Speaker Martin Reviews Ten Charges Of Contempt

Counsels For Hollywood Figures Request Action Be Thrown Out Or Held Until House Meets Next Monday; Technicalities Delay Martin Decision

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) took under consideration today a request that he throw out of contempt of Congress moves against 10 Hollywood writers, directors and producers.

Martin Papper of Washington and Lester M. Levin of New York counsel for the ten men, made the request during a one-hour private hearing granted them by the House speaker.

The contempt actions were initiated by the house committee on un-American activities because the men either refused to answer, or gave what the committee considered unsatisfactory answers, to questions whether they were or have been Communist party members.

The ten were called as witnesses in the committee's inquiry into Communism in Hollywood. Under usual procedure when Congress is not in session, contempt recommendations from a committee of the house go to the speaker who turns the matter over to the U. S. district attorney for prosecution. If Congress is in session, the recommendations are put before the house for a vote.

Popper and Levin argued to Martin:

1. That he should simply refuse to certify the committee's recommendations to the district attorney. They contended he has power to do that and thus, in effect, squelch the moves against the ten.

2. That if he decides against squelching the actions himself, he should hold them until the house meets next Monday and put them before the house for a vote.

Martin gave no indication as to when he would make a decision but told newsmen a technicality has prevented the committee from formally presenting the citations to him.

It was learned the technicality is the fact that the committee's action on the contempt citations was by telegraphic vote. Some authorities on congressional procedure are of the opinion that there must be a formal meeting of the committee to act on the matter.

Martin indicated he has some doubts as to his discretion in the matter once all technicalities are met. He read to newsmen a section of the law saying "it shall be the duty of the speaker 'to certify to the district attorney contempt citations from a committee."

Resistance To Coup In Siam Is Said Developing

Bangkok, Siam, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The Siamese military command headed by Field Marshal Pibul Songgram said tonight that armed resistance had broken out against the new regime established in a swift coup Sunday.

The military declined to say where the resistance had manifested itself or its strength.

Li Gen Phin Chitnawan, deputy commander, said the opposition units were the Siamese People's Resistance Forces. They were believed to be elements of a free Thai movement.

No military action has taken place in Bangkok or vicinity, and Phin said there was no fighting around the main army stations at Pethuri, Prachuab or Rajburi.

Strings To U.S. Aid?

What Kind Of Promises Or Agreements Will We Want From Countries We Help? How Far Will They Go In Allowing Us To Tell Them What To Do With Our Money?

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—One of the most important problems, of all those in the Marshall Plan to aid Europe, is this:

Do we tie strings to the help we give?

If we do, what kind? And what happens if they're too tight?

The Marshall Plan calls for helping Europe over the next four years with goods and money, worth up to \$20,000,000,000 perhaps.

But who'll handle the job of giving the aid to the 16 European nations which asked for it? The State Department? Probably not.

Government men who have studied the problem, and this includes congressmen, think a new and special government agency should be set up.

Their thinking goes like this:

1. The President would appoint someone to head it, with the approval of Congress.

2. He'd be assisted by a board of directors made up of the heads of various big government agencies, such as Secretary of State Marshall.

3. This special agency would have at least one special representative in every country receiving the aid.

So it would be the job of the representatives to see that those countries are living up to the agreements they made with us.

Land Leased For Leaf Research Station Here

Appoint Manager For Farm; Emphasis In First Year To Be Placed On Study Of Tobacco Varieties; Other Crops

Leasing arrangements have been completed and a manager appointed for the new state tobacco research station to be located on the Blount-Harvey Willoughby farm, two miles south of Greenville, according to Dr. W. E. Colwell, in charge of the tobacco research program for the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station. Dr. Colwell and a party of specialists from State College were in Greenville last week to make cropping plans for the coming season.

Guy L. Jones, a native of Lenoir County, and a graduate of State College has been appointed manager of the farm, says Dr. Colwell. Jones will make his home at Greenville and remain in active supervision of the farm throughout the year.

Jones received his B. S. degree in agronomy last June and spent the summer at the Oxford Tobacco Experiment Station where he worked with E. G. Moss and other specialists in the tobacco program both at Oxford and at Raleigh.

Commenting on the cropping plans for the farm, Dr. Colwell emphasized the farm management

TAX WINDFALL TO PAY RELIEF

Receipts May Balance Off Part Of Added European Costs

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—A tax windfall resulting from booming business is showing promise of balancing off part of this year's added costs of aid to Europe.

Some government analysts said today receipts for the current fiscal year ending next June 30 may top the present budget estimate of \$41,700,000,000 by \$2,000,000,000 if nothing happens to check the revenue flow. Last year's total was \$43,200,000,000.

Secretary of State Marshall yesterday put at \$2,597,000,000 the cost of this country's stop-gap and long-range assistance programs between now and the end of the fiscal year. The government analysts said they see little or no threat on the business horizon to continued high tax revenues, but they added that any tax cutting measure could upset their new calculations.

Revenue collections for the first third of this fiscal year—the slackest season of the tax collection calendar—belied budget bureau predictions by running \$200,000,000 ahead, instead of behind, the same period of last year.

SENATOR LISTS AID DANGERS

Taft Says More Taxes And Price Controls Possible

New York, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) said last night that he favored "reasonable" aid to Europe to block the spread of communism but declared that the Marshall Plan, unless carefully administered, might encourage a "continuation of unsound policies" by European governments.

Taft, making his first speech here since announcing his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination, listed "dangers" of the proposed foreign aid program as "further" inflation, continuation of "an intolerable tax burden," and repression.

Poland Urges UN Help Oust Franco

Asks Assembly To Recommend Strongest Measures Short Of Military Force To Cast Out Franco Regime In Spain

Lake Success, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Poland demanded today that the United Nations Assembly recommend the strongest possible measures short of military force to oust the Franco regime in Spain.

