Big Powers Open Holy Land Talks

Secret Sessions Begin In Soviet Consulate; Britain Absent; U.S. Said Insisting Talks Be Confined To Peaceful Measures Of Settlement

New York, March 8—(AP)—Secret big power talks on the Palestine crisis got under way today in the Soviet consulate quarters. Britain was absent.

With only a week to draft recommendations for the United Nations Security Council, the representatives of the United States, Russia, France and China met in a luxurious second floor room of Russia's new consulate on upper Park avenue.

Only nine men were in the room as the talks began—Chief U. S. delegate Warren R. Austin, John Ross, Austin's deputy, and Dean Rusk, head of the state department's U. N. division; T. F. Tsang and C. L. Hsia of China; Alexandre Parodi and Francois De Rose of France; and Andre A. Gromyko and Nikolai Molokov of Russia.

No representative of the UN organization was present. The exact nature of the U. S. plan was not disclosed. A member of the American delegation said, however, this country would insist that the consultations be confined to "peaceful measures" of settlement.

Representatives of the United States, Russia, France and China met at 11 a. m. (EST) in Russia's new Park avenue offices.

Britain refused to take part in the consultations, which were ordered last Friday in a security council resolution. The big powers were asked to take recommendations by March 15 on what to do about carrying out the partition of Palestine.

As the delegates assembled for the opening talks, Chief U. S. delegates Warren R. Austin was reported ready to urge one more effort toward conciliation of Jewish-Arab differences as the first step.

It appeared that he would have the backing of France and China, but it was doubtful whether Russia's Andre A. Gromyko could be lined up in such a conciliation move.

Gromyko objected to U. S. proposal in the Security Council last week that big powers consult with British, Arab and Jewish representatives.

France and China supported the U. S. move in the Council, but it lost by one vote. A U. S. spokesman insisted the Council's refusal to approve conciliation did not prohibit the big powers from going ahead anyway.

B-29 Is Missing On Pacific Hop

San Francisco, March 8—(AP)—An Airforce superfortress with 14 or 15 men aboard has been unreported on the Pacific since 1:34 a. m. (EST) today.

The big plane was one of 10 flying from Spokane to Honolulu. The Army air-rescue arm at Hamilton Field and the Coast Guard sent out search planes.

Congress May Require Agencies To Cooperate

Washington, March 8—(AP)—Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) said today Congress may compel government agencies to give Congressional committees the data they want.

The House un-American Activities committee tried and failed last week to get Commerce Department reports on the loyalty of Dr. Edward U. Condon, Director of the Federal Bureau of Standards.

The expenditures committee has been after income tax returns of some Chicago gangsters. The treasury has declined to hand them over.

"I wouldn't be surprised that legislation came out of the refusal of all these bureaus to give information to Congress.

"I think it will come this session if they persist in their refusal to give Congress the information to which it is entitled.

"Congress can't afford to abdicate all its powers in the government." The un-American activities committee wants particularly a letter FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover wrote Secretary of Commerce Harriman last May.

Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) wired Harriman over the weekend and said it was in the public interest to release the letter.

U. S. Treasury Suggests Repeal Of Tax On Oleo

Recommendation Carries Three-Part Argument For Ending Federal Tax

Washington, March 8—(AP)—The Treasury recommended today repeal of federal taxes on oleomargarine.

Undersecretary A. Lee Wiggin told the House Committee on Agriculture that the present oleo taxes: 1. "Distort the competitive position of two domestic industries, penalizing oleomargarine to aid butter.

2. "Interfere with best use of national resources. 3. "Unnecessarily burden consumers far in excess of the amount paid in taxes."

Wiggins said the taxes are unimportant from a federal revenue standpoint. Collections for this and next fiscal year are estimated at about \$7,000,000, he said.

But, he said, "the burden of these taxes on consumers is not adequately measured by the Treasury's tax collections."

"The taxes increase the cost of the product; they interfere with the consumer's freedom of choice in satisfying personal wants; and they increase his living cost by interfering with the consumption of less expensive foods."

He said "it is the Treasury's view that the federal tax should be repealed."

Wiggins said that there is little need to use taxes to prevent oleo from being misrepresented to be butter.

But if Congress insists on doing so, he said, the tax should be dropped to "normal rates sufficient only for regulatory purposes."

Wiggins said that repeal of the federal taxes on oleo would benefit consumers in most states. Many states have their own taxes or other restrictions on oleo.

