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Byrnes Calls For
Revival Wartime
Draft In AmericaWants New Warning
Against Coercive So-
viet Expansion To Be
Backed Up

Charleston, S. C., March 13—(AP)—James F. Byrnes, former Secretary of State, said today the United States should "act," not just protest, if Russia threatens the independence of Greece, Turkey, Italy or France.

A new warning against "coercive" Soviet expansion should be served on Moscow now, he said. And to back it up, Byrnes said this country should promptly revive its wartime draft.

Byrnes stressed in a speech prepared for delivery at the Citadel, South Carolina military college, that he spoke as a private citizen. He said he had not consulted President Truman or Secretary of State Marshall on his address.

He joined in Marshall's appeal for cool judgment in dealing with a "world crisis." But he added:

"It becomes imperative duty of each one of us to insist that steps be taken immediately to prepare the United States for any eventuality. If we are going to talk strong, we must be strong."

Revival of Selective Service was proposed by Byrnes as a first step to restore American military might. He said it was needed promptly to bring the Army up to its authorized strength of 669,000 men, and should be coupled with increased air power.

"The very fact that Congress takes such action will contribute greatly to the preservation of peace," he said. "Mr. Molotov (the Soviet foreign minister) does not understand English, but to him actions speak louder than words in any language."

Byrnes, champion of a postwar "patient but firm" policy toward Russia, said any action to curb Soviet expansion should be "within the spirit and the letter of the charter of the United Nations." But he added:

"Knowing the Soviet habit of taking over a government and then announcing there is nothing to discuss, we must let the Soviets know we will act immediately to preserve the status quo until the Security Council has an opportunity to investigate the threatened aggression."

The Iron Curtain already has gone down on Czechoslovakia, Byrnes said. And he predicted that Russia's demand on Finland for a defense treaty would be followed shortly by complete political and military control of Finland's government.

More Arabs Die
In Jewish Raid

Jerusalem, March 13—(AP)—Fifteen Arabs were killed and about 20 wounded at dawn today when a large group of Jews raided an Arab village in Upper Galilee, an official source said.

The village was Al Husana. Several Arab houses were blown up during the attack, and the village has been evacuated, the source added. Police and military units found a number of grenades and one rucksack filled with explosives when they arrived on the scene after the attack.

Wrecked Plane
Located In Italy

Geneva, Switzerland, March 13—(AP)—U.S. Army planes today sighted an American aircraft which disappeared Thursday while en route from Geneva to Rome, Swiss air officials said.

The officials said wreckage was sighted near Lake Como, Italy.

The two-engine transport carried a crew of five.

Treasurer W. A. Julian

Maybe You Haven't Heard Of Julian; He's The Treasurer
Of The United States And His Signature Can Be Found
On All Paper Money Issued Since 1933; About Him

Washington, March 13—(AP)—Meet the treasurer of the United States, William Alexander Julian. He's been in the job since 1933.

Ever hear of him? Lots of people haven't.

If you haven't, it's because you don't read your paper money—any paper money—down in the left-hand corner.

There it is, his signature: W. A. Julian, treasurer of the United States. He's not secretary of the treasury. That's John W. Snyder. Julian's job is described in the Congressional Directory this way:

"The treasurer of the United States is charged with the receipt and disbursement of public moneys that may be deposited in the treasury at Washington and in the other depositories authorized by the secretary of the treasury to receive deposits of government funds for credit in the account of the treasurer of the United States."

Which is long for saying: Julian is the big bookkeeper on all the money the government collects and

spends. He has a staff of 1,600 people. His salary: \$10,000 a year.

Snyder, as secretary of the treasury, has a different job. He doesn't have to worry about the bookkeeping. He sets money policies, such as on government loans.

Snyder's signature is on all the paper money printed since he became secretary a couple of years ago, down in the right-hand corner opposite Julian's.

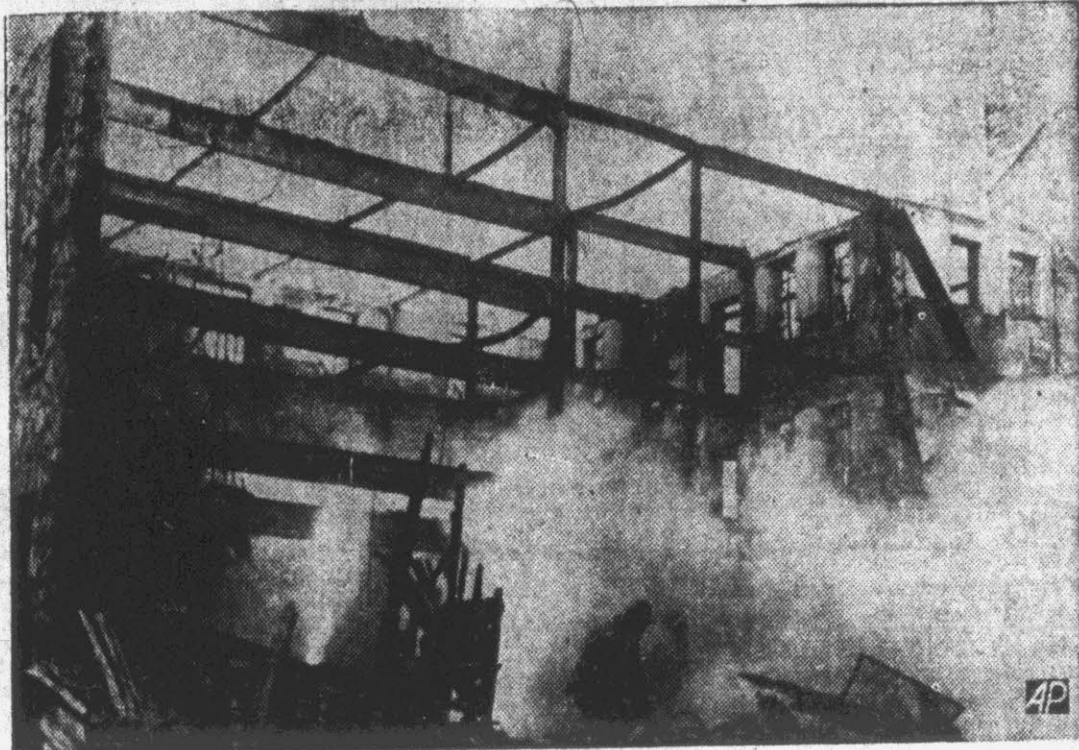
But Julian's is on all the paper money printed since 1933 when he became treasurer, opposite the names of all the treasury secretaries since then: William H. Woodin, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Fred A. Vinson, and Snyder.