Polish Deputy Oscar Lange declared that previous action by the assembly had failed completely in its attempt to rid Spain of Franco. He formally proposed that the Security Council take up the Franco question "within a month" and to take "adequate measures in conformity with article 41 of the charter."

This article provides "complete or partial interruption of economic relations and of rail, sea, air, postal, telegraphic, radio and other means of communication, and the severance of diplomatic relations."

Dr. Lange made his proposal before the assembly's 57-nation political committee.

The 57-nation special Palestine committee at a brief informal meeting meanwhile heard Dr. Herbert V. Evtatt of Australia, committee chairman, urge greater speed in finding a solution of the Holy Land problem.

Evtatt received a promise from the chairman of two Palestine sub-committee that they would "submit their reports within 'a few days.' These will include the partition

plan agreed on yesterday" by the U. S. and Russia, and an Arab plan agreed on by an "Arab" sub-committee.

Evtatt said that as soon as the reports are received he would begin holding three meetings of the full Palestine committee each day until action is completed.

Before the session Evtatt had predicted that the battle on the partition plan would come within three days in the committee, but the outcome remained in doubt despite the rare U. S.-Soviet accord.

Another unknown factor was the eventual attitude of the British government toward the enforcement plan, which provides that Britain, as mandatory power, shall "be responsible for the maintenance of law and order and the conduct of essential public services in Palestine" for an interim period preceding independence.

HUGHES DENIES MEYER OFFER

Disclaims Any Offer To General To Remove 'Outlaw' Ban

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Howard Hughes denied "positively" today that he ever offered Bennett E. Meyers, retired general, \$100,000 to try and remove a New York City ban against showing of the Hughes "motion picture," "The Outlaw."

But the lanky millionaire film producer and aircraft designer testified that Meyers "told me he had talked with Mayor O'Dwyer" of New York City about allowing the Hughes picture to be exhibited. It was banned in New York on the grounds it was too sexy.

"Did you offer Meyers any sum of money to do this job?" pressed Chairman Ferguson.

Hughes hesitated. Finally, he said he wanted to "make it very clear" that he had not employed Meyers, that he had not asked him to do anything except "remove the finger that I believe he had put on it."

Hughes testified yesterday that he had believed at one time that Meyers got the movie banned because Meyers was sore over Hughes' refusal to lend him \$200,000 during the war to finance a \$100,000 bond speculation. He said that later he developed doubts that Meyers got the film banned.

Hughes flared up at one point under Ferguson's questioning and accused the senator of "trying to trip me."

Escapees Begin 20-Year Terms

Asheville, N.C., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Three convicts who escaped from the prison ward of the state sanatorium at Sanatorium, today began serving 20-years each in the federal penitentiary after pleading guilty to charges of kidnapping and violation of the Dyer Act.

Federal Judge E. Yates Webb sentenced the three, Ballard Martin of Newton, James A. Stephenson of Belmont, and Odell Holder of Greensboro, in the U. S. District Court here yesterday.

BARUCH WINS WILSON AWARD

World Can't Count On Third Chance, Says Statesman

New York, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Despite "clashing ideologies," the United Nations must be made to succeed for the world, "cannot count on a third chance," Bernard M. Baruch said last night.

Baruch, adviser to presidents and elder statesman, spoke at the 25th anniversary dinner of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation at which he was presented the organization's award for distinguished service.

Presentation of the award was made by Joseph Daniels, secretary of the Navy in the Wilson cabinet. It was conferred in recognition of Baruch's "wisdom and courage, dedicated without reserve to the service of his country during and between two world wars."

Warren Austin, chief American delegate to the U. N. and another speaker, described Baruch as a foremost spokesman of this country in advancing a concept of world control of atomic energy to insure its use for peaceful purposes only. The American proposals on the control of atomic energy, as out-

Skeptical

Chicago, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Several leading American atomic scientists expressed "very marked skepticism" today of reports that Russian scientists had exploded a small sample bomb last June in Siberia.

"All this does not make much sense," said Edward Teller, professor of physics at the University of Chicago's Institute of Nuclear Studies, when advised of the report. He did not elaborate.

Reuther Wins Fight For Leadership Of UAW-CIO

Atlantic City, N.J., Nov. 11.—(AP)—The battle-weary United Auto Workers, CIO, prepared to re-elect Walter Reuther as their president today for a second term.

At 40, Reuther was riding high in the labor movement. The UAW convention had endorsed his position in favor of filling non-Communist affidavits under the Taft-Hartley Act. He had won the blessing of CIO President Philip Murray. He apparently was in real command of the big union for the first time.

The opposing political faction, the so-called "left wing" led by Secretary-Treasurer George Addes, Jr., must be the reality of works.

Royall Says U.S. Must Base Defence On Program Of Universal Training

Philadelphia, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Secretary of the Army Royall declared today the United States must base its defense on a universal military training program because "the potential forces that might be raised against us are immensely powerful."

The world is in a state "which we cannot sensibly face without adequate military force," Royall said in an address prepared for Armistice Day ceremonies in historic Independence Hall.

"We must never lose the hope and the belief and the desire that there be peace," he said. "We must serve our faith, but added to faith

must be the reality of works. "It will only court disaster if we adopt the soothing but ill-visionary course of minimizing the importance of each separate imposition of any selfish nation."

"As the 1930s must have taught us, every aggressive step though seemingly unimportant in itself can by cumulative combination with other steps throw us into war—and at the same time weaken our will and our ability to fight that war."

Military preparedness is not cheap in money nor in men, Royall continued, but "dollars spent in defense will be the best investment that America has ever made."

President Leads Nation In Tribute

Pays Homage To War Dead In Downpour At Arlington National Cemetery; Military And Civilian Leaders Take Part

President Truman, bareheaded in a downpour, led the nation today in paying homage to the men and women who gave their lives for the United States in times of war.

