

Two Indian Groups Face Bitter Mobs

Militant Hindu Organization Attacked By Gandhi Followers In Unrest

New Delhi, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Throughout India today members of two militant Hindu groups which bitterly opposed Mahatma K. Gandhi's peace appeals were attacked by mobs enraged over the Hindu spiritual leader's assassination.

The Indian press said large numbers of both Mahasabha and the RSS were being arrested by police for questioning. Others were beaten and stoned.

Mahasabha—literally great organization—is a political body with branches all over India. It was formed in this century as a reply to the Moslem League. It seeks an India run solely by Hindu laws with no protection for Moslem rights at the expense of Hindus.

RSS—Rastriya Swyam Sevak Sangh—is another militant group with similar beliefs.

Both organizations are classed as rightist. Both have been assailed as fascist. Both maintain youth organizations called "volunteers" which have been described as private armies.

New Delhi government of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru said today that peace and organizations which preach violence and communal hatred.

Police said Gandhi's accused assassin was a member of Mahasabha. He has been arraigned under the name of Narayan Vinayak Gadse of Poona.

Nehru appealed to the people to let the law take its course in the investigation of Friday's assassination.

The government has promised to show "no mercy" to those fomenting communal trouble. That Gandhi in death might be accorded the honors he failed to achieve in life.

Both Nehru and Home Minister Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel said they were doing all in their power to bring Gandhi's slayers to justice.

Despite the appeals and assurances violence continued to spread.

Eisler Counsel Moves To Effect His Release

New York, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Counsel for Gerhard Eisler planned habeas corpus proceedings today in a move to effect release from Ellis Island of the accused "No. 1 Communist" of this country.

The 50-year-old Eisler, a native of Germany, was arrested yesterday on a deportation warrant and held without bail.

Justice Department officials said the warrant under which Eisler was picked up does not permit bond. But Mrs. Carol King, his New York lawyer said she would begin habeas corpus action today in an attempt to free her client.

The Justice Department declined to discuss all details of Eisler's seizure but practical effect of his arrest, if it is sustained, would leave him in custody until he has served time, been deported, or both.

Union Challenges New Labor Law

Indianapolis, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The International Typographical Union has challenged the constitutionality of the Taft-Hartley law in an action filed in federal district court here.

The brief charges that the section (10) of the law which gives the National Labor Relations Board the right to ask federal courts for injunctions is "repugnant to the due process clause of the federal constitution."

Nehru Seeking Peace

Man On Whom Gandhi's Mantle Has Fallen States Restoration Of Peace Is Issue On Which His Gov't Will Stand Or Fall; Abolishes "Violent" Organizations

Jawaharlal Nehru, prime minister of the Hindu Dominion of India and faithful disciple of the martyred Gandhi, has declared that the restoration of peace in his strife-torn country is the issue on which his government will stand or fall.

That's Nehru's answer to those who slew the Mahatma. It's his answer to those who, the government tells us, also plotted to kill Nehru and other members of his cabinet because they advocated peace with the Moslems as Gandhi taught.

Good for Nehru! Such a stand for right and justice deserves success, but Gandhi's death emphasizes that the prime minister will stand or fall on this issue.

There still exist in this sorry world of ours powerful interests that don't want peace—or if they want peace, it must be the kind they themselves impose by force. That's the reason the United Nations can't function. It's the reason why we still continue, and it is responsible in great degree for continuation of the economic chaos in many countries.

However, Nehru has recognized this truth and his declaration has

German Workers On Hunger Strike

Nearly Three Million In 24-Hour Protest Walkout; Demonstration Appears Aimed At German Food Officials

Hamburg, Germany, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Nearly 3,000,000 German workers went on a 24-hour hunger strike today. The walkout is expected to stall industry in the entire British zone and the state of Wurtemberg-Baden in the American sector.

Three simultaneous strikes began at midnight over an area reaching from Hamburg to Stuttgart. It is the greatest mass demonstration of this type yet held in Germany.

Streets and trains stopped running at the appointed hour in Stuttgart, Heidelberg, Mannheim and other major cities of Wurtemberg-Baden. In factories night shift workers left their machines.

Only vital utilities continued to operate. About 1,000,000 workers are involved in the Wurtemberg-Baden strike. The strikers have adopted the slogan of the "unequally laden table."

In both zones the walkouts appear to be aimed against German food officials rather than the occupying powers.

Most of the strikers in the British sector are office workers seeking food rations equal to those for laborers.

Dixie Demos Talk Split

Speak Bluntly Of Calling Convention To Split With Truman

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Southern Democrats talked bluntly today of calling a Dixie convention to split away from President Truman on the Civil Rights issue.

One deep South speaker who asked not to be quoted by name told a reporter present plans are to ask the conference of southern governors to call an all-Southern convention.

