

SOLONS AGREE ON HANDLING U. S. EMPLOYEES

Claim Procedure In Loyalty Cases Justified; 'Must Not Take Chances'

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—A Republican and Democrat in Congress agreed today that drastic rules for handling cases of federal employees accused of disloyalty are justified because the government "must not take chances."

Reps. Bloom (D-NY) and Jonkman (R-Mich.) told a reporter that any doubtful cases must be decided in favor of the government and that secrecy is essential.

That was their reaction to the weekend announcement of policies and procedure for the government's Loyalty Review Board, headed by Seth W. Richardson.

Richardson, former assistant attorney general, said cases will be handled in strict secrecy and with no public hearings.

In many cases suspected employees can not be told who supplied information leading to investigations, he said. This is necessary, he added, to protect the sources of the investigation.

This means Richardson said that an accused employee will be able to examine his accusers' records.

Reps. Bloom and Jonkman reasoned along much the same line, as members of the House Affairs Committee, they have been interested in the cases of seven State Department employees who first were fired as "potential security risks" and later were permitted to resign.

"There was no mistake made in those seven department cases," the Michigan lawmaker said. "They had the goods on them. And, in any event, the government should be given the benefit of doubt. We can't afford to take a chance."

See Rationed Meat By Spring

Boston, Dec. 29—(AP)—Meat rationing by spring was held out today as a possibility by two New England Republican senators.

The senators, Tobey of New Hampshire and Flanders of Vermont, emphasized they did not like price controls but see no other way other than through rationing, to meet rising prices as far as meat is concerned.

Flanders told the American Economic Association in Chicago he had reached the "reluctant conclusion that we will have to institute statutory rationing" of meat.

Decision On Greek Policy Ahead For Administration

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—Important policy decisions on whether, and how, to step up American military aid to communist-threatened Greece are shaping up for the administration.

Under intensive State Department study for more than a month, the issue involves:

1. A proposal to divert to outright military purposes a still larger portion of the \$300,000,000 fund originally intended to be divided equally between bolstering the Greek army and shoring up the country's sagging economic system.
2. Whether to ask congress to pledge military backing to the Athens regime beyond the June 30 deadline for the current assistance venture—part of the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish program launched earlier this year.

Greece is one of the 16 western European countries looking to the so-called Marshall plan long range recovery help. But that multi-billion dollar project contemplates no outlays for arms.

Official sentiment is divided on the diverted funds by special action whether to ask congress to make up or rely for this on Greece's ultimate share in the Marshall plan.

The whole problem is due to be dumped into the hands of State Marshall's lap as soon as he returns from his holiday visit to Pinehurst, N. C. Marshall then will lay his recommendations before President Truman.

If what appears to be the prevailing State Department view is accepted, any move by Russia's Balkan satellites to recognize the new rump state proclaimed by the guerrillas will bring early American action to bulwark the Greek army.

The administration is in a position to act promptly so long as funds remain from the Greek-Turkish program. Congress left it to the administration to decide how to split the money between economic and military uses. Already \$90,000,000 of the \$150,000,000 originally earmarked for economic aid has been shifted to buy supplies and equipment for the Greek army.

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NEW YORK IS NEAR NORMAL AFTER SNOWS

City Digs Out From Under White Blanket; Transportation Still Problem

New York, Dec. 29—(AP)—The metropolitan area's transportation facilities faced their major test today as hundreds of thousands of commuters, headed back to work and millions of city dwellers trudged through a record blanket of snow that had been lightened by more than 72 hours' exhausting efforts.

Travel conditions were greatly improved, with railroads reporting service near normal.

A majority of principal traffic arteries were well-cleared, but icy pavements hampered travel, and city streets and outlying sections still were covered.

All subway lines were operating normally, but bus and trolley lines still were crippled in many places.

The snow removal force in the city was expected to be swelled to 20,000 men and more than 2,000 pieces of apparatus today.

Mayor William O'Dwyer made a radio appeal last night for all able-bodied men to help "get 90,000 tons of snow off the streets" of the city.

Sixty-seven deaths were attributed to the storm which swept the northeast states from Maine to the District of Columbia on Friday, laying a blanket of 25.8 inches on New York City, almost five inches more than the fall in the blizzard of 1888.

Unofficial estimates of the cost of snow removal in the city ranged from \$3,000,000 to \$7,000,000.

