

N. C. Delegates For Party Meet Given Free Hand

State Demo Convention Votes Unanimously To Send Uninstructed Body

Raleigh, N. C., May 21—(AP)—The Democratic state convention voted unanimously yesterday to send its delegates to the party's national convention in Philadelphia July 12 without instructions on how to vote.

The biennial state convention selected 40 delegates and 40 alternates to cast the state's 32 national convention votes. State Democratic Chairman Wilkins P. Horton offered the free rein resolution.

The platform endorsed by the convention, while moderate in statements, did not mention the name of President Truman or "civil rights."

Col. William T. Joyner of Raleigh, the keynote speaker, set the pattern for the convention when he declared that the proper way to settle party differences "is by debate and action within the Democratic party."

Joyner told the approximately 3,000 delegates he could think "of nothing so ineffectual as a revolt against the Democratic party over the civil rights issue."

"A so-called revolt, the refraining from voting the national ticket in 1948 because of the civil rights issue within the party," he said, "could only result in aid to the National Republican ticket. The Republican party has gone much, much further in its advocacy of federal interference in racial adjustments than has the Democratic party."

Major L. P. McLendon of Greensboro, an attorney and a former chairman of the state board of elections, served as chairman of the convention.

The platform, noting that the state is in sound financial condition, pledged support of higher salaries for teachers and other state employees.

Conscious of its absence from the platform was any mention of the liquor issue.

U.S. Demands Lebanon Free American Citizens

Washington, May 21—(AP)—The United States demanded today that the Lebanese government release 49 American citizens taken off the American steamship Marine Carp at Beirut.

The State Department announced that the U. S. Minister to Lebanon, Lowell Pinkerton, was instructed to submit the demand.

The Department announced at the same time that American diplomatic representatives in all 15 countries, including Lebanon, have been instructed to advise these governments that the United States would "view seriously" any discrimination against American citizens because of race, color or creed.

The group removed from the Marine Carp were between 19 and 55, and the Lebanese authorities took the stand they might bear arms for the new Jewish state of Israel. The Marine Carp was en route to Palestine.

The American citizens, together with 29 other nationalities, were interned in former French barracks at Baker, Lebanon.

The Department said Lebanese authorities had threatened to use force if necessary, in removing them from the ship when it touched at Beirut Wednesday.

Possible violence or bloodshed apparently was averted because Pinkerton advised the passengers not to resist seizure.

Pinkerton first intervened in an effort to prevent the removal of the Americans and then formally objected to their seizure.

Midnight March Ends Shriners' Meet At Wilson

Wilson, N. C., May 21—(AP)—The Grand March at midnight here last night closed the two-day colorful spring ceremonial of the Sudan's Shrine temple.

Earlier, more than 10,000 people lined Wilson's Main thoroughfare to watch the gaily-dressed Shriners candidates for the temple and 18 Eastern N. C. high school bands march in their spring parade. On a special reviewing stand, Dr. Erick Bell, the high potentate, reviewed his colorful troops and the other marchers.

Outcome of Vote In Oregon Today To Damage Loser

Will Be Political Setback For Either Candidate Stassen Or Dewey

Washington, May 21—(AP)—Oregon voters may flash a "slow" signal today on the presidential hopes of either Harold E. Stassen or Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

While the two major contenders for the Republican nomination are battling it out on the Pacific coast, a third, Senator Robert A. Taft, will be invading New Jersey territory where Dewey and Stassen have been claiming support.

It is Taft Day at Princeton, where Stassen visited last month. Dewey also has been invited to drop in for a chat with the New Jersey delegation before the Philadelphia convention opens just one month hence.

The outcome of Oregon's primary vote today was generally regarded here as likely to be heavily damaging politically to the loser. The winner gets the support of the state's 12 delegates. But a lot more is involved in this last contested balloting before the convention.

Most politicians look at it this way: If Dewey wins, he will go a long way toward wiping out the defeats he suffered at Stassen's hands in Wisconsin and Nebraska. He will be reinstated as a top notch contender.

If he loses, the New York governor will have little claim left to being the No. 1 candidate for the nomination. He still will have 134 delegates lined up in his corner, but he may find his secondary backing melting away rapidly.

