Another Blast Rocks Haifa; 11 Arabs Are Killed

Children Included Among Victims; Stern Gang Admits Responsibility

Jerusalem, March 3—(AP)—A truckload of dynamite was exploded in an Arab residential section of Haifa today. Police said the blast killed 11 Arabs and wounded 27. The extremist Jewish underground group, the Stern gang, has taken responsibility for the blast, the police reported. Several children were killed. It was the heaviest toll of life from a bombing incident since the blasting of Jerusalem's Ben Yehuda street Feb. 22, in which 55 Jews were killed. The seven-story Salameh building, near Haifa's central police station was wrecked. The explosion also crumpled the front half of a building across the street housing the Arab division of the government welfare office. A wide area was shaken by the explosion. Army bulldozers and rescue crews tore at the wreckage, fearing more victims were trapped in the debris. Two of the dead were Arab policemen, who were walking toward the nearby courts building. The blast coincided with an announcement by Jerusalem police that an advance partition plan of the United Nations secretary had arrived by air in the Holy Land. They are to be quarantined in Jerusalem. Russia's renewed support of partition and a stronger American stand heightened prospects at Lake Success, N. Y., for cutting Palestine into Jewish and Arab states. Arab-Jewish warfare continued elsewhere in Palestine. Arabs dynamited a highway bridge five miles west of Jerusalem, cutting all communication with Tel Aviv and Jaffa, except through Arab territory. The highway has been the scene of heavy fighting between Jews, supported by British army units, and Arab snipers dug in on hillsides. Ten Arabs were slain in yesterday's fighting in the area.

Carry Dewey's Bid For Office

Chances Of GOP Nomination Said Hinging On Results; Complications

Washington, March 3—(AP)—Secretary Marshall and Forrester told Congress today there is "grave danger" Greece and Turkey cannot remain free unless they get more military aid from the United States. The two cabinet members testified jointly to the House Foreign Affairs committee in support of the Administration's request for \$275,000,000 (M) to be spent on guns, planes and other weapons for the two nations. Secretary of State Marshall said that arming the Greeks and Turks would be "discouraging" to further aggression against their countries. Both Marshall and Secretary of Defense Forrester left little doubt they were thinking of Russia. Marshall said there is "clear evidence" of Communist intention against nations that stand in the way of their expansion. And as long as threats confront Greece and Turkey, Marshall said, there can be no assurance that American assistance can be stopped. Forrester said it is evident that "the military position in both countries must receive our first attention." He added: "Greece and Turkey lie on the fringe of totalitarian countries, whose actions leave little doubt that they hope to extend their control over these two strategically located nations." Congress voted \$400,000,000 for aid to Greece and Turkey last May. The \$275,000,000 additional the lawmakers are now being asked to vote for is for spending in the 12 months beginning next July 1. The \$400,000,000 was divided \$300,000,000 for Greece and \$100,000,000 for Turkey. It was originally planned that half (\$150,000,000) of Greece's \$300,000,000 would be spent to improve business conditions there. But Marshall said \$172,000,000 had to be spent for military aid because of the guerrilla warfare in Northern Greece. Both the cabinet members said the guerrillas are getting help from neighboring countries on the north. They said that economic recovery in Greece depends on first wiping out the guerrilla nuisance. "No program of reconstruction," Forrester said, "can be carried out until the guerrillas are reduced and military stability achieved. Therefore, we must reinforce the Greek armed forces by furnishing supplies and providing technical assistance." Marshall and Forrester both said, too, that Turkey is under foreign pressure and needs continued help if her people are to be assured of keeping their independence.

Reds Suppress Denunciation Of Czech Seizure

Start Confiscate Three-Power Attack On Coup; Other Material 'Purged'

Prague, March 3—(AP)—A criminal court has ordered confiscation of a three-power denunciation of the Communist seizure of power in Czechoslovakia, a U.S. press attaché said today. Joseph Kolarek, the attaché, said copies of the declaration by the United States, Great Britain and France had been distributed by the U.S. Information Service. Communist leaders called for still more drastic purges. Rudolph Slansky, secretary general of the party, said the action committees which executed the coup last week are here to stay. Kolarek said the confiscated issues of the Information Service also included newspaper editorials and comments of Rep. Karl Stefan (R-Neb) on the developments here. The confiscation order was served on Kolarek last night. It charged the Information Service with the security of the republic and humiliated it. About 1,000 copies of the confiscated material already had been distributed. Police ordered the U.S. Information Service to withdraw from its windows last Saturday a display of bulletins containing the denunciation. Slansky's statement was contrary to the declarations of other government leaders, who described as temporary the committees which launched wholesale purges throughout the country in the Communist march to power. Zdenek Fieringer, new minister of industry, told newsmen the committees were formed as a transitory emergency measure. Evjen Urban, minister of social welfare, said the committees would function only until the forces of "reaction" were routed. Alexej Cepicka, Communist minister of justice, called for a "purge in every walk of life in every village up to the cities."

