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Eisenhower Says Army Manpower Problem Serious

Departing General Hopes For An Early Solution; Tells His 'Greatest Moment'

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower told a farewell news conference today that the Army's manpower situation is "getting serious." He said something must be done about it.

Eisenhower spoke as Army chief of staff shortly before turning the job over to Gen. Omar N. Bradley. The Army now is about 100,000 under its proposed strength.

As one means of encouraging recruiting, Eisenhower suggested the Army should give extra pay to men assigned to some of the more undesirable spots in the world. This would be in addition to the 20 per cent extra given all troops on overseas assignment.

He expressed hope for early enactment of legislation to make the Women's Army Corps a permanent establishment. Unless legislation is passed, the WAC unit will cease to exist on June 30.

Eisenhower said he is thoroughly convinced of the value of women in the Army.

The former supreme commander of allied forces in Europe was asked what he considered the greatest moment of his military career.

He replied that "the natural thing would be to say it was when the surrender instrument was signed," but added that this occasion had been anticipated and its value written off in advance. He mediated a moment, then he said:

"I think the greatest moment was when I got the word that the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions had landed on the Cherbourg peninsula."

He disclosed that he had ordered that phase of the invasion of Europe in June, 1944, "over the bitter opposition of the experts." He said the position of the airborne operation was carried out to secure control of the exits from the peninsula in connection with the beachhead landings.

Eisenhower said that "I'm not going to tell any stuffy goodbye to the troops. I'll just tell them 'By God, you've done a great job.'"

Statistician Predicts Early End To Inflation

Cincinnati, Feb. 7.—(AP)—A. W. Zelomke of New York, economic counselor and president of the International Statistical Bureau last night predicted a 20 to 25 per cent drop in commodity prices within nine months.

Speaking to newsmen before addressing the business and professional men's group of the University of Cincinnati, Zelomke said the sharp decline in commodity prices, which set in earlier this week, "is the forerunner of a general downward trend."

"The back of inflation has been broken," he declared "but it will take people a few months to realize it."

However, this week's decline in the commodity market was "too fast," Zelomke asserted. He said he anticipated a rally next week before prices resumed their downward course.

Argentina Buys British Rails

Buenos Aires, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Argentina will take possession of the British-owned railways in this country by Feb. 24.

President Juan D. Peron revealed this last night in a speech before the congress of provincial leaders. The purchase price is expected to provide about 150,000,000 lbs. (\$600,000,000) toward payment of Argentine meat shipped to Britain.

Commodity Price Drop Induces Slight Drop In High Food Costs

The thunder of crashing commodity prices produced a narrow crack in the high wall of family food costs today.

Flour and lard were the first budget items to feel the effect of the spectacular slump of wholesale quotations.

At least two eastern food chains reduced the price of flour by 4 cents per 10-pound bag. Others indicated similar action may be taken Monday.

This traced directly to the collapse of values on major grain futures exchanges. Wheat has fallen 4 1/2 to 50 3/8 cents a bushel from mid-January highs, corn is down 36 3/4 to 47 3/4 cents.

Both grains tumbled the daily allowable limit—10 cents for wheat and 8 cents for corn—for the third successive day Friday.

Retail food price reductions amounted to 4 cents a pound. Whether the initial crack in the high cost of living would widen to a definite break was uncertain.

Top-level government economists, on a "don't quote me" basis, didn't believe retail food prices would match the current sag on the exchanges. They saw the wholesale decline as a healthy adjustment rather than a sign of abrupt collapse.

In its psychological effect, one said, the drop in futures quotations "will strengthen consumer resistance to high prices."

Paul S. Willis, president of the Grocery Manufacturers of America, said, "Unless other cost factors, such as labor," offset lower commodity levels, "a halt to the upward price movement is indicated."

The general commodity trend was sharply lower. In the week ended Friday the Associated Press weighted index of 35 wholesale commodity prices made the fastest decline for any similar period of its 13-year history. After a dizzy slide of 7.27 points in the week, it stood Friday night at 194.97 per cent of the 1926 average.

After two days of following commodities downward, during which listed stocks on the New York Exchange lost upwards of \$1,000,000,000 in market value, the stock market overcame its nervous confusion Friday.

First to enter was agriculture commissioner W. Kerr Scott, whose announcement as a candidate for Governor came just after midday.

Late in the afternoon John T. Armstrong, Chief Inspector for the State Utilities Commission, announced he would oppose Secretary of State Thad Eure in the May primary.

The Scott announcement brought to five the number of active candidates for Governor. The others are R. Wayne Albright of Raleigh, Oscar Barker of Durham, Olay Boyd of Pinetown and State treasurer Charles M. Johnson.

In entering the race, Scott said he would resign immediately as Agriculture Commissioner "because I feel that no man occupying a high state office can serve the people properly while campaigning for the Governorship."

