Death Takes
Co-Inventor
Of AirplaneOrville Wright, 76,
Dies In His Sleep
Under Hospital's
Oxygen Tent

Dayton, O., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Death came to Orville Wright last night 44 years after he put wings on the world with the first flight in a heavier-than-air machine.

The 76-year-old co-inventor of the airplane died in his sleep under an oxygen tent at Miami Valley Hospital at 10:40 p.m.

Dr. A. B. Brower, his physician, said Wright succumbed to a lung congestion and coronary arteriosclerosis, a heart disease.

The world's pioneer aviator entered the hospital last Tuesday after suffering his second heart attack of recent months. He recovered rapidly from a first attack Oct. 10, 1947.

The aged scientist took a turn for the worse Wednesday night when a few hours early yesterday and then sank slowly into a coma that preceded death.

Mr. and Mrs. Horace A. Wright and Mrs. H. S. Miller of Dayton, nieces and a nephew, were at his side at the end. With them was Nurse Delyle Myers.

Orville Wright was born in Dayton, Aug. 19, 1871, the son of Bishop Milton Wright of the United Brethren Church. Ministerial careers were planned for both Orville and his older brother, Wilbur, but a spinner toy from their father changed this.

The little gadget, fashioned from cork, bamboo and paper, formed two screws which were driven in opposite directions by rubber bands. This was the inspiration for their later experiments into powered flight.

With maturity, they built a wind tunnel and hung crude wood and metal frameworks within, much in the manner aerodynamics are studied even today. On Dec. 17, 1903, they flew.

Orville first took their home-made contraption of wood, wire and cloth aloft. He traveled 120 feet in 12 seconds in the air. Man had been given successful wings.

Orville and Wilbur, who died in 1912, made four flights that day, alternating at the controls. Once Wilbur soared up 50 seconds and swooped 852 feet across the dunes of sand.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Greek General
Relieved From
Top Command

Athens, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Constantine Ventiris was relieved today as commander-in-chief of the Greek armed forces, battling the guerrillas in northern Greece.

The national defense council adopted a new command plan for waging war against guerrilla troops, who are striving to set up a separate Communist state in the north.

Lt. Gen. Ventiris, former chief of staff, was given 40 days leave.

Maj. Gen. Stylianos Kitirakis was appointed deputy chief of staff to Lt. Gen. Demetrios Yzidis and was ordered to work out new command plans.

All military units will come directly under the general staff. Previously field commanders like Ventiris had certain autonomy.

DIED FROM SHOCK

Calcutta, India, Jan. 31.—(AP)—An 80-year-old man was at a radio when it announced the assassination of Mohandas K. Gandhi last night. He collapsed and died.

New Foreign
Aid SchemesTwo Changes In
Handling Of Marshall Plan In Debate

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Two new proposals for major changes in the European Recovery Program were tossed today into the congressional foreign aid debate.

One would switch the whole emphasis of the program, to give the United States administrator — and Congress — greater control over how the money is used.

The other is intended to ease the strain on this country's food supply by letting Latin America ship food to Europe in exchange for United States machinery.

Eighteen Republican senators agreed at a meeting last night that the program should be used to "finance projects, not deficits."

They said they favored a change which would compel the 16 Marshall Plan nations to submit specific recovery projects to the U.S. administrator, who could either accept or reject them.

Senator Ball (R-Minn.), spokesman for the group, said the administrator would be directed to hold back aid that might be used for nationalization or socialization of industry.

American Claims
Seized Mohandas
Gandhi Assassin

New Delhi, India, Jan. 31.—(AP)—An American bystander told today how he seized the assassin of Mohandas Gandhi before police took the man into custody.

The American, who had gone to Gandhi's prayer meeting, identified himself as Thomas Reiner, Springfield, Conn. He gave this account: "People were standing as though paralyzed. I moved around them, grasped his (the slayer's) shoulder and spun him around, then took a firmer grip on his shoulders."

"Royal Indian Air Force men disarmed him and police took him into custody. I did not see him do anything to indicate he wanted to kill himself, and I don't believe reports he tried to kill himself at that time."

Palestine Stand

Lake Success, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The United Nations faced a serious crisis today as a result of Britain's newly announced Palestine stand.

Britain last yesterday informed the U. N. Palestine commission:

1. No Jewish or Arab militias could be organized in the Holy Land until after Britain terminated her mandate there May 15.
2. The commission itself should not enter Palestine until two weeks before that date.
3. Britain would not comply with the U. N. plan for turning over the administration of Palestine piece-meal.

Highways In
State Iced

Officials Warn Motorists Of Hazards; Traffic Reduced

Winter continued its relentless siege of the Carolinas today, covering both states with fog and freezing rain and paralyzing highway traffic in many sections.

U.S. weather observers scattered throughout the two states reported the same general condition—fog, sleet or freezing rain and sub-freezing temperatures.

North Carolina highway officials, continuing their close watch over road conditions, again urged motorists to stay off the highways. The warning applied especially to Western North Carolina where hazardous roads disrupted bus service during the night.