If Stassen wins, he will have a string of three popular primary victories—plus a write-in victory in Pennsylvania—to back his contention that he is the popular choice of the rank and file. He will have a powerful weapon for touching off a convention battle like the one that gave the late Wendell L. Willkie the 1940 nomination.

If Stassen loses, his foes will say that the Minnesota's only real popular appeal is in the Middle West, which the Republicans generally chalk up in their column anyway. His loss to Dewey in New Hampshire and his failure to get a majority of the 23 delegates in his contest with Taft in Ohio will be cited in this connection.

Headquarters To Be Transferred

Washington, May 21—(AP)—Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.) said today the Army Air Forces will transfer headquarters of its strategic air command nerve center of its long range striking force—from Andrews Field, Md., to Offutt Field near Omaha.

Wherry told a reporter the transfers will be made as quickly as possible. As part of the shift, the air forces must move headquarters of the second air force from Offutt Field to some other midwestern location.

Huge Budget For New York City

New York, May 21—(AP)—The only billion-plus budget in America except the federal government's was adopted yesterday by the city council.

The 1948-49 fiscal year budget of \$1,160,538,857 is the largest in New York City's history.

Approved last month by the Board of Estimate, the budget becomes effective July 1.

Dante, Va., May 21—(AP)—Grim and sweat-soaked rescue crews early today brought to the surface the last of six miners killed last night after a roof section collapsed in the Clinchfield Coal Company's No. 2 mine.

End In Sight For Jewish Defenders Garrison In Old Walled Jerusalem Driven Back Into Thin Defense Line As Arab Legion Tightens Its Siege

Within the Old City in Jerusalem, May 21—(AP)—The end of a four-day-old battle for old walled Jerusalem seemed to be in sight today.

Arabs claimed last night that their forces controlled 80 per cent of the old city, seized by their forces or abandoned by the Jews.

The Jewish Haganah and Irgun Zvai Leumi had been driven back to a thin defense line along the west side of the Jewish quarter.

Midway of that line, they were holed up for a last stand in the Beit Yaacov or Hurva (Ruin) Synagogue, on a spot where Jews have worshipped for 700 years and two earlier temples have been destroyed.

The Jews withdrew that synagogue yesterday with Arab capture of the Tiferet Israel Synagogue, Jerusalem's tallest structure, to the east.

King Abdullah's Trans-Jordan Arab legion was at their backs, threatening to block escape. The legion had most of the Armenian quarter, west of the Jewish section. It was reported unofficially in firm control of Bion Gate just below that quarter in the southernmost of Jerusalem's 400-year-old walls.

Legionnaires on the gate traded automatic weapon fire yesterday with Jews in a school on Mount Zion on a few score yards away.

(A delayed dispatch from Carter L. Davison of the Associated Press in the Jewish area of Jerusalem said that when 100 young Jews penetrated Zion Gate Wednesday, it was the first time in almost 500 years the city walls had been forced. The dispatch was dated Wednesday. The Jews went in to reinforce defenders of the Jewish quarter.)

In the new city outside the walls, the legion had thrust from the northern limits down Ramallah road to the Damascus gate on the north side of the old city and last night was trying to clear the Jews from Allenby Square opposite the gate.

West of these legion gunners pushed back Jewish defenders from the north side of the Mea Shearim quarter, including central prison, the law courts, the Russian cathedral and the Abyssinian church.

Arab artillery covered the Ramallah road push. The legion bombarded the Sanhedriya Jewish quarter to the northwest of Mea Shearim, threatening the Arab right flank. Arab volunteers shelled the Hebrew university on Mount Scopus to the northeast, aiming for Haganah snipers.

Senate Votes Today On Overriding Veto

Washington, May 21—(AP)—Both sides predicted victory today in a Senate fight over President Truman's veto of a bill to let qualified senators call for FBI reports on top atomic officials.

Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) said he was confident the Senate would override the veto. Senator McMahon (D-Conn.) predicted flatly that the President would be upheld.

Mr. Truman, in vetoing the measure Saturday, called it "an unwarranted encroachment of the legislative upon the executive branch."

The bill passed the Senate and House without a recorded vote in either chamber.

Preliminary debate late yesterday split pretty much along party lines, but McMahon veto he didn't think the final vote would follow that pattern.

Acting Majority Leader Wherry of Nebraska engineered an agreement to shut off debate this afternoon and vote on whether to override the veto.

