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NEW PREMIER DECIDES UPON STRONG POLICY

Schuman's New Cabinet Convenes As Strikes Spread Across France

Paris, Nov. 24—(AP)—Premier Robert Schuman was reported tonight to have decided on a policy of "very energetic" measures...

The new cabinet of MRP, Socialist, Radical Socialist and Independent Republican members met formally for the first time tonight...

Gen. Charles de Gaulle, who has an open supporter in the cabinet in the person of Economics Minister Rene Mayer...

Details of the "energetic" measures were withheld, but there was some suggestion that the government might requisition railroads and other struck industries...

Already tied up by walkouts were nine out of every 10 railroads in France. All the country's harbors and most of her coal mines were idle...

The situation was further complicated by the threat of disturbances arising from a one-franc increase in subway fares in Paris...

San Diego, Calif., Nov. 24—(AP)—The XC-99, world's largest land plane, has passed its first aerial test...

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The XC-99 is a transport version of the slightly smaller B-36 bomber. It is 183 1/2 feet long, 57 1/2 feet high, powered by six 3000-horsepower, pusher-type engines...

"Chief wartime use of the XC-99," said the company, "would be rapid transportation of soldiers and material in quantities heretofore considered impossible."

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—If you want a dim view of the world and what's happening in it, take a look at London...

The foreign ministers of the United States, Russia, Britain and France meet tomorrow to talk about peace treaties for Germany and Austria...

About the best comment you can hear on the conference before it starts is something like "well, maybe some good will come of it."

But nobody's betting on even that much. The war has been over two years and this is the second time in 1947 that the four foreign ministers have met to talk about Germany and Austria...

The four ministers—Marshall for the U. S., Bevin for Britain, Bidault for France and Molotov for Russia—met in Moscow in March...

They got nowhere. So now they're trying again. No one was very hopeful for that Moscow meeting. There seems to be less hope for this one...

Since the war ended a big gap has opened between Russia from the United States, Britain and France. But since the Moscow meeting the gap has been made even wider and this is why: The U. S. has started work on the Marshall Plan to help Western European nations get on their feet and to keep them out of the grip of communism...

Gov't Seeks To Indict Ex-General



Major General Bennett E. Meyers who testified before the Senate War Investigating Committee at Washington will appear before Federal Grand Jurors soon in a review of testimony in which Meyers was accused of profiting through war contracts while deputy chief of Air Force purchasing...

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—The government outlined a 1948 farm production pattern today suggesting near-record acreages of crops but a decline in production of meat and poultry...

Major emphasis was placed on grains in guiding goals announced by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson...

A shortage of grains for livestock feed will make it necessary, the cabinet official said, to cut down on the production of all livestock products except milk, which would be maintained at this year's level...

If the goals are met, farmers will put 3,000,000 acres more to cultivated crops and hay than this year and about 7,500,000 more than the 1942-45 wartime average. This year's planting totaled 347,000,000 acres...

Anderson said high domestic and foreign demands make it necessary for farmers to postpone for at least another year a return to good soil practices needed to give overworked land a rest from its heavy burdens of the past seven years...

"Today, more than ever, United States produce is the paragon in world recovery," he said. "But if this nation is to provide a food share of the food needed so desperately by hungry nations abroad, it will mean an inevitably heavy drain on our already strained soil resources..."

The goals recommend reductions in acreage of some crops because of reduced demand. These included tobacco, which has lost valuable foreign markets; peanuts, which was expanded during the war as a source of vegetable oil and dry peas...

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—The quadruple trouble built up for Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers today as a possible new Senate inquiry threatened uneasy moods for "many others" whose idle cash went "joy riding" on wartime government bonds...

The quoted words are those of Senator Tobey (R-NH). He hinted that his Senate Banking Committee may take up where the war investigating committee left off after disclosures which brought denunciations of the retired Air Force general ranging from "rotten apple" to "snake"...

First, however, federal grand juries here and elsewhere were due to hear a review of testimony in which Meyers was accused of holding aircraft stocks and pocketing profits from his own secretly owned subcontracting firm while deputy chief of air force purchasing...