With snow and ice which fell last weekend remaining over the western portions of both states, another ice coating was added last night, increasing the hazards of highway travel.

The Charlotte bus terminal reported that it had been cut off from bus service from points west and north of Charlotte, but buses to the east and south were continuing. At Raleigh, the Carolina Coach Company reported all its operations cancelled, including routes to Washington, Charlotte and Asheville.

Fog and glazed airport runways also caused cancellation of airline service.

Sub-freezing temperatures were prevalent throughout both states.

Building Activity
In N.C. Declines

Raleigh, N.C., Jan. 31.—(AP)—State Labor Department statistics showed today that building activity in North Carolina municipalities declined last month in comparison with that of December, 1946.

Municipalities last month issued 1,084 permits, or 236 fewer than in December, 1946. Statistics Director Clarence Pritchard said. Last month's total estimated cost was \$7,267,180.

Five Injured As
Bus Overturns

Tarboro, N.C., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Five persons were confined to the Edgecombe General Hospital today with injuries they suffered yesterday when a Carolina Trailways bus overturned about five miles south of here on the Rocky Mount highway.

Several other passengers were given first aid treatment at the hospital and released.

Decides Reject
Soviet Protests

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall has decided to reject two Russian protests against U. S. air force and naval activity in the Mediterranean.

A formal note to advising Moscow will be ready early next week, the State Department says.

Reject Any
Third PartyCIO Head Says Union
Will Depend On Political Action Body

Pittsburgh, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Philip Murray says the CIO is definitely opposed to a third party and is committed to no one in the 1948 presidential campaign.

The CIO and United Steelworker president declared in a nationwide broadcast last night "the only thing that the CIO is committed to is the welfare and security of its members and the entire American people."

Noting that he spoke on the birthday of the late President Roosevelt, the white-haired CIO leader said, "The men and women of organized labor x x x are sick and tired of the 'raw deal' they have been receiving in recent months. They want, and must have, another 'new deal'."

The means of securing this, he said, is the CIO's Political Action Committee which Murray promised will be "more active than ever" in 1948.

The PAC program, as Murray outlined it, includes price control and rationing, as substantially higher minimum wage and broadened social security program, an adequate housing program and a national health program based on insurance principles, and progressive taxation "with real relief for those who most need it—the low income groups."

Too Cold To Run
Away Claim Kids

Ellwood City, Pa., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Running away from home may be fun but "holly mackerel, not in the winter anyway."

That's the cold comment from two 12-year-old boys, Keith Kaufman and Tom Keul, who "just decided to run away" from their neighborhood.

"We didn't think anyone would miss us," Keith said yesterday on their return home.

The grade school youngsters were missing 24 hours.

Secret Data On 'D-Day'
Lost Prior To Invasion

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Army confirmed today that secret data on the invasion of Europe was lost in the mail 14 weeks before the troops hit the Normandy beaches.

Officials said a sergeant at headquarters in England, "tired from overwork and worried about his sister's illness," sent the papers to her address in America by mistake. That was on Feb. 24, 1944.

The papers were intended for Army headquarters in Washington. The officials said they "did not reveal the assault date, the target area or strength of the assault force" and would have been useless to the enemy.

The envelope was addressed to the right Army department, but to the sister's street number and city, the officials said. Postoffice authorities were unable to find any such department at that number.

They turned the packet over to the Army. The officials said the papers left England in an official envelope of a type forbidden for personal use. Hence it did not go through normal censorship.

The sergeant, they added, was "completely exonerated of any deliberate criminality." He received his honorable discharge late in 1945.

The Army declined to disclose his name.

Babson Discusses The Weather

Babson Park, Fla., Jan. 31.—Letters are coming to me stating that the Babson Park weather is forecasting a summer for 1948 similar to that famous summer of 1816 when there was freezing, or at least a frost, every month of the year. Upon reading carefully this publication, I do not find such a statement, although it describes this cold summer of 1816. This fact might lead a reader naturally to think that a similar summer is expected in 1948.

What About Sunspots?

There are many people who believe that a very close relationship exists between weather conditions and sunspots. Those who are interested in the details of such a study should write to Professor H. C. Willett, Meteorology Department, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Massachusetts, or Professor H. T. Stetson, author of "Sunspots in Action," Carsen Books Press.

Knutson Predicts
Heavy Majority

Claims Tax-Cut Bill Will Pass House By 2 To 1 Margin; House Vote Set For Monday; Demos Virtually Concede Defeat

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) claimed today enough Democrats will support his \$6,500,000,000 tax cut bill to pass it 2 to 1.

After two days of sizzling debate, the vote was set for Monday. The house did not meet today.

Meanwhile, Democratic leaders polished up a substitute bill which would hold the income tax reduction to about \$4,000,000,000. It would tax corporation profits \$3,200,000,000 to make up most of the revenue loss. All the Democrats hope for is a no chaos vote.

