## Research Plane Surpasses Speed Of Sound In Test

### Air Secretary Symington Says Feat Accomplished Several Times

Washington, June 10—(AP)—Air Secretary Symington said today the Air Force research plane XS-1 several times has flown "much faster than the speed of sound."

Symington told a news conference that so far as he knows no other plane has achieved super-sonic speed, that is, faster than sound travels.

The first and only pilot to fly the XS-1 beyond the so-called sound wall is Capt. Charles E. Yeager, 25, a fighter pilot who destroyed 13 German planes while serving with the Air Force.

Yeager, a native of Myra, W. Va., is a test pilot assigned to the Air Materiel Command at Wright Field, Ohio.

The speed of sound is 763 miles an hour under standard conditions. Standard conditions are with a temperature of 59 degrees Fahrenheit at sea level.

Sound's speed of travel decreases as temperature drops. At 67 degrees below zero its speed is 662 miles an hour. This speed of sound increases as the temperature rises.

The XS-1 flies at very high altitudes where the temperatures are lower with increasing height.

Therefore, the relative speed of the XS-1 when approaching the speed of sound would be only 962 miles an hour at the high altitudes.

That speed has been reached near ground level by the Douglas D-558 Skyrocket, a Navy research plane powered with a conventional turbo-jet engine.

The Skyrocket, however, flew in relatively hot temperatures where the speed of sound is higher or more than 800 miles an hour. The XS-1 thus avoided aerodynamic problems which are encountered under conditions flown by the XS-1.

The XS-1 has a wing span of 28 feet, a length of 31 feet and is 11 feet high. Its empty weight is 4,650 pounds, including more than 800 pounds of devices for measuring performance.

It carries 8,000 pounds of fuel for its rocket motor.

The plane was designed to reach 1.75 miles an hour at 40,000 feet and 1,700 miles an hour at 80,000 feet.

## Backseat Given To Ben Franklin

Moscow, June 10—(AP)—Trud the Soviet trade union organ, declared yesterday that a Russian scientist named Lomonosov discovered the electrical nature of lightning a year before Benjamin Franklin flew his kite.

The paper criticized an article in a Soviet paper which said Lomonosov's studies of the electrical nature of lightning were inspired by that work of Franklin. Trud said that wasn't so.

It quoted Lomonosov himself as claiming the discovery and denying that he was indebted to Franklin's researches.

## Legislator Gets Rumor Of Cotton Speculation

Washington, June 10—(AP)—Rep. Stefan (R-Neb.) said today he has heard that "certain interests have bought up thousands of bales of cotton" hoping for a "substantial" profit from the European recovery program.

Stefan said the House Appropriations committee, which received that information, has cautioned officials of the Economic Cooperation Administration against paying inflated prices for cotton and other commodities.

"It is estimated that over a half billion dollars' worth of cotton will be purchased for the relief program," the Nebraska said in a weekly newsletter to his constituents. "Since this information leaked out the per pound price of cotton has jumped six cents."

"The committee has been told that certain interests have bought up thousands of bales of cotton, planning to sell it under ECA at a substantial increase in price."

Stefan said the House group is afraid similar practices might be followed with wheat, fats and oils, dried fruits, dairy products, steel and other items.

He said he fears serious misuse of ECA funds in the Chinese phase of the foreign aid program.

He said:

"Experts on China have told the committee," he said, "that an ancient and widespread system of graft in China would dissipate not less than half of any aid given to that country, unless each item were closely followed by an American observer."

## Truman Blast Strikes Sparks From Republican Congressmen

Washington, June 10—(AP)—The political gloves came off today in the wake of President Truman's "worst congress" blast and a Republican lawmaker's "poorest president" retort.

The long distance verbal slugfest showed every sign of turning the coming campaign into the roughest and toughest in years.

The name calling started at Spokane where Mr. Truman, openly bidding for votes on his western tour, lashed out anew at the GOP-controlled Congress.

He held a civic celebration that the people deserve more of the present Congress if they fail to vote in November.

Then, in an exchange with a Spokane reporter from the rear platform of his special train, the President caustically referred to the Chicago Tribune and the Spokane Spokesman-Review as "the worst in the United States."

"Those papers, he added, "got just what you ought to have—you've got the worst congress in the United States you've ever had."

There was no immediate comment from publishers of either paper.

But GOP Congress members struck back swiftly and pointedly.

"There are a lot of people," commented House Republican leader Halleck of Indiana, "who think Mr. Truman is the poorest President we have had since George Washington was elected."

House Speaker Martin of Massachusetts added: "There are people who have said that about the President."

"That's mighty big talk coming from a small boy," said Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa.).

