Republican Solons Hit High Budget

Democrats Defend 'Realistic' Program; Defense Funds Supported

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Republicans ripped into President Truman's \$39,669,000,000 budget today as "extravagant" and "political" while Democrats defended it as "reasonable," considering problems at home and commitments abroad.

But even among critical Republicans there was clear indication that the President's request for \$11,000,000,000 for the armed forces has widespread support.

Chairman Bridges (R-NH) of the Senate Appropriations Committee said the President had presented "an extravagant program beyond the means of the nation to meet this year."

"He has played politics in an attempt to make the budget appear as an economy measure," Bridges declared in a statement. "But no politics, however stated, can avoid the fact that he is suggesting an increase of \$2,000,000,000 in federal spending at a time when the security and well-being of the nation demand reduced expenditures."

Bridges said he regards the proposed expenditures for defense as "realistic even though the sums will appear staggering to many Americans." But he promised that these items will be "reviewed most carefully."

Senator Lucas of Illinois, who as the Democratic whip is an assistant floor leader, said that while he regrets "the necessity to have such a large budget" he is "encouraged to know that once again we can balance the budget and have a surplus to apply on the national debt. Lucas said he hopes expenditures can be cut some, without "crippling the national defense—involving our foreign policy."

Senator Brooks (R-Ill.) told a reporter he thinks the \$7,000,000,000 in new foreign expenditures proposed by the President can be cut, although he declined to estimate how much. As for Mr. Truman's proposal to spend nearly \$2,000,000,000 more money than in the current year, Brooks said:

"Any substantial increase in the budget ultimately will increase taxes, increase the cost of money, competing for commodities in this country, create further scarcities and boost prices."

Individual Stake Reaches \$270

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Your personal stake in the high cost of government will be \$270 in the new fiscal year if you are an average American.

This is the cost per man woman and child of running the nation's business at home and overseas, as shown today by a statement released by President Truman's budget for the year starting next July 1.

The cost was only \$69.15 per American ten years before—in fiscal 1938, which ended just before war broke out in Europe.

Funeral Ship Abandoned And Burning In Atlantic

New York, Jan. 12.—(AP)—The U. S. Army transport Joseph V. Connelley, carrying about 5,000 empty cases, was abandoned and abandoned 900 miles east of New York early today.

Army sources here said rescue of 44 men who had taken to lifeboats appeared imminent.

The S.S. Morrison R. Waite, one of several ships steaming to the rescue, reported it was ten miles away at 6:30 a. m. (EST), two hours after the Connelley's first call for immediate help was intercepted here.

The fire, which started in the engine room, was spreading but the extent was not known here because the ship's radio went out of commission before the Connelley was abandoned, the Coast Guard said.

The ship, commanded by a Captain Bostelman, carried a crew of 42 and an Army officer passenger. It was reported by Maj. Anthony J. Lawrence, duty officer at the Army's New York Port of Embarkation.

The 422-foot, 1,176 gross-ton Connelley first radioed that it was adrift and out of control in the Atlantic. The message was intercepted by Radiomarine Corporation of America.

The Army and Coast Guard cooperated in directing ships to the rescue.

The Connelley, which brought 6,248 war dead—the first World War II dead to be returned from Europe—

Single Individual For ERP Is Urged

Sec. Marshall Before House Foreign Affairs Committee Says One-Man Administrator Would Be More Business-Like

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall told House members today a "business like" administration of the proposed European aid program is important, and the way to get it is to put it under a single individual.

Marshall testified before the House Foreign Affairs Committee where considerable sentiment has developed for an eight-member administrative board. Those backing this idea say it would mean a "business like" administration.

Both President Truman and Secretary Marshall want a single administrator who would be responsible to the secretary of state on matters of foreign policy.

As he did when testifying before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee last week, Marshall urged that Congress authorize a European

aid program adequate to provide "genuine recovery."

He said "the time for relief programs is past," and added: "If we do not move out to meet the problem in Europe today it will certainly come to us here in the United States under conditions far more unfavorable to us."

The Administration is asking Congress to authorize a four-year program of aid for Europe's economic recovery and to vote \$8,800,000,000 for the first 15 months of the program. The amount of later spending would be up to the Congresses of the future.

Some influential Republicans are talking of cutting the \$8,800,000,000 figure in half.

Stassen Renews His Attack On Ed Pauley

Challenges Right To Government Job; Sen. Thomas Offers His Books To Commodity Trading Investigators

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Harold E. Stassen challenged Edwin W. Pauley's right to his job as assistant to the secretary of the army today after Pauley told of making \$923,703 in commodity speculations.

