Announces Candidacy For Office

W. Kerr Scott Throws
Hat In Ring For Gov-
ernorship; Will Re-
sign Office

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—W. Kerr Scott came home today to announce that he will be a candidate for the nomination for governor of North Carolina in the Democratic campaign in May.

Scott's announcement ended state wide speculation on the subject that had been discussed for several weeks.

Weeks ago when Scott announced he would not be a candidate to succeed himself as Commissioner of Agriculture at the expiration of his third term, or 12 years in office, this year, he had no idea of becoming a gubernatorial candidate, he said today.

When he made his surprise announcement in Raleigh that he would not seek reelection, his intention, according to his statement today, was to retire to the beautiful section of Alamance county and devote his time to dairy farming as a major interest, and general farming as a minor interest.

There was an immediate upsurge of sentiment among friends of the commissioner throughout North Carolina, urging him to become a candidate for governor, the apparent strength of which, together with the advice of home folks in Alamance county, shaped his decision to accede to their wishes, and engage in a campaign, Scott continued.

His official statement asserted: "I have decided to become a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor in the 1948 primary.

I shall resign immediately from the office of Commissioner of Agriculture because I feel that no man occupying a high state office can serve the people properly while campaigning for that office. The people are entitled to know adequately and without a doubt—the essential facts about a candidate and the things for which he stands. I intend to guarantee to them this opportunity and right."

**Recommend Cut
Of \$2.5 Billion
In U.S. Budget**

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—A senate-house committee today formally recommended that \$2,500,000,000 be cut from proposed government spending during the fiscal year starting July 1.

The 1702 member committee composed of members of the senate and house but had no appropriation committee was created by the congressional reorganization act to put a ceiling on government expenditures.

The recommendations it approved were drafted by a subcommittee and are subject to senate and house approval. Even then they are not binding but constitute merely a fiscal goal for congress to shoot at.

The committee, composed of Republicans and Democrats with the GOP in control, recommended a minimum payment of \$2,000,000,000 on the national debt next year.

**Church League
Asks Referendum**

Winston-Salem, N.C., Feb. 6—(AP)—The Allied Church League of North Carolina adopted a resolution calling for a statewide referendum on the sale of liquor at its annual meeting here yesterday.

The league also went on record favoring abolition of the so-called "gallon" law which permits residents of dry counties to purchase one gallon of liquor and transport it into a dry area for personal consumption.

See Fight On Rent Bill

Relaxed Controls Expected To Bring A Free-For-All In Congress

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—A bill to extend rent controls 14 months in greatly relaxed form threatened to bring on an election year free-for-all in Congress today.

Some Democrats moved to put more teeth in it even before it reaches the Senate for debate. Some Republicans defended it as a deserved break for landlords.

Chairman Tobey (R-NH) called the full Banking Committee to a closed door afternoon meeting (3 p.m.) to decide what to do.

The bill is the product of a subcommittee headed by Senator Cain (R-Wash.).

It would:

1. Permit unlimited boosts in rents in cases where tenants and landlords agree on leases running through all of 1949.
2. Wipe out government restrictions on building of such things as theaters and amusement parks.
3. Give local rent boards more say over whether rent ceilings should be increased or eliminated in their areas.

4. Continue whatever controls remain through April 30, 1949, under the Federal Housing Expediter.

Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.), a member of the full committee, told a reporter the no-limit provision on "voluntary" leases would give landlords "a lot of opportunity to coerce tenants into signing up at very big increases."

The law, which expires Feb. 29, limits such increases to 15 per cent.

UP ALLOTMENT

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 6—(AP)—Increases in Federal school lunchroom allotments totaling \$905,000 were approved by the state board of education yesterday.

The increases become effective immediately.

The board voted to increase allotments on all lunches, whether served with or without milk.

**New Advanced Designs
In Warships Proposed**

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—Planes big enough to carry atomic bombs may be able to operate from a giant new American aircraft carrier.

The proposed addition of a 60,000-ton mammoth flat-top and eight other experimental warcraft to the nation's arsenal of new weapons was first hinted at a month ago by President Truman.

The President proposed in his budget message to Congress that \$330,000,000 which would have gone into ships now on the ways be used instead to build fighting craft of "advanced design."

It remained, however, for Secretary of the Navy Sullivan to provide the still sketchy details of what those ships will look like.

And Sullivan made another disclosure: The hopes for guided missile development are somewhat ahead of accomplished fact.

National Week
With Activities**

More than 2,120,000 members of the Boy Scouts of America throughout the nation will observe the 38th anniversary of the organization during Boy Scout Week which begins today and continues through Thursday, February 12th.

The theme of Boy Scout Week this year is, "The Scout Citizen at work . . . in his home . . . in his community . . . in his nation . . . in his world." The anniversary will be celebrated in every city and town and most villages and hamlets throughout the nation and its possessions.

