# Some Speculation On Revolt In Dixie

### Politicians Wonder Whether Truman May Be Influenced To Choose Southern Mate For Running Mate; Party Leaders Tend Discount Out- cries

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—Politicians wondered today whether the cries of Dixie Democrats outraged by the racial issue might influence President Truman to choose a Southerner as his running mate.

The speculation among some Democrats here runs this way:

1. The revolt against Mr. Truman's 10-point civil rights program may never bring about the electoral college results its sponsors predict, but it could hurt the President in border states.
2. The late President Roosevelt was sufficiently concerned in 1944 by an even weaker Dixie protest to toss Henry Wallace overboard. He picked Mr. Truman a Southerner for his vice presidential nominee.
3. Someone like House Minority Leader Mayburn of Texas could be chosen without serious offense to either racial or labor groups in the North. He would give Southern Democrats a voice at court.

The politicians talked of these things emphatically and only speculating, President Truman alone knows now—regarding the Southern complaints. His party leaders are inclined to discount them.

Senator McGrath (R), Democratic National chairman, told a news conference at Troy, N. Y., yesterday that the Democratic party historically has championed human rights. He added he does not expect to "fall in line" on this issue.

It apparently is the party leaders' view that they have more to worry about on the score of Wallace's third party bid for the presidency than they have about the role of the South.

In some quarters, the President's submission of the 10-point program was credited, in part, to a desire to head off Wallace's appeal to minority groups.

These minorities cast the biggest vote here the presidential race may be the closest in New York New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and similar population centers.

Wallace has been working the minorities side of the street hard.

An example, he telegraphed the Senate Labor Committee yesterday to oppose segregation of Negro veterans in hospitals. Wallace said such a deal would be "outrageous" and smacked of a "fascist" creed.

Walter White, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People opposed the segregation in testimony before the committee.

All of this added up to no solace for the Southern Democrats.

Senator Overton (D-La.) said in a letter to constituents that Southern governors ought to call on the leaders in their states to hold conventions and possibly "organize a Southern Democratic party of our own and vote for its electors."

## Sheet Shortage Hampered Klan

Swinburn, Ga., Feb. 4—(AP)—Hooded night riders of the Ku Klux Klan, 188 strong, rededicated themselves "to the protection of white womanhood" here last night.

There would have been more Klansmen present, said a leader, but others were unable to obtain sheets.

# UN Power To Enforce

### Desperate Need For Armed Forces To Maintain Peace In Palestine; Arabs Ready To Fight; Makings Of A War; The Only Safeguard; Whose Responsibility?

The question before the house is: When, or when, will the United Nations get around to providing an armed force to maintain peace in Palestine pending the establishment of separate Arab and Jewish states?

That's more than a question. It's a prayer among those who recognize the terrible dangers of this situation in which the Arabs violently oppose separation and the Jews want it. Time presses.

The Jewish Agency for Palestine yesterday appealed for action by the U.N. Security Council against what the agency described as an Arab plot to overthrow the partition plan. A day earlier Associated Press Correspondent Daniel De Luce reported from Jerusalem that sporadic guerrilla fighting gripped Palestine from Jerusalem's ancient walls to the sea.

An unofficial tabulation stated that 1,048 Jews had been killed in the Arab-Jewish clashes since the U.N. decided to partition the Holy Land Nov. 29.

# CIO Blasts 'Politics' In Congress

### Lawmakers Accused Of Playing Politics While Economic Troubles Loom

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—The CIO today accused congress of playing politics while the high cost of living carries the nation toward an economic smashup.

Walter Rieve, CIO president, said the lawmakers should "rise above petty party bickering" and impose price controls forthwith.

Otherwise, he told the senate banking committee, "inflation will run its course and we may well fall into an economic collapse from which this nation and its people may not be able to extricate themselves."

The CIO wants congress to freeze all prices where they were on January 5, give President Truman price control powers until March 31, 1950, and let him ration things which affect the cost of living and production.

