

CONVICTS END MUTINY AFTER 15 HOUR SIEGE

Prisoners Back In Cells; Guards Held As Hostages Unharmed; No Violence

Waupun, Wis., Nov. 25—(AP)—Sixty-nine striking convicts tossed away their home made weapons and filed peacefully out of their state prison barracks today after a 15 hour siege by more than 150 heavily armed officers and guards. The four guards they held as hostages were not harmed.

Ten minutes after a surrender ultimatum was given, the last of the prisoners had left the second floor of the laundry they seized yesterday afternoon. The prison is about 70 miles north of Milwaukee.

Deputies searched the room in which the prisoners had holed up and said they found weapons such as wooden clubs, sharpened bits of metal and lengths of pipe.

The surrender came suddenly and dramatically after the all-night siege. Despite the tense situation, there was no violence.

A public address system was set up and an order was given for the first 20 men to come out. They emerged almost immediately. A second order brought out 20 more convicts and the third emptied the 60 by 120 foot laundry room.

Law enforcement officers from a dozen communities in a 70 mile radius have been called to the prison since the mutiny started yesterday.

Deputies sped from as far as Milwaukee, 70 miles south of here, to help thwart the prisoners who seized the laundry. They refused to deal with anyone but State Welfare Director A. W. Bayley.

Bayley rushed to the scene and told the prisoners he would not talk to them until they were back in their cells. He said Burke was in "complete charge."

Dewey Critical Of "One Front" Economic Aid

New York, Nov. 25—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, urging a two-ocean, foreign policy, called last night for immediate emergency aid of \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000 to China as a bulwark to that country's struggle against her Communist enemies.

Dewey criticized President Truman for not including China in the interim emergency aid program now before the special session of Congress, adding that her "ineptitude and lack of policy in Asia" had given the Soviets a clear field in the Orient.

"If China falls," Dewey told a Columbia law school alumni dinner, "we may reasonably assume that all Asia is gone, and Western Europe and the Americas will stand alone—very much alone in a hostile world."

Six U.S. Soldiers Held By Yugoslavs Released

Trieste, Nov. 25—(AP)—The U.S. Army public relations office said six American soldiers taken into custody yesterday morning by Yugoslav troops were released to American authorities today.

Names of the six men and details of the manner in which they were taken into custody, held and released will be made public in 48 hours, under the terms of a new regulation, public relations said.

In Belgrade it was reported that Premier Marshal Tito had issued an order to his troops on the Austrian and Trieste free territory borders that all military personnel who "may over the line in an 'obviously accidental' manner are to be released immediately."

U.S. Army headquarters announced earlier that the six soldiers, comprising an entire border patrol, were taken prisoner yesterday by Yugoslav troops when they "eventually got out of bounds" in Venezia Giulia about 15 miles from here.

Capture of the patrol brought to 18 the number of U.S. soldiers taken into custody by the Yugoslavs in this area since August. All have been released.

Petrillo Union Bans Kids From Being In Parade

Norristown, Pa., Nov. 25—(AP)—The Ridley township high school band has withdrawn from the Montgomery County Thanksgiving Day parade in the face of an edict by a Petrillo-controlled musicians union, Joseph B. Allen Jr., president of the Bryn Mawr (Pa.) fire company, said today.

Allen said that arrangements were made to have the high school band parade on Thanksgiving day with the Bryn Mawr firemen who were received from officials of local 383, Musicians Protective Union (APL), with headquarters in Chester, Pa., that the band must be withdrawn or union action would be taken.

Big Four Foreign Ministers Reach Preliminary Agreements

London, Nov. 25—(AP)—The four-power Council of Foreign Ministers agreed today on six items for an agenda in their talks on the German and Austrian peace settlements.

Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov of Russia unexpectedly accepted a proposal to discuss the so-called "Byrnes treaty" plan to assure German disarmament and demilitarization.

Still unsettled was the order in which the six accepted items were to be treated.

Secretary of State Marshall met with V. M. Molotov of Russia, Ernest Bevin of Britain and Georges Bidault of France in the blue and gold council room of Lancaster House.

It was the first session of the Council of Foreign Ministers since the four adjourned their unsuccessful efforts at Moscow last April to write a peace treaty for Austria and unify Germany.

