held next May by filing his name with the State Board of Elections, paying a \$250 filing fee and issuing a statement that he was basing his campaign on his record of public service as governor and as a member of the state legislature.

The announcement came as no surprise, for Broughton had been considered as a likely candidate for the Senate since he left the governor's office in 1945, and in recent months he has made speeches in nearly every section of the state.

Umstead, who went to the Senate on appointment by Governor Cherry after the death of Senator Josiah W. Bailey, has stated on a number of occasions that he will enter the campaign. Umstead, too, has been waging an informal campaign in the weeks since Congress recessed.

The race between Broughton and Umstead probably will overshadow campaigning for the Democratic nomination for governor, for which the election will be held in November.

State Treasurer M. Johnson, R. Mayne Albright of Raleigh, former head of the State Employment Service, and Oscar Barker of Durham, member of the legislature.

In his formal announcement, Broughton said that he did not plan to begin an intensive campaign immediately but that "in the course of the campaign next spring, I shall endeavor to visit every section of the state and will discuss the problems of greatest concern to the people of the state and nation."

British Watch Voting Trend In Scotland Today

London, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The political spotlight swung to Scotland today as 69 cities and towns held municipal elections regarded by many observers as a barometer of public reaction toward the policies of Prime Minister Attlee's Labor Government.

The fact that Scotland is predominantly conservative, except around industrial Glasgow, led to predictions that the vote would show a continuation of the rightwing trend evidenced Saturday in local elections in England and Wales.

This swing to the right, which saw net conservative gains of 621 city council seats and net Labor losses of 652 seats, was generally interpreted as a reflection of public restiveness under the increasing austerity of life under the Labor Government.

NEWSMAN MISSING

Nehru's Offer To UN For Kashmir Referendum Is Chance For Assembly To Stop Wrangling For Constructive Work; Recapitulation; Can't Please Everybody

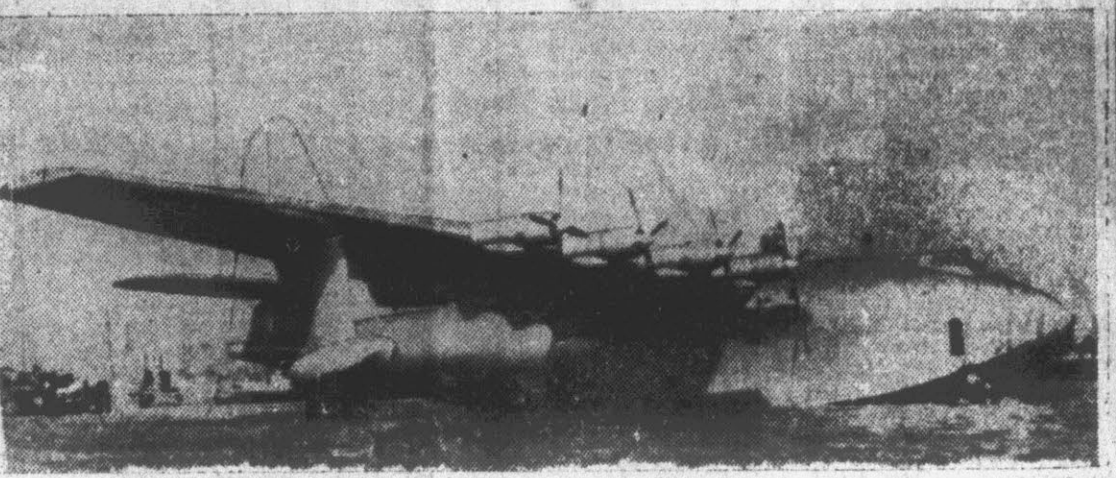
One would think the United Nations ought to welcome the offer by Jawaharlal Nehru, prime minister of the dominion of India, to submit the political fate of the princely state of Kashmir to a referendum conducted under the auspices of the peace organization as soon as the current invasion of Pathan tribesmen has been dealt with and tranquility has been restored.

