H. B. DRUM TO SUCCEED CHIEF JAMES TANNER

Experienced Local Police Officer Will Take Office November 16

The Board of Aldermen at a special meeting last night unanimously elected H. Beauford Drum chief of police of Greenville to succeed Chief James E. Tanner, who resigned to enter commercial business. The new chief will take office November 16.

Drum has been on the police force for eight years, except when he was in the armed forces during World War II. He served with the 36th Criminal Investigation Detachment of the army for two years, and worked in cooperation with the FBI. He is well qualified for the position as chief of police because of his administrative experience with the police force and as an officer and held in high esteem by other members of the police department.

Europe's Coal Supply

Coal Is The Power That Will Play Big Part In Europe's Economic Recovery; Why British And German Mines Are Inadequate Today; Coal Program Prepared

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Coal sounds pretty dull. But it's at the heart of any plan to help Europe recover.

The two big coal producers in Europe are Britain and Germany. Coal output in both suffered from the war. And both are still producing less than they did before the war.

The United States is sending coal to Europe, something it didn't do before the war.

Other Western European countries produce a dribble of coal themselves. But all Europe is suffering from the shortage in Britain and Germany.

For that reason homes have to do with little or no coal and factories are slowed down or stopped. This will tell some of the story: Germany's big coal center is the Ruhr, in the western part of the country. Before the war it had 400,000 miners and turned out yearly 130,000,000 tons.

By the end of the war the Ruhr had only 100,000 miners, mostly slave labor, and output was way down.

Now the Ruhr has about 325,000 miners producing only about 70,000,000 tons, or 60,000,000 less than before the war.

Senators On New Trail In Hearing

Colonel Tells Investigating Body Air Force Purchasing Officers Rumored Held Stock In Companies With Which They Dealt

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Col. William B. Nuckols told investigating senators today he heard rumors in early 1943 that air force purchasing officers had heavy holdings of stock in companies with which they were dealing.

Nuckols was an air force public relations officer at the time, and he said he proposed steps for the AAF to be prepared to answer such rumors, if they gained widespread currency.

He said he suggested that arrangements be made with the Associated Press to make a survey of such holdings.

Among those to whom this letter was sent, he said, was Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers who told the Senate War Investigating Committee yesterday that he bought 100 shares of Republic aviation stock during the war for Lt. Gen. Ira Eaker.

Meyers also told the committee he made a \$4,000,000 speculative purchase of government bonds.

Police Fire On Demonstrators

Naples, Italy, Nov. 13 (AP)—Police fired on Communist demonstrators here today as Italy's wave of political turmoil spread southward. Several wounded were hospitalized.

Industrial northern Italy, prominently leftist, was quiet but tense after a week of violence and bloodshed in the assault from the left against Premier Alcide de Gasperi's Christian Democratic Government.

CALL WALKOUT IN MARSEILLE

Troops Out; Reds Order General Strike After Rioting

Marseille, Nov. 13 (AP)—Troops and mobile guards were called out to patrol the streets of Marseille today as Communist leaders issued a general strike call following a day of rioting in which one person was fatally wounded and six others hurt.

While the Communists claimed their strike call had met a wide response among factory hands, indications as the day advanced were that workers were sticking to their jobs except in trades in which their unions previously had ordered strikes.

Affected were all seamen, longshoremen and members of the metal, building and chemical workers unions. Some food packers also were reported out.

Twenty-one other persons, including the mayor, were less seriously injured in the disturbances, which grew out of a dispute over an increase in street car fares. A waterfront strike preceded the general strike call.

The developments confronted Marseille's new De Gaulist administration, which ousted the Communists in recent municipal elections, with a critical situation.

U. S. State Dept. Readies Slap At Romanian Gov't

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The State Department was reported winding up today for a new diplomatic slap at Romania.

What form it might take remained to be seen, but Secretary Marshall set the stage late yesterday by denouncing the recent trial of former Premier Iuliu Maniu as another attempt by a Communist-dominated government to "eliminate every vestige of democratic opposition."