The conference opened against a background of spreading strikes and unrest in France and uprisings in Italy which American diplomats characterized as a Russian-backed campaign to embarrass Bidault and discourage Western European cooperation with the Marshall recovery plan.

A British informant said Bevin and Molotov had a "very friendly" meeting last night and agreed that unanimity is of "the very highest importance" to the future of the world. Bevin also saw Marshall. Bevin was said by the informant to have adopted a line "more moderate" than that of the U.S. secretary.

Press dispatches from Berlin and reports from Moscow radio told of a Soviet propaganda barrage against American and British policies in Germany, with emphasis on Russia's demands for a direct hand in control of the Ruhr, key German industrial center in the British occupation zone.

Sen. Connally Warns Of Europe's 'Red Menace'

Speaks In Behalf Of Winter Aid Program; Joins Vandenberg On Separate Peace Issue If Russians Balk

Washington, Nov. 25—(AP)—Senator Connally (D-Tex.) told the Senate today that communists are out to "reduce western Europe to vassalage and political slavery" and urged his colleagues to vote \$587,000,000 of winter aid to combat this "totalitarian tyranny."

Taking the floor in the Senate's second day of debate on the relief measure, Connally joined Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the foreign relations committee in urging that the other allies make their own peace with Austria and Germany if Russia refuses to go along.

The Texas senator, top democrat member of the committee, said this action should be taken if the council of foreign ministers, now meeting in London, fails to reach agreement. Vandenberg suggested the same policy a month ago. Both senators have served as advisers at previous council meetings.

Defining the relief bill as an American "must," Connally said the United States cannot sit by and permit the peoples of France, Italy and Austria to be forced into communism because of hunger and cold.

Leaders called the Senate into session an hour earlier than usual in order to push ahead with the debate. They hope for a final vote by tomorrow night.

Several moves were underway, however, to make changes in the measures reported by the foreign relations committee and disposal of these may delay a final vote until after Thanksgiving.

Too Late By Five Minutes

The mother traveled by commercial plane from San Diego to Raleigh and was rushed to Fort Bragg by a Red Cross car.

The Three Countries

Here's Why France, Italy And Austria Need Money From Us; Yes They Have Their Own Currency, But Not Enough Dollars; Behind The European Crop Shortage

Washington, Nov. 25—(AP)—Why do France, Italy and Austria need \$597,000,000 (millions) in help from us?

Don't they have any money at all to buy what they need? Are they broke? The answer is simple.

They have their own money but they don't have enough dollars to buy what they need from us.

If the three countries were turning out enough goods to export to us they could sell those goods to us for dollars.

In that way, they'd lay in a supply of dollars with which they could buy from us the things they need. They've done a number of things to get hold of as many dollars as they could rake together.

France, for instance, got some Frenchmen to sell to the French government, for francs, their holdings in this country.

In this way the French government was able to convert those holdings here into dollars with which to do buying here.

But to make things worse, the higher prices rose in the United States, the less could be bought with the dollars the French scraped together.

Another thing—and this was true pretty generally in Europe—a lot of grain was lost last winter by a freeze-

and in the summer by a dry spell. So France has to import more grain than she would have had to if the crops had been better.

The State Department figures that between Dec. 31, 1947, and March 31, 1948, France will have to spend for what she needs from us about \$555,000,000.

But, says the State Department, France won't have that much in dollars to spend. She'll only have \$228,000,000 to spend. That means she'll need another \$327,000,000 in help from us.

The same story can be told for Italy and Austria. They still have some dollars to spend but not enough to buy what they need to get through the winter months.

By next March 31, here's the story for the three countries:

France—She'll need to spend \$555,000,000; she'll have only \$228,000,000 in dollars to spend; she'll need \$327,000,000 in help from us.

Italy—She'll need to spend \$386,000,000; she'll have only \$159,000,000 in dollars to spend; and she'll need \$227,000,000 in help from us.

Austria—She'll need to spend \$73,000,000; she'll have only \$31,000,000 in dollars to spend; and she'll need \$42,000,000 in help from us.

The three countries—to the value of \$597,000,000—will need food, fuel, fertilizer, seeds, medical supplies and cotton.

FRENCH RAIL WORKERS CALL FOR WALKOUT

General Strike Of Railwaymen Called For Tonight; Paralysis Growing

Paris, Nov. 25—(AP)—A general strike of French railwaymen was called tonight by the National Federation of Railroad Workers.

