

Collapsels Possible Big Four Disclose

Acknowledge Indirectly That Quest For German Peace Treaty May Fail; Still Without Single Major Agreement As Ministers Convene Today

London, Nov. 29—(AP)—Russia and the Western powers indirectly acknowledged today the possibility of a collapse in the Big Four foreign ministers' quest for a peace treaty which would keep Germany harmless, but still helpful to Europe's recovery.

As the ministers convened today at 10:30 a.m. (EST), they still were without agreement on a single major point after four days of discussion.

Yesterday they talked about what might happen if this conference bogged down, as the Moscow meeting did last spring, in disagreement. The Soviet Union bumped into an unbridgeable refusal by Britain—apparently with American and French concurrence—to relinquish in advance the right of setting up a provisional government in Western Germany, should such a stalemate occur.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov insisted upon raising the issue, demanding a yes or no answer on whether the Western powers had such a plan and adding that if they had "the governments involved do not wish to reach an agreement here."

Molotov didn't get a direct answer. However, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin denied that Britain had such a plan and refused to commit his government to that of the British people "as to what might have to be done in the event of a Big Four failure to agree."

"In the end peace is denied," Bevin added, "then surely you cannot at this stage ask us to stand still with Europe in chaos and not do anything at all."

French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault refused to say what the French stand would be. Cautionary observers noted that Molotov had stepped forward with an economic merger of the Saar into the French economy and said he would avail himself of the same privilege of silence.

U.S. Secretary of State George C. Marshall remained silent on the point, except to remind Molotov that the U.S. more than a year ago had invited the governments participating in Germany's occupation to join in its economic integration.

About Your Gov't

In Which Some Answers Are Given To Questions Which May Have Stumped You On The Government; This Story Deals With The Veto, Types And How Handled

Washington, Nov. 29—(AP)—Here are answers to some questions about the government which may have stumped you.

The story will deal with the veto, what it is and what can be done about it.

When both houses of Congress pass a measure it is sent to the President for him to sign into law, or let become law, or veto.

The word veto is from Latin and means "I forbid."

When a congressional measure reaches the President, he says:

1. Sign it. Then it is law.

2. If for some reason he doesn't want to appear to approve it by signing it, but still doesn't want to kill it, he can do this:

SCHUMAN ASKS ASSEMBLY FOR ADDED POWERS

Wants Authority To Crack Down On Agitators; Would Revise Sabotage Laws

Paris, Nov. 29—(AP)—Premier Robert Schuman asked the National Assembly today for power to crack down on agitators for strikes or sabotage "by speeches, writing or tracts."

He said he wanted this right for six months time as he pleaded for power to help him fight a strangling wave of Communist-inspired strikes throughout France.

The assembly's committee on civil and criminal law immediately approved the government bills, 26 to 13, and sent them to the assembly, which is expected to consider them later in the day.

In demanding "complete revision" of the laws on sabotage, Schuman took cognizance of yesterday's reports that sabotage was on the increase and declared:

"If we have reached this point, the responsibility belongs to the Communists."

Speaking directly to the Communists in the assembly, the new premier, beginning his second week in office, charged:

"I declare that your goal is to create excitement in the country. It is against this that the government must contend."

He said the trouble was being caused more and more by foreign elements. Protests roared from the Communist benches.

As Schuman spoke, more than a third of the nation's 6,000,000 organized workers were on strike and government forces were ejecting strikers from rail centers and other strongholds they had seized.

Schuman also asked the assembly to reorganize part of the French security forces and to pass a new law giving added protection to non-strikers.

ARMY READIES PENSION LIST

Prepares To Furnish President With Retirement Records

Washington, Nov. 29—(AP)—As an aftermath of the Bennett E. Meyers case the Army prepared today to furnish President Truman with the records of 28,000 wartime officers retired with a monthly tax-free disability income.

The officers eligible for this compensation, which amounts in most cases to three-fourths of their active duty pay, range in rank from generals—387 of them—down through the grades to second lieutenant.

Speculation that there might be a move afoot to challenge some of the disability ratings went unanswered by an official White House announcement yesterday which said only that Mr. Truman wants the material "for his information."

