

Umstead Enters Political Lists To Retain Seat

Senator Formally Announces Will Be Candidate In Forthcoming Election

Durham, N. C., Feb. 25—(AP)—U. S. Senator William B. Umstead, who has been campaigning energetically, if informally, for several months, announced today that he would be a candidate to retain his Senate seat.

So far Umstead has only one opponent in the race for the Democratic nomination, former Governor J. M. Broughton of Raleigh. Broughton made his formal announcement several weeks ago and also has been campaigning for some time.

Umstead, a former congressman from the sixth district, managed Cherry's gubernatorial campaign in 1944, and upon the death of the late Josiah W. Bailey, Governor Cherry named Umstead to fill out the unexpired term. The Governor has made no secret that he is supporting Umstead in the campaign.

In his formal announcement, Umstead said that "the ambition to serve at least a full term under a commission directly from the people is but natural, and this formal announcement will not be surprising."

Umstead said that "there is a public need of service and the position I have upon upon the issues of the day" and that he would discuss other "important and grave issues of public concern" during the campaign.

A graduate of the class of 1916 at the University of North Carolina, Umstead served overseas during World War I. Upon his return he studied law at Duke University and began practicing in Durham. In 1927 he was elected solicitor of the 10th Judicial district and in 1933 was elected to Congress where he served until 1938. From 1944 through 1946 he served as chairman of the State Democratic Executive committee.

The Pitt County Bar Association at a special meeting yesterday afternoon did not take any action about recommending to the Governor or appointment of a Pitt County lawyer to fill the unexpired term of the late David M. Clark as solicitor of the Fifth Judicial District.

W. J. (Dick) Bundy and J. A. Harrell of Greenville said they are candidates for the place. In view of the fact that more than one man is seeking the appointment, the bar association deemed it best not to endorse any candidate.

The Fifth Judicial District is composed of Pitt, Craven, Greene, Jones, Pamlico and Carter counties. Court is being held somewhere nearly all of the time, and it is expected that Governor Cherry will not delay in naming a man from one of the five counties as solicitor for the term, which expires this year, attorneys said.

Would Provide Lumberton Dam

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—The Carolina Power and Light Company would be authorized to construct and operate a dam on Lumber River near Lumberton, N. C., under terms of a bill introduced yesterday in the House.

The bill was offered by Rep. Clark (D-N.C.). It provides that the company's plans for the dam must be approved by the Army Engineers. Construction must begin within two years and be completed in five.

How To Use Form W-2

The Third Of 10 Stories On Who Has To Do What About His Income Tax; This Is The Employer's Statement; How It Works; What To Fill In; Joint Returns

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—Say you're making your 1947 income tax return on form W-2, the withholding statement.

This is the receipt an employer gets from a boss for tax withheld from his wages or salary in 1947. He must give it to you.

You don't do any tax-filing with it. Just fill it out and mail it to your Internal Revenue Collector. Don't send any money with it.

He'll check it and notify you if you owe him money. You have 30 days to pay him after he notifies you.

If he finds too much tax was withheld from you in 1947, you'll get a refund.

GAO Reports Evidence Fraud In War Contracts

"Unprecedented" Fraud In War Contract Settlements Reported By Lindsey Warren; Cases Certified To Justice Department

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—A General Accounting Office report of evidence of "unprecedented" fraud in war contract settlements brought a promise today of a prompt congressional investigation.

Rep. Lindsey Warren (R-Ohio), chairman of the House Subcommittee on War Contracts, announced plans for the inquiry after the GAO reported that "one out of every twenty" settlements "may have been based on fraud."

The report was made to Congress by Lindsey Warren, head of the General Accounting Office. He said the report contained information obtained by the committee. He added that it "is in line with what I have previously claimed, that millions of dollars of the taxpayers' money has been wasted and literally given to war contractors."

Warren renewed his request that Congress repeal the Contract Settlement Act. He has opposed it on the ground it did not give the General Accounting Office ample power to stop fraud.

Up to last Dec. 31, Warren reported, the GAO had examined 6,701 settlements covering payments to contractors totaling \$606,893,398 on 16,972 contracts, subcontracts and purchase orders.