There would be a chance for the U.N. to halt its international dogfight and do a constructive job of immense importance. I use the adjective "immense" advisedly because the Kashmir situation is so grave that out of it could grow a civil war which would rend the entire Indian sub-continent with its four hundred million people.

The position is so complicated that it ventures to recapitulate: The state of Kashmir is ruled by a Hindu maharajah whose family actually owns this vasty rich and beautiful principality—one of the world's most famous vacation haunts. But while the prince is a Hindu, the great majority of his some 4,000,000 subjects are Moslems.

When the Indian peninsula last summer was divided into two independent dominions—Hindu India and Moslem Pakistan—the maharajah

New Foreign Policy Statement Cites Lack USSR Cooperation

WORLD BREAD GRAINS SHORT

UN Food Group Says Production Ten Million Tons Off

Washington, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The world's supplies of bread cereals are 10,000,000 tons short of the amount needed to maintain present rations, Sir John Boyd Orr, director-general of the food and agriculture organization of the United Nations, said today.

"The situation," he said, "can be met only by an increase in total world food production. The increase which the world needs must come mainly from the rehabilitation and agriculture in the war-devastated countries and from the expansion of the underdeveloped countries."

Sir John explained that because of partial failure of the 1947 crop, especially in Europe, about 39,000,000 tons are needed in 1947-1948 to prevent a decrease in bread and cereal rations, compared with 38,000,000 tons estimated as needed by a FAO conference in September.

"According to the most recent estimates, supplies available amount to only about 29,000,000 tons. The resultant gap is 10,000,000 tons instead of the 9,000,000 that has been estimated only a few weeks ago," he said in a statement prepared for an FAO council session.

Document Declares Russia To Blame For UN Failures, And Slowness Of Demilitarizing, Reconstructing Germany

Washington, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The United States, in a new foreign policy statement, bluntly accuses Russia of failing to cooperate in efforts to establish peace.

The document, which sets forth this nation's position on postwar problems, declares:

1. Russia is to blame for failure of the United Nations "to grasp the fruits of peace and victory."
2. The Soviets have failed to make good on wartime commitments for the demilitarization and reconstruction of Germany.
3. The USSR is mainly interested in getting "maximum reparations" from Germany and in setting up a German political regime "friendly" to the Soviet.

These and similar charges, most of them previously aired by government leaders, are summed up in a statement entitled "Aspects of Current American Foreign Policy," issued yesterday. Fifty thousand copies are being prepared for public distribution.

"A basic aim of the United States," the report says, "is to press for the necessary treaty settlements which will permit withdrawal of occupation troops from Germany, Austria, Korea and Japan and enable all nations of the world to return as soon as possible to a peaceful basis."

Accusing Russia of refusing to compromise on many agreements for Germany's future, the report adds:

"The United States desires that Germany shall occupy a position among the powers which would give her freedom to cooperate in a broad program of European economic construction rather than to be linked economically and politically with an orbit. The impasse between the great powers in this matter has resulted temporarily at least in the virtual partition of Germany."

"The situation in Austria is somewhat similar."

Acquitted

Brunswick, Ga., Nov. 4.—(AP)—H. G. Worthy, former warden, and four former guards at the Glynn County convict camp were acquitted today of federal charges that they violated civil rights of prisoners in the slaying of eight Negro convicts last July 11.

Worthy and the former guards previously had been cleared of blame by a coroner's jury, a Glynn County grand jury and an investigating committee of the Georgia legislature.

The verdict was reached after eight minutes of deliberation.

EXPULSION FROM HUNGARY

Newsman Given 24 Hours Notice By Red-Dominated Government

London, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Jack Guinn, 31, Associated Press correspondent in Hungary for the last 22 months, has been expelled by the Communist-dominated government of that country and expects to leave Budapest today for Vienna.

