

Global May Day Demonstrations Are Held Today

Atmosphere Tense In Many Areas As Communist Issues Again Raised

Millions of workers throughout the world celebrated their 50th May Day today in rival demonstrations—their ranks split by the struggle between Communism and the West. In many countries May Day corresponds to the American Labor Day.

In Athens an attempt was made to assassinate Minister of Justice Christos Ladas. Police said his attacker confessed he was under orders from a Communist execution squad.

In Trieste, Rome and Berlin the atmosphere was tense but the celebrations produced only minor incidents.

More than 300,000 surged through rubble-strewn Berlin, some supporting and others denouncing Communism in bitterest terms. Police said more than 200,000 thronged the Soviet sector to hear Communist speakers attack the Marshall plan.

Loudest applause at Berlin's anti-Communist meeting went to Henry Rutz of the American Federation of Labor when he declared:

"I can assure you the western powers have no intention of leaving Berlin x x x our transport and communication lines will be held. Our troops will stay until all occupation forces leave."

In Moscow Prime Minister Stalin reviewed a gigantic parade in Red Square. The emphasis seemed to be more on civilian than the military but Marshal Nikolai Bulganin told the vast throng, which included U.S. Ambassador Walter B. Smith and other foreign diplomats, that Russia's armed forces will "honorably fulfill all the tasks before them."

In an order of the day Minister of Armed Forces Bulganin urged Soviet preparedness against "the intrigues of international reaction."

Communist vice-premier, Wladyslaw Gomułka of Poland, opening Poland's May Day celebration in Warsaw last night, said the United States is well along in becoming the "most hated" nation. He got a big hand from party members and Left-wing Socialists when he declared the U. S. would not succeed in stringing "strands of economic barbed wire" around Europe.

In the majority of western European cities, Communist speakers' observations were planned. Socialist and anti-Communist groups turned a chilly shoulder to the Communists.

In New York, parade floats of leftwingers and anti-Communists were separated by three long downtown blocks. The Veterans of Foreign Wars sponsored the anti-Communist "Loyalty Day" parade up Fifth Avenue.

Charlotte Elks Lodge Destroyed By Sudden Blaze

Charlotte, N. C., May 1—(AP)—James B. Rowe, Exalted Ruler of the Charlotte Elks Lodge, called lodge officers to meet this afternoon to consider rebuilding the Elks clubhouse here destroyed in a spectacular \$200,000 fire last night.

Fire Chief Hendrix Palmer said it was one of the fastest blazes he had ever seen. It started in the top floor of the three-story red brick building at South Tryon and Stonewall streets. In half an hour it had roared through to the basement.

Rowe said "we will rebuild on this site, of course."

The first alarm was turned in shortly after 7:30 p. m. and three more alarms quickly followed, bringing most of the city fire department.

U. S. Defense Program

This Will Clarify Three Main Points Now Being Discussed By Congress; Bigger Air Force, The Draft And UMT; Different Opinions Delaying U. S. Action

Washington, May 1—(AP)—This brings you up to date if you're puzzled by all the mix-up in Congress over the armed forces.

There are three main points: 1. Making the Air Force bigger. 2. Drafting men for military service. 3. Compelling youths to take military training.

None of the three is settled yet. But this is where they stand now. Take the Air Force first—

The House already has approved expanding the Air Force from its present strength of 55 groups to 70. The Senate is ready to vote on the same plan, possibly next week. So this No. 1 point is nearly being finished.

(A group can be any number of planes, depending on size. A group of big bombers has fewer planes than a group of fighters.)

Secretary of Defense Forrestal first told Congress we needed only 55 groups. But when Congress talked of 70 he raised his figure to 66.

Secretary for Air Symington right along has said we needed 70 groups, though he says he does not disagree with Forrestal. It looks like Congress will approve 70 troops.

Now take the draft.

Congress is thinking of drafting men 18 through 26. So far, it's only

Possibility Seen Avert Rail Strike

Federal Mediation Chief Says Both Sides Are Sincere In Wanting Settlement; New Recommendations May Succeed

Chicago, May 1—(AP)—There appears a possibility of heading off the crippling nationwide railroad strike set for May 11, says the federal mediation chief.