Austrian Treaty Efforts Finally Reach Dead End

Nearly Two Years Of Negotiations Fail; Talks Suspended Indefinitely

London, May 21—(AP)—Four-power efforts to write a peace treaty for occupied Austria hit dead end today, after nearly two years of futile negotiations.

Official United States sources said the negotiations broke down completely Wednesday, after a two week temporary suspension during which efforts were made to compromise the differences between Russia and the western powers—the United States, Britain and France.

As a result, these informants said, it was decided last night to call off the confab indefinitely.

The breakdown came, they said, when Samuel Reber, chief of the American delegation, privately conferred with M. P. Kotimov, head of the Soviet delegation, to discuss the prospects of compromise.

Kotimov, the U. S. sources said, advised Reber he had been instructed by Moscow to stand fast in support of Yugoslavia's claims against Austria. The western powers oppose these claims.

Yugoslavia has demanded approximately 800 square miles of Austrian territory in mineral-rich Carinthia and scenic Styria, both of which have numbers of Slavic residents. The Yugoslavs also have made reparations claims against Austria.

Just before the talks were suspended two weeks ago, Reber outlined the American position by saying that the United States would insist upon two basic principles in any Austrian peace settlement:

1. Austria's frontiers must remain as they were before Anschluss in 1938.

2. Austria must pay no reparations.

May Ask Inquiry Into Slaying Of Commentator

Washington, May 21—(AP)—Congress may be asked to investigate the slaying in Greece of George Polk, American news commentator.

Polk's bullet-riddled, trussed up body was found Sunday in Salonika Bay. He was a correspondent for the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Rep. Sadowski (D-Mich.) told newsmen he will urge the state department to investigate the case fully "and if that fails, I will ask the House to appoint a special committee to investigate it."

"This man was an American citizen and certainly his death in this manner should not be allowed to be overlooked."

The State Department has said American embassy and consular officials are working with the Greek government on an investigation of Polk's death.

Police Captain Slain In Office

Newark, N. J., May 21—(AP)—Police Capt. Thomas J. Rowe was shot and killed today in his office at first precinct headquarters, and Chief John Haller said a tall, red-headed woman identified as Mrs. Ann Powers was being held for questioning.

On Atomic Espionage

It Wouldn't Be Easy To Give Away Atomic Secrets, Says Dr. Edward U. Condon; Fantastic Amount of Scientific Details Involved In New Secret Weapons

Washington, May 21—(AP)—How easy would it be to give away atomic secrets? It wouldn't be easy, says Dr. Edward U. Condon, one of the country's top scientists and head of the U. S. Bureau of Standards.

Condon has been accused by the House Un-American Activities Committee of being one of the "weakest links" in our atomic security.

But the scientist, whose bureau handles some atomic work, says of himself that he is "absolutely reliable." More of this later.

It would be easy, Condon says, for anyone wishing to betray this country to tell a spy we're working on some certain kind of atomic project.

For example: a spy might be able to learn that the U. S. is working on a super-super atomic bomb. But—giving away the details of that project is something altogether different. This is what Condon says:

"Even this, to be really effective, requires the receiver to be a man of high scientific and technical training. x x x

"I feel sorry for any modern Mata Hari who might be assigned to get the secret of the atomic bomb by working her wiles on a young Army sergeant."

In short, Condon says it is extremely difficult to give away scientific secrets, for several reasons:

1. The mere principles of modern scientific military developments are extraordinarily complicated.

2. The really valuable working designs are even more detailed.

3. An ordinary, flat-foot spy wouldn't be able to understand them. A scientist would be needed to understand the documents.

Condon said all this last night in an address before the Washington Academy of Sciences.

It was a lengthy talk in which Condon stressed the need for secrecy but spoke out against strangling scientists in their work or playing up spy scares.

The House Un-American Activities Committee jumped on Condon several months ago.

It accused him of having associated—knowingly or unknowingly—with an alleged Soviet spy. The BI had investigated Condon before this attack by the committee (Continued on Page Eight)

Goldsboro, May 21—(AP)—Republican headquarters for Eastern Carolina will be set up in the next four to six weeks, Algernon L. Butler of Clinton said today.

Butler is head of a committee named by Republicans to select the city in which the headquarters will be established. The party previously has not had an Eastern Carolina headquarters.