First Articles Drafted In West European Union

Brussels, Belgium, March 8—(AP)—First articles of a pact intended to bind five Western European nations in a union to resist the further spread of Communism were drafted here today.

The conferees, representing Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg, referred the drafts to an editorial committee for polishing before tomorrow's session.

Reports circulated that the pact may be ready for signing this week. Conference circles said French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin were ready to come here at any time to sign.

The delegates held three separate meetings today. It is generally agreed that the most difficult problems they must solve are economic.

War Trophy Trouble

Souvenirs, Whether Gun, Shell, Bullet, Bomb, Grenade Or Mine, Should Be Turned In So That It Can Be Unloaded; The Menace Curbed By Alcoholic Tax Unit

Washington, March 8—(AP)—The department of commerce and the committee on un-American Activities, x x x: "As you are aware, very serious charges concerning Dr. Condon's associations have been made, based upon this letter from Mr. Hoover."

Washington, March 8—(AP)—The government is trying to get people to use their brains to keep from blowing them out.

Meaning: If you have a war trophy or souvenir—gun, shell, bullet, bomb, grenade, mine—be sure it's unloaded.

You can have it checked for free. Many people, including children, have been killed in this country since the war by trophies thought to be harmless. For example: Boys blown to bits by a bazooka shell; children killed with "unloaded" pistols; children mangled by hand grenades.

This country is loaded with trophies brought back from overseas by servicemen. They're in all kinds of places: A pistol or cartridge in a dresser drawer; a machinegun in a closet; a shell on a mantelpiece; a mine or bomb in the cellar.

Here's the story: The government has a nationwide campaign for a check on war trophies. It's run by the alcohol tax unit of the Treasury Department. That unit has an office in every state.

All the information here comes from the alcohol tax unit. The Army, Navy, peace officers and civilians all over the country

Politicians Say Only Upset May Indicate Trend

View New Hampshire Primary Outcome As Already Fairly Well Established

Washington, March 8—(AP)—Politicians agree that unless New Hampshire's pre-season primary brings an upset tomorrow in the Dewey-Stassen contest it probably won't scratch the surface of the GOP presidential race.

Forces of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York are contending that he will get at least seven of the state's eight delegates.

Backers of former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota claim their candidate will get up to five.

Yet a outsider or two might edge in to take the play entirely away from both of them.

Charles Tobey, Jr. son of the senator, is running as a backer of Senator Arthur Vandenberg (Mich.). Also a couple of delegates still are backing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower despite his exit from the contest.

A clean sweep for Dewey would be touted by his forces as the beginning of a drive that will land him a first ballot nomination—just as he got in 1944.

Any number between two and five delegates apparently will be called a victory by the Stassen forces.

But politicians think a two to split in favor of Dewey, for instance, wouldn't change the presidential contest much.

Whatever happens, the governor and the former governor will do it all over again in Wisconsin on April 6. But in that race Dewey and Stassen will come face to face with a "darkhorse" candidate for the first time in this year's campaign.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur hasn't said in so many words whether he will seek or accept the nomination, but his name has been entered in the Wisconsin contest.

New Governor Of Connecticut Dies Suddenly

Hartford, Conn., March 8—(AP)—Death has cut short the career of James L. McConough in the middle of his first term as Connecticut's governor.

The 60-year-old Republican chief executive, who entered politics after winning distinction as a college administrator, died suddenly from a blood clot in the heart yesterday in Hartford hospital.

A family funeral service will be held tomorrow in the chapel at Wesleyan University in Middletown where he served as president from 1925 to 1943.

McConough, a native of New York City and a Yale graduate in 1909, devoted most of his adult life to education. Before his appointment as president of Wesleyan, he was president of Knox College, Galesburg, Ill., for eight years, and previously had been on the faculties of Bowdoin and Dartmouth colleges.

Chennault Seeks Aid For Chinese

Washington, March 8—(AP)—Claire L. Chennault came here today to ask aid for China.

The wartime commander of Flying Tigers arrived by commercial plane shortly after 2 a. m. (EST). He was accompanied from Shanghai by his young Chinese wife.

The House Foreign Affairs Committee has invited Chennault, now operator of a commercial air line in China, to testify on American aid for China.

Constabulary headquarters reported today 42 Huks were killed in a constabulary raid on a training camp maintained by the insurgents 30 miles north of Manila.

Raleigh, March 8—(AP)—The state of North Carolina collected a total of \$304,617.55 in taxes on beer during February, the North Carolina division of the U. S. Brewers Foundation reported today.