More than 14 million men and boys have been members of the Boy Scouts of America since the movement was established in 1910.

The Scouts and Scouters of the Greenville District, East Carolina Council, will join thousands nationally this week in celebration of Boy Scout Week. The activity will begin with the placing of window displays in local stores Saturday. Sunday will find the Scouts, in keeping with the spirit and tradition of the Scout movement, attending church together. This year the troops will all attend the First Presbyterian Church in Greenville. The troops in the county will attend church by troops in their own community.

The highlight of the week will be the traditional fash and snout banquet which will be held Thursday night, February 12, at the Woman's Club. **RAF Test Pilot
Claims Record In
New Jet Plane**

Gloucestershire, Eng., Feb. 6—(AP)—W. A. Waterson claimed a world speed record of 515.89 miles an hour over the 100-kilometer closed course for his twin jet meteor IV plane today.

Waterson is an RAF squadron leader and test pilot. The previous record for such a course was set by group Capt. John Cunningham, who made the required three circuits last August in a De Havilland vampire jet fighter at an average of 496.83 mph.

Both United States and British jet planes have exceeded 800 miles an hour over other courses. British announced last Nov. 25 that a jet fighter had averaged 617.63 miles an hour on a test flight between Edinburgh and London. The U. S. navy's jet-propelled Douglas Sky-Stream holds a record of 650.6 The U. S. fifth air force announced in Tokyo Jan. 3 that two of its P-80 jet fighters aided by tail winds, had made flights at 777.7 and 788 mph.

**Six Trapped In
Burning Home**

St. Louis, Feb. 6—(AP)—Six children were trapped and burned to death last night in a fire which in a matter of minutes turned their four-room frame bungalow into a huge torch.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. E. Hoff, were burned in futile attempts to rescue them. The father, a 31-year-old stone setter, is in critical condition.

Collect Sunday

The twice-postponed campaign for collecting overseas relief materials in Greenville is again scheduled for Sunday, Feb. 8.

On two previous occasions when the general drive was announced, bad weather intervened and collections were called off, but Chairman Charles White announced today that the collections will be made Sunday regardless of the weather.

All persons making donations are asked to leave them on the front doorsteps of their homes or leave them at their church and they will be picked up Sunday afternoon beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Price Drop Easing Off

No Indications Yet Whether Break Is A Turn In Inflation Road

New York, Feb. 6—(AP)—Prices of most grains extended their slide downward today, but at a slower pace. At the same time the stock market showed signs of regaining its balance.

Opening prices on the exchanges were little help in answering whether this week's precipitate drop in commodity and stock prices was a temporary correction or a permanent change in trend.

But wheat failed for the first time in three days to drop the allowable daily limit at the opening of the Chicago Board of Trade. And September and December oats contracts were managed slight advances.

Corn again hit its limit decline. Stocks were no worse than mixed on New York's Exchange after losing around \$1,500,000,000 in market value in two days.

Some other commodities held to a down trend although showing signs of stabilizing. Cotton futures were stable and mixed at New York; cottonseed oil was uneven and soybean oil unchanged to lower.

The commodity markets were closely watched by those seeking to determine if the upward spiral in the cost of living might be at an end.

Whether the housewife eventually would pay less for a loaf of bread or a cotton dress depended on one prime factor: whether the break in prices is a flash in the pan or a decisive turn in the inflation road.

The answer may come in the next few days.

**Administration
Of Bizonia Is
Made Stronger**

Berlin, Feb. 6—(AP)—The United States and Britain, ignoring demands for dissolution of Bizonia, proclaimed today a stronger economic administration for the two zones with a high court to enforce decisions.

This is the framework:

1. A state council, or upper house, made up of two representatives named by each of the state governments.
2. The economic council, or lower house, will control railway, coastal shipping, inland transport, customs, some excise taxes, communications, patents, price control, financial matters, foreign and domestic trade, gas, water, electricity, and the distribution of goods, raw materials and food. It can override a state council veto by an absolute majority. Its present membership of 54 will be increased to 104 by elections in state parliaments of the British and American zones.
3. A high court, sitting at Cologne in the British zone. It will consist of 10 members named by the U. S. and British military governors from a list of 25 candidates submitted by the two houses. The court will "owe obedience only to the law," the proclamation said.
4. An executive committee. This will have a chairman and five directors—leading bizonal departments of economics, finance, transportation, communication, and food and agriculture. Its members will be elected by the economic council and confirmed by the state council.

**French Reds Call
For New Rally**

Paris, Feb. 6—(AP)—Communists rallied their forces today for demonstrations throughout France Sunday against the government's monetary measures. City and farm workers were called on to participate.

The Communist party and the Communist-dominated Confederation of Labor urged Frenchmen to demand wage increases and to attack the government's financial plans, including devaluation of the franc.

