SEN. CONNALLY URGES SENATE APPROVE PACT

Asks Ratification Of Hemisphere Defense Treaty; Stresses Security Angle

Washington, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Senator Connally (D-Texas) called today for ratification of the Inter-American defense treaty, terming it "a challenge to any alien or foreign influence" which might seek to attack this hemisphere either openly or by infiltration.

The document, a product of last summer's conference at Rio de Janeiro, provides for all treaty nations to act jointly against any aggression in this part of the world. Connally, ranking minority member of the Foreign Relations Committee, described the treaty as "a long step in the direction of guaranteeing the safety and security of the American republics from aggression or attack by any power outside this hemisphere."

Declaring that it embodies "the lofty principles" for the Monroe Doctrine and "vitalizes and makes definite that it is a policy for the protection and security of all the American states," the Texas added in address prepared for his colleagues:

"It guarantees the liberties and political institutions of the Western world. It is a challenge to any alien or foreign influence that may seek to infiltrate with insidious foreign doctrines or to conquer by arms any republic of the Western world. "It makes clear that here is a sanctuary where liberty and constitutional free government shall enjoy the opportunity to grow and develop according to the wishes and desires of the people of these republics with a respect for the rights and sovereignty of all other states of the hemisphere and with the noble purpose of promoting the peace of the world."

Bar 90 As Bad 'Security Risk'

Washington, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The military services have barred as "bad security risks" during the past year some 90 civilians from working on secret projects let private contractors.

These cases are in addition to previously reported instances of federal workers' dismissals for disloyalty or reasons of doubtful loyalty. Since 1942, when Congress made provision for such action, about 55 persons have been fired from army or air force civilian jobs.

Eisenhower Supporters Push Nomination Drive

Washington, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Fresh indications that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower may step out of uniform in January coincided today with reports of increased activity in his behalf as a possible Republican presidential candidate.

Although the Army chief of staff has been vague about his quitting time, there is evidence that the previous schedule for him to take over the presidency of Columbia University April 1 has been speeded up by President Truman's action in naming Gen. Omar Bradley as his successor.

Brady, whose transfer from head of the Veterans Administration back to the Army was effective last Monday, will be available for his new assignment shortly after January 1. While Eisenhower may remain for a time to advise his successor, friends say that any extended stay is likely to become embarrassing for both men.

Although the five-star general has dodged questions about his availability for the nomination, politicians have begun to count him as a major factor in the race which already has these three publicly announced entrants: Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

On Last Leg Of Global Tour

Dayton, O., Dec. 8.—(AP)—George Truman of Los Angeles and Clifford Evans of Washington plan to take off from here early tomorrow on the last leg of their round-the-world flight in light monoplane. Bad weather grounded them yesterday and they postponed their hop to Teterboro, N.J., their starting point Aug. 9, until 5 a.m. tomorrow. They landed here Saturday and visited aviation pioneer Orville Wright yesterday.

MUTUAL AID PACT

Budapest, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Premier Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia and Premier Lajos Dinnyes of Hungary signed today a treaty of friendship and mutual military assistance.

Emergency Foreign Relief Nears Test Before House

Washington, Dec. 8.—(AP)—A plan to bar government payment of premium prices for relief supplies was advanced today as the emergency foreign aid bill approached a series of test ballots in the House. Backed by the Foreign Affairs Committee, one effect of the plan would be to prevent the government from buying Argentine wheat at a price higher than the American wheat price.

Chairman Eaton (R-NJ) told newsmen the committee would offer an amendment prohibiting government purchases either at home or abroad at a price above "prevailing prices in this country at the time of the purchases."

"For example," Eaton said, "it would prevent the government from buying wheat from Argentina at \$5 a bushel when it is lower than that in this country."

Communist-Sponsored French Walkout Fails

Paris, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor (CGT) suffered a sharp setback today when a two-day strike of Paris subway and bus workers, scheduled to begin this morning, apparently collapsed.

At the same time a five-day "warning strike" of government workers, called by the CGT in an attempt to pull approximately 1,000,000 civil servants off their jobs, was meeting with dubious success.

The strike started for some groups of government employees last Friday and was due to extend to all departments this morning, but government officials declared their offices were functioning normally. A spokesman for the Paris transport system said the subway and bus strike had been called off by the union because it was "a failure."

