

ARANHA SAYS PARTITION TO BARELY PASS

Assembly Vote Slated For Today; Pressure Tactics Charged To Advocates

New York, Nov. 28 (AP)—Dr. Oswaldo Aranha, of Brazil, president of the United Nations assembly, predicted today that partitioning of Palestine would be approved by a narrow margin in the assembly vote expected later in the day.

He said his information indicated that the "Soviet-American" plan to split the Holy Land into separate Jewish and Arab countries would win approval by a minimum of 31 to 15.

He said the margin might be as much as 31 to 15.

A two-thirds majority of those present and voting is required for approval.

Aranha's prediction came as supporters of the partition plan were accused of using "pressure" tactics to influence the vote.

The charges were made on the assembly floor by Pakistan, Cuba and Iraq—all opponents of the plan to split the Holy Land into separate Arab and Jewish countries.

No individual countries were mentioned in the accusations, but Cuba and Iraq referred to some "great powers."

The United States was one of the big powers vigorously supporting partition.

Pakistan, Cuba and Iraq stood firm in opposition to the plan which was expected to reach the final voting test some time this afternoon.

The fate of the partition scheme lay largely in the hands of 12 countries which previously had abstained from taking sides and one which was absent on a test vote earlier this week in the assembly's 57-nation Palestine committee at Lake Success.

There was a likelihood that the outcome of the voting could not be foretold in advance of the balloting, since seven of the doubtful countries were not on today's speakers' list.

Atomic Science Saves More Than Died From Bomb

Chicago, Nov. 28 (AP)—Atomic science already has saved more lives than were lost in the atomic bomb explosions at Hiroshima and Nagasaki, an article in *Hygeia*, health magazine of the American Medical Association said today.

Cecil Forbes Hanna of Walla Walla, Wash., said in the article that the lives have been saved by radioactive tracers used in medicine to combat various diseases and disorders.

"With approximately 100 isotopes of the various elements produced in the chain-reacting uranium piles at Oak Ridge, now available for research at low cost and in relatively large quantities," the previous rate in atomic medicine should be greatly accelerated," he said.

Now Costs More To Live, Die In Japan

Tokyo, Nov. 28 (AP)—It's going to cost more to be born here—or to die here.

The Tokyo metropolitan office has decided to boost fees at civic maternity homes and crematoriums, the newspaper *Asahi* said today, remarking that "expectant mothers may hesitate, and dying people or their families will face greater hardships."

On Export Controls

These Regulations Determine How Much Of Certain Items Can Be Sent Out Of The United States, No Regulation In The Past; War Time Powers May Be Made Law

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—In Congress now there's a lot of talk, and there'll be more, on export controls.

What are they and what's behind the talk? Here's an explanation:

Until 1940 people in this country exported to other countries whatever they wished without government controls.

Simply, the controls mean this: The government says only so much of this or that can be sent out of the United States, and it can say to what country.

But in 1940, with war in Europe and some things getting scarcer here, Congress voted the government this power to control exports.

Congress has renewed that power from time to time since then. The last time was this year because some goods still are scarce.

But the law giving the government this power runs out Feb. 29, 1948.

President Truman has asked Congress to renew the control power so it won't end then. Why?

Because some important things, like grain and steel, are not too plentiful and other nations need them badly.

Since there are not enough of the scarce goods to fill all needs, Mr. Truman wants the government to have power to say who gets what and how much.

Taft Says Europe's Chaos Is Due To Truman Policies

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told the Senate today that the Truman Administration's policies are "largely responsible" for the economic chaos in Europe.

Taking the floor to announce that he will vote for the emergency European relief measure, the Ohio senator said, however, that Americans cannot continue much longer the rate of assistance they are giving to Europe.

Taft spoke after the Senate had approved an amendment by Senator Taylor (D-Iowa) to the \$597,000,000 emergency assistance bill to ban France, Italy and Austria from using any aid received to purchase arms.

The action was taken by voice vote after Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee commented that nothing in the bill "remotely contemplates" arms purchases of any kind.

