

Major Rail Walkout Is Threatened

Three Train Brotherhoods Plan Strike Feb. 6 If Demands Are Not Met

Cleveland, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Another nationwide railroad strike was threatened today by three operating brotherhoods, who said they would walk out Feb. 6 unless given a 30 percent pay increase and 44 changes in working rules.

D. B. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, announced the strike deadline here last night after Chairman Frank P. Douglass of the National (Railway) Mediation Board revealed in Chicago he would advise President Truman that mediation efforts have broken down and an emergency existed.

Under provisions of the Railway Labor Act, the President now may appoint a fact-finding board to investigate the dispute and make recommendations. The board then has 30 days to hold hearings and report to the President. A 30-day "cooling off" period is required before a walkout may start.

Robertson said his union and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the Switchmen's Union of North America would "go ahead with strike plans" set for 6 a.m. Feb. 6.

A strike by the three unions, who claim a membership of more than 238,000, would affect about 240 railroads and switching yards in the country, Robertson estimated.

It appeared such a walkout would halt rail movement as completely as in May, 1946, when the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Railroad Trainmen struck for 48 hours before capitulating to President Truman's terms as troops were being prepared to man the trains.

Douglass said the mediation board had been trying since Nov. 24 to settle the dispute between the three brotherhoods and carriers.

The engineers report a membership of about 90,000; the firemen and engine men about 118,000 and the switchmen about 30,000.

The trainmen and 18 other railroad unions, representing about 1,200,000 workers—most of them non-operating employees—agreed last fall to terms with the railroads, accepting hourly pay boosts of 15 to 20 cents.

Notes On 'Protocol M'

Unscrupulous Tactics Disclosed In Secret Plan To Render Marshall Plan Unworkable; Every Eventuality Covered In Plan; A Blue-Print For Strong-Arm Tactics

When one is engaged in a fight to a finish—even though it be a "cold" war—it is only horse sense to get acquainted with the methods of the enemy.

This column therefore again calls attention to "Protocol M"—purported Communist plan for disrupting western Germany and thereby rendering the Marshall program unworkable. The Protocol is a prime example of the unscrupulous efficiency of Bolshevik methods, and consequently is worthy of study.

I use the term "unscrupulous" deliberately, since the Protocol—a top-drawer secret which mysteriously went astray—is based on typical Red revolutionary methods in which no holds are barred, and itself calls for "unscrupulous" tactics. To quote the language of that amazing document, as published by the British Foreign Office:

"The unconditional prerequisites for the impending final victory of the working class are the maintenance of discipline among the comrades and (get this!) the unscrupulous employment of all functionalities. There must be no doubt that in order to achieve this final victory all the weapons of the Proletariat are utilized."

Those weapons as used by Bolsheviks, of course include not only the

Dewey Entered In Spring Primaries

Strength Of Candidate For GOP Choice Faces Test Against Eisenhower, MacArthur, In New Hampshire And Wisconsin

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, out in the open at last as a declared candidate for the Republican presidential nomination will pitch headlong into battle against General Dwight D. Eisenhower and Douglas MacArthur in the nation's first two presidential primaries next spring.

Full slates of Dewey candidates for election as delegates to the GOP national convention at Philadelphia June 21 will be entered in New Hampshire and Wisconsin.

Opposing the New York governor in New Hampshire will be slates backing Eisenhower and Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota. The state will pick eight delegates March 9.

In Wisconsin on April 6, Dewey, 1944 Republican presidential nominee, will be entered against fields supporting MacArthur and Stassen. The state has 27 delegate votes.

Dewey's decision to test his strength first against the World War II Supreme Army commanders in the European and Pacific theaters became known here less than 24 hours after he had announced his availability for the nomination through an aide.

James C. Hagerty, executive as-

sistant to the governor, made the "authorized" announcement late yesterday in commenting on the entry of Dewey's name in the Oregon primary, which will select 12 convention delegates May 21.

Hagerty said the governor "warmly appreciates the support and loyalty of his many friends in Oregon."

Then Hagerty went on: "He is fully engaged with the work of the legislative session and cannot actively seek the nomination of his party for President, but if nominated would accept."

Dewey has been aggressively but privately seeking the presidential nomination since early last summer. His open entry into the contest took Albany by surprise, however, as it had been stated authoritatively several times in the last few months that he would not become an avowed aspirant.

