

Foreign Aid Cabinet Job Claims Taft

Suggests Creating Special Cabinet Post; Who's To Run ERP At Stake

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—A suggestion by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) that Congress create a Marshall Plan cabinet post provided a new twist today to the argument over who should run the multi-billion dollar European Recovery Program.

At the same time, but without referring to Taft's proposal, Senator Reed (Kas.) called upon his Republican colleagues to avoid a foreign aid controversy that might "break the party in two."

These two developments came as the Senate Foreign Relations Committee called Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to presidents, for the first non-government testimony on the controversial recovery program.

Secretary of State Marshall has said the business side and foreign policy designs are inseparable. He told the Senate committee earlier this month that "there cannot be two secretaries of state."

Taft, in voicing his suggestion for a new cabinet post, did not dispute Marshall on this point.

"I am fully conscious," the chairman of the Senate's Republican Policy Committee declared in a radio broadcast yesterday, "that as far as foreign policy is concerned, it (the Marshall Plan) must be absolutely coordinated with the State Department."

"But economic administration is another thing," the Ohioan continued. "And if one is to find an administrator of a caliber who can do it and if he is to have the powers by which he can do it, he must be of cabinet rank."

Noting that such rank would give the foreign aid administrator equal footing with the secretary of state and the secretary of commerce, Taft added:

"I want a man who is looking in each case at our economy just as much as he is looking at the advantage that goes to foreign countries. Taft said there is a feeling in Congress with which he agrees that the State Department is only interested in giving American money away for foreign policy purposes; that they have no interest in the economy of the United States."

Charlotte Meat Supply May Be Soon Depleted

Charlotte, N.C., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Grim prospects that the supply of fresh meats in Charlotte will be critically depleted within a few months were seen in trade circles here today.

Harvey Morris, prominent Charlotte business man and livestock dealer, said the critical conditions in the fresh meats trade are inevitable because of the steady exhaustion of marketable supplies of livestock in the area.

Morris attributed the rapid marketing to record high prices and talk of fresh meat rationing. High costs of feedstuffs are influencing farmers to sell their cattle and hogs without "finishing" the animals. Morris reported, adding that breeding stock is rapidly being depleted under present conditions.

Gandhi's Achievement

Latest Fast Ends In Triumph With Solemn Pledges His Peace Program Will Be Carried Out; A Historic Event; Millions Shocked Into Halting Communal Rioting

Mohandas Gandhi's fast ("unto death," if necessary) to compel the Moslems and Hindus to cease the bloody strife which has threatened to plunge the Indian sub-continent into war, ended yesterday in triumph for the aged and frail little Mahatma when he received solemn pledges that his peace program would be carried out.

Of course it is probable that not even Gandhi himself believes this means the immediate inauguration of an unbroken era of brotherly love between Hindus and Moslems—between the new Dominions of Pakistan (mainly Moslem) and India (largely Hindu). Bitter religious and racial differences which have been going on for centuries can hardly be wiped out in the twinkling of an eye.

Still, the Mahatma's achievement is great, for he has shocked untold millions into pausing and reflecting on the iniquity of communal strife. He has received promises from the government of India that all steps will be taken to alleviate the plight of Moslems within that predominantly Hindu dominion. And both Moslem and Hindu leaders have sworn that they will strive for communal peace.

Presidential Tax Position Upheld

Baruch And Secretary Of Commerce Harriman Agree That Level Of Taxation Be Maintained During Inflation Period

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Bernard Baruch called today for an excess profits tax on corporations—a step in line with an idea advanced by President Truman for offsetting a proposed \$40 income tax cut for each taxpayer and dependent.

And Secretary of Commerce Harriman supported the President's position by warning that "our economy is in an inflationary situation and sound policy demands that the level of taxation be maintained."

But Baruch did not go along with the tax cut idea. He opposed any tax reduction for two years.

Baruch, longtime adviser to government leaders, appeared before the Senate foreign relations committee. He urged that the excess profits tax be restored at 50 percent of wartime levels, a different basis than Mr. Truman urged. He offered it as one point in a program for building peace.

Harriman testified before the House ways and means committee which is considering income tax reduction proposals.

Opposition to "any material reduction in income tax rates" was expressed to the ways and means group by the American Farm Bureau Federation. President Allan B. Kline said in a statement that "a period of inflation" is not the time for such a move. The federation did urge, however, that the community

property principle in income taxation be extended to all citizens.