Such a political gathering could pick its own candidate for president. But the main objective would be to work out some way to withhold at least part of the South's electoral votes from Mr. Truman.

The governors will meet at Tallahassee, Fla., Friday. They are certain to take up Mr. Truman's message yesterday urging Congress to act on a 10-point Civil Rights program.

The Southerners are boiling mad over four of those points. They call for (1) a federal anti-lynching law, (2) a permanent fair employment practice commission, (3) an end to Jim Crow rules in transportation and (4) outlawing state poll taxes.

Senator Eastland (D-Miss.) called these proposals "outrageous."

"The South will have to protect herself in the electoral college," he told a reporter.

Eastland refused to be more specific.

CIO Strongly Opposes Cut In Initial ERP Cost

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The CIO declared today a deep cut in the \$6,800,000,000 starting cost of the Marshall Plan would be "well-high criminal."

CIO President Philip Murray said the slash of as much as \$1,600,000,000 would make it "merely a relief program and nothing more."

Furthermore, the European recovery program should run at least until the middle of 1952, as asked by President Truman, Murray said.

"No practical man or group of men could hope to bring about the needed rehabilitation in fewer than four years at the very minimum," the CIO leader said in a statement filed with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Murray had one objection to the Marshall Plan draft sent to Congress by the State Department. This provides for turning over 500 American ships to nations of western Europe.

Murray said the CIO is against that because the "continued economic well-being of the United States demands a strong U. S. Merchant Marine."

Republicans in Congress have objected both to the size of the starting cost and any attempt to commit this country to a four-year program.

There was talk today that Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Foreign Relations Committee is trying to keep peace in the GOP family by working out a compromise cut.

But he was said to be insisting that he cannot toss out the estimate of President Truman until he has assurance that the majority will not demand a further reduction in the cost for the first 15 months.

Rural Mail

The Greenville rural delivery carriers were unable to make deliveries of mail again today because of the dangerous condition of dirt roads. The last delivery to rural points was made last Saturday.

Unless bad weather sets in again, the rural carriers will deliver mail tomorrow, Postmaster J. Knott Proctor said.

A postal law requires rural mail box holders to clear snow away from the boxes to make them accessible to the carriers.

Nearly Over Effects Of Sleet, Snow

Eastern Part Of State Virtually Recovered As Warmer Temperatures Continue

Eastern North Carolina today had virtually recovered from its worst sleet and snow storm in 15 years, with continued springlike temperatures aiding in restoration of electricity to once-isolated Wilmington, Morehead City and Beaufort.

Beaufort, where 4,000 people had been without electricity and water since Friday night, expected service to be restored today. The town's water pumps are electrically operated.

Electricity was restored in Morehead City last night after a three day blackout caused by the storm which raged over the coastal area early on the weekend.

Wilmington, whose only contact with the outside world had been through one long distance telephone line and amateur radio hams, expected that 100 linemen, working round the clock, would complete restoration of electrical, telephone and telegraph service tonight or early tomorrow.

A high pressure air ridge along the coast today was expected to bring a continuance of yesterday afternoon's temperatures in the thawing forties. All main roads in the state had been opened yesterday.

Although temperatures overnight got down to below freezing, and are expected to continue frigid tonight and early tomorrow, no rain is forecast for the state until tomorrow, and then only in the west portion.

The erratic weekend storm mixed western North Carolina, and that section had about finished clearing its two-week cover of ice and snow.

Here are the minimum temperatures for the 24 hours ended at 7:30 a.m. today:

Charlotte 29, Greensboro 22, Elizabeth City 20, Warrington 15, Wilmington 25, and Cherry Point 27.

The Greenville Weather Station reported Monday's highest temperature was recorded at 46 degrees, and the lowest last night was 13 degrees. The thermometer reading at 8 a.m. today was 19.

Hurry Up Plans In Successfully From Shanghai

Shanghai, Feb. 3 — (AP) — American and other foreign officials, predicting that Shanghai's social unrest will worsen—today rushed plans for the swift evacuation of their nationals in an emergency.

Shanghai police were ordered, "Shoot to kill," if the past week's rioting flares anew.

Three women were killed and 110 persons, including 40 policemen, were injured yesterday in a pitched battle involving a portion of 7,000 sitdown strikers at a cotton mill. Three hundred workers were arrested.

Within the week, university students and thousands of cabaret girls rioted separately. Mayor F. C. Wu was roughed up, but not injured, when he intervened in the student strike to prevent bloodshed.

Foreign observers see little basis for optimism.

These observers, including many longtime students of Chinese affairs, note that the basis for these riots stem from basic causes including the civil war, inflation, and a resulting wave of lawlessness among the masses.