The problems of the railroads were increased by the homeward trek of Christmas holiday travelers.

There was an increase in flight schedules as runways at La Guardia Field were cleared slowly, but full-scale operations were reported days off.

Shortages of fuel oil were reported, but officials said no fuel famine was in sight because roads were being cleared.

Planes, Ships Seek Victims Of Giant Typhoon

Manila, Dec. 29—(AP)—Planes and ships searched today for 33 crewmen and one passenger from the Danish motorship Kina, which sank Christmas night in a typhoon off Samar Island of the central Philippines.

Twenty-nine others were rescued and the body of the ship's engineer was recovered.

An earthquake on the east coast of Luzon added to the tremendous toll of the typhoon, described as the worst in 42 years. The mayor of Mauban reported the quake coupled with huge sea waves, destroyed half the town.

There were 15 casualties among its 15,000 residents, however. (Radio amateurs, in reports reaching San Francisco, said total damage in the Philippines would approximate nearly \$10,000,000, including an estimated \$500,000 at Clark Field U. S. air base north of Manila.)

Mauban, estimating its damage at \$400,000, was one of scores of towns in which the terrific winds smashed lightly built, postwar housing and business buildings.

Death Takes One-Time Italian King Emanuele

Alexandria, Egypt, Dec. 29—(AP)—Vittorio Emanuele III, 78, the diminutive king whose 20 years of servile rule to Benito Mussolini led to the downfall of the House of Savoy and nearly brought about the ruin of Italy, died in exile yesterday of pneumonia at his Alexandria villa.

Bona, tall, 74-year-old wife of the former ruler was at his bedside when death came.

The former king was stricken with double pneumonia Wednesday while preparing to celebrate Christmas with his family.

Vittorio Emanuele, esteemed by his people after World War I, came under the domination of Mussolini in 1922 when the latter marched on Rome and the king summoned him to form a cabinet.

At the time Marshal Pietro Badoglio was reported to have asked the king to give him a few regiments to smash the Black Shirts uprising, but was turned down because the king wanted to avoid bloodshed.

During the ensuing years the five-foot-three monarch signed a long series of Fascist decrees Mussolini placed before him.

The picture finally changed in July 1943, when Allied victories in the Mediterranean theater showed Italy's true weakness and Vittorio Emanuele played a major role in unseating the dictator to whom he had played yes-man for so many years.

When finally he found asylum with the Allies Vittorio Emanuele denounced Mussolini and Hitler.

The Italians remembered too keenly his previous loyalties, however, and called for his abdication.

Truman's Physician On List Speculators

Gen. Graham And Gov. Maw, Of Utah, Included Among 99 Public Officials Listed By Secretary Of Agriculture

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, President Truman's personal physician, and Gov. H. B. Maw of Utah were among 99 public officials named by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson today as speculating in grain last September.

The 99 included 80 federal government employees, counting military officers as federal employees. The others were for state or local governments.

Charles G. Ross, presidential press secretary, said there would be no comment from the White House itself.

Maw, a Democrat, is now in the third year of a four-year term as governor of Utah.

Graham was reported to have held 30,000 bushels of wheat on the "long" side of the market and 20,000 bushels on the short side on September 17.

He also was reported to have sold 10,000 bushels on September 19.

Governor Maw was listed as having held 5,000 bushels on the long side of the market on September 17 and to have sold the same amount on September 18.

Those on the "long" side of the market believe prices will go higher and accordingly buy grain for future delivery. Those on the "short" side believe prices will go down. They sell for future delivery, hoping to gain by a price decline.

Today's list of traders is the third released by the department under congressional instructions growing out of charges that Harold E. Stassen, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, and others had "profiting by speculation in commodities."

Speculation is entirely legal, but President Truman has spoken out sharply against "gambling" in grain, contending it has run up prices. Some commodity exchange men dispute the President's view that speculation increases prices.

SPLIT AMONG ZION LEADERS

Internal Rift In Jewish Agency Over Western Leadership

Jerusalem, Dec. 29—(AP)—The Jewish agency, cornerstone of the fight for an independent Jewish state, appeared today to be facing the possibility of a serious split over the question of future relations with Soviet Russia and her satellites.

Differences within the agency were revealed yesterday when Dr. Moshe Shohat resigned his post as a member of the agency executive and announced his intention of forming a "popular opposition" group.