Headquarters of the CGT-affiliate which called the strike confirmed that it had been "annulled," but declined to give the reason. A few hours before the subway and bus strike was called, the government announced the arrest of nearly 1,000 persons in a nationwide campaign against sabotage in strike-crippled industries.

The interior ministry said that security police had made the arrests in the past eight days—about half of them Saturday and Sunday. "Some have been detained," he said. "Others have been fined and a few jailed."

Despite these measures scattered reports of alleged sabotage continued to come in. Among these incidents was the derailment of the Lyon-Paris express yesterday near Vaise, where a section of track was reported unbolted.

Moscow Plan At Work

Despite Brighter Outlook In France, Cold Fact Is That Two Million Are Striking On Communist Orders; Molotov's Knot-Tying; Trade Deals With The "Enemy"

The French cabinet, strengthened by the drastic new strike-control law, continued its determined counter-offensive over the weekend against Communist efforts to cause the downfall of the government and create a state of chaos to render the Marshall Plan unworkable.

Upon the outcome of this Moscow-directed Bolshevik assault depends in large degree not only the immediate fate of France but of all Western Europe.

Some 1,000 people charged with sabotage in connection with strikes have been arrested. Under the new law a penalty of ten years in prison can be assessed for sabotage, which is defined as any act that makes a piece of machinery cease to function. Armed police, who have been ordered to use their guns in self defense, appeared to have the upper hand in most parts of the country. Troops were on duty in critical areas.

So things were looking considerably brighter for the harassed government. However, the cold fact remained that more than 2,000,000 workers were striking under orders of their Communist-dominated national committee to "hold firm for the last quarter hour that will decide the victory." Opponents of foreign aid conceded of the House would pass a measure of some sort and the fight was over what shape it would take.

Chairman Leo Allen (R-Ill.) of the rules committee told a reporter there would be no more than 76 votes against the bill. The House has 494 members and one vacancy.

That final vote could come late today, but it is more probable sometime tomorrow. First, the House had to act on various amendments to raise or lower the \$300,000,000 total or tie restrictions to the assistance the bill would provide for France, Italy, Austria and China.

Allen himself is against the measure. But he said the vote against it might be no more than 50. And he has a reputation among his colleagues for unusual accuracy in predicting votes.

Fifty opposition votes is the top figure many Democrats are mentioning. Rep. Bloom (D-NY), senior Democrat on the Foreign Affairs Committee, predicted half that number. Rep. Jarmann (D-Ala.), another committee member, forecast 25 to 50.

Allen said he expected no substantial change in the bill's monetary total.

As the bill came from the Foreign Affairs Committee, it would authorize \$530,000,000 to carry France, Italy and Austria through the winter plus \$60,000,000 for China and boost the total for the three European nations to the full \$597,000,000 asked by the Administration and approved by the Senate.

Official reports that police in Communist-dominated Romania searched the homes and automobiles of United States diplomats and military officials were made public today by Senator Knowland (R-Calif.). He said he would tell the senate that "our diplomatic and military personnel has been pushed around" in violation of ordinary diplomatic courtesy.

Knowland told reporters he first learned of the incidents on an overseas European inspection trip and that a cable from the American minister in Romania, Rudolf E. Schoenfeld, confirmed these reports.

1. Romanian "secret police" twice searched the home of a captain attached to the American military staff despite protests of the captain that his wife was "expecting an infant" and could not be disturbed.

2. A car carrying an American flag and "Secretary Ferguson of the American Legation" was halted by five men, including a uniformed policeman, and Ferguson was questioned "at gun point" and then detained 30 minutes.

3. Homes of a sergeant and a lieutenant on the American military staff also were searched "by secret police."

Dutch and Indonesian representatives, meeting aboard the U. S. Army transport Remville, formally inaugurated today under United Nations offices an attempt to settle the long-drawn conflict in Indonesia by direct negotiations.

The initial meeting, which lasted approximately one hour, was devoted to formal speeches from all parties emphasizing the hope that good faith and good will would prevail. Tomorrow morning the negotiators will reassemble aboard the Remville—anchored in Batavia harbor—to come to grips with the problems facing them.

ARABS, JEWS MOBILIZE FOR FUTURE STRIFE

Arab League Members Meet In Cairo; Heavy Recruiting Continues

Jerusalem, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Eight Jews and an Arab died today in bitter, continuing communal strife over the partition of Palestine while both sides intensified mobilizations for the expected showdown.