Commenting on the efforts of the National (railway) mediation board to effect a settlement between the carriers and three operating Unions, Chairman Frank P. Douglass said:

"There is a possibility that we might be able to make some recommendations that are not already included in the emergency board's report which might stave off the strike."

He said he had found "a sincere disposition on the part of both sides to try to find a settlement."

Railroad representatives met with the board yesterday after the three Unions huddled with the conciliators on Thursday. Today separate meetings with both sides were planned by the conciliators.

"We have in mind the principal points on which they are apart and we are now trying to reconcile these points of view," Douglass told newsmen after yesterday's meeting with the carriers.

"The carriers still take the position that they will bargain within the framework of the emergency board's report. We think the atmosphere is such that progress can be made."

Before conclusion of the session with the railroad representatives yesterday Douglass had described both sides as "unyielding." He said that direct negotiations appeared the only hope of calling off the wayout. Neither side is in favor of further arbitration.

The "big difficulty" in the long-standing wage dispute, Douglass said, is the demand by the three Unions for more pay than recommended by a Presidential fact-finding board.

The brotherhoods—Engineers, Firemen and Enginemen and switchmen—with a claimed membership of 190,000 key rail workers, sought a wage increase of 30 per cent with a minimum hike of \$3 a day and changes in working rules.

The board proposed a pay boost of 15 1/2 cents an hour, which had been accepted last fall by other rail brotherhoods. The carriers, Douglass said, refuse to grant the three unions a bigger wage hike than the other railroad workers received.

Tax Cut Is Now Reality For U. S. Wage Earners

Boost In Retail Buying Expected By Virtue Of "Pay Increase" At Expense Of Government

Washington, May 1—(AP)—The \$4,800,000,000 a year tax cut becomes a hard cash reality for many taxpayers today.

A boost in retail buying was expected as wage earners paid off today found less money withheld from their paychecks for taxes—regardless of when the money was earned.

Those paid today are the first of more than 50,000,000 taxpayers getting a take-home pay raise at government expense.

The law, passed by Congress last March over President Truman's veto, dates the lower withholding tax back to the start of the year. But the government won't grant refunds until 1948 income tax returns are filed early in 1949.

The 7,400,000 persons freed from all income taxes by the new law will have to wait for others to get back the money withheld from their paychecks from January through April.

The millions of other taxpayers will get cuts ranging from 12 1/2 per cent on taxes of \$400 a year or less, down to five per cent on a tax of \$134,000 or more.

The treasury estimates the reductions will cost the government \$600,000,000 in May and June, with over 45,000,000 taxpayers sharing in that pool.

The June reduction will go not only to those subject to withholding taxes, but also to professional workers and higher-income groups who have a quarterly tax payment due June 15.

They can file amended estimates of tax to cut out their quarterly payments. Treasury officials expressed belief many down-scaled their estimates in March in anticipation of the tax cut.

FOR DRIVING INSTRUCTION
Pinehurst, May 1—(AP)—The State Department of Public Education today had a check for \$6,900 from the North Carolina Association of Insurance Agents to help start safe driving instruction in schools.

Months ago the House Armed Services Committee finished a bill for Universal Military Training (UMT).

"That bill is all ready for a House vote. But it's been held up in the Rules Committee. If the full House ever acts, it may change the bill."

"At any rate, this is what that UMT bill would do as it now stands: Compel youths 18 to 20 to take six months military training in camp or on ship."

(They would not be part of the armed forces and could not be used by them except by special act of Congress.)

Relief Fraud Is Charged; German Youth Confesses

Berlin, May 1—(AP)—A German accused of writing nearly 800 begging letters to the United States and other countries will face fraud charges, the American military government said today.

A statement said the man, Heinrich Czerwinski, 23, admitted receiving about 90 care food packages on the representation that he was on a starvation diet. Police said they had found an indexed file on his letters to bishops, university presidents and business men, with notations like "nice guy" and "soft touch."

He employed a secretary to handle the correspondence.

His home held 20 packages. Police said he and his father had the highest allowance in the German food ration and were far from starving.

Learns At Last Her Son Was Spy

German Mother Weeps For Joy On Hearing Son Paroled

Frankfurt, Germany, May 1—(AP)—Goey Dasch's German mother learned for the first time yesterday that her son had been convicted in 1942 as a Nazi spy.