The council of the federation, affiliated with the Communist-led General Confederation of Labor, issued the call as the new government wrestled with France's critical labor situation.

Informants close to the French government hinted Premier Robert Schuman might order conscription of workers in key jobs as one means of fighting the wave of Communist-led strikes now threatening France's whole economy.

These informants said Schuman might make one last offer of increased wages before cracking down on the strikers, now estimated to number more than 1,000,000 men.

The mails and most railway lines were engulfed in the creeping paralysis that spread from the docks of Marseilles during riots there two weeks ago. Most French waterfronts, shipping combines, the Paris schools, flour mills, building trades and heavy industries such as chemicals, metals and machinery all were tied up by strikes.

Most of the strikers were campaigning under a slogan first raised by the Communists—25 per cent more pay to meet skyrocketing costs of living. Informants close to the government said there appeared to be general acceptance of the fact that wages no longer can be held to their present controlled levels.

PROCEED WITH MEYERS CASE

Justice Dept. Prepares To Go Before Federal Grand Jury

Washington, Nov. 25—(AP)—The Justice Department carried the case of Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers to a federal grand jury today as the wartime money dealings of the retired Air Force officer began to explode like a chain of delayed action bombs.

Shaken from top to bottom by the charges against his one-time deputy purchasing chief, the two-months-old independent Air Force stripped the 52-year-old Meyers of his \$549 monthly pension, took away the Distinguished Service Medal and Legion of Merit awarded after his retirement, and announced that he will be court-martialed.

W. Stuart Symington, secretary of the Air Force, described as "one of the most shocking scandals ever exposed in the history of our government" the testimony before a Senate War Investigating Subcommittee that Meyers took \$150,000 in profits out of a Dayton, Ohio, aircraft parts factory while others in military aviation concentrated on winning the war.

Symington told a news conference last night that as a result the Air Force is moving to set up a purchasing system "which reduces to an absolute minimum the chance of any disgraceful occurrence ever happening again."

Kept Swimming After Washed Off Ship's Deck

New York, Nov. 25—(AP)—Wac Tech. Sgt. Vivian O'Rourke, 30, arrived here last night, thankful for the feel of dry land underfoot, but apparently none the worse for her two-hour dunking in the storm-lashed Atlantic Nov. 15.

Miss O'Rourke was washed overboard from the weather deck of the Army transport Gen. C. C. Ballou as the ship plowed through 30-foot waves 1,700 miles east of New York.

After alternately swimming and treading water in the darkness for two hours, she was rescued by the combined efforts of a lifeboat crew and two ship's officers who dived overboard and guided her to the rescue craft.

"I prayed to God and all the saints—and I kept swimming," she told reporters.

Mr. Proctor said there would also be a collection of mail from all street boxes throughout the city beginning at 4 p. m.

Treasury Head Advocates Price Reins, No Tax Cuts

Washington, Nov. 25—(AP)—Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder told the House Banking Committee today price controls are needed to head off inflation, and came out against any general tax reduction in the near future.

As anti-inflation steps, he disclosed plans for a peacetime treasury bond-selling drive and called for new curbs on consumer credit including installment buying.

The banking committee is considering the proposals for price, wage, rationing and other controls which President Truman asked last week in his address to the special session of Congress.

Snyder said there should be no tax reduction at all until "we have taken care of aid to foreign countries, balanced the budget, and taken care of payments on the national debt." Once that is done, he said, taxes should be revised.

Snyder said the purpose of the bond-selling campaign would be to soak up purchasing power which otherwise might be used to buy scarce goods and thus bid up prices.

While Snyder was before it, Chairman Marriner S. Eccles of the Federal Reserve Board was talking similarly on taxes to the Senate House Economic Committee. Eccles said flatly a tax cut now would be inflationary.

Eccles suggested the reserves be "limited by law to a maximum of 25 percent on demand (checking) and 10 percent on time (savings) deposits."

He said he knew this idea would be "resisted" by bankers but "it is our best judgment that overall expansion of the money supply at this time is inflationary and dangerous."

SHIP AGROUND NEAR ALASKA

Army Transport Hit Reef; Gale Warnings Up In Area

San Francisco, Nov. 25—(AP)—The army port of embarkation released the names of 51 of the crew members of the grounded army transport Clarksdale Victory. Most of the crewmen are from west coast cities. Names from the east include that of Boatswain Ronald H. Boyd of Ronald H. Boyd, 45, Greenville, N. C.

