

PACIFIC ATOLL BASE FOR NEW ATOM PROJECT

Eniwetok Disclosed As Research Area; Curtain Of Secrecy Around Work

Washington, Dec. 2—(AP)—Projected atomic tests behind a curtain of absolute secrecy in the remote Pacific suggested today that American scientists may be preparing new weapons based on the same terrible power as the atom bomb.

A terse announcement from the Atomic Energy Commission disclosed that the armed forces are making tiny Eniwetok Atoll—1,500 miles from the nearest large land mass—into a closed-off proving grounds for research on “new fundamental data.”

What goes on there, the commission said, is expected to result in advances in “peaceful as well as in military applications of atomic energy.”

Asked whether a reference to “atomic weapons” means that this country’s arsenal now includes a nuclear fission running mate for the atom bomb, one official replied:

“You can draw your own conclusions.”

Unlike the surface and underwater atom bomb tests at Bikini Atoll in the summer of 1946, which were covered by several hundred reporters and foreign observers, the new experiments will be under “full security restrictions,” last night’s announcement said.

The area will be shut off from the world and the Security Council of the United Nations will be notified to this effect, as provided in the U. N. trusteeship agreement for the former Japanese-occupied islands.

The 145 native inhabitants of the atoll islands of Aomom and Bijiri will leave for a permanent new home which they will select.

Bikini was unsuitable for the new experiments, the commission said, because it lacked land surface enough to contain “the instrumentation necessary to the scientific observations which must be made.” Eniwetok itself has only about 2 1/2 square miles of land. One big reason for choosing it, the announcement explained, is its isolation. There are hundreds of miles of open seas in the direction in which winds might carry radioactive particles.

It lies about halfway between Hawaii and the Philippines, and the closest big land area is New Guinea, 1,500 miles to the southwest.

Manslaughter Is Charged Man In Dormitory Fire

Philadelphia, Dec. 2—(AP)—Detective Sgt. John M. McEnroe said today that Stanley Drust, 57-year-old shop foreman, has been charged with manslaughter by fire in connection with a blaze that swept through a dormitory for homeless men here, bringing death to six and injury to 17 others.

The fire broke yesterday whipped through the interior of the four-story building of the Volunteers of America, Inc., in North Philadelphia, as 60 homeless men—some of them blind—slept in dormitories on the second and third floors.

McEnroe said Drust was charged after he signed a statement in which he said he had been smoking on the first floor of the building shortly before the fire broke out.

The detective said his investigation indicated the blaze started in a shop operated by the relief agency on that floor and then spread throughout the upper three floors.

Two Camps In Labor

“Right” And “Left” Wing Groups; Special Meaning In Labor Movement; Struggle Between Camps For Union Control; Communism Losing Ground In Unions

Washington—When the terms “right wing” and “left wing” are used in the labor movement, they have a special, technical meaning. They refer to the fight over Communism.

It’s important to understand this. Otherwise the average person may be hopelessly confused when someone talks about the “right” and “left” wings of the CIO, or when someone says the United Auto Workers “swing to the right.”

You may be accustomed to thinking of “right” as meaning “conservative” or perhaps “reactionary.”

You may be accustomed to thinking of “left” as meaning “liberal” or perhaps “radical.”

