Baby Beef Show

Pitt County 4-H Club members will show and sell five baby beef calves, which were well with cattle produced in the mid-west at the Rocky Mount Fat Stock Show and Sale on March 31 and April 1.

In a project of this nature, 4-H Club members put the calves and hogs on feed in the fall of the year, feeding grain to top out the cattle by April 1, when the show is held. These calves will grade "good" and "choice," and constitute some of the best beef sold in North Carolina each year, W. H. (Bill) Pruden, assistant and county farm agent, said.

"This year our county has five baby beef calves and 11 fat hogs to be shown. The Greenville Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club are sending buyers to the sale at Rocky Mount on Thursday of this week at 1 o'clock. These service organizations through purchasing calves grown by 4-H Club members, are encouraging the youth of Pitt county to grow more livestock of better grade.

Other local business interests and individuals will be at the sale to purchase cattle sold from this county," Pruden said.

Club members showing calves are Milton Spain, Kenneth Randolph and Robert Thomas, of the Belvoir 4-H Club; Sigbe Dilda, of the Fountain 4-H Club, and Curtis Lee of the Pactolus 4-H Club. PAY ATTENTION TO MESSAGES

Colonel Robt. the Hessian commander at Trenton on Christmas night, 1776, was playing cards and drinking when an urgent note, telling of the approach of American troops, was thrust into his hands. He took no time even to read the message but put it into his pocket and went on with the game. The note was read to him the next day as he lay dying. Washington stood beside his cot, and with tears in his eyes the poor graceless fellow whose indifference and self-indulgence had cost the life of many soldiers and the cause of the Revolution, told him the message. He had lost the opportunity, and through his neglect world history made a sharp turn in a new direction.

Those who do any thinking remember how often this same variety of folly has seized them and caused them to make fools of themselves. The great opportunity once past, never returns. There are messages coming to us all the time—some from friends, others in the wise counsel of loved ones, others through the hard tuition of experience. The word of God is the perfect message—no, not the perfect message; the perfect message was the Word made flesh who dwelt among us, full of grace and truth.

POLITICS ON THE REPUBLICAN FRONT

As the Republican candidate for the GOP presidential nomination step up the tempo of their campaigns, there are some fascinating conclusions which are open to the political observer.

The reluctance of announced hopefuls to oppose Governor Earl Warren of California, in that state's selection of the man whom their delegation will support, is especially meaningful to us.

In avoiding this test of strength, the Republican party's front runners are insuring powerful backing of Warren; which though far from sufficient to win for

him the party's nomination for the presidency, could landslide him into the vice presidential race.

Warren's popularity with Republicans and Democrats is phenomenal in the states on the Pacific Coast. Though it is too early to make predictions, the manner in which the Republican leaders are handling the Californian does appear to have all the indications of preparing him for the vice presidential nomination.

As for the principal Republican presidential aspirants, the big test appears to be between Dewey and Taft. Stassen is regarded in some quarters as not yet being politically mature. General MacArthur is still a question-mark, for his drawing-power has yet to be demonstrated. His silence on political issues to date has handicapped his supporters.

The dark horse in the Republican line-up is Senator Arthur Vandenberg.

Despite the senator's refusal to become an active candidate, his following has been growing. Vandenberg has always been popular among his colleagues, and his handling of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has stamped him as a statesman; a quality which has not been too evident in Senator

Taft or Governor Dewey.

With the growing importance of America's place in world affairs, Vandenberg's experience in this field may well prove to be the ace-in-the-hole which would give him the nomination should the Taft-Dewey contest result in deadlock.

It is significant that in the minds of many Democrats a Vandenberg-Warren ticket is considered to be the strongest combination the Republican party could put into the field.

Farm Equipment Dealers Condemn Grey Marketeers

The Board of Directors of the Carolina Farm Equipment Dealers' Association, in executive session, on March 1st, 1948, in a called meeting for the consideration of matters affecting Association interests, among other subjects, discussed the demoralization resulting from the grey market operations in farm equipment.

Grey Market operations in farm equipment being defined as selling used farm equipment at or above the usual and regular retail delivered price of such equipment when new.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Board of Directors of this organization, such practices are inimical to the best interests of the farmers who are the customers of the members of this Association and are contrary to the best interests of the retail farm equipment industry; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Carolina Farm Equipment Dealers' Association regrets that such practices have been engaged in by dealers in farm equipment and declares that in the judgment of its Executive Board such practices are demoralizing, unethical, and if persisted in, will bring disrepute upon the retail farm equipment industry generally; and the Board is of the further opinion that dealers worthy of the confidence of their customers should discourage such practices wherever they may be prevalent.