Rep. Hope (R-Kas), chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, suggested that "the frigid reception which the President is receiving in the West seems to have driven him to some loose and irresponsible talk."

GOP senators were somewhat more restrained in their public comment.

The Red Cross in Portland said 335 still were unaccounted for in the memorial day flooding of Vapourport housing city of 18,700, and it issued a "critical list" of 121 names. The relief agency said it has exhausted all means—relatives and Vapourport neighbors—of locating the 121.

## Cease Fire Orders Going Out To Troops In Palestine

Calco, June 10—(AP)—Cease fire orders are going out today to Arab and Jewish troops in the field. They are being told to stop shooting tomorrow morning for four weeks, during which efforts will be made to settle the month-old Palestine war peacefully.

Premier Tewfik Abu Alhuda announced in Amman, Trans-Jordan last night that Trans-Jordan forces in Palestine already have been ordered to cease fire at the appointed deadline—1 a. m. (EST) Friday. This would include the Arab Legion, one of the Arabs' main striking forces.

In Tel Aviv, Israel's Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok, said in announcing his government's acceptance of the United Nations-engineered truce, that Israel was ready to issue a cease fire to Jewish troops.

Count Mike Bernadotte, United Nations mediator, who announced the cease fire, told both the Arabs and Jews last night he hoped they would notify every commander on the Palestine battlefield of the date and hour of the cease fire in order to avoid misunderstandings.

Bernadotte said he would call a peace conference as soon as possible on the neutral Mediterranean island of Rhodes.

"We have achieved only the first step," Bernadotte told newsmen. "I assure you we are going to work with the same energy for the big result we hope to get—peace in Palestine."

Shertok declared that Israel's acceptance of the truce "is not a matter of military necessity to us."

"To the contrary," he added, "recent claims of Arab victories in Palestine have been based on proverbial Arab imagination and incurable British wishful thinking."

## Food Price Index Again Goes Up

New York, June 10—(AP)—The Dun and Bradstreet Wholesale Food Index climbed 14 cents in the week ended June 8 to 81.1, the sharpest rise since an increase of 31 cents was registered last September 9.

This compared with \$6.97 a week ago and \$6.12 in the corresponding week of 1947. The index represents the sum total of the price per pound of 31 foods in general use.

## Senate Pledges Final Vote For Draft Bill In Afternoon

### Lewis B. Schwellenbach Dies; Ill Several Weeks

Washington, June 10—(AP)—Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach died today.

The White House announced Schwellenbach passed away at 4:40 a. m. EDT, (3:40 EST) at Walter Reed hospital. He had been ill several weeks.

He was 53 years old and had been Labor Department Chief since June 30, 1945.

Mrs. Schwellenbach was at his bedside at the time of his death.

The White House said death resulted from "cardiac failure which complicated his recent illness."

President Truman, now on the West Coast, has been notified of his death.

No funeral arrangements have been made, the White House statement said.

Schwellenbach was a former Democratic Senator from Washington and Federal District Court Judge.

## Republican And Democratic Leaders Forecast Approval; Agreement To Vote Comes After Three Day-And-Night Sessions Of Angry Debate

Washington, June 10—(AP)—Worn down by talk, Senators pledged a final vote today on their peacetime draft bill.

They agreed to begin balloting on remaining amendments at 3 p. m. (EST) with the likelihood of the showdown rollcall an hour later.

Both Republican and Democratic leaders forecast that the military manpower bill would be approved. Then it moves over to the house for another battle.

That one won't be as drawn out—if it comes. But it still remains to be seen whether the powerful rules committee will let the bill reach the House floor.

The Senate's agreement to vote—coupled with a limit on debate—came after three consecutive day-and-night sessions. Clocks in the chamber had passed the midnight hour after 13 1-2 hours of angry debate.

As the climactic balloting neared, these were the major features of the bitterly contested measure to revise selective service:

1. All men from 18 through 26 would have to register, with those 19 through 25 subject to two years' service in the regular army, air force or navy.
2. Up to 160,000 18-year olds could volunteer for one year of training and thus escape the chance of being drafted at 19 for two years.
3. Both the regular and armed services and their reserves would be expanded, with the draft used to fill up any gaps left by lack of volunteers or re-enlistments.
4. The wartime selective service organization with its local draft boards would be revived for two years on a reduced scale.

Although several amendments are pending in the House, only one major change appeared possible.

Senator Morse (R-Ore.) wants to cut the term of drafters' service from 24 to 18 months. The Senate has just passed a vote on his bill last night before Morse realized what happened.

