

Battle Time To Clear Highways Before Freeze

Carolinas 'Slush-Groggy'; Cold Predicted In West; Rivers Filling

The Carolinas, slush-groggy but warmer, battled the cold today to clear roads before a predicted freeze strikes the western areas of the sister states.

The melting snow brought a threat that some eastern North Carolina rivers, already in flood or approaching their banks, would inundate larger areas.

The Asheville area, its foot-deep snow blanket turning to slush under a 46-degree temperature today, hoped to clear blocked roads into South Carolina and eastward toward Charlotte.

Warm rain and fog came to the states today, with predictions of afternoon temperatures ten degrees above freezing. However, there was the forecast of freezing rain or sleet tomorrow in the western mountains. Raleigh, Greensboro and Winston-Salem were aided in clearing half a foot of snow by forenoon temperatures in the high thirties. Charlotte's four inches of snow was being rapidly washed away by rain and climbing temperatures.

Temperatures early today in the Carolinas were generally moderate, just freezing or slightly above, a harbinger of today's warmer weather.

The North Carolina lower coast, particularly hard-hit by Monday's heavy snow, was near recovery today. Wilmington reported an overnight low of 36 degrees with warm rain predicted through tomorrow. North Carolinians, already suffering a shortage of oil and coal, were cautioned to cut voluntarily their consumption of cooking gas. Gas companies, the utility commission explained, are caught in a squeeze between high demand for gas and a shortage of coal and fuel oil in making it.

Greenville, typical of other eastern North Carolina sections, reported a crew of 25 was waiting only for the rain to lift a little before shoveling away a deep slush layer. Rain continued there and the morning temperature was 34.

Dangerous Roads Delay Delivery Mail In Country

Impossible conditions on country roads continues to hinder delivery of mail on the rural routes. Postmaster J. Knott Proctor said today. No rural deliveries have been made this week. The mail will be held until the roads become safely passable, the postmaster said. Some of the rural carriers' cars were badly damaged delivering mail last week. Mail boxes on the paved highways are inaccessible due to snow piled there by grading machines. A postal law requires rural mail box holders to clear away snow from the boxes. The carriers are not required to deliver mail on foot.

Many persons who live in rural areas have called at the postoffice for their mail, and in numerous cases they have taken mail back to their neighbors, the postmaster said.

Costa Ricans Nip Plot; Leftists Attempt Coup

San Jose, Costa Rica, Feb. 12 (AP)—Troops and police nipped today a plot to overthrow Costa Rica's government and install former President Rafael Calderon Guardia.

The attempted coup began with violence last night over Sunday's presidential elections. A policeman was killed and several persons were wounded in shooting which continued into the early morning.

Gangs raced through the streets. They were the blue, yellow and red armbands of the Republican National and the red armbands of the Vanguardia Popular (Communist) party, both supporters of Calderon. Calderon trails by 10,000 votes in Sunday's election and has conceded the victory of Publisher Otilio Ulate Blanco, of the Union Nacional party. However, Calderon has charged fraud.

Ulate said yesterday he learned the Communists, and some army men planned a coup, but outgoing President Eodoro Picado Michalski declared such a move could be repelled.

A government source said the coup was plotted by the Communists, and that the Republic Nacional was not involved. He said the first step was a vain attempt to seize a barracks. He added it probably failed because the plotters struck too soon. Defense Minister Rene Picado, brother of the retiring President, agreed yesterday to support Ulate. Shots rang out frequently in the capital this morning. Half-tracks

Cancel Plans To Sell Air Field

Atlanta, Feb. 12 (AP)—The War Assets Administration announced today it has cancelled plans to sell Seymour Johnson air field at Goldsboro, N. C.

There was no comment beyond the bare announcement. Sources outside the WAA, however, said it was likely the field would be reacquired by the Army Air Forces.

Plane Crash Kills Four, Another Is Missing

Cold And Snow Sleet And Rain

From Rockies To The Eastern Seaboard, Winter Strikes Again

Chicago, Feb. 12 (AP)—Winter dealt a four-ply punch of cold, snow, sleet and rain over a wide section of the country today—from the Rockies to the Eastern Seaboard.

The worst of the batch of bad weather hit the Kansas-Oklahoma-Texas Panhandle, sections of the mountain states and the Gulf region. The north central area got more sub-zero blasts—but a promise of moderating temperatures.

The mercury was below zero today over most of Colorado, Montana, the Dakotas, Nebraska, Minnesota, Wisconsin and parts of Iowa, and was near the zero mark in sections of Michigan, Illinois and Indiana. Some of the lowest readings included -18 at Aberdeen, S.D., -17, Sioux Falls, S.D., -14, Willmar, Minn., -11, Minneapolis, and -5 at Sioux City and Mason City, Ia.

Schools were closed and highways impassable in many areas of the Panhandle region. In central and northern Kansas 101 schools closed to conserve gas supplies for home heating. In the Oklahoma Panhandle school classes were discontinued as the worst weather of the winter season hit the area. Temperatures of zero to five below were forecast for tonight. Highway travel was nearly halted and scores of cars were snowbound.

Southern Florida escaped the inclement weather and the mercury yesterday reached 85 at Fort Myers and 76 at Miami.