The shift in strategy was viewed here as a reflection of a lately developed belief by the Governor and his advisers that he would have to get his candidacy out in the open if he were to head off Eisenhower and the previously declared candidates—Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Stassen and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

Arabs Claim Big Ambush

Say 49 Jews Killed After Attacking Village Near Bethlehem

Jerusalem, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Arab sources said today as many as 49 Jews were killed in fighting with Arabs overnight in the Judean hills between Bethlehem and Hebron.

A reliable source of the Arab Higher Executive said "identity cards of 49 Jews killed last night near Hebron" had been brought to the executive's Jerusalem office.

He said the Jews, a party of men and women headed for Kefar Elyon settlement, "as reinforcements," were mowed down by machinegun fire from all sides.

Police, piecing together sparse reports from the area, gave this version: Jews attacked the Arab village of Surif in the hills southwest of Bethlehem, wounding six Arabs and returning to their base of operations, they were ambushed by Arabs and about half were wiped out.

Jewish sources said the attackers had inflicted heavy Arab casualties and "all our men returned to the base."

Haganah, Jewish militia, has made no comment since the fight began yesterday.

Dr. Hussein Khalidi, secretary of the Arab Executive, denied identity cards of any Jews had been brought to his office, but said "our reports from Hebron are that more than 40 Jews and six Arabs were killed and eight Arabs wounded."

Relief Fraud Is Charged Woman

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Mrs. Annie M. Candelario, 30-year-old mother of two children was indicted by a Bronx grand jury yesterday on charges she accepted \$6,113 in home relief over a six-year period while she was building up a \$5,000 bank account.

The woman, who came to this country from Puerto Rico 11 years ago, was charged specifically with grand larceny and violating the state social welfare law.

Approve 'Voice'

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—A permanent "Voice of America" program to counter worldwide Communist propaganda against the United States today carried the unanimous approval of the Senate.

The measure, first major piece of legislation to clear the chamber this year, now goes back to the House for consideration of amendments. The House passed a similar bill last June.

Stronger Rent Control Law Is Held Doubtful

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Two more Democratic senators expressed belief today there is possibly any chance Congress will strengthen rent controls as President Truman has urged.

Senators Maybank (SC) and Fulbright (AR) joined Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.) in this prediction as a Senate banking subcommittee assembled to start hearings on legislation to extend controls.

The present rent law is due to expire February 29.

Today's witnesses include Secretary of Commerce Harriman and Rent Administrator Tighe Woods.

Most Republicans and Democrats agree that rent controls should be continued. The big questions are: for how long and in what form?

Mr. Truman, in his November 17 message to the special session of Congress, called for strengthening the existing statute. He made no specific recommendations.

Maybank, Sparkman and Fulbright all are members of the Senate Banking Committee, which must pass on any extension, and Fulbright is a member of the rent subcommittee headed by Senator Cain (R-Wash.).

"I see hardly any chance for tightening up the law we have," Maybank told a reporter. "In fact, I think we'd be lucky if there are no weakening changes."

Will Soon Finish Constitution For Jerusalem

Lake Success, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Informed quarters said today a committee of United Nations experts will finish work next week on a draft statute which will serve as a constitution for Jerusalem under the Palestine partition plan.

The General Assembly's scheme for carving up the Holy Land provides that Jerusalem will be ruled as an international territory under direct supervision of the trusteeship council.

The six-nation committee of experts, created by the trusteeship council, has been working secretly since early December. A member of the group said he is sure the draft statute will be completed by Jan. 23, the date the experts had set as their deadline.

May Legislate Historic Sites

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—A proposal to allow state or local governments to acquire without cost old forts that they want to preserve as historic sites is expected to be brought before the Senate Armed Services Committee soon.

Recommendations have been prepared by the committee staff for an overall policy on the matter.

Just before adjournment last summer Congress adopted a resolution directing the War Assets Administration to refrain until March 15 from disposing of a number of these forts and calling on the armed forces for further information about them.

Auto Union Men Study Pay Demand

Union's General Motors Conference Giving Outline For Planning Session

Detroit, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers' new "wage package" demand—amounting to an equivalent 30 cents an hour—was before the union's General Motors conference today as the 200-man group gathered for a planning session.

