

Actor's Home Said To Be Most Carefully Planned

What is probably the most carefully planned home in the United States is the one owned by Henry Fonda and his family, in the Santa Monica hills overlooking the Pacific. Located on gently rolling hills it is built like an old-fashioned farmhouse, but incorporates everything the Fondas wanted in the way of a home.

"If ever a house was successfully planned and executed from inspiration to occupation, that house is the Henry Fonda," an article in the July issue of House Beautiful declares. "The procedure they followed is not fixed and rigid. No planning procedure dependent upon the variables of the human equation ever is. But the path they trod, the steps they pursued are so correct that they should be studied and adopted by every future homeowner in America."

The Fonda's quest for their dream home began when they were first married and decided they wanted a New England type of farmhouse somewhere in the Santa Monica hills overlooking the Pacific. In 1937 they found the exact spot they had been seeking. But the eight acres they wanted were not for sale.

For four years they waited, renting one place and another, and even building a small home. But they did not despair of getting the site they had set their hearts on. In fact they plinked on their dream whenever opportunity offered.

After four years the company which owned the site capitulated and sold it to the Fondas. But they didn't start to build for two years. They lived on it, camped on it, studying every crevice and then decided where they wanted the house, the tennis courts and the tennis courts.

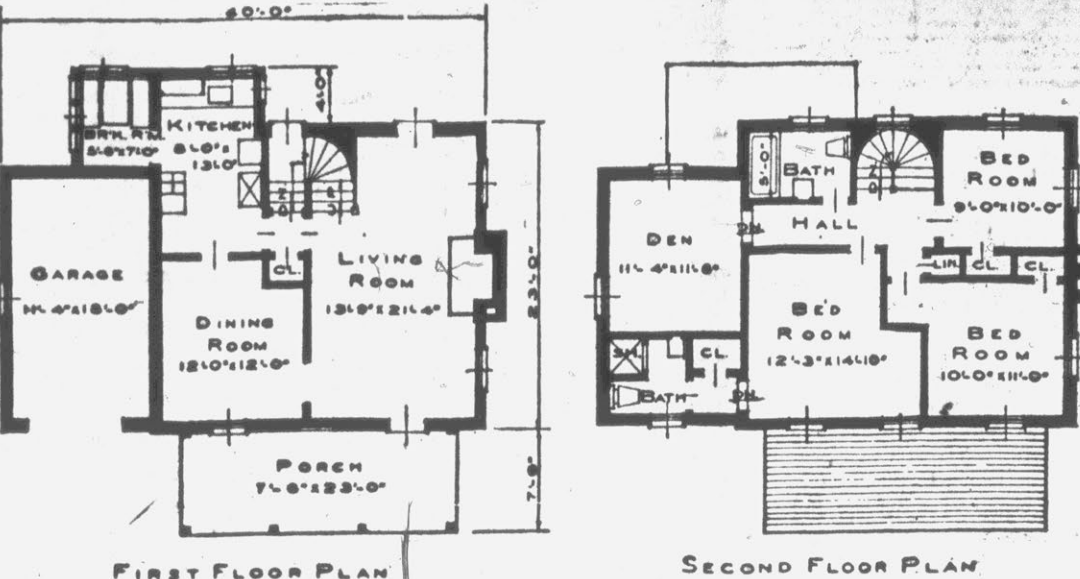
"Before a single bag of cement was mixed, trees were moved and transplanted on the grounds, flower beds were set out, a citrus grove was planted, and gardens were mapped," the article states. "The basic maximum in comfort, beauty, and utility was obtained from Nature, the earth and its terrain."

Only then did the Fonda seek an architect to plan their dream house. In their quest for the right architect they were just as painstaking and unhurried as they had been in every other phase of their plans. They finally engaged Kenneth Albright, whose work in Southern California is well known. At his suggestion, they hired Paul Granard as the interior decorator before there was any house at all. Thus the Fonda, the architect, and the interior decorator worked as a team to bring the Fonda dream house to life.