Seattle, Nov. 25—(AP)—The Army transport Clarksdale Victory, with 13 crewmen and no passengers aboard, smashed into a reef and grounded at 10:15 p. m. (PST) last night off Graham Island in the Queen Charlotte group, approximately 140 miles southwest of Ketchikan, Alaska.

Coast Guard headquarters said the transport's master radioed that his ship was being pounded by heavy seas, but did not indicate whether it was in danger of breaking up.

Soon after the Clarksdale Victory reached its SOS, the British Columbia Weather Bureau at Vancouver, B. C., issued a gale warning for the Queen Charlotte area.

Winds up to 45 miles an hour were expected by early morning, subsiding to 20 miles an hour by mid-afternoon. Intermittent rain and light fog were forecast, with no improvement for the next 24 hours.

The Coast Guard dispatched two cutters to the scene immediately after Capt. Gerald R. Laugesen of San Francisco, the skipper, sent out a distress call.

No further contact has been made with the stricken vessel. The Coast Guard said it was attempting to reach the 7,000 gross ton transport through its Ketchikan station to learn its condition.

President Plans Florida Holiday

This announcement was made today by the White House which said Mr. Truman will fly to the naval submarine base at Key West Dec. 3 for a few days of rest before heading for Everglades on December 6 to make a speech dedicating the national park.

Situation In France

Increasingly Grave Outlook; Nation-Wide Strike Strangling Country; Officials Prepare For The Worst; New Premier Evidently Has DeGaulle's Nod Of Approval

This is no time to rock the boat, but we should recognize that the situation in strike-ridden France is increasingly grave.

I am reliably informed that the French authorities, both governmental and military, are viewing with deepest anxiety the potentialities of the nationwide strike involving a million workers belonging to Communist dominated unions. Officials recognize that, as Elder Statesman Leon Blum warned last week, international communism has declared war on French democracy.

They are preparing for the worst, with the hope that it won't even-
tuate.

French military reserves have been called back to active duty and it is said that very shortly the army will be close to active war strength. These forces are scattered throughout the country.

The new cabinet under Premier Robert Schuman has got into action with a promise of energetic measures. This assurance came as the strike movement spread across the country and threatened disaster to the already chaotic economy. Schuman's task was to win back those million strikers and at the same time try to prevent other workers from leaving their jobs.

SPECIAL TERM FOR R. L. FRITZ

Caldwell Commissioners Ask Governor For December Court

Lenoir, N.C., Nov. 25—(AP)—The Caldwell County Commissioners adopted a resolution today asking Governor Gregg Cherry to call a special term of criminal court December 15 for the trial of R. L. Fritz, former Hudson School principal who was indicted yesterday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretense.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 2 to 1, Chairman Walter T. Carpenter and Mark Goforth voting for it, and Pink L. Poovey voting against it. The request for the special one-week term was made on the grounds that the current two-week term has a crowded docket.

It said he opposed the request because it would mean extra expense for the county. Commissioner Carpenter said the special term could be cancelled if it was found that Fritz could be tried at the present term of court.

The proposed special term would be presided over by Judge Allen H. Gwyn of Reidsville.

Calls Holiday On Evictions

Albany, N.Y., Nov. 25—(AP)—Tenant evictions will be suspended in Albany for the Christmas season.

City Court Justice Jacob Herzog, remarking that "most landlords would not want to put anyone out on the street at Christmas time," declared a moratorium yesterday from Dec. 15 to Jan. 1. He said several cases before the court would have brought evictions.

Beer, Wine Revenue Is Divided Over Carolina

Raleigh, N.C., Nov. 25—(AP)—Counties, cities and towns of North Carolina which permit the sale of beer or wine will receive checks from the state this week representing their share of the state's beer and wine revenues.

Revenue Commissioner Edwin Gill announced yesterday that a total of \$1,744,784.32 had been allocated the local governmental units under legislation enacted by last General Assembly. The law doubled the tax on beer and wine and provided that half the collections should go to counties, cities and towns which permit sale of wine and beer.

Two counties, Yancey and Mitchell, and several towns which prohibit beer and wine sales did not share in the allocation. Local units which prohibit sale of either beer or wine had their allocations reduced accordingly.