Volunteer Forest Fire Fighters Are Encouraged After All-Night Battle

Asheville, N. C., May 21—(AP)—Weary volunteers fighting a devastating forest fire in Transylvania county were encouraged for the first time today with the announcement that a fire line has been completed around the 65 blaze.

More than 60 students at Brevard College responded to an emergency call for volunteers and worked from 1 p. m. yesterday to 8 a. m. today to help finish the giant fire line before a wind, which died down during the night, returns to threaten additional areas.

Fire warden and forest rangers directing the 250-man fire fighting force were reluctant to say that the blaze has been brought under control, pointing out that if the wind resumes before the main fire line has been firmly established it may prove effective.

Last night the fire had surged over 3,000 acres of the rugged, thickly-vegetated Buck-Forest and rich Mountain woodland areas to within a half mile of the Cedar Mountain residential section. It burned to within 100 yards of the Greenville highway in several places but no homes were reported damaged.

No injuries have been reported so far although several firemen were overcome by smoke. The most dangerous period is considered to be the early morning hours after midnight when fatigue reduces the numbers and efficiency of the volunteer workers.

Possible End In Sight Of Meat Packers' Strike

The possible end of the prolonged threat at International Harvester company plants were bright spots in the nation's industrial strike today.

Results of the vote by the striking CIO Packinghouse workers on whether to end their 67-day old strike were expected to be announced today at the Union's national headquarters in Chicago.

Herbert March, strike director, predicted the vote to end the work stoppage on Company terms will favor return to all plants except Wilson and Company. He predicted a close vote for returning to work at plants of three other major packers—Swift, Cudahy and Armour.

Truman To Seek Extend Benefits Social Security

Washington, May 21—(AP)—President Truman will ask Congress in a special message to extend benefits of the Social Security law.

Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) Senate minority leader, said after a while House conference today that the message will go to Capitol Hill within a few days.

Presumably the message will recommend extension of Social Security benefits to farm labor, domestics, self-employed groups not now covered.

The conference also was attended by House Minority Leader Rayburn (Tex) and Democratic members of the Senate finance and the House ways and means committees.

Policy On Palestine

U. S. and England Appear Taking Opposite Sides In Conflict; Not Working Toward Different Ends; Wires Crossed; Defense Of Mediterranean And Suez Canal

The sharp differences between the two major democracies—Britain and America—over the Arab-Jewish issue are bringing many anxious queries to this column.

Why should we find the United States recognizing the new Jewish state of Israel, while England withholds recognition as Arab troops (some of which are British trained and supported) move into the Holy Land for the attack. Why, in short, should the two powers appear to be taking opposite sides in the conflict. Well, we are treading on delicate ground here. However, I think we are safe in saying that London and Washington aren't really working towards different ends. They just have got their wires crossed in a most disconcerting manner, which is causing much heartburning in both capitals.

Britain's main objective, as I see it, is to safeguard her interests in the Middle East. These include control of the strategic areas necessary for maintenance of her life-line through the Mediterranean and the Suez Canal to the Far East. Many of these strategic bases are Arabic. England also is vitally interested in the Middle East petroleum fields—as is Uncle Sam, and in a big way. It may surprise many people to find Britain thus apparently putting heavy emphasis on her Mediterranean defenses once more. It's

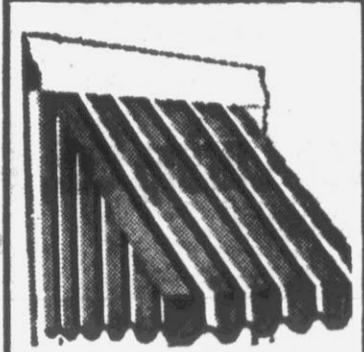



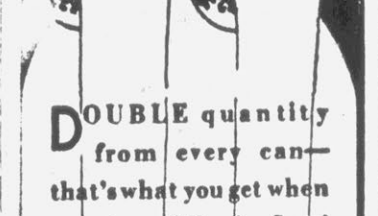

His statement that he will fight Louis the way he is told reflects his entire attitude.

"Boxing is like a football team," he says. "There is a captain, and a coach, and a quarterback. One guy calls the signals. I'm the guy that carries the ball."

"There's been a lot of credit given to me, but just like in football the crowd never sees the guys that run the interference."