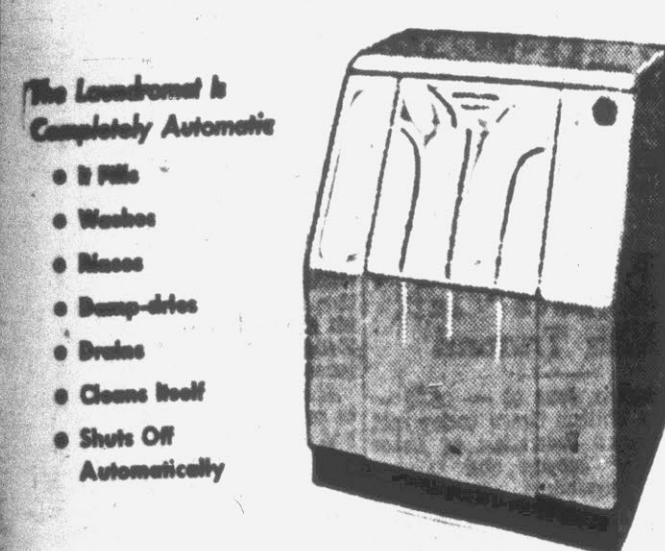

Streamlined modern version of a Colonial theme, this four-bedroom house was designed by architect Kenneth Miller for Joseph Meyerhoff, Baltimore builder, and completed recently in a suburban development. 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You Can Silence Those Creaking Floors Easily

Most creaking floors are caused by subflooring loosened from joists. When the underside can be seen and the defect located by having someone walk above it, drive thin wedges between the joist and the loosened board.

Tips On How To Fix A Sticking Drawer

To ease a sticking drawer, never plane the top edge. Remove the drawer and turn it upside down. Lightly plane, file or sandpaper the bottom edge. Rub the edges and the runways with paraffin, which alone may work in milder cases.

Houses Move

All houses can be expected to settle slightly in the first year and develop a certain number of minor cracks in the plaster. For this reason, wallpapering usually is delayed for a year.

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Don't Overload Your Circuits
It's dangerous to overload electric circuits. Hot wires can burn a house down.
An electric range calls for a separate circuit with its own lead-in of No. 8, or heavier wire.
Kitchens in general should have their own direction, because of the number of appliances used.
Have a licensed electrician do all electrical work and get an Underwriters' certificate wherever possible. Unapproved electrical work can invalidate a fire insurance policy.

(Continued from Page One) ocean. Hence, while the land and its products are constantly getting poorer, the ocean and its products are constantly getting richer. Today the ocean is controlled only within three miles of the different countries which it borders. When we have One World, this control will apply to the entire ocean. With the same attention given to the fisheries as is now given to agriculture, the products of the ocean could supply sufficient proteins to every man, woman and child on the earth.

Clothing and Shelter

The weaving of cloth will in all probability be eliminated in the not too distant future. All of our clothing, rugs and upholstery will be made the same way as paper is made today. Raincoats, man-made shoes are already using such material. Our new houses will sometime be prefabricated and would be today were it not for the crazy rules of labor unions and the antiquated building codes. Then there will be a reduction in the cost of living from which wage-workers will get a real benefit far exceeding anything which the union labor leaders have thus far given them.

Before too many years a start will have been made towards using water and soil as fuel. Wireless and television will have been developed so as to enable for all practical purposes the instantaneous transmission or transportation of us as individuals. We will no longer need to take a train, automobile or airplane for a conference a thousand miles away. We can get the same result by sitting in a television booth at or near our home.

Importance of Decentralization

Another very important development will come with decentralization. In fact, I have almost decided to devote the rest of my life to aiding the decentralization of industries and large educational institutions. Not only is decentralization the only defense against atomic and bacteriological attacks but it is fundamental to efficient economical and democratic living. We, moreover, must not be content with these material developments but make certain that we progress spiritually as well. The greatest need now is for better mental motivation.

BUT ALL ARE CALLED

The name Thomas comes from a Greek word which means twin. Because a man is called Thomas today does not mean that he has a twin brother. But in ancient times it did. One of Jesus' disciples was named Thomas. There were several pairs of brothers in the apostolic circle, but Thomas' twin brother was not among these. Thomas went on to spiritual triumph and a great service in the name of the Lord and Master. Scripture makes no reference whatsoever to the career of the twin brother.

It may well make us ponder seriously why certain people in a family go on to spiritual triumph while others do not. Sometimes godly parents have godless children; occasionally a child of marked spirituality will come from a home where he has had no encouragement along such lines. A godly wife and a godless husband sometimes go through life with these different interests. One member of a family responds to the call of God and another equally promising member does not.

