

British UN Delegation Awaits Policy Instructions On Palestine

Lake Success, Nov. 12—(AP)—The United Nations Palestine discussions were stalled again today by the failure of Britain to deliver an expected declaration declining major responsibility for enforcing the proposed partition of the Holy Land.

The British delegation said it still awaited requested instructions from London. A four-nation partition planning group made up of the U. S., Russia, Canada and Guatemala meanwhile met privately for continued informal talks.

Informed quarters said the group was ready to consider an alternate plan to be presented in the event Britain rejected the Soviet-American plan under which Britain would be asked to maintain law and order in Palestine until next May 1.

Meanwhile, the General Assembly saw these other developments:

1. A sub-committee dealing with the question of Franco Spain agreed unanimously on a draft resolution expressing confidence that the Security Council would reconsider the Spanish question as soon as the situation warrants action.
2. India and the Union of South Africa clashed in the 57-nation Political Committee over India's charge that the United Government discriminated against Indians in South Africa.
3. India announced her withdrawal from the deadlocked race for Poland's seat on the Security Council. India's withdrawal was said by U. N. officials to assure the election of the Soviet Ukraine.

British Minister of State Hector McNeill had said earlier in an interview that his government's policy statement on Palestine probably would be ready for delivery today and that it would be "reasonable and consistent."

DeGaulle Urges France Join Anti-Communists

Asserts His Nation Must Take Lead In Alliances With U. S. And Britain; Party's Aim Is To Foster Such Treaties

Paris, Nov. 12—(AP)—Gen. Charles de Gaulle urged France today to take the lead in forming alliances with the United States, Great Britain and other countries "who feel themselves similarly menaced" by communism.

"France must take the initiative because she is the most menaced," the leader of the anti-Communist Rally of the French People (RPF) told a news conference.

"France is the most menaced externally by this enormous power—the most formidable she has ever faced—and internally because, independent of her own force, this power has assistance within France," De Gaulle declared.

The general said that one of the aims of the RPF, which showed surprising strength in France's recent municipal elections, was to foster such a system of alliances as he proposed.

He declared that treaties should be concluded immediately with both the United States and Britain, but that these treaties must be for specific purposes, arrived at as equals.

France, De Gaulle said, must not appear in the role of beggar. On the contrary she must "work in conjunction" with the United States on full equality.

America, he continued, could furnish economic aid, while France could furnish her "geographical position and moral influence in Europe."

Fate Of Chinese City Unknown As Radio Is Stilled

Peiping, Nov. 12—(AP)—Pro-Government reports said today Chinese Communist troops who broke into Shihkiachwang had been largely "annihilated," but other dispatches said loss of the strategic rail junction city 172 miles southwest of Peiping was taken for granted.

The pro-Government forces admitted the attackers had wrecked a section of the runway of a makeshift airport inside the city and set fire to Government military establishments.

There was no word for Government defenders of the city. Radio Shihkiachwang went off the air Monday night after thousands of Communist soldiers poured into the city from the northeast corner. Next morning a portable military radio sputtered word that the Nationalists were still holding out, but then it, too, fell silent.

Field Maneuvers By Turkish Army

Istanbul, Nov. 12—(AP)—President Ismet Inonu, Premier Hasan Saka and other governmental leaders were expected today to leave for Thrace to witness the first extensive field maneuvers undertaken by the Turkish Army since before the war. Naval maneuvers are being held simultaneously in the Black Sea.

Inonu arrived here yesterday from Ankara. Press commentators said that his absence from the capital, at a time when "political matters" normally would have dictated his presence there, gave added significance to the maneuvers.

Why We Help Europe

Special Committee Gives Three Reasons: Political, Economic And Humanitarian; Our Own Interests Involved In Europe's Recovery; Planned Rehabilitation

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—You have probably asked yourself or your neighbor this question: "Why should we keep on giving aid to Europe, particularly under the Marshall Plan?"

"That plan calls for shelling out help for the next four years at a cost of maybe \$20,000,000,000. Why should we take on something like that?"

An answer to that is given by the special committee which President Truman appointed to study our ability to help Europe.