Shohat said flatly that the agency had been inclined to lean too much toward the western powers and that he believed it had been neglecting its relations with the eastern bloc.

The immediate cause of Shohat's resignation was an agency order directing that for the time being no more refugee ships could sail from Black Sea ports, where thousands of Jewish refugees are reported awaiting shipment to Palestine in defiance of British immigration restrictions.

Unofficial informants said the agency had acted under pressure from London and Washington, which were represented as anxious to prevent further illegal immigration in the light of the tense situation already existing in Palestine.

Red Attackers Drive Nearer City Of Mukden

Nanking, Dec. 29—(AP)—Artillery fire was heard in besieged Mukden as one Communist force penetrated to within 12 miles of the big Manchurian city, the newspaper Hsin Min Pao reported today. It was one of the strongest frontal attacks of the current campaign.

The dispatch, first received from Hsin Min Pao's Mukden correspondent, said censorship was imposed Friday, said 20,000 Communists pushed into a government position 15 miles west of Mukden, and one column advanced three miles farther under cover of heavy artillery fire.

Nightlong shelling of areas only a few miles from the city was said to have caused as National troops hurried back the most advanced Red units.

There were rumors in Nanking that Communists had made air attacks on Mukden, but a military spokesman said the rumors were false.

Prominent N.C. Textiler Dies

Belmont, N.C., Dec. 29—(AP)—A. C. Linberger, Sr., prominent North Carolina textile manufacturer, died at his home here today following several days of critical illness.

The 89-year-old cotton textile manufacturer was stricken last Tuesday.

Linberger was a pioneer in the southeast's cotton textile industry and during a period of about a half-century he built mostly around Belmont a chain of a dozen fine-yarn spinning mills and various other plants which combine to represent an industrial romance.

Report Russians Still In Trouble

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—Confidential reports to the State Department from the American embassy in Moscow tell of continued shortages and increasing prices after the Soviet abandonment of rationing, government officials said today.

Summarizing conditions at the end of the last few days of December, the cables report long queues of Soviet citizens before food shops.

President Promises His Signature But Brands Measure As "Pitifully Inadequate" To Deal With "Grave Peril" Confronting Nation's Economy

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—President Truman promised to sign into law today the Republican anti-inflation bill, but he branded it as "pitifully inadequate" to deal with the "grave peril" confronting the nation's economy.

Several key Republicans struck back with angry words of their own in defense of the voluntary steps which form the backbone of the GOP measure.

Thus the high cost of living and how to bring it down stizzled as the major political issue to start off the 1948 election year.

Mr. Truman took the unusual course of issuing Sunday statements to announce his decision and to declare that if Congress does not give him better weapons to fight inflation the country may face a "serious depression."

He left the actual signing until today, at an hour which the White House did not specify. The measure becomes effective immediately once it is signed.

The first official action to carry out its provisions appeared likely to be an order to distillers to hold their grain consumption to 2,500,000 bushels a month during the five weeks the bill revives Mr. Truman's wartime powers over whiskey making.

A 90-day voluntary distilling program came to an end Christmas Eve with the government and major distillers at odds over a new conservation program.

The bill also extends the President's controls over exports and railroad transportation and provides for voluntary food programs. It does not give him the standby price-wage control and rationing powers he asked for in his 10-point program laid before the special session.

Hence Mr. Truman said he was acting "reluctantly" and with a "sense of deep disappointment" that the Congress has seen fit to take such feeble steps toward the control of inflation.

Centering his fire on the bill's provisions for voluntary agreements in industry, business and agriculture to share scarce materials without incurring the risk of anti-trust prosecution, the Chief Executive declared:

"It is far too late in the fight against inflation to place our reliance upon voluntary action."

"This bill fails to include the key measures which are essential to an effective anti-inflation program," Mr. Truman asserted.

"This bill will not reduce the high cost of living, and it will not keep prices from going even higher."

Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.), who sponsored the measure along with Senator Taft (R-Ohio), shot back that if living costs are not brought down "the fault will be that of the President and not of Congress."

'Terrible Error' By Distillery

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—About 3,600 half pint bottles bearing the label of a nationally-advertised whiskey sent here for the holiday trade turned out to contain nothing more stimulating than water.

The local Alcoholic Beverage Control board was notified when horrified customers made the discovery. Chairman Alan W. Payne said the distributor recalled the bogus whiskey remaining in hands of wholesalers and retailers.

