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Preparing Curbs For U. C. Reds; Expect Approval

Writing Of Legislation Starts Wednesday; See Speedy Action By House

Washington, April 10 — (AP) — A plan to crush the "hard core" of the American Communist party was being whipped into shape today for congressional action.

The House Un-American Activities Committee will start writing it into a bill Wednesday. And Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.), one of the plan's authors, predicted speedy and overwhelming House approval.

The plan, drafted by a subcommittee which Nixon heads, is aimed at making Communist party leaders subject to criminal prosecution on conspiracy charges.

Nixon said he expects it to get "high priority" from House leaders. "This legislative program," Nixon told reporters, "is as vital to the security of the country as the European recovery program and the military defense recommendations of the President."

"The other two without this would leave a fatal defect in our national security."

Nixon said that, under the plan, if the Communist party were found to be "conspiring," William Z. Foster could be prosecuted as its leader. Top penalty upon conviction would be a \$10,000 fine and 10 years in jail.

The subcommittee, headed by the 1940 Smith act, makes it illegal to conspire knowingly or willfully to overthrow the government by force and violence.

As amended by Nixon's group, the act would make it illegal to advocate overthrowing the government by any means "for the purpose of subverting the interests of the U. S. to that of a foreign Communist power."

The program also would attack conspiracies to disrupt trade, commerce or government in this country to further the objectives of the world Communist movement.

It would not outlaw the Communist party or its members. Nor would it forbid any legal political activity of the party.

New Bargaining Session In Coal Mine Walkouts

Washington, April 10 — (AP) — The government surveyed fuel stocks at electric power plants today as union officials and operators got set for another effort to settle the 27-day-old nationwide coal strike.

The survey, which might lead to an appeal soon for power curtailment, came with John L. Lewis and the mine owners still far apart on their pension dispute.

Both sides sent negotiators into a fresh bargaining session (10 a.m. EST). But Lewis, staying away from these meetings himself, forecast a fruitless effort.

The government based its strike-end hopes on a court summons for Lewis to show cause Monday why he shouldn't be punished for contempt for failing to obey a week-old order to send his 400,000 idle miners back to work.

Communist Problem

Handling Reds At Home Is Quite A Job According To House Un-American Activities Committee; Laws Recommended; Still Enjoy Protection Of U. S. Constitution

Washington, April 10 — (AP) — At a time when this country is alarmed by Communism abroad, handling it here seems quite a job. This is made plain in a report by the House Un-American Activities Committee.

The committee has recommended that the full Congress pass a number of laws to block Communists and Communism here.

Can the Communist party be outlawed in this country? That was the first problem the committee faced. It decided this couldn't be done without violating the constitutional right of free speech. And there was the future to think of.

Suppose Congress outlawed the Communist party today and the Supreme Court said this was constitutional. Then tomorrow couldn't the Republicans say, if they controlled Congress, pass a law outlawing the Democratic party or any other political party?

If they could, then they'd be able to set up the Republican party as the only one in this country. And that would mean a dictatorship. Or the Democrats could do the same.

After thinking this one over, the committee said: "We cannot run the risk of infringing upon the freedom of all our people in order to curb the Communists who seek to destroy our form of government."

Defense Bills Get Priority For Action In Senate And In House

Washington, April 10 — (AP) — Defense bills had the right of way on both sides of the capital today.

The main drive in Congress was aimed at building up the nation's air power, with the first step set for early next week.

Other defense moves were due to follow swiftly. This was the situation:

1. The House Appropriations Committee rushed to complete hearings on a \$725,000,000 (M) air force money bill. And expected to have it on the floor for debate by Wednesday.

2. A draft bill which would boost the air force 157,500 men above its present strength, and 102,000 over Administration requests, was made public yesterday by Chairman Andrews of the House armed services committee. Open hearings on it will start Monday.

3. Republican leaders in the Senate announced that military legislation will go ahead of everything else on their calendar.