Reports Russia Returning Lend Lease Ships

Moscow, Feb. 3 — (AP) — A Tass dispatch from Washington said today that eight U.S. ships transferred to Russia under lend lease during the war are being returned.

The dispatch said Alexander Panayukhin, the Soviet ambassador in Washington, informed the United States government Saturday that the vessels—seven tankers and one cargo vessel—would be returned during February and March.

(The State Department in Washington confirmed last night that Russia had notified it of the projected return of the vessels. The United States has asked the Russians to return nearly 100 borrowed ships, or pay for them.)

A-Bomb Put On Assembly Line

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission is taking the A-bomb out of the laboratory and putting it on the assembly line.

The days when the weapons were experimental devices designed, made and put together by big name scientists are over.

The commission said in its semi-annual report to Congress yesterday that it has been working for the past year toward a "different scale of weapon production."

The idea is to "establish a much broader base for production operations and take steps to insure against 'bottlenecking' at any stage."

Senate Shelves Knutson's Bill; May Trim Tax Slash

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The senate put the Republican tax cutting bill on ice today.

The bill may stay in the cooler for two months or more.

And when it does come up for a senate vote, it probably will call for less than the \$5,000,000,000 cut overwhelmingly approved by the house.

The GOP measure rocketed through the house yesterday by a 297 to 120 count. That is 19 votes more than the two-thirds majority needed to override a veto.

Only one Republican—Rep. H. Carl Andersen of Minnesota—voted against it. Sixty-three Democrats voted for it.

But Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy committee, told reporters he doubts that the senate will be able to override a veto unless the amount of revenue loss is reduced.

Solons Turn To Rent Law

No-Ceiling Proposal Is Outlined By Senate Chairman

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — A proposal to permit "voluntary" sky-the-limit rent increases popped up in congress today. A decision was near meanwhile on another cost of living issue—meat rationing.

The suggestion for no-ceiling rent boosts—in exchange for long term leases—was outlined by Senator Cain (R-Wash.). Cain is chairman of a senate banking subcommittee studying legislation to extend rent controls beyond February 28.

The Washington senator told Rent Administrator Tighe Woods some committee members consider such a plan as the best way to speed the end of rent controls.

Under the plan, tenants could refuse to agree to an increase but could not demand lease protection beyond the expiration of controls.

On meat, another banking subcommittee called Charles F. Branham, assistant secretary of agriculture, for further testimony on a bill by Senator Flanders (R-Vet.) authorizing the government to get ready for rationing. The decision on whether to put the program into effect later would rest with congress.

The Vermont senator said that after leaving Branham the subcommittee might vote on the bill. He declared prospects for approval remain dim.

And Senator Tobey (R-N.H.), chairman of the full banking committee, told reporters he doubts there are enough votes in the main group to override rejection of the bill by the subcommittee. Tobey himself is for the bill.

Farm Bureau In ERP Discussion

Asheville, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The North Carolina Farm Bureau's 12th annual convention went into its third day today with the main topic of conversation being the impact of the Marshall Plan will have on Tar Heel farm products, especially cotton and tobacco.

The 500 delegates from more than 40 county farm bureaus in the state heard speaker after speaker declare that the European recovery program will have a far-reaching effect on farm production in the U. S. in 1948 and for years to come.

Abandon Search For Victims

Raleigh, N.C., Feb. 3 — (AP) — Fire Chief A. B. Lloyd said today his department was abandoning a search of the fire-wrecked Carolina Country Club, where five persons are believed to have died early Sunday.

Search of the ruins has failed to yield the bodies of three of the apparent victims, he said.

The search revealed no clue as to what started the fire, Chief Lloyd said.

Seek Owner Of Ball And Chain

Chester, Pa., Feb. 3 — (AP) — Chester police today are seeking the owner of a ball and chain found hidden in a pile of straw near the site of the partially constructed Pennsylvania railroad station.

The ball and chain—similar to those used to secure prisoners in years gone by—was found yesterday beside a red and green checkered hunter's cap. The pile of straw was packed down as though someone had used it as a bed, police said.

University Will Accept Negro

Fayetteville, Ark., Feb. 3 — (AP) — A Negro will be admitted to the University of Arkansas if he completes enrollment today, but he will attend classes separate from those of white students.

The Negro, Elias Hunt of Texarkana, began enrolling for the spring semester yesterday as a graduate student in the law school after his application was accepted.

Taft did not say how much of a reduction he thinks will be necessary, but some leading democrats predicted that if the bill is held down to around \$4,000,000,000 any presidential objections will be overruled.

In any event the senate is going to wait until the senate-house budget committee takes a whack at President Truman's proposal to spend \$39,700,000,000 during the fiscal year starting July 1.