The collections were ahead of the \$278,162 collected in February 1947 but dropped about \$30,000 from February 1946.

Sec. Marshall In Visit To Martin

Personally Urges House Speaker To Expedite ERP Action; May Not Be Able To Act Until April 10; Senate In Debate

Washington, March 8—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall today personally urged Speaker Martin today to expedite House action on European aid.

Accompanied by Undersecretary Lovett and Lewis Douglas, U.S. ambassador to Great Britain, the secretary visited Martin in the Speaker's office.

Later, Martin said he told Marshall he believes the House will be able to act by April 10 or soon after.

While the subject of including military and other aid to China was discussed, Martin said, the main subject of the meeting was to consider a timetable for the European Recovery Program.

The Senate turned today to its second week of Marshall Plan debate with a promise to "get some voting started."

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the acting Republican floor leader, added, however, that he isn't too sure of a quick final vote on the \$5,300,000,000 European Recovery Program itself.

The first voting will be on amendments to the bill.

"Of course," Wherry told reporters, "there is always the possibility that many senators will want to make speeches, and that would tend to delay any final vote."

Wherry is playing a dual role in the debate. As the acting floor leader he is responsible for keeping the Senate working a top speed on the measure. But he is also chair of a Republican revisionist bloc which would like to rewrite

Vienna, Austria, March 8—(AP)—U. S. Army authorities said an American soldier was shot in the back last night after refusing to obey a Russian order to get off the sidewalk and into the gutter in front of a Russian headquarters hotel in the international district of Vienna.

The Provost Marshal's office said the soldier probably will lose his left leg. His name was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The official accounts was as follows: The soldier was walking with two other soldiers and three Austrian girls along a sidewalk bordering a parkway in front of the Grand Hotel. A sentry ordered the soldiers into the gutter and the soldiers refused. The sentry then pushed him back. The sentry then called another sentry from inside the hotel.

The second sentry struck the American soldier with his gun knocking him to his knees. While the soldier was still on the ground, the sentry fired a shot into his back. Another entered the soldier's arm, smashing the elbow.

The remaining soldiers—unarmed according to American military regulations—and the three girls ran to the American-occupied Bristol Hotel two blocks away as the Russian fired over their heads.

When an ambulance arrived 45 minutes later, the soldier was still on the ground and the Russians had made no effort to give first aid.

U.N. Commission On Korea Meets

Seoul, March 8—(AP)—The United Nations commission on Korea met today for the first time since the U. N. Little Assembly proposed elections in South Korea. It took no action on the plan.

George Patterson of Canada hinted his opposition. Delegates of El Salvador, France, China and the Philippines spoke approvingly of the proposal. Syria reserved its decision. S. H. Jackson of Australia voiced no opinion.

Present Plan On Loans To Latins

Washington, March 8—(AP)—The State Department announced today it will ask congress soon to let the export-import bank lend \$500,000,000 to Latin American countries.

The announcement was in a statement sent to the house foreign affairs committee.

It said the department also plans to request \$20,000,000 "to prevent disease and unrest" in the American-British zone in Trieste during the 15-month period between April 1, 1948 and June 30, 1949.

Assembly Passes Schuman Program

Paris, March 8—(AP)—The National Assembly tonight approved Premier Robert Schuman's program to bank inflation by forcing Frenchmen to lend money to the government. The 315-255 decision gave Schuman a comfortable, 60-vote majority.

The measure provides new taxes which can be avoided by taxpayers subscribing to a government loan.

GOP Chieftains Appear Ready To Side With Dixie

Risk Minor Break In Own Lines To Keep Democratic Revolt Ablaze

Washington, March 8—(AP)—The Civil rights fight moved to the House floor today with the GOP leadership apparently ready to side with rebelling Dixie Democrats.

An odd set of political circumstances finds the Republicans circling a minor break in their own lines in an obvious effort to keep the fires of revolt ablaze in President Truman's party.

The showdown test shied up over an anti-discrimination rider to the \$1,017,851,000 (B) labor department Federal Security appropriation bill up for debate today and a vote probably late tomorrow.

The issue is: shall states that do not give equal educational and job opportunities to citizens of all races, when those opportunities are financed with federal funds, continue to receive the money?

An appropriations subcommittee which wrote the bill said they should not tacked on the rider, or amendment, to that effect.

But the full committee overrode the subgroup and by a 25 to 6 vote knocked the proviso from the bill.