Greeted by a 21-gun salute as he arrived at Arlington National Cemetery, Mr. Truman doffed his homburg and stood silently in the rain while a military band played the "Star Spangled Banner." He then placed a huge wreath of yellow chrysanthemums at the base of the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Mr. Truman and his party returned to the White House before conclusion of the ceremonies at which the speakers included Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan, James F. O'Neill, national commander of the American Legion, and Mrs. Lee W. Hutton, of Excelsior, Minn., national president of the Legion auxiliary.

Military and civilian leaders, speaking at ceremonies throughout the country marking the anniversary of the end of World War I, stressed

the theme of preparedness as a means of insuring peace.

Secretary of the Army Kenneth C. Royall went to Philadelphia to speak in Independence Hall, and Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, commander of the occupation Army in Japan, was featured speaker in ceremonies at Cincinnati.

Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz said in an Armistice Day statement that a "strong, well equipped army, navy and air force" is necessary to assure Americans "that the peace gained for us by the heroic sacrifice of the men and women of both world wars is preserved in the ideals

"WILL TO WIN NOT ENOUGH"

Gordon Gray Lists Six-Point Program For Defense

Fayetteville, N.C., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Assistant Secretary of the Army Gordon Gray said in an address here today that "the will to victory is no longer enough to protect our nation in the event of war."

Gray, who operates two newspapers and a radio station at Winston-Salem, said that "the physical and moral preparedness embodied in a six-point program for national security" is imperative if this country is to survive sudden attack.

The assistant secretary of the Army, who entered the second World War as a private in the Army, spoke at dedication services of an American Legion home and civic center. An Armistice Day parade was cancelled because of rain.

Secretary Gray listed the six-point program as:

1. A strong, healthy, educated population.
2. A coordinated intelligence service.
3. Scientific research and development.
4. Industrial mobilization and stock piling.
5. Balanced armed forces to provide a mobile striking power with a coordinated Army, Air Force and Navy capable of undertaking an immediate campaign for strategic bases anywhere in the world, and
6. Universal training to make possible a strong National Guard and reserve components to provide for

State Vehicle Inspector Checks Applicants Here

Arthur T. Moore of Raleigh, director of the Mechanical Inspection Division of the Department of Motor Vehicles, North Carolina State Highway Department, was here Monday giving examinations to a group of 50 or more applicants for jobs in the department in the Northeastern area.

Classes were held at the city hall. Examiners, in addition to Moore, were David G. Monroe and Terry Sanford of the Institute of Government, Chapel Hill, and George I. Dail, who will be zone supervisor of the Northeastern part of the State, with headquarters in Greenville.

Moore is in Fayetteville today; on Wednesday he will be in Greensboro; and on Thursday he will complete his tour in Asheville.

An act of the North Carolina General Assembly requires that all motor vehicles and trailers be examined and inspected once during 1948, and twice a year thereafter. Inspections are to be thorough. Vehicles which do not meet requirements of safety on the highways will be grounded. Owners will be given reasonable time in which to comply with the law. The statute provides a penalty for motorists

who violate the law.

More said 36 crews of mechanical inspectors will be appointed. "Safety inspectors" for testing will be placed in various parts of the state, with from five to seven inspectors in each unit. The Mechanical Inspection

Secretary Of State Says German People Must Be Self-Sufficient And Contribute To Rest Of Europe's Welfare; \$60 Millions For China Before July 1 Wanted

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall testified today it is vital that Germany's economy be restored to the point where its people can become self-supporting and contribute to Europe's economy.

The secretary of state told the Senate foreign relations committee he has no doubt that propaganda attempts will be made to convince the people of Europe that any such rebuilding of Germany threatens France and Italy.

But he expressed confidence that the United States, in administering a proposed long range recovery program will be able to overcome this "perversion of facts."

Marshall brought up the question of German economy after he had told the senators that \$60,000,000 in aid will be needed for China before next July 1, in addition to \$2,597,000,000 for European countries and occupation costs. This makes a total of \$2,657,000,000 for all foreign aid programs through the first half of 1948, the secretary said.

"It is vital that the economy of Germany be restored, keeping in mind protection against its rebuilding its war potential," Marshall said. "Germany must be made self-supporting and able to contribute to the economy of Europe."

Apparently alluding to the present failure of the major allies to agree on a future course in Germany, Marshall said that "the present situation doesn't require much description."

Marshall said the State Department has been working since last August on a concrete proposal for Congress in connection with aid to China, and "we think we have found an acceptable program." But he added:

"I think it is imperative to handle western Europe first."

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) and other Republican leaders have urged the inclusion of aid to China in any emergency foreign relief program. Asked whether any additional appropriations will be requested for Greece and Turkey, Marshall replied it is his understanding that

Spending For Peace

What's Behind Planned Expenditures For European Recovery; Twenty Billion Dollars For Peace Compared With \$330 Billions We Spent For War; World Recovery Plan

Secretary of State Marshall's plan for the economic rehabilitation of Western Europe calls for an estimated expenditure of from \$16,000,000,000 to \$20,000,000,000—but one finds it difficult on this Armistice Day to figure the problem out in terms of money.

The general's program, as you know, is the blue-print for a large-scale, "cold war" offensive, calculated to prevent the development of another "hot war"—that is to say, another world conflict. The strategy of this huge expenditure is to give the countries of Western Europe the economic strength to withstand the Soviet drive to establish communism throughout the continent. The Marshall project is premised on this assumption:

If Communist expansion is held along its present line (behind which lies a Soviet dominated Eastern Europe) then the chances of averting another global upheaval will be good. If the Red line overruns Western Europe, our hope of avoiding a third world war will be slim indeed.