The government notified Guinn yesterday that he must leave Hungary within 24 hours or face charges of "espionage and the smuggling of criminals" out of the country. Guinn decided to bow to the order after conferring with U.S. Minister Selden Chapin.

Guinn's wife and two children will follow him to Vienna shortly by U.S. legation plane.

The Hungarian government action against Guinn followed by a week the arrest of his American-born secretary, Miss Elizabeth K. Pailos, 31, and by three days the expulsion from Yugoslavia of Arthur M. Brandel, Belgrade correspondent for the New York Times.

The Hungarian Ministry of Interior issued a statement saying that political police had discovered "an organization for espionage," in connection with Miss Pailos and seven other persons had been detained.

"In connection with the discovery of this organization," the statement said, "Ministry of the Interior authorities expelled Mr. Jack Guinn, Associated Press correspondent, from Hungary forever."

Name Chairmen For Seal Sales This Christmas

Baltimore, Nov. 4.—(AP)—A story in the Baltimore Sun today said General Douglas MacArthur is planning a triumphal return to the United States next spring to "capture the Republican nomination" for president in 1948.

The story was written by Robert B. Cochrane, former chief of the Sun paper's Tokyo Bureau.

It said: "Private advances from Tokyo received today state flatly that General Douglas MacArthur will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for president in 1948. It is definitely known that MacArthur plans his x x x return x x x in April or May."

Cochrane's story said the crew of MacArthur's private plane has been alerted to return to this country permanently next spring and that "MacArthur's pilot, Elmer 'Red' McBride, has already said his automobile to an allied newspaper correspondent with delivery set for April."

Tax Advisory Committee Gives Report To Knutson

Washington, Nov. 4.—(AP)—A majority of a Citizens Advisory Committee on taxation recommended today "a reduction in individual income tax rates for all, with due regard for the cost of living of those in the lower income groups."

But Matthew Woll, AFL official and labor member of the 10-man group, took exception to the recommendations.

The majority of nine and Woll filed separate reports with the House Ways and Means Committee which created the study group, headed by Roswell Magill, former undersecretary of the treasury. Neither report was immediately made public in full.

The group's report was submitted as the Ways and Means Committee assembled to prepare tax legislation for the special session of Congress convening Nov. 17. Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) has said he wants a bill cutting income taxes by \$4,000,000,000 a year.

Also on the committee's list of business was the issue of whether Farmers Cooperative Associations should be taxed at the same rate as business corporations. On that, Undersecretary of the Treasury A. Lee M. Wiggins submitted a report suggesting that a decision be deferred.

Wiggins said he thought it would be wise to put off a decision until the Treasury completes a study it is now making of the entire tax system.

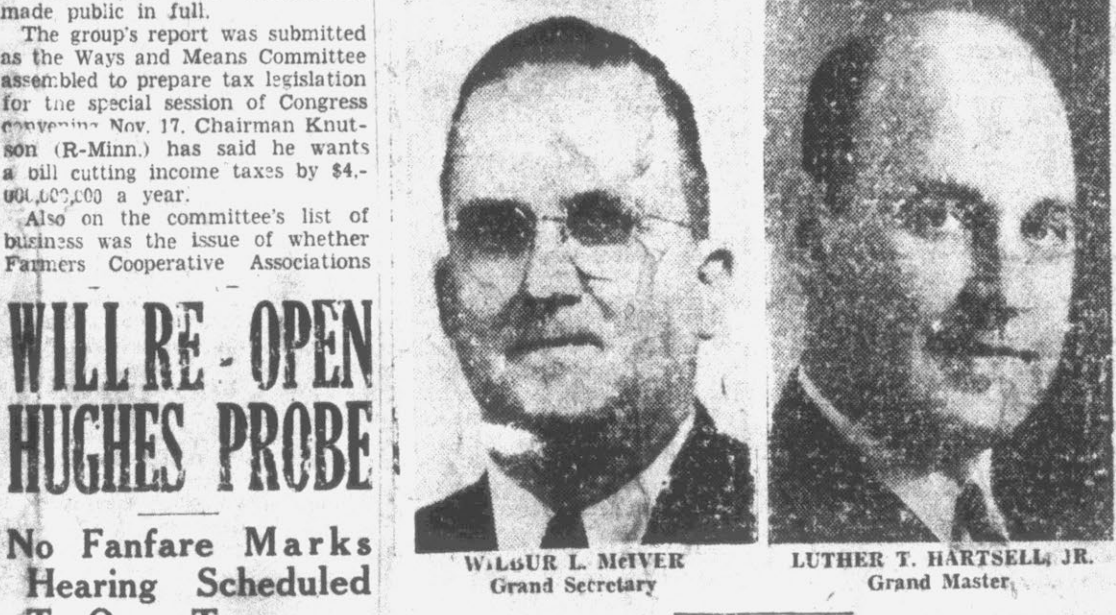
Magill told the committee his group was making no specific recommendations as to rate changes and personal exemptions, but believes "equitable adjustment of tax rates and exemptions is the number one federal tax problem today."