Rep. Keefe (R-Wis.) chairman of the subcommittee and sponsor of the anti-discrimination proposal, told reporters he would offer it on the floor to get the entire House a chance to vote.

A number of other Republicans and most Northern Democrats said they are ready to approve it. But the GOP House leadership is cool to the proposal and, unless it changes its mind, will help Southern Democrats kill it.

The announced stand of the GOP high command is that the proviso has no place in an appropriations bill and should be considered as a separate bill.

But behind the scenes, Republicans admit privately that it would not be good political strategy for them to insure the wrath of Dixie Democrats fighting the President's own program to wipe out racial discrimination.

Three-Way Race For Solicitor Appears Likely

Raleigh, N. C., March 8—(AP)—Possibility of a three-way race for the Democratic nomination for solicitor in the first district loomed today when Walter W. Cohoon of Elizabeth City paid a \$50 filing fee to the state board of elections and entered his name as a candidate in the race.

John F. White of Edenton filed with the election board last week. The present solicitor, John W. Graham of Edenton, has not filed yet but is expected to seek reelection.

William J. Bundy of Greenville, who was appointed by Governor Cherry recently as solicitor in the fifth district, also filed with the board of elections today.

Planes, Boats In Search For Trio

Miami, Fla., March 8—(AP)—Planes and boats went out again today to search for three men missing since Friday in a 16-foot boat.

While hopes for their safety dwindled hourly, the Coast Guard intensified its search for Jockey Albert of Miami, Donald Frazier, businessman from Toronto, Canada, and C. E. (Toby) Trotter, Miami horse trainer.

A two-day search of the vast area at the southeastern corner of the Florida mainland brought no results.

Hitler's Creed Lives

Allies Encounter Difficult Problem In Erasing Nazism And Making Germans More Democratic; Nobody Knows How Many Are Thoroughly Nazified

It is shocking, but not very surprising, to hear from Frau Gertrud Scholz-Klink Heilmeyer, fuhrer of German women in the Hitlerian era, that she is "still a Nazi—as much as ever."

Frau Heilmeyer and her husband, Maj. Gen. August Heilmeyer, one-time officer in Hitler's hand-picked Elite guard, have been arrested in Wuerzburg where they had been living under the name of Stuckebrock. They are being held by the French to determine what, if any, charges shall be brought against them.

The female fuhrer clenched her fist as she proclaimed to members of the press "Hitler still lives for me and my husband!"

Of course that's what one would expect from a hard-boiled Nazi chieftainess. Still, as remarked, it's shocking thus to be brought face to face with a harsh reminder that while Hitler is as dead as a doornail, his totalitarian creed lives on. And it persists not only in Germany but has close imitators in other countries.

One of the most difficult of the Allied problems—and one of the most vital—is how to democratize Germany and make it a peaceful nation. Frau Heilmeyer's attitude

Finland To Begin Talks With Soviet

Rescue Crew Of Tanker Following Night On Reef

All Twenty-One Seamen Pulled To Safety In Breeches Buoy In Rough Sea

Morehead City, N. C., March 8—(AP)—Twenty-one seamen were rescued today from the stricken motorship Norfolk.

While towering waves still pounded the grounded tanker, Coast Guardsmen used a breeches buoy to haul the men to safety one by one. One crewman was rescued yesterday.

The 21 men, all reported in good condition, spent a dreary night aboard their battered, leaking vessel. The Norfolk, a 282-foot, 2,463-ton ship, piled into the treacherous sand bar off Beaufort inlet yesterday while in distress and trying to make harbor.

For a time it appeared she would be broken up by the surging sea. Today Coast Guardsmen said salvage might be possible when the sea calms.

Coast Guard boats stood by the vessel all night in a heavy fog. Bright sunshine this morning soon burned off the fog, but the waves still kept boats from going alongside and the breeches buoy was brought into play.

Planes roared over the area as the men transferred from the motorship to the Coast Guard vessels along the slender line.

The first 14 men were taken immediately to the Fort Macon Coast Guard station and the boats returned for the remaining seven. By mid-morning all were safely ashore.

Rescue efforts were abandoned because of darkness and heavy seas after the ship's electrician, who volunteered to be first, was swept from a rescue line and dashed under the keel of a coast guard boat. He was pulled aboard the boat and hospitalized with head injuries.

Two Coast Guardsmen also were injured in the rescue operations in the 18-foot waves.