But what about that twenty billion dollars we may have to spend to implement the Marshall Plan? For my part I can't even visualize what such an amount would look like in a pile of gold or in greenbacks. I don't know whether I could

vault over it or whether I should have to walk around it.

However, I've tramped across many battlefields strewn with dead. I know what they look like, all right. I was on the fighting front in France on that first Armistice Day, and the anniversary never rolls around without one seeing visions of an endless line of marchers who gave their lives in two world wars.

America's casualties in the two conflicts were about a million and a quarter. The losses in another global war would be colossal, and would come not only from the fighting forces but from the civilian populations. You couldn't balance those figures with mere money, no matter how big a pile of gold the dollars made.

The late war cost America some \$330,000,000,000 for military operations, and nobody knows how much more indirectly. If you will take pencil and paper and figure out how long it would take to spend twenty billions—or maybe less—at the world war rate, you will find that the time would be mighty short.

So it would seem to be far cheaper to wage a "cold war" offensive now than to fight a "hot war" a few years later. As General Marshall put it in urging Congress to help

Women IN THE CHURCH by Mary Fowler

The Protestant women of Cincinnati and vicinity, working under the auspices of the Council of Church Women of Greater Cincinnati, have a notable record of thirty years of service to mothers, working women, and children of that industrial center. In 1917 they began their activities by opening the House of Friendliness for immigrant women; in 1918 they opened the Parkway Day Care Center to care for the children of working mothers; and in 1922 they added the Oakcrest Christian Home for Girls—homeless girls or those from undesirable homes (but not delinquent girls). Today, under the leadership of Mrs. Walter Berry, council president, the organization is planning to enlarge its services through a community center housing the Day Care Center and the House of Friendliness.

The religious schools maintained by churches for the training of children cannot do the task that is theirs unless there is cooperation and understanding on the part of the parents in the children's homes. Miss Dorothy Fritz, who directs the children's work for the Presbytery of New York City, believes, Miss Fritz is directing a new program of religious education that will not be "all sweetness and light," but "something they can bite into." The teaching materials for the new courses are graded from nursery through high school years, and involve study and teaching by the parents as well as by the church school instructors. "A lot of adults could have their religion deepened by reading the book prepared for juniors," adds Miss Fritz.

"Christian Japanese women feel responsibility for the new Japan even more keenly than do their Christian brothers," says the Rev. Mrs. Tamaki Uemura, noted Japanese minister, in writing to friends in America. "The women of Japan do not want another war. They are eager to be allied with their sisters in the other countries for peace and construction of a new world. They seek international fellowship and they wish to educate their children to love all races and appreciate

all nationalities. They want to study the workings of the United Nations, and if they are allowed, they would like to serve it." Mrs. Uemura adds that there are 39 women in the new House of Representatives and that at least two of them are Protestant Christians.

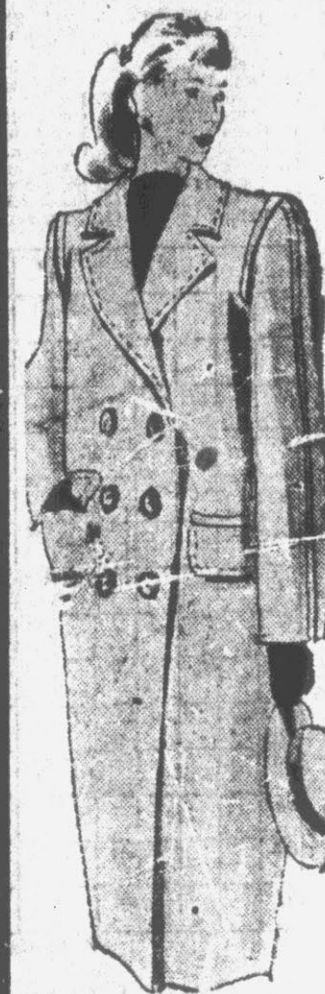

The Stupendous Fact of Authority
The policeman blows his whistle
and raises his hand, turns his back
to the moving stream of traffic, and
begins directing traffic that has
been held up on the cross street.

Have you ever thought about that
policeman's hand? You and I cannot
stop traffic, and for the simple
reason that we have no authority
to do so. But behind the traffic
officer's hand is the authority of
the law—the authority of the local
community, of the state, of the Federal
Government. If the defiance of law
in any local community became so
complete that no local or state power
could deal with it, then the
army or the navy might be called
in. All this is embodied in the au-
thority which the traffic policeman
has as he raises his hand.

like 2,000 showed up.

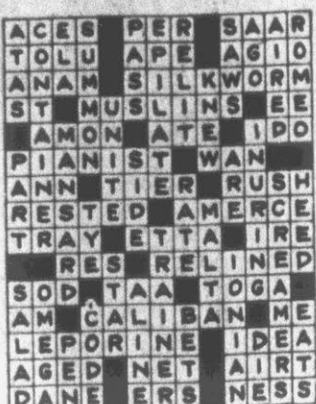
As some one in the long line wait-

Mrs. Mollie Kemel, wife of the
first president of the republic, who
arrived at 7:30. The guests, until

except the Russians.

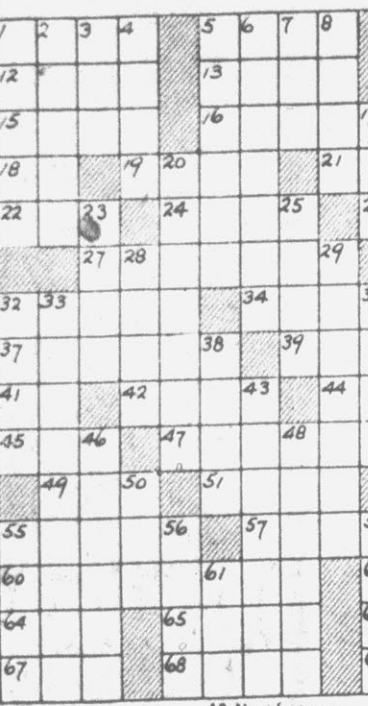

It's supposed to leave ownership of such key industries as mines and railroads to individuals or corporations.