At his protest, the lawmakers agreed to give him a rollcall vote today on the question of reconsideration. If that passes, Morse could ask for a recorded tally on the 18 month proposal.

Backed by exhausted and sleep-deprived lawmakers, Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the acting Republican leader, won the agreement for today's final vote on his second try during the long evening.

"We must keep ourselves physically fit and tolerant," Wherry pleaded.

There were the usual last minute demands before all parties allowed the unanimous-consent motion to slide through.

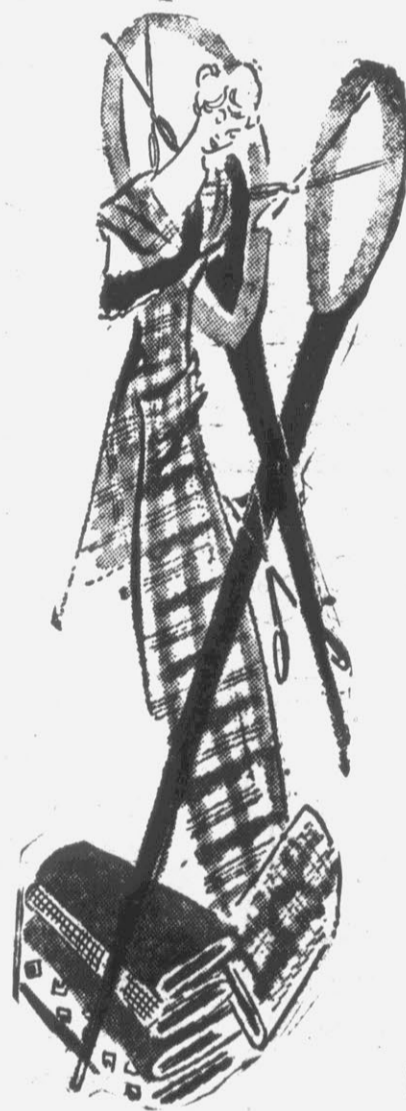

## WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS

Washington—Close to 10,000,000 Americans are expected to flock to their national parks on vacation jaunts this year. From Maine to the Pacific and on beyond to the Hawaiian Islands, from the Texas boundary to Canada and on into Alaska, these parks are located.

The exhibits they boast are as diversified as their geographical locations. There are geysers and hot springs; volcanoes, various stages; canyons and caverns; great glacier covered mountains; petrified trees, and living trees that were growing in the days of Ancient Rome and Greece, and even when Babylon lay at its height. There are high water falls, tumbling cascades, and beautiful blue mountain lakes; prehistoric "apartment houses" and sites connected with important events in our history.

The National Park Service suggests that if one of the more widely known national parks is your destination, you would be smart to make reservations well in advance for barring that, "you might be faced with the alternative of sleeping in your car."

In most of the major national parks there are hotel, lodge, house-keeping cabins, cafeteria, bus transportation, saddle horse, and similar services, provided by concessioners operating under contract with the government, and under the supervision of the National Park Service.

Rates for accommodations compare favorably with those charged at other resorts, or in the vicinity; and this despite the fact that in some of the parks, such as Yellowstone, Glacier, and Crater Lake, the concessioners receive returns on their investments only a few short months of the year.

This year, National Park Service says, motor transportation, saddle horse, and lodging rates will be about the same as last year. The main increase is in meals, which have increased in some of the parks from 10 to 15 percent.

In addition to hotel, lodge and cabin accommodations, free public campgrounds are operated by the National Park Service in most of the parks. Visitors may bring their own equipment and camp there. Each campground has fireplace, table, and benches, on separate individual campsites.

If, however, you are so "conditioned" to steam heat that roughing it does not appeal, there are hotel rooms as low as \$5.50 a day, American plan, or as high as \$14. The prices vary, of course, with the location of the parks and the types of accommodations.

legally constituted "Progressive Party" in North Carolina, it logically follows that it cannot get into court. That is the major premise upon which Attorney General Harry McMullan bases the state's demurrer to the law suit filed some days ago by Miss Mary Price as state chairman of the Wallace party, to force the state board of elections to place names of party candidates on the general election ticket this fall. If there is no party, then there cannot be a chairman of it, and so from legal viewpoint Chairman Price just ain't.

WRONG—The attorney general further contends that even if there were such a thing as a Progressive Party with a chairman, the approach to the issue is wrong. Miss Price as chairman would have no right to bring the suit. It would have to be brought by and in the name of the aggrieved person who had been refused a place on the ticket. Furthermore, the petition for a declaratory judgment is improper and this is not the kind of legal action in which a declaratory judgment can apply. Hearing on the demurrer has been tentatively set for next Friday before Judge W. C. Harris in Wake county.