Harriman did not specifically refer to the President's excess profits tax suggestion in his opening statement to the committee, but he anticipated objections that such a tax would hamper investments in business expansion. He commented:

"Since business needs for investment are being reasonably met with no evidence of a lack of means of financing by business, I do not believe it is meaningful to say that there is a shortage of savings to satisfy business needs."

Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.), author of a bill to cut individual income taxes without an offsetting corporate levy, already has called the Truman proposal "dead as a mackerel."

Knutson has estimated that his bill would mean a reduction of \$5,600,000,000 a year in federal revenue. Mr. Truman figured his own \$40 cut would lower revenues by \$3,200,000,000. Corporation profits should make it up to keep federal income at the present level, he contends.

Gandhi Gets Guarantee

Ends Fast After Receiving Pledges Of Peace In India

New Delhi, India, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi's hope of harmony in India lay today in the solemn pledge by religious leaders which ended his fast after 121 hours and 45 minutes.

The Indian patriot and Hindu spiritual leader drank sweet lime juice at 12:45 p.m. (2:15 a.m., EST) yesterday. It was his first nourishment since 11 a.m. Tuesday, when he began the fast, his fifteenth.

Last night, five hours after breaking his fast, the 78-year-old Gandhi told a big prayer meeting he did so on the "pledge and counsel" of friends from Hindu-led India and Moslem-led Pakistan.

They guaranteed, he said, "complete, unbroken friendship" among Hindus, Moslems and Sikhs. Gandhi said fulfillment of this pledge would double "my intense wish to live a full span of life doing service to humanity x x x at least 125 years, or as some say, 133 years."

His reference was to a resolution signed a few hours before he ended his ordeal, in which communal leaders pledged their lives as an earnest desire of peace.

They adopted his seven-point program for social acceptance and safety of lives and property of Moslems in India. They set up a committee of 130, of all religions, to meet nightly for a review of progress toward these ends.

An associate said that, once Gandhi is sure harmony reigns in India, he intends to go to Pakistan to try "truth and non-violence" to the same purpose there.

Relief For Civilian War Victims Awaiting Action

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Legislation permitting the government to sell \$250,000,000 worth of seized enemy property in this country and give part of the proceeds to civilian war victims awaited rules committee clearance today for a House vote this week.

Overwhelmingly approved by the House Commerce Committee, the measure marks a broad departure from the historic American policy of returning impounded property to its original owners at the end of hostilities.

It has been assailed by opponents as "unchristianlike" and "a return to the dog eat dog policy of centuries ago."

Under the bill an estimated \$250,000,000 in property formerly owned by German and Japanese citizens here would be sold and the proceeds turned over to the Treasury.

Of that sum about \$50,000,000 would be paid out in emergency relief to American civilians held prisoner by the Japanese on Guam, Midway, Wake and in the Philippines.

The relief would include payments at a maximum rate of \$37.50 for each week of detention, plus disability and death payments ranging up to \$9,500.

The legislation does not apply to members of the armed forces who drew military pay during the time they were held by the enemy. Nor does the measure preclude any beneficiaries from filing claims for compensation against the German and Japanese governments.

In this connection, the bill would create a three-member commission to study all claims of American citizens for compensation for war-incurred losses to property and for personal injury.

Colombian Army Again In Action

Bogota, Columbia, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The northeastern province of Santander del Norte was under a government-imposed state of siege today as Colombian troops mopped up to stop fighting between Conservative and Liberal party members which reportedly has caused 30 casualties.

Cutback In Knutson's Tax Bill Is Probable

Republicans Hope To Make Legislation 'Veto Proof' With Billion Dollar Cut From Original Tax-Slashing Measure

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Republicans weighed a billion dollar or more cutback in their \$5,000,000,000 tax slashing measure today as a bid to win Democratic votes and thereby nail down "veto proof" claims for the measure.

The decision will be made by the GOP high command of the House at a meeting tentatively set for tomorrow in Speaker Martin's office.

Even in advance of that strategy huddle, party chiefs signaled for chopping to begin on President Truman's \$3,700,000,000 budget for the new fiscal year.

Rep. Taber (R-N.Y.), chairman of the 106-member Senate-house legislative budget committee called a group of his GOP colleagues to an informal session today to begin work on a federal spending ceiling that has been variously forecast at between \$3,000,000,000 to \$5,000,000,000 below the amount Mr. Truman asked for the 12 months beginning July 1.

Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.), ways

and means chairman, put the "veto proof" label on his \$5,000,000,000 tax-slashing bill when he introduced it. But Snyder told congress it actually would reduce revenues by \$6,300,000,000 and would put the treasury \$2,100,000,000 in the red next year. He hinted strongly that the president will veto any such measure.

Some Republicans, notably on the Senate side of the Capitol, have been saying privately that they consider Knutson's bill too generous.

On top of this there were reports that some influential Democrats in both the Senate and House are ready to go along on a veto-overriding attempt if the legislation is toned down.

Martin declined a prediction on what changes that meeting might bring in the bill, but he told reporters flatly that whatever tax cutting measure is sent to the White House will be backed with more than the two-thirds vote needed to override a presidential objection.

Two Americans Killed In Action With Hagana

Jerusalem, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Jewish sources said today two Americans have been killed in action with the Jewish militia, Hagana, in Palestine since the United Nations voted Nov. 29 to partition the Holy Land.

They said the first was Ari Rabinowitz, student in Haifa Technical College. He was killed three weeks ago in a fight between a Hagana patrol and Arabs of Wadi Rushmilya, Haifa suburb. He was described as an ex-soldier.

The informants said the second was Moshe A. Pearlstein, 22, of Brooklyn, N. Y. He was identified as one of 35 Jews slain Friday in the Judean Hills beyond Bethlehem.

In all, 893 persons have been killed by unofficial count in Jewish-Arab fighting since the U.N. recommended that Palestine be split into one nation of Jews and one of Arabs.

Jews today blew up a suburban home at Er Ramlie between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv on the suspicion that it was an Arab snipers' nest. No casualties were reported.

Arabs attacked two trains in the north coastal area but there were no casualties and only one of the trains stopped. A minor theft was reported from the second.

Ukrainians Are In DP Camps In American Zone

Frankfurt, Germany, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Two hundred self-styled Ukrainian guerrillas who claimed they fought their way out of Communist territory into the U. S. zone of Germany have been freed by the U. S. constabulary and put into displaced persons camps, constabulary officials disclosed today.

"They are being treated just like other displaced persons," one official said.

The Ukrainians, armed, uniformed and battle-scarred, began filtering into the U. S. zone last September. They claimed to be members of a large resistance army fighting the Russians in Poland and the Ukraine in an attempt to restore Ukrainian independence.

To Question Britain On Palestine

UN Partition Commission Meets Today; Draft Queries On British Stand

Lake Success, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The United Nations expects to learn the British attitude on a series of Palestine-problem sessions this week and then will start laying definite plans for splitting up the Holy Land, informed quarters said today.

The five-nation Palestine Partition Commission met today to complete a draft of questions to the British government covering immigration, security and administration aspects of the situation. Sir Alexander Cadogan, British delegate, has promised to reply as speedily as possible although it was assumed he would have to consult his government for some of the information.

An official close to the commission said the group made significant progress in its first week of sessions.

"So far the delegates have been busy lining up the ducks," he said. "Now they are about ready to begin shooting them down, one by one. When the British answers are here, they can start making decisions."

The question of when the U.N. commission will enter the Holy Land has been laid aside pending complete information from the British on its withdrawal plans. It appears that the commission will remain here at least another six weeks and then move to London for conferences with top British officials, including Foreign Secretary Bevin, before actually setting foot in Palestine.

A decision on the biggest problem of all—supplying troops to enforce the General Assembly's Nov. 29 decision to split the Holy Land into independent Jewish and Arab nations—will have to be made by the Security Council. So far the 11-nation council has given no indication when it plans to take action, but one member of the commission said recently he had information that the council would move shortly.

Union Endorses Henry A. Wallace

Suffolk, Va., Jan. 19.—(AP)—The South Atlantic Regional Council of the Food, Tobacco, Agricultural and Allied Workers Union of America, CIO, which represents 20,000 workers in the Carolinas and Virginia, has endorsed Henry Wallace for president in 1948.

The endorsement was contained in a resolution passed yesterday which also stated "the time has come for the American people to raise up and sweep aside the men who would force us into another war and into another era of suffering."

Strategic Air Force Fields Kept On Standby Basis

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Little groups of American military personnel are still stationed on strategic stepping stones across the Atlantic, Africa and the Middle East.

A check with Air and Army officials today disclosed that small units are maintained at several geographically obscure but nonetheless significant points.

They are there for various reasons — caretakers of American installations remaining from the war, to help train personnel of other nations in the use of equipment being turned over to them, to maintain radio contact with remote American diplomatic and military missions and to keep air transport routes operating.