One of those on the list is Meyers, subject of a Senate investigation into air force wartime contract dealings, whose financial affairs while he was an air force major general are now under study by a federal grand jury.

W. Stuart Symington secretary of the Air Force, said last week that Meyers' \$550 a month disability retirement pay has been stopped.

Plane Missing

Frankfurt, Germany, Nov. 29—(AP)—A United States air force C-47 transport plane with 21 persons aboard is missing on a flight from Pisa, Italy, to Frankfurt, air force headquarters at Wiesbaden announced today.

The plane may be down in the Frankfurt area, headquarters said. The ship was carrying 17 passengers and four crewmen.

BUILDING AT PRISON BURNS

S.C. Penitentiary's Factory Structure Is Heavily Damaged

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 29—(AP)—An early morning blaze of undetermined origin burned out half the state penitentiary's huge three-story brick and wood garment factory building here today.

None of the 1,200 prisoners in nearby cell buildings or prison employees were about when a convict noticed flames coming from a basement electrical shop in the building and screamed an alarm.

City fire and state prison officials estimated the loss to the building covered by state sinking fund insurance and to the factory equipment and stocks also insured, at more than \$300,000.

Italian Leftists Wrest Victory In Milan Fight

Rome, Nov. 29—(AP)—Leftist organizations, which almost vaulted to power in the city and Province of Milan yesterday during a bitter and forcible protest against replacement of Milan's prefect, wrested from the government today a promise that the prefect would stay on for the time being.

A communique issued from the prefect's office in Milan said a national government representative who hurried from Rome to handle the situation had arrived at an agreement with the Leftists under which they promised to call off a general strike protesting the removal of the Leftist prefect, Ettore Troilo.

A communique issued in Milan by the government representative Achille Marazza, undersecretary of the Interior, said Mazarra had made amendments x x x for the way in which the announcement of Troilo's transfer was made, acknowledging that it first should have gone to the interested party.

The agreement, both announcements said, including dropping the man the government had named to replace Troilo, Vincenzo Ciotola, now the prefect of Turin.

In a statement to the Italian news agency Ansa, Marazza said he talked with all parties concerned and was in position to supply the Rome government with information on which to base the choice of a new prefect—presumably one suitable to the Leftist "citizens' committee," which all but seized control of Milan yesterday in its vehement protests.

Babson Discusses Rural Buying

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 25—Farmers have always been wise consumers. Until recent years, necessity, as much as long-headedness, tightened the gnarled hand that held the purse strings. Prosperity today rules in most communities and everyone should buy with caution.

First, I suggest contracting for a good supply of fertilizers and insecticides—enough at least for next season's requirements. Purchase of these commodities is a good investment despite the relatively high cost. New equipment should more than compensate for its cost through savings on high labor charges and expensive repairs to old and nearly worn out machines. The well-mechanized farm, factory or store is the dividend producer.

I also advise laying in a good supply of canned goods and dried fruits, such as prunes and raisins. Such foodstuffs will supplement the regular diet and will come in handy in the event of a crop failure next year. Money spent on a deep freeze unit should prove worth its weight in gold. LEAF EXPORTS GET NEW HOPE SAYS SENATOR

Hoey Sees "One Chance" In Surplus Commodity Amendment OK'd In Senate

Washington, Nov. 29—(AP)—Senator Hoey (D-N.C.) said today "the one chance to get tobacco exported under interim aid shipments is through the Surplus Commodity amendment adopted this week by the Senate."

The Senate is scheduled to vote Monday on the bill authorizing winter relief for Europe, which includes this amendment.

"We hope to include some tobacco in early shipments," Hoey told a reporter.

"At any rate, this amendment is to be carried over into long-range programs for foreign aid," the former North Carolina governor added. "It should at least help the tobacco industry eventually."

The surplus commodity amendment introduced by Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) states:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any commodity heretofore or hereafter acquired by the Commodity Credit Corporation under any price-support program may be disposed of by the corporation, for use in carrying out this or any other act providing for assistance and relief to foreign countries, at such price as may be determined by the corporation, which price may be the equivalent of the domestic market price of a quantity of wheat having a calorific value equal to that of the commodity of the commodity disposed of."