There is no need for wage controls, Rieve declared in his prepared statement.

"Money wages have been unable to keep pace with rising prices," he said, "and as a result real buying power lags considerably behind rising living costs."

Rieve said industry made \$1 profit for every \$7 paid out in wages in 1945, but in 1947 made \$1 for every \$4 of wages.

In addition to price control, rationing and the price freeze, the CIO recommended:

1. Appointment of a "coordinator" to run the anti-inflation program.
2. Legal curbs on those who speculate in commodities.
3. Taxation of "excess and speculative profits."
4. Extension of rent control, which expires February 29.

# Hungry Buzzards Killed Four Pigs

Goldboro, Feb. 4—(AP)—A flock of 50 hungry buzzards killed four pigs for Frank Lee of Mount Olive Route Four during the current bad weather, says W. C. West of Mount Olive Route Four.

Mr. West says: "I was reading in the News-Argus of the damage caused by the snow, so I decided to write and tell you what happened to Frank Lee's pigs. The buzzards got so hungry that about 50 flew into his hog pasture and killed four of his pigs weighing about 20 pounds apiece by picking out their eyes."

# Fritz Kuhn Escapes Prison Camp

### Former Leader Of Bund In U. S. Bids For Freedom From Dachau Cell

Munich, Germany, Feb. 4—(AP)—The Bavarian Denazification Ministry announced that Fritz Kuhn, former leader of the German-American Bund in the United States, escaped from a German internment camp at Dachau this morning.

Kuhn was jailed in July for possible trial as a Nazi offender. He has been held since without trial.

Kuhn, who had become a United States citizen by naturalization, was deprived of his citizenship in 1943 and deported to Germany in 1945.

First reports from the German-occupied internment camp said Kuhn escaped from guards as he was being taken from his cell. Unconfirmed reports said he was to be transferred to Nuremberg as a possible witness in American war crimes trial there.

Kuhn had lingered in Dachau since last July 24 when denazification authorities seized him for possible trial under the German denazification law.

At that time Munich Public Prosecutor Julius Herra said the 50-year-old ex-bund leader would be charged "on account of his extraordinary support of the Nazi regime by propagandist means."

Kuhn was freed by American authorities in Apsert, Germany in April 26, 1946 after six and a half years as a prisoner of the U.S.

# De Valera Big Issue As Irish Hold Election

Dublin, Feb. 4—(AP)—Irishmen voted today to determine whether Prime Minister Eamon de Valera will retain control of the government he has run since 1932.

The polls were open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. (4 a. m. to 4 p. m. EST) for balloting in the most hotly contested general election since the end of the civil war days in 1916. A record vote was predicted.

The big issue was whether the tall, gaunt prime minister could hold on to his power. His Fianna Fail party must obtain a majority—74 seats in the Dail (parliament) for him to do so.

There are 406 candidates for the 147 seats in the Dail. Six parties are in the running.

Eire's proportional representation has always made for a slow count of votes. Results are not expected until Friday. The count starts tomorrow.

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# Paratroops Rest After Sub-Zero Tactical Jump

Pine Camp, N. Y., Feb. 4—(AP)—Paratroopers of "Exercise Snowdrop," having jumped into the thick of battle against an imaginary enemy invading the United States moved out today (7 a.m.) to a bivouac area for rest and re-supply by air.

In sub-zero weather last night, the 500 troops depended upon sleeping bags and improvised shelters to keep warm. Each man wore 20 pounds of clothing. No fires were allowed.

The move to the bivouac area involved an eight-mile hike on snowshoes and skis.

Supplies of food, gasoline and medical equipment were to be dropped from C-52 "Flying Boxcars," the Army's largest twin-engine planes.

Sixteen of the giant transports were used for the mass jump of the 52nd Airborne Division members yesterday.

# German Unions Continue Threat

Frankfurt, Germany, Feb. 4—(AP)—Western Germany's biggest strike since pre-Nazi days ended at midnight, but union leaders threatened even more drastic action unless German officials improve the food ration.