"Careful analysis of the evidence disclosed in such examination," he said, "has convinced me that at least 148 of the settlements, or x x x involving improper payments totaling nearly \$4,000,000 x x x were induced by fraud."

Warren said the cases have been certified to the Justice Department. In at least 85 additional cases, Warren said, there is a "reasonable belief" that improper payments totaling more than \$800,000 have been made to 27 contractors.

Long Regime Is Recalled By Victory In Louisiana

New Orleans, Feb. 25—(AP)—The Long regime has been recalled to power in Louisiana.

Earl Long, brother of the late Sen. Huey P. Long, received a top-heavy vote over Sam Houston Jones in yesterday's Democratic runoff primary election for governor.

An unofficial count of ballots cast in 1,065 of the state's 1,878 precincts gave Long 239,199 votes to 135,368 for Jones.

The nomination assures Long's election in this traditional Democratic stronghold of the Deep South. Yesterday's vote was a strong comeback for the Long family. Huey's widow said that if Huey himself were here "he would be proud of this great victory for the people of the state."

Eight years ago, in 1940, Jones defeated Earl in the race for the governorship and brought to an end the regime set up by Huey Long 12 years before.

In the current contest, Huey Long's 29-year-old son Russell was one of Earl's most active supporters. It is generally expected he will be a candidate for office soon himself.

Steel Price Hike Criticism Grows

Government Hunts For Signs Of New Inflationary Spiral

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—Official criticism of the steel price boost mounted today as the government hunted for signs of a new inflationary spiral.

President Truman's order, which sent FBI agents digging into steel industry records for evidence of possible anti-trust law violations, was quick approval of Republican and Democratic leaders alike.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters he was "glad to see" the Administration taking steps to determine whether the law was violated. Taft is chairman of the Senate-House Economic Committee, which has summoned three steel industry leaders to a hearing March 2.

Senator Barkley (Ky.), the Democratic leader, said: "Everybody is wondering why the terrific price increase was made. The people are entitled to know whether it was justified."

Mr. Truman's call for a full scale investigation went to three agencies—the Justice and Commerce Departments and the Council of Economic Advisors.

The focal point of inquiry is last week's \$5 a ton boost in semi-finished steel prices.

But it was learned that the economic council will dig deeper in trying to measure the impact of steel price on inflation. Recent boosts in the price of nails, iron pipe, structural steel and other products will be considered as well, said Chairman Edwin G. Nourse.

Suspend Talk On West Germany For 24 Hours

London, Feb. 25—(AP)—The U. S., Britain and France suspended their talks on western Germany for 24 hours today to await arrival of the Benelux delegations and their views on expanding German production under the European Recovery Program.

Officials said it is reasonable to assume the Big Three have gone as far as they can in figuring out Germany's role before getting the opinions of Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The three low countries were invited earlier this week to participate in the discussions. Their delegations are expected to be present when the talks resume tomorrow.

Responsible diplomatic officials said the Western powers intend to ask Russia for a detailed accounting of what the Soviets have taken out of Austria since the war.

Search Mountain Area For Fliers

Murphy, N. C., Feb. 25—(AP)—Airmen searched the Western North Carolina mountains today in hopes of finding two Murphy men lost on a flight from Hot Springs, Ark.

The two men, Hubert Wells and Frank Dreher, have not been heard from since leaving Hot Springs for Murphy Sunday.

Southern Rebels Switch Tactics; Oppose Truman

New Strategy Is Attempt To Avoid Having President As Party Candidate

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—Dixie rebels switch tactics today. Their aim now is to knock President Truman out of the Democratic Presidential nomination to avoid having to fight him within the party.

Their strategy is to try to convince northern Democrats that (A) Mr. Truman has no chance to win in November and (B) the party should get another nominee.

Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) told a reporter: "The time can come when the party may realize that President Truman can't win. May be then we can get another nominee."

McClellan and six other southern Senators met yesterday with two of the protesting Dixie Governors still in Washington.

The Southerners made clear they are willing to think about a great many other men, so long as the one finally picked is not publicly identified with the President's civil rights program.

They came up with some names. Senator Olin Johnson (D-Miss.) said Secretary of State Marshall would be just the man. The difficulty is, however, that Marshall has said flatly he will "never" run for public office.