APPEAL—Judge Harris' decision is almost certain to be appealed to the state supreme court. The supreme court does not convene for the fall term until the last Monday in August, and election laws require filing of a petition signed by 10,000 qualified voters at least 90 days before the general election, to establish a new party. That means the petition must be in not later than August 3. There just doesn't seem to be much hope for the Wallace Progressives to get any candidates other than for president and vice-president on the ticket, and prospects for getting these names on are not too bright at present.

### U. S. Population Predicted Will Be 192 Million

Chapel Hill, June 10—The Journal of the American Statistical Association has published an arti-

cle by Dr. Dudley J. Cowden, professor of economic statistics in the School of Commerce of the University of North Carolina, entitled "Simplified Methods of Fitting Certain Types of Growth Curves."

Most of the article was devoted to methods for fitting the logistic curve, which has been found useful for describing biological growth, in-

cluding human population growth. Although it was not the purpose of the article to forecast, it appears that if the growth of population of the United States follows the same mathematical pattern in the future that it has in the past a maximum of approximately 192 million will eventually be reached.

### Says Johnson Is Clique Candidate

Raleigh, June 10 (AP)—State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson was termed the hand-picked candidate of "a few powerful men" by gubernatorial candidate W. Kerr Scott in a state-wide radio address last night.

Scott, who will face Johnson in a second primary June 26, said results of the May 29 primary "prove our people are not willing to adopt the Russian system under which you can vote for or against only one man for each office."

He declared the first primary, in which he received 38.2 percent of the votes cast, Johnson 40 percent and three other candidates 21.8 "prove that a few powerful men cannot be 'king-makers' in our state this year."

Johnson, meanwhile, issued two separate statements from his headquarters. In the first he said he would ask the next legislature to authorize the appointment of more highway commissioners. In the second, he termed Scott "the greatest reverse field runner in North Carolina's political history."