Czech Diplomat Quits His Post

Ambassador Resigns To Fight For Free Czechoslovakia

Washington, March 3—(AP)—Czech Ambassador Juris Slavik resigned his post today to "fight for a free Czechoslovakia." Slavik announced at the Embassy that he is sending his formal resignation to the new Communist-led government in Prague. He said he also is informing the State Department of his action. At a news conference, Slavik said he is convinced that Dr. Eduard Benes, Czechoslovak president, was under "duress and terror" when he agreed to formation of the new Communist government headed by Premier Klement Gottwald. The envoy did not say what he proposes to do in his "fight for a free Czechoslovakia." But, he said, "I am confident I don't stand alone." Slavik told reporters: "I know there will be more of my colleagues who will act as I do now. There will be Czechoslovak patriots who will fight for our ideals of freedom. The great majority of our people in Czechoslovakia have these ideals. I wish to live as a free man and I want my nation to be a community of free men."

"Too High" Grows Impatient For Pact Views

Finland's President Said Fearing Delays Will Upset Plans

London, March 3—(AP)—The United States today called Russia's bill for an Austrian peace treaty too high. The opinion was voiced by Samuel Reber in the midst of a deadlock among the Big Four deputy foreign ministers arguing over Russia's claims on German assets. Russia seeks \$200,000,000 cash within two years. She wants two thirds of Austria's oil production for 50 years and control of the Danube Shipping Company. Helsinki, March 3—(AP)—President Juho Paasikivi was described by responsible sources today as growing impatient at the delay in informing him of the views on a suggested military pact with Russia. Political leaders are said to be in favor of negotiating on the pact, but emphasize that acceptance of Prime Minister Stalin's proposal would not necessarily follow. The 78-year-old president, who has had years of experience in dealing with the Russians, was said to fear that undue delay might irritate them and destroy a favorable basis for negotiations. Government circles said they thought Paasikivi might urge parliamentary groups today to speed formulation of their attitude toward the pact. Stalin's offer proposed the agreement was handed to Paasikivi last Friday. Parliamentary groups from the far right to the extreme left have spent hours discussing the proposed defense and mutual assistance pact plus its consequences for Finland. More such meetings are scheduled today. Chairmen of the party bloc told newsmen they had no intention of employing delaying tactics, but that the question was so serious that it required careful consideration. Conservative party newspapers condemned Communist-organized worker meetings in support of the pact as useless and extra-parliamentary tactics.

Socialists Rap Party Actions

Claim Red Victories Impossible Without Socialist Aid

London, March 3—(AP)—Britain's ruling labor (Socialist) party maintained today that the Communist victory in Czechoslovakia would have been impossible without the aid of the Socialists who play ball with the Communists. The party's executive committee issued a statement last night declaring that last week's events in Prague constituted "a warning and lesson to Democratic Socialists." It said the Communist minority in Czechoslovakia chose to "impose a dictatorship" rather than risk defeat in free elections and added: "No clearer demonstration could be possible that Communists consider us as enemies all those who do not surrender unconditionally to their slightest whim." "But Czechoslovakia teaches us something more," the statement continued. "Communists cannot achieve their aims without support from a minority within the camp of Democratic Socialism. In the House of Commons, Sir David Robertson of the Conservative opposition demanded that the Labor government cancel its trade agreement with Russia. He said "weapons of war" were being sent to the Soviet Union.