Stassen, candidate for the GOP presidential nomination, called on President Truman to say whether "a man who has admitted under investigation" such profits "by speculating since the war in increased prices of food and commodities" belongs in his position.

Pauley made known his profits in a telegram last night to Stassen, whose charges of market profiteering by government "insiders" touched off a congressional investigation of commodity dealings by public employees. Pauley accused the former Minnesota governor of making "false statements."

Attention of investigating senators was drawn today to commodity trading by Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) who was reported to have offered his books to them. An official of the committee said that Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.), chairman of the subcommittee conducting the inquiry, accepted Thomas' offer.

Pauley said the profits he announced were made during the last three years.

He told Stassen he would "expose" him if the former Minnesota governor returns to testify before the senate appropriations subcommittee looking into Stassen's accusations that government "insiders" profited in commodity dealings.

Analyst Views With Relief That Rumors Of Stalin's Death Are Strongly Denied; Dangers Of A Rash Successor; Stalin Seeking All He Can Get Short Of War

Moscow denies rumors that Premier Stalin is dead, but one suspects, he received with relief in the capitals of the Western democracies against which the Soviet leader is directing the Communist assault.

I quite realize that such a statement seems to contain conflicting thoughts—and I could be wrong in my viewpoint. However, it strikes me that we are dealing with an idea which at first blush seems absurd and yet actually is correct—ishort, with a first class paradox.

My reasoning is this: The conflict between the Russian bloc and the Western powers is in such a dangerous state that a bad mistake could produce another world war. Both sides recognize this and are proceeding with care because neither wants to see a third global upheaval. Thus so long as steady hands remain in control in each camp, the likelihood of a major explosion in the near future isn't great.

Well, now Stalin's word is supreme and final in Russia. For more than a score of years his policies have dominated both home affairs and foreign relations, including the handling of the Bolshevik Revolution for the spread of Communism. His foreign policy, while

going to full limit of daring in the interest of Soviet expansion, apparently has been aimed at avoiding major warfare.

So if Stalin's control suddenly were removed, and affairs were placed in charge of less dominant and shrewd men, a disastrous situation could arise. For example, an over-ambitious decision in Moscow regarding the fiery Balkan situation might Vouch off the powder keg—and that's only one of many ones which are on the danger list.

No, I think that right now Western diplomacy would prefer to see Stalin at the wheel in Moscow and this despite the fact that he probably is regarded generally by opponents as being the most dangerous man ever pitted against our way of life. It isn't that democracy loves Stalin the more but that it likes the idea of possible hot-headed instability in Moscow the less.

First Auto Inspected Given O.K.

Twenty-Four Of 37 Cars Certified; 12 Are Rejected; One Comes Back

The first automobile, a 1946 two-door Pontiac sedan, to be inspected by the Mechanical Division of the Department of Motor Vehicles at the "safety lane" here today was owned by H. B. Callum, 1408 Chestnut street. It passed inspection with flying colors, Supervisor Walter Dail, in charge of the station, said.

At 10:30 a. m. 37 cars had been inspected. Twenty-four passed the inspection and were given certificate stickers. Twelve were rejected for various defects.

The owner of one of the rejected cars, M. T. Stocks of near Winterville, turned down for defective steering gear, had repairs made and promptly returned to the "safety lane" for another inspection. The supervisor gave him an "O.K." sticker for his windshield.

The inspectors estimate that they will be able to inspect about 150 cars daily if motorists will cooperate by doing several simple things before going up for inspection:

1. Clean off the serial and motor numbers so the inspectors can quickly read them.

2. Have your registration certificate, driver's license and a dollar bill for the inspection fee in your hand ready for the inspector.

This will considerably speed up inspections and the vehicles will move along as on an assembly line and save a lot of time for inspectors and motorists, Supervisor Dail said.

The inspection lane is on Broad street, between Center and Long streets. Vehicles should enter from Dickinson Avenue.

Owners of rejected vehicles are told what repairs are needed and are required to return for another inspection. Those who fail to make repairs are liable to arrest.

Another Battle Shaping Up In Northern Greece

Athens, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Dispatches in Athens newspapers said today that movements of a large force of guerrillas and a number of army units were under way in northwest Greece south of the Albanian border, indicating that a major encounter was shaping up.

The dispatches said a force of between 1500 and 2000 guerrillas, who had withdrawn from Konitsa, was skirmishing near the frontier. It was reported that the insurgents used mortars and artillery.