Feud Over Civil Rights At New High

Georgian Says South's
Revolt Is Most Serious
He Has Ever
Seen

Washington Feb. 6—(AP)—The bitter, Democratic feud over civil rights hit a new pitch today. Senator Russell (D-Ore.) contended that President Truman is planning an FBI "testcase" to break down race segregation in the South.

Russell told a reporter the South's revolt against the President's call for new measures to knock down racial barriers "is more serious than any I have seen in my lifetime."

This is true, the Georgian said, because Southern Democrats have interpreted the President's demand for an end to Jim Crow laws on trains and buses as the opening wedge in a fight to halt all race segregation.

"That could mean, he said, Negroes and whites would attend the same schools, swim in the same pools, eat together and, eventually, intermarry."

"The President has made the last declaration that he considers segregation to be discrimination and a violation of civil rights," Russell declared. "He wants to set up a commission and hire a lot of lawyers to fight segregation wherever it exists."

"He has ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation to work with the Department of Justice Civil Rights Division and says it is giving specialized training to its agents. This is nothing more or less than an FBI test case to break down race segregation in the South."

Russell's charge highlighted these developments:

1. Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) called the Senate Republican policy committee together to pick a spot on the legislative schedule for an expected battle with filibustering Southerners over one or more civil rights measures.
2. Senator Ball (R-Minn.) predicted that Congress will pass an anti-discrimination bill with enforcement provisions. Ball voted "no" when the Senate Labor Committee approved such a measure yesterday, seven to five.
3. Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) called Gov. Fielding Wright of Mississippi today to a conference at Tallahassee, Fla., to discuss the "Southern Governors' today to have a call for an "Independent" Democratic convention to split away from Mr. Truman.
4. A Democratic official said the party's national committee will "sit tight" to see what happens before it charts its course.

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**Charge Obstruction To
Partition Of Holy Land**

Lake Success, Feb. 6—(AP)—The Soviet Ukraine today accused Britain of obstructing the partition of Palestine.

Vassily A. Tarasenko, Ukrainian delegate on the Security Council, charged that the position taken by the British was contrary to the United Nations Assembly's decision to split the Holy Land into Jewish and Arab nations.

In his first formal interview with an American reporter since taking a seat on the council Jan. 1, Tarasenko said:

"The position taken by Great Britain on the Palestinian question is contrary to the resolution on the General Assembly, since such a position not only does not assist in carrying out this resolution, but is putting the drag on it."

He did not elaborate on the accusation.

The British have declined to permit the U.N.'s five-nation Palestine Commission to enter the Holy Land until two weeks before the tentative British withdrawal date of May 15.

**Routine Plane
Trip Prolonged**

Running Start For War On Spending

Campaign To Cut Spending For Scarce Foods
Already Initiated By Consumers Says
Agriculture Department In Review

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—The government reported signs today that its campaign to cut spending for scarce foods is off to a running start.

The agriculture department said a review of market trends since the first of the year shows widespread resistance by housewives to the high price of butter and choice meat cuts.

Demand for meat in some areas, the report said, has turned "sluggish." Consumers are showing more interest in cow and chuck beef, veal and lamb, less in steaks and roasts from top grade steers.

In the dairy markets the demand for butter fell off more sharply than usual after the year-end holidays, the department found. It said high prices were a factor.

Secretary Anderson said yesterday self-rationing of this kind is one way to put the brakes on inflation of food prices.

"The high cost of living is so serious that we cannot afford to do nothing while waiting for legislation to deal with the problem," Anderson declared.

He spoke to a score of consumer, food industry and farm representatives who will advise the government on its nationwide voluntary self-rationing program.

Anderson said consumers should be especially careful of their spending for meat because it is leading the forward march of prices.

"Meat prices are an important factor in determining whether high priced wheat will be used for livestock feed," he said, "and consumers can influence meat prices by their own buying actions."

The government's program will be announced, Anderson said, after the department has had a chance to study suggestions offered at the closed meeting yesterday.

The Senate banking committee wound up its month-long hearing on various proposals for compulsory wage-price controls and rationing. Yesterday's hearing on price-wage controls and rationing ended in an argument between chairman Tobey (R-NH) and T. J. Wood, vice president of Procter and Gamble, over the price of the shortening known as "Crisco."

Wood said the company charges on a fair price.

Tobey declared the price has just about doubled in the last few years. To him he said, that looks like "avidity, cupidity and a lust for profits."

Later the firm issued a statement insisting that the price of Crisco has not gone up as much since pre-war days as the cost of the raw products which go into it.

**Order Attack On
Unidentified
Submarines**

Athens, Feb. 6—(AP)—The Greek Navy Ministry today ordered its warships to attack and sink all unidentified submarines in Greek territorial waters.

The order followed the reported appearance of two strange submarines.

One was reported between the Peloponnese and Crete, and another off the coast of Preveza, in the Ionian Sea. Preveza is primarily a supply port for Egypt.

Troop and supply ships now are being escorted by destroyers and corvettes equipped with depth charges.