McClellan, who says he doesn't think President Truman could win in November even with Southern support, plugged Senator Harry Byrd (D-Va.) as a substitute nominee. But Byrd, who attended the meeting, asked that his name be kept out of that kind of talk.

Another revolt leader, who asked not to be identified, said the name of James F. Byrnes, former Secretary of State, is on many of the Southerners' minds.

Byrd and Byrnes, however, probably would encounter as much opposition from the north as Mr. Truman is finding in the south.

The July 1947 compromise convention in Philadelphia probably will provide the first real battle between the Truman Democrats and the Southerners fighting the President's civil rights proposals.

Railroads Show Increased Income

Norfolk Va., Feb. 25—(AP)—In January the Seaboard Air Line Railroad netted \$918,586, an increase of \$117,356 over January, 1947, it announced today.

The net income figure reported is that given monthly to the Interstate Commerce Commission. It does not include deductions for sinking funds and capital fund purposes to be charged against income next December.

Total railway operating revenues for the month were \$11,773,604, compared with \$11,102,411 for the same month last year.

Disguised Jap Forgot Accent

Shanghai, Feb. 25—(AP)—An escaped Japanese war criminal, disguised as a coolie, was captured today because he forgot his Chinese accent.

K. Nakano, wartime gendarme chief on nearby Tsungming Island, was working as pushboy of a pedicab—a ricksha with three wheels.

Nakano argued with a passenger. In the excitement he got his tongue twisted. Chinese detectives arrested him.

Maintains U.S. 'Hogging' Paper

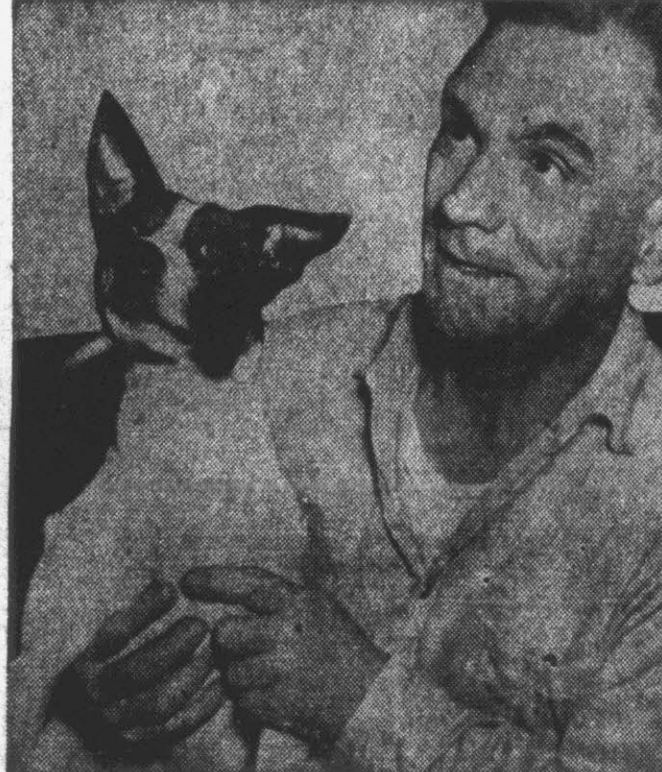
London, Feb. 24—(AP)—American attorney Morris L. Ernst maintains the United States is "hogging" the world's newspaper supply.

He testified to that effect last Oct. 30 before a Royal Commission investigating ownership and control of the British press. His testimony was made public last night.

"At the present time," he told the commission, "there is not enough newspaper to go round the world, and in fact our 140 million people in the United States are hogging far more than our share of it."

Near Vote On Korean Election

American Proposal Faces Ballot In UN Little Assembly Soon

Lake Success, Feb. 25—(AP)—The United Nations Little Assembly neared a vote today on an American proposal for Nation-wide elections in Korea.

The U. S. plan called for a U. N. Korean commission to ignore Russian opposition and start popular balloting for establishment of a national government.

The Russians, who occupy the northern zone of Korea, have boycotted the activities of the commission and refuse to allow members to enter the Soviet-controlled sector.

The U. S. occupies the southern zone of Korea under a war-time agreement which split the country at the 38th parallel for occupation purposes.