"This committee of 19 citizens, headed by Secretary of Commerce Harriman, gave these three reasons:

1. Political—to stop communism.
2. Economic—to help Europe, and by doing so, to help ourselves, too.
3. Humanitarian—to help people in distress.

This is what the committee had to say on each:

Political—The countries of Eastern Europe are dominated by Russia. We don't want the countries of Western Europe to turn Communist or come under Russian control.

It's in our own interest to see that this doesn't happen.

If the countries of Western Europe can become prosperous, there's less chance they'll turn to communism.

Economic—Our economic self-interest—which means our prosperity—is tied in with the prosperity of Europe.

Trade with Europe has always been of the greatest importance to us.

Gen. Meyers Tells Of Big Bond Deal

Netted \$90,000 In Transaction; Claims Had Morgenthau's Okay; Testifies Hughes Offered Loan, Job And House

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers told senators today he and his wife netted \$90,000 from a \$4,000,000 wartime bond deal about which he said he consulted then Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau.

Morgenthau told him he "didn't see how I could go wrong," Meyers said.

The retired general's story of the transaction came atop contradictory testimony from him and Howard Hughes as to whether Meyers sought a loan from the airplane manufacturer for a bond deal.

Hughes testified Meyers tried to borrow \$200,000 to finance a \$10,000,000 bond speculation at a time when Meyers, as an air force officer, was negotiating with Hughes on warplane contracts.

Meyers called that a lie. He said Hughes, through an attorney, offered to lend him \$250,000, but he refused the loan in indignation.

When Meyers related that he actually made a bond deal, he said he talked about it with Chairman Marriner Eccles of the Federal Reserve Board as well as Morgenthau. He said he believes Eccles told him the same thing Morgenthau did.

Meyers told the committee he probably should have reported to superiors the various offers he says.

Hughes made to him—the offer of a loan, and of a job, and to give him a house near Los Angeles.

That was his reply when Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) of the Senate War Investigating Subcommittee demanded:

"Now general, I'll ask you why you did not report it (offer of a house near Los Angeles) to higher authority?"

Meyers testified yesterday that the offers were made in late 1943 and early 1944 when Hughes was negotiating for multi-million dollar airplane contracts.

Meyers at that time was deputy chief of air force procurement and had to pass on the \$400,000,000 in contracts given Hughes, wealthy plane designer and movie producer.

The Senate committee is inquiring into circumstances of the award of the contracts.

PEERS' CURBS NEAR PASSAGE

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—The Labor government's drive to clip the meager powers of the house of lords rolled steadily toward fulfillment today, despite Winston Churchill's cries of distastefulness.

The government's whacking majority in the house of commons trampled opposition to the measure last night, 345 to 194, pushing the bill through its decisive second reading and toward final enactment.

The measure would cut from two years to one the period by which the ancient upper chamber may delay legislation passed by the house of commons.

A government bill to nationalize the iron and steel industry is expected to be introduced in Parliament next year and many believe the labor party does not want to chance the possibility of a two-year delay in getting it passed.

Prime Minister Attlee, backing the lords-club measure last night, did not mention that angle, but declared:

"We believe that the powers of the house of lords are obsolete. We do not suggest reform of the house of lords when we went to the elections. What we did say was that we should take powers to prevent obstruction, and that is exactly what we have done."

Churchill said he thought that "we are approaching very near to dictatorship in Britain—a dictatorship without either its criminality or efficiency."

TAFT GAINING MORE SUPPORT

Drive To Cut Spending Abroad Heads For GOP Showdown

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Senator Taft of Ohio picked up recruits today in his drive to trim foreign spending proposals as he pointed the issue toward a showdown before the Senate Republican Policy Committee on Friday.

Taft's abrupt opposition to the \$2,657,000,000 estimate by Secretary of State Marshall as the cost of economic help to Europe and China up to next June 30 collided sharply with Administration plans for the special session of Congress opening next Monday. The White House has been hoping to rush through a \$597,000,000 appropriation for emergency aid to France, Italy and Austria.