The recent decision to reopen a wartime air transport field near Tripoli resulted in the disclosure that even though the base has been unused by the United States since last spring two officers and eight men of the Air Transport Command had remained there as caretakers.

The base was classed at the time it was built as a "heavy bomber" field but its eventual use was mainly by transport aircraft. One of its three runways is about 7,000 feet, which would make possible the operation of Superfortress-type bombers should any emergency require a shift from its use as a passenger and cargo base.

Air force spokesmen here said a small detachment is stationed at Dharan, but they declined to specify the number. Dharan deep in the Middle East, was built during the war at a time when the United States was preparing to ferry B-29's eastward to bases in Asia for the bombing of the air attack on Japan.

De Gaulle Loses Ground In Suburb

Paris, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The Communists picked up strength and Gen. Charles de Gaulle's Rally of the French People (RPF) lost ground in a municipal by-election yesterday in the "Red" Paris suburb of Malakoff, complete unofficial returns showed today.

The Communists got 6,282 votes, 101 more than they got last October and retained the 13 municipal council seats they won then.

'Hot Spots'

Satan's Kingdom, Conn., Jan. 19.—(AP)—It was only 14 below zero in Satan's Kingdom today as this section of New Hartford and other Connecticut "hot spots" remained true to their names in the face of a cold wave that brought unofficial readings of as low as 30 below in other parts of the state.

Asson Morton, whose home is in the heart of Devil's Den, a section of Wilton, said it was only 16 below—warm and cozy compared with the 26 below recorded at the same time on the thermometer at Wilton's town hall.

Furnace Hollow, in Ellington, checked in with a 20 below reading.

Enter Meat Ration Bill

Legislation Introduced To Set Up Rationing Machinery

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Republican congress members today introduced legislation authorizing the Truman administration to set up meat rationing machinery, including printing of ration books.

The bill, sponsored by Senators Flanders (R-Vt.) and Rep. Javits (R-N.Y.), provides up to \$1,000,000 to allow the Agriculture Department to make all necessary preparations.

Under terms of the measure, President Truman is authorized to submit a detailed meat rationing program to congress. It would go into effect automatically unless disapproved by both the Senate and House within 30 days.

The bill states: "The President is authorized to do all things necessary to formulate a program of meat rationing under this act, including, but not limited to the preparation, printing and binding of necessary papers, forms, records, and other documents x x x."

Flanders said this authorizes the printing of ration books. He and Javits told a news conference they do not favor rationing, but feel that "in view of the impending meat crisis, the public must be told rationing is the only possible means to stop rising prices and insure fair distribution."

The Agriculture Department has predicted a serious meat shortage will develop in the spring.

Forty Homeless After Disaster

Cleveland, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Forty persons were homeless today following a \$225,000 fire which swept through a row of business houses and apartments in downtown Cleveland early yesterday.

The blaze, the city's third major fire in five days, drove an estimated 100 residents into near zero cold in night clothing.

Rail Strike Threat

Three Brotherhoods Want Pay Raises And Working Conditions Changed; Threaten Strike If Not Satisfied; Could Tie Up Whole Country; Laws Involved

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—A railroad strike is threatened for Feb. 1. Don't expect it before April 1, if it happens at all.

The government will step in this week in a way that always delays a threatened strike at least 60 days. Here's an ABC on it:

Three unions, with 338,000 members, want a raise of about \$3 a day and 44 changes in working conditions.

If they struck, these unions—engineers, firemen and engineers, and switchmen—could tie up the whole country.

(Nineteen other railroad unions, with 1,200,000 members, have settled for a raise of about \$1.24 a day. They're not in this dispute.)

Before going into more details, here's some background:

In 1926 Congress passed the Railway Labor Act, a very special law which applies to railroads and airlines, but to no other business.

The railroads and unions asked for it to help them settle their arguments peacefully and avoid strikes if possible.

Bernard Baruch Outlines 'Peace-Waging' Program Which Includes Rollback In Food Prices, No Tax Cuts For Two Years; Endorses Marshall Plan

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Bernard M. Baruch laid before senators today an 11-point program for "peace-waging" including a "rollback" in food prices, no wage raises and no tax cuts for two years.

Baruch was a witness before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on the Marshall Plan for multi-billion dollar aid to Europe. He endorsed it, but told the senators: "Dollars alone will not save Europe nor win the peace."

