Will Enter Eisenhower In Primary

Threaten To Upset GOP Plans With Test In April 27 Pennsylvania Primary

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — The daring young man on the Eisenhower-for-president political campaign today threatened to upset Republican party calculations with a flyer into the April 27 Pennsylvania primary.

Unbowed by the General's newest but second-hand disavowal of political desires, the Pennsylvania Draft-Eisenhower League announced at Harrisburg that a state of delegates will be entered for the retiring Army Chief of Staff.

Thus Pennsylvania, with 73 national convention votes, offers a possible second testing ground for those who think Dwight D. Eisenhower ought to be the Republican nominee and insist they intend to proceed along that line, come what may.

The fact that Eisenhower passed up a chance yesterday to kill off a similar move in New Hampshire immediately subjected the General to the suspicion in both major political camps that, if he isn't already a candidate, he is not slandering the door on the possibility.

The Chief of Staff himself declined comment. But Maj. Gen. Floyd L. Parks, head of the Army Public Information Division, responded to reporters' prodding with this statement, issued through regular military channels:

"General Eisenhower will make no statements with regard to the New Hampshire primary. He has reiterated on many previous occasions that he wants nothing to do with politics. He has not changed his mind."

Politicians quickly noted that while the General might want to shun "politics" in the ordinary sense, he made no direct effort to discourage those who are going ahead, admittedly without his consent, with moves to put him in the presidential race.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), a recent Eisenhower convert, made it plain that he looks on the General's omission as leaving the road open for a campaign to elect Eisenhower—pledged delegates in the March 9 primary in his state.

"The General's statement will not stop the New Hampshire effort to draft him," Taft said. "This is a sincere move and will go ahead."

Try To Legalize 2,000 Divorces

Truman Physician Changes Testimony On Speculation

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham's broker testified today that under written instructions he held Graham's wheat trading account open until Nov. 25, 1947, seven weeks after President Truman had criticized grain speculators.

Harry Brisker, customers' man for Bach & Co. Brokers, also told the Senate Appropriations Committee he does not remember specifically that Graham called him after the President's Oct. 6 blast against speculators and asked that Graham's holdings be sold.

Graham, the President's personal physician, had testified previously that he got hurriedly out of the wheat market after the President lashed out on Oct. 6 against "gamblers" in grain. He got out, he said, except for one small purchase, but continued to deal in cotton until Dec. 18.

The youthful Army officer said

he didn't know cotton was regarded as a commodity and had thought he was correct when he said a public statement that he had gotten out of the commodity markets.

Graham referred to a statement he issued when it was first disclosed that he had been trading in commodities.

Graham said President Truman did not know he was in the market until lists assembled by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson disclosed his name. He added that he never got any trading advice from anyone except his broker.

Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) of a subcommittee investigating speculation asked Graham when he had told the President about his dealings.

"Not until after all this business was finished," Graham replied.

"What did you tell the President?" Ferguson asked.

"I don't know what I said," Gra-

ham replied, his voice dropping. "It was pretty rugged that day."

Before Brisker went to the stand, Graham also had revised his earlier story that the broker bought commodities for him without his knowledge. Graham said he assumed "full responsibility" himself for the trades.

Senator Ferguson, directing the committee's inquiry into speculation, asked Brisker:

"Did you ever get instructions to finally close this account?"

"No, sir," the broker replied. He said, however, that he has sold all the commodities he held for Graham's account.

The committee wound up its hearing in less than two hours, and Ferguson said that so far as he knows his inquiry into Graham's transactions has ended with the exception of certain additional information which it asked Bach & Co. to furnish.

Launch New Offensive

Greek Army In Amphibious Operation Against Rebel Force

Athens, Jan. 13 — (AP) — A Greek offensive was launched today against a force of 800 guerrillas on famed Mt. Parnassus, 75 miles northwest of Athens, with an amphibious operation from the Gulf of Corinth.

A military spokesman said the forces expected to annihilate it. Commando units moved ashore near the port of Itratti from destroyers, gunboats and coast guard vessels before dawn and occupied heights guarding passes used by the guerrillas. Troops, police and the air force began attacks farther inland.

The guerrillas were active particularly during the summer, raiding towns near the northern coast of the Gulf of Corinth.