After the thumping GOP victory in the house yesterday, Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) told reporters "there is no doubt as far as the house is concerned that we will pass the bill over any veto of the President."

There were still indications, however, that the senate will revise the \$5,500,000,000 figure downward to pick up Democratic votes there.

Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.), who wrote the bill, told reporters:

"The overwhelming majority given the tax reduction bill by the house reflects the general demand that our wartime tax burdens be lightened—now, not at some nebulous future date, as suggested by the President. The tax bill now is on the road to final enactment."

The house showdown vote came shortly after the Republicans, with the aid of 21 Democrats, beat down 258 to 159, a Democratic substitute bill. This proposed to cut individual income taxes \$4,000,000,000, but would have recovered all but \$800,000,000 of the revenue loss by a new \$3,200,000,000 excess profits levy on corporations.

The GOP measure, authorized by Knutson, would grant reductions to all of the \$2,000,000 income taxpayers, ranging from 100 per cent in the lowest income area to 10 per cent in the upper brackets. It would apply on 1948 incomes.

Paratroops In Big Jump

Cold Weather Maneuvers For Force Of 500 Paratroopers

Pinecamp, N. Y., Feb. 3 — (AP) — Five hundred paratroopers, conditioned against cold weather, were poised today for a mass jump against an imaginary enemy invading the United States.

Eighteen C-52 "Flying Boxcars" were on the ready line at Wheeler field to carry the white-clad paratroopers participating in "exercise snowdrop" over their drop zone. Clear skies with a minimum temperature of 10 degrees above zero were forecast for the jump.

The drop zone was a bleak, windswept field about five miles north of the village of Carthage.

Snow in the area was at least three feet deep. Lt. Col. Robert H. Wienecke of Glencoe, Ill., commanding officer of "exercise snowdrop" said.

The maneuver, which ends late Thursday, will consist of three phases. These are the airborne assault, a cross-country march on skis and snowshoes and an attack by the entire combat team.

The "enemy" supposedly invaded from the northeast, driving through Canada into the United States to a line extending from Buffalo, to Scranton, Pa., to Bridgeport, Conn. The problem also has the First and Ninth U. S. armies coming up from the south to halt the "aggressors."

Songsman Home From Hospital

Hollywood, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Joe E. Howard, 82-year-old songsman of the gaslight era, is back home from the hospital and a tangle with an automobile in which he came out second best.

Doctors said Howard ought to take it easy. He sustained many bruises and shock when knocked down Sunday, but the composer of "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now" and more than 500 other tunes said he had to be up and working on a new show. So he got up and went home.

Activity By Arabs May Presage All-Out Attack

Damascus, Syria, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Trucks loaded of armed Arabs rolling into Damascus led many observers to believe today that a general attack on Palestine Jews may be approaching.

Some believe such an attack has been set for Feb. 15.

Fawzi Bey Al Kaukji, leader of the Arab forces, told newsmen that "the Middle East's finest army is moving in."

He said he expects to move his headquarters to Palestine "soon," and that he will assume personal direction of operations.

"We are organizing slowly and thoroughly for an all-out fight," he said. "When we strike it will be with confidence of complete victory."

Ahmed Sharabati, Syrian defense minister, said in an interview Jan. 13 that a "direct frontal attack against Jewish forces can be expected." He said such an offensive, would be launched this month.

Sharabati said an Arab "People's Army" would make the attack, fighting against the partition of Palestine approved Nov. 29 by the United Nations.

The exiled Mufti of Jerusalem, Haj Amin Al Hussein, is in Damascus meeting with members of the Arab Higher Executive. Sources considered reliable said they discussed coordination of Arab volunteer tactics in Jerusalem. The Mufti arrived by air from Cairo yesterday.

At least four truck convoys of cheering, rifle-firing Arabs arrived in Damascus last night. Observers estimated the convoys carried about 1,000 men. A Syrian army officer said they had been trained in several Syrian camps.

Lewis Hints Coal Action In Demands

Fuel Short Nation Faces Possible Strike In Spring; UMW Head Aloof

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The fuel-conscious nation faced a possible threat from John L. Lewis today of a nationwide soft coal strike by spring.

Lewis told the industry he feels free to "take any independent action necessary" to start benefit payments to miners out of their untapped \$50,000,000 welfare fund.

Lewis' cryptic note yesterday puzzled the mine operators.

Some said they fear it may mean an April 1 strike by the 400,000 members of the United Mine Workers Union Lewis heads.

Reached at his home, the UMW chief said only: "I wouldn't have any comment at all."

The welfare fund was established in the 1946 coal agreement worked out by the government and calling for a five cent a ton royalty payment on every ton of coal produced.

But the fund's trustees—Lewis for the union, Ezra Van Horn for the operators and Thomas Murray of New York as a "neutral"—never have agreed on a plan to start paying out the money.

