Louis Shows Age In Bout

By CHARLES DUNKLEY Chicago, Jan. 30—(AP)—"Just how far has Joe Louis slipped?" the big question that has been puzzling the boxing world for the past two months—remained as puzzling as ever today with this exception: The Brown Bomber, at the age of 33, is no longer the devastating bomber of old when he knocked out 22 in 25 title defenses over a 10-year span. Age is catching up to him very rapidly.

The world's heavyweight champion last night engaged in his first test with the gloves since his disputed split decision over Jersey Joe Walcott in New York last Dec. 5 by giving Bob Foxworth a one-sided boxing lesson in a four-round exhibition. Foxworth, 24 year old East St. Louis, Ill. aspirant to the light heavyweight championship, had won 16 out of 18 bouts, 14 by knockouts. However, he offered no line on Louis since he had never met him before; was outweighed by 43 pounds; lacked height and weight; was obviously scared stiff. 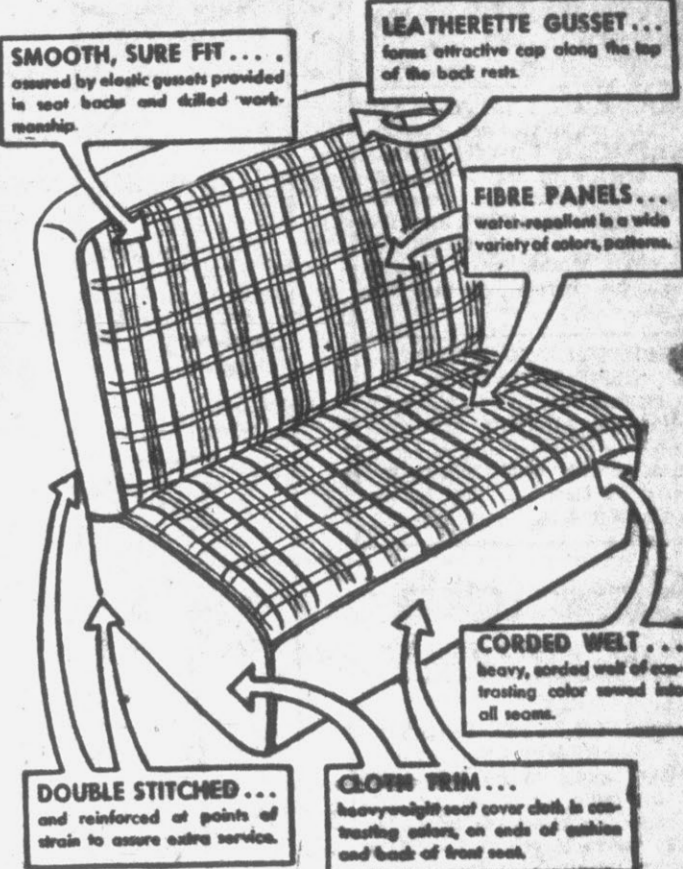

BLESSINGS OFTEN FAIL TO REACH US

Driving alone in an automobile with the radio turned on, we start to cross an iron bridge and immediately the radio volume is reduced almost to nothing. The iron work of the bridge has absorbed the broadcast so that it never reaches the loud speaker.

To one who ponders the moral and spiritual problems of life, this phenomenon suggests what so often happens in the lives of well-intentioned people. Almost everyone has a bit of religion in him. But when we are serious or careless, it happens that a great many of the spiritual blessings which start from heaven with our tag on them never reach their destination, or if they do they are diminished to a tremendous degree. Just as the message sent out by the broadcasting station is absorbed by the iron of the bridge and therefore is greatly reduced in intensity, so the richest blessings of heaven often never get really into our lives because our weakness, our bad habits, our cynicism, our doubts, our moral carelessness and indifference interfere and allow only a little of what God intended should bless us to reach our needy hearts. A vast worldliness gathers about our lives and absorbs the blessings before they reach us.

political headquarters of today are so careful in adopting 1948 campaign slogans is that a hastily formulated battle-cry sometimes can boom-rang.

In the campaign of 1894, for example, a Republican spokesman, Dr. S. D. Burchard, characterized the Democrats as the party of "Rum, Romanism, and Rebellion." Historians say that it proved so offensive to Catholic voters, especially in New York, that Grover Cleveland, the Democrat, won a narrow victory over James G. Blaine, the Republican.

In that same campaign the Democrats called their candidate "Grover the Good." The Republicans sought to popularize their nominee as "The Plumed Knight" and "Blaine of Maine." The Democrats retaliated to this last with a ditty: "Blaine, Blaine, James G. Blaine, The Continental Liar from the State of Maine." In this campaign, the Democrats also used the statement "The Public Be Damned," which they attributed to Cornelius Vanderbilt, one of the Republican backers.