Governor Cherry said he would appoint D. S. Coltrane, assistant commissioner of agriculture, as commissioner when he receives Scott's resignation.

L. Gov. L. Y. Ballentine, who for months was considered a potential candidate for Governor, has announced for the Agriculture post.

Scott said his decision to run came after a survey by friends showed his chances were good. Observers here were sure he would wage a hard campaign.

Armstrong, a former commander of the State Highway Patrol said in his announcement that Eure has hinted he might run for the U. S. Senate or the Governorship and "evidently is no longer interested in serving the people of North Carolina as Secretary of State."

Informed of Armstrong's announcement, Eure remarked, "As I have said all along, I expect to become a candidate to succeed myself." He added he had no previous word that Armstrong would oppose him.

Ervin to Run For Court Post
Raleigh, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Associate Justice Sam J. Ervin, Jr., appointed Jan. 30 to the State Supreme Court, will be a candidate in the Democratic primary in May to retain his seat until 1950.

He paid a \$75 filing fee to the State Board of Elections yesterday. Ervin was appointed to succeed Associate Justice Michael Schenck, who retired because of poor health.

Stunt Man's Leap From 'Frisco Bridge Is Fatal
San Francisco, Feb. 7.—(AP)—A leap from the Golden Gate Bridge was the biggest jump in the barnstorming life of Hollywood stunt man Alfred (Dusty) Rhodes—and the last.

Clad in life jackets and football padding with three small parachutes attached, the Indian daredevil died in the 265 foot plunge yesterday.

His wife, Lorraine, 25, mother of two, watched the death leap and a Hollywood cameraman, Jose Guzman, who was to have made the plunge pay off for Rhodes, recorded it in pictures.

A veteran of many movie cliff leaps, gun and knife fights, the 35-year-old stunt man came here about a week ago after appearing in a daredevil "death car" show in Hawaii.

Yesterday he was driven in a car onto the bridge with his jumping equipment. It included a kapok life suit, "Mae West" life jacket, the parachutes and a 50-pound weight for each foot.

The parachutes opened but failed to break the fall. Mrs. Rhodes said her husband discarded the foot weights before he jumped. They were to have kept his body upright during the fall.

"For about 150 feet he fell upright as he intended," she said. "Then his body started to curve. He struck the water with his face. I saw him hit like a bullet."

"I saw his head bob to the surface and his body start to drift out to sea."

For four years the spectacular stunt had been planned. A year and a half ago San Francisco authorities denied Rhodes permission for the jump. Bridge maintenance men yesterday vainly tried to prevent the leap.

Babson Discusses Marriages, Babies
Babson Park, Fla., Feb. 6.—Statisticians are always interested in marriages and births. These with crops are the basis of prosperity. WHO ARE HAVING CHILDREN?
Children per se need not be an asset to a nation; it all depends upon whose children they are and into what they are to develop. China, India, and other nations do not need more children at the present time. Probably one of the best things that the United States could export to China today would be contraceptives accompanied by nurses showing how they could be used. This might also apply to social work amongst the poorest groups even in the United States.

The children of middle class families are a great asset to the nation. This will especially become true as the nation becomes more interested in decentralization. Certain states in the Central West with tremendous production possibilities are in special need of more marriages and more babies at the present time.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Feb. 7.—(AP)—OH-short families will be loaned electric heaters under a plan expected to start here early next week.

The Citizens' Oil Emergency committee and oil dealers made plans yesterday to secure from a firm in Atlanta up to 200 electric heaters. They will be loaned on deposit of \$4 which will be returned when the heater is given back.

About 100 heaters are expected early next week, with 100 more available if needed.

Bradley To Take Command Today

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley takes over as the Army's Chief of Staff today from his old West Point classmate Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

President Truman arranged to attend the charge-of-command ceremonies at noon at the Pentagon building, National Defense headquarters.

The 57-year-old Eisenhower steps out of the army after 33 years of service as an officer, topped by Supreme command of the World War II Allied forces in Europe.

As a five-star General, he will continue to hold his rank and receive his pay as long as he lives. But after using two months of military leave due him, he will prepare to become president of Columbia University in June.

Bradley, who will be 55 next Thursday, was one of Eisenhower's right hand men in the fighting through North Africa, Italy and France. He commanded the group of four armies which finally battered down the defenses of Germany.

After the war President Truman appointed Bradley to organize the new expanded veterans administration. He left that job last December 1 to prepare for his new assignment as the Army's No. 1 man.

Bradley is the 17th Chief of Staff since the office was established in 1863. Before that the commanders of the army bore various titles—commander-in-chief of the Army, General in Chief, Senior officer.

DeValera Loses Party Majority

Dublin, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Eamon de Valera, Eire's prime minister for 16 years, has lost his party majority in Parliament but is expected to keep his job just the same.