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range for the proper size of seed plates, says Dr. R. P. Moore, head of the North Carolina Crop Improvement Association.

Corn hybrids, he said, are sold by grades which may require special seed plates. Since high yields require good stands, special attention must be given to the selection of the proper plates.

Many farmers report the calls of either old or new plates in order to get an accurate seed-drop. When checking the correctness of seed plates, he added, the farmer should adjust the cell sizes so that the largest kernels of corn present will be planted without difficulty. If this adjustment is made one smaller kernel in the grade will likely cause no trouble, especially in well-graded lots of corn.

"Luck is not a substitute for the proper plates, nor is it a good farming partner," Dr. Moore declared. "Many seed manufacturers are willing to help farmers select the proper seed plates upon request. Farmers, however, must be willing to help themselves. If a good stand is not dropped, don't expect a good stand to come up."

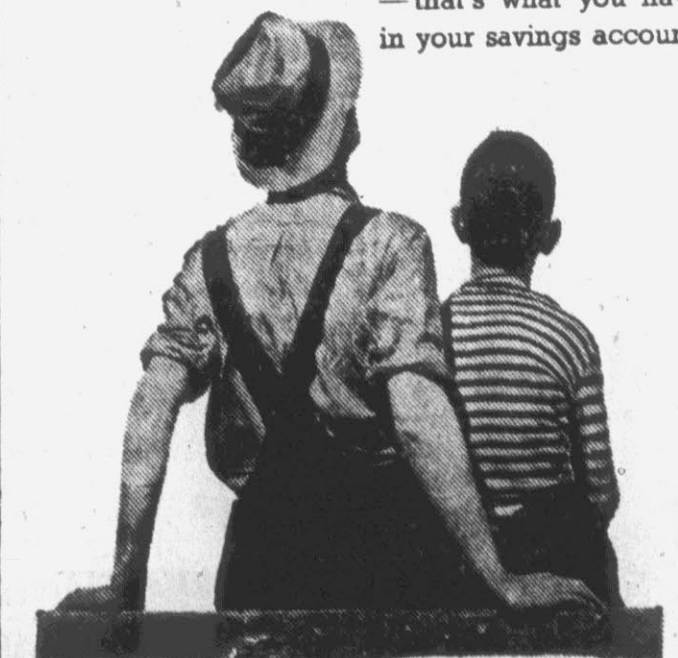

slightly more, that doesn't happen
percent and the government's in-
terest costs stay down.

This is important for a lot of
reasons. One is that keeping inter-
est rates down on government bonds
tends to keep interest rates low for
corporations issuing bonds, and for
other borrowers.

Some people think it is a mistake
for the Federal Reserve banks to
hold down government interest
rates and thereby other interest
rates.

They say making it cheap to bor-
row promotes borrowing and there-
fore adds to inflation, reflected in
high prices, which the government
says it is combating in other ways.

They take the position that one
of the best tried and true ways of
stopping inflation is to cut down
borrowing by letting it become more
costly.

The Federal Reserve System and
the administration, however, say
that interest on the \$253,000,000
debt already accounts for 13 cents
of each dollar the government
spends, and that paying more would
increase the tax burden.

which condemns belief in God as
the hope of the proletariat.

Pope Pius on March 10 placed his
personal and official prestige behind
prelates and bishops who had been
telling Italian Catholics to vote for
candidates friendly to the church.

He did this in a Lenten address in
which he said that Catholics must
vote for candidates who stand "for
safeguarding the rights of God and
of souls, for the true good of in-
dividuals."

Then a few days ago Eugene
Cardinal Tisserant came out with
a sharp pre-election attack on Com-
munists, in a message to priests and
parishioners in his archdiocese in
Rome's environs. The cardinal de-
clared:

"I think that no menace as grave
as atheistic Communism has ever
confronted Christian civilization."

The prelate added that Catholics
who favor Communism "cannot ask
of priests to be admitted to holy
sacraments, to have the ritual bless-
ing of the church, to belong to Cath-
olic action x x x and after death
cannot have Christian services, nor
be buried in holy ground under the
sign of the cross."

Close to 100 percent of all Italians
are Catholics. Now the big question
is how they will react to this edict.
We shall have our answer in about
three weeks.

Literary Purge In Philadelphia

Philadelphia, March 29.—(AP)—James T. Farrell's 12-year-old novel "A World I Never Made," has been placed on the Philadelphia Police blacklist, Assistant District Attorney James W. Tracey, Jr., said yesterday. Tracey said the book is obscene under the law, adding that a recommendation was made that the city solicitor prosecute any sellers. "I wouldn't want to have it around my household," Tracey said, "where young people could get hold of it." Meanwhile, a meeting of booksellers was called to draft a plan to counter the city's action.