The rest of the crew elected to spend the night on the silent, fog shrouded ship buffeted by the waves. They were cheered only by the sight of blinker lights and signal flares which told them Coast Guard vessels were standing by in case the boat broke up during the night.

Czechs Join Ban Of U.S. Movies

Prague, March 8—(AP)—The films of five American stars have been banned in Czechoslovakia because of anti-Communist testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities last October.

Pictures starring Adolphe Menjou, Gary Cooper, Robert Montgomery, Robert Taylor and Ginger Rogers have been barred from screens here.

The government also banned a half dozen other films, including "Sergeant York."

DeGaulle's Anti-Russian Speech Dividing France

Paris, March 8—(AP)—Gen. Charles DeGaulle's call for U.S. help for an organization of western European states to oppose Russia declared the top interest of French politicians and newspapers today.

De Gaulle, first provisional president of reconquered France, declared at Compiègne yesterday he was ready to take over power whenever called upon. He said also that U.S. aid to western Europe should extend to the field of defense.

Deputies of the National Assembly gathered in groups to discuss the speech.

Paris-Press, a supporter of the general, said "events force De Gaulle not to wait longer."

The Communist Ce Gotr said De Gaulle "declared war on the republic." The article said De Gaulle and Premier Robert Schuman's government speak the same language and have "an exasperating anti-Communist attitude and a total submission to the foreign policy of America."

Intrigant, independent Rightist newspaper said the Union De Gaulle advocated was against the Communists and "only the Communists, of course, would be excluded." The account said the general never had been so categorical in demanding power.

France Soir, independent Centrist newspaper, commented: "Gen. De Gaulle demands power. He seems to have renounced distribution of parliament, one of his previous conditions to taking over power. Revision of the constitution no longer appears so urgent in his eyes."

N.C. Birth Rate Increases In '47

Raleigh, N.C., March 8—(AP)—Births in North Carolina in 1947 increased by 12,426 over the previous year, says a provisional report from the State Board of Health.

Cabinet Reportedly Decides To Open Negotiations; Suggest Talks Be Held In Moscow; Extent Of Discussions Not Yet Made Known

Helmski, March 8—(AP)—Finland's cabinet decided today to begin negotiations with Soviet Russia, a member of the government reported.

Finland suggesting that the talks be held in Moscow. No decision was announced on the makeup of the delegation that will go to the Russian capital to carry on negotiations for the treaty of cooperation sought by Prime Minister Stalin.

The cabinet member who made available this information said he could not disclose whether Finland is advising Stalin she is ready to negotiate toward a military pact as well as a friendship agreement.

This reserve likely was due to the desire not to reveal the contents of President Juhio Paasikivi's letter to Stalin before the Russian leader receives it.

The cabinet met with Paasikivi for 90 minutes today.

When Prime Minister Stalin suggested the talks in a letter to Paasikivi dated Feb. 22 and delivered just 14 days ago, he said Russia would agree to meet either in Helsinki or Moscow. Most Finns seem to want to hold the meetings here, but others prefer Moscow.

Stalin's proposal for a mutual assistance pact like those Russia now has with Hungary and Rumania has caused much concern. Most Finns oppose any far-reaching military alliance with the U.S.S.R.

The President alone must make the final decision on the question of beginning the talks. He asked the various parliamentary groups, however, for their opinion.

The popular front, including Communists and Radical Socialists, was the only bloc to support a full military alignment with the Soviet Union. They have 51 of the 200 parliamentary seats.

Opposed to any kind of military alliance are the Social Democrats, 48 seats; Agrarians, 31 seats; Conservatives, 28 seats; Liberals, nine seats; and the Swedish People's Party, 15 seats.

Any treaty that is concluded must be ratified by Parliament.

Yesterday, strong-arm men broke up a mass meeting protesting the proposed treaty.

Four or five men, described by authorities as Communists, suddenly appeared and pushed the speaker aside. They grabbed the microphone and announced that the meeting was organized by fascists.

Long Beach, Calif., March 8—(AP)—Residents of nearby Signal Hill will be faced with two city council candidates named Matthews in the April election.

One is Bertrand Matthews, 74, Republican. The other is his wife, Mrs. Frances Matthews, 33, Democrat.

Both may be elected from the 11 candidates seeking three council seats. They have 12 children.