An estimated two to three million strikers began returning to work this morning after a 24-hour "hunger" walkout which crippled business and industry in the entire British zone and in the American zone state of Wurttemberg-Baden. There was no violence.

# Philippine 'Quake' Toll Raised To 72

Manila, Feb. 4—(AP)—The death toll in the Central Philippines January earthquakes was raised to 72 today. Additional casualties from landslides were reported.

Two slight aftershocks were recorded yesterday, increasing the reported tremors to more than 90.

# Europe Moving Toward Recovery

### Economic Experts Cite Great Strides But Add Continent Still Desperately In Need Of Outside Assistance

Geneva, Feb. 4—(AP)—Most economic experts here believe Europe is making great strides toward industrial and economic recovery. But, they add, she still desperately needs help.

Delegates and officials of the United Nations economic commission for Europe are optimistic about the commission's success in planning European self-help across all political differences. They say they cannot estimate, however, how long it will take the continent to overcome the ravages of the war.

A general reluctance to forecast the rate of progress appeared due, in part at least, to uncertainty over many vital factors. These include future harvests, possible industrial unrest and the extent of American aid—now being argued in congress.

Under the Marshall plan, as enunciated by the U. S. Secretary of State at Harvard last June, the European nations are required to do what they can on their own and together to put Europe on its economic feet. The commission's planning, however, is distinct from the Marshall plan.

A full analysis of Europe's present economic position and prospects now is being prepared by the economic commission's research division. The division is headed by British economist Nicolas Kaldor, a native of Hungary. The report is expected to be ready for publication early next month.

Kaldor is maintaining close secrecy about the conclusions of his survey. They are being drawn from data supplied by nearly every European nation, including members of the commission.

Sweden's Prof. Gunnar Myrdal, the commission's executive secretary, declines specific comment on the status of Europe's economic recovery pending publication of the survey.

He has, however, referred frequently to "considerable progress" made during the past year both in actual production and in self-help measures taken by various technical committees of the commission. They have been operating here for several months with a noteworthy absence of disension.

"Our technical work has been proceeding in inverse proportion to the development of political tension," Myrdal commented.

One senior member of the commission's secretariat said that even if European production developed to a point above the highest prewar level, Europe still would be in desperate need.

The accumulated demand caused by the war destruction and long-deferred consumer requirements cannot be filled for many years, he said.

# Faint SOS Picked Up

New York, Feb. 4—(AP)—A Brooklyn landlord, harassed by complaints of a leaky roof, refrigeration, broken windows and inadequate heat, offered yesterday to give the dwelling to his tenant.

Sam Yeicher, 35, the landlord, had been brought to court by tenants who complained they had no heat.

Yeicher's lawyer explained he would be "ticked to death" and "to clean the house over 'free and clear' to his tenant."

The tenants went into a building, then came back with their lawyer: "Nothing doing."

# Vets In Line For Relief

Alabama Senator Requests Were Ineffective

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—A \$10 to \$30 monthly boost in living allowances is in prospect for approximately 2,000,000 veterans attending school.

Congressional action on a bill providing the increase was completed yesterday by the House. Only President Truman's signature is needed to make them effective April 1.

The House also passed Senate-approved legislation to let ex-GI's draw more pay for on-the-job training. But it has to go to a Senate-House conference committee to thresh out differences.

The bill raising government subsistence allowances for student veterans cleared the House on a 370-6 vote. It provides:

1. A \$75 monthly payment for unmarried veterans—an increase of \$10.
2. A \$106-a-month allowance for a veteran with one dependent—a veteran and his wife, for example, a veteran with two or more dependents would get \$120. The allowance for veterans with one or more dependents is now \$90 monthly.

The other bill, passed 371 to 0, hikes the amount a veteran taking on-the-job training may receive from his employer while getting a government allowance. It sets these ceilings for combined allowances and pay:

- 1—for single men, \$350 a month;
- 2—for married veterans with one dependent, \$325; and those with two or more, \$350.