Baruch then proposed his domestic program, saying "the time has come to organize to mobilize—for peace. It cannot be put off safely any longer. The time for courage and decision is here."

These are the major things he proposed in that "mobilization":

1. Reduce major food prices "in exchange for guaranteeing farmers an assured price for their crops for the next three years."

2. Stabilize wages in return for this rollback.

3. Restore the excess profits tax at 50 percent of wartime levels.

4. Continue rent control "with provision only for clearly justifiable increases."

5. Postpone tax reduction for two years and then cut levies gradually over a five-year period.

6. Put off all less essential state and federal public works, giving priority to "increasing production, housing, schools, hospitals and other essential needs."

7. Set up a capital issues commission to review all public and private projects "with a view to deferring less essential projects."

8. Establish a congressional "digging committee" which would cut government costs.

Baruch, an adviser to presidents in two world wars, said the situation requires a bold, resolute, concerted attack against the clawing fears of inflation and another war.

His tax and farm price rollback proposals were only sub-heads for an anti-inflation point of his general program.

The broader program embraced: "The United States must stand ready to buy all non-perishable raw materials produced anywhere and by anyone in the world for the next five years, and which cannot find normal commercial markets x x x."

"2. Extend the President's present tariff authority for the next three years."

"3. That the countries of Europe—as many as are willing—band themselves into a political, economic and defense union under the United Nations. This would include the lowering of trade barriers among them."

"4. That the United States, and such others as will join us, mutually guarantee the nations entering this union against aggression. By guarantee I mean a firm promise to go to war in joint defense if any of them are attacked."

"5. That the European nations organize to liberate and use every productive resource of the continent."

"6. Stabilize all European currencies and establish realistic rates of exchange."

"7. A two year peace production drive in this country—to work for peace as we worked for war—where feasible, with lower hours and overtime; where not, to smash production bottlenecks."

"8. As part of this work-for-peace drive, an across-the-nation anti-inflation program x x x"

"9. Settle realistically all prewar

Mrs. Roosevelt And Farley To Work In Election

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The Democratic high command has asked Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to campaign for President Truman's election next November and has received assurances of her willingness to cooperate.

Confirming this, Chairman J. Howard McGrath told a reporter he also expects James A. Farley, who broke with the late President Roosevelt in 1940 over the third term issue, to become active again during the campaign.

Farley already has made one speech, in which he prophesied that Henry Wallace's independent presidential venture may end "as a one-man party."

The National Committee has no expectation that Mrs. Roosevelt will stump the country, but plans to ask her to take "a dignified part" in the drive to return Mr. Truman to the White House, McGrath said.

It was stated that these victims who are now being cared for, or who have been cared for, came from Pactolus, Fountain, Ayden, Falkland, Farmville, Bethel and Greenville townships. For one case alone the local chapter had to spend \$1633.00. A number of these victims will require continued help throughout the coming year. The treasurer of the local chapter is Mr. Jonathan Overton. All expenditures from the chapter were made through Mr. Overton after being approved by Dr. S. J. Phillips, Pitt County Health Officer, and Mr. K. T. Futrell, superintendent of welfare and the chairman. The other members in the local chapter are Dr. Conell Garrison of Bethel and Supt. D. H. Conley.

The chapter also had a report from Mr. L. L. Murray, chairman of the 1948 March of Dimes campaign, stating that the county was well organized and there was so far, a great interest among the people in the campaign. He stated that the Birthday Ball for the benefit of the March of Dimes will be held at the Wright building of the college Friday evening, January 30. He also stated that there would be numerous other events held throughout the county for the same purpose.

more fact-finders.

These fact-finders examine the case and tell the President what they think a fair settlement would be.

The law says there shall be no strike for at least 60 days after the fact-finders are appointed.

(Actually, a union could strike anytime from the start of the dispute; before the mediation board steps in, while it's working, before fact-finders are appointed by the President, while the fact-finders are working, or anytime within or after 60 days.)

(But no union has ever struck until the fact-finders had finished and the 60 days elapsed.)

Because of the weight of public opinion, both sides are supposed to accept the recommendations of the President's fact-finders. They do not have to. Unions twice have refused: in 1943 and in 1946.

So much for the background.

The present dispute started in June. The mediation board stepped in Nov. 24. Last week, knowing it had failed, it asked both sides to accept arbitration. This was refused by the unions.

Over the weekend the unions said they'd strike Feb. 1. So today the mediation board was to tell the President there's a national emergency. He's expected to appoint fact-finders quickly.