Dwight F. Griswold, chief of the American mission to aid Greece, said the Greeks had agreed to impose controls on bank credits to combat inflation and to take other action to "help themselves."

Griswold's statement was made at a news conference. The mission currently is administering a grant of \$300,000 from the U.S. treasury.

An authoritative source said large sums of money had been loaned by banks to industrialists for productive purposes and that the loans, instead of being repaid, are being used for speculative purposes.

It was learned that the mission sent a memorandum to the government several days ago charging War Minister George Stratos with lack of cooperation and suggesting that, unless his attitude changes, he be removed. The latter part of the memorandum later was recalled, but an authoritative source said the mission's "thinking in this matter has not changed."

Calls Petrillo 'Economic Pirate' For Record Ban

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Justin Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, told the House Labor committee today that James C. Petrillo is an "economic pirate" who has become "the American public's symbol for bad union leadership."

Miller testified that Petrillo, through iron-clad control of the American Federation of Musicians, is seeking to destroy the recording-making industry by "unwittingly the phonograph." He said this is "hurting the real professional musicians."

The NAB president testified in a Hollywood-like setting before flood lights and clicking newswriters' cameras. He is the first of several witnesses scheduled to tell the industry side of "the case against Petrillo" arising from the union leader's ban on recording-making.

Against the use of union musicians for television broadcasts.

As the hearings began, committee chairman Hartley (R-NJ) recalled that a subcommittee investigated Petrillo in Los Angeles last year. He said the group reported that Petrillo and his union "exercise monopolistic control over all commercial phases of musical production, including recordings, radio, movies and television, and have used their great power to block the technological development of frequency modulation radio and of television."

Now Charge Fratricide

Shotgun Victim Dies; Fountain Man Held; Inquest Wednesday

Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson is holding without bail Calvin Richardson, 23-year-old Negro laborer of Fountain on the charge of murder in connection with the shotgun slaying of his brother, Eddie Richardson, 29, Sunday night. Richardson died early today at Pitt General hospital.

Deputy Sheriff Lloyd Manning, who investigated the shooting, said the brothers had an argument at their mother's home in Fountain late Sunday night; that Eddie criticized Calvin for not looking after his wife and "running around"; that Calvin secured a double-barrel shotgun and fired two shots into his brother at close range, one blast tearing a gaping hole in his abdomen, the other wounding a leg.

Manning and Deputy Jasper Mills arrested Calvin Richardson at a neighbor's house several hours later, after searching several homes.

Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse will hold an inquest at Fountain Wednesday night at 7:30.

Hint Dynamite Raid On Arabs; New Skirmishes

Jerusalem, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Jewish demolition squads attacked Arab sniping posts on the outskirts of Jerusalem today and a Jewish spokesman hinted a dynamite assault may be staged in Jerusalem's old city to lift an Arab siege of 1,500 Jews.

The Jewish anti-sniper raid centered on the Sheikh Jarrah quarter, where Arab gunmen have choked off traffic between Jerusalem and Jewish institutions on Mount Scopus. The Jews, attacking with gasoline bombs and grenades, fired a three-story house and damaged 16 others, after warning occupants to flee.

New violence erupted in the area of the port city of Haifa, where one Jew was killed when a large party of Arabs attacked Jewish laborers. Police engaged the attackers, who were believed to have suffered casualties.

A Jewish Agency spokesman said a "big bang would be the logical outcome" if Arabs persist in their siege of the 1,500 Jews in Jerusalem's old city.

Support Follows Brief Campaign By Ballentine

Raleigh, Jan. 13 — (AP) — The brief campaign of Lt. Gov. L. Y. Ballentine for the Democratic nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture had all the appearances of a band wagon today.

Three Eastern farm leaders who had been considered as possible opponents of Ballentine announced late yesterday that they would not be candidates and that Ballentine would have their support. They were assistant Commissioner of Agriculture D. S. Coltrane, Rep. Alonso Edwards of Hookerton and C. S. Bunn of Spring Hope.

Ballentine, who had been considering entering the race for Governor, announced his candidacy for the Agriculture post last Saturday just 24 hours after Commissioner of Agriculture W. Kerr Scott announced he would not seek reelection this year.