Taft, an announced presidential candidate, said he has "full sympathy" with objectives of the measure to ward off hunger in Europe and encroachments of communism. But he insisted Europe would not be in its present plight if this country had followed other policies.

Moving quickly through amendments so that a final vote can be taken Monday, the Senate also adopted:

A proposal by Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) to allow an on-the-ground check on operations of the foreign relief program by members of the Senate and House Foreign Affairs and Appropriations Committees.

Hearings Continued On Anti-Inflation Program

Administration "Hopes" Lower Prices For Meat, Steel And Lumber - Will Result From Controls; Harriman And Snyder Heard

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Harriman said today lower prices for meat, steel and lumber are "hopes" from President Truman's 10-point anti-inflation program.

The cabinet member, testifying before the Senate-House Economic Committee, mentioned these lower price goals in response to a series of questions by Senator Watkins (D-Utah) about the overall plans of the Administration.

Earlier, Harriman and Senator Taft (R-Ohio) had clashed over whether the Administration is acting in good faith in asking for allocation controls.

Taft said he thought it was not that the Administration is "talking about limited authority" but actually seeking "unlimited controls."

Harriman protested that there was quite a difference between limited authority and complete controls.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, who followed Harriman to the witness chair, opposed a suggestion that banks be required to set aside special reserves, thus reducing the amount of money they have available for lending.

Marriner Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, suggested this last week.

Snyder expressed doubt the Eccles proposal would accomplish its objective. He said the banks' lending ability could best be cut by keeping tax revenues higher than government spending and using the surplus to pay off government securities owned by banks.

When the price matter was raised, Watkins first asked if the anti-inflation program "contemplates a rollback of prices."

Harriman replied he spoke only for himself but "it would be the hope that certain prices which are unbalanced could be rolled back."

Taft suggested that controls might result in "black market" dealing in steel.

"I don't think so," Harriman said. "Most producers are anxious to keep prices in line. Steel is not something you can carry around in your pocket."

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—The United States population was 144,700,000, on Oct. 1, the Census Bureau estimated today.

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A proposal by Senator Donnell (R-Mo.) specifying that Congress shall have the deciding voice, so far as this country is concerned, in disposing of any left-over funds put in trust by foreign governments to apply for relief goods.

Possibility that a House vote on its version of the emergency aid bill might not come until the second week of December was seen in a statement to the House by Rep. Halleck (R-Ind.), the majority leader.

Halleck told the House "It now seems probable" debate on the interim aid bill will begin in the chamber by the middle or latter part of next week, but a final vote on passage "might go over to the first of the following week."

He said there will be "expedient but careful consideration."

CHINESE VOTE IS UPSETTING

Elections Board Embarrassed By Government Landslide

Nanking, Nov. 28 (AP)—Chinese voters didn't do what was expected of them in the recent National Assembly election. Instead, they voted for the men they wanted in office.

Rejecting many official candidates, voters in China's first national election raised some knotty problems for the central elections board by writing in their choices.

Chiang Kai-shek was not a candidate, but his hometown of Fenghua, Chekiang Province, gave the generalissimo every vote as its representative in the assembly. The official Kuomintang (Government Party) candidate drew a complete blank.

Nanking election officials have been juggling this problem like a hot potato for the past three days.

The Kuomintang victory was embarrassingly one-sided.

In Nanking and Shanghai, Kuomintang members—some of them not even candidates—piled up leads over hand-picked representatives of the minority Young China Party and the Democratic Socialists whose election the Kuomintang said was assured.

The Kuomintang Central Election Committee held an emergency meeting today to discuss the problem. It got nowhere.

One minority leader called the election result "a double-cross."

House Investigators To Seek More War Frauds

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—The congressional hunt for fraud in war contracting moves into the House today as the committee next week will advance a bill that more uniform purchasing officers may be called to account.

Rep. Bender (R-Ohio), chairman of an expenditures subcommittee in charge of the inquiry, told a reporter today he is not out to compete with the Senate War Investigating Committee but thinks his group will match the record of the Senate body.