Unofficial tallies show 90 persons have been killed in nine days in wrangles over the future of the country, which the British said they intended to quit as mandate power next May 15.

Five Jews were killed and a number of Arab stores and houses were set fire in a renewal of the fighting on the border between Jewish Tel Aviv and Arab Jaffa.

Numerous Jews and Arabs were wounded in sporadic exchanges of small arms fire in various parts of the country.

Sharing the spotlight with the situation in Palestine were developments in Cairo, where leaders of the seven member nations of the Arab League met to decide the steps they should take to prevent implementation of the partitioning plan.

Some observers thought that the meeting might fix a zero hour for a general Arab uprising throughout the Middle East.

Crowds of Arabs were reported lining up before "recruiting centers" in all Middle Eastern countries, and in Palestine the Jewish press called Jewish youths to register for security duty at registration place which will be opened tomorrow.

Irgun Zvai Leumi, extreme underground group, indicated that it was ready to unite with the more moderate Hagana in the event of an open Arab-Jewish war.

TRUMAN ENDS HIS VACATION

President Departs For Washington Aboard "Sacred Cow"

Key West, Fla., Dec. 8.—(AP)—President Truman ended a five-day Florida vacation today and departed at 10:30 a. m. (est) for Washington aboard his official plane to complete a message to congress on plans for long-range European recovery.

Refreshed and unshaken by five days of relaxation at his "Little White House" here, Mr. Truman appeared in excellent physical condition. He had shaken off the weariness displayed upon his arrival last Wednesday.

He swam in the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico, sunbathed on the beach, and even drove an automobile at a rapid clip from Everglades City to Naples, Fla. after a speech dedicating the Everglades National Park.

He departed from the Boca Chica naval air station aboard his DC-4, the "Sacred Cow," with Lt. Col. Henry T. (Hank) Myers of the Army Air Forces at the controls. Adm. William D. Leahy chief of staff, and other White House aides accompanied the chief executive.

His speech Saturday at Everglades City was largely devoted to the administration's natural resources conservation policy.

Molotov's Price For United German Economy Disclosed

Plan To Surrender Mandate On May 15

London, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Britain has informed the United Nations she intends to surrender her Palestine mandate May 15, government sources reported today.

The British suggested that independent Arab and Jewish states come into existence June 1, after a two-week transition period.

The same informants said the British government had authorized creation of Arab and Jewish civil guard organizations to maintain law and order in key Holy Land areas prior to gradual concentration of all British troops for evacuation "beachheads" around Gaza.

British troops are to be withdrawn from the Jewish areas of Tel Aviv, Petah Tikva and Ramat Gan this month, it was said.

Meanwhile this country's diplomatic representatives are continuing negotiations with Trans-Jordan to obtain units of the Arab Legion to police strategically-important parts of Arab Palestine, including oil pipeline and installation areas. Formations of the Arab Legion already are in the Holy Land.

It was emphasized that the British plan for handing over power to Arabs and Jews was subject to approval of the United Nations commission of five nations. This commission would set up the provisions for the transition period.

Production Shortages

Why We Have Shortages in Gasoline, Oil and Coal; Motorists May Be Asked To Reduce Pleasure Driving; Winter Demands; Needs Greater Than Ever Before

Washington, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Motorists may be asked shortly by the President to cut down voluntarily on pleasure driving to save gasoline.

This points up a national problem in oil and in coal, too. Here's an explanation which government officials give.

Take oil, first. Oil production this year is expected to reach a record high. Yet, it's not enough. The demand is greater than the supply.

Why? Several reasons. There's a shortage of tankers, pipe lines and tank cars to move oil around.

There's a shortage of the tools oil men need for searching out new fields and developing those they find.

And this shortage of tools is due to the shortage of steel to make the tools. The demand for steel also is greater than the supply.

The government expects some shortage of oil next year in states east of the Rockies.

Officials paint this picture: The demand for gasoline for farm work is almost double what it was before the war.

The demand for gasoline for motor cars and trucks is a lot higher than before the war.