The CCC is expected shortly to hold about 500,000,000 (million) pounds of tobacco on which it has made loans to farmers.

Hoey said earlier this week tobacco-state legislators had agreed it would be difficult to move tobacco abroad under the winter emergency program.

At the same time a special congressional tobacco committee, which meets again next week, recommend that "tobacco be included in foreign relief programs."

STORM LASHES SOUTH FLORIDA

Florida Keys Hit; No Major Damage Reported In Area

Miami, Fla., Nov. 29—(AP)—A post-season storm, born in a squall wave, lashed south Florida and the Florida Keys last night with winds up to 65 miles an hour, but caused no major damage.

Key West suffered most from the blow as gusts up to 85 miles an hour sent about 20 small boats, uprooted trees and battered signs and awnings.

At Boca Chica naval air station, where President Truman will land next week to board his plane the wind tore a Navy blimp with four men aboard from its moorings, ripped open the gas bag and dashed it against the runway. Its four crew members escaped unhurt.

As in the previous tropical storms which hit Miami and south Florida this fall, rain and its accompanying flood waters were the prime concern of the blow.

Some 1.21 inches of rain fell in the greater Miami area in the 12-hour period between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., causing the postponement of the scheduled Alabama-University of Miami football game and piling up water still standing in outlying sections from the October deluge.

Winchell Attorney Says Walda Is Home

New York, Nov. 29—(AP)—Walden E. Winchell, 20-year-old daughter of Walter Winchell, who had been the object of a wide search by police since she was reported missing last Wednesday, was back home today, Ernest Cuneo, attorney for the Winchell family, announced.

Cuneo said she had been "visiting friends" and was "back home again." He did not elaborate.

GASOLINE RATIONED

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 28—(AP)—Standard Oil Company announced today it would begin rationing gasoline to its distributors in Alabama Dec. 1. Indications were that the program would be put into effect on virtually a nation-wide basis.

DEMAND DEFER BITTER FIGHT ON PARTITION

Strongly-Backed Colombian Surprise Move May Split The Struggle Wide Open

New York, Nov. 29—(AP)—The bitter fight over the "Soviet-American" plan to partition Palestine was split wide open today as a result of Colombia's surprise move of yesterday to defer final United Nations action until next spring.

As the United Nations Assembly was called back into session set for 4 p. m. (EST), after a 24-hour recess, Colombian Delegate Dr. Alfonso Lozano was reported to have lined up strong support, including the Arab-led anti-partitionists, for his plan of deferment.

The Arab countries met secretly last night and were slated to meet again before the assembly convened this afternoon. One informed source said the Arabs had decided not to take "too stiff" an attitude in the problem but that they had not yet decided whether to offer a proposal on their own account.

This was taken as evidence of an apparent move by the Arabs to be more open to conciliation. Heretofore they have been adamant against any proposal except their demand for a single independent Arabic nation in the Holy Land.

The Colombian proposal for delay was laid before the assembly last night at Flushing Meadow Park when most delegates thought they were finally at the point of voting on the partition plan. Assembly President Oswaldo Aranha of Brazil already had predicted semi-privately that partition would be approved.

Action on both the Colombian proposal and the partition plan was then side-tracked when the assembly approved a surprise French motion for a 24-hour recess so that a final effort at conciliation could be made.

Chileans Detain USSR Diplomats As Hostages

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 29—(AP)—Foreign Minister Vergara Donoso said today that Soviet diplomats still in Santiago would be kept here and would be sealed off from Moscow pending a Chilean appeal to the international court of justice against Soviet refusal to allow the Russian daughter-in-law of Chilean Ambassador David Cruz Ocampo to leave the U. S. S. R.

The minister said the government would "retain" the Russian consuls—numbering about 5, including their families and household staff—who are waiting to go home in an exchange of diplomats, and would no longer permit them to communicate with the Soviet capital pending appeal to the Hague.