Urge Stronger Global Agency

Republican Solons Propose Veto-Free Body Apart From UN

Washington, March 3—(AP)—A new veto-free world agency with power to curb Russian expansion was proposed to the senate today. The idea was offered as an amendment to the Marshall plan by a group of Republican senators. They called for the United States to take the lead in creating a supreme international council from the United Nations. The chief job of this "supreme council" would be to combat either "aggression or subversion in any form." Senator Ball (R-Minn) announced he would offer the plan formally when debate resumes on the \$5,300,000,000 European recovery program. The super agency proposal emerged from a meeting of 14 Marshall plan "reviewers" last night. The text of the amendment does not mention Russia by name, but the intent is obvious. Senator Brewster (R-Maine) who attended the meeting, defined the proposed new agency as an "offensive-defensive alliance." He said it would provide for "effective collective security without the paralyzing power of veto." Russia on several occasions has made use of the veto she holds as one of the "big five" permanent members of the U. N. Security Council.

Appointment Of McCabe Opposed

Record In War Surplus Sales Post Comes Under Attack

Washington, March 3—(AP)—Senator Tobey (R-NH) said today that Thomas B. McCabe ordered the sale of 11 nearly-new B-25 bombers "to forestall bad publicity" from their sale to a private Chinese firm. Tobey made this charge as the Senate Banking Committee opened hearings on McCabe's fitness to be a member of the Federal Reserve Board of Governors. McCabe was in charge of war surplus sales abroad from 1944 to 1946. President Truman has said he plans, if McCabe is confirmed by the Senate, to name him chairman of the board to replace Marriner S. Eccles. In the course of an approximately 10,000-word statement reviewing McCabe's handling of war surplus, Tobey said Brig. Gen. B. A. Johnson, who was McCabe's commissioner in China, arranged the B-25 sale. The planes were sold to a private firm owned by T. L. Soong, brother of Premier T. V. Soong, Tobey said. He continued: "Testimony will be adduced that when the newspapers broke the story on this deal, Mr. McCabe, with no authority whatever for such action, ordered the destruction of these bombers by cutting the tails off. "Evidence will be presented to the effect that Mr. McCabe admitted that his objective was to forestall bad publicity at home. "It will be testified that in the process of carrying out Mr. McCabe's order, another B-25, which had cost \$245,000 new—and which had not been declared surplus, was destroyed by Mr. McCabe's agents."

Midwest Snows Move Eastward

New Falls Forecast For Most Of North Central States

Chicago, March 3—(AP)—The snow storm which blanketed the midwest from the central Rockies to lower Michigan moved into the eastern section of the country today. More snow also appeared in prospect for the midwest area after a fall ranging from four to 12 inches. The weather bureau said there appeared no indications of immediate thaw for the snow belt. Snow fell today over the lower Lakes region and most of the New England states. Light snow also started over a wide area through the Rocky Mountains and in sections of the northern and central plains states. New falls were forecast tomorrow for most of the north central states. Rain fell in parts of Pennsylvania and in the lower Mississippi valley. The heavy falls across parts of the midwest disrupted air, rail and motor traffic and curtailed communications. Omaha, Neb., reported the heaviest fall, 12 inches. New snow in parts of Iowa measured 11 inches. Temperatures are on the chilly side in the northern tier of states from the Rockies to the Great Lakes. However, the only sub-zero readings are in North Dakota, with Minot and Pembina reporting 5. Florida was the country's warmest area yesterday. Jacksonville's high was 85 and Miami's 78. Scott said he had delayed his decision on the management to allow "a prominent citizen" to arrange his personal affairs so he could direct the campaign but that the man had been unable to accept. Pu Yi is still in custody in Russia, however. He was taken prisoner when Soviet troops occupied Manchuria after Japan's surrender.

Red Blood Cells In Plasma Saved

Bryn Mawr, Pa., March 3—(AP)—Research doctors at Bryn Mawr Hospital today reported a new technique for salvaging red blood cells lost in plasma separation. The salvaged cells, according to Dr. Max Stumia, director of the hospital's research foundation, have proved a valuable substitute for plasma in restoring blood lost by patients. Dr. Stumia said the resulting preparation, known as modified globin, has been used successfully in many cases of anemia and shock without the patient suffering from secondary shock.