His Fianna Fail (Government Party) won only 66 of the 147 seats in the new Dail (Parliament) in last Wednesday's general election, complete returns showed today.

The combined opposition, including parties that had sought a coalition government, won 76. The remaining five seats will be filled next Tuesday in a postponed election in Carlow and Kilkenny counties.

The Government Party had 77 of 138 deputies in the old Parliament dissolved last fall.

The new Dail meets Feb. 18 to elect a prime minister. Opponents and supporters agree De Valera stands a good chance of reelection by pulling the votes of some independent and national labor party deputies. He needs 77 votes to win. Independents have 12, national labor four.

The Irish Independent, Dublin newspaper, said he would make a strong try for parliamentary control, even if only temporary, so that he could call another election before long. He did that in 1944 after squeaking through to reelection the previous year.

Spanish-French Border Opening Is Agreed Upon

Madrid, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Spain announced last night she had agreed with France on reopening their common border, closed since Feb. 28, 1946.

(Limited reopening has been arranged for next Tuesday, a Foreign Minister spokesman said in Paris last night.)

Terms of the agreement are to be published tomorrow in Paris and Madrid. It was understood here the frontier will be opened at midnight tonight.

Telegraph and postal services will be resumed and travelers will be permitted to cross in either direction. Trade will not be allowed until a new commercial treaty is completed.

Offer To Shoot It Out Is Ignored

Lakeview, Ga., Feb. 7.—(AP)—A high school coach's offer to shoot it out with the Ku Klux Klan remained standing—and unaccepted—to-day three weeks after hooded leaders burned a cross in his front yard.

Finland Pays Up Last Of Prefabs

Helinki, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Finland has delivered the last carload of prefabricated houses required as part of her reparations payments to the Soviet Union. The delivery was accomplished in just over three years of the required eight year period.

The houses are chiefly one and two family structures.

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Reliable Sources Indicate Feb. 15 Chosen By Arab Army

Jerusalem, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Nine new deaths in bitter communal fighting in Palestine put the unofficial toll today at 1,000 since partition was voted by the United Nations Nov. 29.

Latest to die were seven Jews and two Arabs who lost their lives in scattered areas yesterday. Much of the Palestine battling has occurred in small communities.

Police reported two men presumed to be Arabs shot and killed a 60-year-old Jewish messenger of Haifa's Ottoman Bank. They escaped with \$2,400 in currency.

In the border region between Jaffa and Tel Aviv sniping continued. Two of the slain Jews fell before snipers' rifles there.

Reliable sources indicated today the Arabs have chosen Feb. 15 as D-Day in their volunteer-force campaign against Palestine Jews. This date has been mentioned frequently in speculation about the announced Arab campaign.

Abdul Khader Bey Hussein, commander of Palestine Arabs south of Nebulus, returned last night from a Damascus war council to his headquarters in a small village north of Jerusalem. District commanders are being called in today to receive instructions, it was learned.

Leaders of five countries in the Arab League met at Damascus this week presumably to discuss the Arab campaign against the Palestine Jews.

Tarheel Wages Over Twice 1940 Pay Figures

Raleigh, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The North Carolina worker's average weekly paycheck in the last quarter of 1947 was more than double that of 1940, the State Employment Security Commission says.

The figure rose from \$17.44 in 1940 to \$37.81 in the last quarter of 1947, the commission reported in a review of employment and industrial trends released yesterday.

The state's payroll now exceeds \$1,000,000,000 a year, the review added, having risen to that point from a figure of not more than \$400,000,000 in 1940.

The total of workers mounted from 474,872 in 1940 to approximately 613,000 in the final quarter of last year, it was reported.

Tenants 'Evict' Their Landlord

Orange, N. J., Feb. 7.—(AP)—A tenant has "evicted" the landlord. Gerald Dascher announced in Essex County Court that since he can't evict the tenants in his three family house, he and his wife are moving out.

Dascher complains that the tenants use foul language, and that in the midst of a cold wave, they damaged his furnace.

"At last," he told the court, "I have found the solution to all my problems. I'm moving out."

MAY JOIN BLOC

Stockholm, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Sweden will participate in a British-inspired western European bloc if it means cooperation in the spirit of the Marshall Plan, Foreign Minister Oesten Unden said today.

Taft Claims High Prices In Politics

Accuses Administration Of Deliberate Attempt To Keep Prices High For Political Reasons; Raps Anderson Report

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) accused the Democratic administration today of a deliberate attempt to keep prices high for political reasons.

The idea, he said, is to "create an air of false prosperity" for the presidential election campaign.

Taft told a reporter he can put no other interpretation on the advance announcement of Secretary of Agriculture Anderson that the government plans soon to buy 50,000,000 bushels of wheat.

Anderson disclosed this at a news conference Thursday after corn and wheat had dropped the legal limit of 8 and 10 cents a bushel for two days in a row.