She learned it from a reporter for the Army newspaper Stars and Stripes who also brought her the news that Dasch had been paroled from a U. S. prison and returned to Germany.

She wept with joy at the news, the paper said. She had heard he was in an American prison, but she didn't know why.

She had thought he was an anti-Nazi because he talked against Hitler on his last visit home in 1938.

Her other son, Ernst, was a soldier in the U. S. 8th Army, she said.

Her daughter, Clara, also lived in the United States for a while working as a nurse in Brooklyn.

But now Clara is back living with her aged mother, Joanna, in Speyer, in the French occupation zone.

They said George, although the smartest member of the family, was also associating with "bad company."

They hope he will be able to visit them when he is released.

Dasch and his fellow saboteur, Ernest Burger, still are held in an unnamed detention center in Germany while American authorities work out the conditions under which they will be freed.

Ecuadorian Army Marches To Aid American Camp

Guayaquil, Ecuador, May 1—(AP)—Government troops are reported en route to the town of Chunchi, where an American construction company said it was under attack by several hundred Indians.

A dispatch from Quito said yesterday an official of the Jones Construction Company of Charlotte, N. C., had sent an appeal for help to "prevent the burning of the house where they are defending themselves after the incidents." Reports said a worker had been killed.

An undetermined number of American employees, their wives and children are in the camp.

The government ordered troop mobilization and dispatched Mayor Cesar Montufar, general commander of the civil guard, to Chunchi, which is on the Guayaquil-Quito railroad line.

Registrars Open Books As State Candidates Rest

Approximately 1,950 Polling Places Open For First Saturday Today

Raleigh, N. C., May 1—(AP)—With the primaries but four more Saturdays away, registrars opened their registration books to potential voters at polling places for the first time today.

The approximately 1,950 polling places opened at 9 a. m. and will close at sundown. They will do likewise for the next two Saturdays.

Meanwhile, as the voters got active, most of the candidates took their usual weekend rest.

In yesterday's politicking, both senatorial candidates were active, as were four of the candidates seeking nomination in the Democratic Primary for governor.

Senator William B. Umstead, seeking reelection, told a joint meeting of the Red Springs Rotary and Lions Clubs that "the movement of blue-cured tobacco in the European Recovery Program will be of tremendous assistance to tobacco farmers."

His opponent, former Governor J. Melville Broughton, asserted that only increased production can counteract the "dangerous rise in the cost of living." He addressed a dinner meeting of the North Carolina Finkling Company at Salisbury.

On the gubernatorial front, Kerr Scott was scheduled to finish today his three-day tour through the western part of the state. He made no formal speeches yesterday.

Charles M. Johnson, in a release from his Raleigh headquarters, said yesterday he favored increased financial assistance for the needy aged and for dependent children.

Oscar Barker told the Lower Grove PTA at its annual dinner that school patrons can demand and obtain the kind of schools they want.

Mayne Albright declared that the results of his tours showed veterans "want no paternal handouts from the state. They do want adequate housing, opportunities for schooling their children equal to the national average, and greater participation in the affairs of state government."

The members of all Masonic bodies in Greenville, the Order of the Eastern Star, the White Shrine of Jerusalem, visiting Masons, and the general public are cordially invited to be present. The occasion will be a happy one for the members of Greenville Lodge No. 284, A. F. & A. M., because so far as it is now known it will mark the first time in the history of the Greenville Lodge that they have owned, debt free, their Lodge Hall.

Greenville Lodge No. 284 was chartered December 9, 1898 with Louis Hilliard, Master; William L. Cherry, Senior Warden; and Benjamin W. Brown, Junior Warden. Greenville Lodge No. 284 met in the building formerly used by Sharon Lodge No. 78 on the corner of Pitt and Second Streets. Sharon Lodge having lost their charter during the Civil War. Afterwards Lodge No. 284 moved to the Reflector building

while the Masonic Temple was being built on Third Street, between Washington and Evans. This Temple was destroyed by fire in 1909. Lost in this fire were the records of Sharon Lodge. The first female school in Pitt County was operated by Greenville Lodge No. 284 in 1900. Their next meeting place was over Key Brown's Drug Store. In 1912, the Grand Lodge of North Carolina marched in a body from the hall in Greenville Lodge No. 284 and regularly constituted Sharon Lodge No. 78 and Greenville No. 284 moved to the corner of Fifth and Washington Streets in 1917. The two Lodges were consolidated on November 14, 1933.