In short, Julian's name is on paper money worth about \$27,500,000,000. His office is part of the Treasury Department under Snyder.

Back around 1923 Julian retired from business. He was reported then to be a millionaire.

He had been a shoe salesman. Then, as a shoe manufacturer, he

Senate Races Toward Final
Action For 'Marshall Plan'Meyers Guilty;
Further ActionsWill Be Sentenced On
Monday; Still Faces
More Legal Trouble

Washington, March 13—(AP)—With one legal battle already lost, Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers today had many more ahead.

A federal court jury convicted him yesterday of talking a business associate into telling lies to a Senate committee investigating the general's wartime business affairs. He is to appear in court Monday to be sentenced.

But the 52-year-old Meyers, wartime Air Forces deputy purchasing chief, still faces (a) income tax fraud charges at Baltimore and Dayton, O., (b) a possible Army court martial, (c) a slander suit and (d) a \$10,000 legal claim.

For the witness tampering charges on which a jury of ten men and two women held him guilty yesterday, Meyers could draw a maximum prison term of 30 years.

Standing stiffly, Meyers took the verdict without emotion.

Judge Holtzoff wanted to put Meyers in jail immediately after the jury verdict yesterday. But the general's attorneys—who said they will appeal his conviction—protested that it is usual for defendants "of his position" to be allowed freedom on bond.

"We don't often have a defendant in this position," Judge Holtzoff snapped.

The court finally allowed Meyers to remain free on \$1,000 bond until Monday.

Warmer Weather

Drive To Slash First-
Year Funds Soundly
Defeated By 56-31
Vote; Passage Of
Bill Predicted By To-
night; Senate Meets
At Noon

Washington, March 13—(AP)—The Senate raced toward final action today on the European recovery program after defeating a major drive to slash its first-year funds.

By a 56 to 31 vote late last night it blasted aside a determined effort led by Senator Taft (R-Ohio), chairman of the Senate Republican policy committee, to shave \$1,300,000,000 off the \$5,300,000,000 Marshall Plan figures.

Senator Connally (D-Tex.), one of the program's chief sponsors in Congress, predicted its passage by tonight. The bill is designed to speed funds to 16 western European nations to bolster them against Communism.

The Senate was called to meet at noon (EST) to resume debate on the stack of amendments which still were awaiting action when it recessed at 11:03 last night.

Elated backers said the resounding defeat suffered by Taft's fund-cutting proposal insured Senate approval of the bill without major changes.

"We'll pass it by a bigger vote than we had against the Taft amendment," Connally told reporters.

That would be a victory for Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and chief Capitol Hill exponent of the bi-partisan foreign policy.

Vandenberg stood his ground firmly as Taft led 22 other Republicans and eight Democrats in a roll call assault to batter the fund down to \$4,000,000,000. The Michigan Senator carried 23 other Republicans and 32 Democrats with him.

For the Senate, yesterday was an 11-hour day of bickering, charges and counter-charges.

Senator Kem (R-Mo.) started it off with a speech that lasted four hours, through one interruption after another. Kem said the plan would wreck American capitalism and wouldn't stop Communism in Europe.

Taft said it was justified "by the world battle against Communism," all right. But he said it was "completely without economic justification."

"We may lose every cent we put up, but it seems to be there is a chance it will aid the battle against Communism," he said. "The stakes are so large that I believe we should take that chance."

But he said emphatically that "this is no war measure." He said he did not understand President Truman's statement Wednesday that his faith in peace was somewhat shaken. Taft said he does not believe there is danger of war.

The Ohioan's statement that approval of the aid bill now would not bind this country to continue it later brought on a sharp clash with Vandenberg.

The bill "contemplates" four years of American aid, the Michigan senator said. While no Congress can bind the next one, he added, he would feel obliged to vote for an extension next year if the 16 participating nations live up to their pledges.

Tientsin Consul
In Plea To Reds

Peking, March 13—(AP)—The U. S. Consul General in Tientsin appealed by radio to the Communists today to arrange for the withdrawal of 12 Catholic Nuns believed held by the Reds 90 miles southwest of Tientsin.

The 12 are reported held at Tientsin. Registration records show there are five American, five Canadian and two English Nuns there.

Resource-Use
Meeting OpensSixteen Counties Rep-
resented In Confer-
ence On ECTC Cam-
pus

Attending a Resource-Use conference on the campus of East Carolina Teachers College today are approximately 100 men and women from 16 counties in the eastern section of the state. The meeting, originally set for January, has attracted much favorable attention in the state and in one of six conferences scheduled for the winter and spring of 1948 in North Carolina.

Gathered on the campus this morning to hear addresses and to discuss together the efficient use of the natural and human resources of the state are farmers, educators, business men, ministers, newspapermen, and a number of representatives of state agencies.

The main theme developed at the meeting is the part to be played by the schools, particularly the teacher-training institutions, in training the citizens of the state to evaluate and to use effectively these resources.

President John D. Messick of the college welcomed guests to East Carolina as the meeting got under way at 9:30 o'clock. The chief address of the morning was made by Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, state superintendent of public instruction. A panel discussion on health, public welfare, community planning and development, conservation of soil and forests, and problems of employment was held.