There is a serious process going on whereby some are being chosen and others rejected. This is not because God wills it so, but because the persons involved will it so. It is the will of God that all men be saved. When they are not, it is because with deliberate purpose they choose otherwise.

Around Capitol Square

COASTING—Johnson and Scott headquarters to all practical purposes closed Thursday night and most of the state departmental offices just coasted along Friday and Saturday. Most of the top flight officials and many clerical workers went to their several home precincts to vote in Saturday's primary.

BLACK BAGS—Head men and a few field workers were around and rumor has it they were devoting major attention to the little black bags. There is always at this stage of political campaigning a lot of talk about "putting out money in the precincts." Traditionally that is done under cover of darkness the two nights preceding voting day. Reports are that both camps have some, neither has enough, but that Johnson has a lot more than Scott. From inception of the 1948 campaign the Johnson folks have campaigned they have money. The Scott folks have pleaded pauperism.

VALUE—Opinion is general hereabouts that money spent this year has produced less returns than in many previous campaigns. Exception to that may be the cost of radio time and newspaper advertising. There is evidence that expenditures for these purposes have been on the whole profitable, in that it was necessary to enable voters to reach individual and intelligent decision as to how they would vote. The much larger amounts spent for political workers, operators of automobiles to haul voters and similar purposes have not been productive to any great extent.

REASON—Most commonly assigned reason for this result—or lack of result—is the general prosperity of the people. When a man does not have a job and needs money to pay for his family, he will accept the proffer of a candidate to work for him at moderate wage. If the same man has a job paying good wages and will have to take time off to do political work, he wants to be reimbursed for lost wages plus a good fee for services rendered. So the average price of a man and a car on the election day has been upped from the 1932 to 1938 level of about ten dollars, to a figure more nearly approaching a hundred dollars. The more independent attitude of the average voter further cuts down vote yield, and some campaign managers have complained they do not get as much for the 1948 hundred dollars as they got for the 1932 ten dollars.

SALE—Despite much comment to the contrary there is very little evidence to support the charge that North Carolinians actually "sell" their votes. A few instances are known where a man would accept a cash payment in return for the votes of his family. They are rare enough to prove the rule that very little actual vote buying and selling is practiced. It used to be that voters accepting bribes in cars provided by a certain candidate would feel obligation to vote for him. That rule does not apply this year to same degree as formerly and managers are having the disheart-

Philadelphia, June 26—(P)—She had come a long way and she had only two words to say.

They weren't many words for an honest-to-legal delegate, but they overwhelmed Mrs. Vitis L. Gates of Hopkinsville, Ky.

At the age of 70 she was making her freshman debut at a Republican National convention.

"But I really am 70 years young," she insisted. She explained herself nervously as she fanned the 24 women in the Kentucky delegation had decided that she—the only woman—should deliver their state's vote in the rollcall for the vice-presidential nomination.

The white hair of Mrs. Gates, who wore a blue and white flowered voile dress, stood out like a gardenia in a restful garden.

Coming to Philadelphia was the greatest thrill in her life, but she could hardly talk about it as she waited for Kentucky to be called in the roll.

What was the thing you enjoyed here most, Mrs. Gates?

"Well, you know I have a lot of friends back home who are Democrats and many of them came by and kissed me goodbye as a start-off for the convention.

"But I'll tell you what I really got the most fun out of. It was to sit here and be entirely surrounded by Republicans. That never happened to me before in my life, and I just felt wonderful."

Mrs. Gates looked with anxious eyes toward the platform for her signal.

My grandfather, John McGuire, was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln.

She said, "He was the first lawyer in the United States to espouse the cause of labor."

She thought that over for a moment and then said:

"That's good for the labor vote, isn't it?"

Mrs. Gates had learned the National political angles quick.

"I stayed here until four o'clock last night," she said. "I went to bed at five and got up at seven."

As she spoke she grew more anxious. State by state, Gov. Earl Warren of California was being nominated as Dewey's running mate by acclamation of the entire convention.

Asked if she had any criticisms, Mrs. Gates said:

"Only the transportation. Lots of times taxicabs with only one passenger in them rode by. But they didn't stop for me. That's the city for you. I guess you can blame it on competition."