Marshall Plan Outline

The First Of Three Stories Explaining The Marshall Plan, What It Is, How It Started, And What It Is Supposed To Do; You'll Hear A Lot About This

Washington, Dec. 29—(AP)—A great deal has been said about the Marshall Plan in the past six months.

And more will be said in the coming months, for Congress starts on the plan when it comes back to work January 6.

Unless you know the background, you'll be dizzy when the fighting gets under way in Congress.

So here, in three stories, is an outline of the plan: how it started, why, what it is supposed to do.

Since Germany's surrender, this country has tried to help the countries of Europe recover.

We have given some help to one country, some to another. It was done on a piecemeal basis without any general plan.

By last spring it became clear that Europe not only was not recovering but would need a lot more help for a long time.

But what could we do to make our help count? Continue giving on a piecemeal basis? That did not seem to be the answer.

Congress was sure to object to this kind of aid which was using up our own strength without getting any return for it.

So on June 5 Secretary of State Marshall came up with a suggestion. In brief, this is what he told the countries of Europe:

1. We'll help you all we can if—

2. You work out some plan for helping yourselves recover and then tell us how much added help you need from us.

That was not an unselfish offer. Marshall and this government had three good reasons for the suggestion, as President Truman later explained.

They were:

1. Humanitarian—to help human beings, the people of Europe, get out of their jam.

2. Economic—to help Europe become prosperous again. This would help our prosperity later through foreign trade.

3. Political—to keep Europe from turning Communist. If the countries there became too weak, they might turn to Communism as a last resort.

Shortly after Secretary Marshall made his offer, the European Communists said they would do all they could to wreck the plan.

Russia, and the countries under Russia's thumb, refused to have anything to do with Marshall's idea.

But 16 European nations, most of them in Western Europe, snatched at Marshall's offer. Those 16 were: Austria, Belgium, Britain, Denmark, France, Greece, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Sweden.

Tale Of Appeasement

Death Of The One-Time Italian King Is A Moral Pointing To Dangers Of Appeasement; Emanuele's Reign Ended When He Acceded To Demands By Mussolini

Little Vittorio Emanuele, one time king of Italy, has died in Alexandria, Egypt, an exile from the land he ruled for nearly half a century—historic years in which fortune dealt with him bountifully until she finally abandoned him as a failure in his stewardship.

There is a moral to the story of any man's life, and the moral of Emanuele's tragedy is that he brought about his own downfall by trying to combat a great evil with appeasement. Instead of fighting Mussolini's totalitarianism, he tried to appease it.

In 1922, the monarchist ruler of Italy, he was crowned king. He followed the advice of his ministers and handed power to the Fascist leader.

That act of appeasement to all intents ended the king's reign and saddled his country with a merciless police government which was answerable to one man—Mussolini. It set a free and happy people to glancing fearfully over their shoulders before they dared converse in public. It clamped on a fierce dictatorial restraint, and made the once smiling Italy a land of dread. I saw that rule in action.

Out of the weak king's appeasement grew a horrid regime of aggression. The arrogant, bloody-minded Mussolini seized helpless Ethiopia by force, grabbed tiny Albania, and otherwise extended the imperial

powers which were food and drink to his vanity.

But the evil didn't end with Italy and Mussolini. Hitler drew much of his inspiration for totalitarian ruthlessness from Mussolini's success. What if Duce could do the mighty fervent appeasement by despite fervent appeasement by British Prime Minister Chamberlain and others. Totalitarian ideas, both Nazi and Fascist, took root in other countries until many were suffering from the malady.

Finally the World War developed on the vine which grew from the seed of appeasement, and the whole globe was torn with conflict between democracy and totalitarianism. At an awful cost, Nazism and Fascism were smashed and the democracies thought they had won this titanic battle against totalitarianism—but not so.