Chile broke off diplomatic relations with Russia in October. A government statement said Russian officials have refused since last summer to permit the ambassador's arrival, to take his Russian wife out of the country.

Top Scientists In U.S. Convene

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 29—(AP)—Nearly 50 of the nation's leading scientists met again today in the second session of a special three-day conference called to reformulate their views on the role of atomic energy in world affairs.

The scientists, research specialists in atomic energy and its allied social and scientific fields, were called together by the Emergency Committee of Atomic Scientists, which is headed by Dr. Albert Einstein.

Ally Of Communists

French Reds Strongly Assisted By Privations; Harsh Days For Rank And File; Progressive Paralysis Of French Economy; Schuman Ready For Eventualities

French Communists are receiving the support of a powerful but evil ally in their attempt to bring about the downfall of the hard-pressed government, and this ally is harsh privation, due to a serious shortage of many necessities of life.

Of course there are oases in France where, if you have the money, you can buy most anything you want, and the farmers in general are better off for food than are the town cousins. There also are black markets in which "loose consciences" can find necessities and even luxuries. But for the man-in-the-street these are harsh days.

The rank and file in Paris and other cities are suffering a scarcity of bread, butter, milk, meat, flour and most other things. Parisians are trying to cook on gas-stoves which are virtually without pressure because of the gas-workers' strike.

Equally bad, there is a terrible shortage of coal, due to the miners' strike—and already temperatures below freezing are warning of approaching winter. Not only is much of the country shivering but industry is gravely affected. Minister of Production Robert Lacoste says if the coal strike continues, many electric plants in Paris will be forced to close. Speaking in general of the several coal strikes France has experienced this year, Lacoste declares:

"This is progressive paralysis of French economy. It will be very difficult to repair the wrong already done."

There you have the picture as the Bolsheviks press their attack. This brings the harassed cabinet up against the truism that the peoples of all countries generally blame the government when things affecting their way of life go wrong. And of course the Reds are using the hardships as propaganda to try to stiff the citizens to anger.

The questions naturally arise whether this situation is due to Communist strategy. I think the answer is that the war left France with a badly dislocated economy, and the Reds have exploited this for their own advantage. Certainly many, if not all, of the innumerable strikes are due to Communist influence.

It isn't surprising, therefore, that the strike situation in France is reported as in a confused state. Unions in some localities have been voting to strike, while strikers in other areas have voted to get back on the job. The Communists claim 4,000,000 are striking, while government sources assert that only half that number are out.

France's new premier, Robert Schuman, seems to have taken the bull by the horns. Not only has he recalled thousands of troops to the army and initiated other military preparations to meet any eventualities, but he has created a sensation by ousting 66 police commissioners. There was no official explanation.

MEETING HERE NEXT MONDAY IS IMPORTANT

Farmers And Businessmen Of County To Discuss Crop Reduction Plans

An important meeting will be held at the courthouse in Greenville next Monday night, December 1, at 7:30 p. m., when farmers and businessmen of Pitt County will discuss plans as to what is best for the producers in this county to do to avert disaster as a result of the tobacco acreage reduction order by U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson in Washington.

Pitt county will lose 12,400 acres of tobacco for the 1948 crop, which means roughly a \$6,000,000 loss in income to the farmers. It has also been pointed out that we are losing approximately 4,000 acres that have been planted to peanuts during the past several years, which will decrease the annual income more.

Pitt County Farm Agent S. C. Winchester said: "We are facing a trying time agriculturally in this county, and the meeting Monday night should be one of the most important held here in years. We have secured the services of several who are specialists in their particular line of work, to be here and give us the benefit of their knowledge and experience."

Farmers and businessmen are urged to attend the meeting and participate in the discussion of the serious farm problems now facing them.

Additional Funds For City From Tax On Wine And Beer

Mayor Jack Boyd said today that the city had received a check from the State Department of Revenue for \$5,500.37 as its part of the state wine and beer taxes. The last General Assembly increased the beer and wine taxes to such an extent that cities and towns could share in them.