Britain has a democracy like ours. The elections there are free and the people can choose their officials and lawmakers.

And in Britain capitalism still works. For example: People can open their own businesses and do all kinds of buying and selling.

But Britain has a Socialist Government. And one of the main points in socialism there is government ownership of key industries like mines and railroads.

Already in this country there's been talk, especially among some politicians, that we shouldn't give any Marshall Plan help to socialist

nations in Europe. Their thinking seems to be: We practice capitalism so why help out a nation which is either socialist or may turn socialist?

This idea is opposed by the special committee of 19 citizens, headed by Secretary of Commerce Harrison, which President Truman set up to report on how we can make the Marshall Plan work.

This committee, in its report made public Saturday night, said we should not withhold aid from a socialist country so long as it is democratic.

If we told the British they'd get no help from us so long as they retained a Socialist Government, we'd be telling them what kind of government they ought to have and must have to get help.

The Harriman committee looks upon that as interference with the "internal affairs of friendly nations."

But this question of giving aid to a socialist country also probably will be a sore spot when the arguments start in Congress.

Division expects to be operating in five cities early in January and from time to time other inspection units will be started in various

places.

"North Carolina is ahead of other states in highway safety. This project we are working on is going to result in a substantial reduction in highway casualties and property damage," Moore said. "Railroad transportation equipment is inspected minutely and regularly. The new state law will require the same of motor vehicles registered in North Carolina. New Jersey tried out this plan before the war and the death rate on highways was considerably reduced. That state eased up on mechanical inspection of motor vehicles after the war started and there was a precipitate upward increase in fatalities," said Moore. "We are depending confidently on the newspapers of the state to help us inform motor vehicle owners and operators what we are trying to do—avoid accidents, save lives and avoid property damage."

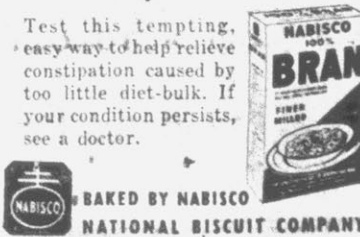

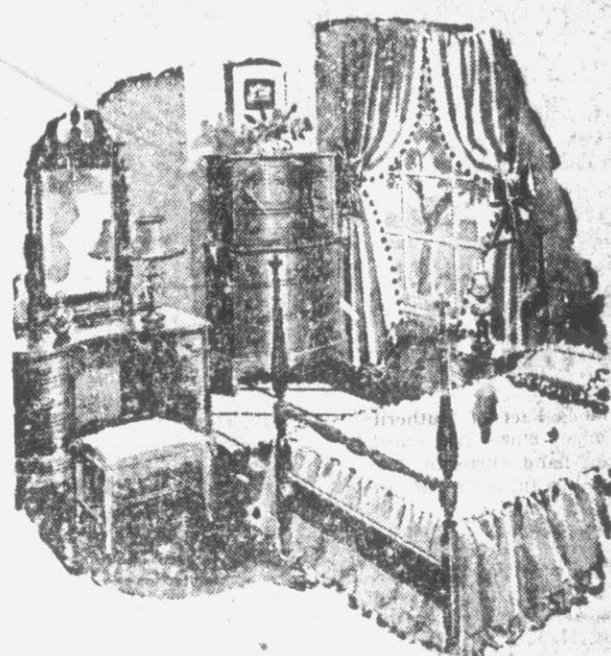

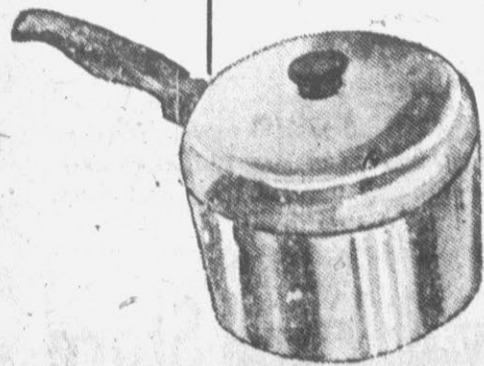

Safety Expert Guest Speaker Auto Dealers

Arthur T. Moore of Raleigh, di-
rector of the mechanical inspec-
tion division of the department of
motor vehicles, North Carolina State
Highway Department, who was in
Greenville yesterday making plans
for establishing "safety lane" sta-
tions for inspection of registered
motor vehicles in North Carolina,
made an interesting talk to the
Greenville Automotive Dealers As-
sociation at a supper meeting at the
Airport Inn last night. President
Lee Folger presided.

Moore, for many years a State
Highway patrolman and for a long
time lieutenant in charge of the
Fayetteville division, knows the
highways and motor transportation.
He explained that the purpose of
periodic inspection of motor vehicles
is to discover any maladjustment in
a vehicle which might become a

an accident, and by removing that
link to prevent the accident. He
pointed out that all motor vehicles

be inspected once in 1948 and twice
a year thereafter. The same inspec-

vehicles are found to be unsafe if
their upkeep is left to the individual
owner, and that about 17 per cent
of all traffic accidents are traceable
to faulty equipment.

Cleveland Buys Former CPL Standout Hurler

Cincinnati, Nov. 11.—(AP)—It's a long shot, but the Cleveland Indians might have picked up the best bargain at the major league player draft here yesterday when Bill Veck, president of Ohio's entry in the American League, put the finger on William Kennedy, a south-paw pitcher owned by Louisville of the American Association.

Kennedy, 29 years old, has an eye-opening record in organized baseball. Last season with Scranton, Pa., one of the Class A Eastern League, he pitched a farm club of the Boston Red Sox. Kennedy won 15 games, lost only two. He was voted the Eastern League's most valuable pitcher.