What many observers regard as a far more dangerous form of the ism has taken over where Hitler and Mussolini left off—communism. It is an insidious, powerfully organized force which has penetrated to virtually every nook and cranny of our globe. It finally has abandoned the underground and has declared open war against the democracies. Battles are raging in many fields, but the chief conflict of the

Christian Science Home Dedicated Sunday Morning

At the regular service, 11 o'clock on Sunday morning, December 28, Christian Science Society, Greenville, dedicated its church edifice, 1006 Dickinson Avenue. The occasion was marked by the reading of a short history of the organization. Since Christian Science churches achieve dedication only when completely cleared of debt, the First Reader, Mrs. Lucille Tripp, prefaced this account by saying, "With joy and gratitude, the society announces this edifice to be free of debt." She continued:

"Thus we reach the culmination of a history that began in 1889. At that time a young lady who had been studying voice in Boston brought to Greenville the first copy of "Science and Health" ever to arrive here. Her sister became a student. A little later, a neighbor, who supposedly was on her death-bed, read the book, arose healed, and proceeded to thirty years of glorious ministry as a practitioner of Christian Science. Members of her family joined her in the study. "The little band would convene every Sunday in the first student's home, to read the Lesson-Sermon. On this lady's departure from the town, the practitioner gathered the attendants in her own home. The congregation having increased, though, and wishing to follow as closely as possible the order of services given in "The Manual of the Mother Church," the group transferred to a larger residence, where a piano was available. Collections were taken, and regular contributions were made to the lecture funds of nearby churches and to the North Carolina Committee on Publication. However, the Sunday School was not organized till 1933.

"Within a year of that step, the company progressed to Fythian Street, 317 Evans Street, and held the first service there on Easter, 1934; and in March, 1935, the Mother Church recognized the society as a branch. More suitable quarters were secured two years later, at the Woman's Club. It is noteworthy that the club building stands on the site of the first student's home, the birthplace of interest in Science here.

"Shortly afterwards came the opportunity to buy the edifice formerly occupied by the Universalists, 1006 Dickinson Avenue, since that denomination had disappeared from Greenville. The Universalist authorities of this district expressed great cordiality and allowed most liberal terms. The first service in this building occurred on December 12, 1937, the subject of the Lesson-Sermon being "God the Preserver of Man."

"The society promptly instituted Wednesday evening meetings that included testimonies of healing through Christian Science. On May 21, 1938, in the auditorium of Pitt County Courthouse, Greenville's first free public lecture on Christian Science was presented. A reading room and lending library, in the church building, opened on January 6, 1938.

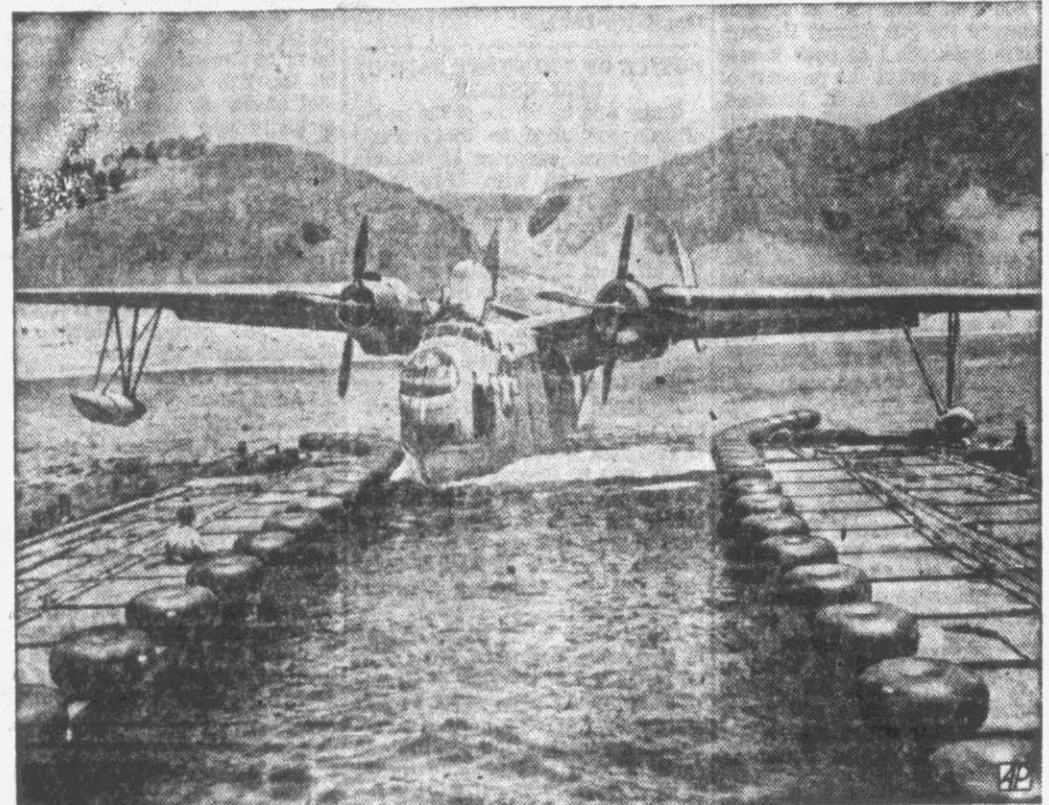
"Aided by a grant from the trustees under the will of Mary Baker Eddy, the members finished paying for the edifice in 1945. "Now in thankful acknowledgment that, as Mrs. Eddy tells us on page 494 of "Science and Health," "Divine Love always has met and always will meet every human need," we consecrate this building to the advancement of the Cause of Christian Science, to the blessing of man, and to the worship of God."