The Ministry of Public Order said a guerrilla band of eighty to 100 fighters clashed with gendarmerie units of Epiro village on Mount Parnassos, only 11 miles from Athens. The mountain is clearly visible from Athens.

The ministry said the guerrilla unit was part of a band from Mount Parnassos which has been moving southward for several days.

Guerrillas reportedly attacked the gendarmerie station at Epiro and three of the 15 defenders were listed as missing after a battle which continued until early this morning.

Aldermen Plan Street Signs Here

Engineer Contracted
To Survey City; All
Residences To Be
Numbered

At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen at the City Hall last night Mayor Jack Boyd announced that a contract has been made with Joseph N. Forlaw, Raleigh engineer, to survey the city and make a map on which all lots in the city will be numbered completely. This survey is preliminary to the city's plan to install street signs at intersections and to properly number all residences and business places. The engineer will start work next Monday.

The board authorized the mayor and the Street Committee to buy and have installed street signs at intersections designating the streets.

J. Con Lanier, Ralph Garrett, Lee Folger and Reynolds May appeared before the board to renew the baseball club's contract with the city to use Guv Smith Stadium again this year. The club has been paying \$1 a year for the park. The matter was referred to a committee composed of W. Z. Morton, W. L. Smith and L. M. Buchanan.

Mayor Boyd announced that the University of North Carolina is sending some of its engineering students in city planning to Greenville for experience. There will be no cost to the city.

Repairs were ordered on a wash-out on Second Street in Skinner's Ravine.

The board ordered a new ordinance drawn containing the provisions for the operation and fares of taxicabs. Some changes were made in the ordinance at the last meeting which require taxicabs to have their rates posted in each car.

Permission was granted Walter Lewis for the Veterans of Foreign Wars to give a dance at the college on February 17 without buying a license. Joe Joyner, who holds a taxicab franchise at Fifth and Greene Streets, petitioned the board to allow him to transfer his taxicab franchise to new owners at the service station. Action on this was deferred. Permission was granted Alfred Williams, colored taxicab operator, to take in James E. Fleming, colored, as a partner.

Clifford H. Oakley asked the board about closing streets from Sixth to Tenth Street, near the site of proposed apartment houses. This was referred to the Street Committee for some action.

**Gandhi Left No
Property Behind**

New Delhi, Feb. 6—(AP)—Devadas Gandhi said today his father, Mohandas K. Gandhi, possessed no property and left no will.

He said his father, assassinated a week ago today, desired that any properties which might nominally be considered his should go to his charity and uplift projects. This, Devadas said, will be done.

Gandhi, one of the Hindus' most powerful spiritual leaders, earned and received contributions amounting to vast sums, but gave it all away and lived the life of a poor man.

**Will Take Over
Electric Plants**

London, Feb. 6—(AP)—Hugh Gaitskell announced today the government will take ownership of Britain's electric utilities April 1. Gaitskell, minister of fuel and power, made the announcement in the House of Commons.

Legislation nationalizing the nation's entire generating and distribution system was passed by Parliament last year.

"A very appropriate date," cracked a conservative M.P. on the choice of April 1.

Anti-Lynching Law

Mob-Murder Too Often Goes Unpunished; Why A Federal Anti-Lynching Law Has Such Strong Support; Mild Penalty In Present Proposals; Opposition Viewpoint

Washington, Feb. 6—(AP)—Lynching is murder. President Truman this week asked Congress to pass a law to stop it.

The House may pass such a bill. But if it reaches the Senate, the Southerners there are just about sure to talk the whole idea to death with a filibuster.

But why a federal law—since lynching is murder and every state has a law against that? Can't states stop lynchings? States haven't.

In spite of state laws against murder, almost no one ever is convicted or punished for a lynching.

Almost always it's a Negro who's lynched. Almost all lynchings are in the South. Almost all lynchings are done by mobs.

When anyone is tried for lynching, the jury of white fellow-townsmen or neighbors almost always says "not guilty."

Yet, the 14th amendment to the constitution says: No state shall deprive a man of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

So a man is entitled to a fair trial before a state can take away his property, or his life by executing.