Sonic Barrier Is Broken In Tests

Muroc Air Base, Calif., Jan. 13 — (AP) — Cracking of the wall of sound by unmanned rocket-powered sleds which streaked over railroad tracks at more than 1,000 miles an hour has been disclosed by Northrop Aircraft engineers.

The sleds were propelled in secret experimental runs over 2,000 feet of standard gauge track in less than two seconds to break through the 763 mph (sea level) sonic barrier. Tests were started 15 months ago.

Denies Call For Powers Due To ERP

Export Program Will Have No Effect On Meat Says Sec. Anderson

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Anderson vigorously denied today that Administration requests for standby rationing and price controls powers over meat and other foods stem from shipments planned under the European Recovery Program.

Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee raised this question after Anderson said the United States can meet huge food shipments to Europe under the aid plan.

The Administration is seeking \$6,800,000,000 for the first 15 months of the proposed four-year recovery program known as the Marshall Plan.

Anderson commented that this country expects to export "no meat" for two years under the plan and Vandenberg said the effect of the proposed exports upon domestic consumers is a big worry.

"Do you mean that if we have to have meat rationing, the export program would have no effect?" Vandenberg asked.

"Yes, it has no relationship to this program (foreign aid)," Anderson replied, adding that the present meat shortage results from a "very large slaughter" and a short and high-priced corn crop.

"That's a most persuasive statement, Mr. Secretary. It's the most direct statement I've heard," Vandenberg commented.

Senator Connally (D-Tex.), former committee chairman and a supporter of the European aid plan, also complimented Anderson.

"Possibly I've rushed in where angels fear to tread. I've done that before," Anderson told the senators.

Anderson appeared before the Senate group as some House Republicans insisted definite orders should be written out for whoever is to run the program with definite limitations specified on his power.

Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio) and Chipfield (R-Ill.) were among those talking along that line as Lewis H. Douglas, ambassador to Great Britain, gave the House Foreign Affairs Committee background information on its study of the Marshall Plan.

Meanwhile, the amount asked by the Administration for the program was further questioned by senators, with Vandenberg commenting there is nothing "sacrosanct" about the figure.

Convict Dies In Bid For Freedom

Raleigh, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Elmer C. Turner, a convicted murderer, kidnaper and robber, died of a broken neck in an attempt to escape from Central Prison today and Hoses Parker, a Negro long-term prisoner, was recaptured a few seconds after he escaped over the high wall. Warden Hugh Wilson said.

Parker, sentenced in Duplin and Greene Counties to a total of 46 years on a series of charges ranging from breaking and entering to malicious burning of public property, was recaptured within 90 yards of the wall.

Turner was sentenced from Cabarrus and Guilford Counties to 35 to 40 years and natural life for murder, kidnapping and highway robbery.

Wilson said the men apparently climbed a water downspout at the corner of the prison hospital and that Turner, attempting to jump to a cross-arm and over the fence, lost his footing.

No others were in the break, Wilson said.

Delegation From Eastern N. C. Seeks Hospital

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — A delegation from Eastern North Carolina will come to Washington tomorrow to seek definite assurance from the Veterans Administration that a 1,000-bed veterans hospital will be located in that part of the state.

Representatives of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Chambers of Commerce will confer with Veterans Administrator Carl Gray. The decision to send the delegation was taken at a recent meeting in Goldsboro, N.C. The delegation will support a specific Eastern North Carolina city, just the general section.

A Veterans Administration location team recently toured 30 North Carolina cities, but no definite location for the hospital has been announced.

Representatives from Eastern North Carolina, including Bonner, Barden, Kerr, Clark and Cooley, say they will back the request of the Eastern North Carolina delegation.

The people of Greenville have received two letters in recent days. One is a cry for help, the other carries thanks from a little girl who received a package from this community.

A prayer for help, "in the name of humanity," was addressed to The Municipal Office, Greenville, North Carolina. It was given to The Daily Reflector, and we offer them to you. The letters speak for themselves:

12 Dec. 47

"Dear Sir:
As I worked as a prisoner of war at North Carolina I wish to ask the town Greenville to help me. I am from Czechoslovakia, and this is the reason why I cannot return any more into my old country."

"I am deprived of everything and which is worst of all, I have no clothes, no underwear and no shoes

left. The clothes that I brought along with me from my captivity are now going to pieces."