Four years later Benjamin Harrison, grandson of old "Tippecanoe," defeated Cleveland, who used "Public Office is a Public Trust." Harrison ballyhooed "No, No, No Free Trade."

Cleveland won the 1892 election, defeating Benjamin Harrison. The real fireworks, however, were supplied by James B. Weaver with its slogan "In God we Trusted, In Kansas we Busted."

William McKinley, Republican candidate, defeated William Jennings Bryan in the "Free Silver" campaign of 1896. The Democratic slogan was taken from Bryan's famous words "You Shall Not Crucify Mankind Upon a Cross of Gold."

Republicans used "True Americanism" and "Sound Money."

"Four More Years of the Full Dinner Pail" was the party slogan that returned McKinley to the White House in 1900. He again defeated Bryan. Another opponent was Eugene V. Debs, nominee of the Social Democrats.

Theodore Roosevelt, with his "Speak Softly and Carry a Big Stick," won the 1904 election for the Republicans, defeating Democrat Alton B. Parker and Debs who

was running again. "Let the People Rule." Bryan's slogan in 1908, was unable to win him the key to the White House over William Howard Taft, the Republican candidate. (Tomorrow: "A good five-cent cigar.")

State's Highway Commission To Reject Low Bid

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 30.—(AP)—A contractor whose bids the State Highway Commission had voted not to consider made the low offer on one of 12 projects on which the commission received bids yesterday.

Under court order, the commission tabulated a bid from the Asheville Contracting Company on 10.65 miles of grading and surfacing in Buncombe and Haywood Counties.

This was more than \$14,000 below the second bid, \$328,782.50, submitted by Suber and Company, Inc. of Whitmire, S. C.

After the commission voted at its December meeting not to accept bids from the Asheville company, its owner, W. H. Anderson, obtained a temporary restraining order directing the commission to consider his offer.

The restrainer, signed by Judge Zex Nettles in Buncombe Superior Court January 17, expires February 4, the scheduled date of a commission meeting to consider contract awards on projects on which it received bids yesterday.

Officials said they would hold the meeting as scheduled, and that a representative would be sent to Asheville February 4 for a hearing on the restraining order.

 about your request when we get ready. Compulsory military training would cost \$2,000,000,000 a year.

"But we have to act on a lot of other things that cost a lot of money. We want to see what else we have to spend before we start on this."

If the Rules Committee won't let a bill out for a House vote, there are two ways of getting a vote by taking it away from the committee:

1. A member of the House—if he can get 218 members, a majority of the 435 members, to sign a petition—can get a bill out of the committee.

Or a member can get up on the House floor and ask for a vote to take a bill out of the committee's hands. This takes a two-thirds vote of the House to do.

Neither is easy to do. If neither is done, the Rules Committee can sit on a bill till this session of Congress is over. That kills the bill.

Or, at any time between now and the end of the session, the Rules Committee can let the bill out for a vote.

Even if the bill comes out of the committee and is approved by a vote of the full House, that doesn't mean it becomes law.

Before that happens, the Senate must also approve. The Senate, where the Republicans also have a majority, may let it die by not acting.

Govm't Asks Steel Mills To Share Supplies

Washington, Jan. 30—(AP)—The government asked the steel industry today to break the steel shortage by sharing up supplies.

Secretary of Commerce Harriman called together a 23-man steel producers' advisory committee to consider voluntary allocation.

While Harriman has said he doesn't think voluntary methods will solve the problem, he has promised to give them a try with "full support." The administration has asked congress for power to distribute scarce steel by law.

An automobile industry spokesman told the senate banking committee, meanwhile, that the allocation power the administration wants would cut production, raise prices—and wouldn't work anyhow.

John Middlekamp, speaking for the Automobile Manufacturers Association, said such controls "failed during the war and certainly would fail in times of peace."

The committee is considering President Truman's 10-point anti-inflation program, which would include government power to ration goods and control prices and wages if necessary.

living quarters: "Let Gandhi die."

But there was every indication that this was the view of a tiny minority, embittered by the communal warfare.

Shortly after the fast, a bomb exploded near by prayer meeting also in the Birla mansion estate, but did no harm. A Hindu was arrested.

Some Hindus, their womenfolk violated in the communal upheavals, had resented Gandhi's pleas for peace with the Moslems.



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Royall Proposes Organizations Lend Executives

Boston, Jan. 30—(AP)—Secretary of the Army Kenneth C. Royall today proposed that business, labor and farm organizations lend their "most promising young executives" to the government to fill important administrative posts.