Knutson withheld temporarily release of the report's text. But it was understood to propose 46 changes in the tax laws.

Underground Movement Aided Escape of Exile

U.S. And British Intelligence Groups Maintain Escape Route From East Europe; Polish Leader To Visit U. S.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—(AP)—An American Military Government source said today that Stanislaw Mikolajczyk was aided in his dramatic 15-day flight from Warsaw to London by a sort of "underground railway" set up by U.S. and British Army intelligence sections to help "interesting personalities" escaping from east to west.

This informant said the Polish peasant party leader fled Warsaw Oct. 20 and arrived in the British zone of Germany Saturday.

An informed American source here said those who helped him comprised a team especially trained and practiced in aiding persons escaping from the east to the west, such as scientists, technicians, scholars, politicians and others. This source said such persons were being moved westward at a rate of two a day.

"We get some hot customers—hot with the breath of the Russian pursuers on their necks," the informant said. "Some of these have been Russian scientists who fled the Soviet Union and made their way to the United States or British sectors of Berlin and appealed to us as refugees."

London, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, Polish opposition leader who fled here from his Communist-dominated homeland, said today he was going to the United States soon "to see friends."

U.S. Offers New Korean Proposal On Withdrawals

Lake Success, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The United States submitted a revised proposal today calling for withdrawal of American and Soviet troops from Korea within 90 days "if possible" after establishment of a proposed independent Korean government.

Under the new U.S. plan, all foreign troops would be out of Korea by next summer instead of by next Jan. 1 as proposed by Russia.

The U.S. proposal also called for the creation of "national security forces" in Korea and the dissolution of "all military or semi-military formations" such as those set up by the Russians in northern Korea.

Union Organizer To Enter Prison

Winston-Salem, N.C., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Philip Koritz, CIO tobacco union organizer convicted of resisting an officer during a strike here last year, has waived extradition from New England and is expected today in Winston-Salem today to begin serving a year's imprisonment.

Tobacco Markets Show No Effects Of Sales Holiday On Price Averages

Raleigh, N.C., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Prices reflected no effects of the three-day sales holiday resulting from the British ban on import of American leaf yesterday as North Carolina's three flue-cured tobacco belts resumed operations.

Despite the absence of buyers of the Imperial Tobacco Company, which handles the purchases for the British trade, prices held comparatively steady, the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture reported.

Slightly stronger demand for most grades was seen on the old belt. The eastern and middle belts reported an almost equal division between price gains and losses.

"Small changes" were reported on the eastern belt. Outstanding in the changes were some lower qualities and some leaf and lug grades which were up from \$3 to \$4.

Middle belt sales saw lugs and cutters advancing from \$1 to \$2 and nondescript up 25 cents to \$3.75. Leaf and smoking leaf reflected a mixed trend with orange grades declining \$1 to \$3 and green and red grades up from \$1 to \$3 in most cases.