# UN Palestine Body Will Send Advance Party

Lake Success, Feb. 4—(AP)—The United Nations Palestine Partition Commission will send an advance party into the Holy Land, possibly within 10 days.

A source close to the five-nation commission said the party would go to Jerusalem first to lay groundwork for the split-up of Palestine.

The commission made the decision yesterday but did not decide on the composition or date of entry of the group. It was stipulated, however, that the party would not include any of the delegates. A U.N. official said the move from here might be started within 10 days.

# Italy Plans Ban 'Private Armies'

Rome, Feb. 4—(AP)—Italy's government has decided to get tough with the Communists' "private army," a spokesman for Premier Alcide De Gasperi said today.

The spokesman said the cabinet, meeting tomorrow, will vote to put teeth into Article 18 of the new constitution. This article bans secret societies and military organizations for political purposes.

BATTLESHIP INACTIVATED

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 4—(AP)—Veteran of five campaigns in the Pacific, the Navy's mammoth battleship Wisconsin is to be inactivated and assigned to the Atlantic fleet's Fifth Naval District announced today.

# Solon Says Truman Bills Are Doomed

### Two Measures Boosting Allowances Await Signature

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.) declared today that most of President Truman's anti-inflation requests are doomed.

The Alabama senator has been one of the leaders in the fight for the President's 10-point cost of living program.

Sparkman told a reporter the hopelessness of the situation was made plain by a Senate banking subcommittee decision to kill a bill which would have permitted preparations for most rationing.

"That bill," said Sparkman, "was by far the mildest anti-inflation measure before the banking committee. It seems mighty clear that the Republicans are not going to do anything about living costs, except extend rent controls in some form or another."

Actually, one Democrat joined two Republicans in recommending that the "get ready" meat rationing bill be allowed to die. One Republican and one Democrat voted for it.

The subcommittee report now is before the full banking committee. Chairman Tobey (R-N.H.) himself in favor of the measure, predicts the main group will back up the subcommittee when the bill comes up for another vote, probably next week.

The full committee also expects to vote next week on legislation which would meet Mr. Truman's request for stand-by power to restore rationing and wage-price controls on a limited basis.

These are the measures Sparkman said do not have a chance.

Meanwhile, Senator Taft (Ohio), chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, said he expects a rent control extension bill to come up in the Senate about February 12. The present law expires February 29.

No extension bill has cleared even a subcommittee yet, but Chairman Cain (R-Wash.) said he hopes to have some sort of a measure in the hands of the full banking committee by Friday.

# Spy Ring Broken As Greeks Claim New Successes

Athens, Feb. 4—(AP)—The Greek 8th division announced today the arrest of Ioannina of 14 persons and the breaking of a spy ring.

The 14 were detained to have been furnishing guerrillas with details on troop movements. All those arrested were described as Communists. They will be tried by a military court.

Third Army headquarters at Salonika said 322 guerrillas were killed and 706 captured or surrendered in the two weeks ended January 12 in central and western Macedonia.

An informant source said several U. S. reconnaissance planes have been delivered to Greece. He said military airfields had added anti-aircraft guns and searchlights to defenses. The guerrilla radio asserted recently the rebels were developing an air force.

# Dismiss Three Soviet Protests

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—The first three of Soviet Russia's current series of protests against American military moves abroad have been dismissed as groundless by the State Department.

But Moscow may have somewhat better luck with the fourth, received yesterday. It charged American fliers with ten specific acts of circling or flying low over Soviet shipping near Japan last fall. A department spokesman said the alleged incidents will be investigated before a reply is made "eventually."

# GOP Senators Thinking Of Delay For Tax Cuts

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—Some Senate Republicans are thinking of delaying any tax cut until July 1.

The bill passed overwhelmingly by the House Monday would carry the tax cut back to January 1. It would add \$6,500,000,000 off the amount taxpayers will owe on 1948 earnings.