It was a war investigating subcommittee which unearthed the story of Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers' extra-curricular activities as an Air Force purchasing officer.

Those disclosures, including the secret ownership of a Dayton, Ohio, subcontracting firm, already have sent the retired general his \$550 a month pension and brought the threat of prosecution in both civil and military courts.

"We are not out hunting headlines," Bender said, "but we have been working hard on this (House committee inquiry) for several months. We have jurisdiction over all purchasing, military and the rest, and we have some fraud cases on plane contracts ready to go."

Bender declined to comment on any specific case. But he said investigators have been looking into the relations of several wartime purchasing officers with manufacturers later listed as having been highly overpaid by the government.

Former Red Army Officer Says Its 'Invincibility' No More Than Legend

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—A former Estonian officer who has fought with and against the Russian Army says its "invincibility" is "one of the greatest legends of our time."

An article by Arnold Purre in the Reserve Officer, a monthly magazine, said the Soviet fighting force is "poorly armed, poorly equipped, poorly trained and has low morale."

Purra added that Soviet leaders "are making every effort to catch up with and to outdistance the democracies."

The magazine said the Estonian was "absorbed" into the Red Army when his country was occupied in 1940, but escaped in 1941 and engaged in guerrilla warfare against the Russians.

He now lives in Sweden, and the Reserve Officer described him as one of that country's best informed experts on the Soviet Army.

TAFT, DEWEY MAY CONTEST ILLINOIS VOTE

Leading GOP Hopes Likely To Enter Lists In Primary For Nomination

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio may collide head on in the April 13 Illinois primary in their contest for the 1948 Republican presidential nomination.

While neither has given any indication of his plans, friends of Taft said today he is almost certain to enter the Illinois lists if Dewey decides to try openly for the state's 56 convention delegates.

Taft is an announced candidate, but Dewey hasn't said publicly that he is running again for the nomination he won in 1944.

Politicians generally have looked on the Illinois Republican situation as unsettled because of reported opposition within party ranks there to Gov. Dwight Green as a "favorite son" candidate.

Under Illinois law, the name of any candidate may be entered in a preferential primary with or without his consent. The results are only "advisory" to the state's delegation but prestige is involved.

Dewey's friends have given notice that his name will be entered in the March 9 New Hampshire primary, where former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, an announced candidate, already has pitched his hat.

Dewey forces also are reported to be marshalling for a battle with Stassen, and probably Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in the Wisconsin primary April 6. But whether the New York governor will be projected into the Illinois contest a week later apparently depends largely on what arrangements Green can make toward getting a favorite son pledge.

Taft previously had said he didn't intend to enter any primary except in Ohio, May 4, where he is virtually conceded solid support of the state's 53 delegates.

Close associates said, however, that some Illinois situation develops to the point where Dewey is entered. Taft will plunge into the race, too.

Stowaway Faces Shipment Home After Hardships

Portland, Me., Nov. 28 (AP)—A 23-year-old French bride who lost 15 pounds hiding in an 18-inch high oil tanker locker to follow her husband from France to the United States today faced possible deportation.

Maria Louise Hicks, wife of Lavern A. Hicks, 22, of Oakes, N. D., an oiler aboard the tanker *Chocoma*, was turned over to immigration officials when the vessel docked here yesterday.

Immigration officials said the girl, who came to the U. S. with her husband, had been in the locker for 16 days.

The girl's husband brought her food and water until bad weather made her seasick and forced her out of the tiny compartment.

France Calls Troops To Meet Emergency

Additional 80,000 Called To Colors After 66 Police Commissioners Fired By Government; Strike Epidemic Continues

Paris, Nov. 28 (AP)—France called an additional 80,000 conscript troops to the colors today to help meet the emergency caused by an epidemic of strikes which slowly are strangling French economic life.

The country's decision, reached in a session of more than four hours, brought to 15 divisions the total of military forces called up within a week to deal with the threat of civil strife arising from communist-supported strikes involving 2,500,000 men.