"I do not know what I can do about it and so I am addressing myself to you, the town Greenville, with the request to help me. If you would know what it means to fight against the hunger, and to fight against the forces of winter, I feel sure you could not be silent and reply with cold heart: I am sorry, I regret we cannot help."

"In the name of humanity, in the name of all that is dear to us, I beg of you who have a wife and children yourself, to consider what it means to see how wife and children are getting more deeply into misery without being able to help."

"That is why I beg to ask you again, do help me, please. Maybe it

Sinking Barge Sends Out SOS

Seattle, Jan. 13 — (AP) — A self-propelled Army barge, believed to have nine civilian crew members aboard, sent its own urgent distress call today after apparently hitting a small island south of the Alaska peninsula while en route to the rescue of another grounded ship.

District Coast Guard headquarters announced the 86-foot BSP 1927 (barge, self-propelled) had radioed that it was sinking about 40 miles southwest of Cold Bay, which is near the end of the Alaska peninsula.

Gordon Gray In Support Of UMT

Winston-Salem, N.C., Jan. 13 — (AP) — Gordon Gray, assistant secretary of the Army and publisher of the Winston-Salem Journal and Sentinel, emphatically supported compulsory military training yesterday.

He spoke at the annual meeting of the Twin City's Chamber of Commerce.

"It is historically a proven fact, and I submit it will be permanently true, that military preparedness and power is the most powerful argument at the peace table," he asserted. "If this power is backed by the will for peace then peace will be had."

All Hands Rescued From Burning Funeral Ship After Sea-Search

New York, Jan. 13 — (AP) — All 46 survivors who abandoned the Armys flame-swept funeral transport Joseph V. Connolly were safe today aboard two other vessels after a dramatic rescue from lifeboats in which they had tossed for 11 hours in raging North Atlantic seas.

Rescue of the 46—the Connolly's 45 crewmen and its lone passenger—was completed last night after an all-day air and sea search for the survivors who abandoned their blazing ship in a northeast gale some 900 miles east of New York.

The half-frozen men were picked up by the Army transport Gen. R. E. Callan and the Black Diamond Line's Union Victory which sped to the scene after intercepting the stricken Connolly's calls for help earlier in the day. Long range Air Force planes from Kindley Field in Bermuda aided in the rescue.

The two ships reported all hands safely aboard with "minor burns and injuries among survivors."

The Gen. Callan, still standing by the Connolly late last night, messaged that the distressed vessel was

ablaze "from stem to stern with constant eruptions from 40 to 50 feet."

An Army sea-going tug left New York harbor yesterday morning to attempt salvage operations but the Callan's master radioed that the

tug would "not be able to come within one-half mile of the flaming derelict."

Cause of the fire, which originated in the Connolly's engine-room, had not been determined, the Callan said.

ABC On The Budget

It Involves You; How Much Tax You'll Have To Pay, And How The Government Spends Your Money; Congress Will Be Arguing About It For Months To Come

Washington, Jan. 13 — (AP) — Here's an ABC on that big load—the budget—which President Truman dumped on Congress yesterday.

It involves you; how much tax you'll have to pay and how the government spends your money.

Also it will cause so much work and argument in Congress, as it does every year, you'll be hearing about it from now until June.

The budget is Mr. Truman's idea about taxes, government spending and paying off the public debt in the 1948 fiscal year.

That's the year beginning July 1, 1948, and ending June 30, 1949. The government runs on a fiscal year instead of from Jan. 1 to the next Dec. 31.

The government can pay its way only so long as it collects more money in taxes than it has to pay out for expenses.

When expenses are greater than taxes, the government must borrow money from banks and other sources. It runs in debt then, the public debt.

During the war the government's expenses were so much greater than the taxes collected, it had to borrow many billions of dollars.

That's why the public debt now is about \$257,000,000. It won't be paid off in our lifetime. It can be paid off only by us.

That's why the President and Congress now want to keep expenses lower than taxes so some of the debt can be paid off.

And that's why Mr. Truman, in his budget message to Congress, said this is what he thinks the score should be in the 1948 fiscal year:

Taxes — The government should collect \$44,500,000,000.

Expenses — The government figures to spend \$39,700,000,000, leaving a difference of \$4,800,000,000 in the Treasury. (Mr. Truman looks for a bigger difference this year — \$7,483,000,000.)

