

Soviets Move To Force American Ouster In Korea

Russians Announce Intentions To Leave Korea; Terrorism In Seoul

Seoul, May 8—(AP)—Russia moved today to force the American hand in Korea as pre-election Red terrorism hit Seoul, national capital and headquarters of the American zone, for the first time.

Lt. Gen. G. P. Korotkov, Soviet commander of North Korea announced "arrangements have been made for the immediate withdrawal of his troops to 'make American troops withdraw from Korea simultaneously."

His announcement did not name any specific date for the withdrawal and was so worded as to leave some doubt that the Russians even intended to get out at all. Similar proposals previously have been rejected by the United States.

Korotkov, former Russian commander on the Estonian front, made his announcement in a letter to Kim Doo-Bong, chairman of the recent North-South unity conference in Pyongyang. The letter was broadcast on the Pyongyang radio. The conference, dominated by Korean Communists, urged both Russia and American troops to leave the country.

Korotkov expressed sympathy with the conference's demand and recalled that the Soviet government made the same proposal in the United States-Soviet joint commission negotiations and before the United Nations assembly.

Negotiations by the U. S.-Soviet joint commission looking to the establishment of a Korean provisional government broke down completely last year after the commanders in the two zones were unable to agree on practically anything.

At the beginning of the discussions, the Soviets refused to consult Korean leaders who had opposed the occupation. The U. S. has not for consultation with all Korean factions in establishment of the provisional government.

After the failure of the joint commission efforts, the Soviet North Korean commander last year proposed that occupation forces of both nations be withdrawn simultaneously, permitting the Koreans to organize their own government. The U. S. rejected the plan and it was noted that the Korean Communists had developed an army of 200,000 men. South Korean moderate leaders have repeatedly warned that if the U. S. gets out it will be but a matter of days until that army takes over South Korea.

Russia rejected the United Nations proposal for free elections in Korea to establish a popular government and refused to permit the UN commission to enter the Russian zone.

Air Of Futility Prevails In UN Over Failures

Lake Success, May 8—(AP)—An air of pessimism and futility prevailed today at United Nations headquarters over failure to solve the Palestine problem.

Delegates have less than one week to meet the crisis and no solution is in sight. The British insist they will give up their mandate rule at midnight next Friday—leaving a government vacuum in the embattled Holy Land.

In a desperate effort to do something to bridge the gap, a 12-nation working group scheduled sessions today. Emergency meetings may continue through the weekend. This group has set up in the current special Palestine session of the UN assembly.

70-Group Air Force

What It Means, What It Will Mean, And Why; Defense Needs Closely Studied; The Results; A Race With Atomic Bomb For Russia; A Long Range Plan

Washington, May 8—(AP)—Here's an ABC on the 70-group Air Force, what it means, what it will mean, why. A group can be any number of planes, depending on their size. A group of heavy bombers will have fewer planes than a group of small fighters.

The Air Force now has 55 groups. Congress this week approved an increase to 70.

That doesn't mean we'd have the 70 groups next week or next year. We wouldn't be up to 70 groups before 1952.

And that would cost billions of dollars. But, to get the picture, start from scratch.

Last year President Truman appointed five civilians to study this country's future air problems.

In January, 1948, this five-man group, called the President's Air Policy Commission, made a report called "Survival in the Air Age."

Among other things, the commission told the President:

An enemy nation—no one doubts Russia was meant—may have a lot of atomic bombs by 1953, enough to start a war.

If such a nation attacks us, the attack may be sudden. To be prepared we need a stronger Air Force than we have now. How strong?

Cease-Fire Order In Holy City Goes Into Effect; All Is Quiet

Jerusalem, May 8—(AP)—Jerusalem's cease-fire, agreed to by both Arabs and Jews to allow negotiations for a permanent truce in the Holy City, went into effect today.

In the first hour, not a shot was heard.

An official British communiqué said last night Arab military leaders ordered their forces to cease fire in the Holy City at noon (5 a.m. EST) today.

A Jewish agency spokesman commented, "The moment the Arabs stop firing we shall stop also."