China Nears Collapse

Country Contains A Quarter Of World's Population; Chaos Growing; Communist Capture Of Manchuria Feared; Money Alone Can't Save People; Outlook

It's necessary to record that China is in grave danger of collapse and even partial dismemberment.

China is a vast country which houses a quarter of the globe's population and theoretically ranks as one of the Big Five powers along with America, Russia, Britain and France. She has reached such a chaotic state economically, politically and militarily that she cannot save herself by her own resources alone. Only outside aid on a vast scale could turn the trick. You naturally think of Uncle Sam—and wonder.

China has just entered its lunar new year ("the year of the rat"). This normally calls for national celebration. However, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's government banned such observance because of the country's plight. Chiang told his lieutenants that "this year will be better than the last," but apparently he was wise enough to let this non-committal remark lie where it fell.

The old fact is that the country's economy has been blown to smithereens. It's so bad that the experts can't give an intelligible estimate of the disaster. People continue to die of starvation. The inflation is as

crazy as the mad hatter.

This frightful economic disruption is in part a reflection of the political mess. Chiang has to struggle with powerful forces which make it impossible to establish an efficient government. War lords and other vested interests continue to put self before country, with disastrous results.

Small wonder that the Chinese Communist rebels have been making a field day of this politico-economic collapse which inevitably has crippled Chiang's military efforts to crush the rebellion. The position of the government as regards Manchuria is close to desperate. The Chinese Communists are in control of that great and rich country, and it will be a military marvel if Chiang can regain it.

Worse yet, there is a heavy exodus from cities which are threatened by the Communists in northern China. In fact, the government's position north of the Yangtze River through central China is bad generally.

If the Chinese Communists are able to consolidate their hold on Manchuria, what have you? Well, (Continued on Page Six)

Shot Down

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 12 (AP)—The Bulgarian telegraph agency says two Turkish fighter planes were shot down Monday by Bulgarian coastal guards.

The report, issued yesterday, said one of the pilots drowned in the Black Sea, off the port of Sopot. The other was said to have been injured and captured. Anti-aircraft guns apparently were used. The agency said the guards warned the planes by flashing red lights that they were over Bulgarian territory but that the planes ignored the warnings and dived Sopot several times before being downed.

Gandhi's Ashes In Three Rivers

Thousands Look On As Last Solemn Rites Are Performed

Allahabad, India, Feb. 12 (AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi's ashes sealed in urn, were immersed in the waters of three sacred Hindu rivers here today.

Tens of thousands looked on as the solemn rites were performed over the mortal remains of India's assassinated spiritual leader.

Millions of others throughout this teeming sub-continent had a part in the ceremonies as portions of the Mahatma's ashes had been sent to all Indian provinces.

The immersion took place at the confluence of the Ganges, Jumna and Sarawati rivers. Among the witnesses was the Prime Minister of India, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. Others who watched included members of the Central Government, the Governor of the United Provinces, and Ministers of the local government.

The special train carrying Gandhi's ashes arrived at Allahabad station at 9 a. m. Nehru, who arrived in Allahabad by airplane yesterday, was at the station to greet the train of third-class coaches bearing the funeral urn.

A guard of honor escorted the urn to Triveni Sangham, Confluence of the three rivers, for the final ceremony.

OIL TANKER ON FIRE

Taft Moves Into Stassen States

Hard Boiled Approach To ERP And Tax Cuts Earns Response

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 12 (AP)—Senator Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) has found a hard boiled approach to the Marshall Plan and tax reduction the most responsive issues among Illinois and Indiana Republicans.

At least, supporters noted his mention of those issues has drawn the largest share of infrequent applause at speeches delivered in Chicago, Bloomington, Ill., Gary, and Hammond, Ind.

Taft invaded today the nominally hostile territory of Minnesota. Here former Gov. Harold E. Stassen, who broke the unwritten rules by challenging Taft's Ohio backing for the Republican presidential nomination, is strongly entrenched.

In fact, Stassen is credited with such grass roots support in this state that Taft's backers say their friends will not raise their heads publicly until what they regard as an opportune time at the Philadelphia GOP convention.

Stassen's supporters contend that time never will come. But the Taft office in small change and their foe in the Minnesota delegation of 25 if Stassen fails to make the grade. Taft's midwestern reception thus far has not been such as to change his views on any of the major issues of the day.

He got his biggest applause of the trip at Hammond yesterday when he demanded that Europeans show signs they intend to help themselves before they receive any help from the United States.

Postoffice At Winterville Robbed Again

Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson is holding Frank Rudolph Gray, 18-year-old Negro youth, on the charge of breaking into the Winterville postoffice and the robbery of several dollars in small change and a quantity of mail. Gray is in the county jail. U. S. postoffice inspectors are expected here to continue the investigation.

Winterville Police Chief Jim Buck arrested Gray. Miss Gertrude Spear is the postmistress. The best information available today was that Gray allegedly forced open a door to the interior of the postoffice, secured some small change and carried away a quantity of mail.

Chief Buck said Gray had been in trouble before that sometime ago he was implicated in a postoffice robbery in Winterville and that Gray is also charged with breaking and entering a poolroom there last Saturday.

Deputy Sheriff Loyd Manning and Capt. Lester D. Page of the Greenville police department, went to Winterville to bring Gray to jail here.

