

Concentration Camps Charged As Soviet Tool

Sharp Note From U.S. Accuses Smashing Of Political Foes With Terror

Washington, March 27—(AP)—The United States has charged Russia with smashing political opponents in eastern Germany by throwing them into concentration camps without trial.

In a sharp note to the Soviets last night, the State Department said Russian-backed political parties in the former enemy country are "the new bulwark for a totalitarian regime" and added:

"Concentration camps are being used anew for individuals unwilling to accept this totalitarianism." A diplomatic official, meanwhile, identified two of the camps as Buchenwald—where millions perished at Nazi hands during the war—and Oranienburg.

The American note was in answer to a Russian protest that the Western powers are splitting Germany—and Europe—in defiance of the Potsdam agreement.

Flatly rejecting that charge—as Britain did Thursday—the United States referred to moves it has taken with the British and French to achieve the "pacification of Germany and the economic recovery of Europe," and added:

"It is not these steps which have led to the political cleavage of Europe as claimed by the Soviet government, but rather prior actions of the Soviet government and a group of Eastern European states under Soviet influence."

Those actions, said the note, "have disrupted the normal framework of the European community and interfered with the progress of recovery from the effects of the war."

The American answer, signed by Assistant Secretary of State Norman Armour, was delivered Thursday to Russian Ambassador Alexander S. Panyushkin and released yesterday by the State Department.

It was prompted by a Russian protest last March 6 that U.S.-British-French discussions of Germany's future violated the Potsdam agreement, which provides for four-power rule of Germany.

No Negotiations Seeking Delay Of British Army

London, March 27—(AP)—The Foreign Office denied today negotiations are underway with the United States to delay departure of British troops from Palestine.

"I am able to confirm that there has been no approach, formal or informal, by the United States with a view to retarding our departure," a spokesman said.

Michael McPhee, State Department press officer, said in Washington he knows of no basis for London newspaper reports that the United States intends to ask Britain to stay on in the Holy Land.

Propose Treaty End Censorship

Geneva, Switzerland, March 27—(AP)—The United States today proposed an international treaty to abolish censorship and protect the rights of foreign correspondents.

The 16-article draft convention was submitted to the United Nations conference on freedom of information by the American delegation.

It proposed that all acceding nations grant equal facilities to each other's news and correspondents and refrain from any censorship other than "regulations relating directly to the maintenance of national military security."

ABC On Rent Control

The Second Of Two Stories On The New Rent Control Bill Which Is Expected To Become Law By April 1; What It Does; Conditions Attached; Rent Increases

Washington, March 27—(AP)—Here's an ABC on rent controls in this country after April 1.

A rent control bill was passed by Congress two days ago. President Truman almost certainly will sign it into law by April 1.

Then it will control rents for the 12 months between April 1, 1948, and March 31, 1949. It will be treated in this story as if it already were law.

Can a landlord raise your rent in those 12 months? No, except under these conditions:

1. You voluntarily agree to an increase but when you do agree you sign a lease. The landlord can't force you to agree or to sign a lease.
2. The area rent control director permits the landlord to raise your rental. If this happens, the director will tell you so in writing.
3. The government has approved a rent increase for the general area in which you live.

But—if you agree to a rent raise in exchange for a lease—then remember these two things because they're important to you:

1. The rent increase must not be more than 15 per cent above the rent the landlord got for your living quarters on June 30, 1947.

Lewis Forces Delay In Effort End Coal Strike

Brings Presidential Inquiry Board To Standstill By Failure To Appear At First Meeting; Must Appear Monday

Washington, March 27—(AP)—John L. Lewis forced a 72 hour delay today in government efforts to bring the soft coal strike to a speedy end.

He brought President Truman's special inquiry board to a standstill by failing to appear at its first hearings yesterday.

The three fact finders finished hearing the coal operators' side of the minor pension dispute in less than two hours.

When the United Mine Workers' chief didn't show up, the board recessed until Monday. The bushy-browed Lewis was given until then (10 a.m. EST) to decide if he will appear voluntarily. Otherwise the board could force him by getting a court order.