Jersey Joe doesn't conceal the fact he thinks a great deal of his trainers, Dan Florio and Joey Allen, his manager, Joe Webster, and his becker, Felix Boonchichio.

## Calumet Profits Over Million On Winning Horses

New York, May 21—(AP)—If you want to win money in the racing business, all you have to do is go out and get a few good horses—like Citation, Coaltown, Ferrent and Faultless.

Thanks to this quartet, Warren Wright's Calumet Farm already is well ahead of its record cash-collecting year of 1947, when the stable's performers banked an unheard of \$1,402,436.

The race will be a 100-meter contest involving Pell-Mel Patton of the University of Southern California, Lloyd La Beach of Panama and seven others of national or regional repute.

The largest crowd since the 1932 Olympic games here is in prospect and estimates ranged up to 60,000, depending on the weather.

Kinston's Charlie Keller and Ayden's Jim Tabor have earned permanent places in the annals of major league slugging. Each of them proved capable of wholesale bombardment. Back in 1940, Keller connected for a total of 12 bases in two different games. The New York Yankees outfielder was the only player in the American League with such a record. On July 28 he clouted three home runs against the Chicago White Sox, and, incidentally, Detroit's Pinky Higgins did the same thing against the Boston Red Sox on May 20. However, Keller went Higgins one better, for on June 14 he slammed two homers, a triple, and a single against the St. Louis Browns. As for Jim Tabor, his best fireworks came quite appropriately on July 4, 1939, while playing third base for the Boston Red Sox. He tied two home records in a single afternoon. Tabor smashed a circuit clout in the first half of the holiday double-header with Connie Mack's Athletics, and added three more in the nightcap. His four round-trippers for the double bill tied a record held jointly by Earl Averill and Jimmy Foss. And since two of his second game homers came with the bases loaded, he also tied a mark established by the late Tony Lasser.

Henry T. Low, of Bulawayo Southern Rhodesia, was named second vice president and Joge Fidel Duon of Tegucigalpa, Honduras, third vice president.

Tennent was named director from the eastern United States; C. Reginald Smith of Albion, Mich., from the Midwest and Harry F. Russell, of Hastings, Neb., from the western zone.

Frank E. Spain, of Birmingham, Ala., reported the convention approved an appropriation of \$150,000 annually for three years for a Rotary foundation to promote international understanding.

The ships New Amsterdam and Uruguay, which brought more than 1,000 persons from New York for the convention are expected to sail for the return trip tomorrow. More than 7,500 persons registered for the convention.

Talk of Possible Second Primary

Raleigh, N. C., May 21—(AP)—Will a second primary be necessary in the gubernatorial elections? Two candidates have pretty definite ideas on the subject.

In statements yesterday, Charles M. Johnson said "in my opinion there will not be a second primary. I think I'm going to win in the first."

His opponent for reelection, former Governor J. Melville Broughton, was at Rocky Mount this morning, at Fountain this afternoon, and is scheduled to address the graduating class of Hobcoken High School in Pamlico County tonight.

Cotton Growers In Pitt Are Entitled To Enter Contest

Cotton growers in Pitt county are eligible to enter the N. C. State Cotton growing contest. This contest is sponsored by the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, cooperating with the N. C. Cotton seed crushers association.

(Continued from Page One) But meantime the Holy Land is torn by bloody strife. What of that? Some observers familiar with the Middle East believe that sooner or later the Arabs and the Jews will make a deal for a division of Palestine, and end the war.

King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan, commander in chief of all the Arab forces, is ambitious for expansion and might well be interested in bargaining.

If some compromise is achieved it may not come until after a considerable period of warfare. How that will go is anybody's guess at this writing. The warring forces haven't yet come to full grips, and there is nothing by which to gauge the trend.

The Commerce Department officials considered Condon okay. But the House committee demanded to see the BI report. The department refused.

Condon himself called for an investigation to end what he called "public smears" of scientists inside and outside government.

The Atomic Energy Commission told Congress Condon had no access to top atomic secrets. The House committee still demanded the FBI report.

Finally, the Commerce Department turned the FBI report on Condon over to President Truman. The committee couldn't get it from him.

Then Condon publicly asked the President to let the committee have the report. So far Mr. Truman has shown no sign of doing so.