Speakers from the college scheduled to speak at the afternoon session are Dean Leo W. Jenkins and Dr. Howard J. McGinnis, director of field services.

Sec. Anderson
Announces Intent
Run For Office

Washington, March 13—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson announced today he will run for the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator from New Mexico.

Anderson said he will remain in President Truman's cabinet until Congress adjourns, probably in July.

Anderson will be a candidate for the office now held by Senator Hatch. Hatch said last week that he will not be a candidate again in order to accept appointment to the federal district court in New Mexico if it is offered.

Anderson did not speculate on who might succeed him as secretary of agriculture.

A PRINCESS DIES

London, March 13—(AP)—Princess Helena Victoria, granddaughter of Queen Victoria, died in London today.

The princess was 77. She had been in failing health for several months.

Benes Joins In
Mazaryk RitesRed Premier Blames
West For Martyr-
dom; Thousands At
Funeral

Prague, March 13—(AP)—Solemn funeral services were held today for Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk, with President Eduard Benes making his first public appearance since the government crisis began Feb. 21.

Dr. Benes reached the pantheon of the National Museum at 2 p. m. (8 a. m. EST) and a few seconds later the funeral began. From early morning thousands of persons had gathered around the national museum and Parliament, and had crowded the side streets of Prague's Central Square. Yesterday more than 250,000 persons had filed past Masaryk's bier.

Communist Premier Klement Gottwald spoke at the funeral services. Gottwald blamed criticism from the west for the death of the Czech statesman, who died Wednesday after plunging from his office window and was officially recorded a suicide.

Hundreds of thousands of people were gathered under leaden skies for the state and military rites arranged by the Communist government. From early morning they trudged toward the National Museum—clerks, shopkeepers, merchants, laborers, horny handed peasants from the country.

They bought out the flowershops for blossoms to throw at the casket bearing Masaryk's body there from the Foreign office. They piled wreaths at the bier.

"Look at them," said one woman in the crowd, pointing to the Communists. "They do not even have enough decency to stay at home, those hypocrites. They have come to sneer at their victims."

Believes Veto
Can Be Beaten

Washington, March 13—(AP)—Senator Byrd (D-Va.) said today he believes Congress could override any presidential veto of a Senate bill to cut income taxes \$4,700,000,000.

However, he added: "I would be rather doubtful about chances for overriding on anything bigger than the Senate figure."

Lewis Hurls Implied
Threat Coal StrikeSeek Stave Off
Party ShowdownAdministration Said
Hoping For Compromise
At Convention

Washington, March 13—(AP)—Administration officials were reported seeking today to stave off a civil rights showdown until the Democratic convention in July.

At that time, a party official said, the resolutions committee will be asked to work President Truman's hotly-debated proposals into a compromise plank in the 1948 platform.

These proposals come before a committee of Southern governors here today. Indications were they would be roundly condemned. And the governors' report might throw new fuel on the fire of a Dixie Democratic revolt.

With this in mind, Mr. Truman's supporters are said to have agreed to leave it strictly up to the resolutions group to decide how strong a pledge the party wants to make toward bringing about race equality.

The convention group will be made up of members from each state and territory and the District of Columbia.

Thus rebelling Southerners will have a voice in deciding the issue even if they are outnumbered by northern and western Democrats.

National Chairman J. Howard McGrath told four Southern governors recently that he would be willing to go back to the 1944 platform declaration.

General Relaxes
Censorship Of
Criticism In U.S.

Tokyo, March 13—(AP)—General MacArthur directed today that the Japanese press be permitted to "carry any American political attacks" against him.

This was announced by Col. M. P. Echols, the Supreme Commander's public information officer. Several stories, reporting comment on MacArthur's presidential candidacy, had been delayed by Allied headquarters censorship yesterday—although some were passed, including those critical of the general.

The general policy of censorship over the Japanese press has been to delete criticism of MacArthur as a supreme commander under the overall prohibition against criticism of the occupation.

Businessman Is
GOP Dark Horse

Baltimore, March 13—(AP)—A Republican from Democratic stronghold North Carolina, Thomas C. Scott, is a dark horse entry for the GOP presidential nomination.

Scott, a 44-year-old self-described research expert who "tells business men where their business is sick," announced his candidacy today.

Scott said he has written the Republican chairman of Maryland, North Carolina and Texas asking them to nominate him at the national convention.

Chilean Move Pushes
Russia Into Role Of
Defendant Before
World; Case Placed
On Calendar For
Next Wednesday; U.
S. Support Expected

Lake Success, March 13—(AP)—Chile's demand for United Nations investigation of the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia pushed Russia today into the role of a defendant before the world.

It also opened the way for airing of conditions in at least one part of Soviet-dominated eastern Europe. Many saw the possibility of an East-West showdown.

The Security Council put the case on its provisional calendar for next Wednesday. The Russians then must meet head on the Chilean allegations that the methods of Nazi Germany are being used by "a member state against another member state" and that "the extent and magnitude of the plans of the U.S.S.R." stand revealed.

"This was the first time Russia has been called directly to account since the Iranian case in early 1946. The feeling here was that the current case presages a test between Russia and the western powers over expansion of Soviet influence."

The United States delegation cautiously refrained from early comment. However, on the basis of recent statements by President Truman and Secretary of State George C. Marshall, strongest American support for the Chilean case could be expected.

In filing his case yesterday, Chilean delegate Hernan Santa Cruz emphasized that he had not discussed the plan in advance with any other delegate under strict orders from President Gariel Gonzalez in Santiago. This apparently was to forestall any charges that the move was dictated by the United States.

Action by Chile forced consideration on the once rejected case. Secretary-General Trygve Lie had ruled out the same charges presented by Dr. Jan Papanek, Czechoslovak anti-Communist delegate.