Isn't lynching, then, a violation

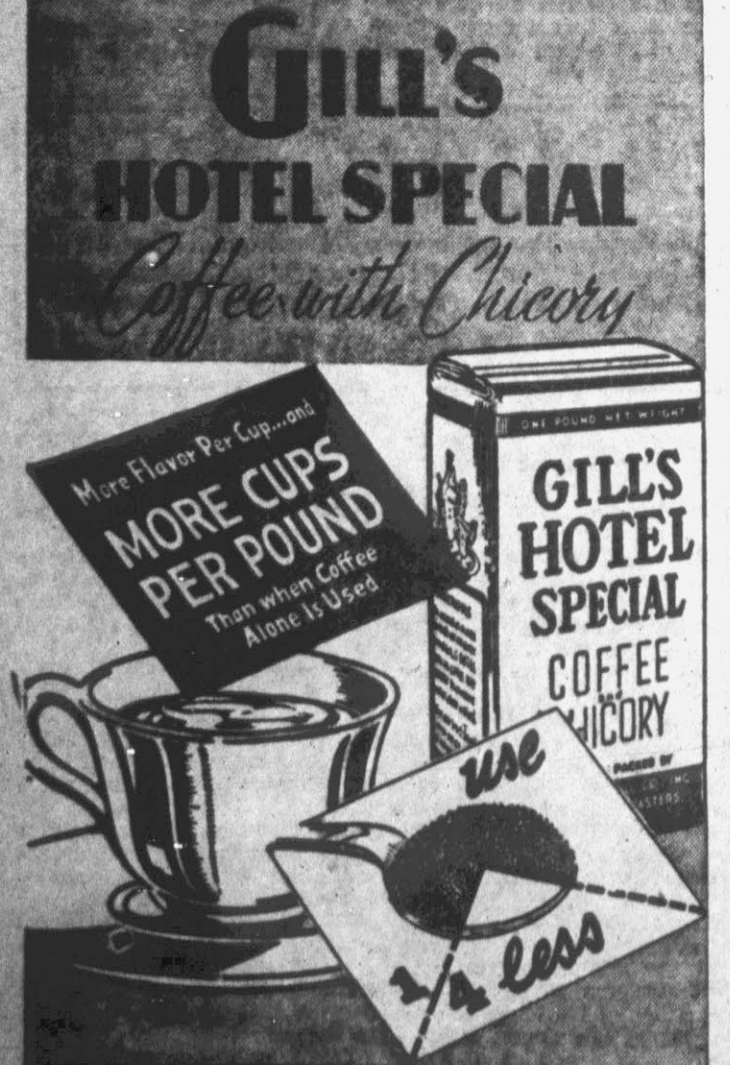

Will Soon Decide Amount Of Tobacco In Interim Aid

Washington, Feb. 5.—The State Department will decide within the next 10 days how much of the \$522,000,000 European interim aid fund it will spend for packaged cigarettes and tobacco, this reporter was told today.

A State Department source said that the idea of sending "economy brand" cigarettes as incentive goods to France, Austria and Italy was "strongly appealing" and a decision would be reached soon on how much of the \$26,100,000 earmarked by Congress for "incentive goods" could go to purchase them.

The main objects of the interim bill is to provide food and fuel, and such goods as tobacco, candy and other consumer items have been authorized only because their inclusion will induce European farmers to turn their food products into regular market channels, it was explained.

Under the plan sponsored by the independent cigarette manufacturers, and influential members of Congress, packages of 20 would be processed in this country, labeled with an "American" message telling of this country's desire to help rehabilitate Europe. They would be furnished at a minimum cost to this government which including the tobacco and cost of manufacture would amount to about six cents a package (without tax).

The State Department's authority from Congress to buy such incentive goods is "permissible" and not "mandatory," but an experiment will be made, it was indicated.

Anything which will be done regarding tobacco under the interim aid bill is not to be confused with the longer-range Marshall Plan which is now being debated by Congress, it was stressed.

The sign will be inscribed with the name Greenville Airport and an arrow pointing toward it; latitude and longitude, etc. The airport marker was designed by Tom Rivers, civil engineer.

protest about American activities in Iran as "absolutely baseless and void of truth." The Russians had charged that the actions of a U.S. military mission in Iran constituted a threat to the Iranian government which U.S. Ambassador George V. In short, it's clear that these three countries still are determined not to let Russia "get away" with what they regard as "rough stuff." And of course all this is tremendously important when we consider that control of the Mediterranean area is involved.

It is doubly significant in that this whole situation would seem to be working toward a climax. The American attitude of course continues to represent the Truman doctrine of providing aid to weak countries to resist communist aggression. There has been no apparent change in that, but the question does arise as to what extent this program shall be continued. The funds for this program will run out June 30 when Congress must decide whether the aid already given is sufficient to maintain the Truman policy or whether new funds shall be provided.

Thus the developments of the next few months in this struggle may be momentous.