Specifically, Attorney General Clark said the government's objective will be to indict Meyers on charges of war frauds, perjury and income tax evasion...

Still a fourth question also remains to be answered, whether the two-star officer will be ordered back into uniform to face a court martial. Meyers' war-time boss, General of the Army H. H. Arnold, revived speculation over a possible military trial just before the war investigating committee's hearings came to an abrupt close Saturday...

The last of a parade of witnesses who accused the disgraced Meyers of falsehoods, Arnold declared: "The penalty for a false official statement is severe—the first basic ground for a court martial..."

He was referring to Meyers' answer to an official 1943 questionnaire inquiring whether top purchasing officers held any aviation stocks. Meyers replied at the time he held none. But a committee investigator testified that the general's account showed he had some \$35,000 worth...

Helena, Mont., Nov. 24—(AP)—A 68-second earthquake rumbled across Montana yesterday, cracking plaster in two cities, and startling residents of a dozen more...

The quake brought down a main street cafe ceiling in Hamilton, cracked plaster in several Butte homes, and shook buildings in Helena, Harlowton, Malta, Havre, Glasgow, Kalispell and Bozeman. The shock also tripped the alarm on the seismograph at Carroll College in Helena for the capital city's 2.87th quake since 1935...

FARM ACREAGE EXPANDED FOR CROP PROGRAM

Gov't Outlines Near Record 1948 Farm Goals In View Of World Needs

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The 82nd is the Army's only home-based airborne division. Latest Washington information suggests that the Russian airborne force now exceeds 100,000 men. By comparison the United States will have the 16,000 men of the 82nd Airborne, plus a presumably somewhat smaller figure in the 11th Airborne Division, now on occupation duty in Japan...

The 82nd apparently is being used in part as an experimental organization while the Army works on a long-range program of making all its infantry "air transportable." The Army has announced it would like to have all infantrymen and their equipment capable of being moved in units by transports and gliders...

The average wartime American airborne division numbered 10,000, and the increase means the 82nd will be brought up to the full 16,000 strength of a standard infantry division...

Gen. Jacob L. Devers, commander of the Army Ground Forces, announced that about 17 per cent of the 82nd Airborne's total strength would be in Negro troops...

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Prices of foods have soared—rocketing as high as \$500 in the case of some motor cars—as a result of the government's "austerity" program announced last week, restricting imports ranging from automobiles and jewelry to fresh fruits...

The government hopes to save upwards of \$300,000,000 on foreign exchange and make the national economy more nearly self-contained. Meanwhile manufacturers, importers and consumers sought appointments to present their cases to government officials as effects of the new curbs were felt throughout the dominion...

In Vancouver union officials warned that restrictions on imports of fresh fruit and vegetables from the U. S. might create a "bad situation" in British Columbia mines and logging camps this winter...

In Toronto there was a run on fruits and vegetables. Along the Canadian border police reported seizure of banned goods from returning Canadian visitors to the U. S. Canadians are permitted to spend up to \$150 a year in the States, but can't bring home toys, typewriters, cigarettes, radios, electric razors or many other items included in the ban...

Baguio, P. I., Nov. 24—(AP)—Philippine President Manuel A. Roxas declared today that needy Asiatic countries would never forget it if wealthy powers left the impression that "the one world idea is limited to the Western Hemisphere"...

In an address opening the 12-day conference of the United Nations Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East, Roxas expressed belief the United States was making a grave mistake in concentrating its foreign aid program on Europe...

"It is to be regretted that the world's attention is focused only on the problems of Europe," he said. "We cannot deny the peoples of Europe also need help, and urgently so, but it is also undeniable the needs of Europe are less acute and less pressing than ours..."

"Low as Europe's standards now are, they still compare favorably with those prevailing among us. We have every right to appeal to nations able to help us..."

The 12-nation conference hopes to work out a program of self-help in feeding and clothing 1,250,000,000 Asians...