Informed persons predicted the case would run something like this:

1—Russia will have a bitter fight, with certain support from the Soviet Union, to kill the charges before the 11-nation council can discuss them. However, moving the case from the provisional calendar to the official agenda is a matter of procedure and therefore outside the range of the big power veto held by Russia and the other great powers.

Chile needs the support of seven delegates to get the case heard.

2—Failing to muster five opposition votes, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko may repeat his walkout of March, 1946, when he left the council chamber in a row over the Iranian case.

3—If Russia stays and fights, one of the bitterest propaganda battles in the U.N.'s two-year history is in prospect with perhaps the life of the organization at stake.

The Palestine problem remained unsolved. Another big-power session in New York yesterday produced no solution on how to divide the Holy Land into Jewish and Arab nations in the face of Arab opposition.

Burmese Report
Communist Plot

Rangoon, Burma, March 13—(AP)—The Burmese press reported today the uncovering of a Communist plot to assassinate Premier Thakin Nu and overthrow his government.

Newspapers said the plot was disclosed in secret papers seized by police during a roundup of "Red Flag" Communist party members. A countryside uprising was planned in the wake of the assassination, the press accounts said, with the outlawed Red Flag leader Thakin Soe returning to Rangoon to assume leadership.

Momentous Occasion

The Agreement Of Five European Nations To A Treaty
Of Cooperation Is Of Far-Reaching Importance;
Plan To Meet Next Great Emergency Together

Britain, France and the Benelux nations (Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg) in a remarkably short time have reached agreement at Brussels on a fifty year treaty for political, economic and military cooperation to counter Communist aggression.

Urgency had been thrust upon the conference by the Bolshevik rape of Czechoslovakia and the further threats to Finland and Italy.

It is a momentous and far-reaching development which, when formally ratified by the governments concerned, is likely to play a major role in the crisis that has grown out of the battle between Communism and Democracy.

The other states registered in the Marshall Plan are to be invited to join these five—which include four of the world's greatest colonial powers—to form a union of western Europe. Several already have indicated a desire to participate and we may hear from the rest shortly, since the 16 Marshall Plan countries are scheduled to meet in Paris

Monday to discuss the program. Back of this sensational Brussels agreement has been the hope that the United States will promise military aid against aggression. Thus far there has been no announcement from Washington on this point.

We do know, however, that a western European union has the blessings of America, and that talk about military aid from the U.S.A. hasn't been discouraged. In fact after yesterday's cabinet meeting in Washington Secretary of Labor Schweinfach told reporters that the western alliance was brought up during the discussion. However, America's policy has been not to decide her exact attitude until it is clear what sort of support the nations in the western union desire.

Along with the Brussels agreement has come a striking announcement from Holland—perhaps coincidental or possibly impelled by the success of the conference. The Dutch government states that 25,000 men

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Here's Some Timely Tips On Your Home's Interior

Your recipe for a home interior may differ from your neighbor's. You may prefer a heaping teaspoonful of inexpensive Modern to a dash of Chippendale, Sheraton or Hepplewhite. But if you place your furniture about the home with a deft hand, you may achieve what Mrs. Jones with her lavish-sprinkling of period and expensive furniture cannot achieve—comfort, livability and good taste.

It isn't necessary to empty the tea canister of your life's savings. It is planning, and not necessarily dollars and cents, which can achieve beauty in the home.

There is much more common sense in home planning today than there was a generation ago. Grandma, and mother too, often changed furniture as they did their winter underwear. They bought "suits" of furniture. When one piece broke down, the whole set was discarded or sold to the junk man, and a new set purchased.

Today, however, the average woman buys a good piece of furniture and veers away from "sets" or "suits." Her individual pieces with proper care are made to stand up for a lifetime. If she can't afford all the things she would like at once, she is willing to do without "extras" temporarily until she can achieve quality in lieu of quantity.

If you are planning a home, and the project is new to you, several good prospects should not be ignored. Before you buy anything, investigate Cousin Sue's attic, Aunt Minnie's cellar, Uncle Ben's garage, the family storage bin, or any other place where accessible furniture may be stored.

All junk? Not always. Sometimes the glittering, expensively tagged items you admire in the antique shop around the corner are discovered in just such out of the way places. Polished and repaired, they make attractive additions to any home.

There are many schools of decorating thought in respect to what goes with what.

Some decorators hold by the old

theory that Modern is in a class by itself; that period furniture can be mixed esthetically only with furnishings of the same period; that walnut and mahogany should not be mixed with blonde woods.

But many decorators now advise mixing the new and the old to create a new feeling in home living.

Often the old style of traditional furniture is preserved. But treated to a Modern sleekness, it achieves comfort and eye-appeal in the modern manner. Old woods are pickled (bleached); bright colored fabrics replace the stuffy somberness of Victorian upholstery; old furniture is converted to emphasize usefulness. Glass and plastic as well as metals—chromium, aluminum, brass and copper—are sprinkled about enthusiastically to achieve brightness.

If you feel a warm friendliness toward a piece of furniture before you purchase it, you will never feel uncomfortable in its presence.

A decorator may prove a tremendous help, if you can afford it. Such steps as combining colors, utilizing space and achieving harmonious backgrounds in wallpaper, paints, draperies, curtains and rugs are second-nature to the decorator. But remember to express a few ideas of your own.

Color should be applied to your home with the same gentleness of purpose that goes into the planning of your flower garden. Remember, if you make a mistake in color harmony in your home, it may be expensive to rectify.

The first decision to make about color is whether or not a man is to live in the home to be planned. If so, skip the baby pinks and sky blues. Concentrate on green greys which are more restful to masculine sensibilities. Men usually prefer vibrant shades to the orchid, maize or other pastels.

It is better to make your color scheme simple, rather than to become involved in such things as mixing blue green drapes with a yellow green divan or a yellow-orange chair with a red-orange rug which may give a completely inharmonious effect.