The author's league of America and the American Booksellers' Association have joined local booksellers and other industries, including Perrell himself, in denouncing the blacklist action and recent seizures of books by members of the Philadelphia Vice squad.

Tracey said the recent seizures included copies of Farrell's "Studs Lonigan," and "Rainbow County," by late Ross Lockridge, Jr.

The seizures were made by detectives under Inspector Craig Ellis without warrants from bookshops under a state law permitting on-the-spot confiscation of literature considered by police to be obscene.

Graves Robbed Of Flowers At Easter Season

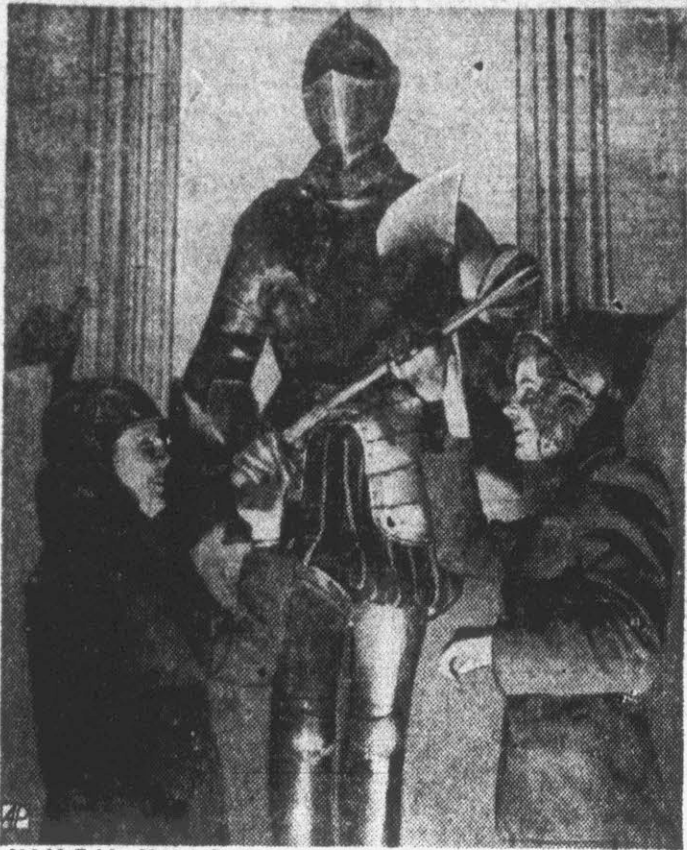

Vandals pillaged graves in Greenwood Cemetery Easter Sunday of flowers placed there and otherwise desecrated the sacred precincts of the dead, owners of plots in the cemetery reported today. The marauders dug up hyacinths, pulled up pansy plants, dug up bulbs, stole flowers from vases and other receptacles and potted plants placed there by members of families whose dead are buried in Greenwood. Similar acts of vandalism have been reported there for three successive years.

Mrs. Leon Smith said she placed flowers on her husband's grave early Saturday morning for Easter, and when Sunday came vandals had stolen them for the third successive year. The graveyard desecrators were reported to have pillaged Mrs. Walter C. Johnson's grave and dug up bulbs and flowers there.

Owners of lots in Greenwood Cemetery have frequently complained of small boys, apparently 10 to 14 years old, making a playground of the cemetery and damaging and removing flowers from graves.

Fatal Ending Chicken-Killing Dog Here Today

Hutch Ward, who lives at 910 Evans Street, reported to police today that early this morning a dog broke into his chicken house and killed three hens, weighing about seven pounds each. The owner of the chickens dispatched the trespassing dog in an appropriate manner. He killed it with a piece of pipe.

Frequent complaints are made to police about prowling dogs killing chickens on people's premises and damaging gardens on private property. The canines are now roving the streets and private premises in apparently increasing numbers. Householders complain of prowling dogs overturning garbage cans, littering the ground with the contents. Others complain of neighbors who own dogs which bark at nearly every sound—night and day—and make life miserable for light sleepers and the sick.

Public sentiment here favors the city making some kind of a law about dogs running at large and enforcing it. People suggest that the city administration should provide a dog pound, hire a dog catcher, and dispose of the unclaimed canines.

It was pointed out today that with the approach of warm weather the danger of being bitten by a dog with hydrophobia increases. Dog owners who really care for their pets feed them, look after them and have them inoculated against rabies.