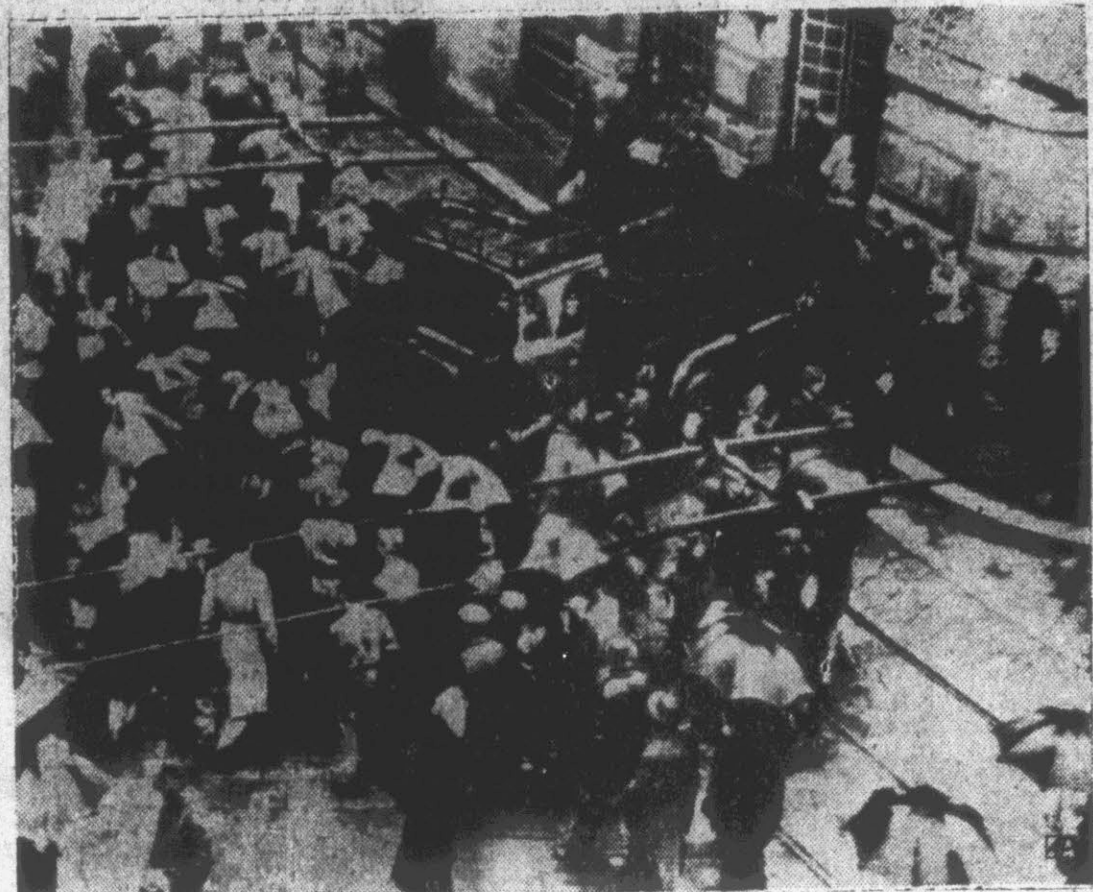
But when you go to a CIO convention and hear the delegates talking about a “right-winger,” they don’t mean a reactionary or a conservative.

They mean an anti-Communist. They usually mean someone who is not only opposed to Communism in theory but also is resisting the efforts of the Communists to take leadership in the trade union movement.

If a Socialist fights Communism he’s a “right-winger.”

This doesn’t mean all “left-wingers” are Communists. In numbers, the Communists are a tiny minority of the labor movement.

Reds Filibuster In French Assembly

Stall Action On Anti-Strike Law As Communist-Led Strikers Launch Offensive Against Government Forces Now In Mines, Plants

Paris, Dec. 2—(AP)—New Communist harangues stalled a National Assembly vote today on a rigid anti-strike law as Communist-led strikers launched what appeared to be a concerted counter-offensive against government forces occupying their plants, depots and mines.

A Communist sit-down filibuster in the assembly which lasted 10 hours had been broken early in the day. The assembly was reconvened to enact the law for defense of the republic asked by Premier Robert Schuman to fight the strike wave, now involving 2,000,000 workers. But the assembly resumed once again to Communist speeches, this time attacking Assembly President Edouard Herriot for ejecting a Communist deputy.

Paris police drove 2,000 strikers out of the Salomon automobile factory in the suburbs in hand-to-hand fighting, after the strikers and workers from the strike-bound Renault plant nearby used a tractor to smash a hole in the wall. Workers poured through the gap, attempting to eject the police.

The police described the fight as “very serious.” Three mobile guardmen were hospitalized.

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LAMARRE GOES BEFORE JURY

Plans \$10,000 Court Claim Against General Meyers

Washington, Dec. 2—(AP)—Bleddie H. Lamarre, self-styled “dumb” president of a war contract firm, went before a federal grand jury today promising to “tell all” about his dealings with Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers.

Before entering the jury room Lamarre told reporters he plans a court suit to recover \$10,000 he claims the retired general owes him.

The grand jury is investigating testimony before a Senate committee that General Meyers realized more than \$150,000 profits from the concern Lamarre headed.

“I’m ready to tell the grand jury all I know—without reservation,” Lamarre told reporters.

The 35-year-old witness told the Senate War Investigating Committee that he kicked back most of his salary to General Meyers, wartime deputy Air Forces procurement chief, retaining only about \$50 a week as president of the Aviation Electric Company, Dayton, Ohio.

Lamarre, who now calls Meyers a “snake,” followed his young bride to the grand jury room.