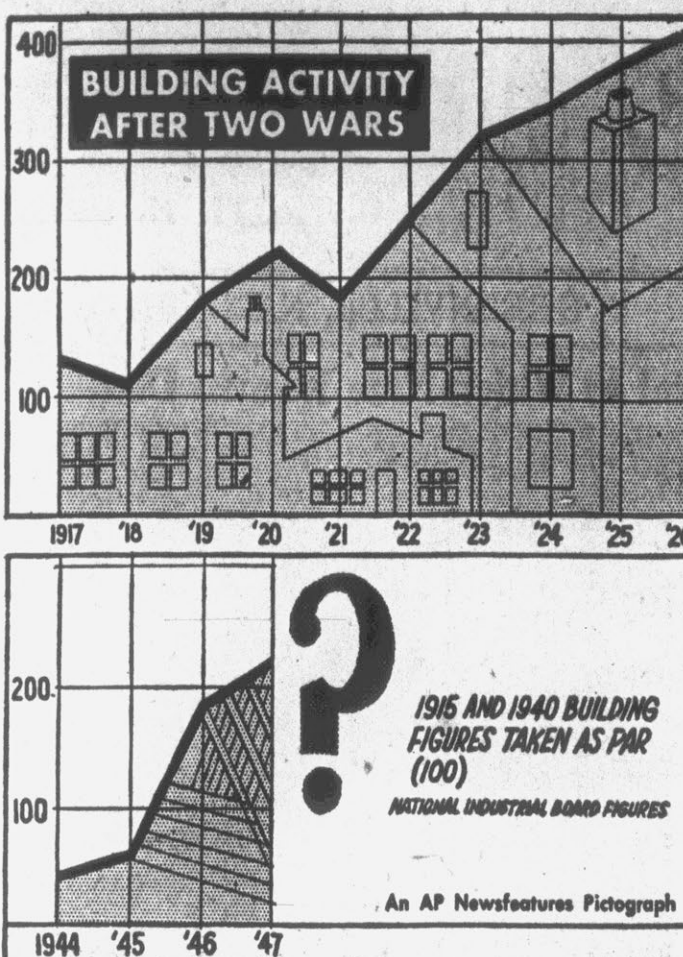
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You should learn something about combining colors before you try to do the job yourself. Any art store can supply you with a color wheel that explains which colors are related to one another.

A dark room can always be brightened considerably to give the appearance of spaciousness with a vivid yellow paint job on the walls. If maple or blonde wood furniture is used, the effect of roominess will be even greater. Yellow is always a gay, cheerful color to use in any room. Green, nature's favorite, is considered the most restful and is usually the color selected by hospitals and psychiatric institutions. Red, because it is such a stimulating color, should be handled with a light touch. It can, however, be used in small amounts, providing other colors temper it. Blue is pretty and restful and will help make the walls recede, but it will fade more rapidly than other paints, particularly if sunshine floods the room where it is used.

Seeds Of Cancer Planted In Mice

Atlantic City, March 13—(AP)—Evidence that seeds of cancer may be planted in the very young, and even before birth, was reported today to the American Association for Cancer Research.

These seeds are invisible. They appear to be only a tendency that somehow gets into living flesh. They were shown in mice, by Drs. W. E. Smith and Peyton Rous, of the Rockefeller Institute, New York City.

The seeds were sown by injecting young mice, before birth of their young, with urethane, a chemical compound known to be able to cause cancer in animals. Why this substance causes cancer is not known.

When the mothers had been injected, many of their young developed cancers. Sometimes one of these baby mice showed a cancer within a few days after birth. Sometimes not for weeks.

But mostly the young mice had cancers much earlier than those whose mothers had not received the cancer-making injection.

There is much evidence that cancers, both in animals and men and women, may not show up until years after the mysterious thing known as the cause of cancer has set the stage. The Rockefeller tests show that it is possible to shorten the time between seeding and appearance of a cancer. That suggests a possibility of learning what may speed human cancer and how to avoid this.

Romanian Woman 'Newborn' After Allowed To Stay

New York, March 13—(AP)—Assured a haven in this country under a bill signed by President Truman, a Romanian woman doctor said today "I am the happiest girl in the world. I feel newborn."

Dr. Gisela Perl, a Gynecologist, had faced the prospect of returning to Romania until approval yesterday of a bill introduced by Rep. Sol Bloom (D-NY) permitting her to remain as a permanent resident.

Going back, the 45-year-old doctor said, would mean nearness to Auschwitz and Belsen and the horror camps where her husband, son and parents were caught in the Nazi death mill.

In New York hotel room, Dr. Perl bared her left arm with the tattooed number "25404."

That, she recounted, "stands for so much suffering."

Plane Overdue; Flames Sighted On Mountainside

Seattle, March 13 (AP) The Seattle CAA control tower, checking on a Northwest Airlines plane overdue at Edmonton, Alberta, reported today it had been informed by the Gulkana range station a fire had been sighted on Mt. Sanford 200 miles east of Anchorage, Alaska.

The Gulkana station, about 50 miles west of the mountain, said the plane had reported it was overhead at 11:36 p. m. (PST). No further radio contact was made with the four-engine craft carrying 24 passengers and a crew of six on a charter flight from Shanghai.

The CAA said the flight plan filed by the pilot called for checks at Gulkana and Northway, after leaving Anchorage. The plane was scheduled to have arrived at Edmonton at 5:03 PST.

Will Either Sell, Or Close Down His 'PM'

New York, March 13—(AP)—Marshall Field III said today he either was selling his New York newspaper, PM, or closing it.

He said he no longer would support the publication because of heavy deficits it has incurred since he helped establish it eight years ago.