The British statement said Arab league leaders agreed to the truce at a three-hour meeting in Jericho yesterday with Gen. Sir Alan Gordon Cunningham, Palestine high commissioner.

The session was attended by a United Nations truce commission composed of the consuls general of the United States, France and Belgium.

The Jewish spokesman recalled a letter from the agency to Cunningham on April 9 in reply to the latter's plea for a cease fire.

The letter said: "The Arabs started these attacks and as soon as they

stop them we shall do so too. That goes for Jerusalem as well as anywhere else in Palestine."

Belief was expressed in some quarters that Arab and Jewish leaders have given the truce commission their terms to peace not only in Jerusalem, but in all Palestine. The British mandate in the Holy Land ends at midnight next Friday.

Informants said the chief point at issue was the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv road. The Jews insist that the road be kept open. The Arabs reportedly want the road closed with the understanding that Arabs will transport food and water to Jerusalem's 100,000 Jews.

Attending the Jericho truce talks with Cunningham were Sir Henry Gurney, chief secretary for the Palestine government; Abdel Rahman Azzam Pasha, Arab league secretary; Ismail Safwat Pasha, Iraqi commander in chief of Arab volunteer forces in Palestine; and two Egyptian consular officials.

Announcement of the Arab cease-fire order came while the Holy City was undergoing its heaviest fighting in a week.

Arabs at the Jaffa gate and Jews in the Yemen Moshe district exchanged shots for 30 minutes until they were silenced by British cannon fire.

Nation Prepares For Rail Strike

Long Tie-Up Would Strangle Industrial Lifelines

NATION PREPARES—FRONT ... Chicago, May 8—(AP)—The nation prepared for a railroad strike next Tuesday and the long range estimate of the potential damage to all segments of business and industry was staggering.

A virtual paralysis of the country's rail transportation would result from the threatened strike by the some 190,000 engineers, firemen and switchmen. A tie-up for any length of time would slowly choke off the lifelines of other industries and business and the impact would be felt in every home.

Millions would feel the effects of the impending walkout, some immediately after the strike deadline scheduled for 6 a.m. on Tuesday. The idle in the railroad and scores of other industries would run into the millions.

In the St. Louis area alone, the Chamber of Commerce estimated that a strike would cause layoffs of between 200,000 and 350,000. In Detroit, auto industry leaders said plants throughout Michigan would be closed "in a matter of few days" in event of a strike.

The spilling of millions of dollars worth of produce and other crops would threaten the strike. That situation would pose a problem for the housewives who do the shopping for food and meat.

Freight Embargo To Start Monday

Charlotte, N.C., May 8—(AP)—An embargo of all shipments less than carload of freight of all classifications, effective 12:01 a.m. Monday, was announced here today by the Southern Railway.

Officials at the railway's lines east headquarters said the step will be taken due to the threatened nationwide railway strike Tuesday.

They added that an embargo on carload shipments is expected momentarily for the same reason.

Convene Monday On State Rights

Action Against Nat'l Demo Party Ahead Says Governor

Jackson, Miss., May 8—(AP)—"Militant action" against the national Democratic party will be taken at the state's rights convention opening here Monday, the movement's leader asserted today.

The statement was made by Mississippi Governor Fielding L. Wright, in a pre-convention interview. Wright sponsored the calling of this revolt convention.

The states' rights movement grew out of Southern objection to the President's civil rights program. It has been expanded by Wright and other leaders to include additional measures regarded by them as invasions of states' rights by the federal government in other fields.

Some 1,200 delegates from 12 Southern states and Indiana, Illinois, and Missouri are expected by those in charge of the convention's arrangements.

None of the delegates will carry official state party status in the convention, though some of them occupy state party positions.

Governor Wright said "I don't know what will happen," adding that "this is the delegates' meeting."

No special action objective for the convention has been officially announced.