Republicans In House Divided On Form Of Emergency Aid



Chairman Eaton Reports "No Progress" In Writing Companion Measure To One In Senate; Overwhelming Approval In Upper House Predicted

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—Republicans on the House Foreign Affairs committee were reported split on the form of emergency aid to Europe today as the senate began debate on \$597,000,000 of help for France, Italy and Austria...

Chairman Eaton (R-NJ) told reporters after a meeting of the house group that "no progress" had been made toward writing a companion measure to the one before the senate...

But a committee member who asked that his name not be used said committee Republicans were divided on this question: Shall the interim aid be regarded as a tapering off of present relief measures, or shall it be a prelude to the Marshall long-range rehabilitation and reconstruction?

"There is a fundamental split in the Republican party on this, too," member said. "Despite what you hear about there not being any disagreement at all, some Republicans are trying to keep it hushed up..."

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), chairman of the foreign relations committee, opened the senate debate with a plea for speedy approval of the measure. He said the aid is needed to defeat the "lurking tyranny" of Communism...

Senator Donnell (R-Mo.) told the senate he may offer an amendment specifically limiting the relief aid to \$382,000,000 for France, \$227,000,000 for Italy and \$142,000,000 for Austria...

Vandenberg said he would not resist such an amendment but observed he believes it would be better to leave the appointment of the \$597,000,000 fund up to the appropriations committee...

Donnell objected that a provision of the bill permitting the President to delegate administration of the stop-gap program to any official "is a backdoor method of predicting overwhelming senate passage..."

At hearings today, Bridges said there is a "strong probability" the aid program will result in a serious food shortage in the United States...

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—The resignation, one month before the general's 57th birthday, will follow by a month the retirement of Gen. Omar Bradley as veterans administrator...

Lenoir, N. C., Nov. 24—(AP)—The Caldwell County grand jury this afternoon returned a true bill of indictment charging R. L. Fritz, Jr., former principal of Hudson School, with obtaining money under false pretense...

Solicitor James C. Farthing said no date had been set for the trial. Throughout the morning the grand jury had heard four witnesses, but failed to call others of the 16 witnesses subpoenaed. The list of those subpoenaed included all members of the North Carolina Board of Education...

London Conference Of Foreign Ministers Is Only Side Show Compared To Cominform's Tactics In France And Italy; Objectives And Their Significance

The anxiously awaited Big Four Foreign Ministers Conference, opening in London tomorrow, will find itself rather in the position of a side-show instead of in its much advertised role as main international attraction...

That's not to say that the London party isn't of great importance, for its task of trying to write the bitterly debated Austrian and German peace treaties is vital. But communism's resort to direct-action against the economically bledgered governments of France and Italy has changed completely the complexion of the conflict between Russia and the democracies in Western Europe...

This direct-action—undertaken under direction of the newly created Bolshevik "Cominform," with headquarters in Belgrade—has two chief objectives: to further Moscow's efforts to gain control of Western Europe, and to render impotent the Marshall Plan for economic rehabilitation of that great area. Obviously these two objectives are interlocking, since economic recovery would enable the West to defend itself against Communist aggression...

on of the chief purposes of the Marshall Plan. The situations in France and Italy continued thence. In the latter country the strikes and disorders subsided at the weekend, although Pietro Nenni, pro-Communist Socialist leader, warned that a national strike might be called to protest "violence against the workers." In France, however, the position became more acute...

The number of French strikers increased to more than three-quarters of a million, under direction of the Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor. Truck loads of guardsmen, armed with machine-guns, moved into Paris to counter any possible disorders which some Frenchmen predicted for today. Unrest pervaded the capital...

France's new premier, Robert Schuman, member of the moderate Popular Republican Party, burned midnight oil in his endeavor to form a strong cabinet which could command the support of the General Assembly during the dangerous days the government has before it in beating down the Bolshevik challenge. Schuman took over when Edouard Stautman Leon Blum had been unable to secure endorsement of his membership by the National Assembly, after Premier Ramadier resigned...

As this column pointed out earlier, Blum would seem to have continued thence. In the latter country...