THE RESIDUE
Those who saw the motion picture several years ago of the life and labors of Marie and Pierre Curie, and those who have read any biography of this remarkable couple, remember how they reduced tons of raw material to a little residue of radium, all of which could be held on the point of a penknife. But how that little bit of radium glowed! How it sent forth rays out of all proportion to its size. Tons of raw material, months and years of patient labor, and at the end a little residue so small that one had to look sharply to see it at all.

Yet this is always the way it happens, the world being made as it is. It takes years of growth to bring forth the harvest of the human soul. The college student labors for years getting ready for the ordeal of final examinations on which so much depends. Sometimes people live a whole life through, apparently to accomplish some one particular thing—a precious residue as rich to them as radium was to the scientists who discovered it.

This radium glowed with an almost unearthly brightness. The residue always glows, for it has involved sacrifice, skill, patience, faith. And these things make any achievement glow.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—The new king of the 4,000,000 people of Yemen, which is on the Red Sea and is perhaps the world's most isolated country, is descended from a long line of wealthy land owners and warriors.

He is El Sayed Abdullah Ibn Ahmed El Wazir, and in Yemen he is considered a sort of arabic counterpart of Napoleon. He succeeds 85-year-old Yahya Hamid El Din, who was recently assassinated.

Abdullah Wazir, the Imam, as the king is called is 60 years old and said to be the greatest military general in the country. He is said also to be a man of great strength but possessing wisdom and understanding.

He owns much of the country's coffee land, the produce of which brings into the nation some half million dollars annually.

Yahya, the murdered king, was short, thick-set and very positive. He resisted social progress and was loathe to put out the welcome mat for anyone who were not Moslems. However, he was credited with bringing a great deal of law and order into the country.

Until 1946 only seven Americans had visited the country. In September that year, Rives Childs, United States Minister to Saudi Arabia, was also assigned to represent this government in Yemen.

The former Imam had been on the throne at Sana'a since 1902 but had never been out of High Yemen, the mountainous part, and had never seen the sea.

For 500 years Yemen, best known as the home of the Queen of Sheba, had been under the rule of the Turks who didn't allow foreigners within their borders.

Last July, Washington put on its best party manners to welcome Prince Abdullah, the sixth son of the Imam and the first Yemeni official to visit the United States.

Chicago, March 8—(AP)—Olympic decathlon hopefuls usually are brawny athletes who have to be sturdy to stand the gauntlet in the grueling 10-event championship.

But picture, if you will, a spindly, 165-pound chap who has decathlon aspirations—and may be right in there picking when the United States rounds up its Olympic track gang next June.

That's Ohio State's Lloyd Duff, who stole the show in the 38th big nine indoor championship at Champaign, Ill., Saturday with a record breaking flourish that gave the Buckeyes the conference crown.

Placed third in the pole vault a fine soar of 13 feet, 8 inches, two inches behind co-champions Tom Bennett of Wisconsin and Harry Coper of Minnesota.

He played for Stokes High School in his first two years. He scored 287 points in 17 basketball games the first year, and 417 points in 19 games the second year.