Public debt — That \$4,800,000,000 left-over should be used to pay off part of that huge public debt and bring it down to \$246,000,000,000 on June 30, 1949.

Will Congress try to follow Mr. Truman's ideas right down the line? No.

From now till next June Congress will try to cut government expenses even lower than the President figured. It tries this every year.

This year — the election year of 1948 — something else is mixed up in this whole business and makes Congress work even tougher.

The Republicans in control of Congress are bent on cutting income taxes. Some of them talk of cutting taxes as much as \$5,000,000,000.

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If We Turn Down ERP

Secretary Marshall Predicts Trouble Will Come To Us If We Fail To Meet It In Europe With A Relief Plan; Only Two Ways Left To Stop Communist Advance

Secretary of State Marshall, in testifying before the House Foreign Affairs Committee in Washington yesterday regarding his proposed European aid program, declared that "if we do not move out to meet the problem in Europe today it will certainly come to us here in the United States under conditions far more unfavorable to us."

The General didn't place a precise interpretation on that grim sounding statement. However, at another point he gave this amplification:

"European recovery, we feel sure, is essential to preservation of basic freedom in the most critical area of the world today. European economic recovery is essential to a return of normal trade and commerce throughout the world — we want peace. We want security — a great crisis has to be met. Do we meet the situation with action or do we step aside and allow other forces to settle the pattern of future European civilization?"

Those statements give us a picture, I believe, of America (and other countries) suffering all the dire disabilities which accrue from a lack of world peace. Marshall and Secretary of Commerce Harriman told the committee that the aid program would put burdens on the American people. Harriman named high prices as one burden and said

that the project would add to our difficulties in trying to control inflation.

Both secretaries, however, asserted that the gains would be worth the cost.

It would be highly interesting if we could read the mind of General Marshall, who played such a great part in the late war and discover what more he thinks it might mean if western Europe weren't rehabilitated economically. However the situation isn't so complicated that we can't figure the thing out for ourselves.

In the first place Russia has made it clear that she is determined on communizing western Europe and adding it to the area under her domination. There are two ways of stopping this aggression. One is to create a military barrier through central Europe — a task which only the United States could undertake, and she won't do it. The other is to put the countries of western Europe on their feet economically so that they can defend themselves — and of course that involves the Marshall Plan.

Now if the Marshall Plan is put into effect, Moscow plans to fight it tooth and nail. That's official. If the Soviet Union can defeat the plan, then the road will be open for

no Marshall Plan, or if there is one and it fails. However, the General says the program can succeed, and the indications are that the countries of western Europe are eager to cooperate. ernment would collect a total of \$44,500,000,000 in taxes. A Republican cut of \$5,600,000,000 would bring that total collected down to \$38,900,000,000.

But—that total tax of \$38,900,000,000 would be \$800,000,000 less than the \$39,700,000,000 Mr. Truman figured the government would spend.

So—if the Republicans succeed in cutting taxes they'll still have to cut government expenses till they're below the amount of tax collected.

By doing that, they'd have some tax money left over to pay off some of the public debt.

Note this, though: when they

speaking of cutting taxes by \$5,600,000,000, the Republicans mean income taxes only. They don't plan to cut or raise the tax on corporations.

Mr. Truman also says taxes can be cut but without the government's losing a penny below the total tax off \$44,500,000,000 he wants it to collect.

His way of doing it is very different from the Republicans' he'd do it this way:

Cut every income taxpayer \$40 and another \$40 for each of his dependents. But wouldn't this mean a cut in the total amount of taxes the government could collect? No, says Mr. Truman.

He'd make it up—the money the

government loses on an income tax cut—by raising the tax on corporations. (The Republicans said right away they were against raising the tax on corporations.)

Well, what happens? Will there be a tax cut, or not? You guess it. Nobody can tell at this point.

Anyway, you're warned: these next six months won't be quiet.

Naval Academy Hunting Civilian Football Coach

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 13—(AP)—The Navy, hoping an injection of outside blood will help give it a winning football team, went shopping today for a civilian coach.

Rear Adm. James L. Holloway, Jr., Academy superintendent, disclosed yesterday the Navy had abandoned the graduate coaching system in effect here for the last 14 years and that Capt. Tom Hamilton, who coached the Middles in 1948 and 1947, had been appointed Director of Athletics.