In 1946 he won 23 and lost only three for Rocky Mount, N.C., of the Coastal Plain League—fanning 456 batters in 280 innings, shattering all strikeout records for organized ball.

It's a long jump from Class A to the big time, but should Kennedy make the grade, the Indians, in the hands of Bill Veck, would have the greatest one-two punch in baseball when it comes to retiring batters on strikes.

Kennedy cost Cleveland \$10,000—the draft price for a player owned by a Class A league.

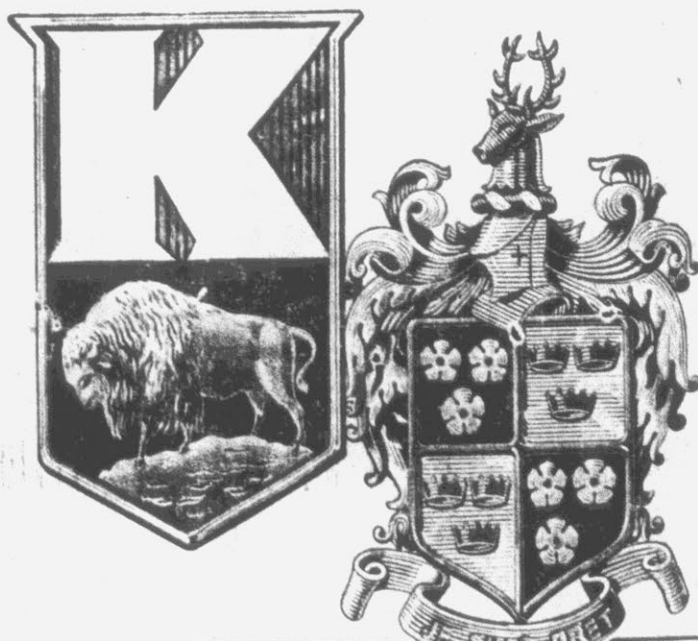

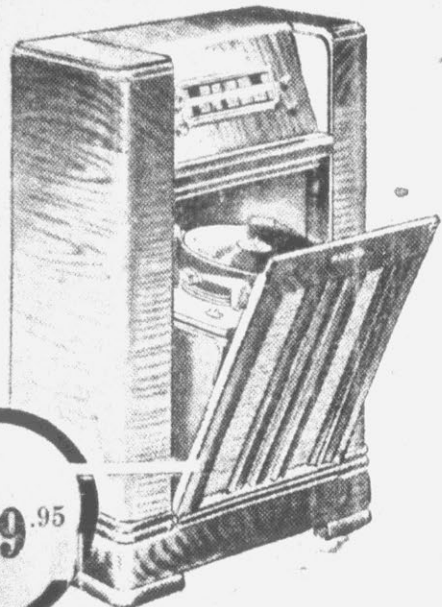

Humber Speaks Before Legionnaires And Guests

Robert Lee Humber of Greenville, philosopher, nationally known lawyer, world traveler and eloquent orator, thrilled with an inspiring address nearly 300 legionnaires and guests at the American Legion Armistice Day memorial exercises held at Respass' place, across the river, at noon today.

Theodore K. Fountain of Falkland presented Mr. Humber.

James S. Jenkins, commander of Pitt County Post No. 39, American Legion, presided over the meeting.

Incidentally, 123 veterans joined the American Legion at the meeting, increasing the local post's membership to about 300.

Mr. Humber, always convincing, always eloquent, stressed the responsibility of the Legionnaires, individually and collectively, to lead the way in establishing peace in the world. He urged them to get behind the movement to outlaw war by replacing diplomacy with international law. He explained the importance of police individuals who cause war, instead of nations. He emphasized the fact that we are facing a grave crisis during the next few years more serious than either World War I or World War II.

In concluding, the noted author of the World Federation Plan said: "If we fail to accept our obligation to civilization, we inevitably will be drawn into another war. And may I remind you that if we do fail in

this, our children will suffer."

The Legionnaires gave Mr. Humber an ovation at the conclusion of his masterly address. His message was broadcast over WGTC.

Ambassador Of Brazil Reports Stalin Ailing

Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Brazil's former ambassador to Russia says the state of Prime Minister Stalin's health is causing his doctors concern.

Mario de Pimentel Brandao, who arrived here from Moscow yesterday on his way home, told a news conference last night that the doctors had advised Stalin to take things easy because his health was not of the best.

Stalin will be 68 years old on Dec. 21.

The Brazilian diplomat, returning home because his country severed diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union Oct. 21, declared there was "some unrest" in the Ukraine, "where conditions are terrible and many people presumably are dying," but he added:

"Stalin's prestige is very great and I have no belief in any revolution. There is no spirit of revolt, only resignation."

Robert Lee Humber, distinguished Greenville lawyer and campaigner for World Federation, has been chosen for "Look Applauds" in the current issue of "Look" magazine.

The internationally popular magazine had this to say about Mr. Humber on page 19:

"This Greenville, N.C., lawyer decided something should be done for world peace even if he had to do it by himself. Only laws, he figured, can keep international order—just as laws bind communities and states. So he started a one-man campaign for a World Federation."

"He took the stump throughout the American countryside. Educate the people and their local governments was his credo—Congress would see the light after the groundswell had started. To each state legislature, he took a resolution in favor of World Federation. Recently, he chalked up the fifteenth legislature to adopt the resolution. Others are considering it, and Mr. Humber is still on the road to enlist the rest."

GAME PRESERVE HUNT

Asheville, Nov. 11.—(AP)—A 300-pound black bear and 14 deer were killed at yesterday's opening of the first big game hunt to be held in the Pisgah National Game Preserve since 1945.