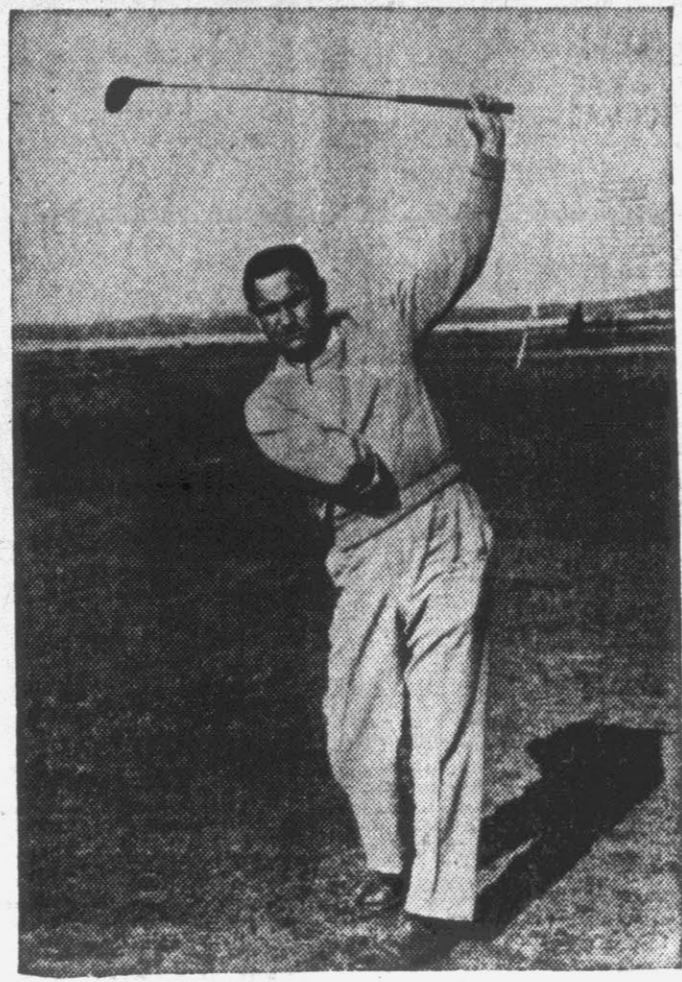

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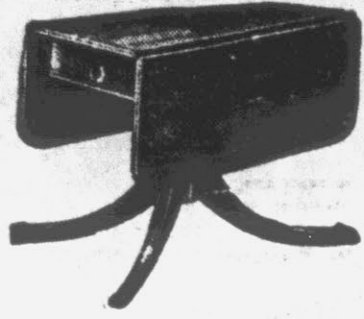
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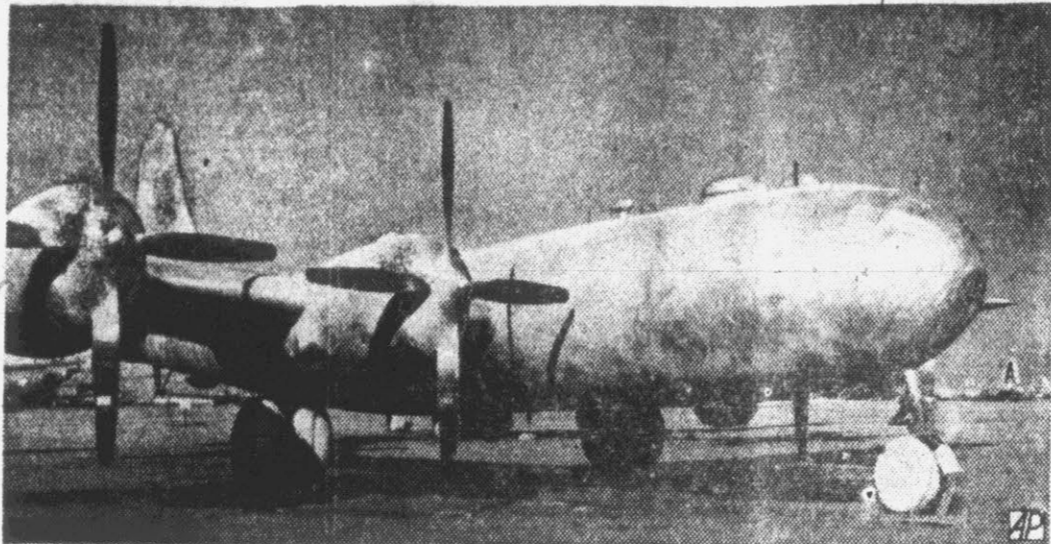
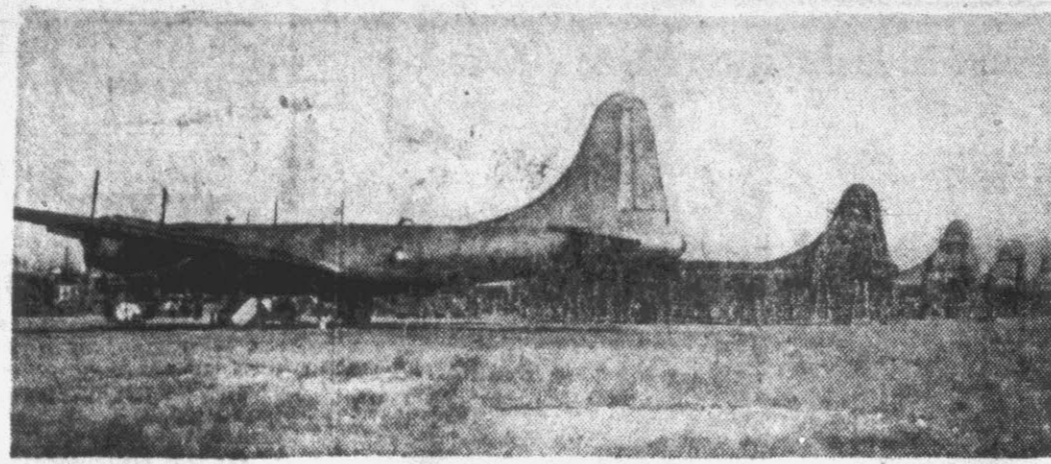

Study Shakeup In State Dept.