HOUSE BEGINS TEN CONTEMPT CITATION VOTE

Overwhelmingly Vote Citation Against First Screen Writer A. Maltz

Washington, Nov. 24—(AP)—The House overwhelmingly voted today a contempt citation against Screen Writer Albert Maltz...

Maltz, author of the movies "Destination Tokyo" and "Cloak and Dagger," was one of ten witnesses cited by the Committee on Un-American Activities during its recent investigation of communism in Hollywood...

The House voted to turn the Maltz case over to the United States attorney for prosecution. This case was the first brought to the House floor, but the other nine were to be called up immediately, one at a time...

All ten had declined to say whether they were members of the Communist party. Maltz, who had refused to testify, was the only one to take the oath prior to the vote. Rep. Field (D-Calif.) claimed that Maltz's refusal to testify impaired the usefulness of the committee although it "would be an unpleasant experience for the chairman and the members of his committee..."

The Californian contended that during its nine years of existence the Un-American committee has received \$771,143 for operating expenses and its record on recommending legislation "is exactly zero..."

But Rep. Thomas (R-N.J.), chairman of the investigations subcommittee, had stated "only the beginning of what he terms the committee's drive to force Communists out of the motion picture industry..."

Finance Minister D. C. Abbott said market price increases on many foods in the past week could not be justified by increased costs. He announced ceilings would go back on the more important varieties of canned fruits and vegetables, and said the government was prepared to reimpose controls on fresh produce and canned fruit juices...

Cris have lined up before the Russians on one side, the Americans, British and French on the other.

If the four ministers could ever reach some general agreement on the future of Germany, they would not have much trouble settling on Austria.

Germany now is divided into four zones: American, British, Russian, French.

Each nation runs its own zone and has its own troops in its zone as an army of occupation. So there's no

German government, and no unity. For business purposes, the American and British zones work together. The Russians and French run their zones their own way.

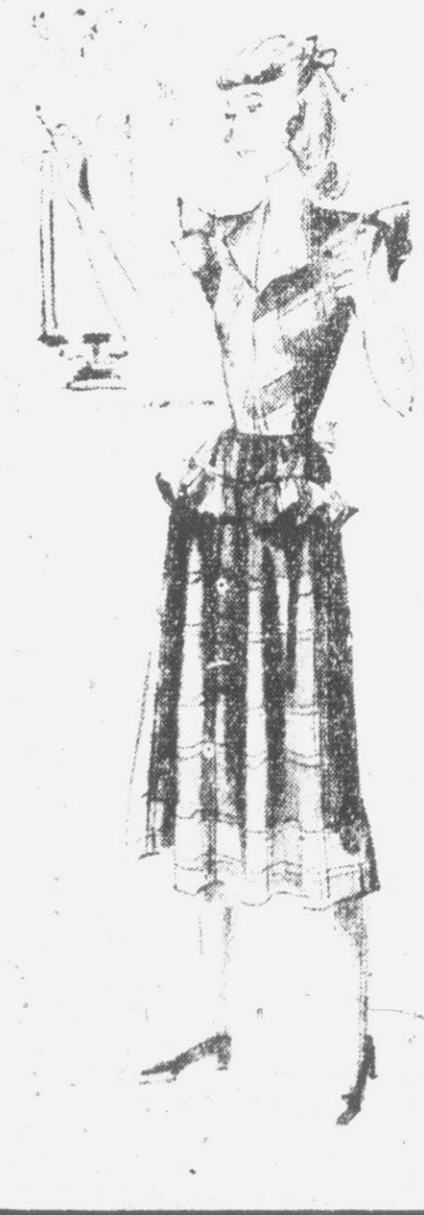

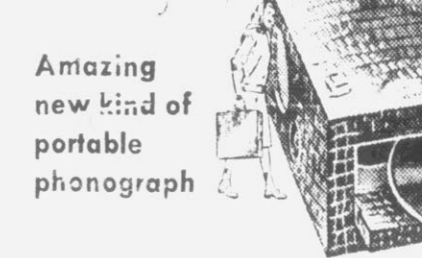