But GOP senators say they must hold the revenue loss to somewhere near \$4,500,000,000 to get the Democratic votes necessary to override an expected presidential veto.

Making the tax cut a six-month affair would take \$3,250,000,000 off the taxpayers' bills for 1948. But that might not satisfy the Democrats over the long run because they estimate the House measure will cut federal revenues a total of \$7,100,000,000 in the 12 full months after July 1.

So the Republicans still are talking also of halving the 10 to 30 percent rate reductions of the House bill. That would save the Treasury about \$1,500,000,000 over the course of a year.

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# Calls Halt To New Pay, Profit Hikes

### More Cold Forecast In Midwest

Chicago, Feb. 4—(AP)—Zero weather chilled the northern section of the country today from the Dakotas to northern New England as shortage of fuel supplies in some communities continued acute.

There appeared no relief for the frigid north central region where temperatures skidded to a low of 38 below. The mercury dipped past the 30 below mark in parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin today and to a low of 25 below in northern New England. Lows included -31 at Bemidji, Minn. As the sub-zero line extended from the Dakotas to Iowa, and -25 at Caribou, Me.

But the current cold snap in the central states, federal forecasters said, will be "reinforced." They predicted a large mass of cold air sweeping in northwest Canada will sweep into Minnesota tonight and spread over the area. Temperatures, however, were expected to moderate in the east and New England states.

Snow and freezing rain fell in many sections of the country, slowing highway travel. A rain belt was reported from the western Gulf northward through eastern Texas and Oklahoma and a wide area of snow extended northward into South Dakota and eastward across Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, eastern Ohio and parts of Michigan and Wisconsin.

Low readings in the cold belt this morning included -28 at Land O'Lakes, Wis.; -32, Bemidji, Minn.; -30, Caribou, Me., and -17, Ticonderoga, N.Y. The mercury fell in the Midwest yesterday.

In New York City, where the mercury was near the 30 above mark as compared to -3 at Albany and zero at Syracuse, the Navy announced it will complete plans today to send oil to New York State and the metropolis to help overcome the current critical shortage.

Colder weather was in prospect for California, with rain and snow predicted for the drought area.

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# No Jackson Day Dinners In S. C.

Columbia, S.C., Feb. 4—(AP)—W. P. Baskin, state Democratic chairman, indicated today South Carolina Democrats would not hold the customary money-raising Jackson Day dinners this year.

The A.P. Air Line pilots Association said the walkout which began at 11 p. m. last night, was "the inevitable climax of two years of notoriously poor pilot-management relations."

"They also blamed as the other of 'two motivating reasons,' a 'concern over air safety.'"

# The Rights Of Man

### What Does Freedom, Civil Rights Mean? President's Message To Congress On Civil Rights; Where Do These 'Rights' Come From? An Old Idea; History

Washington, Feb. 4—(AP)—The rights of man... freedom... civil rights... we throw the words around. What do they mean? Sometimes, it seems, they lose their meaning.

President Truman issued a message this week on civil rights. In it he asked Congress to pass laws protecting better the civil rights of all citizens.

The Constitution guarantees all of us certain rights: to vote, to a fair trial if we're accused of crime; to free speech; to free worship.

In his 4,000-word message Mr. Truman used the word "rights" 84 times which is understandable since it was a message on rights.

But what rights does man really have? And how did they come to be listed in the Constitution as the law of the country?

The rights of man are an old idea. We've put it into practice and tried to protect it with the Constitution only after ages of blood and agony for mankind.

That's because it took man centuries to work out the idea clearly in his mind. He had to shake off tyranny to make it work.

# Attlee's Government Seeks Check Inflation In Britain By Pegging Incomes; Stresses Need For Increased Volume Of Production

London, Feb. 4—(AP)—The British government called today for a halt on increased wages and profits. It was a move to check inflation.

Prime Minister Attlee's Labor government issued a white paper saying:

"It is essential that there should be no further general increase in the level of personal incomes without at least a corresponding increase in the volume of production."