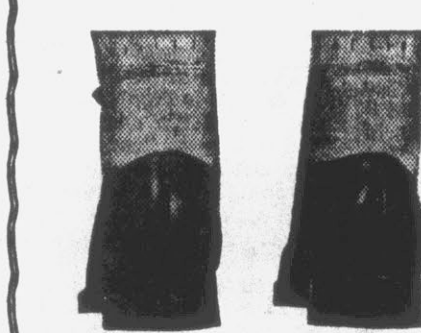

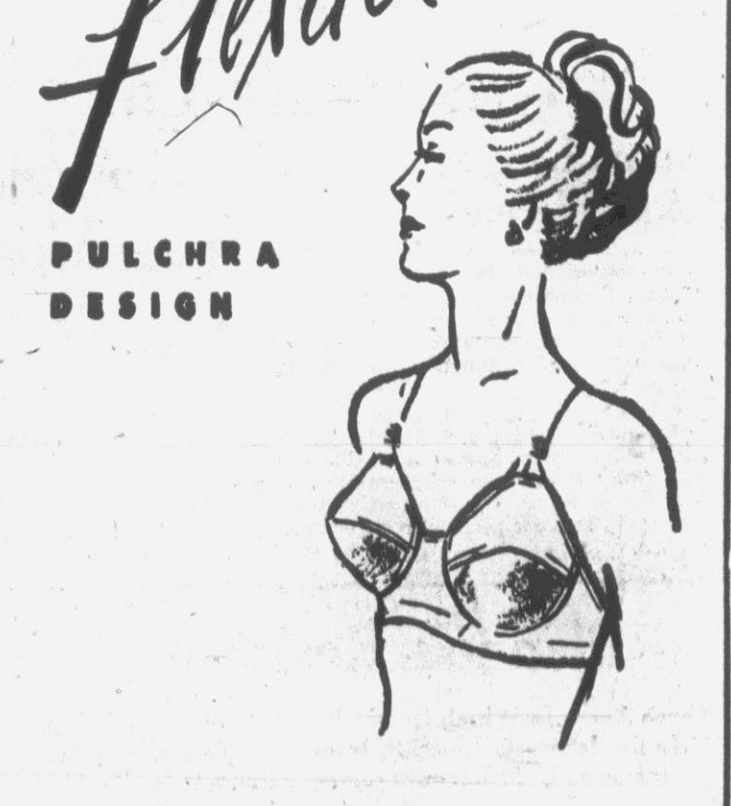

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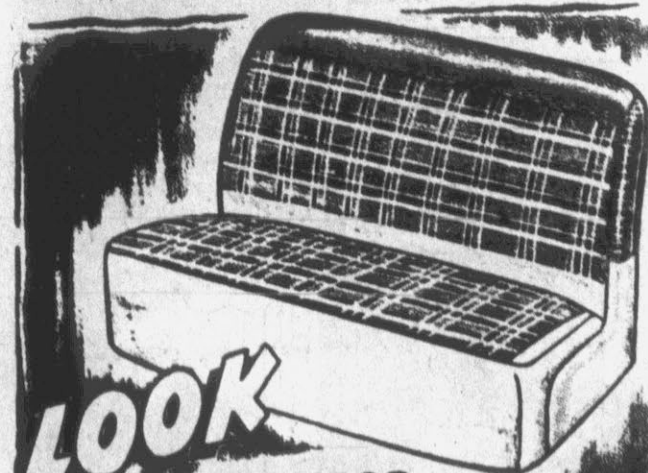

TWO PRINCIPLES OF PRAYER

The famous Dr. Grenfell, whose ministry to the people of barren Labrador is one of the brightest spots in the history of the Church, has spoken and written much about prayer. The good physician of the North expressed the whole of his religious philosophy when he said, "Prayer to me means speaking to my Father in heaven. I approach Him exactly as I would approach anyone else to whom I would make petitions, and I address Him as my common sense suggests, in perfect confidence that that is the way He would wish me to treat Him. I would wish Him with knowing how much I want a thing, and whether I am willing to do everything in my power to obtain it. That is, I consider He will look to me to be willing to pay the price. I never expect Him to be my share."

Grenfell has expressed here two of the greatest principles of prayer. The first is that we should approach God simply and with confidence, knowing that He is even more willing to give than we are to receive, confident that He loves us and wishes us well.

The second principle involved in Grenfell's statement is that prayer puts upon us the responsibility of fulfilling our part of the bargain. We can be sure that we always have to do something, little though it may be, to help God answer our petitions.

Washington—New chemical killers will provide the leading ammunition in the government's all-out attack against man's ancient enemy—the rat.

The world food shortage calls for immediate action in ridding the nation of rats which annually consume or destroy nearly 200,000,000 bushels of grain in this country. A nation-wide war on the grain thieves has been launched by the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior and the Department of Agriculture's extension services.

They are getting the cooperation of a National Rat-Control Committee appointed by Secretary of the Interior Krug and composed of representatives of civic and industrial groups.

Measures for the permanent eradication of rats are being taken wherever practicable. But they have to be combined with the killing of the animals especially in an emergency like the present.

FUMIGATING AND TRAPPING ARE METHODS SUGGESTED BUT THE EMPHASIS IN THE CURRENT BATTLE AGAINST RATS IS ON POISONING. Composed 1080 discovered by the Wildlife Research Laboratory during its war time search for new rodenticides, is the most effective rat poison known. However, it is much too dangerous for use by the general public. It can be obtained and used only by qualified government employees and pest control operators, trained in the safeguards necessary to its use and who carry adequate public liability insurance. Ten-eighths, soluble in water, with a taste not objectionable to rats, was first tried out on ground squirrels in California. One pound of 1080 mixed with grain killed over 1,000,000 squirrels.