Earlier reports said 200 guerrillas crossed the Yugoslav border and attacked the Greek frontier town of Idomeni. Some 20 houses were reported to have been burned and seven gendarmes wounded. The guerrillas took five hostages and retreated into Yugoslavia, the advices said.

Court Will Rule On Rent Control

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today agreed to rule on the legality of rent controls in peacetime.

The tribunal granted a Justice Department request that it review a decision by Federal Judge Paul Jones in U. S. District Court in Cleveland that the 1947 rent control act is unconstitutional.

Judge Jones said Congress cannot control rents under its war powers because the country is now, "in peacetime."

The informant said the move was the oft-rumored exodus from Berlin to the friendlier American zone. They said some remnants of military government would remain in the capital in order to avoid an impression that the U. S. Britain and France have ceased trying to reach some accord with the Russians.

Outlines Plan Calling For \$39,669,000,000 Expenditure During Next Fiscal Year; Nearly Four-Fifths Of Estimate Represents Aftermath Of War Says Truman

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—President Truman fired an unprecedented peacetime budget of \$39,669,000,000 at Congress today to meet "the realities of our existing international and domestic requirements" during the 1949 fiscal year beginning July 1.

He told the hostile Republican Congress nearly four-fifths of the spending estimate represents the aftermath of World War II and efforts to head off World War III.

Although it exceeds by \$2,000,000,000 his budget request for the current year, Mr. Truman declared its preparation was governed by "rigid standards of operating economy" in the government.

"The plain fact is," he said in his accompanying message, "that our budget must remain high until we have met our international responsibilities and can see the way clear to a peaceful and prosperous world."

In an obvious reference to the hoped-for effect of foreign aid in curbing the spread of Communism, Mr. Truman said:

"Should failure of these programs result in a further extension of totalitarian rule, we would have to reexamine our security position and take whatever steps might be necessary to prevent a future war."

Mr. Truman declared that 79 per cent of the expenditures he proposed "directly reflect the costs of war, the effects of war, and our efforts to prevent a future war."

In this class he listed the two biggest items in his budget: \$11,000,000,000 for national defense, 28 percent of the total and \$7,000,000,000 for foreign and other international affairs, 18 percent of the total and up \$1,500,000,000.

After allowing for veterans benefits, interest on the public debt and tax refunds, Mr. Truman said, only 21 percent of the outlay would be left for social and medical care, sciences of government.

He injected a note of optimism, however, with an estimate that "under existing tax laws" federal revenues will yield a record-breaking surplus of \$7,482,000,000 this year and another of \$4,808,000,000 in the year following.

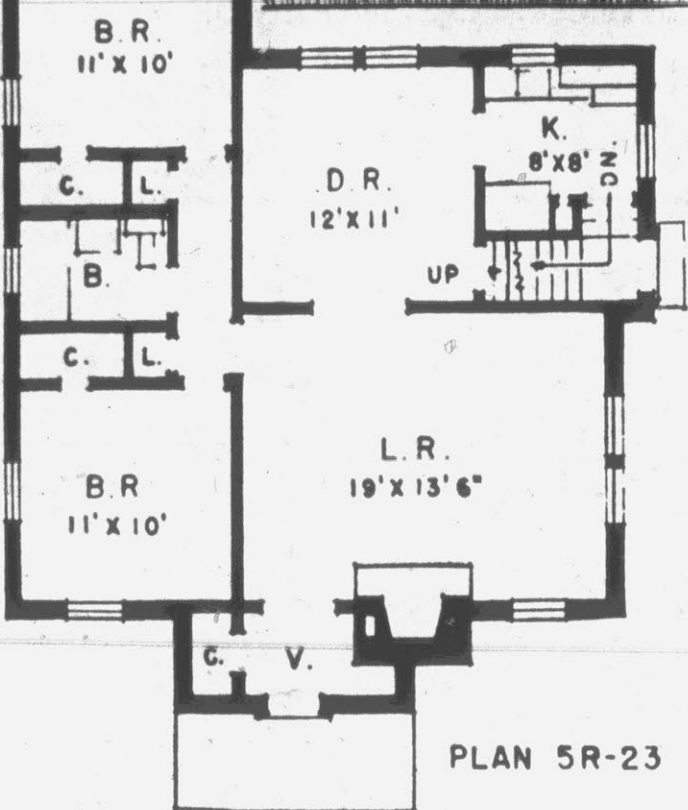
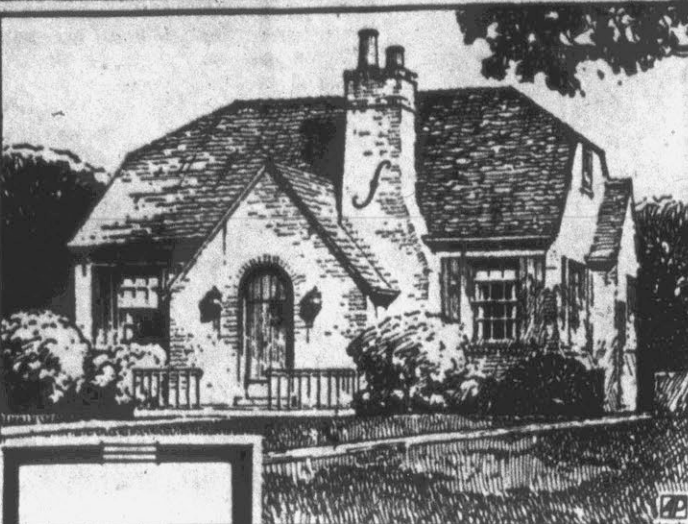
Washington — The princess of