A long series of American protests has failed to deter Romania and her pro-Soviet neighbors from other actions to which the United States made the same objection.

Courses open to the United States include another formal protest to the Bucharest government or an appeal to the United Nations for action of some kind.

Higher Prices On Eastern Belt

Raleigh, N.C., Nov. 13 (AP)—Eastern belt flue-cured tobacco markets noted higher prices in yesterday's auctions, while averages held comparatively unchanged on the old belt and irregular on the middle belt.

Gains on the eastern markets ranged from 25 cents to \$4.50 per hundred pounds, with practically all grades advancing \$2 or more, common greenleaf grades and thin non-descript led the gainers.

Polish Exile Applies For Visa To America

London, Nov. 13 (AP)—Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, Polish Peasant Party leader who fled last month from Poland, has applied for a visa to enter the United States.

Favors Stopping Relief To Future Communists

Secretary Harriman Would Withhold American Aid From Nations Which Might In Future Go Under Soviet Influence

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Averill Harriman testified today he would favor stopping at once any American aid to a nation which might in the future come under the influence of Russia.

Harriman was asked about his attitude in such a case while he was testifying to the House Foreign Affairs Committee in behalf of the Administration's proposed \$597,000,000 emergency assistance for France, Italy and Austria.

"I would then lose interest in it, in that particular country," Harriman said.

But, in contrast, he said he believes America should help itself ready to extend help to nations of Eastern Europe if they should free themselves of Russian domination.

Certain of these nations, the secretary said, would be "lied to come in and work with us," but were prevented from doing so by Russia.

"Poland, Hungary and Romania are very friendly to us and have been forced into the iron vise against their will," Harriman said.

His views were brought up under questioning by Rep. Jackson (R-Calif.). Jackson also wanted a list of commodities which this country now exports to Russia. Harriman promised to furnish it.

Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee made clear that the U.S. has a vital interest in the world's uranium resources.

He told a State Department representative, appearing before the committee which also is hearing testimony on the Administration's emergency foreign aid program:

"Some of us, before this show is over, are going to want some information about uranium."

The uranium question came up when William Phillips, an adviser in the State Department's office of international trade policies, told senators of hopes of this nation to obtain strategic material for stockpiling in return for aid extended under the long-range, self-help recovery program, often called the Marshall Plan.

Phillips was listing materials which he thought might be made available from territorial possessions of the 16 Western European nations which would participate in the plan.

End Purchases

Dublin, Nov. 13 (AP)—Prime Minister Eamon De Valera announced in the Dail today that Eire would suspend purchases of American tobacco and coal.

In a statement on recent trade agreements negotiated with Britain, De Valera said Eire would use existing stocks of tobacco, without reducing consumption for the present. He said British coal would replace coal Eire has been importing from America.

In 1945 Eire imported 11,220,000 pounds of flue-cured (cigarette) tobacco from the United States.

NAZI RELATES BURNING SHIP

French Paper Says Spy Admits Destroying Normandie

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—The French language newspaper France America says a Nazi spy, now being held in Germany on a murder charge, has admitted responsibility for the fire that turned the French luxury liner Normandie into a flame-ravaged hulk as it lay at its pier here on Feb. 9, 1942.

The newspaper, which said it obtained its material from sources both here and abroad, quoted the spy as saying he gave orders to former members of the German American Bund, working aboard the Normandie, to fire the vessel. At that time the 83,423-ton liner was being converted for troop transport duty.

The newspaper said the spy told the following story "in effect" to an allied information officer in Germany:

"The whole business was planned in New York. I was assigned to those who were going to set the fire, to give them the signal, to point out the places at which to apply (Continued on Page Six)

Big Wheat Crop Is Still Possible For Next Year

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—A bumper wheat crop is still possible next year despite a serious seeding delay in the Great Plains. Agricultural Department officials said today.

A department crop report yesterday said about 25 percent of the intended wheat acreage in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico remained unseeded November 1 because of critically dry weather.

