

Western Germany Closed To Russian Train Traffic

Joint American-British Action; "Technical Difficulties" Is Explanation; Strong- est Counter-Move Yet Taken To Break Month-Old Berlin Blockade

Berlin, July 26—(AP)—The United States and British military governments today took the strongest action yet taken to break the month-old blockade of Berlin, now a month old.

The joint American-British action appeared to be the most positive counter-move yet taken by the Western Allies to break the Russian blockade of Berlin, now a month old.

Gens. Lucius D. Clay and Sir Brian Robertson, the American and British military governors, took the action at a conference in Frankfurt. The restrictions are effective at once. The prohibition is against the movement of all trains "originating or terminating" in the Soviet zone.

When the Russians stopped traffic on the long railway between Berlin and the western zones of Germany, they asserted "technical difficulties" were the cause.

In another development, the Berlin city government ordered the dismissal of Police President Paul Markgraf who was appointed to his position by the Russians in 1945.

Dr. Ferdinand Friedensburg, deputy mayor of Berlin, said he had handed Markgraf a letter of dismissal, ordering him to turn over his office to his assistant. The move was expected to have wide repercussions in this four-power city.

Markgraf holds the highest German military award, the Russians captured him at Stalingrad, put him through Soviet "doctrination" with other German officers, and brought him to Berlin soon after the city fell. He has been constantly criticized by anti-Communist political parties.

Frans Neumann, Berlin leader of the Social Democratic party, said Markgraf was responsible for the wave of political kidnappings in Berlin in which 5,413 persons have disappeared during the occupation. Neumann said the kidnappings were done by the Russians with the connivance of police in the Soviet sector.

U.S. and British officials in Frankfurt orally termed the rail stoppage "economic sanctions."

Authorities said the rail commerce between the Soviet zone of Germany and Western Europe "doesn't amount to much." Interested countries of Western Europe have been informed of the order through international railway channels.

A Berlin informant insisted that "technical difficulties are real and do exist" as far as the rail traffic into and from the Soviet zone is concerned.

A certain number of freight trains have been moving into and through the American, British and French zones carrying manufactured and raw material products from the Russian zone.

The American-British action means that trains carrying goods from the Russian zone to Switzerland, or to Bremen for shipment to Scandinavia no longer can travel through Western Germany. The same ban applies to traffic from Western Europe if its destination is in the Russian zone.

International mail trains will be permitted to pass, however. So will trains from eastern countries as, for instance, Poland. Russian trains returning German prisoners-of-war also will be permitted to enter the western zones.

An American Military Government official said the action may have "far reaching economic and political ramifications."

New Party's Outlook

Wallace's Backers Stress Idea That Russia And U. S. Can Live At Peace And Work Together; Historical Background On Relationship Of Two Countries

Washington, July 26—(AP)—Henry Wallace's new Progressive Party hammers on this idea: That this country and Russia can live at peace and work together.

Merely saying so doesn't make it a fact, for, since that's also the No. 1 problem of our time, a number of questions have to be faced.

True, the two countries lived peacefully before World War II, although they didn't work very much together.

Until that time the Russian Communists had concentrated on making communism survive and work in their own country.

While they did, they let their neighbor, Nazi Germany, grow strong enough eventually to attack Russia and almost destroy it.

But, anyway, until World War II communism in practice was limited to Russia. It was not in any real conflict with this country. It is now.

Pushed and helped by the Russian Communists, Communists have taken over all the countries of eastern Europe except Greece.

Case Continued

New Haven, Conn., July 26—(AP)—The case of Stephen J. Supina, the ex-Army Air Force gunner who "bombed" United Nations headquarters at Lake Success, N. Y., Thursday, was continued in city court here today.

At his Danbury office, Clark told newsmen that he expected to receive the report "later in the day" from Dr. Roy L. Leek, former superintendent of the Connecticut state hospital at Middletown.