In the war year of 1943 the unions turned down a fact-finders' recommendation. President Roosevelt then proposed a wage settlement which the unions accepted.

In 1946 two unions not only turned down a fact-finders' recommendation but one by President Truman.

Mr. Guy V. Smith, who presided over the stockholders' meeting, appointed a nominating committee composed of Dave Whichard, Jr., Reynolds May and Gus Forbes to select seven directors. The stockholders also voted to issue a 1,000 shares of stock in the local incorporation with 600 shares of the controlling stock, to be issued to Mr. Bob Doty and his associates, who will operate the Greenville Baseball Club this season. The remaining four hundred shares will first be offered to the present stockholders before being put on sale to outsiders.

Director's Meeting Immediately following the stock-

holder's meeting, Bob Doty the newly elected president, called a meeting of the directors to discuss plans for the coming baseball season. By a unanimous vote of the directors, Mr. Doty was elected to the position of business manager of the club with the full power to do the hiring and firing of players for the club.

Among the matters taken up at the directors' meeting was the matter of allowing broadcasts of home games, the securing of a new score board at the local park, and the team's spring training activities. In the matter of allowing the broadcasts of local games, the matter was left open until the next meeting of the directors.

To Train in Florida

President Doty then announced to the directors that the Greenville Club would hold its spring training in Bartow, Fla. Incidentally, this marks the first time in the history of the local club that spring training has been held in Florida. Tentative dates call for the spring training to get under way around March 15th and the team will return to Greenville about a week or ten days prior to the opening of the Coastal Plain season on April 22 to play several exhibition games with teams in this area and also for the purpose of giving fans an idea of what they may expect during the coming season.

New Manager

Raymond William (Bill) Phebus, former pitcher of the Washington Senators and who at the present time is an instructor in the pitching department at the Bartow Baseball School at Bartow, Fla., has been named as playing-manager of the Greenville Club for the coming season, according to an announcement made by Mr. Doty at the director's meeting.

Phebus 36, is a native of Fresno, California. From 1929 to 1935 he was in the Pacific Coast League and in 1936 he was sold to the Washington Senators, with whom he played for two years. In 1938 he went to Chattanooga, Tenn., of the Southern Association and during 1938 and 1939 he was with Albany, N. Y., who at that time was a member of the International League. In 1940 he went back to the Pacific Coast League as a member of the Hollywood, Calif. club. From 1941 to 1945 he served in the U.S. Army in the Physical Training Department. After getting out of the Army he went to the Bartow Baseball School as an instructor in the pitching department, which position he now holds. He is six feet tall, weighs 180 pounds and is a right-hander. In 1946-47 he worked as assistant recreation director in Bartow, Fla., and has been active in organizing baseball clubs in the American Legion. He is married but has no children.

Prospects

In commenting on the prospects for the Greenville Club for the coming season, Doty stated that he was not making any promises on the status of the club at the present time, but that he was going to do all in his power to put a winning team on the field and one in which Greenville fans would be very proud. However, he did state that the eight or ten men now under control by the Greenville Club would have to "make" the team as all positions would be open from the start of the spring training until the team is selected to represent Greenville in the Coastal Plain League for the 1948 season.

Summer Session Plans For College Completed

Plans for the 1948 summer session at East Carolina Teachers College, now being completed, will include both regular academic work and a number of special courses offered to teachers, Dr. John D. Messick, college president, has announced. A letter to superintendents throughout the state has been sent by Dr. Messick to determine the needs of teachers who, according to a recent ruling of the state Board of Education, must renew their certificates by September, 1948. College authorities are making every effort to set up the summer school so as to meet the needs of teachers by providing an adequate faculty and by offering those courses most in demand. Dr. Leo W. Jenkins, dean of instruction at the college will be director of the summer school.

Dr. Jenkins joined the staff of the college in September 1947 as dean. Before coming to Greenville, he was assistant in higher education in the State Department of Education of New Jersey. During World War II he was in the Marine Corps as personal adviser to Major General Graves B. Erskine and served at Guadalcanal, Guam, and Iwo Jima. He holds degrees from Rutgers, Columbia, and New York Universities.

Two terms of work will be offered, the first lasting from June 9 through July 16 and the second from July 19 through August 27. Instruction on both the graduate and the undergraduate levels will be included in the summer curriculum. Courses will be offered in 18 subject matter fields.