Taft's declaration that the whole bill is too big brought a quick rebuff from Republican Senator Dworthak of Idaho, who told a reporter he thinks "the United States is spending too much in Europe."

It also prompted a Democratic senator, who asked that his name not be used, to express the hope that Taft will "fight it out" Friday before the GOP Policy Committee which the Ohioan heads.

A-Bomb Rumor-Mill 'Trick Of The Trade'

Authorities Regard Dispatch On A-Bomb Test In Russia As Fishing Technique For Obtaining U. S. Military Secrets

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Many of the strange dispatches and thunderous speeches about atom bombs coming out of Europe strike official Washington as primarily Russian-inspired fishing expeditions for military information.

Also involved, well informed authorities said privately today, is propaganda, intended for local Russian consumption as well as for the "cold war" of nerves.

Termining the fishing technique an old standby in military intelligence, these authorities said it works like this:

A rumor is planted at a point where it will be picked up by some newspaper, magazine or radio station. The idea is to get the rumor into circulation and then see whether it is denied or confirmed.

In the published denial or confirmation by any official of another power, the rumor-planter hopes to glean some information.

In the case of the a-bomb, for instance, Russia would like to know:

1. How much the United States knows about Russian progress or lack of progress toward producing an atom bomb.
2. Any hint of United States progress in improving its own bombs.
3. Whether the United States or any other power has a workable method of detecting an atomic bomb test explosion that might be made in some hidden corner of the world.

The instance of the dispatch printed yesterday by the Paris newspaper L'Intransigent was cited as an example. The dispatch—telling of a purported test explosion of a 12 1/2-pound atom bomb near the Russian city of Irkutsk—came to L'Intransigent from Prague where it was reported to have arrived from Moscow.

Fireboats Blockade Newark; Try Keep Old Battleship Out Of Harbor

Newark, N.J., Nov. 12—(AP)—The city of Newark's two-fireboat navy—armed with chemical sprays and water hoses—manned battle stations today in an attempt to blockade the onetime battleship New Mexico as the 30,000-ton giant approached the Port Newark channel enroute to a salvage dock here.

City officials, who have requested the Navy to vacate its lease on part of the port in order to permit the start of a \$70,000,000 development program, said they wanted no more ships scrapped at Newark and would block the channel entrance to halt the New Mexico and the three tugs which are towing it.

Mayor Vincent J. Murphy said, however, that his dispute today was mainly with the salvage firm, Lipsett, Inc., to whom the Navy had leased the salvage dock and sold the decommissioned New Mexico. Murphy made it clear he wanted no battle with the Navy and had nothing against the New Mexico.

"She is a fine old ship with a wonderful record," he said, "but the New Mexico is no more a part of the Navy today than our fireboats are part of the Coast Guard, which originally had them. The New Mexico has been purchased by Lipsett, Inc., from the Navy and is now merely a potential scrap heap."

Sec. Marshall Questioned On China's Relief Program

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall said today the government is working on a program to help China with the expectation that any funds will be used with "about 70 percent efficiency."

Marshall also told the House Foreign Affairs Committee it "is our feeling" that any assistance to Europe ought to be supplied immediately to keep the supply pipelines filled.

The secretary appeared before the committee for questioning on the Administration's foreign spending program as he did yesterday before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. And the questions started out today covering much the same ground they did yesterday.

Rep. Kee (D-W.Va.) wanted to know about prospective help for China, which Marshall has figured at around \$300,000,000 over fifteen months. The secretary said the situation is one of "great complexity," that the government wants to "do something helpful," and is trying to develop a program in which funds will be used perhaps with 70 percent efficiency.

No one asked him immediately why they could not be used with 100 percent efficiency.

While Marshall talked to the House group, Secretary of Commerce Harriman told the Senate Foreign Committee that \$597,000,000 in goods can be supplied to France, Italy and Austria as emergency aid without further strain on this nation's economy.

Marshall, in his testimony before the House group today, said that conditions in Europe and China are completely different with regard to immediate help.

In Europe, he said, Italy is in the most acute need because she will be "at the end of the tether" about Dec. 1. He added that France will be out of funds to buy the things she needs abroad about Dec. 31.