Outlook Brightens For Partition Of Palestine

Lake Success, March 3—(AP)—Russia's renewed support and a slightly stronger American stand brightened the prospects today for Palestine partition. A long-awaited Soviet speech yesterday served to clear the air and gave Security Council delegates something new to discuss at today's meeting. Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko dodged the issue of sending a United Nations armed force into the Holy Land. He did accept a portion of the American plan supporting the principle of partition. He also agreed to Big Five consultations on the subject but objected to a U.S. plan for carrying out the talks. Gromyko's speech was unusually conciliatory. Twice he accused the United States of attempting to confuse the issue, but his counter-suggestions appeared to offer a basis for settlement. He also omitted previous charges that the British are obstructing partition. The United States wants the council to establish a Big Five committee to look into the Palestine problem, talk with the Arabs and Jews, and report back. Gromyko says the Big Five should meet independently of the council and should not bother trying to mend differences between the Jews and Arabs

Kluxers Parade Again In Georgia

Wrightsville, Ga., March 3—(AP)—The Grand Dragon of the Georgia Ku Klux Klan last night told robed and hooded members of the organization that "blood will flow" in the South if the Negro takes a place at the side of white men through the force of federal bayonets. Dr. Samuel Green of Atlanta addressed the Klansmen as they paraded around the square of this Johnson County seat on the eve of a Democratic primary to name 10 county officials. About 300 Ku Kluxers participated in the orderly demonstration.

Nineteen Die As Plane Crashes

London, March 3—(AP)—Nineteen persons, one identified as an American, died in the flaming wreckage of a Belgian airplane which crashed at London airport in a dense fog last night. Three survivors, thrown clear, were injured. The intense heat kept rescuers away from the screaming passengers trapped inside. It was Britain's first major air crash of 1948 and the first at London's busy international airport since it opened in January, 1938.

Fuel Cost Too Much, Drilled Well For Gas

Jamestown, N.Y., March 3—(AP)—Anthony Mangine says he tired of paying fuel bills averaging \$1,400 a year for his restaurant and residence. He interested a neighbor in drilling a gas well. Two weeks later, they tapped a supply of natural gas at a depth of 875 feet. He estimated the daily yield at 250,000-500,000 cubic feet.

1948 Tax Estimate

Some People Must File An Estimate On Their 1948 Income And Start Paying Installments On Tax; Who They Are; Examples; Estimate Can Be Changed

Washington, March 3—(AP)—March 15 is the income tax deadline for: 1. Those who must make a final return—and pay in full any tax still owed—on their 1947 income. Most people, when they've done that, won't have anything further to do until March 15, 1949, when they settle up on their 1948 taxes. That's because most people make under \$5,000 and full 1948 tax will be withheld from wages and salaries under \$5,000 in 1948—2. Some people also by March 15, 1948, must file an estimate on their 1948 tax and start paying the first of four installments on some of it. That's because several million people won't have the full tax—or any tax—withheld from them in 1948. The reason is: They'll make over \$5,000 or will have the kind of income from which tax is not withheld. So, to repeat—By March 15, 1948, they must file an estimate on their 1948 tax and make the first of four payments on the difference between the tax withheld (if any) and the estimated full tax for 1948. Those three other payments are due June 15 and Sept. 15 of this year and Jan. 15, 1949. You're one of these people: 1. If your 1948 income from wages or salary will be more than \$5,000, plus \$500 for each exemption besides your own. Example: You're married. Your salary will be \$5,500. Full 1948 tax is withheld up to \$5,000, plus each exemption except your own. You claim a \$500 exemption for your wife. You don't have to file an estimate. Example: You're married and have one child. Your 1948 salary will be \$9,000. In your case full tax is withheld up to \$5,000 because of those two \$500 exemptions for your wife and child. You'll have to file an estimate and start paying the difference between the tax withheld up to \$6,000 and the full tax due on \$9,000. 2. If you expect to have \$500 or more income from which no tax is withheld—such as a Doctor with fees or a landlord with rents—you'll have to file an estimate on your total 1948 income and the tax on it and start paying the tax. 3. If you'll have income of more than \$100 from which no tax is withheld—in addition to income from which tax is withheld—and if the two incomes total \$500 or more—you'll have to file an estimate and make the first payment on the difference. Anti-Soviet Feeling

Reaction To Taking Over Of Czechoslovakia Similar to 1938 When Hitler Did Same Thing; Danger Signals Flying; Tightening Of Defenses Apparent

