Understanding Spiritual Things
Justin Martyr, a famous figure in
Christian Church history who lived
and worked about the middle of
the first century, has left us this
helpful and penetrating statement:
"Without God, God cannot be
known."

Can we not pick up the Bible and
read about God and understand
what the Bible teaches about Him?
No. All the world's wisdom will not
enable us to understand the simplest
teaching of the Bible unless God
enables us to understand. In fact,
we can be sure that no matter how
broad our knowledge or how deep
our understanding, we shall not be
able to understand adequately any-
thing we read in the Bible unless
God gives us the gift of under-
standing. The Bible is not like other
books. This is demonstrated in many
ways, but in none more clearly than
in the complete unwillingness of
the Bible to yield the secret of its mes-
sage to anyone who fails to meet
its spiritual requirements.

But this is neither a hard doctrine
nor a hopeless one. Any man who
desires to understand the Bible can
do so, provided he meets the re-
quirements for understanding spiri-
tual truth. Regarding secular
knowledge, we accept it when we
understand it. But in the field of
the spiritual, we never understand
a truth until we accept it. It doesn't
seem to make sense, but it does.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington, Nov. 15 (AP)—Old age, but old habits, make it hard for the
mature woman to find a job.

So says Dr. George Lawton, who
adds that the most important thing
is not whether your hair is gray, but
whether your ideas are gray.

Dr. Lawton has been concerned
with the adjustment problems of
individual men and women from 40
to 85 years of age, but Altrusa Inter-
national, women's service club, asked
him to consider the problems be-
setting all older women workers.

The result is a pamphlet, "Women
Go To Work—At Any Age" based
on data uncovered in an exhaustive
survey by Altrusa of employers, per-
sonnel officers and chamber of com-
merce representatives all over the
country.

Dr. Lawton thinks that every
woman should work and can work
as long as she lives if she will choose
her occupation to suit her interests
and her physical and mental capabil-
ities.

The U. S. Census Bureau says that
of the 36,222,000 women in the U. S.
over 35 years of age, 8,351,000 are
employed and 230,000 are seeking
employment.

The Bureau has predicted a defi-
nite increase of 1,500,000 women
workers 45 to 64 years of age in the
decade 1940 to 1950.

"The trouble is," says Dr. Law-
ton, "the older we become, the less
enthusiastic an employer is about
hiring us. In some communities,
even a person of twenty-five is re-
garded as 'getting on'."

A list of standard complaints on
the part of employers cleared in the
Altrusa survey includes the follow-
ing:

Older women workers are stuck
in a rut. They resist changes, new
ideas and new methods. They are
intolerant and lack initiative. They
either give up trying to look well, or
overdo the job.

Because they are afraid of their
job they often scheme to keep down
any fellow worker they can con-
vincingly regard as competitors. If
they're not over-emotional, then
they're under-emotional, listless,
and devoid of any real desire to
make a contribution to their jobs.

Dr. Lawton says the following
steps to sum up the thinking of
employers who favor the employ-
ment of older women:

"If the older woman has kept
her mind flexible, makes a present-
able appearance, is in good health,
is agreeable, and has definite skills,
age does not keep her from a good
position, especially in firms with
no pension plans."

neys fighting the tax, said it was
a step down from the "commu-
nism."

The Supreme Court ruled that a
tax on income, such as from land
or property, was a direct tax and
therefore unconstitutional because
Section 2, Article I of the Constitu-
tion says "direct taxes shall be
apportioned (in just proportion)
among the states."

Under that law of 1894 anyone
with income from land in any state
could be forced to pay an income
tax.

So, looking at Section 2, Article I,
the Supreme Court decided the tax
was not being "apportioned" among
the states and was unconstitutional.
Although that Supreme Court de-
cision stood in the way, the fight
to have an income tax continued.
It became clear that, if Congress
were to pass another income tax
law, the constitution would have to
be doctored up a bit.

So in 1909, in the Republican Ad-
ministration of President William
Howard Taft, both Houses of Con-
gress passed a resolution to amend
the Constitution.

It took four years—until 1913—for
the necessary 36 state legislatures
also to approve. Then the amend-
ment became part of the Constitu-
tion.

In their book "The Federal In-
come Tax," Roy G. and G. C. Blakey
said there was a lot of doubt in
Congress, when it passed the resolu-
tion in 1909, that the necessary 36
states ever would approve.

That amendment, the 16th, said:
"The Congress shall have power to
lay and collect taxes on income, from
whatever source derived, without
apportionment among the several
states, and without regard to any
census or enumeration."

That fixed up the Constitution so
that Section 2, Article I, which the
Supreme Court in 1895 said pre-
vented an income tax law, wouldn't
get in the way of another income
tax law.

And in 1913 Congress passed an
income tax law. We've had one ever
since.

The other is Neil McCarthy, former Hughes attorney, who told the senators at a previous hearing that Meyers once tried to float a loan from the millionaire aircraft maker and movie producer.

maximum freight bill of \$500 per year for tuition, laboratory, infirmary, and other fees, plus subsistence of \$85 per month for married men and \$90 per month for single men. The law also provides that a man may hold a job while attending school, except that if he earns more than \$110 per month his subsistence is reduced proportionately.

The college enrollments of 2,143,000, more than half of whom are veterans, is testimony to the good sense of G. I. Joe. Let me add that my new Utopia College in the center of the United States, at Eureka, Kansas, will take care of any G. I. of good character unable to get located elsewhere.

If You're Not a G. I. Don't Give Up
But don't give up a college education because you are not a G. I. There never was a better time to work your way through. Most employers generally prefer hiring men who have already developed successful work habits and who know the value of a dollar. If you have to watch your pennies, remember:

(a) privately controlled colleges have many full or part scholarships, from \$200 to \$600; (b) state colleges and universities have very low tuition rates, about \$125 per year, and some make no charge for tuition.

Prewar surveys of 611 colleges revealed that half of the men and one-fourth of the women earned part of their expenses, while about one-fifth of the men and one-tenth of the women earned all their expenses, totaling annual earnings of \$2,000,000. Scholarships and fellowships granted by 864 colleges to deserving students amounted to another \$11,000,000. Job and scholarship opportunities are as good as ever.

Conclusion
A college education can't guarantee to make you a millionaire. But, if you take your education seriously, it will broaden your mind, enrich your life, and increase your chances of more rewarding income. How broad, how rich, and how rewarding depends upon you.

more if and when the Marshall program becomes effective to save Western Europe.

Then another great danger to communism suddenly has arisen in France, and that is the sensational political come-back of General Charles de Gaulle on an anti-communist platform which vows to drive Bolshevism out—look, stock and barrel. This new threat comes out of the blue, and couldn't have been foreseen by the Communist high command.

So we see the Cominform forced to adopt new and drastic measures to meet these emergencies—and to do so quickly. Italy and France both are key positions in the contest for Western Europe, and if the Reds are knocked out there, their chances of expansion westward will be small, for in the West they lack the Russian armies of occupation which have enabled them to impose their will on the small eastern states.

The battle for Western Europe is getting into full swing.