Lewis stayed away, he informed the board, to study "legal questions involved." But his absence threw a monkey-wrench into board plans to work steadily through the Easter weekend to speed a report to President Truman.

That report must be in Mr. Truman's hands before he can seek a court order to halt the walkout under terms of the Taft-Hartley Act.

Meanwhile the strike, nearing the end of its second week, was paralyzing industry. Secretary of the Interior Krug appealed to the few coal mines still operating to dole their production only to essential consumers. And Krug asked everyone to help save coal.

He estimated that three more days of the strike will affect 18 percent of the electric power utilities, 25 percent of the steel and rolling mills, 27 percent of the major railroads and 72 percent of the retail coal yards.

Coal burning freight and passenger service already has been cut 25 percent by government order.

New Refusal By Eisenhower Seen

General Reportedly No More 'Available' For Democrats

Washington, March 27—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was being pushed into a new political corner today by anti-Truman Democrats who want him as their party's presidential candidate.

The general, who froze a GOP draft-like drive last January, is reported to have told friends in the last few days he is no more available for the Democratic nomination than he was for the Republican post.

But this may not be enough to head off a new movement that had all the signs of an organized drive.

If it isn't, Eisenhower's friends predict the retired Army Chief of Staff will make another statement.

The general didn't leave much room for doubt about his position in January. He said the "decision to remove myself completely from the political scene is definite and positive."

When he said he "could not accept" a nomination, he did not specify party, it was pointed out. There are some indications that Eisenhower's views about the Democratic nomination may have been passed along to President Truman.

It was directly against the President that the latest converts to the draft-like movement aimed their arrows. These came from two sons of the late President Roosevelt, Franklin D. Jr., and Elliott.

Recommend Hike In Wages For Rail Brotherhood

Washington, March 27—(AP)—A presidential emergency board recommended today that locomotive engineers, firemen and switchmen should get a wage raise of 15 to 20 cents an hour, retroactive to last November 1.

The railway labor act requires the three brotherhoods to keep working for 30 days. After April 26 they will be free to strike if they want to.

The board, headed by William M. Leiserson, made its report today to President Truman.

Besides the wages, the dispute involved 37 proposed changes in working rules.

The brotherhoods had demanded a 30 percent wage boost with a \$3 per man daily minimum.

Farmers Advised Plant Cotton To Decrease Losses

Clinton, March 26—(AP)—North Carolina farmers were advised last night to plant cotton to make up for income losses that will be caused by the 28 per cent cut in tobacco acreage.

Commissioner of Agriculture D. S. Coltrane told the Sampson County Pomona Grange that "the prices for the 1948 cotton crop are to be supported by the government at 92 and one-half per cent of parity."

The agriculture commissioner declared that the larger farmers that hire a lot of help "should plant as much cotton as they can handle with available labor" and added that "family-size farms that have enough workers may find that it pays to put in more cotton."

Czech Reds Will Ignore Demands For Explanation

Gov't Spokesman Says Regime Views February Coup As Internal Affair

Lake Success, March 27—(AP)—The Czechoslovak Communist government will ignore a United States demand for an explanation of its rise to complete power, a spokesman said today.

He said the new regime takes the position that the coup last month was an internal affair and the United Nations had no business investigating. The spokesman for Delegate Vladimir Houdek added that the American demand that Prague and Moscow lay their cards on the Security Council table does not alter the situation. Houdek has refused to take part in the debate.

Neither were there any indications here that Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko would be prodded into doing any explaining. Instead Gromyko is expected to keep counter-charging that the U.S. is interfering in Italy and Greece.

These developments put the next move up to the western powers. Council debate resumes Wednesday.

So far Britain has said the spread of Communism must be stopped even at the risk of war. The U.S. has demanded Czech and Russian explanations. France has expressed the belief that President Eduard Benes is a prisoner of the Communists.

A Prague announcement last night said President Benes will make a public statement April 7 in presenting a grant to Charles University, which will be celebrating its 600th year.