Navy's change of course came after two seasons during which it dropped 15 games tied one and won only two.

Critics blamed the record on the tough schedule and on the system whereby officers were called in for a two or three year tour of duty as head coach and then shipped out again.

They were generally agreed that, under present day conditions, that no active Navy officer could hope to turn out consistent winners.

Admiral Holloway called in a panel of eight former Navy athletes to look over the situation last week.

He said the policy change reflected their recommendations.

Army had a graduate-coach system, too. They gave it up in 1941 after absorbing lickings from Navy and hired Coach Earl (Red) Blaik as its first civilian mentor.

Talent Show Has New Prospect In Middleweights

Pittsburgh, Jan. 13—(AP)—The fight faithful came to a "talent show" hungry for a new hero last night and left singing the praise of a middleweight prospect, 21-year-old Lee Sala of nearby Donora, Pa.

A clean-limbed youngster, Lee was appearing before a home district crowd as a pro for the first time and even his manager, voluble Bunny Buntag, thought Brooklyn's Vinnie Rossano "might be a little too tough."

It proved the other way around. Sala out-punched and out-boxed the cagy Brooklyn warrior to gallop off with an unanimous decision in a fight which had the crowd roaring in tribute at the end. It was his 34th straight victory, 23 by knockouts.

Playing their sixth game in 10 days at Chapel Hill last night, the Tar Heels had little difficulty running over Wake Forest's Deacons, 56-35.

Bill Miller, a forward, and Sherman Neerman, center, led the Tar Heels, each collecting a total of 13 points for scoring honors. North Carolina led at the half, 32-21.

Tom Scott, the North Carolina coach, said he was glad the Tar Heels had a couple of nights of rest so his boys could practice.

Thursday night they invade New York's Madison Square Garden to tangle with New York University's undefeated Violets.

Scott took a moment to admit his Tar Heels "are a better team than last year."

"Three things make us a better team," Scott said. "The team has better spirit, more height and better reserve strength."

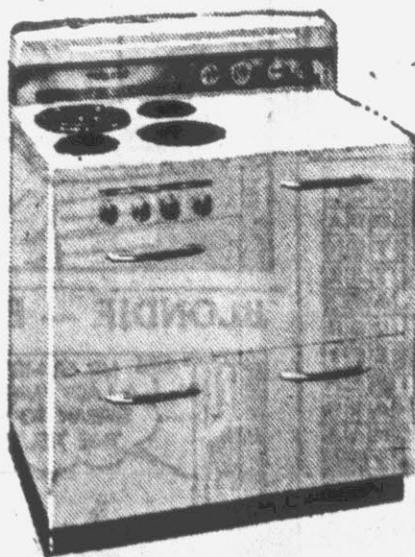

**WASHINGTON
LETTER**
By JANE EADS

Washington—Some 750,000 Ameri-
cans trekked to lovely, peaceful
Mount Vernon, the Virginia Home
of George Washington, 16 miles
south of the Capital, in the past
year.

Neither war nor world restlessness
nor the changing seasons seem to
lessen the interest of the public in
the stately old mansion overlooking
the Potomac. There Washington
took his bride in 1759 and lived the
life of a southern planter in the
days preceding the Revolution.
There he died and now lies buried.

About 50,000 of last year's visitors
journeyed from Washington by ex-
cursion boat between May and Sep-

tember. Of those who went by land,
one out of seven were in organized
sightseeing parties.

Last July admission to the man-
sion and grounds was raised, for
the first time since the place was
opened to the public in 1860, from
25 cents to 3 cents plus seven cents
tax.

Upkeep of the estate, the salaries
of its 70 or more employees, renova-
tions, restorations and other costs
are covered by the admission charg-
es.

The estate was acquired in 1859
by the Mount Vernon Ladies Asso-
ciation of the Union, after both the
United States government and the
Commonwealth of Virginia had de-
clined to purchase the property.

The association, founded by Miss
Ann Pamela Cunningham of South
Carolina is the oldest patriotic as-
sociation of women in America. It
is incorporated under the laws of
Virginia and holds Mount Vernon
"in trust for the people of the
United States."

Charles C. Wall has been resident
superintendent of Mount Vernon for
18 years. His predecessor died at 85,
had held the post for 52 years.
Walter Denmore, Mr. Wall's assis-
tant, has been on the job for 13 years.