The revulsion of the non-Communist nations of Europe to the Bolshevik rape of Czechoslovakia is reminiscent of the violent reaction to Hitler's assault on that same little republic ten years ago as he got his conquest of Europe underway—both reminiscent and significant. Toward the close of 1938 I arrived in London looking for the solution of an important problem. This was after I had attended the Munich conference, followed Hitler into Czechoslovakia, and made a grand swing of the Balkans and back through Italy and France to England. I immediately sought out a distinguished British source and placed my problem before him: "I sense a decided hardening of the British and French attitude toward Germany, but I can't put my finger on it. I shall be grateful if you will tell me whether I am right and, if so, what that hardening means." "You are quite right," he replied without hesitation. "We have decided that appeasement goes out the window. We shall use our armies if necessary." That was to say, of course, that the two powers would use their armies to keep Hitler in hand if he started a rampage. It was the right idea but a couple of years too late. The Nazi dictator was about ready to open fire, whereas an earlier display of two-listed firmness by the Allies might have prevented war. Now with the communizing of Czechoslovakia we have reached a crucial point in fresh world contact being trying to halt by appeasement. The first reaction to the Red assault on the small democracy was the joint note of condemnation by America, Britain and France. This has been followed by a wave of anti-Soviet sentiment which has swept Scandinavia. Norway, Denmark and Sweden—all of which are in the danger zone of Red aggression—are showing their feelings by tabling demonstrations and press attacks against the aggressive spread of Communism over Europe. At the same time there has been a sudden decision to speed up the conferences to consider implementation of British Foreign Minister Bevin's proposal for a "western union" of Europe. England, France and the so-called Benelux countries—Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg—are scheduled to meet tomorrow in Brussels to begin discussion. (Continued on Page Five)

DIPLOMACY NEEDS RELIGION
There are many people saying today that the cause of all our international troubles is a spirit of nationalism.

The medieval world strove for unity; then came the Renaissance and with it the rise of nationalism. In the nineteenth century nationalism had a field day, and no one can deny that out of it arose some of the benefits we prize most highly today. Mazzini, the Italian patriot, was one of the great exponents of nationalism. He once said: "God has written one line of his thought on the cradle of each nation."

Human life is going to be made better or worse for centuries to come by the decisions we make within the next decade, and one decision we shall have to make is whether we can preserve nationalism within an international structure. The way that question is answered will mean more than can be expressed to the happiness of us all, and will have a determining effect on the life of children yet unborn.

Is not Mazzini's answer the right one? God has set nations aside for special service within the circle of his providence. If we regard nationalism as a stewardship given us by God and if we strive to bring our nation to the fulfillment of that stewardship, all will be well for us. International diplomacy to be helpful to mankind had to be approached in the spirit of sound religion.

UNION IN EUROPE
We are not wondering if the proposals for a union of western Europe will stop the march of Communism across that continent, but whether those individual states can agree to the loss of "sovereignty" which it entails.

There are numerous barriers which stand in the way of the idea; barriers which have proven to be too much for those who strove to this end in the past.

For example, there are the many languages, conflicting traditions and intense national pride, to say nothing of trade barriers and petty jealousies.

In size, the countries who will meet to discuss this union on Thursday are very small. Individually they are weak, but banded together they can be strong.

Fear of Communism's expansion might possibly prove to be the one incentive great enough to overcome the obstacles to a united front.



That which is about to be attempted is directly in line with Winston Churchill's earlier call for insuring the future. Indeed, much of the ground lost since then to the creeping Red Tide might still be free if others had listened. Churchill's warnings and pleas for a union of Europe must be haunting the ears of governments who made light of that statesman's predictions and solution.

A successful union of western Europe might well be the first step towards world federation. But more important at the present moment, is the walling off the progress of a tyranny which is proving to be equal, and even worse than Hitler's.

Solicitor Plays Good Samaritan Role In Court

The solicitor was praised for his Good Samaritan gesture.

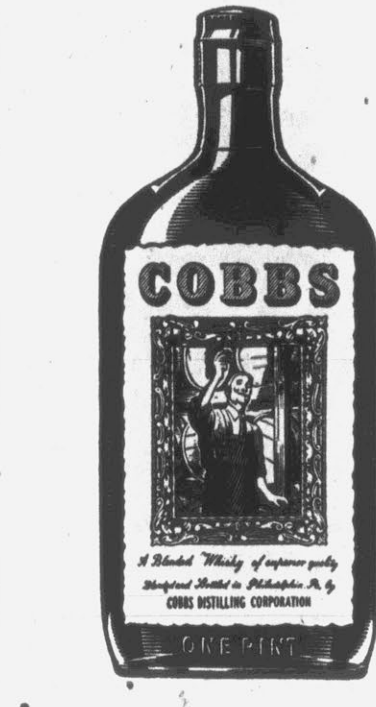

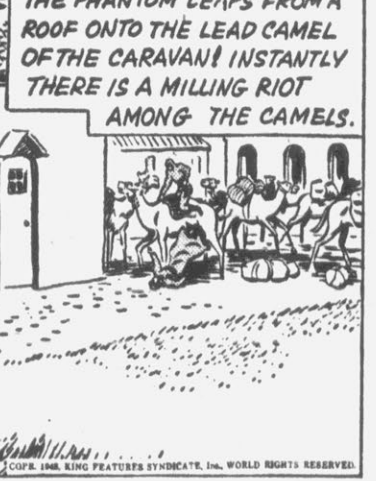

ference between the tax withheld and the full tax due.