Usually the government's buying intentions are kept secret.

The announcement by Anderson was followed by a brief rise in wheat. But yesterday's market closed with the legal limit drop for the third consecutive time.

Taft, a candidate for the GOP presidential nomination said he thinks Anderson took an unusual course to boost sagging prices.

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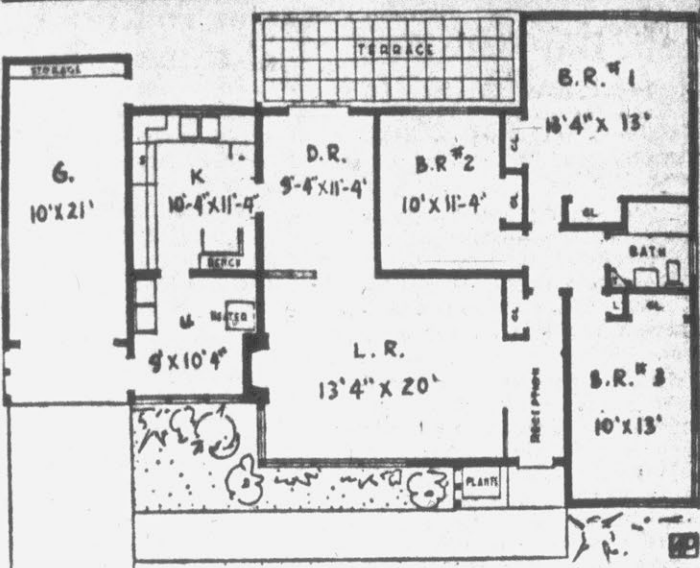
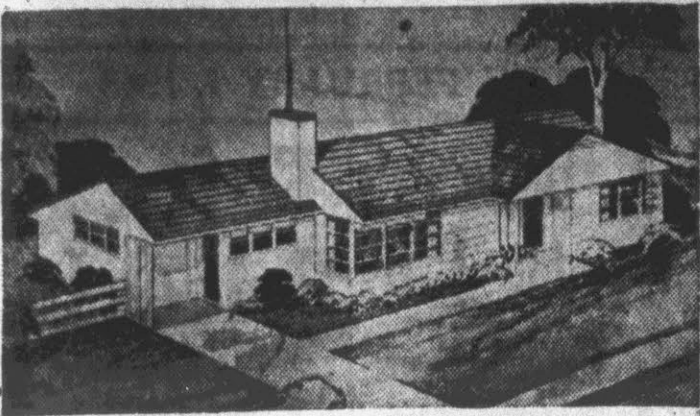
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HOMES FOR AMERICANS



This three-bedroom house is 33 feet overall and requires a 65-foot inside lot or 50-foot corner lot. It was designed by Walter T. Anloak of Ann Arbor, Mich., as his plan No. 712 and contains 15,720 cubic feet, a figure that can be used to estimate local building costs. Elimination of the basement and use of radiant heat mean economy and the sliding closet doors mean ample wall space. The architect recommends frame siding or cinder block painted white with a dark asphalt shingle roof. He calls attention to the built-in breakfast nook and big living area.

How To Estimate Building Costs With Cubic Measure

What your house will cost you depends on a wide variety of factors. Only you and your architect or builder can consider them all.

Your own specifications the number and size of rooms, the shape of the house, local building codes, labor wage scales and material prices are some things that must be weighed.

Unsettled building costs make local estimates more important now than at any time in the past. Although a house in northern states with a relatively expensive heating plant and tighter construction always did cost more than a house of the same size in the south, there are now major variations even between northern states and cities. Architects use two rule-of-thumb methods to figure the construction cost of an average house. One is based on square footage and the other, more exact, on the cubic feet of content.

However, the cubic foot cost for an uninsulated cinder block, wood frame dwelling of the most inexpensive construction may run around 80 cents to 90 cents in some sections which the index for fire-proof masonry and expensive construction may range from 65 cents to 75 cents per cubic foot.

Your own specifications will spell the difference between an estimate and a guess. You may want a fully tiled bath with built-in elaborate fixtures. That would cost more than a modestly painted or papered bathroom with lower-priced fixtures.

Two houses may appear identical from the street. They may be built in the same town by the same contractor. Yet they can vary widely in cost. One may be of steel frame construction with a concrete first floor and complete insulation, copper or brass plumbing throughout, solid bronze hardware, custom-designed trim and year-round air-conditioning. The other may be a sound frame house with iron piping, painted hardware, standard millwork and low cost equipment.

Cubic content is figured for a simple rectangular house by multiplying the length by the width and mul-

More Home Owners

Washington, (AP) — The Bureau of Census report shows that owner-occupied homes in the United States have increased by nearly one-third in the last six years. Home owners have increased in number from 15,300,000 to more than 20,000,000 since April 1, 1940. During the same period tenant-occupied dwellings declined by 2,100,000.