More Military Aid For Greece Said In Cards

Athens, Feb. 12 (AP)—An informed source said today increased military assistance to Greece following expiration of the present program of American aid to Greece is under consideration in Washington.

This source said a large Greek army is expected to be formed by June 30 indicating that future aid will be greater than current expenditures for the military.

The American mission of aid to Greece allocated, \$159,000,000 for military aid covering a 13-month period. This period ends June 30. Eugene Cady, financial adviser to the mission, and Maj. Gen. Arthur Harper, mission member, now are in Washington preparing a recommendation for aid, the informant said.

The same source said more than a million dollars donated by Greeks will be used to buy modern rifles for the Greek army.

Russians Again Brings Charges Against Allies

Declares Britain And France Encouraged Hitler To Turn Against Russia

Moscow, Feb. 12 (AP)—Russia says Great Britain and France before the war encouraged Adolf Hitler to turn the German army against the Soviet Union.

She charges that they let Germany take over Czechoslovakia and, in the pact of Munich and others, entered into non-aggression agreements with Germany's foe.

These accusations were made in a statement issued last night by the Soviet Information Bureau. In support of them, the bureau cited German foreign office documents for 1937 and 1938 which it said the Red Army had captured.

The statement was Russia's second in reply to publication of papers on Nazi-Soviet relations by the United States. This one said little about the U. S.

(The U. S. State Department published captured documents Jan. 21 which said Hitler and Stalin plotted to split up Poland, dominate the Balkans and shut the western powers out of Europe altogether.)

In Washington last night, no comment was forthcoming from the department on the latest Soviet statement.

(The British Foreign Office and the French Foreign Ministry did not comment, either. In London, a foreign-office spokesman said Britain's official reply, if any, would be withheld pending a check on how the statement was documented.)

The Soviet communiqué said British-French policy before the war was aimed "at isolating the U. S. S. R. and directing Hitler's aggression towards the East against the Soviet Union, using Hitler as a tool for their own ends."

The bureau quoted statements it said were made in:

(1) A talk between Hitler and Viscount (now the Earl of) Halifax (at that time lord president of the council) in the presence of Baron Konstantin von Neurath (then German foreign minister) Nov. 19, 1937, at Berneseburg, Bavaria.

(2) A talk between Hitler and the late Sir Neville Mayrick Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, March 3, 1938, in the presence of the late Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop.

(3) A report to Berlin from Herbert von Dirksen, German ambassador to London, July 10, 1938.

Electioneering By Unions Hit

Two Big Complications In Organized Labor's Political Drive

Washington, Feb. 12 (AP)—Organized labor's drive to swing the 1948 elections ran into double trouble today.

The two big complications seemed to be:

1. The possible chilling effect of a grand jury indictment on union political spending.

2. Divided political loyalty within the ranks of both AFL and CIO.

The indictment was returned by a federal grand jury here yesterday. It cited the CIO and its president, Philip Murray, under the section of the Taft-Hartley act which bans use of union money for political purposes.

A CIO strategist said privately the indictment is bound to discourage unions from campaign spending.

Even if the unions doubt the government can make the indictment stick, he said, "as a practical matter it will deter them."

The CIO contends the section of the law involved is unconstitutional. Its lawyers hope to get a supreme court ruling before the high tribunal takes its summer recess in June.

Both the AFL and CIO have as their aim the defeat of congressmen who voted for the Taft-Hartley Act. But both are finding it hard to make their members stay hitched to a single line of political action.

Woman Ignores Traditions Of Politics, Wins

Gray, Ga., Feb. 12 (AP)—Pett "Pat" Hungerford, "the nurse lady" of rural Jones County, has won a seat on the Board of County Commissioners.

She not only beat 11 men for the job, she led the entire ticket. Although complete but unofficial returns gave her 1016 votes against 788 for the highest male candidate.

Her campaign slogan was: "You kiss the babies. I change their diapers. You work from one end, I work from the other."

The attractive, 37-year-old blonde served for two years as Jones County Public Health nurse. She is the mother of two children. When she announced for office, she declared the requirements for election included (1) many relatives; (2) the right political affiliation, and (3) a little cash to keep the pot boiling. She bragged she had none of them—but she campaigned enthusiastically.

Plunging Market Takes Rest Today

Fall Appeared Slackening Yesterday, Reaction Spreads To Security Markets Around World; Economists See Lower Prices

New York, Feb. 12 (AP)—Plunging market prices took an enforced breathing today after a week-long rampage. United States Commodity and Securities Markets were closed in observance of Lincoln's birthday.

The first decisive break in the rising price level came on Feb. 4. Since then prices have nose-dived on the Commodity and Security exchanges, and to a lesser extent in wholesale food and raw material markets. Grains and cotton led the slide. It still was on yesterday, but appeared to be losing some of its momentum.

Last Friday the consumer felt the first effect of the widening breaks. New retail food prices cuts were on the fire last night.

The retail price of flour and lard fell. Bacon and some cuts of beef were cheaper in many stores. Bread prices were down.

Reaction spread yesterday to securities markets around the world. Stocks tumbled in Manila, Copenhagen, Sydney and Toronto. There was a slump on the London market, but prices there recovered before the British exchange closed for the day.