"Unless we are prepared to check such a tendency, we shall find ourselves unable to fulfill our export task, owing to the rise in costs which will be reflected on the home market."

In recognition of the shaky British economic position, Attlee planned to take the floor in the House of Commons and outline the need for self sacrifice by British workers and employers.

Informants said a decision to try to peg incomes temporarily was reached at a cabinet meeting yesterday. They said the prime minister would present the program on a voluntary basis.

It would however amount to the first wages-price declaration since the Labor government came to power in 1945. The government previously limited its intervention in such matters to collective bargaining between employers and unions. In these they appealed to the workers not to ask for major pay increases in return for a promise to keep living costs down.

Living costs have been climbing, however, particularly since the decision late last year to freeze government food subsidies at the present level.

The government informants said Attlee's proposal had been laid before Parliament at 3:30 p. m. on Feb. 3.

At the same time, the government will issue a white paper outlining the need for curbing increased incomes to prevent inflation.

One official spokesman conceded the proposal would touch off bitter debate in the House of Commons.

"The Conservative opposition has been campaigning for a long time against government controls, although conceding that some might have to be retained for a while."

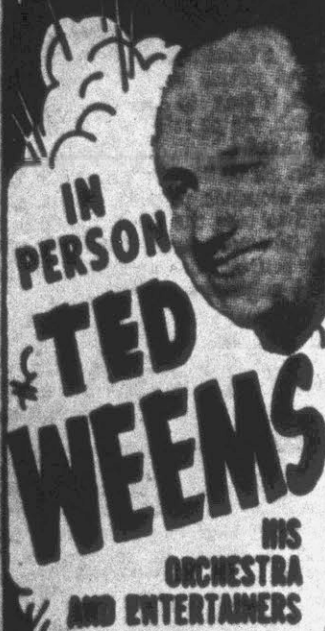

no neutral armed force at hand to maintain order, all haves obviously can break loose. The commission recognizes the danger and authoritative sources say that it will ask the U.N. Security Council for an international force to make the partition effective.

So in the long run it's up to the Security Council. That theoretically powerful body thus far has been virtually ham-strung by Russian employment of the veto vested in the Big Five nations. However, there have been some indications that in this case Russia might agree, providing the Big Five furnished the armed force for Palestine. The signs are that Moscow would like to have Soviet troops in the oil-rich and strategically important Middle East.

This might be one case in which at least America and Britain would interpose a veto, since they have no

desire to see Russian fighting men installed there. It might be too difficult to get the Russians out after the need of the security force had passed. For this reason the so-called Guatemala Plan is again being discussed.

This plan—proposed by Guatemala—provides that the personnel of the armed force for Palestine come from small nations, and that they be financed by the big powers. If the Big Five would agree to that in the Security Council it might solve the difficulty—always providing that the council moves fast.

democracy — both groups — comes down to this:  
The individual is important, not the state. The state is created by individuals for the individual, not the individual for the state.

Here's the position of an individual in a totalitarian state from the "political doctrine of fascism" by Alfred Rocco. It was published in 1926 when Italian fascism was just getting under way:

"For fascism society is the end, individuals the means, and its whole life consists in using individuals as instruments for its social ends . . ."

"Fascism faces squarely the problem of the right of the state and of the duties of the individuals. Individual rights are only recognized in so far as they are implied in the rights of the state."

But the rights of individuals in this country are not always protected but are often violated, as Mr. Truman pointed out.

"The Encyclopedia Britannica sums up what has happened to civil rights and liberties in this country:

"At various times and places minorities, many of which later became respectable, have been persecuted by Americans in ways which match the more wholesale horrors of the totalitarian terrors.

"Jews, Masons, Catholics, Quaker, Mormons, Abolitionists, Copperheads, Southerners, carpetbaggers, Irish Germans, Negroes, Indians, Chinese, Japanese, strikers, employers, union organizers, 'seabs', syndicalists, anarchists, communists, fascist pacifists, feminists, artists, teachers.

"Some of these in turn have violated each other's liberties."