Red squill is the safest for use by the general public. ANTU, developed at Johns Hopkins and first tested by the U. S. Public Health Service, can be used with reasonable caution. But it must be kept away from dogs and other domestic animals.

Experts warn, however, that all poisons should be handled with great care, should be kept away from livestock and children and should be stored in plainly marked containers high shelves away from edibles or feeds. The advice, too, that all poisons are only as effective as the bait with which they are mixed.

Bread crumbs, fat hamburger and fish are good baits, according to rat controllers. They suggest that if

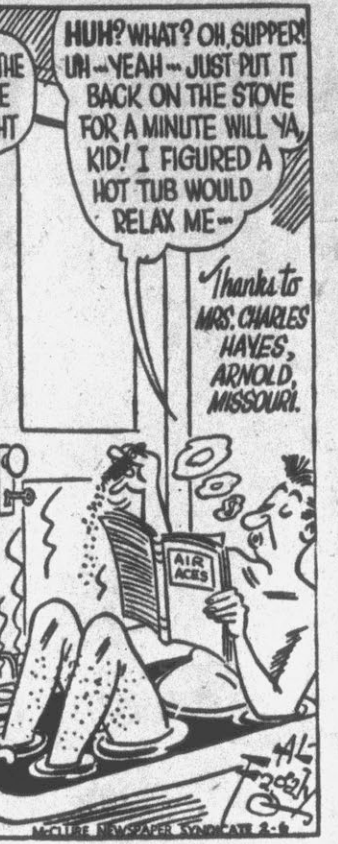

Oppose Size Of Cut In Leaf Quota

Board Of Governors Of Tobacco Association Call For 20 Per Cent Maximum

The Board of Governors of the Tobacco Association of the United States at a meeting on January 30, passed a resolution opposing the 27 per cent reduction in flue-cured tobacco and calling attention to the steady increase in tobacco consumption. The resolution follows: "Whereas, the domestic consumption of flue-cured tobacco is now at an all-time high, approximately 700 million pounds per year, and is steadily increasing; and, whereas, in order to maintain and increase this domestic demand, it is necessary and essential that manufacturers have access to sufficient quantities of the required grades of leaf tobacco in order to preserve the present high quality of their products; and, whereas, a sufficient supply of such grades cannot be anticipated out of a crop less than one billion pounds;

"And, whereas, it is probable that substantial quantities of flue-cured tobacco will be shipped to various European nations under the European Recovery Act now under consideration by the Congress; and, whereas; withdrawal from present stocks for this purpose will substantially lower stocks now held by the Commodity Credit Corporation and by private dealers in this country.

"And, whereas, it is the considered opinion of this board that a cut of 27 per cent in the flue-cured acreage is too drastic and is an unwarranted under all the facts, in that it fails to provide the necessary margin of safety in stock requirements which is essential to order to provide suitable grades for domestic manufacture and in order to enable exporting firms to recapture and enlarge world markets for American tobacco.

"Be it therefore resolved, that this association go on record as opposed to the 27 per cent cut in the 1948 flue-cured tobacco acreage, and that this association urge the secretary of agriculture to reconsider his decision as early as possible to the end that the acreage be reduced not more than 20 per cent as a maximum in 1948. "Be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the secretary of agriculture, and that a copy be given to the press for publication."

The resolution was signed by Clyde B. Austin, president of the association, and J. C. Lamer of Greenville, counsel for the association.

POLAND STRIVES TO REPLACE DOCTORS
Poland (AP)—Poland lost more than 50 per cent of its physicians during the war, but new doctors now are being trained in seven Polish cities.

Poland had 13,000 doctors before the war and only 6,300 when it was over. Today, 8,200 students are attending medical schools in Poman, Warsaw, Krakow, Lodz, Lublin, Kdansk and Wroclaw. A new medical academy also is to be established in Lower Silesia.

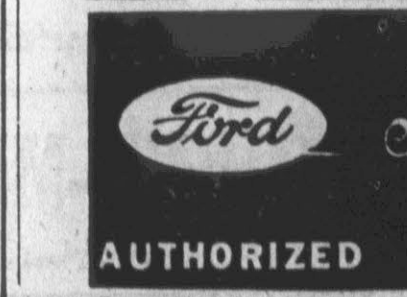

China Aid May Be Big Relief Test

Marshall's Global Strategy Likely To Meet Critical Test In Congress

Washington, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall's global strategy for peace appears likely to meet a critical test in Congress over his aid for China program.

Officials have disclosed that this program calls for \$510,000,000 of American assistance to the Chinese government during the 15 months beginning April 1.

While the sum is considerably larger than the \$300,000,000 Marshall previously suggested informally, it is expected to encounter criticism, both in and out of Congress, from advocates of much greater help.