Yesterday the UAW-CIO executive board unanimously approved a third round wage increase demand of 25 cents an hour and an additional five cents in health and medical insurance.

The GM conference members, delegates of some 250,000 employees of 75 General Motors plants across the nation, were the first rank-and-file representatives to view officially the union's latest proposal, which also includes a guaranteed weekly wage and a three-week vacation with pay for five-year employees.

Later the union's Chrysler national conference will be assembled to pass on the demands, UAW-CIO President Walter P. Reuther announced.

Either General Motors Corporation or Chrysler Corporation may be designated by the big auto workers union as the first "target" for its newly-mapped program, Reuther said yesterday, adding that a decision on the matter would be made soon by the UAW's top policy board.

He said the UAW would file notice of intent to open negotiations with GM Feb. 26, the earliest possible date since the UAW-GM contract expires 60 days later on April 28. Contract talks may start 10 days after notice has been filed.

The Chrysler-UAW pact runs for another year, but wage negotiations may be started again any time after a 60-day notice has been given by either the union or management.

Reuther said strike action would be used if necessary to enforce the new demands, which union officials have estimated will add about \$10,000,000 to the industry's weekly payrolls.

Finds Use, Old License Plates

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Governor Cherry has found there is a use for everything—even an old license plate.

He got a request yesterday from Wilfred Wilkins of New Hampshire for the last plate off his official automobile, known as number 1, if it was available. Wilkins admitted his hobby is collecting old plates from the various states.

The governor had the number 1 plate neatly wrapped and on its way to Wilkins yesterday afternoon.

Tokyo Police Uncovered Murder Mill For Babies

Tokyo, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Metropolitan police said today more than 100 babies—most of them illegitimate—are believed to have died in a diabolical "murder mill" operating under the guise of a maternity home.

Investigation into the sordid affair, they said, revealed that the operators—a 33-year-old Japanese midwife and her husband—starved to death babies entrusted to them in order to capitalize on government rationing for the infants.

The newspaper Asahi reported the woman had admitted 169 infants died in her grimy home, situated in a filthy Tokyo tenement district. Police said most of the victims were boys.

Babson Discusses Great Britain

Washington, D. C., Jan. 17.—I have always been in close touch with Great Britain. For many years I have had an office in London and have crossed the ocean many times. From the earliest part of World War II, I constantly stated that England would suffer tremendous losses and would be temporarily forced to become a second-class power. All of these forecasts have proven true.

The Labor Government's Goal

Today I am just as optimistic as I was ten years ago. I was pessimistic about the future of England. I am always impressed to see how many times, during the last thousand years, there has been "down and out." The English people have a character and steadfastness which, in the end, is worth far more than money or even military power. They are the world's greatest authorities on colonial development, shipping, insurance and banking. I sometimes think that the poverty propaganda which England is now issuing is to help her States! However, we should not blame her for this as we cannot afford to have England collapse.

Doughton Says Knutson Bill Veto Might Be Sustained

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Rep. Doughton (D-NC) predicted today Congress would sustain a veto of the present Knutson bill to slash income taxes \$5,000,000 a year.

Nevertheless, the North Carolinian told a reporter, he thinks President Truman is wrong in his stand that there should be no overall reduction in federal revenues.

And if the Senate "moderates" the GOP tax measure after it leaves the House it might muster the necessary two-thirds majority to override a presidential veto.

As matters now stand, Doughton declared the bill introduced by Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) and the President's own plan for a "cost of living" income tax cut offset by a new levy

on corporations present "a choice of two evils."

"Thus far I have seen no justification for restoration of an excess profits tax," he said. "There should be a reasonable tax cut, but not as much as in the Knutson bill." Treasury experts say the GOP proposal actually would reduce federal revenue by \$6,300,000,000.

Doughton, who managed tax legislation when his party controlled Congress, said that in his opinion "there are too many federal employees."

He added: "We are spending too much and taxing too high."

Doughton said he is not yet ready to say whether he will vote for the Knutson bill in spite of his objections to it. The stand he ultimately takes will have a strong bearing on whether Republicans

enough Democratic support to override a veto.

That there is virtually certain to be a veto of the GOP measure was made clear yesterday by Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, as the election year tax battle opened before the House Ways and Means Committee.