"Considering the market as a whole, it was generally on the same level as on last Tuesday," the federal-state report said. General quality of the offerings was improved and volume of sales was heavy.

Former Ambassador to Britain Takes Own Life

Concord, N.H., Nov. 4.—(AP)—John G. Winant, 58, former ambassador to the Court of St. James, committed suicide last night by shooting himself in the head with a bullet fired from a .32 Belgium pistol.

His private secretary, J. Bernard Teulon, said in a statement issued early today that the death weapon was one of two pistols found in the bedroom where his body was discovered. The other, a .32 German Luger, apparently had been thrown against the wall when he couldn't find ammunition.

Teulon said that Winant had not been in good health since the summer, but that he had continued work on his memoirs, even completing a section of the second volume yesterday.

He ate lunch downstairs, but had dinner served in his room. No one saw him after dinner. Teulon said he died at 8:20 p. m., about an hour after the diplomat had fired the fatal shot into his head. He did not regain consciousness, passing away while his personal physician, Dr. James W. Jaeson, was administering to him.

Mrs. Winant, who was notified in New York of his death, arrived at Concord airport in a state of collapse in a chartered plane early today. She went immediately to the family home.

A medical referee Clarence E. Butterick pronounced Winant a suicide and said he had shot himself while alone in a bedroom of one of his sons. A single shot had been fired from the Belgium weapon.

Still Talking Tax Cut

Legislators Talking Of Relief On 1948 Taxes, 1947 Hopes Cane: Politically Popular Move; Two Stumbling Blocks—National Debt and Marshall Plan

Washington, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Hold your hats. The tax-cut talk starts again. You'll be hearing it for months to come.

Maybe you'll get a cut in your 1948 taxes. This much seems pretty positive: You won't get a cut in taxes you owe on 1947 income.

In 1947 Congress twice passed bills to cut your 1947 income tax. And twice President Truman killed the idea with a veto.

All the talk in Washington now is about cutting 1948 taxes, not those for 1947.

Months ago the House Ways and Means Committee, which handles tax problems in the House, set up a special outside committee of 10 civilians to study taxes.

That committee was expected today to recommend a bunch of changes in the tax laws, including cuts in 1948 taxes.

So that starts the tax-cut all over again, with a bang.

Cutting your 1948 tax would be a politically popular thing for Congress to do because 1948 is a big election year.

In 1948 you'll vote for a president, vice president, one-third of the Senate, and all 435 members of the House.

KENTUCKY AND MISSISSIPPI IN SPOTLIGHT

Successor To Bilbo, And Labor Law Test In Kentucky Hold Vote Interest

Mississippi voters choose a successor to the late Senator Theodore G. Bilbo, and the border state of Kentucky decides a hard fought campaign for governor in today's two major off year elections.

Elsewhere, selection of three U.S. representatives to fill vacancies in New York, Indiana and Ohio shared interest with scores of races for city, county and state offices.

Politicians generally said little could be expected to develop in the way of trends for next year's presidential contest.

However, injection of the Taft-Hartley labor law as an issue added interest to the Kentucky gubernatorial race between Rep. Earle C. Clements, Democrat, and State Attorney General Eldon S. Dummitt, Republican.

Clements, who voted against the Taft-Hartley Act, ran with union backing. At the last minute Senator Barkley (D-), Senate minority leader, staged a whirlwind campaign on behalf of his party colleague.

Simons S. Willis, Republican governor, was not eligible to run again.

To replace Bilbo in the Senate, Mississippians had a choice of five Democrats and one Republican.

Forrest B. Jackson, Bilbo's personal attorney, was one of the Democratic candidates for the post. The others were Rep. John E. Rankin, long-time proponent of "white supremacy" and a member of the House Committee on Un-American Activities; Paul B. Johnson, Jr., son of a late governor; Circuit Judge John C. Stennis and Rep. William M. Colmer.