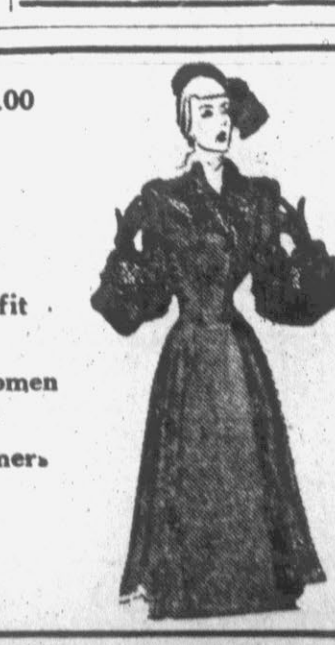

AN OUTWORN CREED

The Roman Emperor Julian, known as "the apostate," lived a brief life of thirty-one years and was said to have died muttering, "Gallien, thou hast conquered."

He lived in a day when religion and politics were so mixed together that it is little wonder he fell away from the Christian faith into which he had been born. By the time he was twenty, he had decided against Christianity and for philosophy and paganism. He was in some ways a better man than many of the so-called Christians who persecuted and fought him.

But he made the mistake of trying to turn the hands of history's clock backwards. He tried to get the world to accept again a type of inferior religion which by and large all sound thinking persons had definitely discarded for good.

The Gallien won. He always wins. And for the simple reason that he advances the only system of ethics which is really suited to the dignity of human life. Furthermore, he makes supernatural claims and supports these with a life so magnificently superior to any other life ever lived that men can accept these supernatural claims without doing violence to their reason. Paganism does not work, and Julian was neither the first nor the last man to find this out.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—On the birthday of the king golden apples bob in the beautiful fountain in the Old Square at Copenhagen. The royal guards don their most resplendent uniforms, and the Danish people cheer in the streets.

This year the celebration honors Frederick IX, who ascended the throne in April 1947 upon the death of his father Christian X. The new monarch was born March 11, 1899. There are some 150,000 Danes in the United States. About 8,000 are in New York City, where the king's birthday is always observed in a big way.

Members of the Royal Danish Guards who have emigrated to this country and formed a society put on a show. Lauritz Melchior, of the Metropolitan Opera Co., is an active member in planning the programs, which consist of a Danish buffet and a ball at a New York hotel.

The most popular feature of the Danish buffet is the smorrebroed, or open-faced sandwich, served with "snaps" (a drink like aquavit and the famous Danish beer, Carlsberg and Tuborg Cherry herring, a Danish brandy, is served with the coffee. Back in 1897, when Frederick was crown prince, he and his charming wife, Princess Ingrid, the daughter of the Swedish crown prince, visited the United States.

The king and queen have three daughters, Margarethe, the eldest was born on April 16, 1940 a week after the occupation of Denmark by the Nazis. Dances say the little princess, born in this hour of darkness, gave them their first glimpse of hope.

"It was like the first beam of sunshine for us," says an embassy official here. April 29, 1944, Benedikte was born. Anne-Marie, followed on August 19, 1946.

Danes in America are looking forward to a visit from their "first family" within the year.