These six states produced about 49 percent of this year's record crop of 1,406,000,000 bushels.

REPORT SAYS TAX LOAD CAN BE LIGHTENED

Six Billion Dollar Reduction Practical For 1948 Claim Businessmen

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Congressional tax experts received today a report from the Committee for Economic Development saying the U.S. tax load can be lightened \$6,000,000,000 in 1948 without jeopardizing foreign aid or payments on the national debt.

Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) turned the findings of the businessmen's study to staff consultants of the House Ways and Means Committee, but said he still must press for enactment of his own proposal to cut income taxes by \$4,000,000,000 at the regular session of Congress.

The Committee for Economic Development is headed by Paul C. Hoffman, president of the Studebaker Corp.

Its report called for a new federal budget policy and increasingly sharp cuts in individual and corporation taxes until these total \$15,000,000,000 below present levels sometime in the 1950's.

The recommendations were qualified with the phrase "unless inflationary conditions make this unwise."

The CED said the present tax system "discourages new and independent business and arrests the growth of established business," therefore, it added, it is "a threat to a free economy and a free society."

It argued that "it is important that careful plans for tax revision be made in the Congress as soon as possible."

For the 1950's, the report said, a thorough "tax reform" is needed—a drop in the individual income levy to a starting rate of 11.5 per cent, instead of 19 per cent; a standard corporation tax rate of 20 per cent, instead of 38, and elimination of all excise levies except those on gasoline, tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

Much of New England was left blanketed today in ice and snow.

Hampering tides rolled over wharves, and seawalls, smashed at least one fishing trawler, damaged moored craft, wrecked seaside dwellings and caused heavy loss to power facilities—especially on Cape Cod.

During the height of the storm, the weather station at Block Island, R.I., measured a sustained average velocity for a one-minute period of 78 miles an hour—three miles above minimum hurricane force.

The storm center passed over southeastern New England and swirled out to sea—losing violence as it went offshore but bringing in its wake snow and hazardous ice-coatings for highways.

Many Cape Cod communities below Buzzards Bay were without power today. Approximately 10 percent of the area's telephones were out.

Nobel Prize For French Author

Stockholm, Nov. 13 (AP)—The French author Andre Gide received the Nobel prize in literature today.

The Swedish Academy of Literature selected the 77-year-old author, for 45 years a leader among French writers. Swedish literary circles acclaimed the choice.

Gide's Swedish translator, Dr. Schlidt, described the Frenchman as "a Communist against Stalin and a Christian against the church."

The observers said no progress was made in ironing out disputes among the big powers which have obscured the future of Germany and Austria since the foreign ministers last met in Moscow seven months ago.

The chief development today was submission by Deputy-Delegate Robert Murphy of the United States official agenda for the Foreign Ministers' Council.

It differed little from the position taken by Britain and France—that a peace settlement with Austria should have first priority. Russia has insisted that question be laid aside until the problems of Germany have been settled.

The United States suggested that, after Austria, the foreign ministers should take up, in order, these questions:

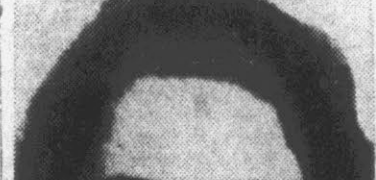
1. Economic principles relating to Germany.

2. Form and scope of the provisional organization of Germany.

3. The four power disarmament and demilitarization treaty.

London, Nov. 13 (AP)—Britain has decided against accepting, or substantially sharing in, the Soviet-American plan for partitioning Palestine, high Whitehall (government) sources said today.

Under the Soviet-American plan Britain would be asked by the U.N. Assembly to continue to be responsible for law and order in Palestine until May 1, 1948.

(A British U.N. delegation spokesman at Lake Success, N.Y., said Britain would make an official declaration on the plan to a subcommittee on Palestine meeting today.)

Disclosure of the British decision came a few hours after the British cabinet's regular weekly meeting.