In the senate, though, even the Republicans admit the \$6,500,000,000 slash provided by the Knutson bill will be trimmed. This will be a bid for Democratic help to override the expected presidential veto by the necessary two-thirds majority.

Rep. Barden (D-NC) told the house yesterday the GOP cut is too deep. He said he might vote for it, just the same, in the expectation that the senate will tone it down.

There were signs that quite a few other Democrats feel the same way. Barden said the people are expecting "reasonable" tax relief.

The Republican measure would raise individual exemptions from \$500 to \$600, let married couples in all states split their income for tax reporting purposes, and cut taxes besides by percentages ranging from 30 per cent in the lowest income brackets to 10 per cent in the highest.

Suspend Action

Lake Success, Jan. 31.—(AP)—United Nations efforts to settle the India-Pakistan dispute over Kashmir state were suspended today because of Gandhi's death.

An Indian spokesman said his delegation was making no moves here pending instructions from New Delhi.

"If your whole country should go up in flames, there would be little use in arguing a case before the Security Council," he said.

Bern, Switzerland, Jan. 31.—(AP) Doctors reported today that Princess Touboutzky, the former Barbara Hutton, suffered a relapse last night. They added that despite some improvement this morning, her condition was critical.

The physicians said a sharp rise in the Woolworth heiress' temperature last night indicated that her recent intestinal operation had not been entirely successful. They added that another operation was being considered.

Italians Deny
Peace Violation

Rome, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Italian government took issue today with Russian protests that the presence of American warships in Italian ports violate the Italian peace treaty.

A foreign ministry spokesman said the Soviet Union had not "given due importance" to the fact that the ship visits are in every way "normal practice."

Italy has authorized the calls, he said, and is disposed "to receive with equal cordiality visits of ships of any other nation."

Cost Of Selling
War Surplus Cut

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The cost of selling war surplus now amounts to about half the receipts, the War Assets Administration reported today.

Administrator Jess Yanson told congress he still has to get rid of goods which cost the government about 7,472,000,000 new. He expects the job to be pretty well finished about June 30.

Flaming Gas
Main Shut Off

Lansing, Mich., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Flames leaping high in the air from a broken gas main 200 feet from a big Consumers' Power company storage tank were kept under control more than an hour last night until the flow of gas could be shut off.

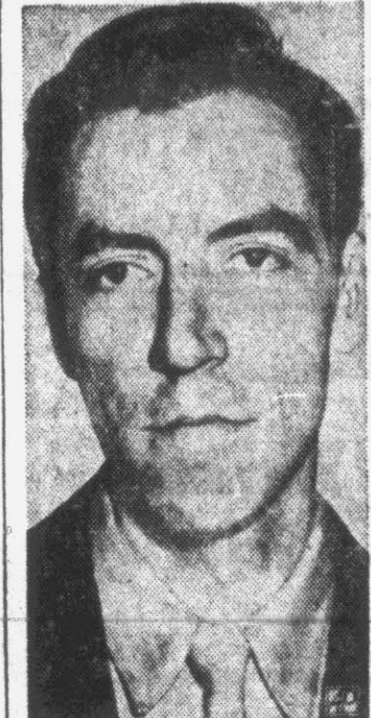
The main near the Consumers Power main plant exploded when it was punctured by workers repairing a sewer line.

Meat Fears
Said FalseInstitute Declares
Scare Over Shortage Is Unfounded

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The American Meat Institute declared today fears of a serious meat shortage are unfounded. R. J. Bissette, executive director of the institute's marketing department, told a Senate subcommittee.

"The supply of meat per person next spring and summer will be about one-half an ounce less than last year, but there will be more meat per person during this period than before the war."

The Agriculture Department has forecast that a severe shortage will develop in the spring and grow worse during the summer.

The subcommittee is considering a bill by Senator Flanders (R-Vt.) which would let the government get ready for meat rationing. It would be up to Congress to decide whether to ration.

Seize Gas Plant
To Avert Strike

Boston, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Everett plant of the Eastern Gas and Fuel Associates was under state control today following its seizure to avert what Gov. Robert F. Bradford described as a threatened strike which would have shut off gas to 350,000 homes in 34 Greater Boston communities.

Bradford seized the plant last night after the CIO union refused to grant a further 10-day extension of the 1947 contract beyond one 30-day extension which expired at midnight.

The Death Of Gandhi

His Assassination A Shock To Entire World; Gandhi's Achievements Are Record Of Herculean Tasks; India Believed Now On Brink Of Fearful Perils

With the great Gandhi dead at the hand of an assassin, observers are anxiously seeking the significance of this shocking event, not only to the Indian peninsula's four hundred millions but to the world at large—for what affects that vast sub-continent in a major way, but also affects other nations.

I was in Atlanta, Ga., when the shocking news of the Mahatma's death broke, and for hours newsboys maintained an endless chant in the streets: "Gandhi assassinated! Gandhi assassinated!" There we had a measure of the disaster. Gandhi was dead in Delhi, and half a world away Atlanta was deeply stirred. So were the cities of other lands throughout the two hemispheres.