Dr. Leek yesterday spent two hours with the twice decorated veteran of 33 B-17 bombing missions over Germany who is confined to the New Haven county jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond.

Keep High Price Level For Leaf

Georgia-Florida Market Edges Over Opening Day Marks

Valdosta, Ga., July 26—(AP)—Today's prices on the Georgia-Florida five cured tobacco market appeared to be steady to slightly higher than Thursday and Friday when the auctions opened.

The Adel (Ga.) market opened stronger than on the first two days with high grades bringing 60 to 65 cents a pound. The average price there was reported the highest in history.

The market superior in Valdosta said prices were stronger there than Friday. Expectations were for a full sale with buyers operating in the first two warehouses until noon and then moving on to others. He estimated 550,000 pounds would be sold for an average of 64 cents a pound.

Floors were filled at the Waynesville (Ga.) market, with prices steady and high grades bringing 60 cents.

"Sales" followed reported picture as strong and "perhaps stronger" on the Moultrie (Ga.) market. An average of 64 cents or slightly higher was forecast.

Blackshear, Ga., had steady prices with the average running 62 to 63 cents a pound and most better grades averaging 67 cents. A large volume poured into warehouses over the week-end and floors of the five houses were about three-fourths full.

Japs Enabled To Buy U.S. Cotton

New York, July 26—(AP)—SCAP officials at Tokyo said today a new procurement arrangement had been worked out enabling the Japanese Board of Trade to obtain stocks of American cotton directly from private shippers in the United States.

All cotton purchased under the procurement program must be shipped before September 30 and must be shipped in United States vessels unless otherwise decided by the export-import bank at Washington, according to the announcement.

Then this country would find itself alone in a sea of communism. It couldn't survive against a communized world.

So what does this country do, knowing communists everywhere are working for world communism? Does it sit idly by, letting itself be surrounded and eventually, perhaps crushed?

The United States already has taken a stand to prevent communism from spreading further.

It is doing it through the Marshall Plan for helping Western Europe get prosperous; by giving aid to Greece and Turkey; by holding fast against Russia in Germany.

Russo-American 'Give-And-Take' Peace Stressed

Presidential Candidate Wallace Says His Party Just Begun To Roll

Philadelphia, July 26—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace rolled his new Progressive Party today down a road he and his followers promised leads to a give-and-take peace with Russia.

With an assertion that "We've just begun to roll," the third party presidential nominee set out to plant in every state the seed of what he called a new political crusade.

It was born here in a boisterous, singing, shouting convention that ended last night in seven and one-half hours of free-for-all debate over a party platform.

Wallace, glued to a television set while his friends were adopting a platform placing "joint responsibility" on the United States and Russia to keep the peace, then whirled off to a Youth for Wallace meeting.

As teen agers packed into a jammed hotel ballroom cheered lustily, the former vice president grinned widely above back an unruly forelock and said:

"Gosh, it's swell to meet with folks who are not playing it safe."

That was a keynote of this first Progressive Party convention, which picked Senator Glen Taylor of Idaho as No. 2 on the third party presidential ticket headed by Wallace.

Taylor put it into words before the youth conference.

"I was told that if I ran with Wallace, they'll call you a Red and probably prove it," he said. He didn't identify "they" but he said he didn't worry.

The communist issue plagued the New Party formers throughout their meeting.

It broke out in the Sabbath Day platform session when James Hayford of Westbury, Vt., a delegate, offered from the floor an amendment to put the party on record against indexing any nation's foreign policy.

Hayford said the draft submitted by Rexford Guy Tugwell, former Roosevelt brain-truster, criticized the bipartisan American foreign policy and by implication approved Russia's.

Fog Blamed For Canada's Tragic Transport Crash

Rimouski, Quebec, July 26—(AP)—Authorities blamed fog today for a Saturday night plane crash on the Gaspé peninsula which killed 26 persons. It was the worst aviation disaster in Canadian history.