General Warns Coup In Korea If U.S. Steps Out

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Brig. Gen. Charles G. Helmick said today 250,000 Russian-trained North Koreans might take over Korea if the United States steps out.

Koreans in the U. S.-occupied southern zone he said "feel it would just be a matter of time."

Helmick is deputy American military governor in the southern zone. He said the North Korean troops have Japanese arms and some are believed to have combat experience with Chinese Communist armies in Manchuria.

In the southern part Helmick told a reporter, "we have a police force and a constabulary to back up the police, but they are considerably smaller."

Helmick said the American authorities have "devoted their money to education and economic rehabilitation, rather than to preparing for war."

U.S. Resources Dangerously Low

Washington, Feb. 3 — (AP) — America's natural resources may get dangerously low soon unless something is done about saving them, Secretary of the Interior Krug said today.

In his annual report Krug said the United States may have 135,000,000 mouths to feed by 1960 and 165,000,000 by 1980.

But, he warned, we are losing enough topsoil every year to support 175,000 persons.

The answer, he said, is to save coal, reclaim land, find new oil sources and waste less of everything.

New York City Asks Navy For Fuel Oil

New York, Feb. 3 — (AP) — New York City, hungry for fuel oil, has asked the U. S. Navy to share some of its supply.

Mayor William O'Dwyer revealed yesterday that he had appealed for "all the oil the Navy can spare."

He said his plea had not been answered yet.

'Bootleg' Labor Pacts

What Term "Bootleg Contract" Means; Peculiar Status In Law; NLRB Counsel Constantly Warns Against Such Pacts; Door Open To Unlimited Cases In Court

Washington—A new term, "bootleg contract," has crept into the conversation of people concerned with labor-management relations.

It means a contract in which an employer and a union agree to something that is forbidden by law. As heard in Washington, it usually means a contract for (1) a "closed shop" or (2) a "union shop" which hasn't been approved in the manner outlined in the Taft-Hartley Act.

Such a contract has a peculiar status in law. It isn't a crime. It isn't even "illegal" in one sense, since the mere signing of it can't be punished. But the performance of the obligations under these contracts is clearly forbidden and legally can be halted.

Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB), is constantly warning employers and unions that such contracts "will inevitably lead to trouble."

But some have been signed. Let's see how they came about.

Suppose a company and a union have had a closed shop contract for years. That is, the company

agreed to hire only members of the union and to fire anyone who lost his membership.

Suppose the contract expires. The Taft-Hartley Act forbids a renewal. For reasons of his own, the employer renews anyhow. (Maybe he is satisfied with the closed shop, or maybe he wants to avoid trouble with the union.) Yet, this would be called a "bootleg contract."

Take another example: A company has a union shop contract with a local union. That is, the company can hire anyone it pleases, but each new employee must join the union within a certain period—and stay joined—or else the company must fire him.

The law prohibits a renewal unless certain conditions are met. The main condition is that a majority of the employees must vote "yes" in an election conducted by the NLRB.

The law prohibits the NLRB from conducting such an election unless the union officers have filed non-Communist oaths.

Suppose the local union officers refuse to file. Or perhaps they are willing but their national officers