Washington, March 8—(AP)—A shake-up of the way the State Department operates is under study. Persons familiar with the detailed reorganization plan said today its main objective is to tighten the workings of the big department, which has taken on many new duties since the end of the war.

Whether the plan actually will be carried out, however, remains to be decided by Secretary Marshall and President Truman.

It is understood to assign major authority for the day to day operations of American foreign policy to four assistant secretaries. They would be responsible, respectively, for United States relations with (a) Europe, (b) Latin America, (c) the Far East and (d) the Middle East and Africa.

In addition there would be either three or four other assistant secretaries to handle public relations (both domestic and foreign), economic affairs, United Nations affairs and possibly the administration of occupied areas, such as Germany and Japan.

Such an assignment of duties would differ radically from the present system.

His idea of course, was to get his people to follow him in a campaign of conquest, racial destruction and pillage which no religious person would countenance. His success was registered in the horrors of his concentration camps which not only engaged in wholesale murder but in bestial tortures.

So the ideological de-lousing of Germany is going to take many long years, during which Allied troops will have to be maintained in the country—unless the Allies are prepared to gamble with world peace. In this connection a fresh work has developed—one which is causing concern right now in the five-nation conference in Brussels to try to effect a western European union. This is the fear that the German Nazis and the Russians might join forces against the rest of Europe. And that's not such a far-fetched idea. Both the Nazis and the Reds are totalitarian minded and both are bent on conquest. The question of whether they can work together is answered when we look back to the partition of Poland between Berlin and Moscow in 1939. Yes, the democratization of Germany if one of the keys to the palace of peace.

(Continued from Page One) 1930s. The weapons might have passed through a dozen hands—with all identifying marks filed off—before a gangster bought them. So they were hard to trace. To block this, Congress in 1934 passed a law which said:

These weapons, but only these, had to be registered with the alcohol tax unit: machineguns, shotguns or rifles with barrels less than 18 inches long; any firearm, except a pistol or revolver, which could be concealed on the person; a muffler or silencer for any firearm.

Anyone who had such a weapon and didn't register it, was subject to a fine of \$2,000 and 5 years in jail. And every time such a weapon was transferred from one person to another a \$200 tax had to be paid. The alcohol tax unit was picked for the job of registering such weapons because it has investigators in every state to see that the federal tax on alcohol is paid.

Will Investigate Principals Work

Raleigh, N.C., March 8—(AP)—A subcommittee of the State Education Commission is going to look into statements that North Carolina pays thousands of dollars each year for supervisory school services it does not receive.

Several speakers told the commission's committee on organization and administration here Saturday that time-consuming extra duties make it impossible for principals to give the supervision for which they are paid.

The committee appointed a four-man subcommittee to find out what duties principals are assuming and the time they spend on various activities. Members of the subcommittee are C. Reid Ross of Lilling-

ton, W. A. Graham of Warrenton, Colin G. Spencer of Carthage and O. M. Pharr of Statesville. Spencer told the committee that he knows principals who drive trucks, fire boilers and patch school house roofs. "Principals are no longer educators," he asserted.

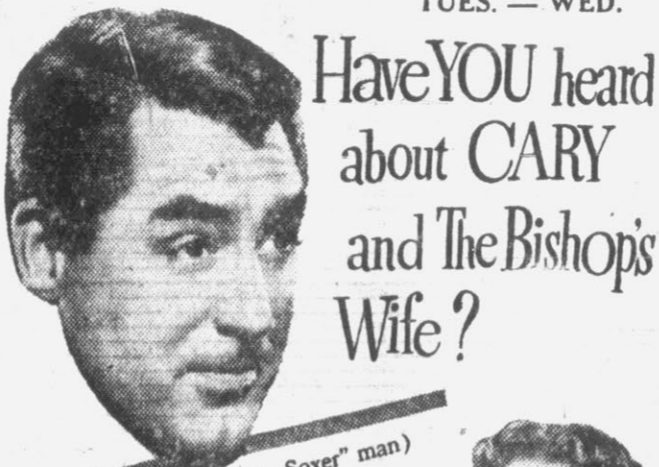