4. Chairman Gurney (R-SD) of the Senate Armed Services Committee estimated the combined first-year cost of a draft and universal military training at \$700,000,000 (M). This would be in addition to the \$14,000,000,000 defense outlay asked by the President. His committee will continue closed sessions on combined draft-UMT legislation Monday.

The bill sponsored by Andrews would give President Truman power to order a draft whenever he thought necessary. It would set a manpower ceiling of 1,944,000 on the armed forces, and give them until July 1, 1950, to reach it.

No man could be drafted within 60 days after the law goes on the books. Even then there would be no calls until the President de-

cided the men could not be obtained through voluntary enlistments.

However, Andrews said he does not think the services could get enough volunteers to reach the strength his bill calls for. He predicted that early draft calls would be heavy.

The Andrews bill would set the air force goal at 502,000 men. It has 364,500 now and in its draft bill would ask for 40,000.

Andrews also set higher goals for the navy and Marine corps. The administration asked for 462,000 and 90,000 respectively, but Andrews' bill would allow 350,000 and 110,000. He and the Administration agreed on 782,000 for the army.

Contests Will Feature Races For Several Offices; Primary On May 29

Interest in the coming Democratic Primary, Saturday, May 29, increased considerably during the past few days, when it began to appear that contests will feature the races for numerous public offices.

The campaign for a seat in the Senate took the spotlight today after Dr. Paul E. Jones, Farmville dentist and political leader, announced for the office now held by Arthur B. Corey of Greenville. J. Pickens Arthur, Greenville tobaccoist, entered the campaign about a week ago.

W. Jasper Smith of Bethel, who did not come out for reelection as a county commissioner, sprang a surprise today when he announced for a seat in the lower house of the General Assembly. S. C. Worthington of Greenville and Frank Kilpatrick of Ayden, incumbents, are up for reelection. Dr. E. L. Henderson, ETO faculty member for 21 years, announced for the House several days ago.

Charles P. Gaskins, incumbent, is a candidate for register of deeds. Judge Dink James is seeking reelection as judge of the County Recorder's Court.

The campaign for county commissioner was becoming exciting when Zeb V. Vance, Bethel businessman and farmer, entered the race. Westhead for commissioner from District 2, Bethel, Belvoir, Pactolus and Carolina townships. J. T. Dupree, Belvoir businessman and farmer, is opposing him.

J. Vance Perkins of Greenville, District 1, Greenville township; G. E. Pittman of Falkland, District 3, Beaver Dam, Farmville, Falkland and Mountain townships; Marvin Smith of Chicod, District 4, Winterville, Chicod and Grimesland; W. H. Hodges of Grifton, District 5, Swift Creek and Ayden townships, all incumbents, announced for reelection last Monday. Wayland L. Bunsucker of Winterville is opposing Smith in the fourth district.

C. H. Haddock and Roy L. Dixon have announced for constable in Chicod township and Alston Sugg for constable in Ayden township.

Pitt County Chairman of Elections said yesterday the deadline for filing is at 6 p. m. Saturday, April 17. Registration books will be open at the regular places beginning Saturday, May 1, and close at sunset on Saturday, May 15.

Challenge Day is Saturday, May 22, from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. The Democratic Primary will be held Saturday, May 29.

General Election Day is Tuesday, November 2.

Fourteen To Pay For Million Dead Sentences Wind Up Biggest Murder Trial In History

Nuernberg, Germany, April 10 — (AP) — Fourteen officers of the SS (Elite Guard) were sentenced today to hang for at least a million killings. The sentences wound up the biggest murder trial in history.

The men were leaders of the "Einsatz Commandos." These were special extermination squads sent into Russia to do away with peoples classified by the Nazis as racially undesirable.

Two other men drew life terms. Another five were sent to prison for lesser terms ranging down to 10 years.

The judgment by the American court was the stiffest ever handed down in the Nuernberg war crimes trials.