Analyze Errors In Amphibious Invasion Test

Tyndall, Fla., Nov. 4.—(AP) Mistakes and lessons of the unified armed forces first amphibious exercise were to be analyzed today by high Army and Navy officers who sent a small-scale invasion of armored troops over a Gulf Coast beach here yesterday.

It was obvious that things didn't go quite right in the operational climax of "Exercise Seminole," a tactical problem that has been going on for weeks on paper and finally came to a close with landing of the Second Armored Division.

The entire landing timetable was thrown out of kilter yesterday when a Navy landing ship ran aground before it could reach a pontoon causeway over which it was supposed to discharge its armored cargo high and dry to the beach.

Becomes Sheriff Despite Protest

Southport, N.C., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Despite a strong protest from the county Democratic Executive Committee, Walter M. Standland today had qualified as sheriff of Brunswick County, succeeding the late sheriff John White.

The county commissioners yesterday approved a bond of \$2,000, making official the appointment of Standland, who served a term in the federal penitentiary in Atlanta in 1927 for violating the prohibition law and who resigned as judge of the Brunswick Recorder's Court in 1942 after having been indicted on charges of malfeasance.

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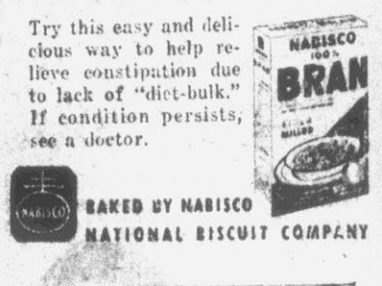

Brody's

Negro Education
In South, Topic
Messick Article

Progress in Negro education in the Southern states, existing discriminations, and a suggestion that many inequalities can be lessened through federal aid are discussed by Dr. John D. Messick, president of East Carolina Teachers' College, in an article published in the October issue of "The Journal of Educational Sociology." Specific reference is made throughout the article to the education of the Negro in North Carolina.

Dr. Messick states that in Southern public schools attended by Negroes improvement has been recently shown in enrollment, daily attendance, length of the school year, and number of teachers.

North Carolina, he says, has five of the 23 state colleges in the South for the training of teachers for Negro pupils. All Southern states now have agricultural and mechanical colleges with normal departments for Negroes, but only eleven offer the Negro graduate work, he points out. The North Carolina College for Negroes he cites as one of two reputable schools in the South to offer degrees in law to Negroes only.

North Carolina, which has only twelve public libraries serving Negroes, he gives as an example of poor facilities for Negroes. On the other hand, North Carolina is one of the few Southern states in which single salary schedules for white and Negro teachers are in practice, he adds.

The poverty of the South goes far toward explaining the present situation, he says, and the increase of tenancy in recent years has added to the difficulties. In spite of the large expenditure of state funds and the aid offered by educational foundations, Dr. Messick says, the South has been unable to provide adequate educational opportunities for all its citizens. The type of education offered, he adds, since it fails to stress vocational subjects sufficiently, is not what is most needed.

Federal funds, Dr. Messick concludes, should be provided through the state departments of education so as to assure for all pupils an adequate program of education commensurate with desirable standards.

Increased Tax
Take In Carolina

Greensboro, Nov. 4—(AP)—For the fourth consecutive month since the beginning of the fiscal year in July, internal revenue collections in the state showed gains over last year.

A report on the October collections, released today at the office here of Charles H. Robertson, internal revenue collector for the district of North Carolina, showed a total of \$104,121,905.18 paid into the United States treasury from Tar Heel sources. This represented an increase of \$8,439,992.07 over the \$95,681,958.11 collected in October, 1946.