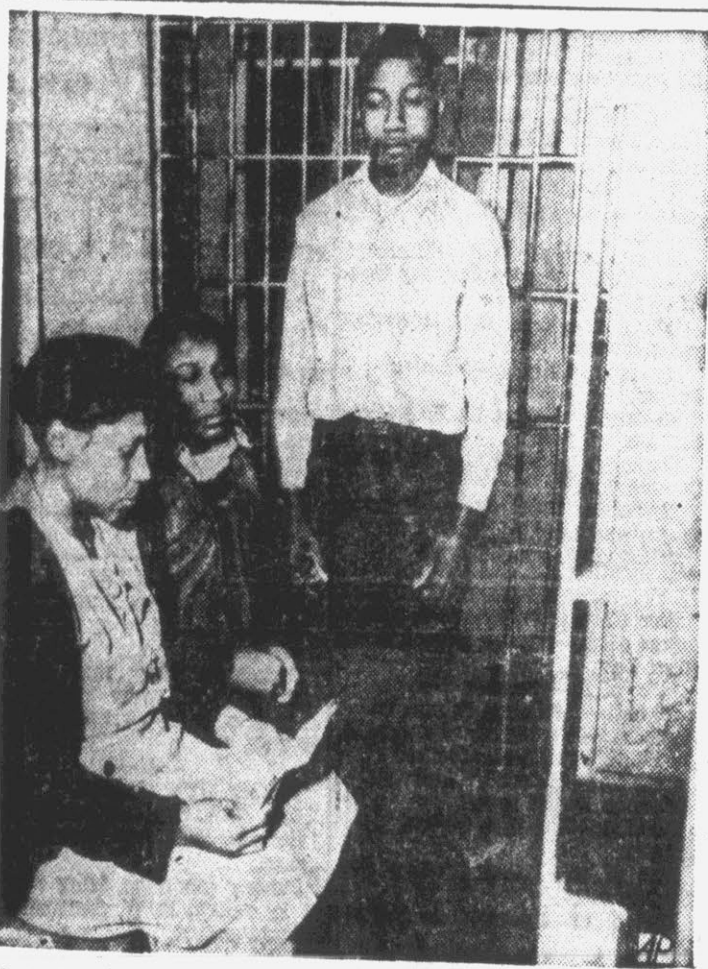
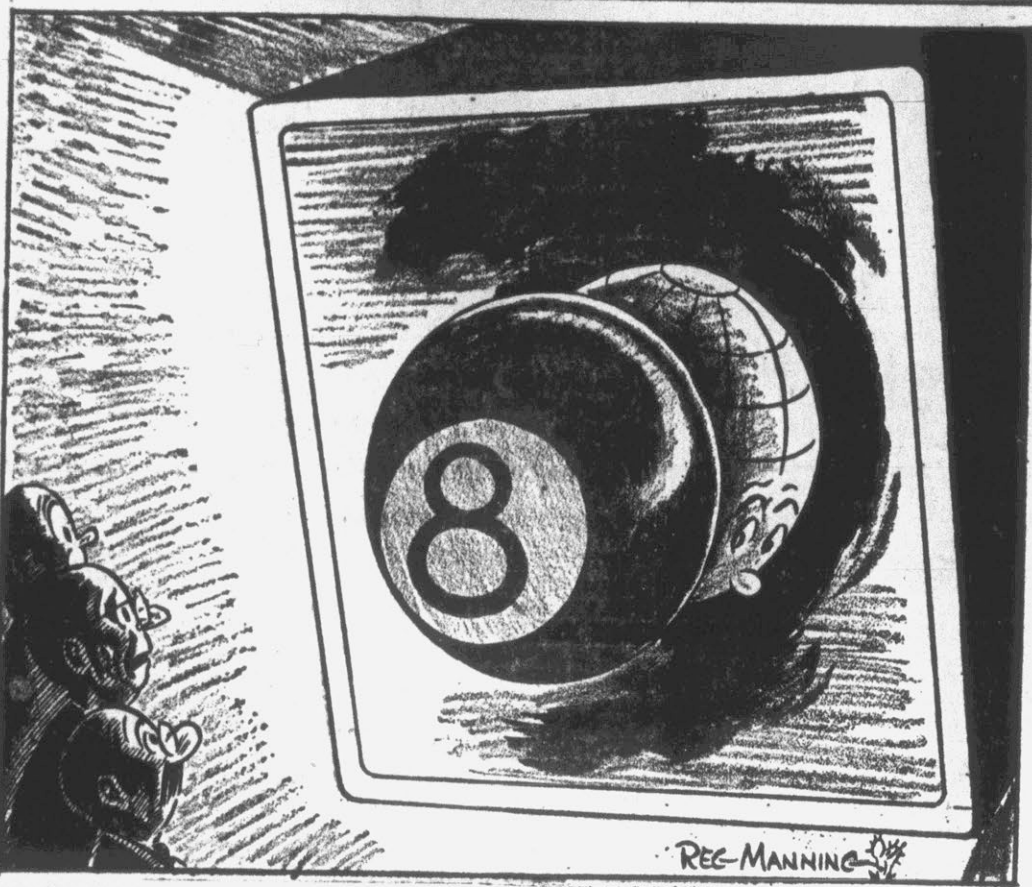
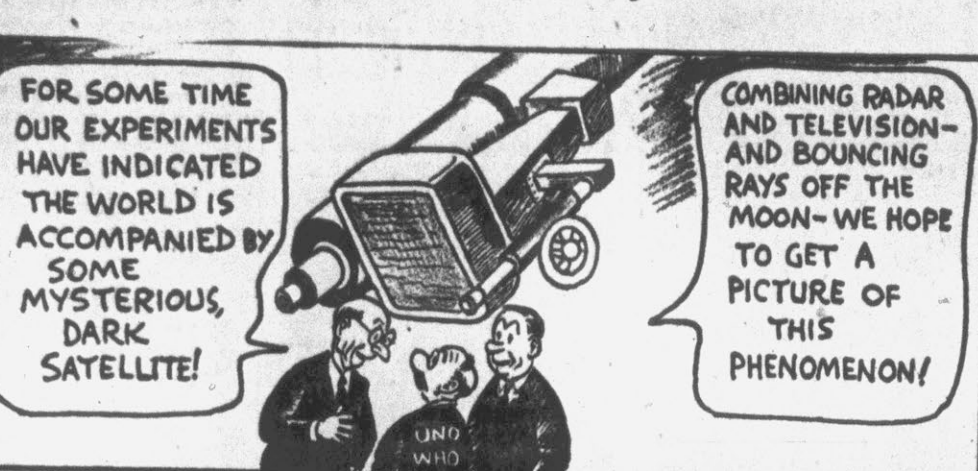
The story goes that the Danes came by their flag, a white cross on a red base, back in the Middle Ages when the mighty Danish king Valdemar the Victorious began his crusade against the heathen Estonians.

June 15, 1219, on the site where the city of Reval now stands, the Danes were thrown into confusion by the enemy. As they began their retreat, according to the tale, they saw a flag floating down from the heavens unfurling as it came over the troops. At the same moment the fortune of the Danes changed and the symbol in the skies thereafter was adopted as the motif for their flag.

He was also president of a trust company in Cincinnati, Ohio, and director of other banks. When he quit making shoes, he kept his bank directorships.

Meanwhile, he was a Democrat. Rumor said he was one of the "angels" of the Democratic party in Ohio. Then President Roosevelt and the "New Deal" came along in 1933. Mr. Roosevelt appointed Julian treasurer of the United States. But—

If he retired from business in 1923 and became treasurer in 1933, how old was he in 1933?

In 1933 friends guessed he was about 68 years old. Newspaper files don't show his age. The story of his life, but not his age, is in Who's Who in America.

Julian himself has been shy about talking of his age. One of his top assistants, asked about it, said:

"The only ones who know the answer to Mr. Julian's age are God and Mr. Julian. I should think he's in his late seventies."

But if he was 68 in 1933, he must be 83 now. Asked directly, Julian said: "I'm old enough to know better."

"Won't you tell, just for the record?"

"No. Why should I?"

Julian will get a vote for president of the United States when the Democratic delegates go to their national convention in Philadelphia in July to choose a presidential candidate.

The Ohio Democratic delegates are pledged to cast their first vote for Julian. After that they're free to vote for anyone else.

N.C. Republicans Also Opposing Truman Program

Sylvia, N. C., March 13—(P)—Some Western North Carolina Republicans—like a vast majority of Southern Democrats—feel that President Truman's Civil Rights program is an "invasion of States' rights."