Typically that area by the height from the bottom of the cellar floor slab to a point midway in the gable. Included in the cost per cubic foot will be structure, labor, heating plumbing fixtures, lighting fixtures, and sometimes kitchen cupboards and other built-in details. Usually excluded are ranges, refrigerators, laundry, shades, Venetian blinds, swinging terraces, walks, driveways, sewage disposal, wells, landscaping. A thorough understanding is important, therefore, before construction is undertaken. Changes of mind after a contract is awarded and work has been started call for "extras" These mean added expense. For preliminary estimates before deciding finally on details, cubic content can serve as a handy guide in comparing local builders or architects about a plan you have in mind. But it is well to remember that your prefigured cubic cost is only an estimate. Also it does not include land with utilities provided.

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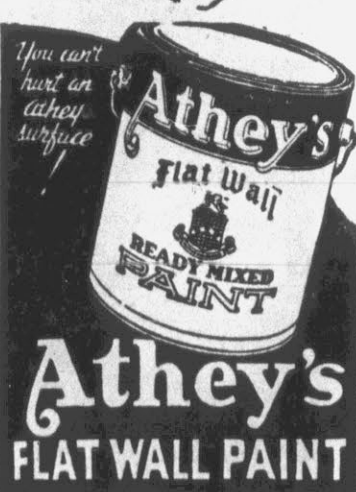

Bills to come before the Congress will deal with labor, world peace, and many other topics.

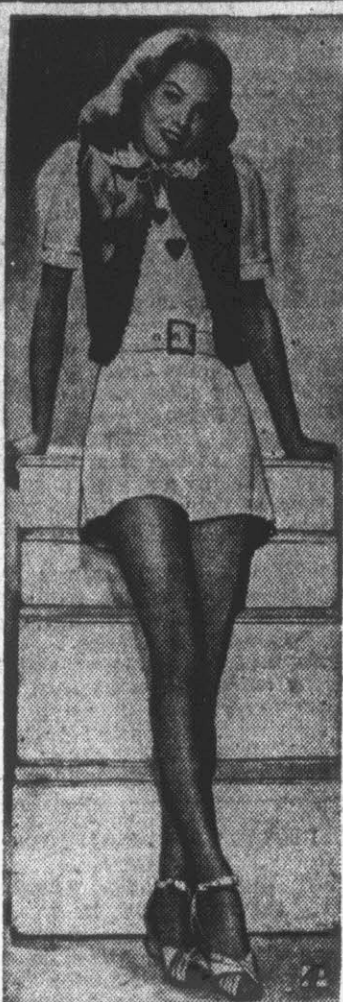
The annual staff have now sold 313 annuals and have placed an order for 350. The price of the annual is now \$2.50 while they will sell for \$3.50 later.

**Negro Home De-
monstration News**

The agent held meetings with 12
Home Demonstration Clubs with 124
club members hearing the discus-
sion and demonstration on 1948 outlook,
record keeping and budgeting. In
view of the fact that we are living
in a changing world it is necessary



for each farm family to plan his
farm family living to cope with the
present situation as the changes
take place. Especially since the cost
of living is advancing monthly.

What can be done about the food
situation? It was demonstrated by
the use of posters that it is much
cheaper to produce the family food
supply—namely, a year-round gar-
den, a cow, chickens. Can the sur-
plus amount of vegetables and meats
for the pantry shelves to be served
during the non-productive months.
Good storage for canned products
and root crops which would mean
better meals.

To be a successful farm family it
will be necessary to have an intelli-
gent knowledge of what becomes of
our money each year. Financial farm
records would be the best method
to use was stressed by the agent
and too many families don't know
just what went with their money.

The agent demonstrated how re-
cords might be kept by using a cal-
endar hung in a convenient place
with a pencil intact in order that
each person in the family might
write in what was spent on that
particular day. At the end of the
month the mother, father or an older
child may record in farm record
book or a note book for that purpose.

Other problems demonstrated were
clothing, housing, health and house
furnishing and equipment. At the
end of the demonstration the agent
asked each member if she knew how
much they made in 1947? How much
do you owe? How much do you own?
How much are you worth? Leaflets
on "Are You An Ant Or A Grass-
hopper?" were given to members for
further study.

Mrs. Estella Edwards, route 3,
Ayden, reported, "After living where
I am for four years, I am glad to
report that I have my first toilet."

Due to the inclement weather
club members have not been able
to get off to a good start. The fol-
lowing members have: Mrs. L. J.
Chapman, R-2, Ayden, set out 400
cabbage plants; Mrs. Robert Chap-
man, R-2, Ayden, set out 200 straw-
berry plants; Mrs. Helen Strong,
R-2, Ayden, set out 100 strawberry
plants, two grape vines, 12 peach
trees, two pears, two apples and two
peach trees; Mrs. Maggie Strong,
R-2, Ayden, set out four peach trees,
one pear, one peach, two fig and one
white grape vine; Mrs. Duddie
Mint White, R-2, Ayden, set out one
dozen peach and two apple trees.