There were temporary rallies in the prices of grain during the week but they were short-lived.

The worst day of the week-long melees was Tuesday, when prices fell like ten pins. Stocks tumbled \$1 to \$5 a share Tuesday and sent the Associated Press average down to a new low since last June. Never before were so many issues traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

"The back of inflation has been broken," said A. W. Zelomok of New York (economic counselor and president of the International Statistical Bureau, a private organization. Many economists agreed.

Zelomok predicted that commodity prices would fall 20 to 25 percent within nine months. Most economists were chary, however, with any predictions for the future.

Snowslide Hits Pint-Size Train

Three Coaches Tumble Into Mountain Gorge; All Escape Death

Alamosa, Colo., Feb. 12 (AP)—Massive snowslide thundered down on a tiny narrow gauge railroad train last night, tumbling three coaches down a mountain gorge but those aboard miraculously escaped death.

The cars were huffed hundreds of feet.

Two train crew members were hospitalized today with injuries and a dispatcher for the Denver and Rio Grande Western reported that all the 11 passengers were shaken up.

The passengers and members of the train crew arrived here at 4 a. m. (mountain standard time) after a two hour, 15 mile trip from the wreck scene.

The injured men were identified by the dispatcher as Brakenham George Ottaway and Railroad Express messenger Victor Ingie.

Railroad officials said the snowslide was 100 feet wide and 10 feet deep.

The only route to the wreck scene, high in the Cumbres mountains near the Colorado-New Mexico border, 50 miles southwest of here, was over the winding, breath-taking railway line.

The five-car train was being pulled over its tortuous route by two engines when the snow avalanche slammed into it about 5 p. m. (MST) two passenger cars—half the train—were hurled at least 300 feet down the canyon. The observation car tumbled about 75 feet. The engines, baggage and mail cars remained upright.

Statehood For Hawaii

Entrance Into The Union Depends On Senate, House Approved Last Summer; Main Arguments Pro And Con; Less Chance For Alaska; Status Of Hawaii

Washington, Feb. 12 (AP)—Statehood for Hawaii this year depends on the Senate. It may approve.

An Okay by both Houses of Congress is all that's needed to make any territory like Hawaii a state. The House approved last summer. There's less chance for Alaska, also a territory, to become a state this year. Neither House has acted on Alaska.

Hawaii—Eight islands in the Pacific 2,300 miles from the west coast—has a population of about 500,000. In area it's larger than Delaware, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Its three biggest products: Pineapples, sugar, coffee.

Not everyone in Hawaii wants statehood. The majority do. The people there voted on the question in 1940. The result: 67 per cent voted for it.

Some Congressmen oppose it. Some arguments against making it a state go this way:

1. This country's 48 states, solidly grouped together, have two oceans for a frontier. Making Hawaii a state would extend the frontier 2,300 miles into the Pacific.

Probers To Ask "Seer" Maynard How He Did It

Three Committees After Grain Trader Who Turned Slump Into Profit

Washington, Feb. 12 (AP)—E. T. Maynard of Chicago will be asked to tell congressional investigators how he turned the grain market slump into a \$300,000-plus profit.

The only question today is which of three interested committees will get to him first.

The three are the Senate Agriculture Committee, a Senate Appropriations subcommittee inquiring into speculation, and a similar special group in the House.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said yesterday Maynard made more than \$300,000 in wheat, another \$40,000 to \$50,000 in cotton and an undetermined amount in oats.

Senator Knowland (R-Calif.), a member of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee, told reporters: "I would advise you to keep in close touch with the committee next week." There were unconfirmed reports that the group would call Maynard in Monday.

Senator Young (R-ND), who is on the Agriculture Committee, said he thinks all of Maynard's operations "must be investigated."

"If we do not make the investigation," Young told a reporter, "then one of the special congressional investigating committees should."

Young said one thing he wants to know is whether Maynard, as a member of the Chicago Board of Trade, was required to put up the same one-third margin as other traders.

In Chicago, Maynard offered this statement as the key to his success in the market:

"All you had to do to know prices were going down was to read the newspapers."

Anderson told the agricultural group that Maynard has "no inside information" and that "no corruption" was involved.

He said the trader has bought and sold more than 1,000,000 bushels of wheat this month.

Maynard's windfall came up during Anderson's appearance before the committee to seek authority for controlling the oat or commodity market, or for anti-trust suits.

Tax Deadline On Monday, Feb. 16

Dewey Plans Attack On Government 'Failures'

the Republican Presidential nomination last month and his third invasion of doubtful New England in the last five months.

During his overnight stay in Boston, Dewey will confer with Massachusetts Republican leaders, including Gov. Robert Bradford, Sinclair Weeks, National committeeman, and former Gov. Alvin T. Fuller.

In a statement disclosing the theme of the speech, Paul E. Lockwood, Dewey's secretary, said:

"The failures of the Foreign Policy of the President National Administration have brought about confusion among the American people and fear that we are drifting toward another catastrophe."

"Governor Dewey—Will propose a specific and constructive program which he believes to be essential for the building of a lasting peace."

"These proposals will deal specifically with the crisis which imperils western Europe and the action which should be taken within the resources of the American people to restore the political and economic stability of the free areas of the world."