The announcement said the statement will be non-political. Benes has not spoken in public since a Czech legionnaires' meeting last November.

U.N. observers admitted the council would have difficulty making a decision after hearing only one side of the Czechoslovak case.

The United States may move for a U.N. investigating commission to be sent into Czechoslovakia to get facts and evidence. This would raise the question whether the Communist regime would allow the commission inside Czechoslovakia.

Doctor Honored For Her Services

Tribute Paid Dr. Maline Irons For Aiding Underprivileged

Last night was "Dr. Maline Irons Night" at the Greenville Kiwanis Club's weekly supper meeting when the service club paid tribute to the public-spirited woman physician and specialist in children's diseases. Vice President Arthur Tripp presided.

The 75 or 80 Kiwanians gave her a rising vote of thanks and appreciation for her interest and cooperation in her underprivileged child work and her generosity in contributing her time and skill. It was all a surprise to the Good Samaritan.

Dr. C. F. Irons, Dr. Maline's husband and a Rotarian, was at the meeting, and in his presence Past President Ed Bloom made her an honorary member of the Kiwanis Club.

Bloom was eloquent in his tribute to the woman physician for her generous service to underprivileged children. In presenting this loving cup, Dr. Maline Irons, may we offer it as a gift from all of the underprivileged children of the community and as a token of our love and esteem." Babson Discusses Marshall Plan

Washington, D. C., March 27—People ask me, "As a businessman, what do you think the Marshall Plan would mean to American business?" The answer I should like to make is, "As a man, what do you think the Plan would mean to humanity?"

I have read letters to various newspapers written by supposedly intelligent people. They refer to the Marshall Plan as "Operation Rat Hole" and say, "we will be pouring our millions down the drain." The suggestion is that the project is hopeless from the start. The writers imply that they would rather keep tight hold of their cash than to give it away.

The same people have the impression that the Plan is merely an over-sized charity. They fear that we would ship overseas the food which we ourselves might need and would send to Europe money which we could spend at home. Even if this were true, could we, as the world's richest country and as a Christian community wholly refuse to share?

What Is The Marshall Plan? Most of the arguments against the Marshall Plan have been advanced by people who seem to have little idea what it means. The Marshall Plan is a program for the investment of money and goods, not for Europe's relief, but for her recovery. At present, Europe is nearly helpless because she lacks such essentials as food, fertilizer, coal, steel, and transportation. These were destroyed or used up by the war. They can now be replaced—but not without our help. You, yourself, could not plant a garden if you had neither spade, fertilizer, nor seed. You couldn't start a trucking business without a truck, gasoline, or money. Nor can Europe.

What the Marshall Plan proposes to provide is the capital for refinancing an old business. That some of the capital will be in the form of wheat does not alter the case. European laborers cannot now produce to capacity because they are hungry. When they have full stomachs and are able to work, and when they have tools to work with, there will be coal to run the factories to produce the steel from which to build the tractors to plow the gardens to feed the workers.

More Control On Exports For Russia Demanded In Congress

Washington, March 27—(AP)—An administration clamp-down on exports of war goods to Russia failed today to stifle demands in Congress for extra padlocks.

Rep. Mundt (R-S.D.) said he intends to go right ahead with an amendment to the \$6,206,000,000 House foreign aid bill which would give the director of the European recovery program veto power over "war potential" exports.

And Chairman Rixley (R-Okla.) said his House expenditures subcommittee is going to dig deeper into the disposal of World War II surplus supplies to the Soviets.

Committee investigators, he told a reporter, are going to New York to check goods being loaded onto Russia-bound ships. He said they also will look into reports that speculators are selling export licenses.

And Chairman Shafer (R-Mich.) of a House armed services subcommittee said Commerce Department officials will be quizzed next week on shipments to the U.S.S.R.

For months congressional committees have been digging up information about oil and ships—and, in the last few days, airplane engines—Russia has been getting from this country.

President Truman stepped into the export dispute yesterday. He issued a proclamation tightening controls, particularly on exports of plane engines and radar equipment.