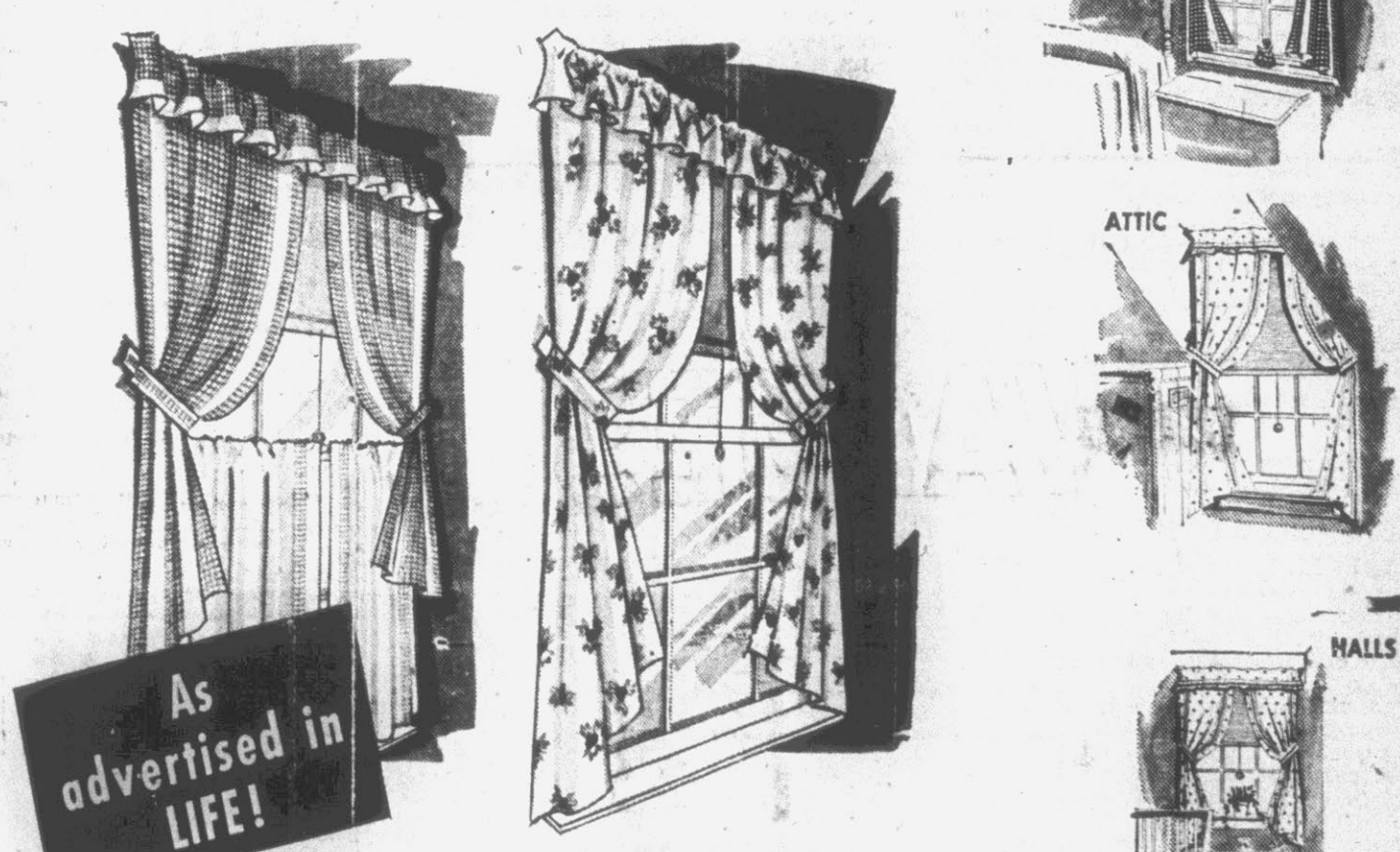

Farm Bureau's Swift Action During Leaf Crisis Cited By Dr. Frizzell

Swift action taken to meet the crisis resulting from the recent British ban on imports of American tobacco has proved conclusively that "farmers together have the necessary power to protect their interests," Dr. M. T. Frizzell, Ayden, president of the Pitt County Farm Bureau, declared today.

