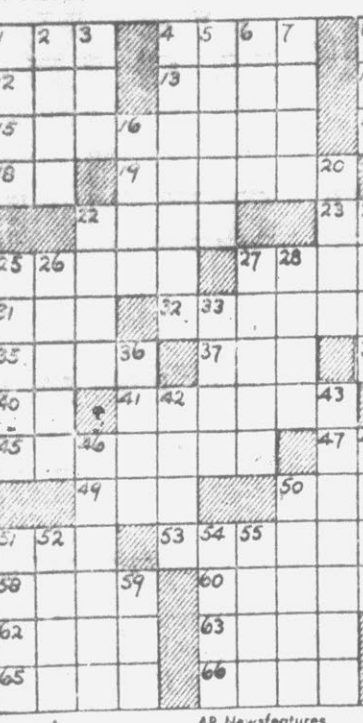

for the increase in living costs since the 40-cent minimum was established.

Argument is even hotter on the 40-hour week and overtime issues.

The employers say:

1. There is no proof the required overtime penalty pay causes employers to "spread the work" in times of depression—that is, keep the same number of men on their payrolls instead of firing some and working the others longer hours.

2. There is no sense in keeping a penalty on employers against using their workers more than 40 hours a week when the national

goal now is greater production to eliminate shortages and bring down prices.

In defense of the 40-hour week and overtime pay, unions say:
1. In times of heavy production, this part of the law permits workers to share in increased profits; in slack times, it is more profitable for business to hire additional employees rather than concentrate the work in the hands of a few overworked workers.

2. A worker is most efficient working only 40 hours a week, with the remainder left for leisure and rest.

Not all employers nor all unions have agreed with these positions. Some employers have asked for exemptions for their industries. Unions have asked for removal of some of the existing exemptions.

A general plea among employers is that, if the law is to remain on the books, Congress should clarify many provisions to avoid argument about whether their particular work-

ers come under the law.

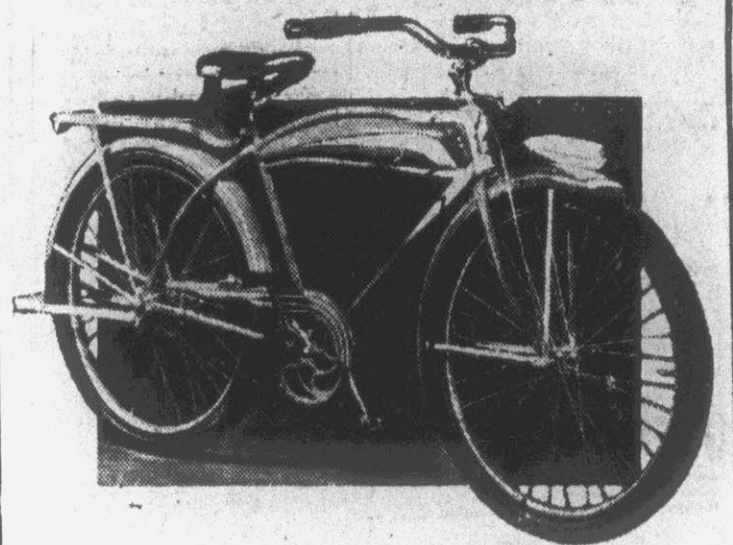

with accordingly.

It is up to the United Nations, having sanctioned partition, to see the matter through. Most certainly the U.N. should create a police force (which does not now exist) to maintain peace during the reconstruction period, and close observers

who know the Middle East believe that this force should be moved into the Holy Land immediately. Now is the dangerous time. To leave Palestine ungarrisoned would be to invite a Moslem holy war. And once that got started there would be no telling how far it would run. It is well that this great question should be in the hands of the U.N., for after all it is a matter in which the world as a whole has a vital and special interest. Palestine is indeed a Holy Land, and not only to the Moslems and the Jews but to the whole of Christendom. To the Jews and to the Arabs of Palestine is entrusted a spiritual heritage of mankind. The U.N. must help safeguard it.

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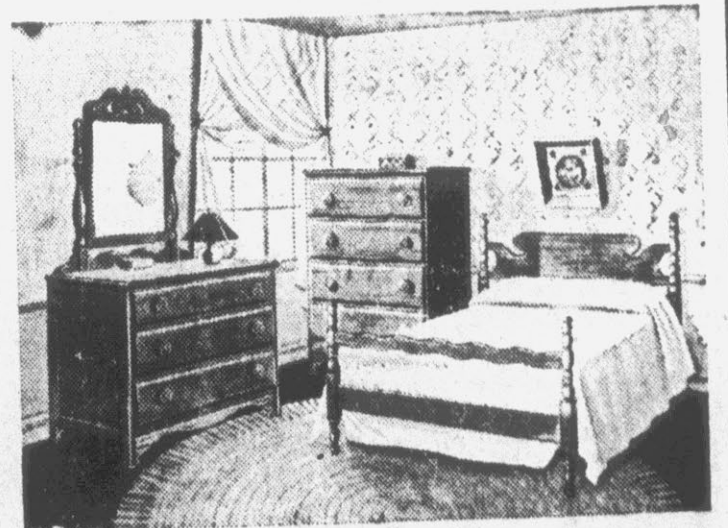