Communist Army Breaks Through Defensive Ring

Peiping, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Communist troops were reported to have penetrated the first of three defense lines around Shihkiachang today and military observers said the next 48 hours would decide the issue in China's most savage battle of the civil war. Reports said about 100,000 Red troops were engaged.

The Reds, despite counterattacks from the air, broke through Government defenses northeast of the strategic rail junction, 172 miles southwest of Peiping.

Capture of Shihkiachang would give the Communists a corridor between northern Shantung Province and northern Shensi and, even if they failed to hold the city, would provide them with machinery, cotton and other rich loot.

Romanian Party Chief Sentenced To Life Term

Bucharest, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Juliu Maniu, Romanian National Peasant Party leader, was convicted of high treason today and sentenced by a military tribunal to life imprisonment at hard labor.

Maniu, tried with 18 others, also was sentenced to 10 years in prison on charges of instigation to armed rebellion, seeking to flee the country, espionage, plotting and entering into relations with foreign powers to overthrow the government, and seeking to establish a government in exile abroad. He is 75 years old.

Jon Mihalache, vice president of the National Peasant Party and Maniu's chief aide, also was sentenced to hard labor for life for high treason. Both were condemned to civil degradation and their property was ordered confiscated.

London, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The four-power foreign ministers' deputies ended their fourth meeting here today, still unagreed on membership of committees and subcommittees to draft a German peace treaty.

After more than two hours of discussion, the deputies emerged agreed on one proposal—to begin consideration tomorrow of the agenda for the November 25 meeting of the council of four foreign ministers.

Most of today's session was concerned with the membership of the permanent committees and the subcommittees to draft the German treaty.

WARNINGS UP

Miami, Fla., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Small craft warnings were ordered up along the entire Florida peninsula at 6 a. m. today as southeast to south winds of 25 miles an hour were felt over the state.

Load Friendship Train With Food

Green River, Wyo., Nov. 11.—(AP)—The Friendship Train, carrying food for Europe's hungry people, headed today for Cheyenne, Wyo., where it will pick up five additional cars.

Six cars of foodstuffs were added here last night as Gov. Herbert B. Mwa of Utah turned over command of the train to Tracy McCracken, president of Cheyenne Newspapers, Inc., representing Gov. Lester Hunt.

Loaded aboard the train last night at Green River were one carload of milk, 5,000 pounds of beans, and 10,000 pounds of macaroni. The other five carloads of miscellaneous foodstuffs were sent here from Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

Eight Injured By Small Tornado

Ch. Chipley, Fla., Nov. 11.—(AP)—State Highway Patrol headquarters reported at least eight persons injured in a small tornado which hit Eoro, a village about 35 miles south of here, early today.

George Watts, radio dispatcher for the patrol station here, said he had no report on seriousness of the injuries. The tornado victims were taken to hospitals in Bonifay, Chipley and Panama City.

Legislature To Handle Violence

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Governor Fielding Wright of Mississippi announced intention today of summoning a special session of the State Legislature to cope with labor violence arising from a strike against the Southern Bus Lines, Inc.

Wright said he would disclose later today the date when the session would be called. He made the announcement to a gathering of state legislators, after declaring he needed authority to stop violence. The meeting endorsed a special call.

Oppose Free Flow Of Culture In UNESCO

Mexico City, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The Polish delegation to the UNESCO general conference today attacked the U. S. position on all points, including the free-flow of ideas and mass communications on implied grounds of cultural imperialism, and urged the conference to appeal to the United Nations to "condemn most energetically all the war propaganda."

BACHELOR AT HEART

Los Angeles, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Mrs. Evelyn Baldwin Griffith, 33, testified that her husband, veteran film producer D. W. Griffith, 73, frequently told her he was "a bachelor at heart" and she should have married a younger man. She obtained a divorce yesterday, and an out of court property settlement. They were married in 1936 in Louisville, Ky.

Hold Mother In Death Of Son

Springfield, Mo., Nov. 11.—(AP)—A 26-year-old mother was held without charge today in the strangulation death of her 3-year-old son.

A coroner's jury ruled yesterday that the child died by strangulation at the hands of his mother, Mrs. Letha Lake.

Police quoted Mrs. Lake as saying she felt "an urge to kill someone" as she sat listening to the radio and, after swallowing a liniment in an unsuccessful attempt to end her own life, strangled her son.

Prosecutor Wayne Walker said he would withhold filing of charges pending the outcome of a sanity hearing.