New York is just one of the cities facing the problem of the out-of-control teen-ager, who roams the streets looking for excitement. So one city councilman, Samuel Di Falco decided to grasp the problem by its pigtails and open warfare, against some of the kids "who make it bad for the others."

Out of the blue came his resolution proposed to the City Council, to impose a curfew on all teen-agers found unchaperoned in the Broadway theatrical district after 10 p.m. By teen-agers, Mr. Di Falco says he means those 16 years of age and younger.

However, Mr. Di Falco wants all teen-agers in the country to know that he is not against kids having fun—what he is doing, he says, "is something they will appreciate when they are grown up and are parents of children who may prove a constant source of concern to them."

He adds: "Youngsters have no business roaming the streets after 10 o'clock. They should be home in bed resting and studying for school the next day. If they knew the dangers involved in strolling on a busy thoroughfare like Broadway, or bright-light districts in other cities, they would be glad to accept the advice."

Father of two children aged 3 and 9, Mr. Di Falco says he was aroused to action by unpleasant happenings to unwary youngsters in search of excitement. He says:

"In one instance groups of teenagers were found in a room smoking marijuana just for a thrill. There have been hundreds of other unpleasant incidents of teen-agers being harmed by picking up with strangers who made them false promises with fancy jobs in the office."

When he was a boy, Mr. Di Falco says there weren't any bobby-soxers. Kids were more restricted in their activities. Today's parent, he says, is more liberal. Not that he blames the parents. They don't want to be classed as old fogies when Johnny or Mary say they would like to go to the movies, visit a school chum or go to a dance.

But what happens is that Johnny and Mary more often may decide to

The meet goes on Friday through Sunday.

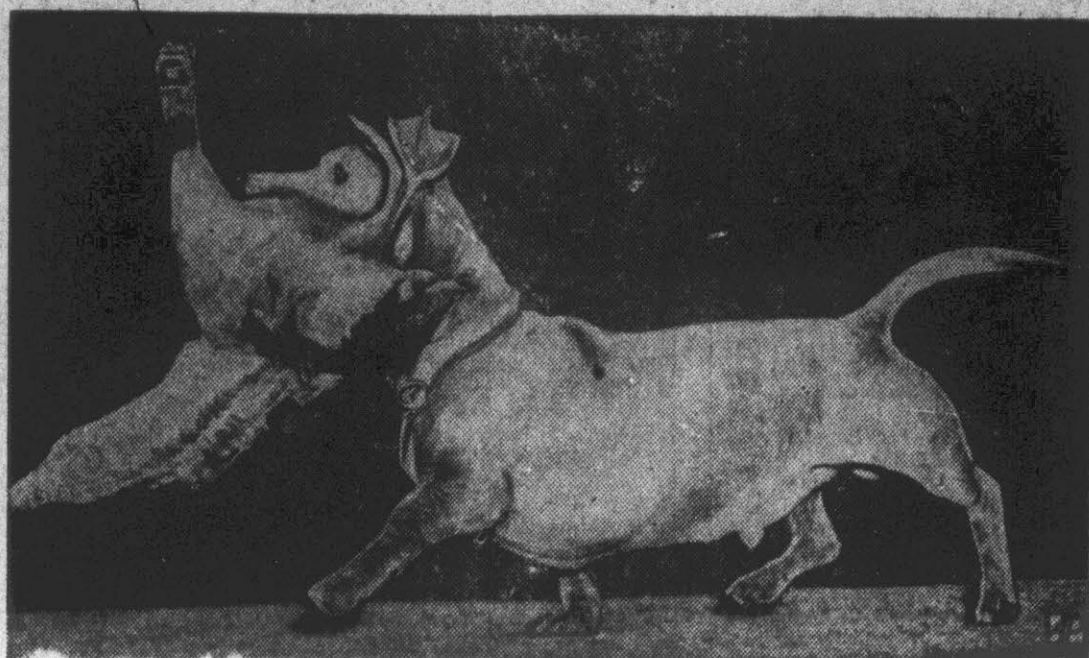

Many Rookies In Major Leagues Seeking Berths

Chicago, Feb. 12—(AP)—The 1948 crop of rookies who will seek berths on the eight American League baseball clubs totals 135—more than one-third of the 302 players who are scheduled to report for spring training on March 1.

The St. Louis Browns, who during the past few months have sold several of their star players, will have the most youngsters at their training camp—23. The other seven clubs average about 16 newcomers per team.

The league's new Red Book, released by Publisher Carl Hilligan, carries an abundant amount of facts and figures about the eight clubs and their 1948 personnel.

The world champion New York Yankees will have the most players in spring camp—42, if all come to terms, while the Browns' roster lists 40, more than half of them rookies.

Detroit's squad totals 39; Philadelphia and Cleveland 37 each; Chicago and Boston 36 each, and Washington 35.

Cage Tournament Tickets All Sold

Durham, N.C., Feb. 12—(AP)—If you haven't got your tickets for next month's Southern Conference basketball tournament, it's too late now.

Coltrane, who has been assistant commissioner of agriculture since Scott took office in 1937, is a native of Randolph County.

To Take Hand In Building Industry

Gov't Ready To Step Into Labor Disputes; NLRB Ready To Act

Dallas, Feb. 12—(AP)—The government is ready to step into building industry labor disputes for the first time.

Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board, says his agency is assuming jurisdiction under the Taft-Hartley law.

Denham's assertion in a speech before the Associated General Contractors means that the NLRB will act to:

1. Enforce bans against "featherbedding" and secondary boycotts. (Featherbedding is the practice of requiring employers to hire more workers than they need. Secondary boycotts occur when workers not on strike themselves refuse to handle goods from plants which have disputes with other workers.)

2. Consider charges of unfair labor practices by either building trades unions or contractors.

3. Settle jurisdiction disputes in which two or more unions claim the right to do certain work.

Heretofore the NLRB has held aloof from labor troubles in the building industry on the grounds that the work in most instances did not involve interstate commerce.

REASON NOT ENOUGH

Throughout the whole of my
adult life, rationalism failed me at
every point. It was not until I
came to see that religion is some-
thing vastly more than reason that I
began to get somewhere spiritually.

Thus spoke a man to me recently
as he poured out passionately the
story of a generation of failure
crowded at last by triumph. He had
grown up in a home where his pa-
rents and older brother believed
that the mind of man is equal to
any challenge. Think straight and
you will live straight, was the family
slogan. But this man came to see at
last that, like Saint Paul, the good
which he would do he could not do,
and the evil which he abhorred, that
he practiced. Reason was not
enough.

If reason had been enough, the
vast intellectual empire of Greece
would never have gone bankrupt.
If reason could solve all our prob-
lems, then a college diploma would
be an insurance policy against most
of life's incalculabilities. If the mind
were everything, then the modern
gadgets and inventions would be all
we need to make us happy. In fact,
a formula could probably be worked
out whereby we could get health and
happiness compounded in a single
pill.

The prospect for such a happy
state is not, however, entirely re-
assuring.

WASHINGTON LETTER

(Second of Two Articles on the
"New" Pentagon Building)

Washington—Today's population
of the Pentagon, three times size of
the Empire State building and
as big as Chicago's Merchandise
Mall, numbering about 22,000.

Its peak during World War II
it housed nearly 35,000 workers, the
average working population of a
city of 100,000.

Only one-fourth of the popula-
tion is military. The rest are
civilian Defense Department per-
sonnel, operation and mainte-
nance workers employed by the
Military Buildings Administration
and employees of the National
Food Corp., which operates the
cafeterias and beverage bars.

The maintenance personnel in-
cludes several hundred janitors and
charwomen, most of whom work at
night. The whole building gets a
good going-over every night. This
means dusting, sweeping, buffing
doors and emptying waste.

A crew of 10 window washers
works constantly on the 5.2 acres of
glass in the Pentagon's 5,693 cas-
ements, making the rounds about
once in 30 days.

Pentagon "Town" has round-the-
clock cafeterias and beverage bars,
complete banking service, medical
and dental clinics, post offices, bar-
ber shop, uniform and tailoring
shop, chain drug store, department
store, book store, railway and air-
line ticket service, frozen foods
counter, dry-cleaning and laundry
outward and so on.

Developed during the war as a
sort of special service for War De-
partment civilians, the Community
Activities Branch is constantly think-
ing up new ways of bringing normal
recreational out lets to the Pentagon
population.

There's a 100-voice Pentagon
Choral Club a theater group of 100
members known as "The Pentagon
Players," two public speaking classes
in which privates to full colonels
take lessons from college professors
for 14 weeks. There's also a stamp
society.

The Pentagon has the largest pri-
vate branch telephone exchange in
the world, with facilities enough to
service a city of 125,000. The dial
exchange system, which serves 22-
000 main telephone stations at the
peak, still serves at least 17,000.

The switchboard connects with
the telephone company's central of-
fice in Washington by 12 submarine
cables, weighing over 250 tons, be-
neath the Potomac.

The Pentagon receives more than
45,000 calls daily from nearly 50-
000 local calls, 700 long-distance calls
and over 100,000 air-branch calls.
All figures except the last were
more than doubled at the war-
time peak.

The Pentagon library carries 200-
000 volumes. These are two dispen-
saries. Approximately 300 military
personnel a day get routine medical
and dental examinations or treat-
ments from a 70-man dispensary.

tists and three nurses.

Under a civilian medical program
first aid emergency treatment for
illness and a health education pro-
gram are carried out. Some 66,000
chest X-rays in a special
tuberculosis survey.

With all the nagging and com-
plaining about Washington's weath-
er, the Pentagon is really an ideal
place to work. Air-conditioning keeps
the place at 78 degrees and 50 per-
cent humidity in summer and 75
degrees and 30 percent humidity in
winter.

Named Chairman For Activity Of AAUW Unit

Chicago, Feb. 12—(AP)—Univer-
sity of Illinois Dental School profes-
sor today declared that the teeth of
Americans are decaying six times
faster than they can be filled and
that eating of sugar is the major
cause.

Dr. Robert G. Kessel, professor
therapeutics at Illinois and president
of the Illinois State Dental Society,
made the assertion in a paper pre-
pared for the 83rd midwinter meet-
ing of the Chicago Dental Society.

He said that nine out of ten chil-
dren in the United States have den-
tal cavities (decay) and estimated
that the average American eats
about his own body weight in sugar
yearly.