The agents have prepared dem-
onstration materials for February
lesson on production of the family
foods.

Three club meetings were not
held during the month due to rain
and icy roads.

The agent attended the first dis-
trict conference for the year in Tar-
boro January 29, 1948, at which time
different members of the state staff
outlined extension progress since
1910 up to the present time—namely,
number agents and accomplish-
ments, distribution of time to the
many project activities and the
many needed phases of the work
on the long time program.

To climax the December activities
of the Ayden Home Demonstration
Club the club members reported
holding their annual Christmas party
at the home of Mrs. J. M. Reeves
on December 26. Approximately 30
members and their husbands took
part in games and songs. A dessert
course was served by the hostess.
Highlight of the party was an ex-
change of gifts.

Thirty members of the County
Council met with the agent and
made their final plans for carrying
on the county program of work for
1948 January 3 at 10:30 a.m. in the
Agricultural Building, which was re-
ported well in each club during the
month by club representatives.

The agent held meetings with 17
4-H Clubs during the month with
an enrollment of 360 girls for the
month. The meetings were presided
over by the club officers which was
commendable in most instances. The
procedure followed: meeting called
to order by the president, song, club
pledge and prayer. Minutes of the
last meeting were read and adopted
after which the roll was called, old
and new business was in order. The
agents greeted the whole group for
a few brief remarks after which the
boys and girls were separated for
project instructions.

The agent gave a demonstration
to the 4-H Club girls on 4-H Club
record keeping and budgeting. The
demonstration began with asking

three questions: Did you have a job
in 1947? How much did you earn
and what did you save? If all the
questions could not be answered by
yes it is time to begin thinking
about 1948 record keeping and bud-
geting. Mimeograph sheets of paper
were given to the girls. The agent
demonstrated how each girl might
use a calendar for her daily record-
ing and at the end of the month or
at some leisure time the informa-
tion might be transferred to a small
note book. Project record keeping
was demonstrated besides discussing
with them the meaning of a 4-H
Club project and the requirement
for completing a project. A bulletin
board of many of the available 4-H
bulletins for 4-H members to give
them assistance in carrying out their
projects was part of the demonstra-
tion material.

In order to help with the food
shortage many of the 4-H members
were encouraged to select food pro-
duction project along with other
homemaking projects. At the end
of the lesson application blanks
were given to each member.

1. Each club girl to keep records
of their expenditures for one month
and make a report at next club
meeting.

2. Each 4-H Club girl to try to
save at least \$1.00 each month.

3. Select at least two projects by
the next meeting and begin work
on. If no more than collecting and
reading material.

4. Help with home accounts.

5. Encourage other girls to be-
come members.

At the end of each meeting the
girls and boys were brought back
together for one song and game as
their recreational program. The
meeting adjourned.

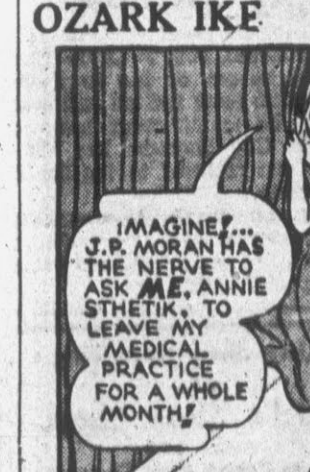

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO

VEHICULAR TRAFFIC UPON CERTAIN SECTIONS OF DESIGNATED STREETS IN THE CITY OF GREENVILLE; DEFINING TERMS USED IN SAID ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR ITS VIOLATION

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Greenville do ordain:

Section 1. Definitions. The word "Vehicle" or "Vehicles," whenever used in the context hereof shall mean and include automobile, truck, bus, motorcycle and any other carriage propelled by any motor of any kind, and-or bicycle, pushcart, wagon, cart, buggy or any other carriage pulled or drawn by beast or man, and-or persons riding upon saddle horses or other beasts of burden.

The term "Left Turn" whenever used in the context hereof shall be construed to mean the entering by any vehicle of any street, avenue or highway intersecting the street, avenue or highway upon which the operator or driver of such vehicle shall be travelling from such driver or operator's left hand side.

The term "U Turn" whenever used in the context hereof shall be construed to mean the complete turning around of any vehicle by the driver or operator thereof at any street intersection.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for the operator or driver of any vehicle as defined herein while operating any such vehicle to drive such vehicle so as to make a Left Turn and-or a U Turn, as herein defined, at the following street intersections:

(a) At the intersection of Fourth Street and Evans Street.