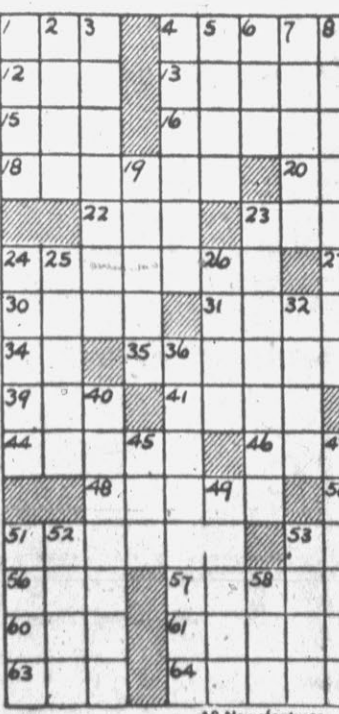

starts to work. Or, rather, con-
gressional committees do, one in the
House, one in the Senate. They're
called the Appropriations Commis-
tees. By custom, the House com-
mittee starts first.

They hold hearings. The hearings
will go on until next June. One by
one each department's figures are
examined.

The committees, sitting around a
table, call in the department
heads, one by one, to explain of
justify the money they say they
need.

Almost everything said at these
hearings is recorded by stenograph-
ers. The testimony fills many vol-
umes and many thousands of pages.

The committees whack and whit-
tle on the President's budget fig-
ures, trying to cut them down and
so cut down the cost of running the
government.

When they're finished with a de-
partment, the committees draw up
bills which they send up to the full
House and Senate for debate and
vote.

In these bills the committees say
how much they think each depart-
ment needs. The House and Senate
bills on any one department pretty
often differ.

Very often the House and Senate
cut down the amount okayed by
their committees, or add to it.

In deciding how much money the
government needs to run, Congress
has to know: how much can the
government afford to spend?

The answer to this is also out-
lined in the President's message for
in it he tells how much the govern-
ment expects to collect in taxes dur-
ing the year.

Unless Congress can keep the
spending less than the income, the
government will have to borrow
money from the banks to keep run-
ning.

A government department doesn't
always spend as much money as
Congress allows it. But sometimes,
during the year, it finds it has to
spend more.

In that case the department has
to go back to Congress and ask for
a little more. That means more
hearings and more voting.