China and several smaller powers supported the American position. Canada and Australia objected on the contention that the elections would not be legal. Russia also is boycotting the Little Assembly.

Under the U. S. proposal, the U. N. commission would start holding the elections in the south and work northward. If halted at the 38th parallel by the Russians, the national government would be set up with delegates elected in the south only.

Since two-thirds of the Koreans live in the southern zone, the national Assembly would have two-thirds of its seats filled.

Steel Man Fears ERP May Endanger Economy

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—Steel Man Ernest T. Weir said today the Marshall Plan might lead to a depression here more serious than any threat of "collapse and Communism" in Europe.

Yet, the chairman of the National Steel Corporation contended, the administration is using "a tremendous propaganda campaign" to try to win quick approval for its multi-billion dollar European recovery program.

Weir outlined his views in a statement prepared for House Foreign Affairs Committee hearings on the plan.

"To those who are alarmed by the prospect of an expansion of Russian Communism," he declared, "I say that a serious depression in the United States is the greatest thing to fear."

And one is sure to come, he said, if huge sums "wasted through inefficient spending abroad" are piled upon the "fantastic cost of government at home."

Weir said he was not making the point that all aid should be denied Europe.

But he said it should be on this basis: "1. Continue urgent relief of human suffering by proven agencies. 2. Then make a thorough, careful study of Europe's ability to absorb our aid; the practical possibility of effective use of our aid by Europe; and the effect of aid on the U. S. economy."

"3. Establish for this study and the administration of aid an independent agency free from political influence x x x."

Senate Takes Up House Rent Bill

Approved Own Bill To Continue Controls For 14 Months

Washington, Feb. 25—(AP)—The senate turned today to the house-approved one-month extension of rent controls after passing its own bill to continue them 14 months.

The present rent law is due to expire Sunday.

Last night, the senate voted to change the law in several ways but kept controls until the end of April, 1948.

The senate bill is slated to stay in a house pigeon hole until next month. House leaders have made it plain, however, that rent controls eventually will be extended for at least a year.

The House 31-day measure goes to the senate banking committee, which is expected to approve it speedily. There was a possibility the senate would pass the bill by nightfall, but action tomorrow appeared to be more likely.

House Republican leaders say they are putting off study of the senate 14-month bill to find out what effect the recent market price changes have on rents.

Peace And Partition

Security Council Is Face To Face With Necessity Of Answering Report That Dividing Holy Land Cannot Be Carried Out Without Force; U. S. Position

The United Nations Security Council finally is face to face with the necessity of answering its Palestine Commission's report that the partition of the Holy Land can't be carried out without force.

It's a difficult and dangerous problem. And it's unwelcome, for the U. N. must either produce a judgment of Solomon or the peace organization may come a cropper from which it never will recover.

In short, the U. N. is on trial in a big way—maybe for its life.

The Palestine Commission not only says force is a requisite for the carrying out of instructions, but it warns that quick action is imperative. To my mind that warning is one of the most vital points of the report, as should be clear to anyone who reads the headlines according the bloody warfare between the Jews and the Arabs, and the preparations by both sides for all-out war.

The world has been looking to the United States for a lead in dealing with the Palestine issue—one of the most controversial of these troublesome times. Yesterday chief U. S. Delegate Warren R. Austin went before the Security Council and made a declaration. It was a most carefully worded statement—

President Eduard Benes Bows Before Red Demands; Government Radio Now In Leftist Hands Announces Cabinet Resignations Of Opponents Accepted

Prague, Feb. 25—(AP)—The government radio announced President Eduard Benes bowed today before Communist demands, indicating removal of the last obstacle to iron Communist control of all Czechoslovakia.

The radio, now in Communist hands, said the president had accepted the resignations of 12 anti-Communist ministers from the coalition cabinet. This would clear the way for the Communist seizure of complete power.

The president's office declined to make any statement immediately, but did not deny the report. A statement was promised later today.

Communist Premier Klement Gottwald went to the presidential palace to present a list of ministers for a new cabinet. The radio said an announcement of a new government was expected momentarily.

The Communists clamped a grip on communications as the coup rushed to a climax. Nowhere, now, do the opposition parties have a chance to oppose Gottwald publicly.