(b) At the intersection of Third Street and Evans Street.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and up on conviction by the Court shall be fined \$5.00 for each offense.

Section 4.—All ordinances and clauses of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

Ice Hockey Again Official Olympic Sport Says Body

AHA Team From U. S. Will Not Be Recognized; Americans Out Of Running

St. Moritz, Switzerland, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The International Olympic committee announced today ice hockey had been restored as an official Olympic sport, but the team of the amateur hockey association of America (AHA) will not be recognized.

Hockey was relegated to unofficial status just before opening of the fifth winter games after a bitter international controversy that for a while threatened the entire carnival.

The AHA team had been recognized as the official U. S. entry by the Swiss organizing committee and over the protests of the U. S. Olympic committee, which sent across its own team.

The U. S. committee contended the AHA was "commercially tainted."

The ruling means that the winner of the hockey tournament now in progress will be recognized as the Olympic champion and points will be awarded other top finishers—with the exception of the U. S. team. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be presented to the top three finishers in the hockey tournament, said Otto Mayer, chancellor of the I. O. C.

The United States' team, already twice beaten, apparently has little chance of bettering its present fourth place position. Mayer said the eleven-hour compromise of the hockey wrangle had been accepted by the Swiss Olympic committee.

It came following a secret exchange of letters yesterday between the I. O. C. and the Swiss with the International Ice Hockey Federation kept informed.

Switzerland is currently leading the hockey pack with six wins and no defeats with Czechoslovakia and Canada following with five wins and one tie.

Bobo Newsom Is Again For Sale

New York, Feb. 7.—(AP)—It's moving time again for Pitcher Bobo Newsom—the New York Yankees say they can't find a place for the 36-year-old veteran this season.

The talkative Bobo, who has pitched for eight different major league teams during his 20 years with organized baseball, has been offered to any club for the price of \$1.

Actually, this is an unconditional release, but Newsom is a 10-year-man in the majors and waivers must be asked. The dollar payment would make it legal, but if Bobo refused to join the claiming club he would be a free agent.