Snyder said the Republican bill would blast hopes for debt retirement and actually put the Treasury \$2,100,000,000 in the red in fiscal 1949. And he said, this would "constitute a major threat to the nation's fiscal integrity and economic stability."

He argued that the country's best interest would be served by prompt enactment of the President's own tax proposal.

Statement Brings Suit

Huey Long's Brother Asks Million Dollars For 'Libelous' Charge

New Orleans, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Guerrilla Candidate Earl K. Long said Rep. James D. Long (D-La.) and four others for \$1,000,000 yesterday and dared the representative to repeat in Louisiana a statement made on the House floor "under the cloak of congressional immunity."

The declaration, filed in civil district court, charged a conspiracy by Doughton, two New Orleans publishers, former Governor Sam Jones, one of his opponents in Tuesday's Democratic primary, and Robert H. Ainsworth, Jr., Jones' campaign manager.

Long—brother of the late Senator Huey P. Long—said the defendants conspired to have Doughton make "malicious, false, libelous and slanderous statement" against him on the floor of Congress.

In his House speech Thursday, Doughton charged that Long had an illegal income of \$250,000 in 1938-39, when he was lieutenant governor, and shortly after, governor.

Doughton said Long had been assessed \$100,000 for delinquent income taxes. He asserted Long had received an income largely obtained in an illegitimate and illegal manner at the expense of the taxpayers of the state, while he was in office, and had reported only nominal income in a "willful intent to evade his income tax."

Whitney Refuses Support Wallace

Cleveland, Jan. 17.—(AP)—A. F. Whitney resigned from the Progressive Citizens of America today because "I cannot go along in its endorsement of a third party."

Whitney, president of the powerful Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has been a member of PCA's board of directors, and sat on the stage when Henry A. Wallace, PCA's presidential candidate spoke here recently.

Free On Bond

Miami, Fla., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Alexander Bittelman of New York, accused of advocating the overthrow of the U.S. government by force and violence, is free on \$5,000 bond today awaiting hearing before a two-man immigration examining board to determine whether or not he should be deported.

Bittelman, who was arrested yesterday by Francis J. H. Dever, head of the Immigration and Naturalization Office here, is charged by Attorney General Tom Clark in a warrant which stated he is alleged to "believe in, advise, advocate and teach the overthrow of the United States government."

Dignitaries Of N.C. And Nation To Attend Rites

Raleigh, N.C., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Joseph Daniels, elder statesman and editor-publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, who died Thursday, will be buried today.

Numerous high dignitaries of the state and nation were on hand to pay last respects to the former secretary of the Navy and ambassador.

Expected to attend the services at 2:30 p.m. (EST) were Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, widow of the president in whose World War I cabinet Daniels served, and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, whom Daniels served as ambassador to Mexico.

Joseph C. Grew, former under-secretary of state, was designated by Secretary of State Marshall to represent him at the funeral.

Plans for the last rites were simple, with Bishop W. W. Peole of Richmond, Va., a long-time friend and former pastor, conducting services at the Edenton Street Methodist Church where the 85-year-old editor worshipped. Eight Negro men long associated with Daniels in his household and at The News and Observer are the pallbearers.

As the flags over the North Carolina State Capitol stood at half mast, at the direction of Gov. R. Gregg Cherry, hundreds of messages of condolence were directed to Daniels' four sons who were at his bedside when he succumbed to pneumonia and the complications of old age.

More Snow Ahead For New York

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—New York City, which has spent more than \$6,000,000 to rid itself of some 25.8 inches of snow which fell Dec. 26, was advised today by the Weather Bureau a snowfall of five inches or more would begin late this afternoon.

All city departments were alerted that a storm now off the Tennessee-Ohio Valley was approaching.

Get Go-Ahead On Rain-Making

Miami, Fla., Jan. 17.—(AP)—A company which expects to go into the rainmaking business on a national commercial scale will try to give Miami its first snowfall in February just to prove it can do it.

City Publicity Director Robert Quinn, after exploring the plan and finding no opposition to it, gave the Toledo, Ohio, concern the go ahead signal today.

Relief Family Returns 'Home'

Los Angeles, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The famous Brinks are back.

Mr. and Mrs. James Brink, who left here last July with the financial help of county public assistance officials, returned yesterday with 10 of their 12 children.

Attorney John L. Richardson of Lynwood said Mrs. Brink told him she had been referred to him for advice. He quoted her as saying the family decided "to go home."