The present Temple was purchased in 1946 and was finished in 1947. It is one of the most complete and modern in the State, with kitchen facilities and a dining room on the first floor large enough that 200 persons can be comfortably served. On the second floor is the Lodge room and the third floor is used for storage.

Laying Strategy To Block Early Stassen Triumph

Some Republicans Want No More "Willkie Stampede" At Convention

Washington, May 1—(AP)—Some Republicans were reported today to be laying new strategy to block any early Stassen stampede at the Philadelphia nominating convention this summer.

Their idea is to ask delegates from seven key states to keep their 300 votes lined up behind "favorite sons" until the strength of other contenders has been tested.

This move was said to be directed primarily at stalling any switch to Harold E. Stassen at early ballot stages, thus avoiding a repetition of the 1940 convention, where Wendell Willkie swept the nomination from GOP favorites.

Stassen, most ardent admirers say they think he can win the nomination by the sixth ballot if he (1) wins a majority of the 23 delegates he is trying to take away from Senator Robert Taft in Ohio next Tuesday, and (2) beats Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York in the May 21 Oregon primary.

While the anti-Stassen people won't admit the former Minnesota governor can turn that trick, they apparently are taking no chances.

There were indications that some members of the Pennsylvania and Illinois delegations have been discussing the Stassen threat. Pennsylvania will cast 73 votes for Senator Edward Martin and Illinois 56 for Gov. Dwight Green on the first Philadelphia ballot.

The stop-Stassen people were said to believe that delegations in five other vote heavy states might be persuaded to follow their strategy—to keep voting for favorite sons until they can evaluate the strength of Dewey, Taft, Senator Vandenberg, House Speaker Martin and others.

Deputy Coroner George A. Brandes said he returned a verdict of suicide in the death of Mrs. Anne S. Airey of Washington, D. C.

Says World Does Not Comprehend A-Bomb's Power

Atlantic City, N. J., April 30—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Leslie R. Groves said today "it is still too difficult for Russia and her war satellites to understand the power of the atomic bomb."

Groves, who headed the Army's Manhattan district which developed the bomb, told a luncheon meeting of the New Jersey Manufacturers Association he referred to the failure of the United Nations atomic energy commission to reach an agreement on atomic control.

He attributed this failure to the inability of member nations to comprehend the power of atomic weapons.

"It is easy for one to speak glibly of a city being destroyed in an instant, but it does not follow that one comprehends it," he said in a prepared speech.

Worries On May Day

Communists All Over The World Observe Day Of Jubilation, But They Have Much More To Worry About This Year Than In Past; Solidarity Of Democracies

The Inter-American Conference of Bogota hasn't fulfilled all the hopes which had been built up in advance (what international parley ever does?) but it nevertheless has achieved one far-reaching success.

The 31 nations have the satisfaction of knowing that they have contributed greatly to hemispheric political solidarity. And a vital part of this contribution is the expressed determination to prevent infringement of aggressive Communism on the Western world.

Time may prove that this was the most important contribution the conference could have made to our generation, coming as it does at a critical juncture in the fight-to-a-finish between Bolshevism and free nations. This battle of the tens is by far the greatest global issue of the day.

It was a whimsical fate which decreed that the conference should be disrupted by the bloody revolution which the Colombian government attributed to Communist influence. The principal item on the agenda had been hemispheric economic cooperation, but the revolt resulted in this being postponed until a later meeting in Buenos Aires, and the Bogota conference concentrated mainly on political solidarity and war against aggressive Com-

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Two-Front Struggle In Coal Negotiations

John L. Lewis Gets Notice From Southern Coal Operators That They Want To Discuss New Union Contract

Washington, May 1—(AP)—John L. Lewis today faced prospects of a two-front battle in new contract negotiations with the soft coal operators.

The United Mine Workers chief notified the owners yesterday he will be ready to start talking matters over May 18. At the same time he received notice from the Southern Coal Producers Association that it also wants to discuss a new pact to replace the one expiring June 30.