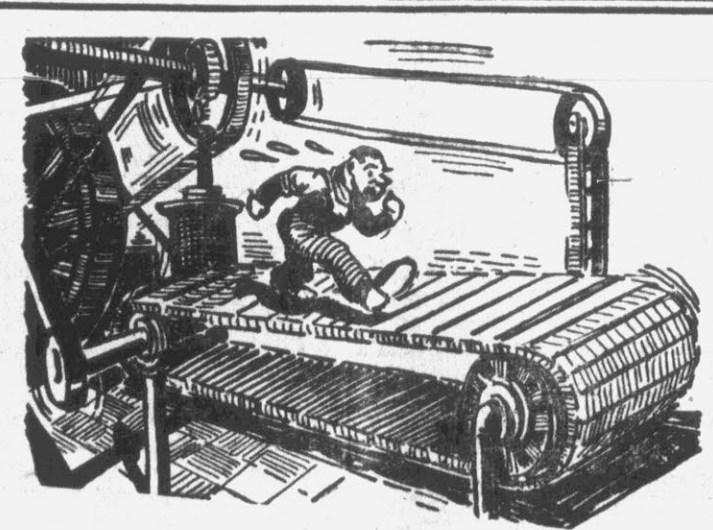

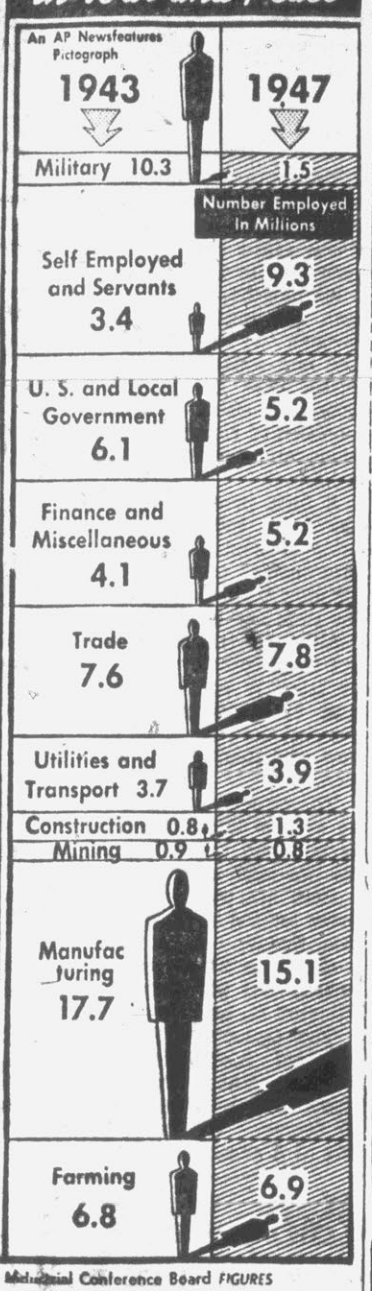

Second U.S. Title Seen Olympic

St. Moritz, Switzerland, Feb. 3.—(AP)—A second American moved within sight of a championship today while Norway was edging temporarily past Sweden for the team lead in the fifth Winter Olympics.

The daring veteran of the skeleton bobbed, Jack Heaton of New Haven, Conn., turned in three fast heats down the suicidal open ice tunnels to gain a second place tie at the halfway point of the Cresta Run.

Heaton's accumulated time of two minutes 23.2 seconds, shared by Nino Bibbia of Italy was only two-tenths of a second back of the leader, John Cranamond, British broker and naval officer.

They move into the final three heats tomorrow with Heaton conceding a good chance of successfully defending the Olympic championship he won in 1926, the last time the event was held.

Richard Button, 18-year-old Englewood, N. J., figure skating stylist, virtually assured himself a championship when he led yesterday through the compulsory figure tests—half of the title competition. Free skating, Button's specialty, is on schedule tomorrow.

These were other developments as the winter games hit the halfway pole with a stepped-up pace:

1. The United States' Amateur Hockey Association team won its third game in four starts, defeating Sweden, 5 to 2, to remain in the unofficial ice hockey round Robin. Unbeaten Canada defeated Italy, 21 to 1.

2. Sweden's four-man distance ski team—Nils Oestensson, Nils Tapp, Gunnar Eriksson and Martin Lindstrom—won the 40-kilometer (25-mile) ski relay in the Olympic record time of two hours, 32 minutes and eight seconds. The United States team withdrew.

3. On the strength of its ski victory Sweden supplanted Norway in the see-saw unofficial team standings, 49 points to the Norwegians' 39 1-2.

4. John Werket, the 23-year-old Minneapolis youth who was sixth in the 1,500 meter (metric mile) speed skating test yesterday, fell back in the longer 10,000 meter (6 1-4 mile test). His time of 19 minutes and 44 seconds was bettered by many early finishers.

Several skiers collapsed short of the tape because of difficulty in breathing in the high altitude.

Women's figure skating, in which the United States is conceded a good chance, topped today's program. The ladies will do compulsory figures.

AFL Opposes Wallace; Line Up PAC Head

Miami, Fla., Feb. 3—(AP)—The AFL turned thumbs down on Henry A. Wallace for president today and indicated it might pick a one-time isolationist senator to lead its new political campaign.

The AFL Executive Council opposed Wallace's third party candidacy for president on the ground that he was an "apologist" for the Communist party, and added the AFL would not be "hoodwinked" by Communist claims of liberalism.

As a possible director of the AFL's Political League, former Senator Burton K. Wheeler (D-Mont.) was suggested to the council, and probably will be recommended to the 30-member administrative committee of the league when it meets here tomorrow, members said.

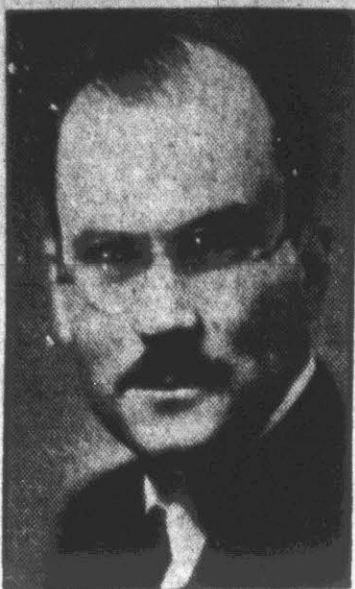
Mr. Green was born and reared in Pamlico County and spent all of his married life around Robersonville. He was a farmer and a member of Oak Grove Christian Church.