Most of the passengers aboard the chartered two-motor Dakota transport were lumberjacks heading for a holiday. Two married couples and a baby also perished and Odette Ouellet, daughter of Wilfrid Ouellet, a vice president of Rimouski Airlines, which owned the plane, was reported among the victims.

The plane, making a 50-mile hop across the Gulf of St. Lawrence from Port Moutier, on Anticosti Island to Gaspé, struck a mountain near Grand Neve, about 12 miles from its destination, and burned.

Charge Of Mail Theft Against Postal Worker

Charlotte, July 26—(AP)—Roy Laney, veteran of 23 years' service with the Monroe post office, is under a charge of theft from the mail.

U.S. Postal Inspector C. J. Shannon of Charlotte reported this week-end that Laney, the superintendent of mails, was arrested July 16 and bound over to federal district court at Shelby, following a hearing before U.S. Commissioner D. P. Price at Gastonia. Laney was free under bond.

Shannon said Laney's arrest followed an investigation of reported losses covering a period of 18 months to two years. The losses, the inspector added, are being estimated.

Expressing regret over the case, Shannon said Laney did "splendid work for the department during World War II."

Carolina Cotton Executive Dies

Clinton, S.C., July 26—(AP)—William Plumer Jacobs II, president of the American Cotton Manufacturers' Association, is dead.

The 54-year-old Carolinian, whose activities in a rich life included education, manufacturing, religion, sports, advertising and publishing, died in Doctor's Hospital at Washington at 12:30 p.m. yesterday.

He suffered a heart attack Friday, July 16, while in Washington on business.

N.C. Polio Soars Over 900 For '48

National Foundation Asked For Additional Money To Combat Disease; State Funds Reported Dwindling Fast

Raleigh, N. C., July 26—(AP)—North Carolina's record polio epidemic today pushed past the 900 mark in cases, with reports of 43 new cases reaching the state board of health.

These brought the statewide total for the year to 927 cases, the board said in releasing a corrected total. One case previously listed as polio has been re-diagnosed.

Two counties which previously had been polio-free reported cases today. They are Greene and Macon, with one case each.

Buncombe and Davidson counties, each with seven cases, led today's list. Others were reported by: Onslow, five; Mecklenburg, four; New Hanover, and Gaston, three each; Durham, Henderson, Rockingham and Union, two each; and Cleveland, Cumberland, Moore and Surry, one each.

The 1948 total of cases went past the mark for the previous worst year, 1944, last Saturday. The board announced then that 51 deaths have been recorded in this year's epidemic.

Meanwhile, the North Carolina Epidemic Fund Committee announced yesterday it has asked the

National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis headquarters in New York for \$100,000 in March of Dimes funds.

Philip S. Randolph, state epidemic coordinator for the National Foundation, said he expects to receive a check for the sum either tomorrow or Wednesday.

"A great deal more than this will be needed," Randolph declared. "I'm afraid the \$100,000 request is just the beginning."

Randolph said the foundation's chapters "throughout the state are spending their March of Dimes funds at the rate of \$150,000 a month. Many have completely exhausted their own assets."

The epidemic fund committee received \$42,796.88 from chapters in the eastern and western parts of the state, he said, and disbursed \$38,400 of the to chapters in the hard-hit central region.

In Greensboro yesterday, the building fund for the new General Carolina Convalescent Center there reached \$180,000. Money for the hospital is being contributed from all over the state. The town of Liberty, fund officials reported, contributed \$2,400—about \$2.50 a person.

Socialists Again Harass Premier

Unwilling To Accept Responsibilities In French Cabinet

Paris, July 26—(AP)—Socialist deputies who wrecked the government of Robert Schuman a week ago were harassing the government of Premier Andre Marie today before it had a chance to be born.