Although the Southern group was included in the agreement signed last year, it did not take part as a group in the negotiations. Lewis contested the right of Joseph E. Moody, head of the Dixie organization, to sit in on talks dealing with the disputed mine pension fund.

If Lewis challenges the right of the association to bargain for the 14 big groups in the rich Southern fields, he may be in for more court appearances.

Moody already has filed a complaint with the National Labor Relations Board, charging Lewis with an unfair labor practice by refusing to bargain with him on the pension fund.

The case has not yet been acted on by NLRB General Counsel Robert N. Denham. But if Lewis forces a shutdown on the contract issue, Moody is expected to press the complaint.

The Lewis-Moody conflict dates back to the court order issued April 3 by Judge Matthew F. McGuire against the mine strike then in progress. The judge also ordered union and operator representatives to negotiate on the pension fund.

Senate 'Grounds' Air Force Study

Obstacles To Early Passage 70-Group Plan Lie Ahead

Washington, May 1—(AP)—The 70-group air force program was grounded in the Senate today with no action likely until late next week.

A gusty Senate dispute over non-military matters delayed plans yesterday to take up the \$3,233,000,000 bill to start the air force expansion. And further obstacles to early passage were in the offing.

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Farm Home Planning Has Its Own Special Features

New York—If any house could be called a "machine for living" it would be the modern American farm house.

While town or suburban dwellings can be efficiently planned for comfort, attractive appearances and outlook, durability and general livability, the farm house must have all this and utmost usefulness, too.

Everybody and everything on a successful farm must work. The house has as many jobs to perform as any hired man.

Unlike its city counterpart the farm house calls for an office. Farming is a business and requires space for records and crop reports, reference books and agricultural literature. Buyers must be interviewed, workers must be hired and foremen are conferred with.

The Agricultural Associates, Inc., 26 Elm Street, Ardsley, N. Y. specialists in farm building design, say the best location for the farm office is adjacent to the front door. Here it is accessible from the main highway as well as from the barnyard. This location eliminates the use of the living room for business purposes. It also cuts down the amount of "tracking in" on muddy days and thus reduce housework.

The farm office can be planned as a multiple purpose room. It can double as a guest room, or child's room. A daybed, serving as a sofa in the daytime, does this trick. Many a town house exploits such multiple use in library-guest room-extra sitting room combinations.

The women of a household like this extra room advantage for sewing. It saves their living room from threads and lint. It is a godsend for parents with growing children, who claim priority to the living room for their five seasons.

Another distinguishing feature of the modern farm house is an ample work room adjacent to rear door and kitchen. This can be a general utility room. A farm house may have a complete basement, but usually storage space is at a premium on the

abundant farm. So a general utility room adjoining the kitchen is virtually mandatory.

Here the men can come in from the field, wash up, and perhaps take a shower—if adequate equipment is planned. At the same time this room offers space for laundry, canning, and other more or less messy jobs that the women like to keep out of the kitchen.

The Agricultural Association recommends a wide stairway to the cellar with no twisting or turning, to make the carrying of large quantities of produce easy and safe. This stairway is wider than the average town house cellar stairs. It should be wide enough for anything to be stored in the basement.

A farm house can be built without a basement, but because of the need for storage space, and the necessity for foundation footings below the front line in all northern states, not much economy can be achieved through elimination of a cellar. Construction of storage room above grade can cost as much or more in northern locations as excavation.

Closets are important in farm house planning, as well as in the design of any dwelling. The Agricultural Associates champion sliding doors for all closets because of the economy of space achieved by avoiding swinging doors.