Just then she was rushed to the microphone. The Republican party wanted to know imperatively whether Kentucky wanted to nominate anyone else beside Gov. Warren, the agreed-on choice. Kentucky didn't. Excitedly Mrs. Gates seized the microphone and said—as every other state had said:

"Kentucky passes!"

She said it loudly, eagerly and triumphantly. After 70 long years spent among Democrats her life had reached its peak in two words.

"Kentucky passes," she said.

The Republican party could never forget her. She was part of its record forever. And she was happy.

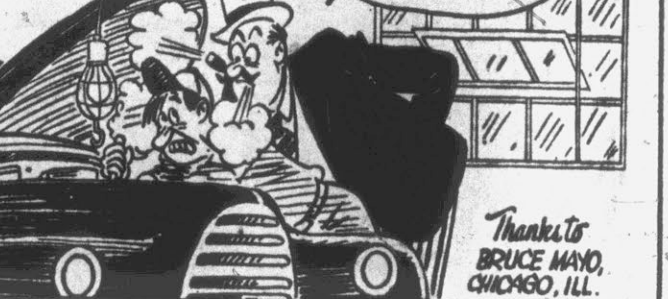

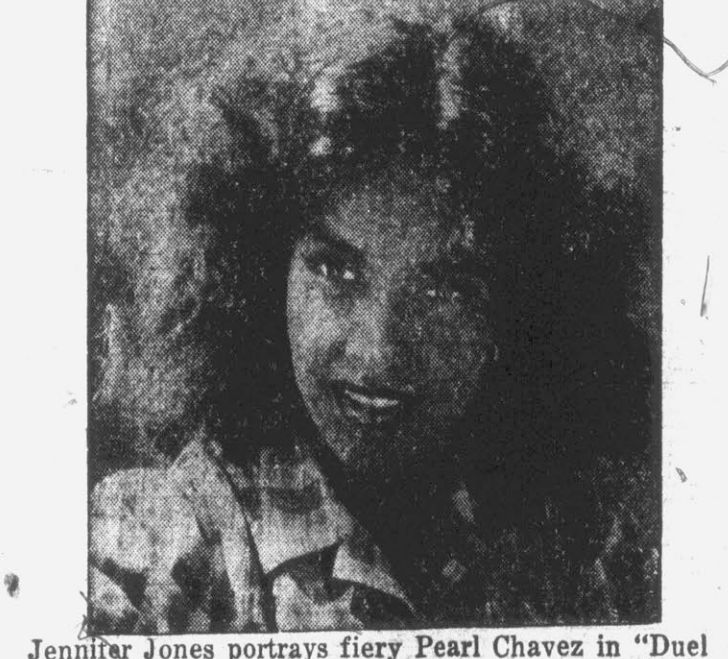

Joe Louis Wins, Retires; Series Of Fights To Decide Champion

New York, June 26 — (AP)—Joe Louis' proud reign as heavyweight boxing champion of the world is ended—by the only man who could end it, Joe Louis himself.

Flashing for 15 seconds all the savagery that brought him 52 knockouts in 61 fights, Louis stretched out Jersey Joe Walcott on the hot canvas of Yankee Stadium in the eleventh round last night.

His revenge secured, his pride soothed, he said he was quitting. This created confusion as great as when Gene Tunney retired undefeated in 1928.

Walcott himself, Gus Lesnevich and Ezzard Charles crowded up as claimants.

Sol Strauss, acting head of the Twentieth Century Sporting Club, said he would put on a series of fights to determine the successor.

Against Louis, Walcott side-stepped and danced through 10 rounds just as successfully as he did last December when Louis managed to win a disputed, split 15-round decision.

Then Jersey Joe made the mistake in the eleventh of trying to mix it at the ropes. He had been told not to do it. The champion's crumpling blows flashed as of old, right and left against Walcott's head and body.

Walcott went down flat, struggled up to his knees, almost rose at nine, fell again, and was up soon after the count of ten. But it was over, with only four seconds more to go in the round. There was a great surge to the ringside, and an exultant roar from the crowd.

"For my mother—this is for her—tonight was my last fight," said Louis. Later he said he would enter politics.

"I'll be active in this year's presidential campaign," he declared, adding that he would announce next week whom he would support.

Louis went out at 34 years of age as one of the greatest of champions. He had held the title longer than anyone else—11 years and three days. He defended it more often—25 times.