Unwilling to take responsibility for the six ministerial posts Marie offered them, the Socialists have asked Marie to include only two of their party in his cabinet—Louis Blum as vice-premier and Paul Ramadier as minister of state. Both Ramadier and Blum are former premiers.

Marie was reported also to have offered the Socialists the portfolios of interior, social affairs, public works and commerce and industry.

The Socialists deputies approved the proposed Marie cabinet by a vote of 35 to 31 today with eight abstentions.

The caucus then decided that, in view of the narrow margin, they would send another delegation to see Marie.

France has been without a cabinet since a week ago tonight, when the Socialists turned the tables on Schuman and pushed through a measure that forced his resignation.

The cabinet list that Marie submitted to the Socialists today placed Schuman in the line-up as foreign minister in place of George Bidault.

Judge Says Note Threatened Life

Delhi, India, July 26—(AP)—Judge Atma Charan, who is trying eight Indians for the killing of Mahatma K. Gandhi, said in court today his life has been threatened in an anonymous letter.

Charan made the disclosure when the defense lawyers complained their brief cases were searched each time they entered the room.

'New Look' Bestowed On 1947 Flying Saucer Stories

Atlanta, July 26—(AP)—The flying saucer—or something—is back again. Reports from widely separated sections of the country have described "it" over the week-end as:

1. A wingless craft, spurring flame "like a Buck Rogers rocket ship."

2. An aluminum covered balloon.

3. An unusually bright light.

4. A ball of fire.

5. A red and blue flame that burst in mid-air.

6. A flash of cherry red fire.

"It" first was reported by two Eastern Airlines pilots, each a flier pilot during the war, who said they encountered a wingless mystery plane, supporting fire, near Montgomery, Ala., on the Atlanta-Houston flight Saturday.

Huge Navy Plane Crosses Country

The 'Constitution' Does It In 10 Hours, 19 Minutes

Patuxent Naval Air Station, Md., July 26—(AP)—The Constitution, biggest airplane ever to cross the country, did it in 10 hours and 19 minutes yesterday.

The 194,000-pound giant, second of two built by Lockheed Aircraft as naval transports, flew a 2,600 mile course from Moffett Field, Calif., at an average speed of about 260 miles an hour.

The navy has not yet accepted either of the giant planes. They were built at a cost of \$27,000,000. The first still is full of flight test gear. The second is equipped as a combined passenger and cargo plane with 92 seats on the upper deck and 7,375 cubic feet of cargo space below. The lower deck can accommodate 76 passengers.

The plane's regular tanks can hold nearly 10,000 gallons of gasoline. It has an estimated range of 3,500 miles with a full payload, or about 6,300 miles without payload.

The wingspan is 189 feet, length is 166 feet and height 50 feet. The normal crew is 12.

The Constitution, designed the XR-90, is not the nation's largest plane.

Economists See Sharp Price Decline In Offing

National Bureau Of Economic Research Says When Prices Do Start To Fall, The Decline Probably Will Be Fast

New York, July 26—(AP)—When prices do start to go down, the decline probably will be a sharp one, the National Bureau of Economic Research said today.

The observation is contained in a study of postwar prices made by the bureau and reported by Dr. Frederick C. Mills, professor of economics at Columbia University.

Dr. Mills is a member of the research staff of the bureau, a non-profit organization devoted to scientific and economic research.

In a review of price trends, Dr. Mills said that since 1938-39 up to the recent further advance in consumer prices, wholesale market prices had doubled and living costs

had gone up two-thirds.

The greatest advances, he said, were in soft goods such as food and farm products, with farm products rising nearly 200 per cent.

Metals and durable goods in general lagged behind the general price rise of the past nine years, the study showed. The prices of common stock in industrial corporations rose only 26 per cent and rents—under federal control in much of the country—increased only 11 per cent.

With the stability of rents holding the level in check, Dr. Mills reported, the general cost of living for urban workers went up 68 per cent.