In the wake of the federal government's approval of a plan to finance British buyers for the remainder of the season, President Frizzell pointed out how Farm Bureau representatives went to work for government action to relieve the market situation as soon as the ban was announced.

"This example of organized efficiency is typical of the way in which the Farm Bureau has served farmers in North Carolina," he observed. "No Tar Heel farmer can forget how the Farm Bureau took the leadership in promoting establishment of the Flue-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation, which has added millions to the income of North Carolina growers by guaranteeing minimum support prices for their tobacco."

Mr. Frizzell continued to say that the Farm Bureau's current campaign to enroll 100,000 members in this state, deserves the support of every North Carolinian.

"We are faced with the task of making sure that a sound national farm program is created to replace the present agricultural laws which

expire at the end of 1948," he said. "Already farmers are faced with strong opposition to parity and price support principles, which are basic to a real farm program."

"Unless we farmers unite to see that a beneficial farm program is enacted, disastrous confusion is ahead," he concluded. "That is why this Farm Bureau membership drive is vital to the prosperity of farmers and city folks alike."

Canada Attempts Conciliating Of Palestine Views

New York, Nov. 4—(AP)—Former Vice President Henry A. Wallace arrived at La Guardia Field today by plane from Rome after a three-week tour of Europe and the Middle East.

Wallace, who spent 12 days in Palestine, said "the tension is not as great as it had been reported."

He added that he had talked with leading Arabs and Jews and "the outlook of each is dependent upon what position they hold in life; bankers taking the economic view, farmers that of the worker."

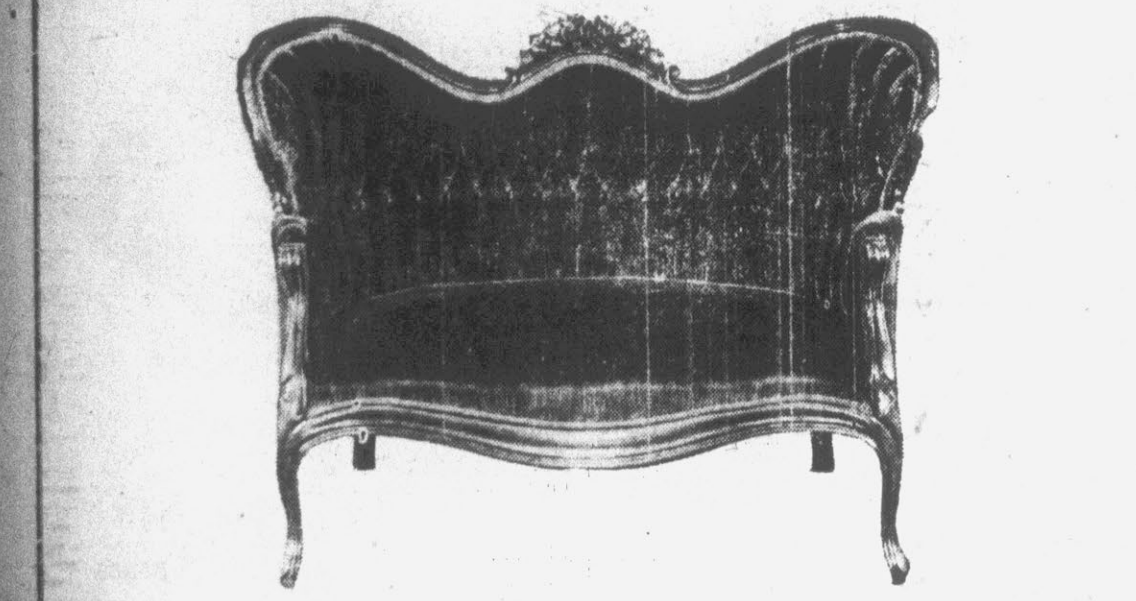