The mayor said the Board of Aldermen anticipated only \$3,200 of beer and wine tax when they made up the annual budget. The difference between the above sum and the amount received will give the city an increased fund for unbudgeted expenses during the present fiscal year.

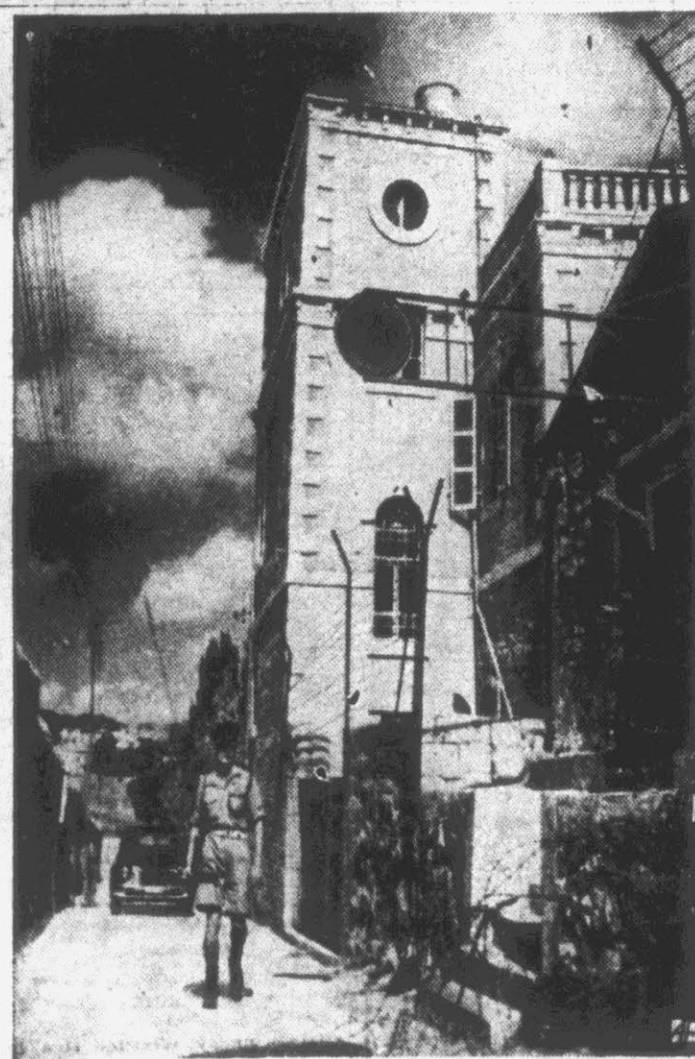

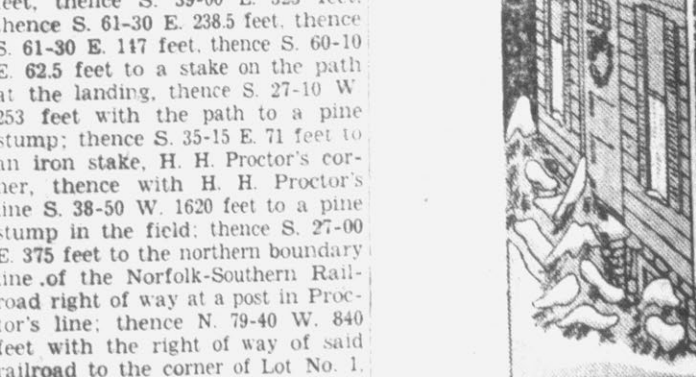

Strength FOR THE DAY

IT REQUIRES ALL WE HAVE
We can generally be confident
that a man who puts his whole
self into anything will succeed. Al-
most everyone who does this be-
comes a leader. Some people think
that the days of rugged individual-
ity and sterling leadership are over,
but a review of the facts would
show that there are about as many
outstanding leaders today in pro-
portion to our population as there
have ever been.

This capacity for complete com-

BOOKMOBILE

Books are the repositories
of men's thoughts, their
knowledge and the wander-
ings of their imagination.
Even poor books carry in
them a wealth of material
which reflects some small
portion of today's culture.