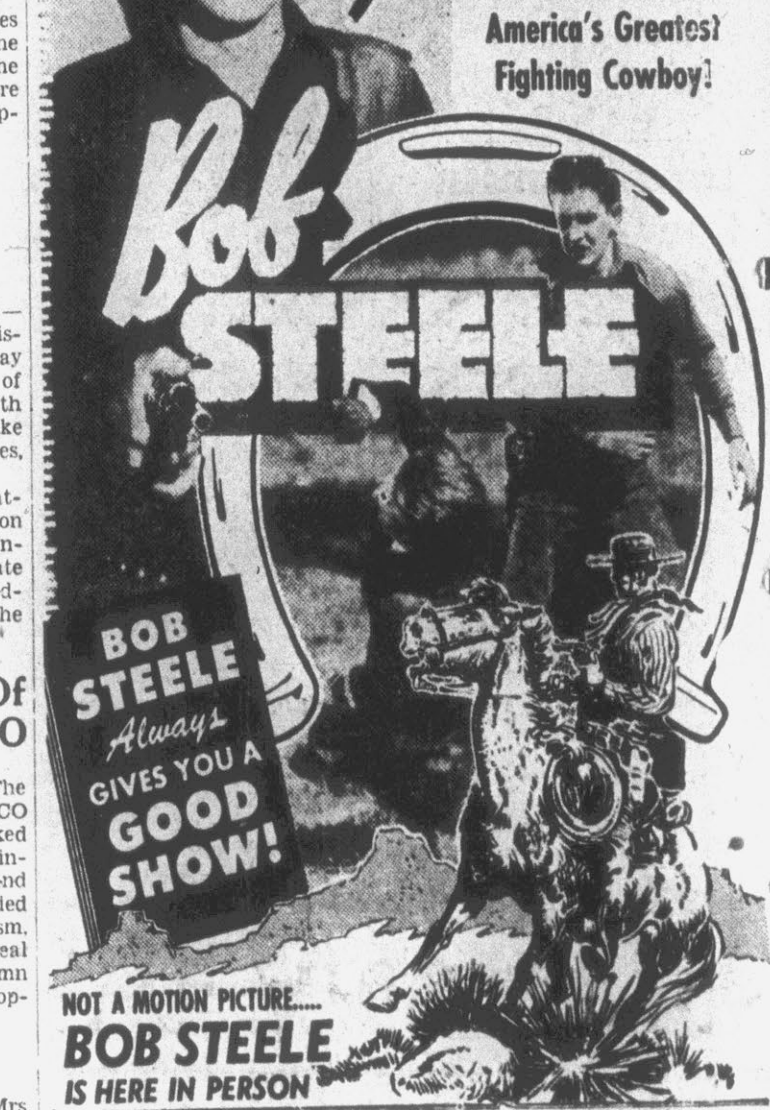

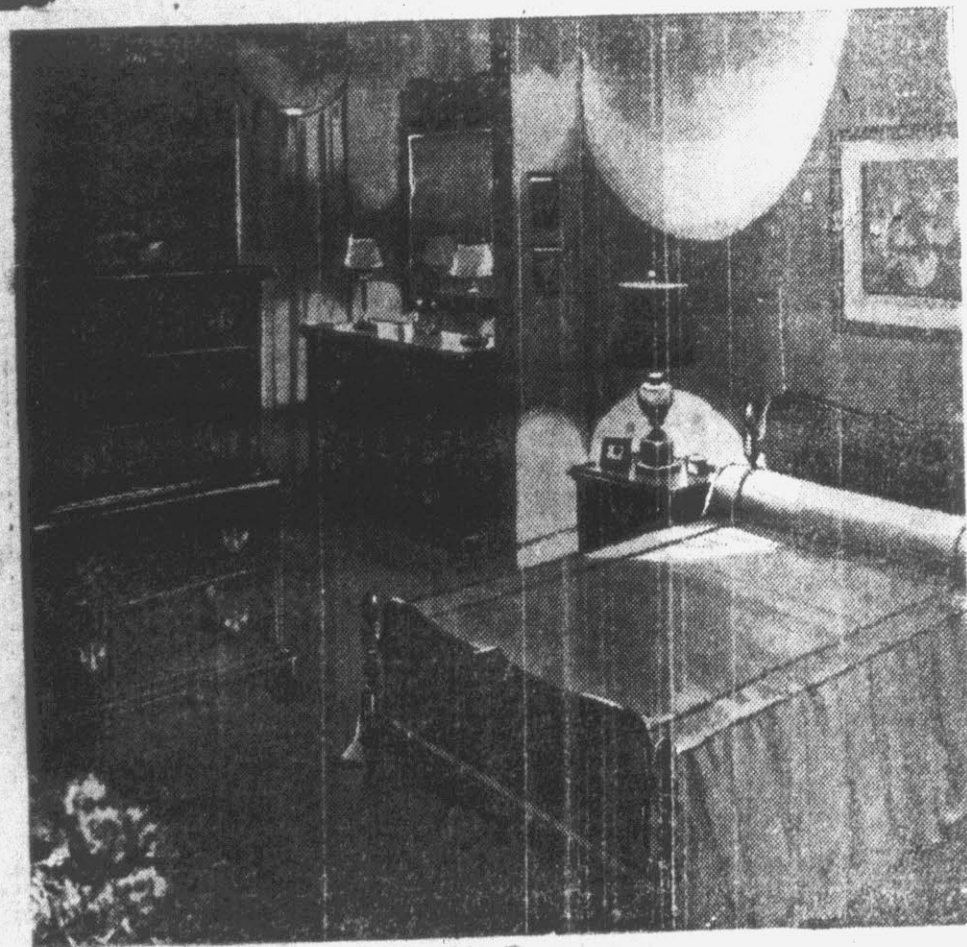

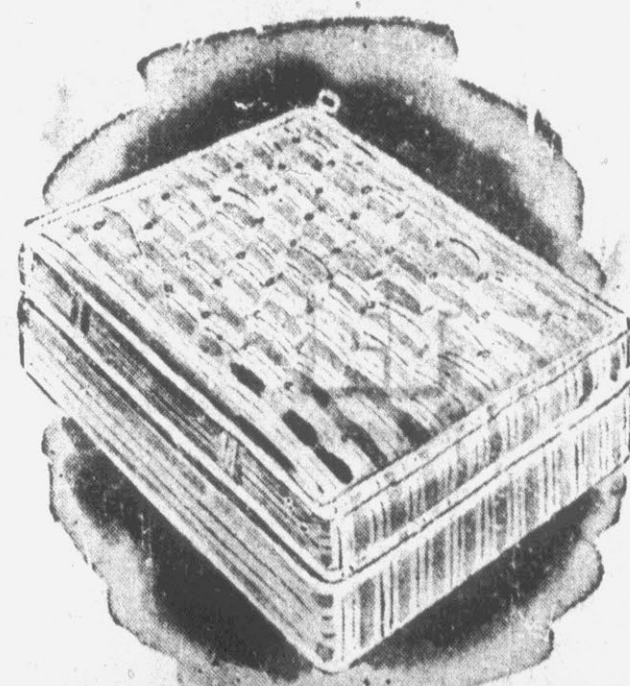