Diller, Neb.—(AP)—A new slant on a dog's devotion to its master almost cost a Diller dog its happy home.

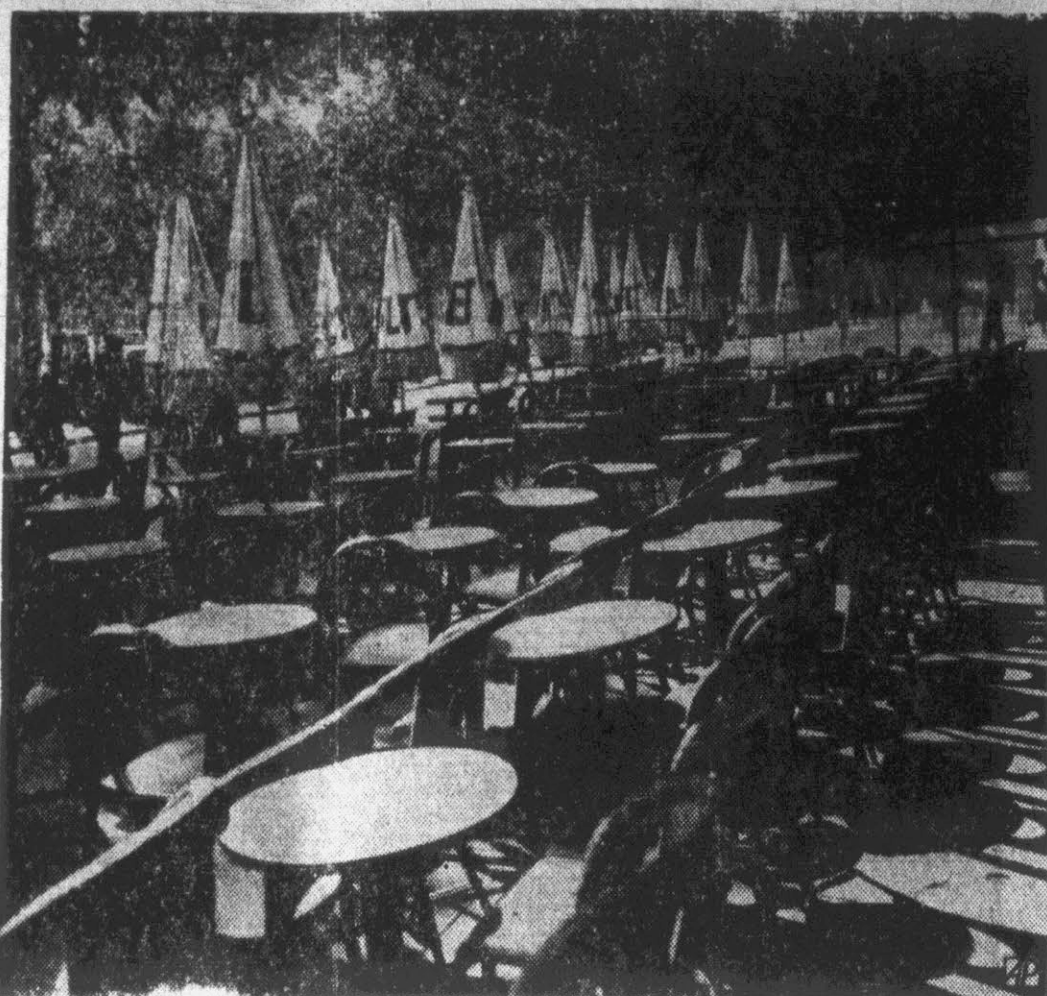

won't file. Either way, the local union can't have the election. And it can't get a union shop in accordance with law.

Yet some employers, in circumstances like these, have gone ahead and signed a union shop contract, perhaps with the motive of continuing happy relations with the union.

But here's the rub: The parties to the contract may be prosecuted for unfair labor practices.

The means by which the Taft-Hartley Act prohibits such contracts is a provision making it "unfair" for an employer to discriminate in favor of union members in hiring and firing (except in the case of a properly approved union shop contract).

It's also "unfair" for a union to cause or try to cause, an employer to so discriminate.

Here is an example of what can happen:

Suppose Employee Jones quits the union. Or the union expels him. The union asks the company to fire him.

The company, obeying the contract, does this.

Jones then can go to an NLRB office and file charges of discrimination. Denham's office can prosecute the case before the NLRB. The five-man NLRB, backed up by the federal courts if necessary, can order the company to reinstate Jones, and order the union to make good his back pay.