Following that move—1. Secretary of Commerce Harrison told a news conference Russia and her satellites are getting no exports except those the Army and Navy approve.

2. The War Assets Administration said it is delaying for at least 80 days taking Finland's high bid of \$1,666,000 for 46 unused steam locomotives. Finland and Russia are talking over a military treaty, but WAA didn't mention that, or any other reason for its action.

Harrison said the new policy on shipments to Russia has been in effect since March 1. He said the idea is to keep Russia and the satellites from getting U. S. goods that might build up their "war potential."

Merchant Ships Given To Italy

Twenty-Nine Vessels Officially Turned Over In Wilmington

Wilmington, N. C., March 27—(AP)—The 29 merchant ships that President Truman ordered transferred to the Italian government were officially turned over to representatives of the Italian embassy at ceremonies here today.

The ceremonies were on board the Ft. Kootenay, which was renamed the Italian steamship Mangiola. Present were representatives of the Italian embassy, the State Department and the Maritime Commission.

President Truman ordered the transfer March 16. He acted under Congressional authority to return or replace all Italian ships seized by the United States during the war.

It was a "Harry coincidence" that the negotiations for the transfer were completed just before the Italian elections on April 18.

Italian sailors and workmen are continuing repairs on the vessels. The first is expected to be ready to sail at the end of the month. The Merchant ships are at the maritime commission's layup basin here. Fourteen are seized Italian vessels, and 15 are Liberty ship replacements for Italian bottoms lost or worn out after seizure.

Russian Press Says Norwegians Are 'Selling Out'

Moscow, March 27—(AP)—The government newspaper Izvestia said today that Norwegian government rightists are "selling out Norway to the United States."

"The Marshall Plan holds nothing good for Norway except that it endangers her independence and is fraught with her complete subjugation to foreign imperialists," Izvestia said.

(Russian organs attacked Finnish non-Communists before Prime Minister Stalin asked Finland for a treaty of cooperation, now being discussed. Norway has a common frontier with Soviet Russia under the Finnish peace treaty, and there has been speculation that Russia might demand a mutual aid pact from Oslo.)

Trieste, March 27—(AP)—The U. S. light cruiser Manchester arrived today shortly after sailing the Dayton which had been here for 10 days. U. S. Cruisers have been visiting Trieste periodically for the last two months, usually staying ten days.