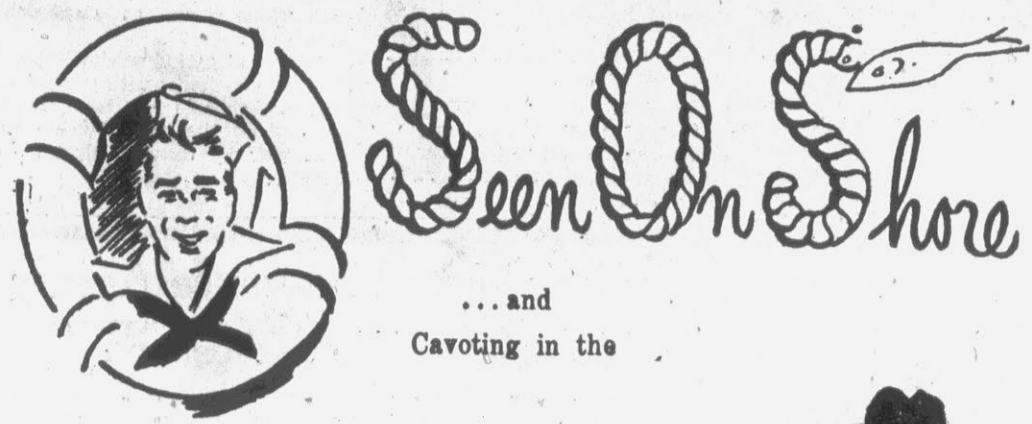

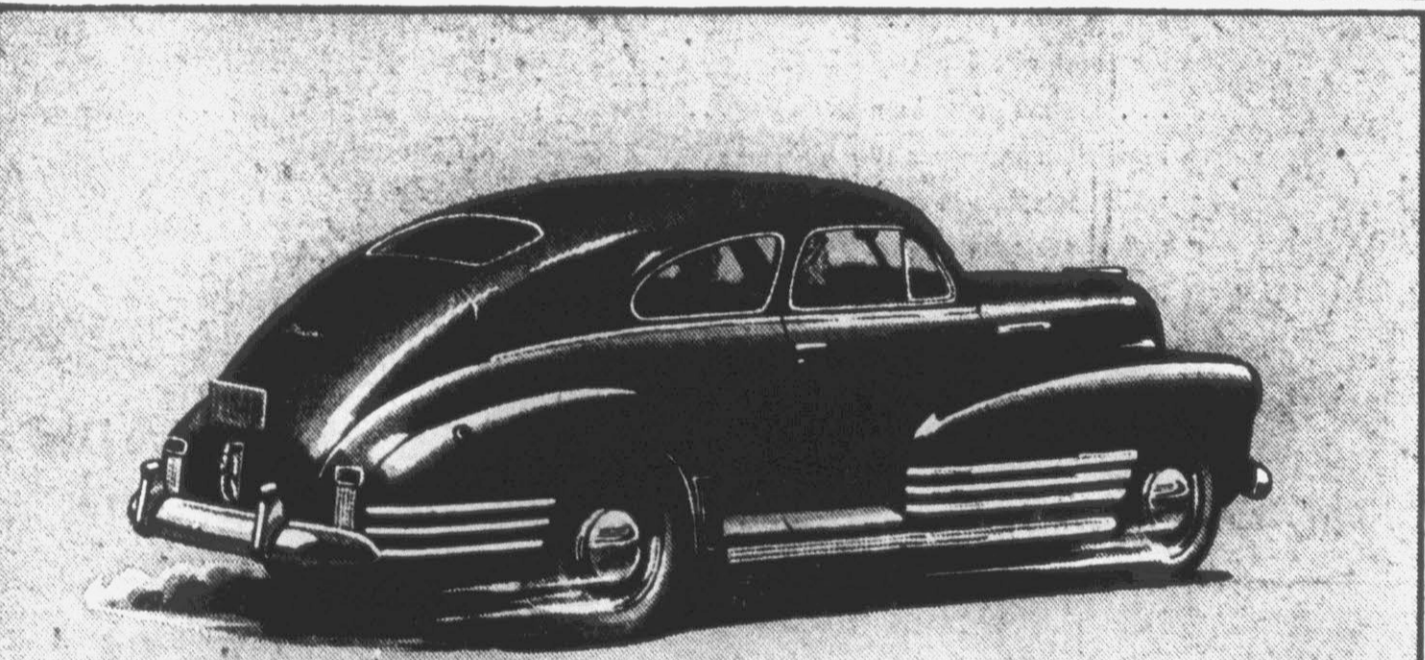

## Hogan Is Choice To Lead Pack In U. S. Open Play

New York—In many ways boxing and horse racing are similar. You pick a horse on his past performances or on workouts. In boxing you pick one of two rivals because you like his record.

When a horse gets old, say more than five, you lean back and think. Maybe his legs aren't what they used to be or the distance may be too far, you say to yourself.

It's the same in boxing. Take Joe Louis, for instance. The world's heavyweight champion is past his

prime. He's 34 and fights once a year. A boxer, or even a horse, getting the taste of competition once a year can't be expected to give his best, despite all the grooming and preparation.

The same holds true of Jersey Joe Walcott, the father of six kids. He all but knocked the heavyweight crown from Louis' head last December. He's around 34, too. Nobody seems to know his exact age. He's been fighting so long that some observers seem to believe he's closer to 40.

At any rate, many a racetrack handicapper will tell you the thing to do is string along with the champion until he is beaten. That again makes you stop and think. Who inflicted the most damage and who looked fresher when it was all over last time they met? These are two important questions that apply to boxing as well as racing.

Walcott looked better than Louis last time. At the end of 15 rounds he honestly thought he won the decision. So did the referee, Ruby Goldstein. But the two judges voted

for Louis. Their explanation, although never put on the record, was "you can't take the title away from a man when his opponent runs away."

But again you've got to remember that Walcott floored Louis, that he landed the harder blows, connected more often than the champion who at the end was bleeding from the mouth and had his left eye closed.

That fight might have taken more out of Louis than many suspect. When the two Negroes met again on Wednesday, June 24 in Yankee Stadium, Walcott might have a little more ring courage than he had six months ago.

One thing Walcott knows is that Louis is not the Louis of old. But Walcott also knows what happened to seven of Louis' previous opponents who squared off second time against the Brown Bomber.

Louis has always improved the second time against the same rival, beginning with Lee Ramage in 1935 right up to 1946 when he knocked out Billy Conn. Others knocked out

by Louis in return bouts were Max Schmeling, Natie Brown, Bob Pastor, Arturo Gogoy, Buddy Bear and Abe Simon.

Thus, the question is: Can Louis continue to improve in return bouts? Many fight followers doubt that he will this time. On the other side of the ring will be Walcott, a man with a real incentive. He has six kids to feed.

## Beginning To Pay Back Dividends On \$60,000 Investment; Cubs And Giants Split Double-Header; Cards Miss Opportunity

Apparently all that was troubling young Curt Simmons was a case of big league jitters. Off to a good start, the 19-year-old Egypt, Pa., high school graduate who received a record bonus of \$40,000 from the Philadelphia Phillies last summer, is beginning to pay back dividends on the investment.

The solidly-built southpaw gave the most impressive performance of his brief career last night when he outpitched the great Ewell Blackwell as the Phillies defeated the Reds 3-2 in Cincinnati.