Railroads have been using more and more diesel oil. The use of it

Wants \$10 Billions In Reparations And Repeal Of Economic Merger, British And U.S. Zones; Attacks Plans For Economic Revival Of Occupation Areas

London, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov today listed \$10,000,000,000 reparations and repeal of the economic merger of the British and American zones as the price of Soviet agreement to the economic unification of Germany.

Under western pressure, Molotov detailed Russia's demands on Germany for the first time since the foreign ministers' council convened November 25.

He coupled his reparations demand, a reiteration of previous Soviet figures, with an attack upon British-American plans for economic revival of their occupation areas. These, he said, were "aimed at the liquidation of Germany as an independent state."

The Soviet statement came after U. S. Secretary of State Marshall joined British and French representatives in a three-power meeting November 25.

Marshall saw British foreign secretary Ernest Bevin and France's Georges Bidault in what apparently was an effort to consolidate the western position prior to meeting this afternoon with Molotov.

Up to this point Marshall aides always have reported that he carefully avoided any evidence of behind-the-scenes collaboration among the three western powers.

Marshall saw Bevin and Bidault simultaneously, lending strong support to speculation that he disclosed to them the course he intends to follow today.

The meeting was held at the American embassy shortly after Marshall gave a reception for members of the American delegation.

American diplomats expressed the conviction that today's meeting would open a week of decision for the conference. Some said one session might be adequate to show whether there would be any chance of Russian-western agreement on Germany.

Molotov, however, apparently is ready with a new move of his own—a long-expected demand that a German delegation chosen by the communist-sponsored "German people's congress" in Berlin be given a hearing by the big four on its views on Germany's future.

There were signs that the U. N. itself would maintain a "hands off" attitude at the present time regarding the disturbances which have occurred in Palestine since adoption of the partition plan.

When Secretary General Trygve Lie was asked at his weekly press conference whether the U. N. had taken official notice of the outbreaks, his top Russian aide, Arkady A. Sobolev, took up the question.

U.S. Prosecutors Open Krupp War Crime Trial

Nuernberg, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The American prosecution today opened the war crimes trial of the House of Krupp, Germany's top gun makers for nearly 150 years, who are charged with having cooperated with the Nazis in waging aggressive war.

The Krupp combine, which supplied Kaiser Wilhelm and Chancellor Otto Bismarck with arms for their wars, also "assisted both with its money and its prestige in the establishment of Hitler's authority and dictatorship of the third Reich," Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, chief counsel for war crimes declared in the prosecution's opening statement.

Taylor asserted that Krupp "provided the third Reich with what is most needed to put its aggressive and warlike policies into effect and played a vital part in the waging of wars which inevitably followed."

The main Krupp defendant is Alfred Krupp Von Bohlen Und Halbach, head of the armament dynasty since 1943. His father, Gustav Krupp, will not be tried because he has been pronounced senile and ill.

Seven of the company's chief officials are also on trial.

"The utmost ruthlessness and disregard of international conventions came as naturally to Krupp as to the German war lords and political leaders of the third Reich," the prosecution asserted.

"The mines and factories of Austria and Alsace and the Ukraine were seized with as little compunction as the deported workers from France and Poland and Russia were enslaved and terrorized."

AWAIT ACTION ON HOLY LAND

UN Observers Interest In Strife Will Be Brought Up

Lake Success, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The chief interest at United Nations headquarters today was whether any member nation of the Security Council might initiate discussion of the current wave of violence in Palestine when the 11-nation council meets tomorrow afternoon.

Many U. N. observers expressed doubt that the Palestine question would receive any more than formal recognition when the council is convened for its scheduled 3 p.m. meeting. When the delegates meet for their first session since adjournment of the General Assembly on Nov. 29 they are slated to receive a routine U. N. communication notifying them of the assembly's decision to partition the Holy Land into separate Arab and Jewish countries.

The Negro, arrested by Moore, was identified as Cordell Williams, 33, who last summer earned the nickname "The Catman" after Wilmington police arrested him on a charge of burglary. Williams was acquitted of the burglary charge.

Detective Capt. L. A. Teague said Williams will be charged with robbing five white women.