Immediately after the announcement that the frail Benes had capitulated, the government radio broadcast a proclamation of the Social Democratic party, key to the crisis, denying a split in its ranks.

The broadcast said the proclamation was signed by Zdenek Fierlinger, pro-Communist former premier who was deposed last November as the party's chairman when it declared independence from the Communists. Fierlinger walked into party control yesterday.

The other signer was Bohumil Lausman, former minister of industry, who had succeeded Fierlinger. Only the president's approval had stood between the Communists and their complete domination of the country.

Communist Premier Klement Gottwald went to the president's palace with a list to present his list of ministers for a new cabinet.

His visit followed an exchange of letters during the night which asked for Benes' acceptance of the Communist demands.

The exchange was made public shortly before noon in a special one-sheet edition of Mlada Fronta, youth newspaper, and they were read on the later broadcast of the government radio.

The president's letter said he insisted upon parliamentary democracy for Czechoslovakia. It blamed the crisis on the present international situation.

It added, however, that: "In the crisis itself the principle of the national front (the country's seven-party coalition government) is not rejected."

The Communist answer insisted the party could not deal with the present leadership of three opposition parties, declared the president should accept the resignation of the 12 ministers and demanded that Gottwald be allowed to pick his own cabinet.

The letter promised that Gottwald would name "democratic progressive" members of the three opposition parties.

Completes Fastest Atlantic Crossing

New York, Feb. 25—(AP)—The Cunard White Star liner Queen Elizabeth steamed into New York harbor yesterday, completing its fastest February crossing from Southampton since she put to sea in 1941.

Despite strong winds and heavy seas, the voyage was made in four days, 15 hours and 37 minutes. The vessel carried 1,561 passengers.

so guarded, indeed, that we await further enlightenment.

Austin's main points would seem to be these: America proposes that the Big Five powers (the U. S., A. Britain, France, Russia and China) begin immediate talks with the Arabs and Jews in an effort to settle the problem, but the exact nature of the talks is not clear. The United States pledges that its policy "will conform to and be in support of United Nations action on Palestine."

Austin said the council must act to restore peace but declared that it had no legal authority to enforce a political settlement, that is, partitioning of the Holy Land.

"The council's action," he said, "is directed to keeping the peace and not to enforcing partition."

Austin added that the United States is ready to enter consultations on the creation of an international force to keep peace in Palestine if the council decides such a course is necessary.

Well, now, where does that leave us? The U. N. has decreed that the Holy Land shall be divided between the Jews and the Arabs. The Jews want partition and the Arabs don't. Both are arming to the teeth to maintain their viewpoints.

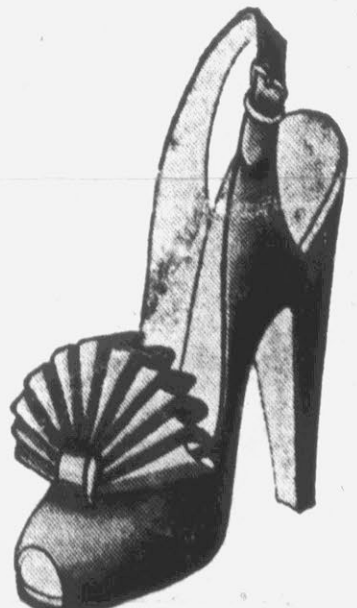

Pittsburgh, Feb. 25—(AP)—A committee of students and alumni today told the University of Pittsburgh to get out of big-time football or get a team that can play it.

The recommendation came in a 14-page report submitted to Chancellor Rufus H. Fitzgerald. He will lay it before the University board of trustees on Friday.

The report also suggested that the University fire athletic director James Hagan, who was blamed for many of the school's ills. It recommended that head football coach Mike Milligan be given another chance next season to see if he can make good. His team won one, lost eight games last fall.

The committee, composed of three alumni and three students, worked nearly four months on the report.