Simmons was tagged for nine hits, but in only two innings did he allow more than one hit. He gave the 28,423 fans a good look at his fast ball by blazing third strikes past nine Redlegs.

The victory, which advanced the fifth place Phils to only two and a half games behind the first place New York Giants in one of the closest races in national league history, was Simmons' third in succession. He now has a record of four victories and four defeats. June two weeks ago, Curt boasted only one victory against four setbacks. Yesterday's triumph followed 2-1 and 4-3 victories over Pittsburgh and Chicago respectively.

Dick Sleser, hard-hitting Philly first baseman, supplies the victory wallop for Simmons and the Phils. The former St. Louis Cardinal cracked his ninth home run of the season with two men aboard in the third inning to account for all Philadelphia's runs. Blackwell, the Red's ace righthander, who gave up only five hits, was lifted for a pinch hitter in the seventh inning. It was Blackwell's fourth loss, his first at night. He had won nine straight under the lights, eight without a setback last year and one this season.

The Cardinals missed a glorious opportunity to take over first place when they suffered in 11-5 setback at the hands of the Boston Braves in a night game in St. Louis. A victory over the Braves would have put the Cards half a game on top.

The Giants, who started the day with a four percentage point lead, had split a double header with the Cubs in Chicago and lost their four-point bulge. So, instead of being in second place, the Giants found themselves in front by half a game when the Cards got whipped.

After presenting the Cubs with five unearned runs to drop an 8-7 decision in the opener, the Giants came back to win the nightcap 5-1. Sophomore Clint Hartung spun a neat five-hitter to register his third victory. Enjoying a 6-0 lead, the giants committed five infield errors, the last one giving the Cubs the winning run in the ninth.

Knocking Howie Pollet out of the box with a six-run assault in the second inning, the Braves went on to gain an easy victory for southpaw Warren Spahn. Jimmy Russell drove in four runs for the victors with three hits. Teammates Ed Stanky collected four blows. The triumph left the third place Braves only a game and a half behind the Giants.

Ralph Kiner's three-run homer highlighted a five-run first inning and gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 6-4 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Pirates, also only a game and a half out of first place, trail the Braves by three percentage points.

The Detroit Tigers came from behind twice to hang another defeat upon the skidding Athletics, 7-4 in a night game in Philadelphia. It was the A's fifth straight loss and dropped them into third place, a half game behind the New York Yankees. Philadelphia is now four games behind the American League leading Cleveland Indians.

### Farm Expert Is Forecasting Cut In Net Income

Speaking before a group of ministers at Duke University, Professor H. B. James, farm expert at N. C. State College, declared that net farm income will be lower this year than 1947 due to higher cost of production.

"Although the long run prospect for farming is definitely better than it was in the 30's he stated, 'it is not as good as it was in the lush period of the 40's."

He pointed out factors which have the most pronounced effect on the farmer's economic welfare. These included business activity, foreign policy, and government farm programs. The factor of efficiency in agricultural production, is the only one over which the farmer has much control, Professor James explained. "Efficient production is of vital importance for the farmer in these times," James said, "if he is to raise or even maintain his standard of living."

He made four suggestions for increasing efficiency on the farm, including more thorough planning in order to make better use of land and labor; use of the latest scientific production practices; increase of labor efficiency through more careful organization of the work to be done; and the use of more machinery and equipment to reduce the cost of production and increase the efficiency of labor.

Dr. James' talk came as a part of the Second Annual Christian Convocation now in progress at Duke University.

### Soviets Jump Output Of Cigarettes In '47

Moscow—(AP)—The Soviet tobacco industry produced 74.3 billion cigarettes in 1947. This, says a letter from tobacco workers of the nation, represented an increase of 46 per cent over 1946 output. The letter, published in all important newspapers, says that in 1948 production was to be 90 billion cigarettes, or 21 percent over 1947.

### Dewey Leaves Raleigh On Intensive Tour Of State

Raleigh, June 10 —(AP)—New York's Governor Thomas E. Dewey left here this morning for an intensive one-day tour of North Carolina's rich Piedmont area.

The presidential hopeful, who arrived in North Carolina's capital city last night, scheduled a full day of riding and speaking in his attempt to win support of delegates of the Republican National convention.

The day's schedule called for formal addresses to party gatherings here, in Lexington, and in Morganton, and brief talks at seven towns along his route.

Both Dewey and Harold E. Stassen visited Richmond yesterday in an attempt to win members of Virginia's delegation for the Philadelphia convention this month.

The New York governor shied away from definite predictions on the outcome of the convention but Stassen predicted confidently that he would get the nomination "on the ninth ballot."