Another aspect which may draw critical fire is the reported lack of any provision for military assistance for the Chinese Nationalist forces battling Chinese Communists over a large area.

The China program may go to Congress within a week or so, while the lawmakers still are studying details of the Marshall Plan for European recovery.

However, the relationship between the size of the Chinese program and the \$6,800,000,000 European program is described by authorities as reflecting the basic strategy which Marshall is applying to the problem of world recovery.

The main assumption of this strategy is that the United States simply cannot help all countries to the full limit of their needs. The problem therefore is one of selecting the most critical areas and giving

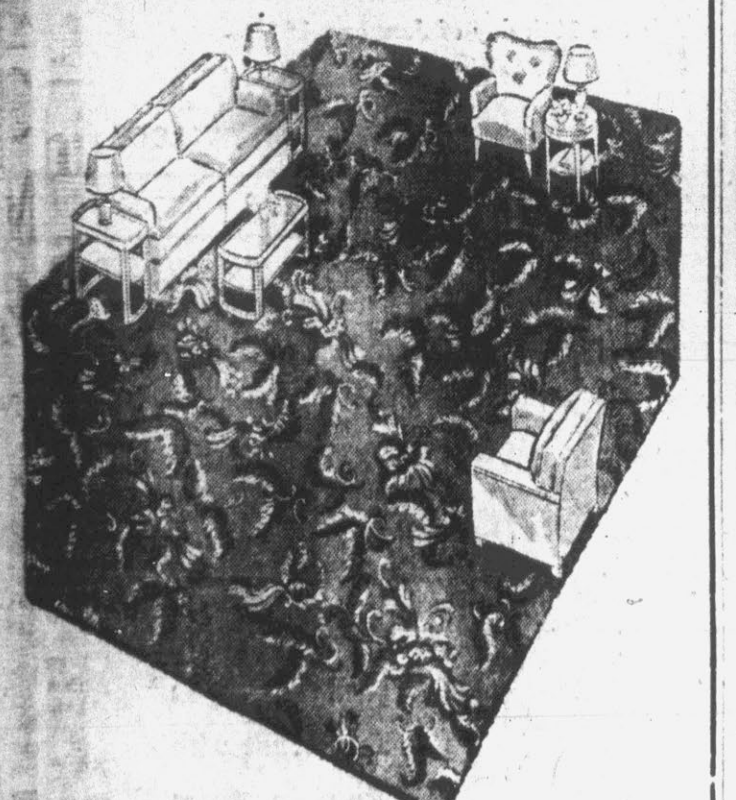

Variations In Weather

North Freezes. South Warms Up And Far West Gets Rain

Chicago, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Winter carved a climatic hodge-podge across the nation today.

There was lots of snow in many sections—the heaviest in the Middle Atlantic region and Kentucky. Rain and sleet pelted areas in the south and southwest and travel on some highways skidded to a slow pace.

Cold weather, with temperatures ranging from freezing to sub-zero levels, continued to envelop the northern half of the country. And in some parts of the south—Florida, Louisiana and Texas—the mercury climbed to around a balmy 80 above.

The fuel oil situation was eased in some communities as temperatures moderated but in others supplies dwindled and thousands of homes were cold.

In the normally sunny Southern California region farmers were singing in the rain as steady precipitation fell over the drought-parched lands and ended the worst winter drought in 70 years. More rain was forecast after yesterday's downpour which measures 1.62 inches at San Bernardino and 1.07 inches at Los Angeles.

Snow and hail fell in Northern California but the Pacific Gas and Electric Company said the precipitation was not enough to make up for water losses during the last six weeks. Because of power shortage, the world's largest cyclotron at the University of California and related atom-smashing machines are being shut down between 4 and 6 p.m. Several lumber mills in Northern California and southwestern Oregon have closed or curtailed operations because of power shortage.

Dislikes Evictions

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Feb. 6.—(AP)—"I have seven children myself and this business of putting people out on the streets is not in my line," declared Constable Ray K. Jones.

So Jones, constable for five years, yesterday forwarded his resignation to Clerk of Courts Michael Teacock. As constable, Jones had been required to enforce eviction notices.

The heavy falls of snow across the country disrupted transportation and forced the closing of schools in some sections.

Police Enforce Law Concerning Dogs On Streets

Following innumerable complaints from citizens in various parts of the city, the police department has been instructed to strictly enforce the city ordinances regulating dogs.

Frowning canines have attacked several persons. They prowl the streets at all hours of the night and day, scratch off flower bulbs, turn over garbage cans, and are otherwise a public nuisance, police said.

A city law requires dog owners to procure license tags; an ordinance prohibits dogs from running at large on the streets, and a state health law requires that all dogs be vaccinated against hydrophobia.

One complainant, the owner of a dog, said he loves dogs, but they should not be allowed to roam the