Our first thought, of course, is that the Mahatma's murder has created a terrible threat to the already troubled peace of his country, for it comes at a moment when politico-religious feelings are running high. It could cause a mighty explosion and precipitate the most terrible fratricidal conflict of history.

The fact that it was one of Gandhi's own people—a Hindu—who slew him may serve to keep passions in hand—but unhappily that doesn't necessarily follow, as witness the killing which already has taken place in Bombay.

Bitterness is strong between the Hindus and the Moslems in many areas, and each side is quick to charge misfortune against the other. So while hoping for the best, we mustn't dismiss the possibility of more bloodshed.

The London Daily Express comments: "Now truly India stands on the brink of fearful perils." And the London Daily Mail says: "Deprived of their pilot, the Indian governments now are faced with a crisis which exerts by far anything that they have yet had to cope with in their short but lurid history."

Still the fact that Gandhi died, as he would have wished to die, while at prayer, will have a strong influence on his followers, and approves of this thought British Prime Minister Attlee says:

"I am certain his spirit will continue to animate his fellow countrymen and will plead for peace and concord."

That would seem to be a fair appraisal. Our chief concern is whether the grief of his people may overwhelm them in its first fierce rush and cause them to violate the peace to which he devoted his life. So much for the dangerous present. But what of the future? It is difficult to analyze the position dispassionately, for our troubled world places in Bombay.

About Our Government

Some Questions You May Have Wondered About And Their Answers; They May Be Useful; Sources Of Information And Record, On Congress And Government

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Here are some questions and answers about your government. They may be useful. Or maybe you've wondered about them.

Q. Does the Library of Congress have a copy of every book printed in the United States?

A. No. The library was never intended to have all the books printed in this country. But—

By law two copies of all published material that is copyrighted must be sent to the register of copyrights. Not all are kept.

And many books published without copyright are not worth keeping.

Q. Where is the Library of Congress and who can use it?

A. It's here in Washington, right behind the capitol. It's for the use of members of congress and the public.

Q. How many volumes does the library contain?

A. More than 7,304,000 books and pamphlets, 1,500,000 maps, 1,600,000 pictures and pieces of music, 570,000 prints, and 7,790,000 manuscripts.

Q. What is the Congressional Record?

A. It's a record of what's said on the floor of the house and senate every day those houses are in session. It's printed every night after a session.

Everything said is taken down by male stenographers. In the back of the record, in a section called the "Appendix," are all kinds of things which congressmen can get printed in the record free.

Such as speeches they made elsewhere, speeches some of their friends made, newspaper stories, radio broadcasts, poems, and so on.

The record shows the way congressmen vote when their names are called. (They don't always vote by name so in such cases there's no record of who voted on what.)

If you want to keep a full, daily check on what congress does when it's working on the floor, the record has it. It does not have records of what the congressional committees do.

Q. How can you get a copy of the record?

A. Every representative and senator gets a copy delivered to his office every morning.

If you want a copy, ask your congressman to have your name placed on the mailing list for a record. You can get it free that way.

But there's a limit to the number of copies a congressman can have mailed free by the government to anyone who asks him for one.

If your congressman has used up his quota and can't get you a record, (Continued on Page Six)

Local Milk Supply Meets Public Health Standards

Carolina Dairy wishes to announce that it is delivering to its customers the very best milk obtainable. We receive from dairies in Pitt County approximately 250 gallons of milk daily. The consumption of milk in Greenville is approximately 800 gallons daily. This means to meet the demands for milk we have to ship in from out of the state 550 gallons of milk everyday. In order for us to ship this milk into Greenville we have to have the stamp of approval and a permit from the Dairy Division of the Dept. of Agriculture, Raleigh, N.C., a letter approving the supply from the State Board of Health and the approval of our Pitt County Board of Health.

It would be ideal if we could secure locally or within the state a supply of milk. This is impossible at present. We are doing everything possible to promote local production of milk.

We have in our files the January report from the State Laboratory of the Dairy Division of the Department of Agriculture showing an analysis of the milk we are delivering. This analysis shows bacteria count less than one tenth the amount permitted by the U.S.P. health ordinance, butterfat was 4.1% (minimum requirement 3.25%), milk solids not fat 9.35% (minimum requirement 8.5%). We are now assured of a continuous supply of approved Grade A milk to take care of our customers. With the next delivery your milk will be properly labeled Grade A as approved by the Pitt County Board of Health.

Cream Line

All milk delivered to our customers will more than meet the State Butterfat (Cream) requirements. The reason there is no cream line on some of the milk delivered by us is that the milk shipped in from out of state has to be pumped from one container to another through sanitary approved pump as many as six times before it reaches the milk bottle. This agitation plus the agitation resulting from transportation break down the globules of fat to such an extent they will not rise to the top of the bottle but remain thoroughly mixed. In effect this milk is homogenized. Our locally produced milk does show and will continue to show a cream line because it does not undergo this agitation. This explains why one day you may get a good cream line and the next day have none, but the bottle of milk contains the same amount of cream.