Dewey said he didn't think there was any doubt about a Republican victory in November.

Dewey remained silent on the south-provoking civil rights issue, deferring a statement on the question until after the party's platform is drafted.

Stassen, however, said there is a need for striking "that delicate balance" between civil rights and states rights. The former Minnesota governor declared President Truman's civil rights program "is much too extreme."

"Progress in civil rights must come gradually," he said, "and the best of it will come from within the states themselves with the impetus given by forward-looking leaders. Those of us who do not live in the South shouldn't try to tell the people of the South and answer to all their problems."

Several North Carolina Republican leaders said that Dewey al-

ready has the support of a number of the state's unpledged 26 convention votes. (An Associated Press poll of the delegates recently drew 16 replies and 9 indicated they favored Dewey.)

## Second Primary For Nine Seats In Legislature

By LYNN NISBET  
 Raleigh, June 10—(AP)—Two seats in the state senate and seven in the house of representatives will be involved in the second primary to be held on June 26.  
 Run-off is assured between Charles M. Johnson and W. Kerr Scott for governor, which is the only statewide office involved. There will also be a second race between Ertel Carlyle and Hargrove Bellamy for congress in the seventh district.  
 Both senate places are in the eighth district, one to come from Johnston county, the other from Wayne. House seats affected include two in Gaston county and one each in Columbia, Harnett, Richmond, Tyrrell and Washington.  
 In an undetermined number of other counties there will be second races for clerk of court, register of deeds, county commissioners and other local offices. Since these races are entirely within the respective counties and handled by local elective boards, no complete report on them is available at Raleigh.  
 In most cases the issues are carry-over from the first primary and will be settled on June 26. In the Johnston county senate race the issue goes much farther back and will not be settled this year. The main issue there has been, and is likely will be for some time, whether H. B. Marrow will continue as superintendent of schools.  
 Pro and anti Marrow sentiment influenced Johnston county votes for governor and United States senator in the first primary, as well as having material effect on votes for local candidates. That the issue will not be allowed to die this year is indicated in a circular letter sent out by J. B. Benton, eliminated from

the state senate race on May 29. In his letter the Benson newspaper man gives notice that he will be a candidate again in 1950 at which time he will remind his fellow citizens of promises made during and before the current campaign.  
 Funny thing about this Johnston county situation is that all candidates, while making the county superintendent the main issue, profess to be seeking to take school administration out of politics.

## 'Unholy Alliance' Blamed In Defeat

Charlotte, N. C., June 10—(AP)—An "unholy alliance between Southern Democrats and Northern Republicans" was blamed last night for blocking President Truman's Civil Rights program.  
 The charge was hurled by Gloucester B. Current of New York, branch director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He delivered the keynote address of the fifth annual North Carolina Conference of the NAACP. Current called for a program that would promote legislation insuring non-segregation, fair employment practices, voting and educational equality and more adequate housing for Negroes.  
 Another speaker during the first day's session, Cyrus M. Johnson of Raleigh, differed some with Current, expressing the belief that the Civil Rights program would not be workable. Johnson, director of the North Carolina Commission on Interracial Cooperation, said that although he was supporting the anti-lynch bill, he was opposed to it "in spirit."  
 "I feel that a healthy climate of public opinion would be far more effective," he said. "Society must cease to engender a feeling of superiority or inferiority in any individual."

New York, June 10—(AP)—Seven or eight three-year-olds may challenge Citation's bid for the triple crown in Saturday's running of the \$100,000 added Belmont stakes.  
 As of today, these colts appeared as prospective foes of the Calumet Flier in the mile and a half test: Better Self; Gasparilla; Salmagundi; Faraway; Escadru; Vulcan's Forge and possibly Golden Light.  
 For Citation the race offers more than just a chance to add a third jewel to the crown that already includes smashing victories in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness.  
 The rich purse gives the Calumet champion a chance to menace Whirlaway's fourth place in the money winning lists and Assault's world record for single season earnings.  
 If as many as six face the starter, the winner's share would be \$79,200. This would make the 80th Belmont run the richest in its history.  
 The previous top purse was the \$78,900 that Cmv. Whitney's Phalaris took away last year.  
 Should Citation follow form and triumph Saturday, his earnings for a season and a half of competition would hit \$548,200. Whirlaway, another Calumet speed specialist, holds fourth place in all-time money winning ranks with \$561,161.  
 Assault, the king ranch runner who was retired last winter, holds the mark for the most money won in a single season—\$424,195 in 1946. So far this season Citation has won \$311,320.  
 Citation could top Assault's record by taking the Belmont and one other major stakes victory.  
 The main threats to Citation in the Belmont are W. L. Brown's Escadru, who came into his own in last Saturday's Peter Pan Handicap at Belmont, and Better Self, easy winner of the Yankee Handicap at Suffolk Down on the same day.