Babson More Optimistic

Babson Park, Mass., May 8—I have today returned from a trip throughout the great Central West, the "Magic Circle" of America. During the winter in Florida, I was rather blue due to the waste and indifference that I saw there. On Saint Patrick's Day, however, I heard a message of courage and decision broadcast to the world by our Chief Executive and Commander-in-Chief of our armed forces. If this has aroused the U. S. A. to new purpose and productivity as it aroused me, good times for the next few years are "possible." Provided: We can match our new-found faith with a proportionate output of good will and goods!

Good Times "Possible" Readers of this column will recall that repeatedly I have stressed, if production fails to keep pace with demand, all of us could be caught up in a tornado of inflation, the vicious "boom and bust" spiral. Furthermore, the threat of Communism and other storm-clouds had also darkened our outlook for the nearby nineteen-fifties. Therefore, I

had been distressed for sometime by the "take-it-easy" attitude of our people.

My trip of the past few weeks has changed my attitude and strengthened my faith. I found that President Truman—with that speech—peppered the entire nation. Agree To Divide German Private Assets In Spain

Spain To Expropriate, Liquidate And Divide Property For Claims

Madrid, May 8—(AP)—Spain and the United States, France and Britain today agreed how to dispose of German private assets in this country. The assets are estimated roughly at 600,000,000 pesetas, about \$55,000,000 at the official exchange rate.

The agreement, fruit of 17 months of negotiations, will be signed Monday. It commits Spain to expropriate, liquidate and divide properties of all Germans not resident in Spain. A Spanish decree will confiscate these properties and set up liquidation machinery.

The pact provides for transfer of proceeds from expropriated assets to allied countries and safeguard against creation of any economic threat to the peace through sale or disposition of German assets.

Spain will receive about \$14,000,000 from sale of German assets. This settles all claims pending between the Spanish and German states.

The remaining \$41,000,000 will be divided among Albania, the United States, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Egypt, France, the United Kingdom, Greece, India, Pakistan, Luxembourg, Norway, New Zealand, The Netherlands, Czechoslovakia, Union of South Africa and Yugoslavia.

The division of the proceeds among the allies is government by the Paris reparations conference pact of Dec. 21, 1945, under which the Soviet Union agreed to forego any share in German assets in this sector.

Under a formula established by the conference Britain and the U. S. get 28 percent or an estimated \$11,480,000 each from the proceeds of the German private assets in Spain. France will get 16 percent or \$6,560,000. The other 15 nations will divide the remaining \$11,480,000.

Approval of the accord by the cabinet of Gen. Franco was announced last night.

Streamliners In Headon Smashup

Luxury Trains Collide In Fog; Several Persons Hurt

Montgomery, Ala., May 8—(AP)—The Hummingbird, Louisville and Nashville streamliner, ran headon into another luxury train in a dense fog 20 miles north of here early today.

Several persons were injured but only three required hospitalization; the others were given first aid treatment at the scene.

The second train, the Miami to Chicago Florida Arrow, was standing still when the collision occurred. A trainman who declined to be quoted by name, said the Hummingbird missed a signal in the fog and failed to take a siding.

The engines of both trains, and two cars of the Arrow, were derailed, but none overturned. The Hummingbird was southbound from Cincinnati to New Orleans. After a delay of about four hours both trains continued their runs behind new engines.

The wreck did not block traffic. Other trains by-passed it on a siding.

Party Organizer Killed In Fight

Charleston, S. C., May 8—(AP)—A seaman faced murder charges today following the fatal stabbing of the president of this city's Wallace-for-president club in the local National Maritime Union headquarters.

Detective Herman R. Berkman said Robert New, port agent for the NMU, died shortly after a fight at the union's headquarters. Rudolph Sirrio, 49, of the Seaman's Home, was treated for cuts on the arm and charged with murder. Berkman added.

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White House Summons Rail Operators For Conference

Has Birthday



Washington, May 8—(AP)—President Truman observed his 64th birthday today with his attention on the threatened rail strike—and its possible effect on his cross-country travel plans.

His transcontinental talking tour calls for the use of the special Presidential train—the last word in railroad equipment.

Unless the White House succeeds in its efforts to avert the rail walk-out Tuesday, Mr. Truman, like millions of other citizens, may have to alter his travel plans. In that case he could use the Presidential plane—but that would eliminate his scheduled rear platform appearances on the June trip to the West coast.