Denham says, therefore, that such contracts are unenforceable, don't protect either party, and open the door to "unlimited" law cases.

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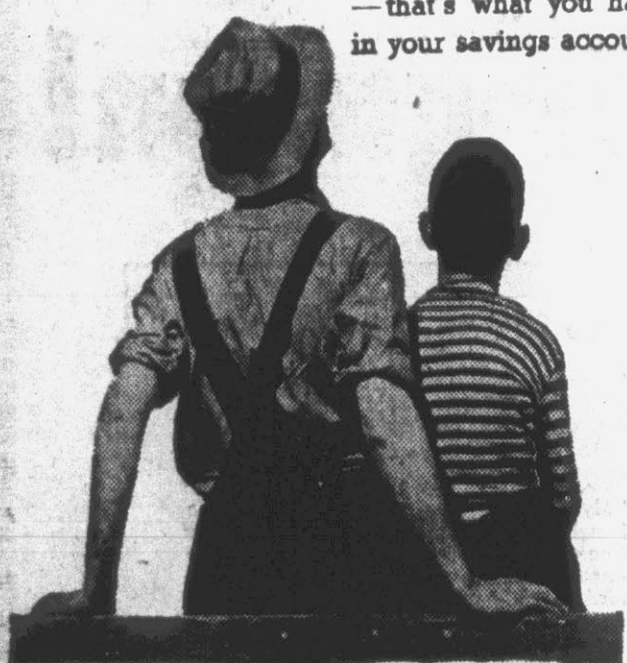
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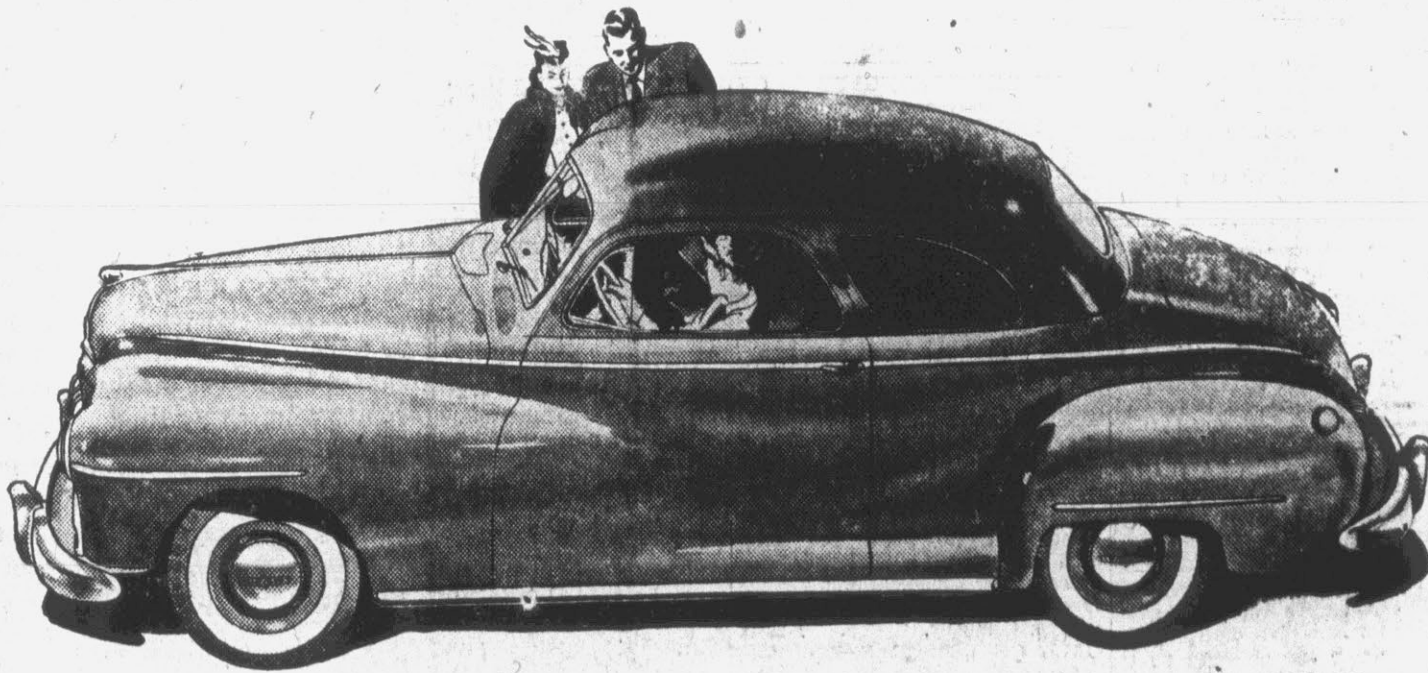
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