The informants said this country's delegation at Lake Success has been instructed to inform the United Nations:

(1) Britain will not be a party to the use of force in the implementation of any solution in the Holy Land.

(2) Britain will not be prepared to make any substantial contribution towards implementation of a settlement not acceptable to both Arabs and Jews.

(3) Britain will not singlehandedly carry out the Soviet-American partition plan which would require this country to remain as mandatory until next May, when the process of transferring power to the Arab and Jewish states should begin.

More Trains Are Planned

Unexpected Carloads Of Food Given Friendship Train

Council Bluffs, Ia., Nov. 13 (AP)—Plans for new Friendship Trains were being made as the original, laden with a heavy harvest of Nebraska wheat, rolled into the Iowa corn belt today.

The train was 57 cars long as it crossed the Missouri River during the night on its cross-country trip picking up food for Europe. Sponsors were having difficulty keeping ahead of unannounced plans for adding to its load of food.

"We keep running into food cars we don't expect," said Tom Slater of the President's food committee. "With the unscheduled stops we've had to make, it's a good thing the railroads are being generous with their facilities. And there will be more Friendship Trains."

One of the unscheduled stops was at Sidney, Neb., yesterday where three carloads of wheat were picked up. The Lincoln, Neb., Citizens' Food Committee announced it will send another carload of wheat to a Friendship Train which will leave Wichita, Kans., about Nov. 21.

Slater said the train leaving Wichita will be carrying contributions from Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Another train will originate at Louisville, Ky., and travel north through Indianapolis, Ind., to Chicago, and still another will move up the Ohio valley from near Parkersburg, W. Va., to Pittsburgh. Definite schedules have not been set.

DeGaulle's Proposal

Call To France To Take Lead In Alliances For Defense Against Communism May Have Been Premature; Will Put Strain On Big 4 Meeting; No Break With Russia

General Charles de Gaulle's call to his native France to take the lead in making alliances with America, Britain and other countries "who feel themselves similarly menaced" by communism, is likely to be received with mixed emotions among the western democracies.

One would expect the first reaction to be one of certification that this powerful personality should be throwing his re-born political leadership into the battle to help stem the Red tide's rise against Western Europe. The other democracies certainly need the all-out support of France, and General De Gaulle won a smashing victory in the recent elections with his new party—the "Rally of the French People" (RPF)—although he has no position in the government.

However, this first reaction most certainly is bound to be followed in many circles by anxious questions. For one thing, some of General De Gaulle's opponents in France charge that he has dictatorial ambitions, and there has been some uneasiness over this in the chancelleries of allied capitals.

But there is another consideration which is of more immediate concern. De Gaulle's proposal comes almost on the eve of the Big Four Foreign Ministers' Conference in London to

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Hungarian Exile Arrives In U.S. After Flight

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—Zoltan Kossuth, 47-year-old former leader of Hungary's Independence Party, arrived here by plane from Europe yesterday after a dramatic flight from "the shadow of the noose" with which he said he had been threatened by Hungarian Communist leaders.

Pfeiffer, one-time undersecretary of the Ministry of Justice under former Premier Ferenc Nagy who also fled recently to this country, said that the people of Hungary face a choice between flight or surrender to the Communists.

"The Communists have dropped their mask in Hungary," he said after his arrival here with his wife and five-year-old daughter. "I resisted right into the shadow of the noose. What more can a man do? No politician can do anything against a loaded pistol."