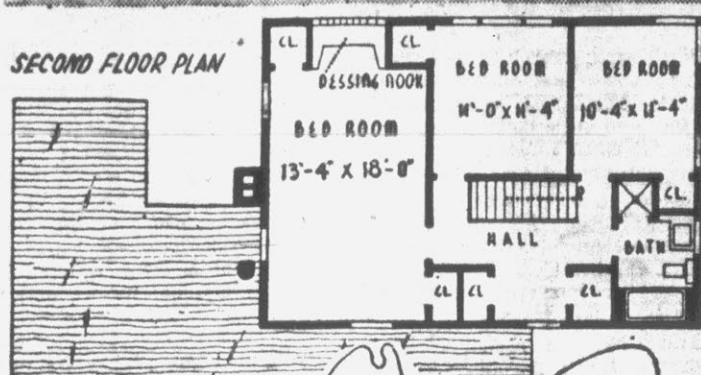

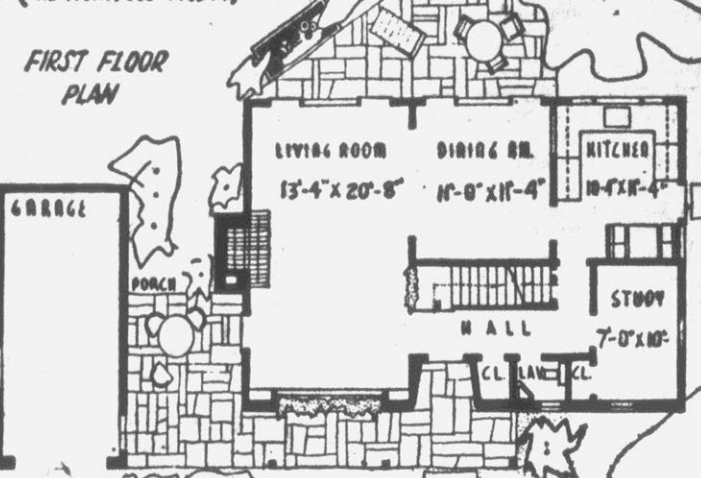

New Hardwood Flooring Helps Modernize Home

The acute housing shortage, according to builders, has stimulated tremendously the remodeling and modernization of old houses. Unable to buy or build new homes, thousands of families have been forced by necessity to purchase old ones that did not meet their needs or desires. Many of these families, however, have found that a sturdily built dwelling of ancient vintage often can be transformed into a modern comfortable home at only a fraction of the cost of a new building.

Often, of course, the interior calls for rather extensive remodeling to bring it up to date. One of the most important features to consider, building say, is the flooring. Besides receiving heavy wear, floors are among the most conspicuous parts of a house and have a great deal to do with overall attractiveness.

If the floors are of oak, they usually can be refinished to look regardless of their age. In many instances, however, the floor may be of such quality and condition that repair would be a poor investment. Under such circumstances it is advisable to install new flooring. Building experts point out that new flooring of oak or other hardwoods may be laid directly over the old. Properly maintained, it will last the life of the building.

Incidentally, the installation of new oak floors can play a prominent part in giving a house the desired new look. For example, modern styling calls for elimination of interior thresholds; so the new oak flooring should be laid flush through doorways. This feature in itself adds a note of modernity which helps distinguish the up-to-date home.

Ordinarily it is preferable to lay the new flooring at right angles to the existing floor, which serves as

a subfloor. It is unnecessary to use the thick size oak flooring customarily employed in new construction. The thinner size, which is more economical, provides sufficient strength when the old flooring is structurally sound. Home owners are advised against tackling the installation task, since it requires special skill. An experienced floor technician, however, can do the job quickly.

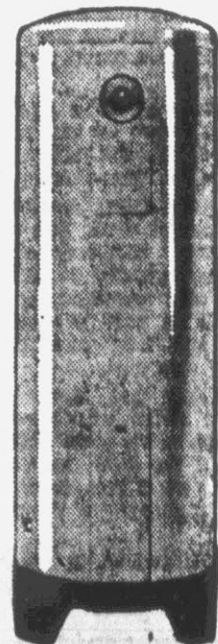

Nearly Score Die In Spring Storms

Chicago, March 27—(AP)—Early spring tornadoes and thunderstorms ripped across parts of the central and southern sections of the nation yesterday, killing nearly a score of persons.

The tornadoic gales which struck west central Indiana, parts of Missouri and Illinois and Alabama were the third to sweep over the country's mid-section within a week. The death toll from the twisters and storms was about 75. More than 40 died in last week's tornadoes while 13 lost their lives in the gales which hit Oklahoma Thursday.

Yesterday's twisters left their biggest path of destruction in west central Indiana. The known dead was 14. The American Red Cross said the death toll was 15. Scores were injured. Buildings in several communities were demolished.

Two persons lost their lives and scores were hurt when a tornado struck twice at Alieville, Ala., near the Alabama-Mississippi line.

Another twister swept over an area along the Mississippi River near the Missouri-Illinois line at St. Charles, Mo.

A mother and her two sons were killed near Paris, Ill., near the storm area, in an automobile-truck collision during a driving hail storm.

Complete Plans Cherokee Drama

Cherokee, N. C., March 26—(AP)—Plans were complete here yesterday for construction of facilities for presentation of a drama depicting the life of Cherokee Indians and early white settlers in the Great Smoky Mountains.