"In our opinion, sugar has a
double action in the production of
cavities," Dr. Kessel said. "One is its
conversion into acids that can de-
stroy tooth structure, and two, is its
depressing effect on ammonia de-
velopment, which compound has a
limiting action on the bacteria that
are associated with acid formation."

Dr. Kessel and his associates have
been making clinical studies for
several years of the effect of am-
monia in reducing tooth decay.

They are currently making a long
range study of 2,000 sixth grade chil-
dren who are using a dentifrice and
mouth wash containing ammonia.

Find Shortage
In Cooking Gas

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 12—(AP)—North
Carolinians, who have had a hard
time finding fuel to keep warm this
winter, were confronted today with a
shortage of cooking gas.

The State Utilities Commission
warned yesterday, that gas users are
faced with an immediate loss of fuel
unless they reduce consumption.

The gas companies of the state,
the commission explained, are
caught in a squeeze between unpre-
cedented high demand for gas and a
shortage of the materials used in
generating it, coal and fuel oil.

Stuart, a native of Brunswick
County, was sentenced in Warren
County in 1933 to 6-8 years for con-
spiracy to rob, and escaped from the
Macon County prison camp in 1936.

Some 11 years later he was ar-
rested in White Bird, Idaho, where

Has New Lease On Life After Heart Surgery

Charleston, S. C., Feb. 12—(AP)—Betty Lee Woolridge, 21-year-old rheumatic heart victim from Ohio is going home Sunday with a ballerin dress and a new lease on life.

She is enthusiastic about dropping many of the restrictions necessary since an attack of rheumatic fever when she was 18 left her an invalid.

After her family in Canton was told a few months ago she would die within a year, Betty Lee read an Associated Press dispatch telling of experimental work done on heart valves of animals at the medical college here. There was no prediction human surgery would come soon.

She begged her doctor to arrange for an operation. The Crippled Children's Society and the Rotary Club of Canton paid travel and hospital expenses.

The operation corrected a scar in the heart valve which interfered with flow of blood from one chamber to the other.

And now Betty Lee has eaten her first chocolate in months. Yesterday she had a carbonated drink for the first time in two years.

She will have to avoid stairs and a lot of exercise when she goes home but she's hoping she will be able to help her mother, in the apartment which they share, with cooking soon.

Her job as a clerical worker in a Canton-Roller Bearing Company where she worked for a year when she finished high school, is waiting for her.

Meanwhile, she's busy with a drawer full of letters from victims vitally interested in the operation.

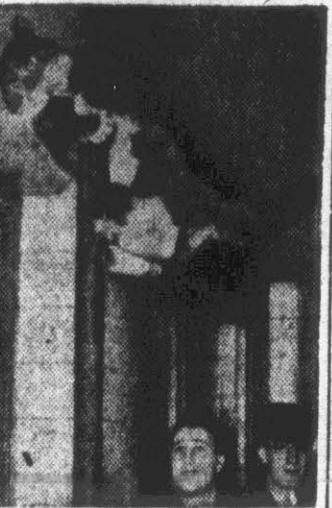

Thurmond Mum On Southerners' Political Plans

Columbia, S.C., Feb. 12—(AP)—Gov. J. Strom Thurmond was "mum" today on Arkansas Governor Ben Laney's statement that five Southern governors will go to Washington Feb. 22 for a showdown conference with Democratic leaders over President Truman's civil rights program.

Thurmond was appointed chairman of a committee to map action against the President's program at the Southern governors conference in Florida last week.

Gov. Laney said yesterday the group—comprising Governors Lester of Texas, Cherry of North Carolina, Tuck of Virginia, in addition to himself and Thurmond—will "lay our cards on the table" on George Washington's birthday, in a meeting with Howard McGrath, Democratic national committeeman.

Thurmond declared the committee is "surveying public opinion in the South and would continue working."

One World Award For Einstein

New York, Feb. 12—(P)—The one world award for 1948—a trip around the world—has gone to Prof. Albert Einstein, of Princeton, N. J.

The citation says the physicist "recognized that scientists, like every man, are involved in mankind, and that they can't avoid taking a stand on the great moral issues of the time."

Designation of Einstein to receive the award, a memorial to the late Wendell L. Willkie for his contributions toward International Unity, was announced by the award committee yesterday.

Big Sentences By Tito's Court

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Feb. 12—(P)—Five Greek Orthodox Priests and a nun were sentenced yesterday to terms at hard labor ranging from 18 months to seven years. They were convicted of harboring a former Chetnik in Serbia for two years.

The Chetnik, Milan Milanovich, was sentenced to be shot. Two merchants convicted of alleged large thefts of textiles at Maribor, in Slovenia, also were condemned to death.