We are co-operating 100 per cent with the local health department to protect the health of milk consumers of this community. We will welcome any suggestions from our customers that many enable us to render even better service.

Washington—Sometimes the most
popular slogan in a political cam-
paign has nothing to do with the
election.
For example, the campaign of
1912 is best remembered for the
widely-popularized remark of Thom-
as R. Marshall, Democratic vice
presidential candidate, who said
"What this country needs is a
good five-cent cigar."
Woodrow Wilson, victorious Demo-
cratic candidate for president, won
on the slogan "The Government has
been used too long for private and
selfish purposes." He defeated Theod-
ore Roosevelt, with "My Hat's in
the Ring" as his slogan on the Pro-
gressive ticket; William Howard
Taft, Republican, and Eugene V.
Debs, Social Democrat.
Roosevelt campaigned on "The
New Nationalism" and coined the
phrase "The Square Deal."
War has given rise to many po-
litical slogans. "He Kept Us Out of
War" helped win the 1916 election
for Wilson.

Warren G. Harding's "Back to
Normalcy" helped put the Republi-
cans in power in 1920, when he de-
feated Democrat James E. Cox and
the Social Democrat, Eugene V.
Debs.
"Keep Cool with Coolidge" urged
the Republicans in 1924. They won
with Calvin ("Silent Cal") Coolidge
over Democrat James W. Davis and
Progressive Robert M. La Follette.
One of the chief issues of the
1928 campaign, when Republican
Herbert Hoover defeated Democrat
Al Smith, was prohibition. The Re-
publicans termed it "The Noble
Experiment."
Smith was dubbed "The Happy
Warrior" by the late President
Roosevelt. Republican slogans in-
cluded "A Chicken in Every Pot"
and "Hoover and Happiness or Al
Smith and Sou-Houses."

"A New Deal for the Forgotten
Man" helped win the 1932 election
for Franklin D. Roosevelt. Hoover,
running for re-election, predicted
"Prosperity is Just Around the Corner."
Roosevelt's campaign song was
"Happy Days Are Here Again," and
the Republicans warned that if he
won "The grass will grow in the
streets of 100 cities."

In 1936 Roosevelt, running against
Alfred M. Landon, coined the "Eco-
nomic Royalist" phrase and called
for a "Second New Deal."

Wendell Willkie, Republican candi-
date in 1940, was backed by the
party slogan "win with Willkie," but
Roosevelt won again.

"Win the War and the Peace with
Roosevelt" caught on during the
1944 campaign. Lincoln's "Don't
Swab Horns" was also used by
Roosevelt supporters.

Thomas E. Dewey, Republican
candidate, used "Time for a
Change."

In the Congressional campaign of
1946 the Republicans used "Had
Enough? Vote Republican November
5."

casting companies to worry about
from sunspots. In short, all sci-
entists believe that sunspots have
an important effect upon the vege-
tation of the earth as well as upon
the men and animals, but not
enough evidence exists to enable
forecasts to be based thereon.

Cause of the 1816 Cold Summer
After careful study of this famous
1816 summer, I conclude that the
cause of the low temperatures was
the dust in the air covering the
skies of the entire world. It was a
year of several volcanoes in action.
These might well have caused dust
in the air which could shut off the
sunshine. I further understand that
certain other cold summers have
come along in conjunction with
many dust storms and other causes.
The above is not saying that 1948
may not witness a cold summer, but
farmers and others will be wise to
plan upon normal weather, at least
so far as temperature is concerned.
As to rainfall, this seems to follow a
cycle and many sections of the
United States are now entering a
dry cycle. Crops which can prosper
with little rainfall are to be pre-
ferred during 1948.

Importance of Diversification
The failure of certain crops due to
a wet spring or early frost, or too
much or too little rainfall, may be
expected almost any year. On the
other hand, as years go on, each
crop failure should be less disas-
trous than preceding ones owing to
the lessons which may be learned.
The important thing however
which all farmers and others inter-
ested in the farm crops should re-
cognize is the importance of diversifi-
cation of both location and rota-
tion so that a fair portion of the
crops will come through safely
whatever may happen to certain
other crops.

When Purchasing a Farm
Now a word of advice to those who
are looking for farms, but have not
yet purchased one: Get a farm in
the central part of the country
which is not too subject either to
dry spells or wet spells. Buy a farm
equally divided between upland and
bottomland, with some woodland
and with an independent water sup-
ply. Before making any purchase,
visit the new U. S. Irrigation de-
velopments in the southwest. They
are worthy of careful study as the so-
called "Arid" land is very rich. The
very fact that it has not had rain-
fall, causes it to retain the min-
erals and vitamins which have been
largely washed out of much farm

land subject to normal rainfall
throughout the centuries.