GOP party members from 10 counties took such a stand yesterday in the 12th Congressional District convention here yesterday. A resolution adopted by the delegates condemned the President's civil rights program as "insincere" and "an effort to win the Negro votes in a few northern cities."

The District named William C. Meekins of Asheville and W. C. Hennessee of Sylvia as delegates to the GOP convention in Philadelphia next June.

Temperature To Rise Over Nation

Chicago, March 13—(P)—Fair weather with rising temperatures were indicated for most of the nation over the weekend, ending a cold snap for many areas.

Warm air from the Pacific moved into the central part of the country yesterday. It was expected to spread eastward today and with clearing skies day time temperatures were expected to climb to seasonal and above levels over the entire area.

Cold, however, lingered in some sections during the early morning hours today. The bulk of the frigid air had moved into eastern sections but the mercury also was below zero in several midwestern communities.

Parts of the South reported temperatures below normal. Freezing readings were reported in central and eastern Texas and within 100 miles of the Gulf coast in Louisiana and Mississippi.

The lowest temperature in the Midwest was -15 in Atlantic, Ia., but in nearby Omaha, Nebr., the minimum was 11 above. Low readings in the east included -14 in Binghamton, N. Y., and in Burlington, Vt.

The only precipitation on the weather map was rain in western Washington and Oregon and in northern and central California.

Raleigh, N.C., March 13—(AP)—A half-century or more of prison life has started for 16-year-old Tommy Lee Phillips, convicted Wednesday of slaying his parents.

Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Phillips were shot to death New Year's Eve. As he started for State Prison here yesterday to begin his 50- to 60-year sentence, the Winston-Salem boy said:

"All I want is another chance. I'm going down (to prison) with the hopes that I will get out some day and prove myself."

Republicans In North Carolina Grab Spotlight

Raleigh, N. C., March 13—(AP)—North Carolina's Republican party seldom a winner but ever a threat will grab the political spotlight in North Carolina next week.

The Republicans, who are holding their county and congressional district conventions now, will move into Durham Thursday for their state convention.

GOP leaders here predicted that the Republicans, heartened by their hopes of returning to power nationally next November, will enter a full slate of candidates in the various state races and that there may be a statewide primary to select the party's nominee for governor.

The Democrats, who already have generated lively campaigns for the Democratic nominations for governor and U. S. senator, will have their eyes on March 20—the date the state board of elections closes its books on filing of candidates for state office.

Several state officials and several congressmen who are unopposed thus far for the Democratic nominations are waiting anxiously for that date to pass. They know that the last week—often the last day for filing—usually produces some surprise candidates.

State officials who are without Democratic opposition so far include: State Auditor Henry L. Bridges, Attorney General Harry McMullan, Superintendent of Public Instruction Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, and Insurance Commissioner William P. Hodges.

Congressmen who so far have no opposition for the Democratic nomination are: Herbert C. Bonner, John H. Kerr, Graham A. Barden, Harold D. Cooley, Carl T. Durham, C. B. Deane, R. L. Doughton, Hamilton C. Jones, A. L. Bulwinkle, and Monroe M. Redden.

Republican sources predicted that the 26 delegates to the Republican National Convention would be uninstructed in the race for the party's presidential nominee. They added, however, that they believed two or three of the delegates would favor former Governor Harold Stassen of Minnesota and that the others would be about equally divided between Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Robert Taft of Ohio. Four of the delegates will be chosen at the state convention and the remainder at district conventions.

J. Ivan Bissette of Grifton, member of the Pitt County Federal Crop Insurance Board, introduced the speaker and said that he and H. K. James, district supervisor, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, Wilson, were there to answer any questions farmers wanted to ask.

Federal crop insurance is now available to seven counties in North Carolina. The federal corporation offers under annual contracts insurance of a major portion of the investment in producing fire-cured tobacco against loss in yield and quality, due to unavoidable causes, such as drought, frost, hail, wind, rain, flood, plant diseases and plant infestation. A federal crop insurance premium buys protection of most of the "out-of-pocket" costs of producing a crop of tobacco against the major production risks from transplanting through harvesting. It adds only a little to operating costs to insure against the production hazards which man cannot control. Crop insurance premiums are deductible as operating costs for income tax purposes.

Premiums paid by farmers are used only to pay losses to insured producers. Administration costs of the corporation are carried by the federal government as a service to farmers. "Crop insurance is a farmer's program with each insured paying a small amount for protection in order that none among them may suffer a disastrous loss," it was stated.

Tobacco crop insurance completed a three-year trial period in 1947, during which this crop protection was offered to growers in only 19 counties. Then legislation was

So far as one can foresee, the next great emergency which the democracies will have to meet in Europe will come with the Italian election in April. The Reds have made it quite clear that they intend to gain control of this strategic country by hook or by crook. They apparently hope that they may gain sufficient strength in the election to dominate the situation. However, there are many indications that they also are getting set to use strong arm methods if the voting goes against them.

Italy would provide the Communists with a powerful base for operations against the rest of Western Europe as well as against Greece and Turkey. By the same token obviously is essential to the defense of democracy being tightened in preparation for the expected Red political assault on the hard-hit Mediterranean nation.

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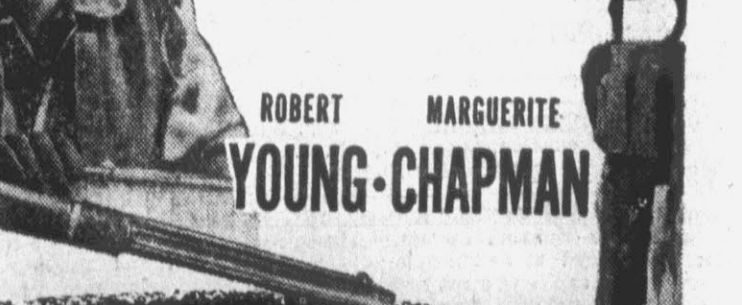