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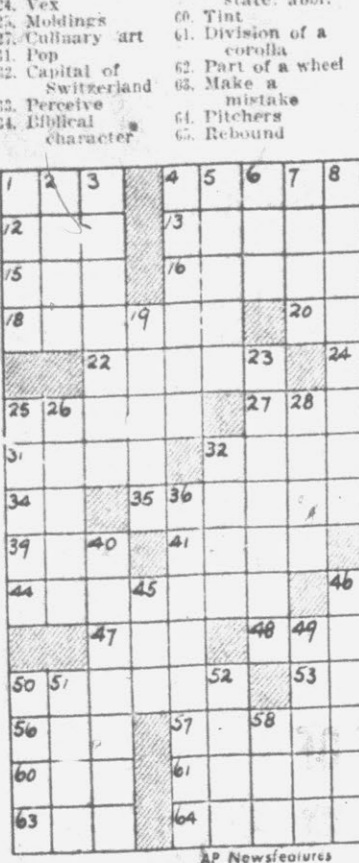
Strength FOR THE DAY

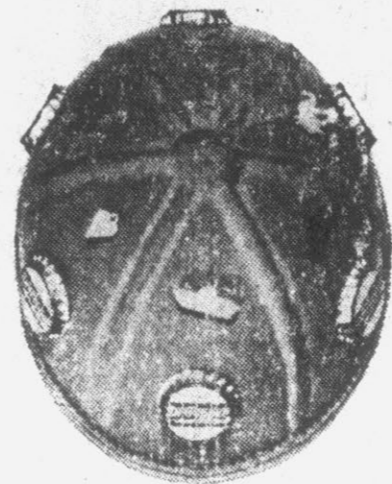

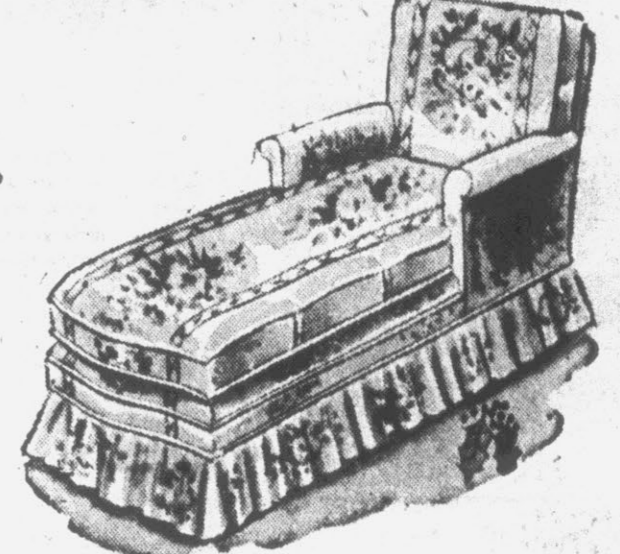

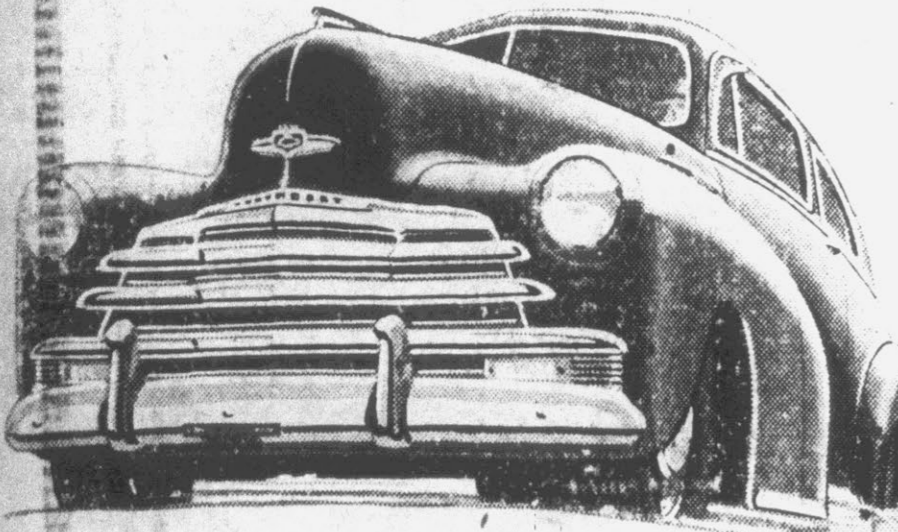
Skippers of the two tugs which cut her loose reported earlier today to the Coast Guard that they were unable to re-locate the big ship.