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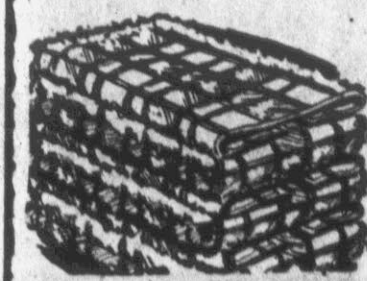

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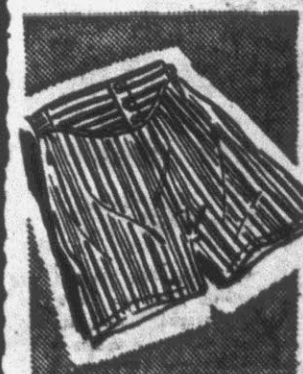

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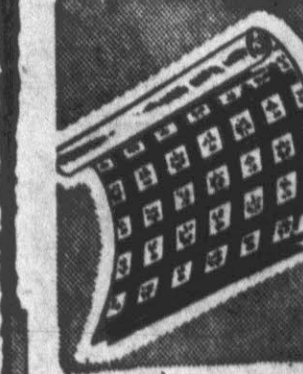

Humber's World Federation Plan Told Rotarians

By WYATT BROWN

In a world darkened with the threat of World War III and devastating atomic warfare, there's hope in a World Federation, declared Rotarian Robert Lee Humber last night in his address to the Rotarians on the subject "Rotary's Quest for Peace," assigned on the occasion of the local club's celebrating the 43rd anniversary of Rotary.

Mr. Humber was presented to the club by Roy Martin, program chairman.

Indicating the traditional Rotary quest for peace instigated by founder of Rotary, Paul Harris, Mr. Humber etched in graphic detail the dark picture facing the world today as he gathered it first hand around the United States. The threat

of war is on the tongues of leaders of national calibre, despondency exists in the minds of many leaders in the United States, he said.

There will be either peace or war—no middle ground—but there must be machinery to preserve peace.

The prospect of war with the modern improvements effected upon the instruments of war—tanks and planes—plus the addition of atomic bombs were mentioned as items to make war ever more disastrous.

Reminding his audience that this time the United States would be the first nation to be on the schedule of attacks in World War III, Mr. Humber made a plea that world order be sought through world law.

"We are preparing a crushing blow with crushing blow. It behooves us to prevent needing to win the next war," Mr. Humber exhorted. "There is no defense against atomic warfare."

Then Mr. Humber explained the use of world law, citing its efficacy in state and national fields today to control criminals. The superiority of law lies in its addressing itself to the individual, thus preventing a criminal to coerce his fellow citizen.

He cited how the U.N. is functioning but lacks the machinery to handle war-producing factors, but that under Article 109 of the United Nations Charter, it is provided that a member nation can call for the creation of world government.

Mr. Humber urged the Rotarians to write the State Department of our national government requesting that the U.S. call for such action because of the role of leadership the U.S. can influence more nearly universal cooperation in such a move.

In conclusion Mr. Humber made a moving appeal for the dedication by the Rotarians of themselves to the achievement of the goal of peace through a Federated World.

Following the address members of the club posed questions the address had raised in their minds. The question, or facets of the question, of representation in a world parliament engaged several questioners while some were concerned with the practicability of the ideal of democracy in a world government.

Mr. Humber answered each in terms of the teachings of history and in terms of his experience as an international lawyer.

And on line No. 5 state your occupation, and your wife's occupation. Move over now to the right side where it tells you to list your exemptions.

You claim your three children as exemptions since none of them had income of \$500 or more. (If a dependent has income under \$500, it doesn't count.) Write in their names. Each exemption takes \$500 off your income before it is taxed.

Because this is a joint return, you and your wife both sign. You'd sign it alone if you alone had income or your wife was making a separate return.

Now it's filled out. Send it to the Internal Revenue Collector. And remember: Don't send money with it.

With the present temper of the Jews and Arabs, partition can't be carried out without the employment of outside force to keep the peace. Therefore if the Security Council doesn't provide a force to maintain peace the Arabs and Jews will fight it out to a terrible finish.

On the other hand, if the council does provide a peace force, it will be creating a situation which ipso facto will permit the Jews to establish their government against the wishes of the Arabs. In other words, any effective peace force will implement partition.

Try and figure out that one! That's what the Security Council has to struggle with. And the essence of the situation is speed.