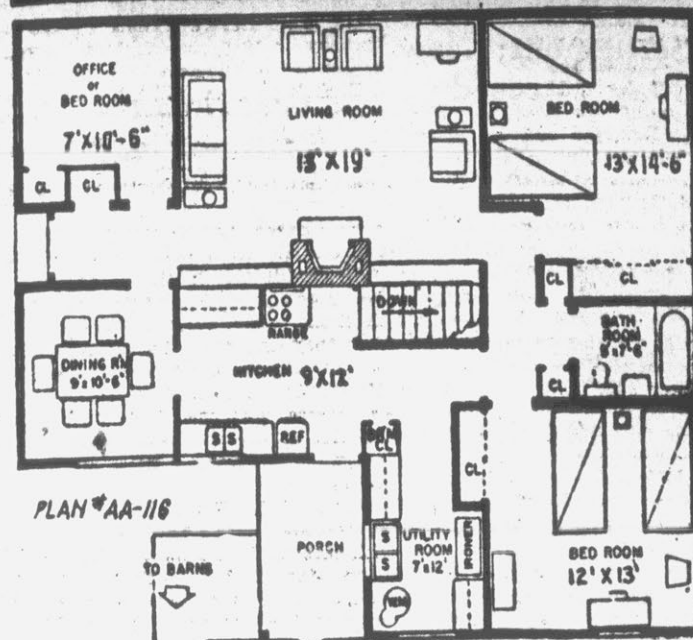
And the designers point out that although the farm house must be primarily functional, its exterior design does not have to be extreme.

"Most people still have a warm spot in their hearts for a touch of tradition in the design of their homes," the architects say. "Window boxes shutters, a small drooping to a low eaves line and a massive chimney can still fit into a useful farm house."

Built-In Blower Is Kitchen Aid

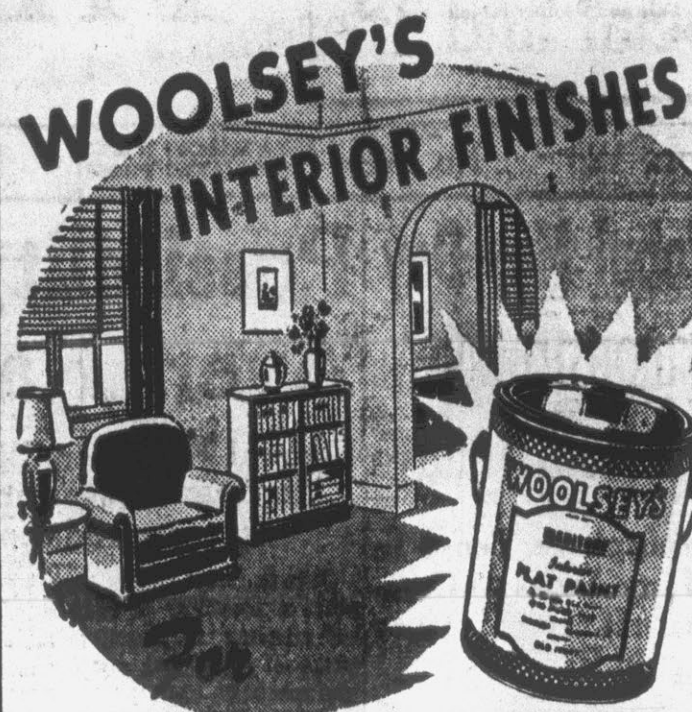

A built-in blower with a vent over the kitchen range is much more efficient than a ventilating fan in window or wall. The blower carries fumes and smoke directly out of the kitchen before they cross walls, ceiling and curtains. Blowers have more force and capacity than fans.

Planned for the farmer, this house does chores. Note the farm office near the front door, the utility room for laundry and canning, adjoining the kitchen, and the wide cellar stairs without a turn. This house, Plan AA-116, was designed by the Agricultural Associates, Inc., 26 Elm St., Ardsley, N. Y. It covers 1,200 square feet with-out porch and contains approximately 2,400 cubic feet with a complete basement. The designers suggest the bedrooms at the right facing north. This would bring morning sun in the kitchen and dining room.

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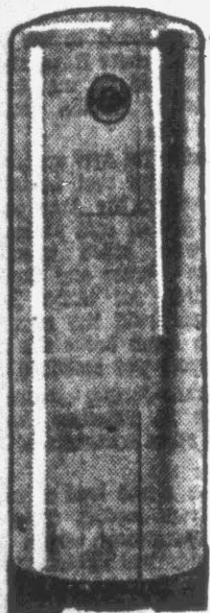

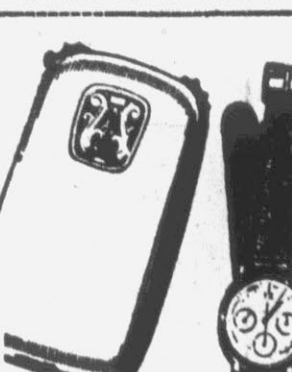

As we observe modern life, and as

Western Europe.
The problem of how far America might go in backing Western Europe isn't likely to be settled until the major European powers work out their own strategy of defense. However, Secretary of State Marshall has stated that the question of giving military lend-lease to Western Europe is under active consideration. British government officials also say the five-nation alliance has been

given informal assurances that U.S. military materiel will be forthcoming once its defense plan is finished.