Suppose husband and wife both have incomes large enough to require an estimate. Then both must file an estimate, separately or jointly.

Then, at the end of 1948, they can decide whether they want to make their final return for the year jointly or separately.

Say you don't have to file an estimate now. But suppose you find later in the year that you do because of income changes or other reasons. In such a case you can file an estimate by the next payment date: June 15, Sept. 15, Jan. 15, 1949.

Suppose a person files an estimate by March 15 and later in 1948 finds he's underestimated. What does he do? He doesn't have to do anything unless he finds he's underestimated by more than 20 per cent.

If he's underestimated by less than 20 per cent, he can pay in full in 1949 when he makes his final return on 1948 income.

But if he's underestimated by more than 20 per cent, he must correct it by the time he makes the next payment, June 15, Sept. 15 or Jan. 15 1949, by filing a revised estimate.

Farmers don't have to make an estimate on 1948 income or make any payment until Jan. 15, 1949. Tomorrow: How to file an estimated tax return.

discussion of this sensational project. Under Bevin's plan these countries would serve as the nucleus of a larger grouping of western European democracies.

In short, this would provide for a consolidation of western Europe for mutual benefit which would include defense against Bolshevik aggression.

So we are witnessing an all-around tightening of the defenses against Bolshevism in Europe. It is not only encouraging but gives definite promise that the line can be held, against the Reds if appeasement is discarded.

Far from being an encouragement to war, a firm stand against Communist aggression is the sure way to prevent another global upheaval. The certain way to bring on another world war is to temporize and appease.

Phone Operator Rescues Family

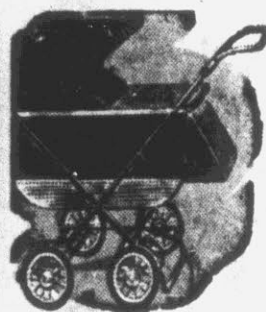

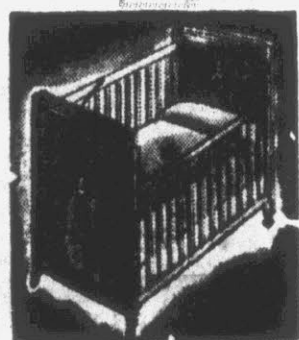

May Ask Condon Loyalty Hearing

Washington, March 3—(AP)—Public hearings to explain its charge that Dr. Edward U. Condon is "one of the weakest links in our atomic security" may be ordered by the House un-American activities committee.

The 46-year old director of the National Bureau of Standards, which tests some of the government's biggest scientific secrets, scoffed at the accusation. He advised the country to "relax."

To finance its work for the rest of this year, the committee is asking for \$200,000—double last year's fund. The House Administration committee meets today to vote on the request and perhaps bring it before the House for approval.

Robert E. Stripling, Chief Investigator for the un-American activities group, relayed word to reporters from Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ), that:

1. Commerce Department loyalty records on Condon will be subpoenaed today.

2. These may be used for public hearings.

3. Even if Condon is loyal—and the committee has no evidence he is not—he still could be indiscreet, and from a security standpoint Thomas thinks it makes little difference.

The Commerce Department Loyalty board was reported by under-Secretary William C. Foster to have found no reason to believe Condon is disloyal to the United States.