China, he said, is not faced with an end of imports and has resources to last for months. He said China herself must make certain adjustments to reduce inflation but did not specify what measures he had in mind.

"Outright Lie"

New York, Nov. 12—(AP)—Henry Morgenthau Jr. said today "it's an outright lie" when he was informed of Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers' testimony before the Senate War Investigating Committee in Washington that Meyers had discussed a multi-million-dollar bond transaction with the former secretary of the treasury.

Morgenthau said "the conversation never took place."

"Our whole practice there (Treasury Department)," Morgenthau said, "was to discourage speculation in government bonds and to make it impossible for people to speculate in government bonds."

News Briefs

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—President Truman will deliver to a joint session of Congress in person Monday a message calling for stop-gap European relief aid and for inflation curbs at home.

The White House said Mr. Truman will speak to members of the House and Senate in the House of Representatives chamber at 1:30 p. m. (EST).

Mr. Truman is continuing a round of conferences with representatives of industry, agriculture and labor as he and his staff work on the special message.

The President, called in M. W. Thatchers of St. Paul, Minn., president of the National Federation of Grain Cooperatives, and other representatives of this group. He also had an appointment with Earl O. Shreve, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, and Philip Murray, CIO president.

He talked earlier in the week with William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, and on Monday with Earl Bunting, president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross said the discussions have been concerned with the whole food situation and aid to Europe.

Two Girls And Youth Killed In British Attack

Jerusalem, Nov. 12—(AP)—Two Jewish girls and a youth were killed today in a gun battle with British troops surrounding a coastal plain house, suspected of being an underground Iron Zvai Leumi hideout.

Two other young Jews were wounded in the encounter, between Raanana and Hezliya.

Military sources at Tel Aviv said 10 Jews were captured in a raid on the isolated house where the army was tipped the Iron was conducting "armed exercises."

A British police sergeant was killed and three other British police officers were wounded by sub-machinegun fire while they sat in front of a cafe on the Kingsway, main street of Haifa.

Nine Carloads Of Grain, Food Awaiting Train

North Platte, Neb., Nov. 12—(AP)—At least nine carloads of grain and other foodstuffs awaited the Friendship Train as it rolled across Nebraska today.

This total does not include four carloads of Colorado contributions shipped to North Platte, to be hooked onto the train here. Loaded cars also were ready at Kearney, Grand Island, Fremont and Omaha, as Nebraska concentrated their offerings in foods and cash for hungry Europe.

The Friendship Train had collected 45 carloads of foods and been split into two sections before it entered Nebraska at Sidney last night. These included four carloads of food added at Cheyenne, Wyo., one of them a car of wheat given by former Governor Leslie A. Miller of Wyoming and two carloads of foodstuffs from Colorado.

To Seek Uniform Marriage Laws

Washington, Nov. 12—(AP)—A federal uniform marriage and divorce law should include a prohibition against marriages of first cousins, Senator Capper (R-Kan.) said today.

Capper has announced he will seek action next year on his bill now pending in the Senate Judiciary Committee to provide uniform marriage and divorce procedures.

Freud Co-Worker Died Yesterday

Los Angeles, Nov. 12—(AP)—Dr. Ernst Simmel, 65, a psychoanalyst who was one of Sigmund Freud's early co-workers, died yesterday after a brief illness.

Dr. Simmel, who was born in Breslau, was credited with founding the first psychoanalytic sanitarium in Germany and served five years as president of the German Psychoanalytic Society.

Airlines Ground Huge DC-6's Pending Inquiry

Plane Builders Urge All Users To Ground Giant Aircraft Until Cause Of Recent Fires Has Been Established

Gallup, N.M., Nov. 12—(AP)—At least four airlines grounded their huge DC-6 planes today, pending an inquiry into the cause of a fire which forced an American Airlines ship to make an emergency landing.

The Douglas Aircraft Corp., which builds the four-engined planes, also urged that all other users of them do likewise until cause of fires "have been established and eradicated."

Twenty-five passengers and crew personnel emerged unscathed yesterday after the American Airlines' DC-6 came in for a spectacular emergency landing at Gallup Airport with flames spouting from beneath its fuselage.