So this first of May—Communism's annual day of jubilation—finds the Bolsheviks with far less to jubilate over, and much more to worry about, than they have had on the anni-
versaries of recent years. The defenses of democracy are being consolidated rapidly—and they are formidable.

The American people spent \$467 million for educational reading materiel in 1940 and an additional \$338 million for recreational reading.

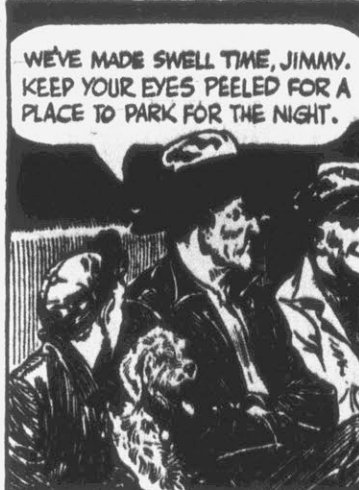

for example, that to buy a dozen
eggs the average European has to
work just about four hours, while an
American factory worker can earn
a dozen eggs in a little over half an
hour. A pound of butter—even this
year—costs not much more than
three-quarters of an hour working
time here. It would cost the average
European eight hours—and then he
probably could not find butter to
buy!

Living conditions in Russian-dom-
inated countries do not bear out the
Russian contention as to the won-
ders of Marxism and Communism.
Bulgaria, where the Russian shad-
ow is dark, recently invited West-
ern reporters to see their brave new
world; but the reports only confir-
med our belief that, our poorest peo-
ple are better fed, better housed,
better dressed than any working
people in any other country. Our
wage-workers, moreover, are safer,
happier and freer. Britain thus far
has been unable to make Socialism
work. The South American coun-
tries under dictatorships find that
one-man rule is a misrule.

Let Us Not Be Content
There may well be a middle ground
between Capitalism and Socialism
which will make our American Way
even better than it now is. Hence,
we all should be open-minded and
always insist upon justice to every
group. The greatest crime of Com-
munism is that its leaders are not
content to let it prove itself but they
murder all minorities who do not
agree with them. The world can-
not progress on such a principal.

After their six months' training,
they could do this:
1. Take another six months of it
and, after that, be free of such
training.

2. Join the armed forces and, after
serving out their enlistment, be free
of further training.

3. Go back to civilian life but, for
three or four years, continue to take
part-time training at school or in
some reserve outfit like the National
Guard.

The Senate bill—as it stands now,
although it's not finished—would do
this:

Compel youths of 18 and 19 to
take military training in the armed
forces, along with draftees. But these
youths could not be used overseas
except by special act of Congress.

The Senate committee is wrap-
ping up its ideas on the draft and
UMT in one bill.

The House committee is handling
the two things separately. It's still
working on its draft bill. Its UMT
bill, as explained above, was fin-
ished months ago.

No one can predict right now
what Congress finally will do about
UMT or the draft. Congress is split
wide open in its thinking on UMT.

There'll be no brotherly love lost when Warren Wright's steppers break out of the gate to see which can get there faster. Wright said both jockeys, Eddie Arcaro with Citation, and Newbold Pierson aboard Countdown, would be sent out to win for dear old Calumet. He didn't care which of them first, just so one of them brought home the \$83,400 pot, value of the race with six starters. This will be the smallest field since six ran in 1907.

It might be well to mention the four other pretty fair country horses who have more than an outside interest in the classic.

Probably everybody in Louisville can spell their names correctly by now—Ben F. Whitaker's My Requisite, William L. Brann's Escadrille, R. W. McIlvaine's Billings, and Mrs. John Payson Adams' Grandpere.