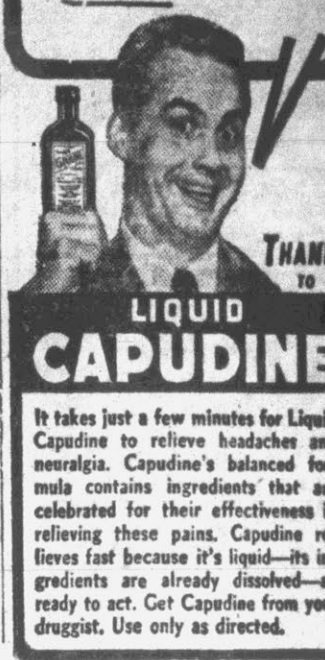
Special emphasis will be placed on

A day-camp organized for music teachers and secondary school students is under consideration, and plans for it will be released later. Another offering being considered is that of instruction in the field of education for exceptional children. Mrs. George Mesta, the town's No. 1 hostess, for instance, she gave a huge luncheon for 60 in honor of Miss Bessie McKee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John McKee.

The parties haven't been as fantastically extravagant as in the days when live butterflies were loosed from ballroom ceilings, hand-painted automobiles were given away and the debts wore stoles of fresh orchids. But the old crystal and silver, older family trees, hot and sweet music and champagne made them worth jotting in a girl's memory book.

Speaking of family trees there's Miss Laura Wilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Winslow, whose great-great-grandfather, Dr. Charles Worthington, came to Georgetown, one of Washington's most exclusive sections, in the 18th century. This debutante is also the granddaughter of the United States late former minister to Norway.

Then there's debutante Margaret Crosson Wiley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Wiley, of Toledo, O., who has been attending school here this winter and is staying with her grandparents, Dr. and Mrs. H. J. Crosson.

Her mother, as Margaret Blaine Crosson, was a popular deb a generation ago and her grandmother, a niece of James G. Blaine, Secretary of State under three presidents—Garfield, Chester Arthur and Benjamin Harrison—was a belle two generations ago.

Other lovelies making their bows included Miss Louise Houghteling, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Houghteling and a second cousin of the late President Roosevelt and Miss Louise Leahy, daughter of Capt. Women in the Church

The Board of Missions of the Methodist Church (150 Fifth Avenue, New York City) plans to recruit and send to Japan in 1948 about 40 young women and young men to form "The Fellowship of Christian Reconstruction in Japan." They will go for a three-year period to teach English, music, or physical education in high schools and colleges; and to take part in sports, fellowships, clubs, religious meetings, etc. All instructions and activities will be carried on in English. College graduates, 21 to 25 years of age, are sought.

The North Country Garden Club of Long Island, New York, recently donated \$1300 to the College of Agriculture and Forestry of the University of Nanking, China, and with this money there has been purchased and distributed a large quantity of cotton, wheat and vegetable seeds adaptable to the agricultural region around Nanking. Other garden and flower clubs in various parts of the United States are planning to give similar aid to the relief of China's starving millions. The cotton raised from imported seeds can be sold for "food money" or it can be made into clothing.

When the adults of the struggling little Protestant Episcopal Church in Salmon, Idaho, "grew tired" and decided to close its doors, ten children, led by Miss Virginia C. Gesner, a home missionary, decided otherwise. They held their own services, under the missionary's direction, brought other children into the church—and finally the adults returned. The church is now reported a "going concern, with varied activities and good congregations."

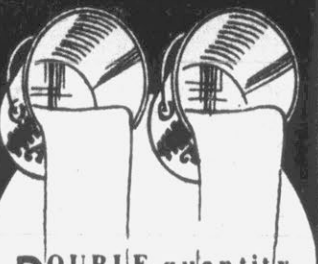

Chamber of Commerce After New Industries

The Greenville Chamber of Commerce is centering its attention now on what projects to include in its 1948 program of industrial and commercial development of the Pitt County Metropolitan, Executive Secretary Willard T. Kyzer said today.

The monthly Bulletin, edited by the executive secretary, January edition, issued yesterday, notified members of the trade body that each is expected to fill in an enclosed white sheet denoting what projects should be sponsored in 1948. Projects suggested on the questionnaire will be submitted to the new Committee on Program and Public Relations, which early in February to make up the general program.

Washington, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The government's No. 1 labor peace-maker set out today on a campaign to convince unions that strikes are futile and employers that they should try to get along with unions.

