Note Contrasts In N. C. Weather

Past Year Had All Kinds Of Extremes Reports State College Observer

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 10.—All sections of North Carolina from the sea coast to the mountains were exposed to "extreme contrasts in weather" during the past year, according to the 1947 meteorological summary issued today by the U.S. Weather Bureau at N. C. State College.

Director C. E. Lamoureux said that 1947 included "the wettest November on record for the state as a whole, the second coldest March and the second coldest July on record, near-record high temperatures in January, light frosts in the higher mountain valleys in June and July, damaging flash floods in restricted areas of the Piedmont, and exceptionally high tides along the coast."

Lamoureux's summary continued as follows:
"The warm weather of October, November and December, 1947, continued through January 1948. It was so warm that apples were blooming in Columbus County and tobacco was up in that section. The month was the wettest January of record in the southwest corner of the state."
"In contrast to the preceding four months of warm weather, February and March were very cold. It was the coldest February of record at many stations in the western mountain area. Very little snow had fallen the early part of the winter, but heavy snows occurred in the mountain areas in February and March; the total snowfall at Parker was 63 inches—the heaviest two-month fall at that place."

"A widespread sleet and snow storm on the 20th of February hindered traffic and caused a temporary closing of rural schools. Severe windstorms on the 25th and 26th of March broke plate glass windows in Raleigh and Winston-Salem."
"In April and May temperatures were slightly above normal and rainfall was rather light. Near drought conditions prevailed in early May, but rains later in the month relieved the dry condition. Early sown crops prospered, but late sown crops made a poor stand, with much replanting necessary. A tornado near Fairmont on April 30th killed one person, injured four others and badly damaged 61 buildings."

"Killing frosts in the mountains on the 8th to the 11th of May severely damaged fruit and vegetables in that section of the state."
"June and July were cool, with July the second coldest of record. Record breaking low temperatures were registered on July 23-25, while light frosts were recorded in the higher mountain valleys in both months. By way of contrast, near record high temperatures were registered in many localities on the 10th and 11th of June."

"Heavy rains along the eastern slopes of the Blue Ridge caused damaging floods in the upper Yadkin on the 13th and 14th of June. In the eastern part of the state less than one inch of rain fell in June in portions of Robeson, Scotland and Hoke Counties."

"Severe wind and hailstorms were reported locally during June and July."

"August, September and October were above normal in temperature, although there was a very cool period the last 10 days of September and the first five days of October."

"The lowest September temperature in the state (23 degrees) was recorded at Transou on the 28th. Killing frosts were reported in the mountains on the 28th of September and again on the 2nd of October."

"Heavy local rains in September caused considerable property damage. On the 7th of the month local flooding occurred in the Greenville and Washington areas; 200,000 pounds of tobacco was damaged in local warehouses."

"On the 24th and 25th of September a small tropical storm crossed southeastern North Carolina. Heavy rains were general over all sections east of the mountains. Flash floods in the tributaries of the Cape Fear River were the highest of record."

"On the 12th and 13th of October, a hurricane off the North Carolina coast caused heavy rains and exceptionally high tides along the coast. Later this storm moved inland across southern Georgia, and caused heavy rains along the southeastern slopes of the mountains. Dry conditions in the southern mountain counties were relieved, and minor

He cautioned against permitting heating plants, stoves and heaters to become overheated and cause a fire. "Be watchful, and prevent fires to have property and maybe human lives," the fire chief said.

"November and December were cold, with the cold weather continuing through January 1948. It was the wettest November of record, with twice the number of rainy days as compared to normal. The field crop situation deteriorated steadily throughout October and November and well into December. Farmers were unable to harvest lespedeza hay, and it was left to rot in the fields."

"Burley tobacco, in the mountain counties, was damaged by the inclement weather. Burley tobacco requires fine fall weather for curing. Peanuts deteriorated in the fields, and there was some small loss to corn in the shock."

"On the whole, the extreme variability of the weather in 1947 would not appear favorable for crops. Yet, a good crop of winter grain was harvested in spite of the fact that the dry spring caused a short straw. Flue-cured tobacco ran into dry weather during the usual transplanting period, and much replanting was necessary. The crop was spotty, and with moderate yield and quality."