The President will take time today to attend a birthday party arranged by his staff.

Former Burmese Premier Hanged

Five Henchmen Also Die For Murders Of Cabinet Men

Rangoon, Burma, May 8—(AP)—U. Saw, pre-war Burmese premier, and five of his henchmen were hanged at dawn today for the machine gun murders last July 10 of seven cabinet ministers.

U. Saw, convicted ringleader in the assassinations and attempted coup, was hanged at 5:15 a.m. By 6:30 the gallows trap had been sprung beneath the others.

The dapper, westernized U. Saw was granted a final request—to be hanged alone. He had complained the original plan to hang the six in pairs was not dignified. Officials permitted this final, life-saving gesture.

While government motion picture cameras whirled, U. Saw, wearing a yellow shirt and baggy Chinese trousers, walked into the courtyard. He knelt briefly in Buddhist prayer at the foot of the gallows. Then he walked firmly up the dirt ramp.

A witness said he smiled and murmured another prayer. He put on the traditional white tunic worn by persons convicted of murder in Burma, and stood at attention for a moment. Then his hands were manacled behind him and the white death cap was slipped over his head.

The noose was put around his neck and seconds later the trap flew open beneath him. Witnesses said he died without a struggle and his body swayed gently at the end of the rope.

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House Committee Urges Draft To Bolster Defense

Believes Soviet May Now Be Willing To Risk Showdown Rather Than Wait

Washington, May 8—(AP)—A Congressional committee said today it believes "the Soviet Union may now be willing to risk a showdown" with the United States.

To forestall such a "rash decision" by Russian leaders, the House Armed service committee said, this country should strengthen its ground and sea forces through a manpower draft. And it added:

"A 70-group air force is not a substitute for selective service."

Both the Senate and House have approved expanding the nation's air arm from 55 to 70 groups over the next five years. But as yet they have taken no action on President Truman's request for a temporary draft and universal military training.

The House group's normal report—accompanied by a stinging dissent by a five-man minority—was issued as Senate Republican leaders confirmed the top priority they have given all defense legislation between now and the June 19 adjournment date.

The committee majority recommended prompt passage of a bill by chairman Andrews to draft men from 19 through 25 for two years' service. The committee approved the measure 28 to 5 last Monday.

The majority report's warning of possible Russian showdown intentions coincided with a statement by Gen. Jonathan Wainwright that the Russians would launch an all-out war only as a "last resort."

In a letter to Republican Congressional leaders urging the return of Gen. Douglas MacArthur to testify on preparedness plans, Wainwright said:

"He (MacArthur) knows only too well that present enemies of the United States and our world desire first to accomplish their objective of the destruction of our constitutional democracy by means of revolution and civil war."

"Their last resort only would be real war from the land, sea and air."

The House committee said recent Soviet moves in Europe—such as the Communist victory in Czechoslovakia—have convinced it that "the Soviet Union may now be willing to risk a showdown on the assumption that the future can bring only a worsening of the Soviet position."

Should the talks fail to result in a new agreement, the present contract will be allowed to expire at midnight tonight.

The statement was made by G. S. Dring, assistant vice-president of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company.

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Insulation Meets Another Challenge In Condensation

State College, Pa.—Most Condensation, a new public enemy.

Condensation puts captive moisture between the interior and exterior of your home, says the Pennsylvania State College engineering experiment station where preventative measures and cures are being studied.

The newer, better-built, compact and easy-to-heat homes are especially susceptible to condensation's attack—to saturate and then rot the timbers. This is due to the sealing of cracks and crevices with insulation, explains F. G. Hechler, director of the Penn State experiments.

"What we design," says Hechler, "we're interested in keeping the heat in and the cold out, and vice versa." The Penn State engineer declares the moisture indoors enters a great pressure to go outdoors. It penetrates the porous interior wall. If the moisture escapes through the exterior wall as it enters from the warm side, no serious damage results. But if the moisture does not escape it causes condensation.