A community is fortunate
to have a library within its
bounds; and they miss it
most, who have none. Librar-
y users are immensely rich-
er than their less fortunate
neighbors for they have a
storehouse of information
and entertainment to absorb
and enjoy at their leisure.

Greenville has a library,
and its many patrons will
testify as to the part it plays
in their everyday lives. Pitt
Countians who live outside of
Greenville have little oppor-
tunity to make use of the lib-
rary's facilities.

The most practical means
of bringing books within
reach of these people is the
"Bookmobile" which will be
kept in operation by Shep-
ard Memorial Library. The
necessary supplies of books
are on hand; money for its
maintenance and operation
(including the salary of a
trained librarian to drive it)
will be available if the Book-
mobile is purchased by oth-
er than public funds.

On Monday, December 1,
a group of business men in
Greenville will try to raise
\$1,300 which is the balance



necessary to complete the
purchase. It's a chance for
true book-lovers to spread
their cult and give a lot of
kids in the county a taste of
good literature that was writ-
ten for them, and add pleas-
ure to the "quiet evening at
home" of the older folks.

The Children's Corner

Shepard Memorial Library

Books for the World of Tomor-
row was the theme of Book Week
observed last week and every adult
with an interest in children would
do well to ponder this phrase, and
to give some thought to what Books
can do for the future of our world.
The Treasure Chests of books
which are made up and set to
groups of children in other lands,
will do much to help their under-
standing of us as Americans, just as

the books our children read of Mei
Li and Helen and Hans Brinker
give them a greater knowledge of
these children of other lands, and
will help ultimately in bringing to-
gether the family of nations.
Most children, from the time they
first begin to read, have an inter-
est in the printed word. This in-
terest must be nurtured and culti-
vated by the parents, if we expect it
to grow. The child's early pride in
his ability to read will lose its im-
portance to him if the parents fail
to cooperate in supplying books, or
making regular trips to the library.
The finest provision for a child's
growing intelligence is an ever-wid-
ening bridge of books to the won-
ders of nature, science, history, for-
eign lands, and realms of imagina-

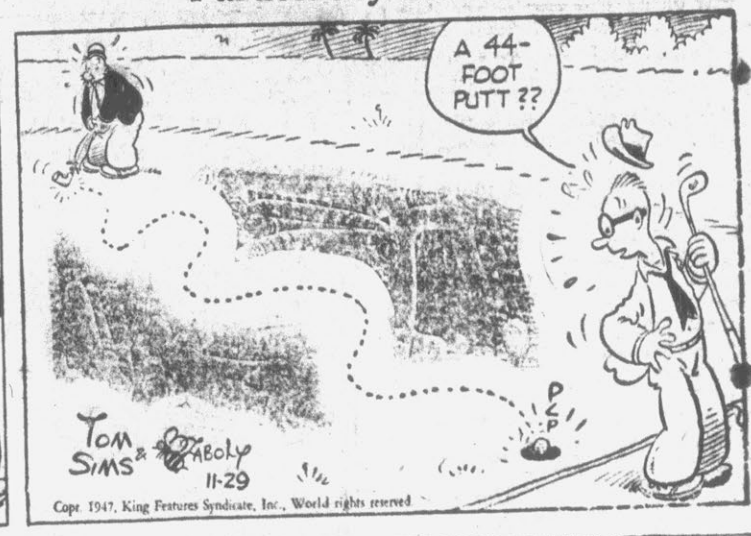

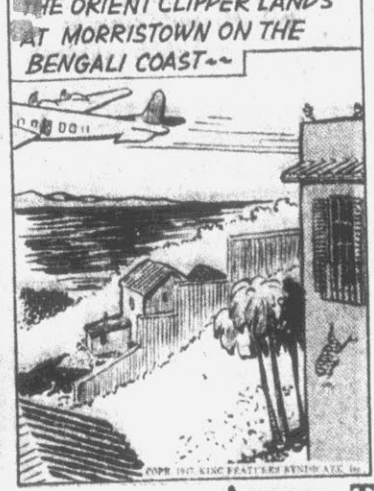