The Brinks were "I to leave the state after, public assistance officials said, they had drawn as much as \$240 monthly over a period of two years.

They added he was so feeble, however, he frequently rested in silence.

Thousands of Sikhs, Hindus and Moslems joined in mass demonstrations designed to convince Gandhi religious hatreds were quenched and the purpose of his fast fulfilled.

Wallace To Make Major Address

Chicago, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace, third party candidate for President, will make a major campaign speech on domestic issues late today at opening sessions of the second annual convention of the Progressive Citizens of America.

About 500 delegates from 35 states whooped it up for the former Democratic vice president, demonstrating their enthusiasm for his "Peace and Prosperity" platform as they gathered to endorse formally his candidacy.

U. S. Commission Of Experts Warns What To Expect In Next War; Accept As Inevitable The Thought Of Another War, Set Preparedness Date; Rocket Problem

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The war starts. A rocket, maybe an atomic rocket, comes whizzing out of the stratosphere and hits an American city.

It travels so fast—more than a mile a second—it's invisible. And then it explodes, unseen till it hits and explodes.

Can this happen to us, separated from Europe and Asia by two oceans? Maybe, in the next war.

Can we find some way of searching out that rocket in the stratosphere and exploding it before it lands? Maybe, but we don't know right now.

The ideas mentioned here so far are not new. You've heard talk of them before.

Maybe they sounded like pipe-dreams or just the talk of Army and Navy men who wanted more money to spend.

But they were given new weight this week by an important body, President Truman's Air Policy Commission, made up of five distinguished civilians.

Mr. Truman appointed this commission last summer to find out, among other things, what we should do to be strong in the air in case of another war.

Indonesians And Dutch Sign Truce

Pact Is Endorsed Aboard U.S. Transport Off Batavia; A UN Triumph

Batavia, Java, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The Dutch and the Indonesian Republic signed a truce today in the warfare that broke out last summer in Java, Sumatra and Madura.

The agreement was signed at 2:55 p.m. Java time, (2:35 a.m. EST) aboard the United States Navy transport Renville anchored off Batavia.

Endorsement of the truce climaxed 11 weeks of negotiations by a Good Offices Committee sent by the United Nations Security Council to try to bring peace in the Dutch Indies.

Terms of the truce were not made public immediately. However, reliable source said last night it provides:

Both the Dutch and the Indonesian Republics are to issue an immediate cease-fire, stand-fast order to their troops, fully effective 48 hours after the signing.

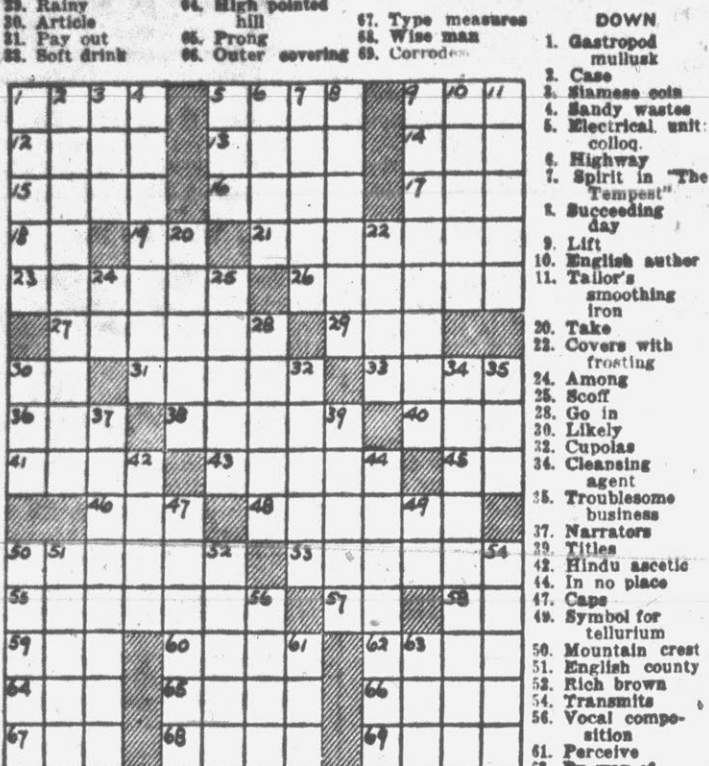

Then the police arrested "Dr. Bozard" and his confederate.