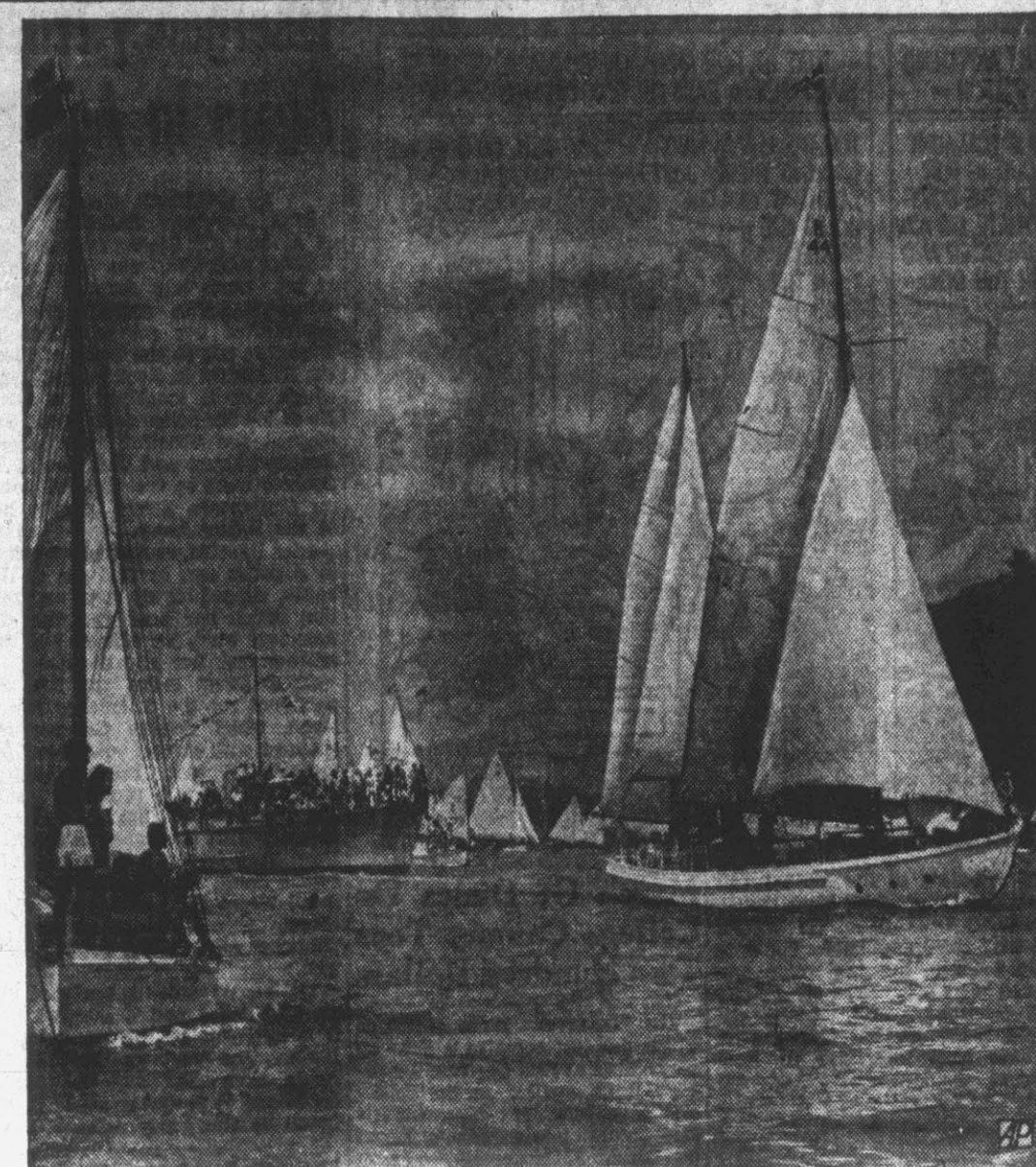

Expect Pitt Cotton Ginners At Convention

A good representation of Pitt County ginners is expected to attend the annual convention of the Carolina Ginners Association, which convenes in Charlotte Monday morning, February 9, in the Hotel Charlotte.

Altogether, approximately 250 ginners, agricultural leaders and representatives of raw cotton interests will be on hand for the one-day session, according to Fred P. Johnson of Raleigh, executive secretary of the organization.

High on the discussion agenda, Johnson said, will be the ginning industry's plans for a better balanced farm program and cotton's place within that program.

"With tobacco farms facing a cut in acreage," he said, "we have an opportunity to set up a balanced program by adding cotton, livestock, poultry and other such crops."

The Carolina Ginners Association, which includes membership from cotton counties in Virginia as well, is expected to include in its 1945 program increased support of the State Extension Services, Johnson said, "as well as bring about closer cooperation between ginners and their customers—both producers and marketing interests."

H. H. Williamson, assistant director of the Federal Extension Service, will serve as convention keynoter with an address entitled, "The Place of Cotton in the New Agricultural Pattern of the Southeast."

Other speakers will include D. D. Day of Dallas, Texas, representative of the Cotton Gin Machinery Manufacturers Association; C. E. McDaniel, area supervisor of the National Cotton Council; and Lt. Governor L. Y. Ballentine.

The Association's 1945 program will be submitted by the board of directors to a panel of specialists for analysis.

God's plan was that we should put our savings into children and land, depending upon these to take care of us in our old age. sive. In 1908 he held the Senate floor 18 hours and 23 minutes against a money bill.

The second longest was Senator Huey P. Long, Louisiana Democrat, in 1935 he spoke 15 hours against the National Industrial Recovery Act.

There have been filibusters in the Senate for more than 100 years. In his filibuster a Senator doesn't have to talk about the bill he is trying to block.

He can read the Bible aloud or talk about anything, including cooking recipes, so long as he keeps on talking. Isn't there any way to stop a filibuster? There is, it's a thing called cloture. It means limiting debate.

But two-thirds of the senators have to vote for cloture before a filibuster can be blocked.

The senators seldom do this. Why? Just a kind of gentlemen's agreement that they won't vote for it. Their reason for not voting for cloture—which means their willingness to let a bill be killed by a filibuster—goes like this:

"Senator Jones wants to filibuster today because he really wants to block a certain bill."

"Maybe next week I'll be the only one against some bill I really want killed and the only way I can block it is by a filibuster."

"If I vote for cloture against Jones today, he may vote for cloture against me next week. So—no cloture."

Senator Elender, Louisiana Democrat and a Huey Long supporter from way back, threatens a 40-hour filibuster if the civil rights bill comes up.

Other Southern Democrats are so sore about the bills Mr. Truman wants passed that they're talking of leaving the Democratic Party.

Among other things Mr. Truman asked Congress for laws to stop lynching and wipe out the poll tax. Almost all lynchings are in the South. And seven Southern states, the only ones, have a poll tax. It has to be paid before a man can vote.

In other years, Southern senators have filibustered to death both an anti-poll tax bill and an anti-lynching bill.

Dean Jenkins Says Peace Depends On Individual Training

Dean Leu W. Jenkins of East Carolina Teachers College told members of the Student Federalists organization at the college at a meeting held on last Tuesday evening that elimination of war begins in the church and the school house and not in new theories of government. Dr. Jenkins' talk stressed the idea that throughout the world men must learn to trust one another if they hope to establish permanent good relations. No form of world government, however well planned, he said, will bring peace if men continue to suspect, misunderstand, and hate one another. Noah A. Toler of Point Harbor, president of the Student Federalists, introduced Dr. Jenkins.