In quick succession America, United, Braniff and National Airlines suspended flights of their DC-6s.

One source termed the fire "a very serious" and a "near parallel to the blazing crash of a United Airlines DC-6 which killed 52 persons in Utah last month."

The American Airlines ship was enroute from San Francisco to New York with Capt. Evan W. Chatfield of Tulsa at the controls.

An informant here who declined to be quoted by name expressed the view that the flames in both instances apparently originated in the heater compartment below the pressurized cabin. He did not elaborate.

A statement from Chairman C. R. Smith of the American Airlines Board in New York said Chatfield voiced a like opinion regarding his ship.

Accounts from passengers and crew of the ship forced down here stressed the impression that all aboard displayed amazing calm, although several said they could see flames from the right side while still in the air.

Plan Consolidate Furman Colleges

Greenville, S.C., Nov. 12—(AP)—Furman University plans consolidation of its two colleges into one large campus. The plan was announced last night by Alexander G. Furman, Jr., president of the university's board of trustees, before a meeting of the South Carolina Baptist convention here.

Furman did not say whether the university planned to expand its present facilities off Augusta Street or build a new plant elsewhere.

Pattern In Romania

With Conviction Of Julius Maniu, Anti-Communist Peasant Party Leader, Communists Strengthen Hold On Romania; Maniu's Background; Tactics Used To Defeat Him

Julius Maniu, grand old man of Romanian peasantry and several times premier of his country, has gone the way of all those who oppose communism within the Soviet zone of domination.

A military tribunal has pronounced him guilty of treason, the charges including the accusation that he plotted with America and Britain to overthrow the government. He was condemned to solitary confinement for life—a punishment regarded by most as more terrible than death. Eighteen others were convicted of crimes against the state (four in absentia) and received various degrees of punishment.

It is an ironic circumstance that it was Maniu who lifted the prohibition against Communist activity in Romania when he first became premier in 1928 after his National Peasant Party had won 85 per cent of the country's vote. The same regard for individual liberty which impelled him to raise this ban also inspired him to battle against control of his country by Moscow, although he denied on the witness stand that he had done anything treasonable.

Just as Maniu had fought Hitlerian domination of Romania, so he opposed Soviet rule which was inaugurated in 1945 when Petru Groza was made premier upon demand of Moscow. The ultimatum for Groza's appointment was delivered to youth King Mihai by Andrei Vishinsky, Soviet deputy foreign minister, whose two-fistedness has been so well demonstrated in his attacks on America and Britain in the United Nations.

Maniu had been a grievous thorn in Moscow's side, and the crushing of this aged idol of the peasants would seem to give the Soviet Union a tight grip on the country. This is especially true since Russia maintains a large force of troops there.

The tactics employed by the Communists in Romania are typical of those used elsewhere in absorbing Eastern Europe into the Russian zone of domination. There is the same pattern of strong-arm methods against which the United States and Britain have protested in numerous instances—Romania being among them.

Of course it's easy to understand why Russia wants to have absolute control of Romania. It is a vital section of the Eastern European bloc which Moscow has been consolidating.

If you will glance at your map you will see that not only does Romania lie up against the Soviet front—(Continued on Page Three)

- Improvement of appellate practice.
- Improvement of the practice of administrative agencies.

Moreover, Romania possesses petroleum and is one of the important grain producing countries of the Balkans. Curiously enough corn (maize), though not grown in most parts of Europe, is one of the big crops and I've seen fields of it so large that they reminded me of the U.S.A.

Well, Russia seems to have secured her control all right. It's hard to figure out anything that will disturb it for the time being.

And we can keep more people
working here if we make things to
sell to Europe, things which Europe
can buy because it's selling some of
its own goods to us.

Humanitarian—
Millions of Europeans will be cold

"To withhold our aid would be to
violate every moral precept asso-
ciated with our free government and
free institutions." The committee
goes on:

We can't pour out our resources
indefinitely, even though we're a
rich country.
So any plan for helping Europe
should be a plan, like the Marshall