Chief Drum said the case looks like the old-time flimflam game. McCormick and Dupree will be tried in Police Court Monday.

Negro Victim Highway Wreck Died Thursday

William Crandell, 26-year-old farm laborer, who was injured in a collision on the Washington highway near here the night of December 23, died at Pitt General Hospital Thursday morning. Highway Patrolman R. E. Gibbs, who investigated the accident, quoted Claude Everett, Greenville taxicab operator, as saying that he was blinded by the lights of an oncoming car and that his cab collided with a soybean combine being towed along the highway by a tractor. No arrest was made. Coroner Griffin H. Rouse is investigating the case.

Crandell, driving the tractor was seriously injured. Larry Reeves, Negro, riding on the combine, was painfully hurt. Everett, the taxi driver, was considerably shaken up and his cab was slightly damaged.

which—with the British Dominions—will again make the British Empire the world's greatest power. Therefore, don't let England short! England will get out of India all that she has put in India with a good profit to boot. This also applies to certain other distant provinces where she gradually is relinquishing. India is cursed with an unbelievably large population and an impossible religion. Africa is richer in natural resources, has comparatively few people, and these, although called "heathen," are adaptable to the Christian religion. In addition to the rich undeveloped mines, water powers, forests, oil prospects, and other natural resources of Africa, it is nearby and already within Great Britain's grip. You hear nothing about giving up Africa.

The Marshall Plan
I find in Washington that the Marshall Plan will be adopted after careful planning. England is very glad to have it apply to France, Italy and Greece generously, but it is not so keen about Korea, China and the Far East. English diplomats tell me that it is foolish for the United States to try to "save the world." English statesmen on all parties are unanimous that the Mediterranean countries should be protected, so that the democracies will definitely control the Mediterranean. England, however, is prepared to let the Chinese themselves handle the Russians; and they can do this very well by swallowing them up. The same applies to the people of India.

Let us also remember that the British Empire knows the secret of the atomic bomb. This is both very important for the protection of the British Empire, and also because atomic energy has an important future in the development of Africa. Therefore, let us be generous with Great Britain as otherwise, when World War III finally comes, she may remain neutral and take over all of Europe and Asia after both Russia and the United States are exhausted.

accurate, high-altitude target-seeking missiles for defense are of great importance to our national security. Research in these areas must be given the highest priority. How the Germans made their rockets that traveled 200 miles now is well known to Army men. But if there's a war between continents, of course, the rockets of the future will have to travel a lot farther than 200 miles. The commission says developing such rockets will be a huge problem and will cost a lot of money for experimenting "before we can hope to produce a pilotless weapon x x x that will have a reasonable chance of hitting a distant target."

But the report is loaded with other things which the commission thinks we must do if we are to be prepared for another war. It says we must be prepared by Jan. 1, 1953.

Communists—and the Communists have discovered the Socialists. The Protocol as published in London lays down the long range strategy and the tactics which are to be employed. This covers every eventuality, such as the wholesale creation of strikes, the delay of transportation and prevention of timely arrival of food supplies. Then comes this revolutionary order:

"The unity of the working class must be achieved at once, even if it means the elimination of overall power."
So goes this blue-print for strong-arm tactics against the Marshall Plan. The Bolsheviks are concentrating on the great Ruhr, with its coal mines and manufactures. That is the key to Germany's economy and Germany is essential to the economy of western Europe.

On the whole the Protocol looks like shrewd generalship—of the Bolshevik type. It displays the same meticulous care that is being demonstrated in every country where a Communist party is trying to secure a foothold. It is an excellent lesson in organization, and not to be overlooked by those who are trying to combat the growth of the Red.

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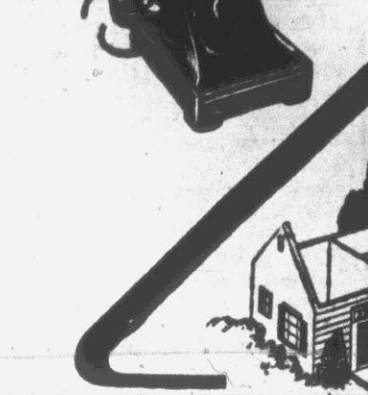