The international military tribunal which tried top Nazi leaders condemned only 12 defendants to death. Sentence was pronounced by Judge Michael A. Musmanno of Pittsburgh, presiding over a three-man court, at the end of a trial lasting seven months.

Maj. Gen. Otto Oltendit was one of those sentenced to death. He admitted in the trial that his Einsatz group killed 90,000 Jews.

Maj. Heinz Schubert was another of the condemned. He claims distant relationship to Franz Schubert, composer of the "Unfinished Symphony" and other well known works.

About Parking Lights Highway patrolmen last night cited to court many motorists who parked their cars near an open air motion picture show about two miles out on the Winterville highway in violation of a state law. The law requires all motor vehicles parked on any highway to have on parking lights.

Babson Discusses Prices

St. Louis, Mo., April 10 — During the past two weeks I have visited some of the largest U. S. cities, interviewing prominent farmers, manufacturers and merchants. The following are their conclusions:

Food Prices The wholesale market for nearly all farm products has declined since I was in the Central West six months ago. Yet, intelligent farmers do not regret this and feel more secure than when prices were abnormally high. Most farm products, with the possible exception of dairy products, will continue to work lower over the long-range.

Therefore, the farmer should follow the practice of getting out of debt and putting his buildings and implements in good condition. Otherwise, he should carry on business as usual continuing to plant acreage and let prices follow naturally. Avoid speculation by either rushing crops to market or holding them back for higher prices.

Building Prices I see no reason why building costs should be less during the balance of 1948, but one should be able to get better results in good condition. Runs For Office

U. S. Personnel At Embassy Are Taken To Safety

Colombian Troops Escort Marooned Staff To Other Sections Of City

Washington, April 10 — (AP) — Colombian army forces with tanks and motor trucks arrived at the American embassy in downtown Bogotá in mid-morning to remove United States personnel to other sections of the city.

This was reported to Undersecretary of State Robert Lovett about 10 a. m. (EST) by Assistant Secretary Norman Armour, who is a member of the U. S. delegation to the disrupted Inter-American Conference at Bogotá.

Scores of delegation officials and embassy and delegation staff members had been marooned in the embassy and a nearby office building since mid-day yesterday—many without food since Friday morning breakfast.

Earlier, dispatches from American correspondents said that numerous fires broke out during the night in the building housing the embassy. However, they were extinguished and the Americans were not menaced by the flames.

Armour reported that the embassy staff and delegation personnel were "all okay."

Secretary of State George Marshall and other ranking officials were reported still at a suburban residence where they had been since yesterday. They also were all right.

Much of Armour's report here paralleled dispatches from American correspondents in Bogotá.

A series of fires flared in a building housing the United States embassy in Bogotá last night but none threatened embassy personnel. They did not leave.

All the "rumor" fires were extinguished, but the small, peak office in another wing of the same building was destroyed. There was no mention of damage to the embassy.

The revolution followed the assassination yesterday of a Liberal leader and resulted in the setting up of a Liberal junta. The government of President Mariano Ospina Peres is mainly Conservative.

One American, John Powell, diplomatic courier, was reported among those hurt.

No police were seen on the street. The few soldiers about apparently were unable to halt the widespread looting.

Earlier last night President Mariano Ospina Peres said forces of the Conservative government were regaining control of the situation.

The president issued a communique accusing Communists of inciting the uprising. He said steps had been taken to restore order.

(Diplomatic dispatches reaching the State Department in Washington reported Communists appear to be abetting the revolution and helping attempts to provoke a strike.

(Diplomatic officials in Washington scanned Bogotá reports today to determine just what role the Communists are playing in the revolution.

(Washington diplomatic authorities said the Communist party in Colombia has about 8,000 members.)

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New Houses Said Standing Empty In Winston-Salem

Winston-Salem, N. C. — (AP) — Real estate men and builders recently said that a large number of new houses are standing empty in and near Winston-Salem.