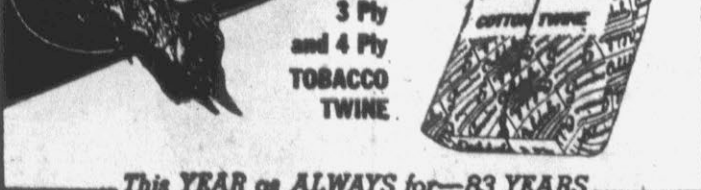

has been estimated as its cost? Can
we ship overseas seven or eight
percent of the food we raise? Can
we aggravate present shortages by
sending steel, fertilizer, railway cars,
and other necessities to Europe?

coal? Can we spare any?
The answer is that we can afford
the Marshall Plan because we can-
not afford to reject it. What the
program will cost us has only been
estimated, but what its rejection
would cost can scarcely be imag-
ined. There is, of course, no guaran-
tee that this plan will save Europe;
but without it Western Europe will
go down into chaos and Communism.
We cannot live alone in the world.
We must not give Europe over to
the other camp. For the sake of our
way of life, for the sake of the in-
stitutions which mean most to us,
for the sake of our business and
our future, we cannot refuse to
make the attempt.

Conclusion
As a businessman, then, I think
that the Marshall Plan is a good
gamble and, what is more, I think
that the alternative is a poor gam-
ble. But one thing I insist on. Let's
see that after the countries of Eu-
rope receive our aid, they get busy
and produce. Production is the only
lasting solution to their problems
or to our problems either.

Injury Jinx Has Cards' Infielder Marion Worried

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 27 — (AP)—Marty (Mr. Shortstop) Marion fears an injury jinx that helped prevent the St. Louis Cardinals from repeating as National champions last year, may end his baseball career.

Marion's left knee, which he hurt in a slide last year, is acting up again, and caused him to leave the training field yesterday with the remark that he didn't expect to play ball again unless the trouble is corrected.

"I'm really worried," the 30-year-old veteran of eight seasons with the Cardinals declared. "I tried to lean forward for a ground ball and felt right on my face. I can't imagine what it is."

Recent X-ray photographs showed no bone injury. Marion thought the trouble might be a bad cartilage, but Doc Weaver, club trainer, told him he could find no sign of such a thing.

"In ordinary walking it does not bother me," Marion said, "but when I try to walk up steps or to put pressure on my knee to one side or the other, or try to bend down on it, I know there's something wrong. As long as it's in that condition I can't play baseball."

Manager Eddie Dyer was a little more optimistic. He said Dr. Robert F. Hyland, club surgeon, has expressed belief there was nothing seriously wrong and had advised further heat treatment.

Hyland is due here Monday and is expected to give the shortstop another examination.

Marion, regarded as one of the greatest shortstops ever produced, is also a powerful hitter. He batted 272 last season and drove in 74 runs. His loss to the team for any considerable time would be a severe blow to Cardinal pennant chances.

Injuries and illness among key players last year caused the Cardinals to be left at the post and prevented them from overtaking the Brooklyn Dodgers in spite of a fine mid-season comeback.

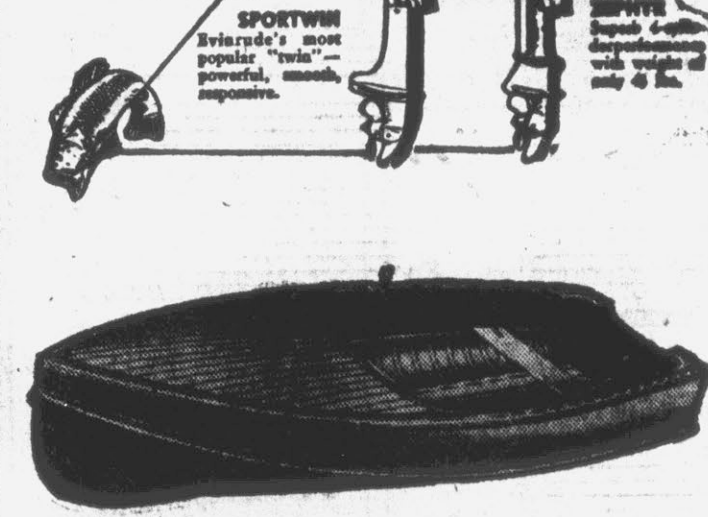