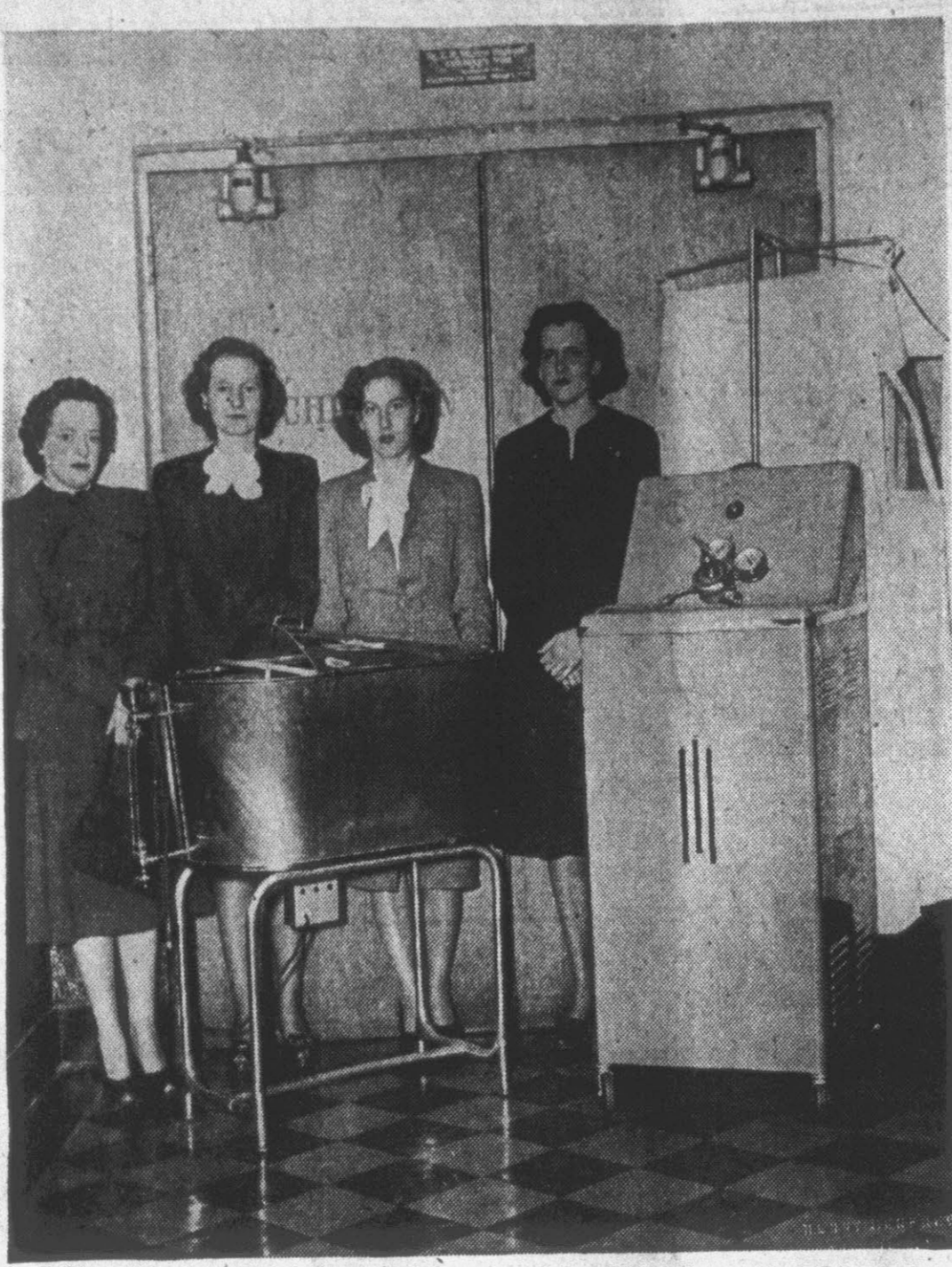

## Jr. Woman's Club Looks Back On Children's Wing At Hospital

The Greenville Junior Woman's Club voted in the Fall of 1944 to sponsor the Dance Revue of Mrs. Marie Smith Crute's dancing classes with the proceeds from the revue to be used for some charitable purpose. In March 1945, when plans and discussion for the dance revue were underway, the club members had to decide for what purpose the money was to be used. Dr. T. M. Watson, Greenville's beloved pediatrician, had just died and it was decided that the club would provide a memorial to him.