His prospective \$10,000 court claim against Meyers, Lamarre told newsmen, is in the hands of Robert C. Kneec, Dayton attorney.

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POWER FAILURE IN WASHINGTON

Water Service Restored; Almost Total Blackout In Town

Washington, N. C., Dec. 2—(AP)—This Eastern North Carolina city of 12,000 residents today awaited the arrival of electric technicians to restore normal power service after an almost total blackout last night.

The entire city was blacked out following a failure of its light and water system yesterday. The failure was attributed by city officials to a ruptured boiler which flooded the main switchboard in the power and water plant.

Water service was restored here last night but in suburban Washington Park residents were still without both water and electric lights. The stoppage also affected several nearby rural communities.

Traffic here was at a near standstill as filling stations, equipped with electric pumps, were forced to close along with theaters and other business houses normally open at night. Homes were lighted only by candles or lamps.

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WEAPONS FOR WAR PROMISED TO EGYPTIANS

Thousands Of Riotous Marchers Shout “We Want War, Weapons And Revolution”

Cairo, Dec. 2—(AP)—Thousands of Egyptians, demonstrating today against the impending partition of Palestine, were promised “an abundance of arms” by Abdel Rahman Youssef Pasha, secretary general of the Arab League of seven Middle Eastern states.

The riotous demonstrators, some of whom smashed windows of foreign-owned shops, stoned an Egyptian-owned night club and wrecked posters advertising foreign movies and American soft drinks, arrived at Arab League headquarters shouting:

“We want war, Azzam; we want weapons, Azzam; we want revolution, Azzam.”

Azzam urged the demonstrators to organize and work quietly and to refrain from violence against Christians. He said they should prepare for a long struggle to achieve Arab aims.

He advised the crowd not to commit violence against Christians, commenting that Christian Arabs were “in the vanguard of the Arab struggle.”

“We know our enemies,” Azzam cried. “We will go to them, we will fight them in regular armed struggle. You will get arms—an abundance of them.”

Some estimates of the crowd placed the number as high as 10,000. Police cars appeared on all sides.

“Long live Hitler, the assassin of the Jews,” some youths in the crowd shouted.

Some demonstrators stoned a Greek-owned cafe in a downtown business building where several foreign firms, including American have offices.