The decision followed an announcement that 66 police commissioners, each of them in charge of a district, were fired by the government. There was no official explanation. The Communist newspaper, *L'Humanite*, called it a purge.

Premier Robert Schuman's new cabinet met under the chairmanship of a Socialist President.

Discussion Of
German Problem

Ward James of Winterville, graduate student and fellow in the English Department at East Carolina Teachers College, speaking on Saturday afternoon before the Delta chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, national honorary society for women teachers, in the Classroom building at East Carolina Teachers College, discussed with members the interaction of German and American cultures as it affects the peace and stability of the two countries and of the world.

James' remarks were founded on observation of the relationships of two peoples of conflicting ideas. During the war he served in Germany as a major in the army; and after the end of hostilities he was stationed in Germany, where he had opportunity to study many phases of German life, especially the schools of the country.

James pointed out that our task in the American zone in Germany is to show that democracy is a desirable way of life and to counteract, especially by education, the spread of ideologies opposed in principle to ours. Prevalent conditions of poverty and disease in Germany, he said, make the task difficult but not insurmountable. He urged an interest on the part of all Americans in alleviating distress abroad.

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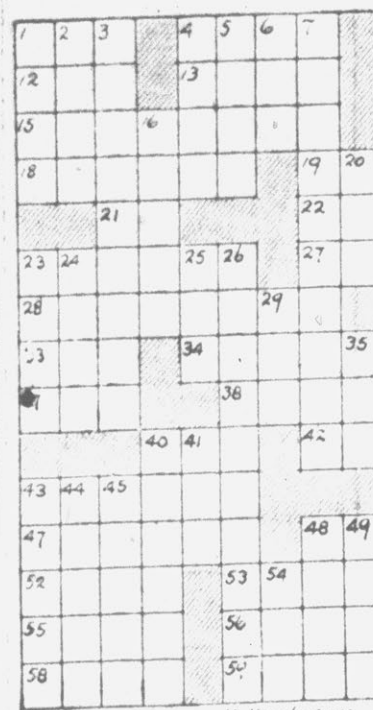
CONCERNING GOOD TEACHING
We can never escape the influence
of our teachers. Most of us look
back upon some man or woman in
school or college who made such a
lasting impression upon us that we
are conscious of it every day. Our
parents moulded us for the first ten
years of our lives. Then our teachers

After that we were pretty well set in
our ideas for life. We may think we
have changed a lot since we cast our

good teaching and exemplified it.

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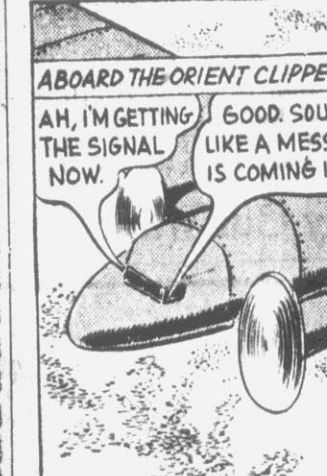

nism. He has served in many posi-
tions—as president of the provisional
government in 1946, as premier and
numerous times as foreign minister.
A wartime resistance leader, Bidault
now is titular head of the "Popular
Republican Movement," the party
to which France's new premier —
Robert Schuman—belongs. Bidault
is royally hated by communism, be-
cause he has been staunchly sup-
porting the Marshall Plan. His
philosophy is that "it is a sin" to
despair.

And finally we have Vyacheslav
Molotov, 57, an "old Bolshevik" who
perhaps is closer to Marshall
Stalin than is any other Russian.
In any event, Molotov stands at the
Soviet leader's right hand, as he
has done since the days of the
Bolshevik revolution in 1917. The
Soviet foreign minister has a mind
as quick as a steel trap, but it runs
along one line—the furthering of
Soviet interests, which of course is
a natural trait. He is a direct ac-
tionist and has been through all
the vicissitudes of communism. He
is one of the chief railers against
the "Anglo-American bloc" and
"democratic" policies.