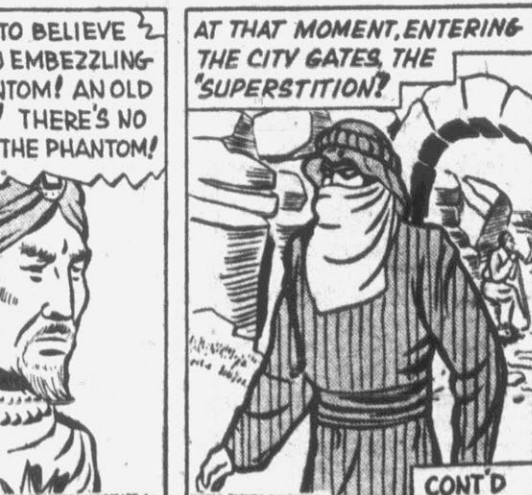

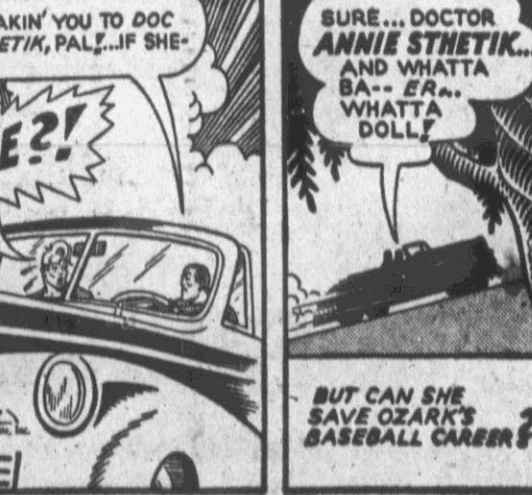

The game was marred by several fistic clashes among players and bickering with officials.

The two teams took the ice in defiance of an order by the I.O.C. striking hockey from the winter games' program.

Shortly before the day's activities began the International Ice Hockey Federation announced the tournament would be continued, regardless of the I.O.C. action.

After the contest Coach Johnny Garrison of the A.H.A. squad said he thought his team's performance was "fairly good" but Poland offered no real test.

Only a small crowd turned out to see the U.S. team, center of one of the bitterest of all Olympic disputes, run home five goals in the first, nine in the second and nine in the third.

DeGroot Is New Football Coach
Morgantown, W. Va., Jan. 31—(AP)—Returning to college gridirons after four years with the professionals, Dudley Sargent DeGroot on July 1 will become the head football coach at West Virginia University.

DeGroot was named last night to succeed William F. (Bill) Kern, who resigned near the end of last season.

University President Irvin Stewart announced DeGroot's appointment after unanimous recommendations by the university's athletic council and board of governors.

Jim Camp Signs With Cardinals
Chicago, Jan. 31—(AP)—Jim Camp, University of North Carolina halfback, has signed a 1948 contract with the Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League. Ray C. Bennigen, president of the Cardinals, announced today.

Camp, whose home is in Danville, Virginia, was a member of the south team which defeated the north, 33 to 6, in the Blue and Gray Bowl game at Montgomery, Ala., on New Year's Day.

Baseball To Pay Last Respects To Herb Pennock

Kennett Square, Pa., Jan. 31—(AP)—Baseball pays its last respects Monday to one of the game's greatest pitching stars and most beloved executives — Southpaw Herbert J. Pennock.

The 53-year-old general manager of the National League's Philadelphia Phillies died yesterday in New York of a cerebral hemorrhage. He will be buried today in the farm country of Chester County.

It was here that the former portside ace of the Philadelphia Athletics, Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees was born Feb. 10, 1884. Here he acquired the familiar title of "Squire of Kennett Square" for his non-baseball past-times of hunting and riding the hounds.

Funeral services at 2 p.m. Monday will be private with only members of the immediate family attending. But Pennock's host of baseball friends and his neighbors in this tiny community of 3,500 will be permitted to view his body tomorrow afternoon in the American Legion hall here.

Norwegian Speed Skater Takes Olympic Event

St. Moritz, Switzerland, Jan. 31—(AP)—Finn Helgesen, 21-year-old Oslo, Norway, youth, won the Olympic 500-meter (547 yds.) speed skating championship today in 43.1 seconds.

Two United States speedsters — Robert Fitzgerald and Kenneth Bartholomew, both of Minneapolis — tied with Thomas Byers of Norway for second place with 43.2.

Ken Henry of Chicago occupied fifth place, negotiating the distance in 43.3.

The first five broke the Olympic record of 43.4 shared by Charles Thunberg of Finland and Bernt Evensen of Norway (1928). John A. Shea of the United States (1932) and Ivar Ballangrud of Norway (1936).

The world's record of 42.4 was set by Allan Potts of the United States at Oslo in 1936.

Pasquel Again Boss Of Circuit

Mexico City, Jan. 31—(AP)—Mexican baseball's future was back in the hands of millionaire importer and sportsman Jorge Pasquel today. High Commissioner Alejandro Aguilar Reyes changed his mind yesterday and once more resigned — "definitely" — this time.