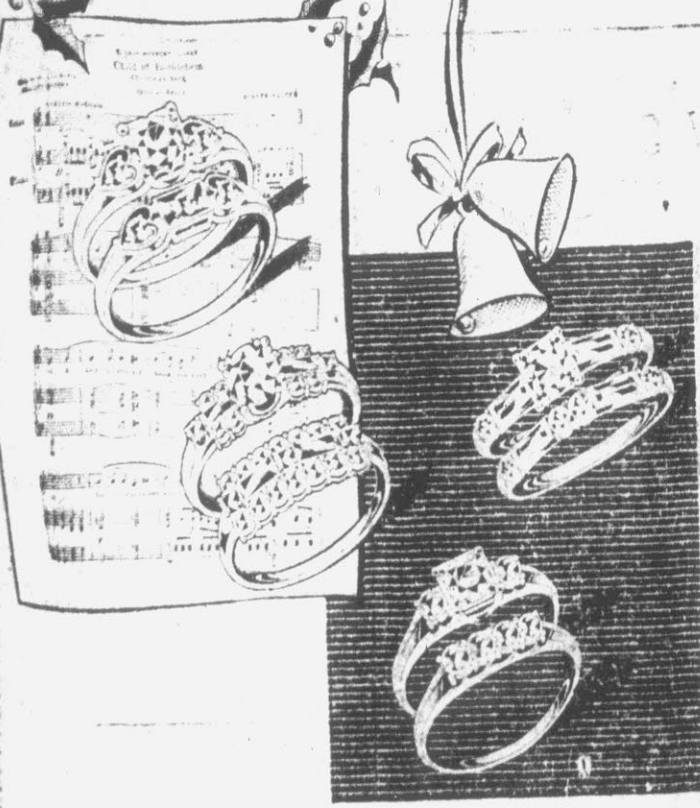

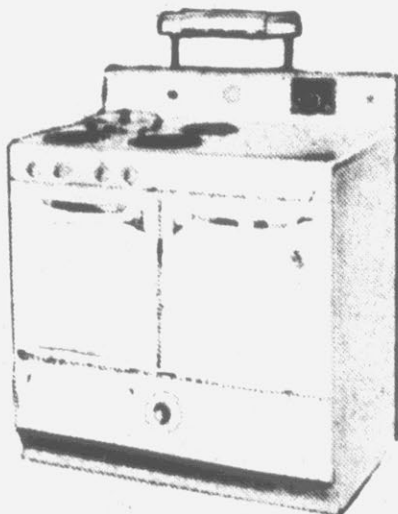

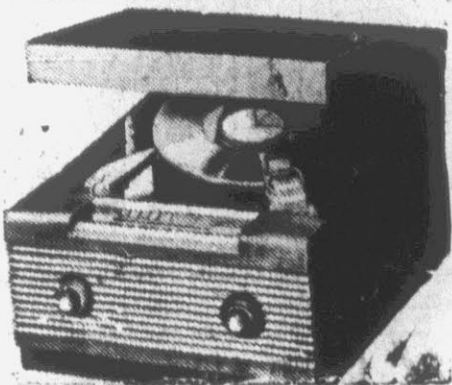

Dr. Messick Was Speaker Lions' Club Meeting

At the supper meeting of the Greenville Lions Club last night, Dr. John D. Messick, president of ECTC, delivered an interesting talk on "The Influence of Education."

The speaker pointed out many instances in recent history in which education played a primary part in the indoctrination of entire populations. Pointing particularly to Hitler and Mussolini in pre-war Europe, Dr. Messick explained how education can be, and sometimes is, perverted to serve the evil ends of would-be dictators.

Turning to the brighter side of the history of education, the speaker outlined how teachers play an important part in shaping the ideals and lives of their students and, through these students, the lives of the people.

"It should be evident," Dr. Messick said, "that it is important that we obtain the best minds and the most highly trained people to mould the young people into the way in which they will go."

Looking to the future of education in this country, the speaker said the surface has hardly been scratched in such things as adult education, and the deliberate effort of schools to inculcate into the minds of students workable knowledge and training in the social subjects, such as good manners in everyday life, at the table, on the street, at dances and elsewhere.

In conclusion, Dr. Messick pointed out that, if we believe the ancient truism, "as the twig is bent, the tree will grow," it is of vital importance to us now to be particularly careful not only of what is taught our children in schools and playgrounds, but also of the type of ability of the persons teaching them.

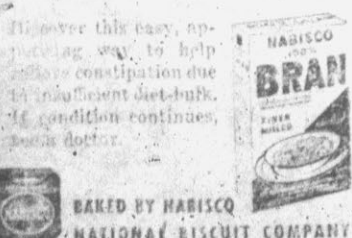

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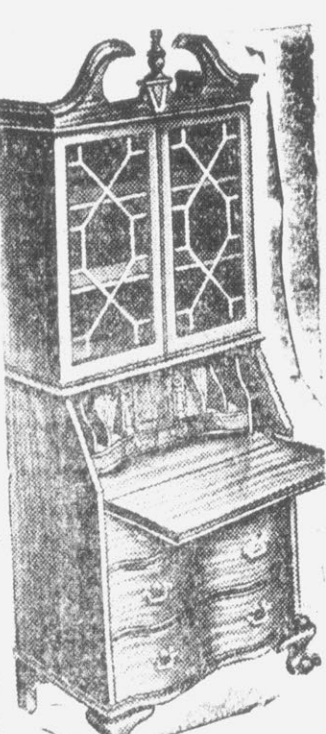

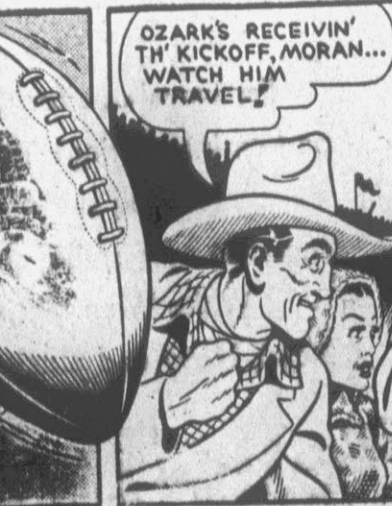

Many people who find themselves in a so-called "left-wing" resent being called a "left-winger."

Many radicals and progressives who are anti-Communists deplore the lack of a better term than "right wing." They say it suggests "reaction." They accuse the Communists of being "reactionary."

They point to Communist Russia as a totalitarian state and say that anyone who supports a totalitarian doctrine is reactionary.

The Communists themselves use the terms and when they say "right wing," they try to identify it with "reaction" and "Fascism" as well.