Contractors explained that buyers do not move in as fast as they did a few months ago because it is now difficult to find those who can pay the asking prices, and home loans—especially GI loans—are tighter. One real estate man, who declined to be quoted by name, said he believed that both apartments and houses would be begging for occupants by late next fall. He said this situation would come about, not because the demand for decent housing had been met, but because of a shortage of home-seekers who have the money necessary for buying. But other contractors and real estate men doubted that the housing shortage would end by late fall. They added, however, that many houses built for sale probably would have to be rented. There are now under construction here a total of 724 dwelling units in big housing projects. Scattered residential construction, builders say, probably would raise the figure to 900.

Look For These Finish Qualities In Your Floors

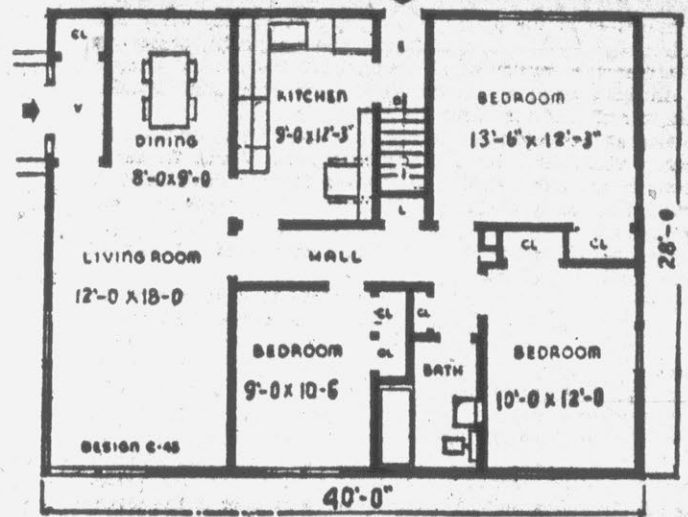

After the contest the Chamber of Commerce entertained the contestants at luncheon at the college and then took them on a sightseeing tour of the city.

up" fuel oil discounts there will probably be no reduction in fuel prices and there may again be a scarcity.

Oil companies are spending huge sums developing new wells and bettering their refining methods. However, the consumption is terrific, now running about 5,400,000 barrels a day. Synthetic fuel plants cannot help for years to come. Here again the only answer is for drivers of automobiles to show some restraint and not waste gasoline.

War Outlook

In my Annual Forecast for 1948, published in this paper about January 1st, I made two very important statements. One was that World War III would not start in 1948. Notwithstanding the calamity howls of the broadcasters and the exciting news in the papers, I continue to be convinced of this whatever may

happen after 1948. The longer it can be delayed, the better chances are that it will not occur for many years.

Another definite forecast was that 1948 would be a year of preparation for war. I now add that these preparations will increase monthly in fact this preparing for war will be one of the things to prevent it.

I still cling to another statement in my Annual Forecast, namely, that 1948 will be about the same as 1947.

Thus, farmers, manufacturers, bankers, and especially merchants, should go about business as usual. Figure that there will be no shortage of goods, yet no surplus. Buyers will not be justified in waiting for lower prices. On the other hand, they will not be justified in buying surplus goods for fear of higher prices. Let us all give more time to developing our business and reducing operating expenses, and less time to listening to news broadcasts and discussing them with our neighbors.

power. Again, this would be Russia. If the government tried to enforce such a law it would have to prove three things.

That there's a world-wide Communist conspiracy; that the man charged under the law was taking part in it; that a foreign Communist power wanted to get control of the United States.

Whether that would be easy to do — on all three counts — remains to be seen. But the committee says that under such a law:

"The master conspirators of the Communist movement in the United States can, without question, be prosecuted."

So, without outlawing the party the government under such a law could try to smash the party by prosecuting the leaders of the party.

All this, as pointed out, is only the recommendation of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Nothing will happen unless Congress passes such a law, someone is arrested, and the Supreme Court decides whether such a law is constitutional.

So it would take a good while before this country could step on the Communist leaders in this country. The committee recommended other laws. But the one outlined here is the big one.