The club membership is composed largely of young mothers. Direct contacts with the baby doctor gave them first-hand knowledge of Dr. Watson's breadth of character, his interest in humanity and his ability to relieve the suffering of children and babies. Many suggestions and types of activities were considered. It was the thinking of the club membership that Dr. Watson's efforts and time were spent chiefly in two places—his office and the Pitt General Hospital. Since the Pitt General Hospital is operated as a community hospital, it was felt that a memorial of greatest magnitude could be sponsored by the redecorating and the furnishing of certain equipment which would add to the comfort of child patients. This activity is confined to one section of the second floor, formerly known as the Children's Ward. They named the undertaking, the Dr. T. M. Watson Memorial Children's Wing.

The Dance Revue proved to be an overwhelming success, and the club realized a profit of \$785.70 from this revue. With money in the Watson Memorial Fund, the ground work was laid for immediate beginning on the Memorial. The first work to be done on the Children's Wing was the painting of the walls and the many cribs in pastel shades of blue, pink and green. Several of the local furniture stores donated chairs for the wing. At the meeting of the Club on April 11, 1945, Mrs. T. M. Watson was guest of the Club. She presented the members of the Club a beautifully painted copy of Dr. Watson's purpose titled, "My Purpose 1920 On—So Help Me God," with the request that it be placed over the desk in the hall of the Chil-

**Says Cotton Is Most Logical Crop To Make Up For Leaf Acreage Cuts**

Raleigh, Dec. 5 — Cotton is "the most logical cash crop to help Pitt County farmers make up at least some of the approximate \$5,073,000 income loss they will suffer from the 26 percent blanket reduction in 1948 flue-cured tobacco acreage allotments," George T. Ashford, Red Springs, North Carolina, president of the Carolinas Ginners Association, declared today.

"Inventories of cotton are more depleted than in many a year," Ashford said "and less changeover in farming operations will be required to supplement next year's income loss if at least a part of the 12,390 acres idled in Pitt County by this reduction is planted to cotton."

"Also favorable to 1948 cotton producers are this year's successful experiments with insecticides to control pests and the raw cotton requirements of the 16 European nations seeking aid under the Marshall Plan. According to the United States Foreign Trade Division, if these requirements are met, total exports of all growths next year will be about 5,000,000 bales or 25 percent higher than this year."

North Carolina's chief cotton seed supply counties in the Piedmont section have been heavily damaged by adverse weather, Ashford said and our cotton farmers are now looking to Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia for their planting seed for the coming year.

"The harvesting season in these states," he added, "has been more favorable and if orders are placed early, sufficient seed can be obtained before planting time."

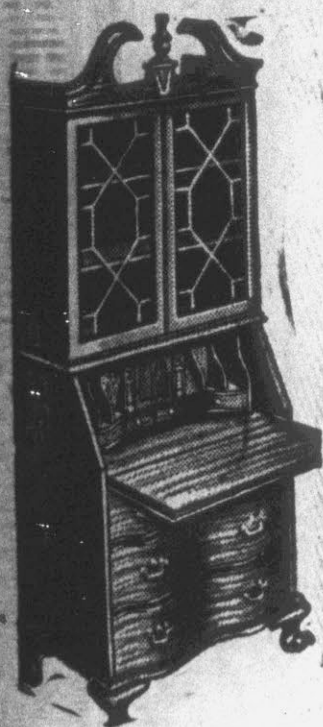

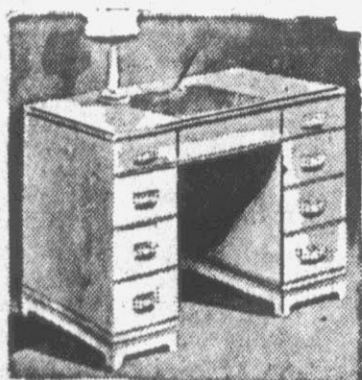

Of course those supplicants for Russian aid are in the position of not having the wherewithal to purchase necessities in the other available markets. It certainly is an ironic circumstance, however, that they should have to turn to the great power which openly is doing its utmost to bring them under its domination. Such transactions naturally cut both ways: They not only provide the purchasers with necessities but they strengthen the hand of the seller. This is uncomfortably reminiscent of the fact that U. S. traders sold Japan stores of war right up to the assault on Pearl Harbor. On the more cheerful side is the

report by John Foster Dulles, adviser to U. S. Secretary of State Marshall in the London conference, described the results of his trip as "most satisfactory," though he withheld details from publication.