Stancill Infant Dies; Funeral Rites Today

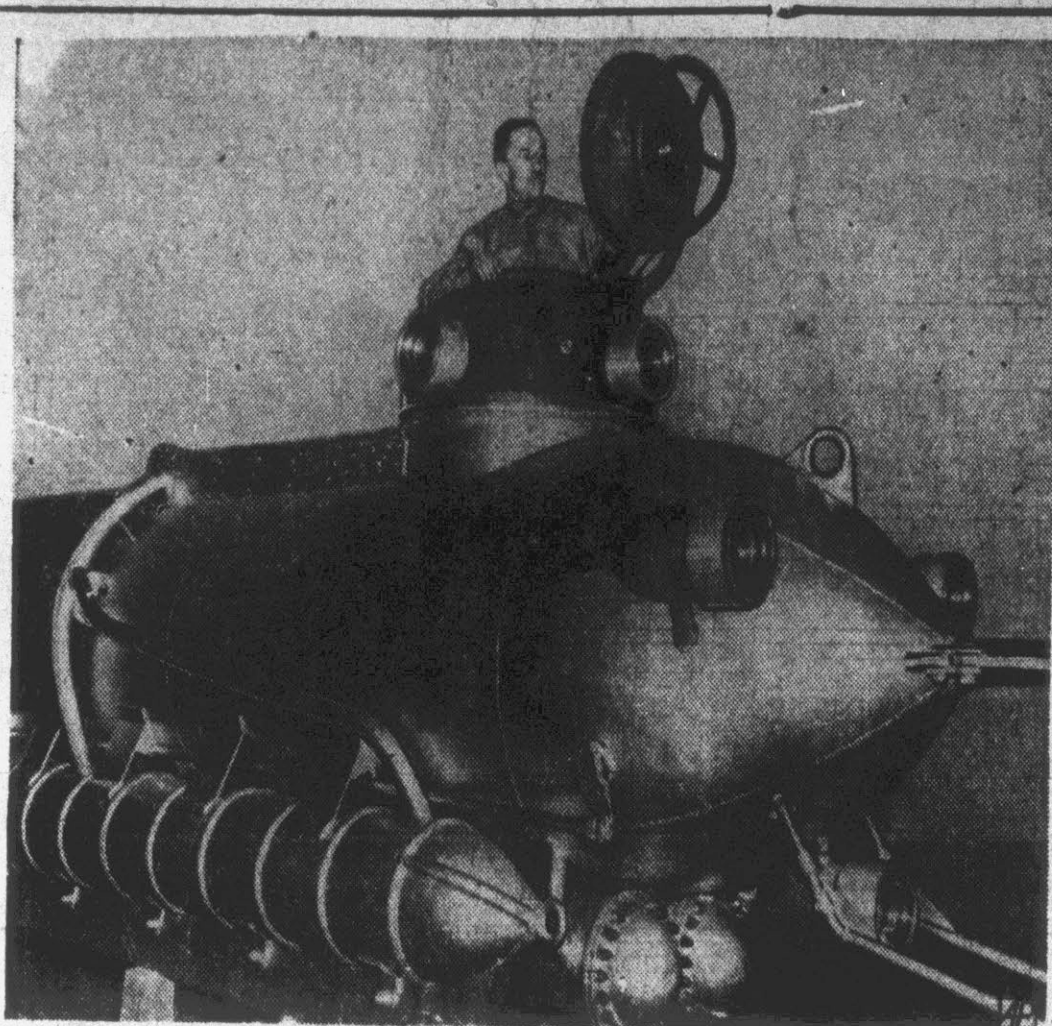

of 30 House members and 15 Senators. The people there—or 85 per cent of them—are U. S. citizens. They pay the same taxes people in the states pay.

But, except for the legislature and a delegate to Congress, they can't elect their officials.

The President of the United States appoints the Governor and all the Judges.

Although the Hawaiians elect a delegate to Congress he can't vote there. He is a representative without power.

Which means the Hawaiians have no say-so in the U. S. government although it's controlled by that government.

If it became a state it could elect its own Governor, have two full-fledged U. S. Senators and at least one voting Congressman.

Now the people of the island can't even vote for the President and vice-President of the United States.

In 1900 Congress passed an act making Hawaii a territory. Congress at any time can, by another act, take away even that benefit. If Hawaii were a state, Congress couldn't do anything to it that can't be done to any other state.

For instance: There's a law forbidding Hawaiians to refine the sug-

Personal Incomes At Record Total

Washington, Feb. 12—(P)—Personal incomes reached a record total of \$197,000,000,000 (B) in 1947, topped 1946, the previous record, by \$20,000,000,000.

Announcing the 1947 totals today, the Commerce Department said incomes, rising through the year, hit an annual rate of \$209,700,000,000 in December.

The December rise, compared to an annual rate of \$204,000,000,000 in November, was attributed chiefly to increased farm income. That fact made it appear that a drop will show up in personal incomes for early 1948 because of recent slumps in farm commodity prices.

Obviously you have a separate state, for one thing. But that's far from being the whole story.

Chiang's government has charged that Russia has been giving the Chinese Reds material help in their rebellion. If it is true (and neutral observers generally accept it) Manchuria would become another satellite of Moscow. This would multiply the already vast influence of the Soviet Union in the Far East so that she might be the dominant power in that part of the world.

Recognition of China's great need is seen in the U. S. State Department's request to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee for an increase in the fund for Chinese aid. The new estimate is for \$570,000,000.

Naturally \$570,000,000 more won't save China. As a matter of fact, the problem is so vast that nobody knows whether it can be solved by money. Some close observers point out that China has had great experience with adversity, and say that on the basis her position isn't hopeless. Be that as may, China's salvation depends in major degree upon herself.