The mansion is getting a new
paint job and various repairs are
being made, though changes of any
kind are frowned upon. The asso-
ciation endeavors to keep everything
as it was in the days when Wash-
ington lived there. Only plants and
shrubbery known in the 18th cen-
tury are grown. Even the tomatoes
are the 18th century pear-shaped
variety and not the full round ones
grown today.

When the wallpaper in the man-
sion gets worn it is replaced with
hand-blocked paper imported from
France.

At present the butler's house at
the west front of the mansion is
being restored, as is the old barn
between the mansion and the tomb.

Some 60 to 75 wreaths were laid
in Washington's tomb this year,
mostly by Masonic lodges and mili-
tary organizations. Washington was
the first master of Alexandria Lodge
22 of the Masons. The President
always places a wreath on the tomb,
or sends one, on Washington's birth-
day and on Decoration Day.

**Eleven Resigned
On Investigation**

Washington, Jan. 12—(AP)—Eleven
persons resigned from govern-
ment service while they were being
investigated by the FBI under the
new federal loyalty program, the
agency said today.

The FBI reported having process-
ed 191,234 of the fingerprint-person-
nel data. Information forms which
some 2,000,000 federal workers were
required to fill out late last year.
The processing job was started in
October.

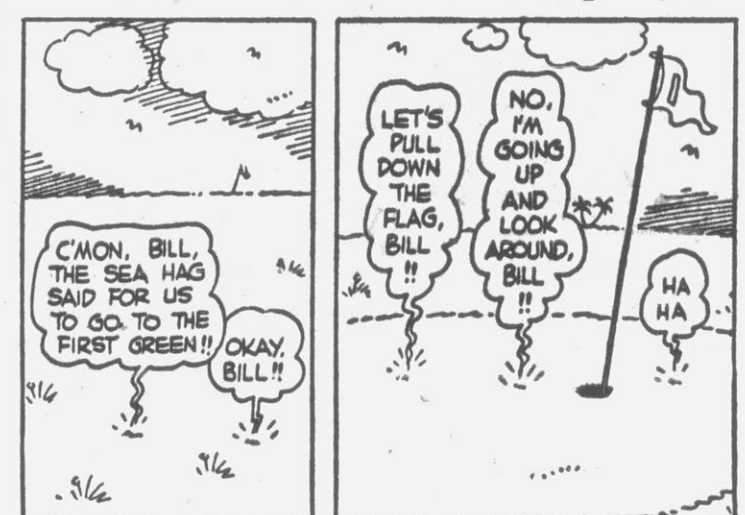

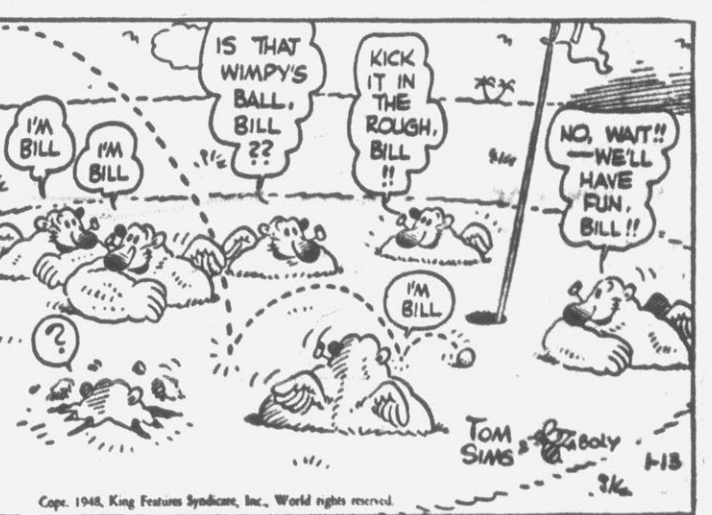

Although the new budget exceeds by nearly \$2,000,000,000 the anticipated government outlay for the current fiscal year, Mr. Truman told Congress it was tailored to "rigid standards of operating economy" and is necessary to cope with "the realities of our existing international and domestic requirements."

"The plain fact," he said "is that our budget must remain high until we have met our international responsibilities and can see the way clear to a peaceful and prosperous world."