Society To Try Mail By Rocket

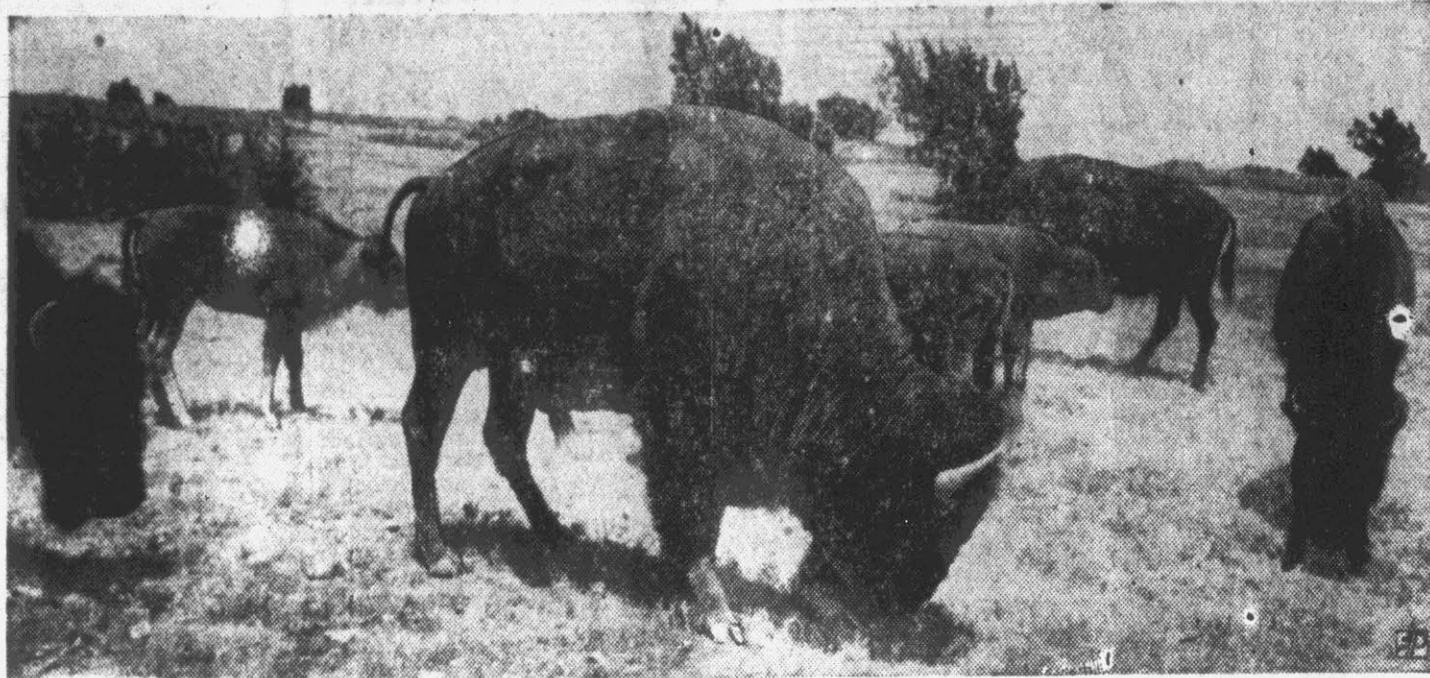

Scientists Say Condon Critics Hindering Work

Chicago, March 3—(AP)—The emergency committee of atomic scientists headed by Albert Einstein asserted today that the House subcommittee on un-American activities had "rendered a disservice to the interests of the United States."

The scientists criticized a report of the legislators which labeled Dr. Edward U. Condon, head of the government's Bureau of Standards, "one of the weakest links in our atomic security."

"Unsubstantiated and unwarranted attacks on distinguished scientists in government can have but one result: To make it increasingly difficult for the United States government to obtain services of able scientists," the committee of scientists said in a statement.

CIO Chief Urges Price Controls

Boston, March 3—(AP)—CIO President Philip Murray says "big business is driving the people of the United States to economic despair."

He told the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems last night that "they must be stopped or we will have one of the most devastating depressions the world has ever known."

Murray advocated the return of price controls as "the only effective means of protecting the people from being gouged by profiteers."

British Protest Guatemala Acts

Guatemala, Guatemala, March 3—(AP)—A British Diplomatic spokesman said today British will protest the flying of the Guatemalan flag over the British legation here during a demonstration yesterday.

The spokesman said a "vigorous protest" will be made to Guatemala's government, which is currently disputing Britain's claim to British Honduras (Belize).

Thousands of persons demonstrated for more than an hour yesterday and ran up the Guatemalan flag over the legation.

Attorney General Clark said the indictment was returned by a Federal Grand Jury in New Haven, naming Painters' Local Union No. 481 (AFL), and the local's president, John R. O'Brien.

He said the indictment charges the illegal use of Union funds to buy political advertising space in the Hartford Times, and to buy broadcast time for a political speech