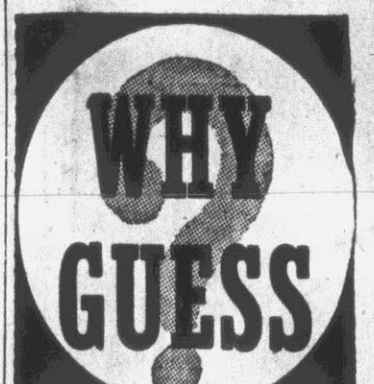

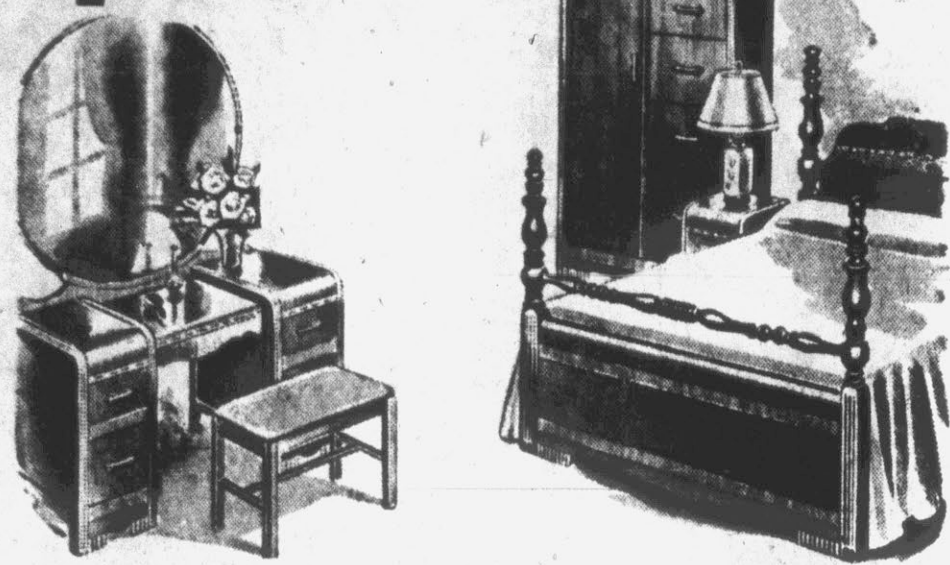
Daughter Charges Negro Father With Assaulting Her

Fuel Oil Shipments Are Resumed After Walkout

Texas City, Tex., Jan. 12—(AP)—Thousands of barrels of fuel oil were scheduled to move to two eastern ports today, first shipments from the Pan American Refinery Co. since the end of a 10-day strike Saturday night.

Two tankers, the Bulkclub and Pan American, were to depart today with approximately 290,000 barrels of oil.

The Bulkclub will sail for Providence, Rhode Island, and the port of New York.

The Pan American will unload at New York City.

No oil was moved here yesterday but in addition to the two tankers scheduled to depart today, four more were standing by to load.

Loading of fuel oil was halted by the strike of CIO oil workers at the Pan American Refinery and Pipeline Company.

The walkout was over a wage dispute. The strike ended when union members Saturday night ratified an agreement calling for a 12-cent basic wage increase and continuation of a 22-cent cost-of-living bonus.

Officials of the refinery said it would be from 10 to 12 days before the plant can return to capacity operations.

Prior to the strike, Pan American shipped approximately 2,500,000 gallons of heating fuels daily to eastern points.

Brother Shoots Brother During Family Quarrel

"We want peace. We want security. We want to see the world return to normal as quickly as possible. A great crisis has to be met. Do we meet the situation with action or do we step aside and allow other forces to settle the pattern of future European civilization?"

Stalin, more than any other individual, would seem to be responsible for the building of Russia's house of Communism. He inherited theories but the interpretation and practical application have been his. And apart from his political and economic operations, he is given credit for having been in fact the commander in chief of the Russian forces during the late war. All strategy is said to have passed through his hands.

Of course, there are many observers who believe that when Stalin does give up the helm of state the succeeding regime may be com-

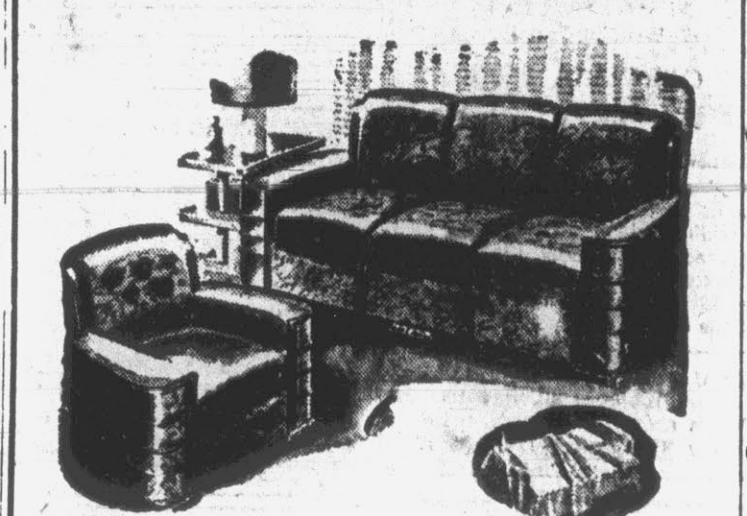
prised of individuals who may sacrifice discretion to ambition and that thus Communism will be weakened. Obviously that's a bit of wishful thinking which is on the knees of the gods.