Out with the commissioner went hopes of an immediate truce between the caucus circuit and U.S. organized baseball.

GUARD BOBSLEDS

St. Moritz, Switzerland, Jan. 31—(AP)—The United States Olympic bobsled team posted a watchman at the bobsled garage today after three of the two-man bobs were found damaged shortly before Friday's initial tests.

BAGGED 567 BEARS
Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 31—(AP)—Pennsylvania hunters killed 567 bears during 1947, the highest total since 1941 when a record bag of 593 was reported.

Italian Fighter Out-Punches foe

New York, Jan. 31—(AP)—The Jackie Cranford boom is dead today. Pugilist Gino Buonvino of Bari, Italy took the wind out of Cranford's sails in a thumping heavyweight bout last night at Madison Square Garden.

Buonvino was a 2 to 1 underdog with the crowd of 16,247 who paid \$64,836.

Cranford, a tall blond youngster from Washington, D.C., no longer is talked about as a heavyweight title prospect. For that matter, neither is roly poly Buonvino. Next on the schedule for tireless Gino probably is a match with Joe Baksi.

Cranford remains a puzzle because he appears to have the makings of a real scrapper. When he boxed Gino, using his superior reach and talented left hand, he had no trouble. But once the pugilist Italian rushed to the attack, swinging — not punching — both hands to the body, Jackie folded. Cranford had a bad cut over his left eye and Buonvino's left eye was swollen shut when it ended with a unanimous decision for the invader.

Scouts Stand In Line Trying To Sign Pitcher

could ill afford to lose this great and saintly man.

However, taking it by and large, the 78-year-old Gandhi had performed the task which fate had assigned him. That was truly Herculean, for it included these achievements:

1. His great social labors among his people in South Africa — a work so notable that it evoked tribute from none other than Tolstoy himself.

2. The foremost part in the winning of independence for India.

3. The moral and spiritual rehabilitation of untold millions of Indians.

4. Living what he taught (and he told me that the greatest inspiration of his life came from Christ's Sermon on the Mount) he did much to better the condition of

the world's most tragic people — India's 60,000,000 Untouchables. These are folk so lowly that their plight in many ways is worse than that of the gaunt native dogs from which they have taken the name of Pariah — worse because they live longer and suffer mental tortures. And so perhaps, hard though it is to say, the Mahatma's martyrdom may be the greatest final contribution which he could make to the world, for it will immortalize his deeds and teachings.