Eisenhower's Name Listed In Primary Ballot

Manchester, N.H., Nov. 25—(AP)—State Rep. Joseph H. Geisel announced today plans to organize a slate of delegates for New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation primary March 9 pledged to General Eisenhower as a Republican presidential candidate.

Entrance of an Eisenhower slate would assure a three-sided fight for the eight GOP delegate seats. Avowed candidate Harold E. Stassen has announced he would enter candidates, and supporters of New York's Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, an unannounced aspirant, have indicated they would file a slate pledged to him.

Geisel, a Manchester Republican, said in a statement that sentiment is strong in New Hampshire for a "Draft Eisenhower for President" movement.

College Holidays Begin Tomorrow

Thanksgiving holidays at East Carolina Teachers College, which will begin at noon on Wednesday and extend until Monday morning, December 1, will take practically all of the 1401 students attending the college away from the campus. Only two of the women students who live in the dormitories will remain at the college. About a score of men students will be on the campus for the holidays. One of the college cafeterias will remain open for the period.

New Outburst Of Violence In Italy

Rome, Nov. 25—(AP)—A Christian Democrat and a Communist youth were slain last night in the southern province of Calabria, signaling resumption of the violence which has plagued Italy for two weeks.

The new outbursts followed the same pattern as other eruptions which have become integrated with a concerted leftist assault against the Christian Democratic government of Premier Alcide De Gasperi. Nearby Apulia province was similarly afflicted last week.

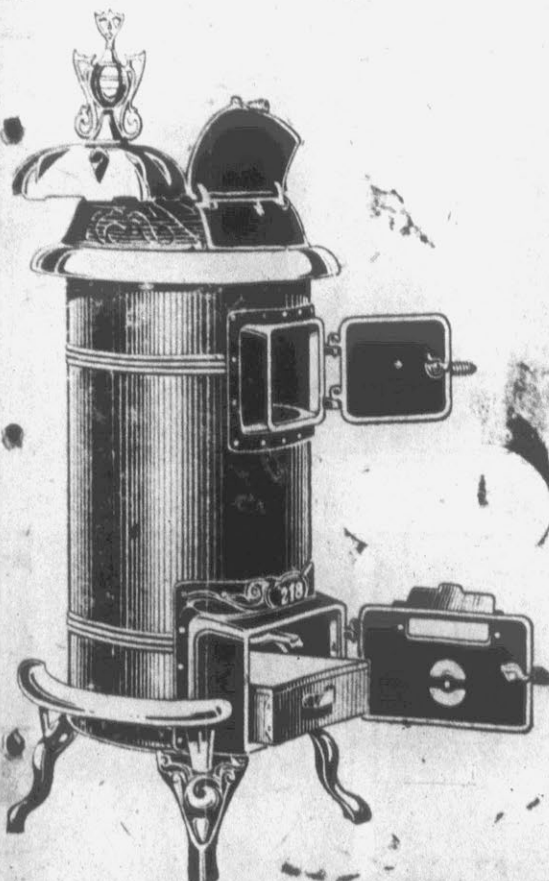

that he was dictatorial ambitions, but the way the vote swung in his direction in the recent elections would indicate that if the general public holds any such views, it still vastly prefers his leadership to communism. That is natural, because France on the whole is anti-Communist.

The great strike has the country tied in knots. Nine tenths of the railroads are out of commission. All the many harbors are idle. Most of the absolutely vital coal mines were without workers.

One of the grimmest aspects of the situation is the obviously necessary military precaution which is being taken. Several thousand mobile guardsmen are on duty in the usually smiling capital. And at Fontainebleau, south of Paris, reservists of the 1947 class have been assembled.

The whole situation is suggestive of the lull before a gathering storm.

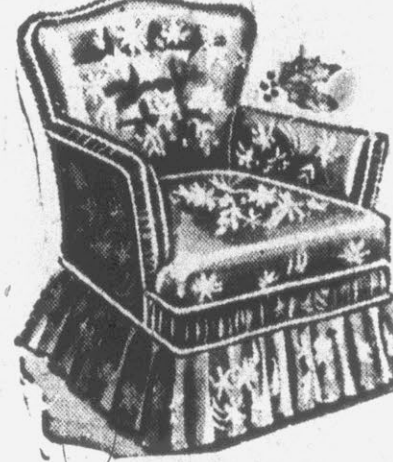