Wallace Nears Hour Of Decision On Third Party

Washington, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace comes to his hour of decision tonight, with Democratic leaders hoping that if he elects to head a third party he will pull no punches in his criticism of President Truman.

The view of these Democratic strategists is that a Wallace campaign on a "peace" ticket would react to the President's benefit if the former vice president displays publicly the bitter feelings he is reported to hold against Mr. Truman for kicking him out of his cabinet.

Latest reports to the Democratic high command are that Wallace will make the leap into the presidential race in his radio speech from Chicago at 10:30 p.m. (EST), contending that both major parties have become "war" parties and that the only road to peace lies in developing a new policy toward Soviet Russia.

Republicans, confident that Wallace can command some so-called left-wing votes which otherwise would go to Mr. Truman, would welcome his entry.

Meanwhile in New York, differences of opinion on the staff of New Republic Magazine over its connection with the political future of Wallace its editor, have been highlighted by the resignation of William Harlan Hale, editor in charge of articles.

Hale, novelist, historian and New Deal Democrat, said yesterday he had mailed his resignation to Michael Straight, publisher.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington — Numa, the second
king of Rome according to leg-
endary history, is supposed to have
started all this New Year's business.
He set aside the day in honor of
the god Janus, for whom Julius
Caesar named the month of Janu-
ary. Tacitus mentioned New
Year's in the first century, but it
was first referred to as a Chris-
tian festival about the year 567.

Numa had a good idea. He or-
dained that the day should be ob-
served as a day of good humor
and good fellowship, that all grudges
and hard feelings were to be for-
gotten. Trouble nowadays is
that some people get started on
their celebrating too early, spend
the day nursing headaches.

On this day too Numa decreed
that sacrifices of cake, wine and
incense were to be made to the
two-faced god who looked backward
and forward.

Through the years the date of
New Year's day itself has varied
among different nations. Among
the Egyptians, Chinese, Jews and
Romans it has been observed on
dates varying from Mar. 1 to Dec.
25.

It was the 16th century before
Jan. 1 was universally accepted as
New Year's day by the Romans.
Nations such as Russia and Greece
observed it some 13 days later than
those who reckoned time Julius
Caesar's way.

Thousands of years ago, in an-
cient Egypt, the year began with
the over-flowing of the Nile, which
generally occurred sometime around
the middle of June.

The 21st of December was New
Year's day in Anglo-Saxon England
until William the Conqueror changed
it to Jan. 1.

The Romans used to give gifts
at New Year's. Legend has it that
Augustus Caesar had a vision in
which he saw himself receiving
gifts right and left from the Senate
and people thereabouts.

When Queen Elizabeth ruled Eng-
land there was a special ceremony
at court on New Year's for ex-
changing gifts. Historians claim
that practically all of the Queen's
wearing apparel and jewels came
to her at this time.

The English celebrants of New
Year's have what they call a "was-
sail bowl" in which a drink called
"lamb's wool" is blended and han-
ded around to family and friends.
Each person wishes the other "Wass
Hail" which means "to your
health."

Odd customs mark the observance
of New Year's day in some coun-
tries, even in these times.

One of the most widespread of
all New Year's superstitions is that
concerning the "first footer." The
type of person first setting foot
across the door sill on New Year's
day is considered by many as highly
important.