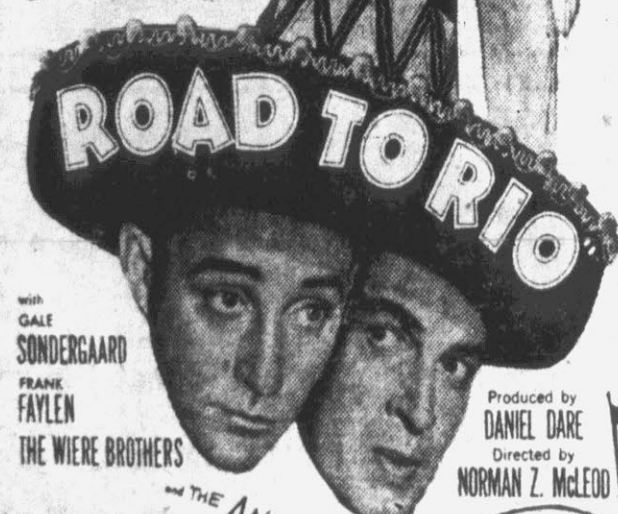

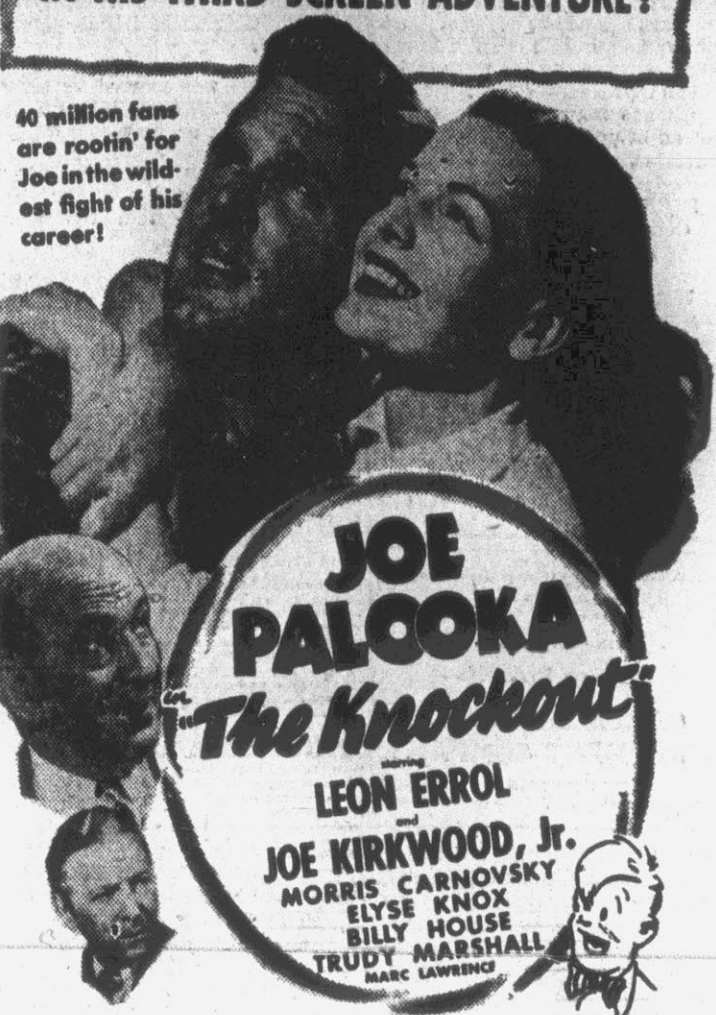

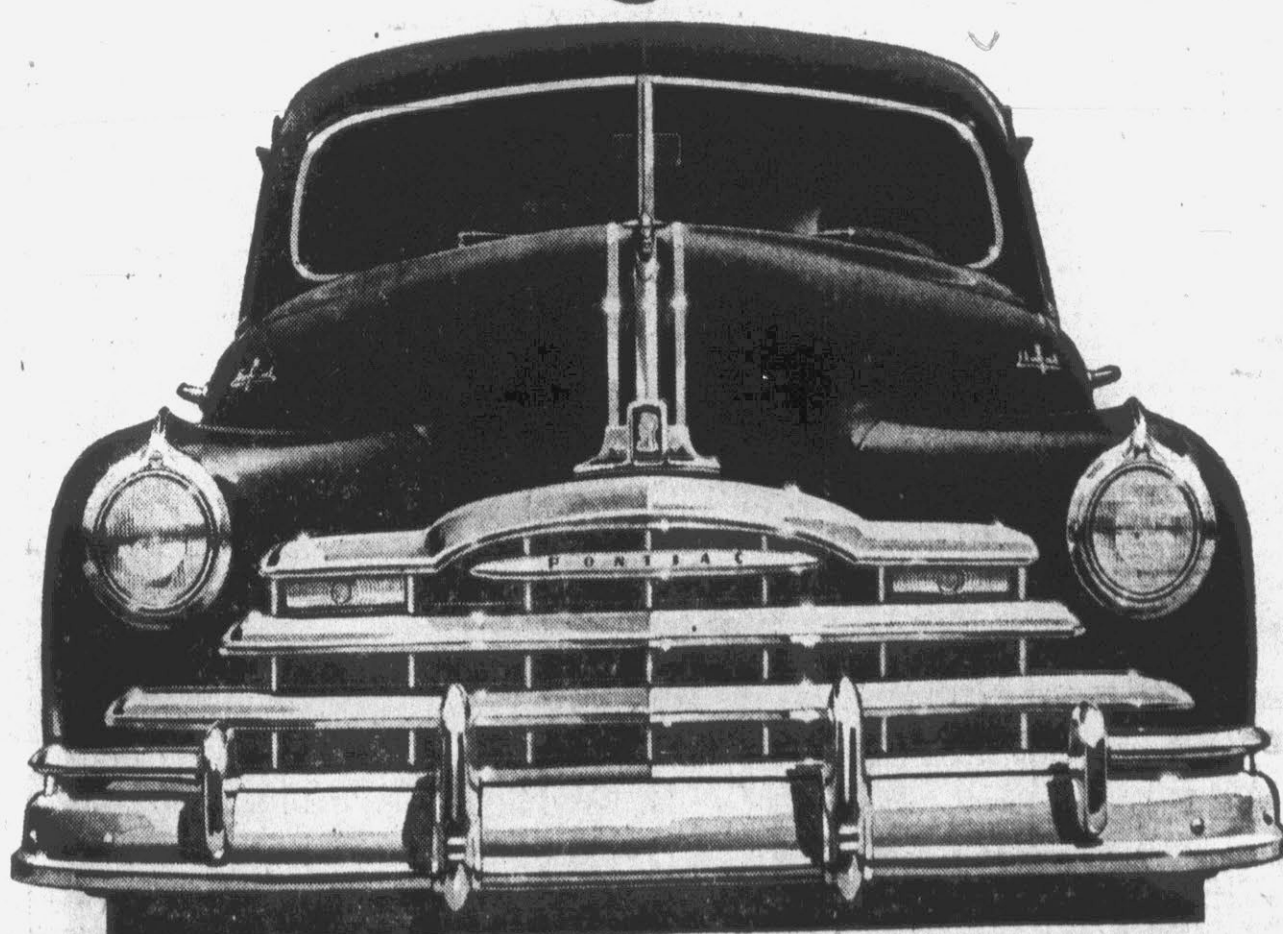