Besides, the output per miner has dropped. For this reason:
In Britain there's a shortage of things to buy. If the miners worked harder and made more money, there would still be too little for them to buy.
Because of the way the mines are laid out in Britain, a lot of manpower is used up in hauling coal underground. Britain is far behind us in that.
In Britain about one in five men underground is used in hauling. In this country only about one in 50 is so used.
What's the answer to getting more coal out of Britain and Germany and, therefore, more coal for the countries of Western Europe?
Sixteen Western European countries, including Britain, have worked out a program for this.
They've done this in keeping with the Marshall Plan. Secretary of State Marshall's proposal that those countries work out a way of helping themselves and asking for us added help they still need.
The 16 countries figure that they, all of them, will need about 125,000,000 tons of coal more than they're getting now. This will mean tremendous increases in the output of both Britain and Germany.
(They're also figuring that Poland—not part of the 16—which is sending them now about 11,000,000 tons a year will increase its production, too.)
Right now the United States, which produces more than twice as much as Britain and Germany combined before the war, is sending Europe about 39,000,000 tons a year. Under the Marshall Plan of stepping up European production it's expected the U.S. will be able to cut down its coal shipments to Europe to about 6,000,000 tons a year by 1951.
Coal was called the "crux" of the European problem by the Harriman committee, the committee of 19 citizens appointed by President Truman to outline the kind of help we can give Europe.

rupture.
Then, too, Britain and France surely couldn't contemplate breaking with Russia before even knowing whether the Marshall Plan will be approved by the United States Congress. If the plan does go through it will in effect be an alliance among the countries of Western Europe to combat communism. And it will be more realistic than any alliance in the military sense.
All these points would be bound to come up for consideration—or so it strikes me—if General De Gaulle should in due course be in position to formalize his proposal. One would think, however, that as previously indicated, the other Western democracies would be inclined at this juncture to take the position that the idea is premature, rather than that it is without merit.

Country Style Sausage and Lima Beans
Soak 2 1/2 cups dried lima beans in 5 cups cold water several hours.
Add 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. garlic powder (optional), few drops of hot pepper sauce, 1/4 lb. WILSON'S ECONOMY PORK JOWL BACON.

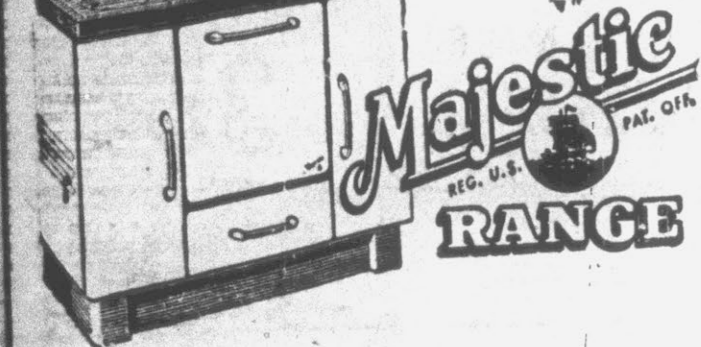

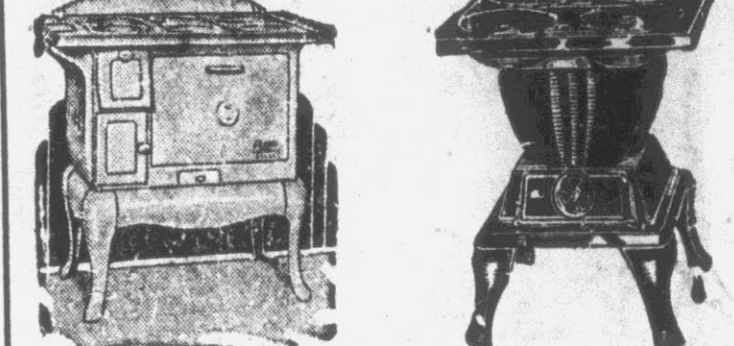