Hechler has these suggestions for reducing condensation in your home:

1. Place a barrier to the passage of vapor within the wall, somewhere near the warm surface.
2. Ventilate your attic regularly.
3. Eliminate sources of excess humidity. Never dry laundry in your home.
4. Paint porous interior walls.
5. If you have a crawl space under your home, cover the ground surface with asphalt roofing to reduce the amount of water evaporated.

Modern home builders, who found the economically-heated house, also uncovered a new and very serious problem in condensation, Hechler declares.

Insulating batts are now available with a moisture barrier on the face. Mineral wool batts come complete

with moistureproof paper. Some combine the reflective insulation of aluminum foil with the blanket insulation of batts. Metal foil naturally forms a vapor barrier.

Ventilation of crawl spaces is highly important. Such ventilation should not be closed in cold weather. Ralph R. Britton, engineering adviser to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, made a study of condensation damage and reported:

"Wood has rotted away, steel has corroded badly, insulation has deteriorated, and there have been many paint failures in outside walls. We have also experienced deterioration of inside plaster finish and in some cases total collapse of ceilings."

How Fluorescent Lights Act Best

Fluorescent lighting has captivated the imagination among home planners.

Fixtures for this type of lighting cost more, but the operating cost is lower than for incandescent lights. However, the color effect of fluorescent lights must be considered. Sometimes they give the complexion a sallow green cast.

One way to avoid this is to use fluorescent tubes in cover lighting, where the indirect rays blend with the colors of the decoration.

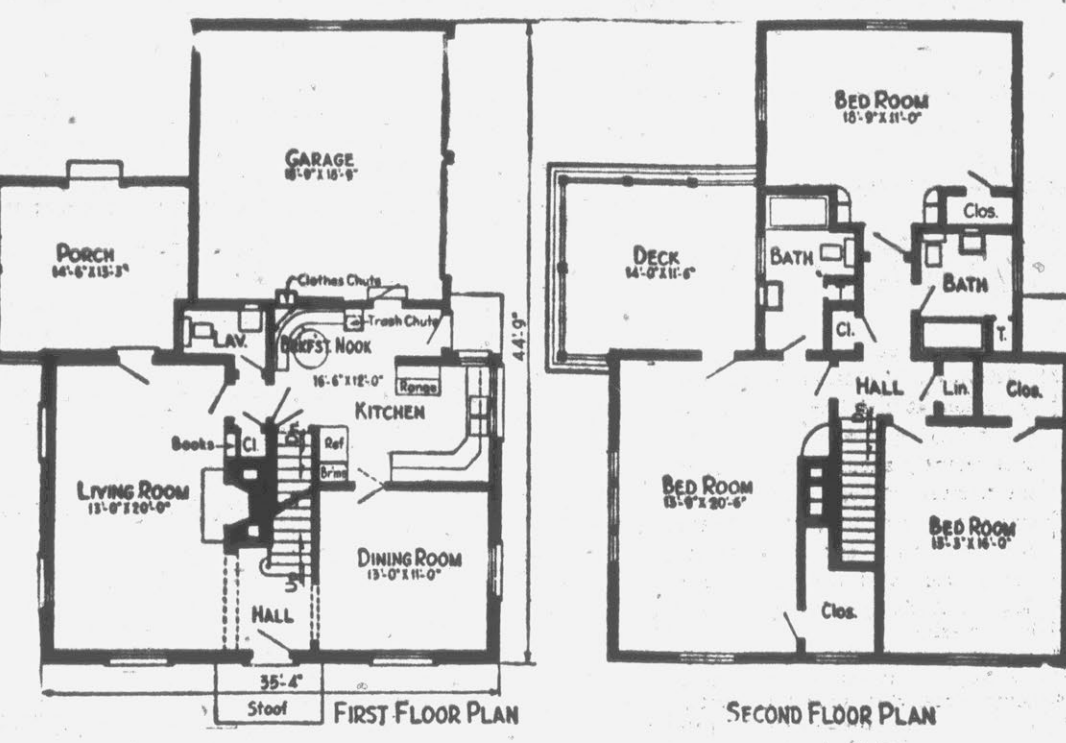
Plug-In Base Strip For Electric Outlet

Aldermen In Busy Monthly Session

The Board of Aldermen, in monthly session at the City Hall Thursday night, repealed the dog ordinance recently adopted which limited the number of dogs a person may own and keep on his premises in the city. Bill Drum and Mrs. Lindsey Savage requested the repeal for a large number of persons. Mayor Jack Boyd presided.