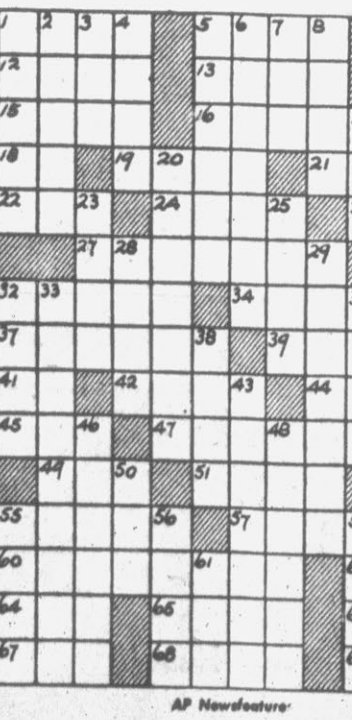

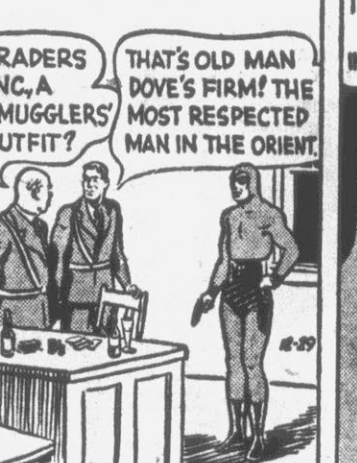

Drivers Licenses For Motorists Whose Names Start With A And B Expire Jan. 1

By CHESTER WALSH
Motorists whose names begin with the first two letters of the alphabet—A and B—who have not appeared before the State Highway Safety Division's license examiner at the City Hall before January 1 will find that beginning on that date their drivers' licenses have expired.

Those who did not procure new license will be subject to arrest on the streets and highways of the state.

The last General Assembly passed a law requiring that all motorists in the state pass examinations for drivers' licenses.

The statute also provided that motorists whose names start with A and B secure new licenses before the end of 1947.

Those whose names start with A and B may pass the examination after January 1, but they are liable to arrest for not having proper driver's licenses after January 1.

Beginning January 1, motorists whose names start with the letters C and D, and so on, until all motor vehicle drivers will have gotten new drivers' licenses. This project will

require several years. The state law requires motorists to display 1948 license tags by not later than January 31.

Beginning about January 17, the State Highway Safety Division will begin to inspect motor vehicles here to make the highways safer.

Western Sheriff Straightens Out Young Family

Kingfisher, Okla., Dec. 29 (AP)—A tender-hearted western sheriff hoped today hearts are as big in Welch, West Virginia, as they sometimes can be in Oklahoma.

It will mean all the difference in the life of a young man, his wife and two tiny children, Sheriff Francis H. Perdue of Kingfisher County believes.

The sheriff himself has invested in the proposition. The young man is 24-year-old Frank C. Pence, who pleaded guilty last Wednesday to pilfering a Kingfisher ten-cent store. His wife and babies were destitute, he said, and he needed money to buy them food. After Pence's arrest Dec. 17 Sheriff Perdue located Mrs. Pence with the two children, 10 months and three years, and found them literally penniless and without a place to stay.

He moved them into a small hotel and supported them there until after the trial. He won over the store manager, and explained things to District Judge Tom R. Blaine. In the end, a four-year sentence for second-degree burglary was handed down and suspended.

That was Christmas Eve. To console the mother and children the sheriff set up a Christmas tree in the small hotel room, passed out cakes and candies, and gave the three-year-old a red tricycle.

Relatives in Welch were contacted, a job for Pence lined up Friday Sheriff Perdue and the Red Cross got the family bus tickets back east. At the station, the sheriff gave Pence a fatherly sermon—

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First Exchange Of Reparations Eastern Zone

Paris, Dec. 29 (AP)—Almost 60,000 tons of wheat, wood, and motor fuel in reparations from eastern Germany have been made available for the first time by Soviet occupation authorities and were allotted to ten countries today, the French foreign ministry announced.

The announcement said the allotments were made at the 14th session of the assembly of the inter-allied reparations agency.

Beneficiaries will be the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Holland, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Egypt and India.

The reparations represented the first time Russia had carried out her part of the Potsdam agreement on exchanges of reparations from western and eastern Germany, an official said.

WOMAN DIES SUDDENLY
Coroner G. H. Rouse today reported that Mary Armfield 53, colored, died Sunday morning from natural causes.

The deceased lived near Bell Arthur, and had been suffering from heart trouble and tuberculosis for a number of years.

No inquest will be conducted, said the coroner.

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