# Cause Of Floods Found In Broken Drainage Sewer

By CHESTER WALSH  
 Clyde T. Mallison, superintendent of city streets, has discovered why heavy rains flood the streets and private premises in the vicinity of Ninth and Forbes (formerly Cotanche streets) and with a city crew of workers he is doing something to relieve a flood trouble which has been prevailing for many years.

An 18-inch clay tile pipe, supposed to carry off surface water, was completely stopped up with a long and matted mass of roots, soil and other debris, and it had been so for many years. Mallison undertook to do some exploring and find out why the surface drains would not take the water, causing it to flood the streets and private property over a considerable area. He dug a trench four or five feet deep on Forbes street, between Eighth and Ninth, and found what he expected. Several sections of the 18-inch clay tile pipe were broken and he expressed the opinion that they were broken when installed more than 25 years ago. Workmen now are taking up between 50 and 75 feet of the broken pipe and will replace it with durable pipe, properly laid and supported with cement at the joints.

Mallison today was receiving considerable praise from property owners and others in that part of the city for his discovery and prompt action in obtaining authority of

the administration to install new pipe to stop flooding during heavy rains.

When the city laid the 42-inch steel reinforced cement surface drainage pipe from Albemarle Avenue, near the National Biscuit Co.'s plant, along the Coast Line Railroad track to the river nearly two years ago it was predicted that directing surface water from the western part of the city to the river near the power plant, would take some of the load off the drainage lines in the central part of the city.

Results of restoring the 18-inch drainage pipe in the vicinity of Forbes and Ninth streets will be watched with interest by those who have suffered from the flooding of the streets.

# S. C. Democrats Open Party Door To Negro Voters

Columbia, S. C., June 10—(AP)—Membership in the South Carolina Democratic party was open to Negroes today for the first time in state party history.

The membership offer, from Richland county's Democratic Executive committee, and in contradiction of state party rules, marked the first material participation by Negroes in state politics since carpetbag rule ended in 1876.

The committee agreed at a closed meeting yesterday to let Negroes enroll on its precinct books on the same basis as whites—residency being the only requirement.

Committee chairman John I. Rice said the move was to avoid threatening federal court action. Richland committee members were defendants in a recent case in which the federal courts ruled "qualified Negro electors" must be allowed to vote in primaries.

The committee said its legal advisers believed contempt of court charges might be brought against it if it failed to enroll Negroes.

State party rules still limit membership to white persons, but allow Negroes to vote in primaries on presentation of general election certificates.

Rice had little to say about his committee's action. He announced enrollment would proceed "according to law," saying he referred to "the law of the land."

State party rules and policies are due for further discussion at the local level tomorrow at a Charleston County Democratic Executive committee meeting called by chairman Francis Coleman.

The Democrats sought to overthrow the substitute housing bill offered by Banking Chairman Wolcott (R-Mich.) and turned to the House instead the T-E-W bill sponsored by Senator Taft of Ohio, a Republican presidential aspirant.

step of recognizing Israel, Israel exists. It cannot be abandoned.

Britain ultimately must recognize the new state, too. When she does, her position vis-a-vis the Arab world may become practically impossible. The Arabs certainly will turn elsewhere, to some other major power, for help.

You will not need three guesses, or even two, to name that power.

That's the basis for British irritation with the United States.

Americans, in turn, are beginning to feel excessively annoyed over British economic operations. As Marshall plan loans, Americans will see the sea, that annoyance may develop into real friction.

For one thing, there is the "sterling bloc." How will British and American administrators decide between an "earned" dollar and a "free" dollar? The British are going to acquire dollars both by the sale of exported products, and through Marshall plan loans. Americans will demand some degree of supervision in the use of the latter.

Criticism already exists in Washington, over the matter of trade between Western Europe and those countries within the Russian orbit.

Britain recently sold Russia steel coarse grains for cattle fodder. Britain needs timber, and she can get it more cheaply from Poland and Russia than anywhere else.

The American position is that nothing should go to Russia, or her satellites, that is potentially war material, or useful to the Soviet war machine. Steel rails make railroads, and railroads move troops and tanks.

# French Cabinet Crisis Is Easing

Paris, June 10—(AP)—The French cabinet crisis eased today.

Observers expressed belief the national assembly would have a noisy debate tomorrow and Saturday over the plan for a federal government in western Germany, but that Premier Robert Schuman would not be defeated.