Judge J. W. H. Roberts, representing Negro citizens of the "Bama, South Greenville, since that section was taken into the city limits, petitioned for water, electric and sewerage facilities. This was referred to the Utilities Commission.

The Sheppard Memorial Library Commission requested an increase of \$400 in the library's operating expenses. This was referred to the Budget Committee.

The board passed a resolution changing the 351 parking meters in the city from one-hour to two-hour parking periods at the request of President Bill Taft of the Merchants Association.

June H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, requested the Board of Aldermen to approve a loan of \$10,000 from the State Library Fund for school equipment. This was approved.

The board authorized the City School Board to construct an elementary Negro school building on land adjacent to Brown Hill Negro Cemetery in the western part of the city.

Pitt County Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson was given permission to hook up his office by remote control with the city's police radio station. Permission was granted subject to the will of the Board of Aldermen.

A resolution was passed requiring property owners to repair broken and bulging sidewalks abutting their property.

The board instructed the tax department to proceed with advertising delinquent real estate taxes.

An ordinance was ordered drawn which will require buildings constructed partly in the fire zone and partly out of it to be built according to fire zone ordinance requirements.

Miss Mary L. Langley Clerk at the City Hall, who was in the hospital some time and now confined to her home by several broken vertebrae, received in a fall in the snow, was granted leave of absence until the end of the fiscal year—June 30.

During last night's meeting the aldermen discussed at length financial matters concerning the Utilities Commission and the city.

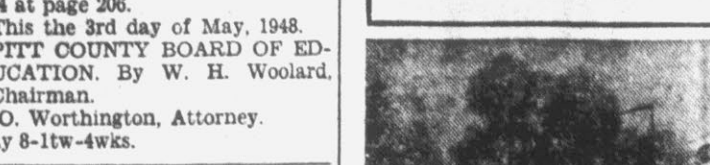

Who Among Us Are "Producers"? Another thing: We must accept the economic truth that in a period of prosperity people will not be content with a mere "something to eat." Alert and informed families will ask more about the nutritional values of the foods they eat. Their goods are grown, hence, I predict that housewives of the "fifties" will become students of the principle that good foods originate in good soils. The agriculture of the "fifties" will tend toward a combine of engineering and organic chemistry. Then there are hundreds of important new inventions ready to come on the market.

When the U. S. Air Force was at its peak in World War II, it had 243 groups, or a total of about 40,000 combat planes.

Now it has 55 groups, with a total of 5,500 combat planes in active service and 7,500 in storage.

The 70 groups will call for 6,889 active combat planes and 8,100 in storage.

That doesn't just mean increasing the 5,500 planes in the 55 groups to 6,889 in 70 groups.

Year by year the older planes will have to be replaced to give this country the most up-to-date Air Force in the world.

So, although the Air Force this year will order 2,727 planes, year after year between now and 1952—and year after year beyond that—it will have to keep on ordering thousands of planes.

This may give an idea of why the Air Force wants all those planes: It aims at making the Air Force jet-propelled as soon as possible, except in the case of the heaviest bombers.

Right now it has some experimental models of the B-36, the heaviest bomber, which is designed to fly 10,000 miles but hasn't so

far. The Air Force has ordered 85 of the B-36s.

The Air Force has a lot of the latest propeller-type fighter planes. In time many of these will be replaced by jet-fighters.

The B-29 was the biggest bomber the Air Force had in the war. (It still has 2,200 of them.)

They'll be replaced in time by an improved propeller-type model, called the B-50.

The B-29 can make a 4,800-mile trip with a five-ton bombload. The B-50 can do 6,000 miles with the same load.