As a starter, Director Cyrus R. Chinn of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service arranged to meet with leaders of the Communications Workers of America, an independent union mapping wage demands on the telephone industry.

Beyond that, Chinn told a reporter, he has a series of dates with labor and management people—in advance of 1948 wage drive—for this purpose.

Judge Burney Is Presiding Over Criminal Court

Judge John J. Burney of Wilmington convened a one-week criminal term of Superior Court here at 10 a. m. today. Nine grand jurors were selected to succeed nine whose term expired. There are 18 members of the grand jury. The court appointed B. M. Lewis of Farmville foreman.

Judge Burney charged the grand jury as to its duties, explained the law, and pointed out the importance of the body's investigations of law violations.

Much of the forenoon session of court was devoted to miscellaneous matters.

John E. Vernon of the Mill Village, who was charged with attempted rape of his mother-in-law, submitted a plea of guilty of assault on a female. Solicitor D. M. Clark accepted it and Judge Burney gave Vernon a year on the roads, sentence suspended on payment of court costs and he was placed on probation for three years.

In the case against Arthur King, charging non-support, he pleaded guilty and prayer for judgment was continued for two years on payment of costs. In the case charging King with seduction was not pressed with leave.

The case against James Armfield, charging abandonment of a crop, was not pressed with leave.

The grand jury returned true bills against Ernest Leon Jefferson on eight counts of forgery.

It also returned a true bill against Calvin Richardson, colored, charging him with the shotgun slaying of his brother at his mother's home at Fountain.

The grand jury returned a true bill against David Tetterton, colored, charging him with murder in connection with the pistol slaying of Matthew Dixon, colored, at Grimesland.

Considerable time was taken up with the trial of Mitchell Acklin, 33-year-old Negro, who is charged with the larceny of floral designs from graves in a cemetery.

Many important cases are on the docket for trial, two for murder and about a half dozen charging embezzlement.

The grand jury is scheduled to visit the various Pitt County offices and institutions and report on their condition.

Count Casualties Of Greek Rebel Forces

Athens, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Press dispatches said today Greek forces killed 300 guerrillas in a decisive victory over a force of 1,500 to 2,000 which attacked Platona, in south central Greece Friday.

In other reported actions, 107 guerrillas were killed and 45 captured.

Made Progress

Los Angeles, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Six police squad cars and eight fire trucks rushed to the 2300 block on West Boulevard last night in answer to an explosion report.

Excited residents told police about the blast. One man said it "blew me right out of my living room chair."

Police and firemen searched the neighborhood and found:

1. A shredded metal container.
2. A burned spot on the sidewalk.
3. Information that several youngsters in the neighborhood had received chemistry sets for Christmas—and had apparently progressed beyond the instruction book stage.

Officers Raid Big Cock Fight

Greenville, S. C., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Eighty-one men from three states were free under bonds of \$5 each today following interruption of a cock fight in a mountain community near here yesterday.

A state constable reported that more than 200 men, the majority of them from North Carolina, were packed around the cockpit when nine officers staged their raid. Most of the spectators fled through the woods while the officers were rounding up the 81.

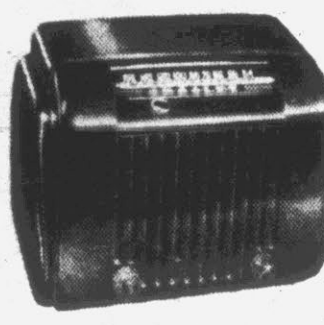

Full Details Of Death Not Told In Police Report

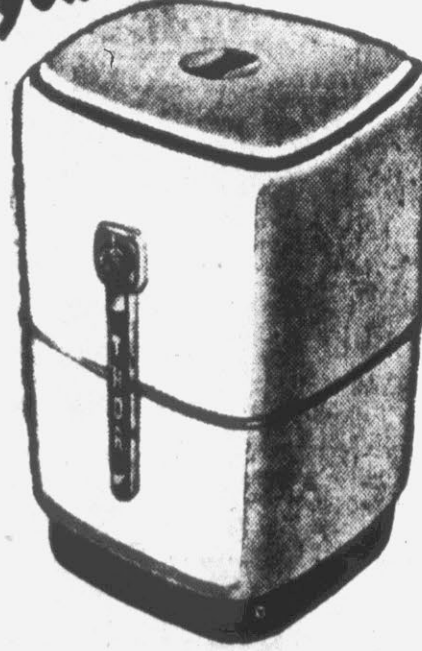