One of the major defenses against unchecked inflation, he declared, was the big gain in industrial production between 1939 and 1948—a gain of 82 per cent. Manufacturing employment rose 70 per cent, railroad freight 118 per cent and farm output 27 per cent, he added.

G. B. Shaw Is 92; Health Improved

Bearded Sage Scorns Birthdays, But Desires Live To 100

Ayot St. Lawrence, England, July 26—(AP)—George Bernard Shaw turned 92 today, determined to round out a full century of life. The bite of his wit and wisdom is as potent as ever.

The bearded sage's scorn of birthdays—especially his own—has for years imposed a hush upon his household when this important day comes around, and consequently observance of the anniversary is a subdued affair—insomuch as Shaw can manage it.

He has a word for such celebrations—"rubbish." When he wants to say a syllable he explodes: "Bah."

Still, telegrams and telephone calls pour in. There are personal visits, gifts to be acknowledged, persons seeking interviews. Mostly GBS passes the buck on these things to his stenographer and the adroit Dr. F. E. Loewenstein, Shaw's official biographer and remembrancer.

Shaw's general health is said to be better than it was a year ago. He has fully recovered from a recent chill caught while strolling in the rain.

Shaw gives the credit for his good health to his vegetarian diet, the fact he is a teetotaler and to his extremely careful rules for living.

The years have not affected his sharp wit. Told not long ago that plans were afoot to bury him in St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin next to another eminent Irishman—Dean Swift—Shaw inquired: "Doesn't that seem premature?"

Prominent Man Died Yesterday; Funeral Tuesday

Guy T. Evans, 73, died in Pitt General Hospital at 2:50 p.m. Sunday after several months of illness.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home, 1501 Dickinson Ave., at 10 a.m. Tuesday by his pastor, Dr. H. G. Haney, of Eighth Street Christian Church. Burial will be in Greenwood Cemetery.

Mr. Evans, son of the late Amos and Hattie Hill Evans, was born and reared near Greenville and had lived in Greenville for the past 35 years. He was a rural mail carrier and retired in 1934. He had also engaged in farming. With his brother-in-law, the late Louis B. Garris, he formed the Garris-Evans Lumber Company in 1920. At the time of his death, he was vice-president of the organization. He was a member of the Eighth Street Christian Church and had served as a deacon.

He was married to Penelope Plato Garris of Ayden, who survives.

Mr. and Mrs. Evans celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary last January 9.

Also surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Laurence A. Morye of Maury; three sons, Guy C. David A., and Plato G. Evans of Greenville; 10 grandchildren and a brother, Godfrey A. Evans of Greenville.

Yugoslavia Lists Peace Principles

Support Of Russian Policy Voiced By Vice Premier

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, July 26—(AP)—Vice Premier Edvard Kardelj told newsmen after a meeting of the Yugoslav Communist party today that the new Yugoslavia will be governed in her foreign policy by the principles of peace, independence and support of the anti-imperialistic policy of the Soviet Union.

He listed the principles as:

1. Universal activity for peace and peaceful cooperation on the ground of full equality based on the principles of the United Nations.

2. Economic cooperation with all countries on the ground of equality and respect of mutual obligations.

3. The policy of support to the forces struggling for peace, national freedom and independence.

4. Support to the anti-imperialistic policy of the Soviet Union and the countries of the peoples' democracies (the Communist nations).

5. Development of cooperation in all respects with the Soviet Union and the countries of the people's democracies in economic and cultural life with the object of strengthening the common development in the socialist countries.

Culbert L. Olson, former governor of California, says Premier Marshal Tito told him yesterday Yugoslavia is ready and willing to trade with the United States.

Significance Of ERP

Economic Factors Will Determine Outcome Of Present Cold War And Future Actual Conflict; Putting Western Europe On Its Feet Meeting Obstacles

The cold war between Soviet Russia and the democracies has its genesis in ideology—aggressive communism bent on world conquest—but its outcome is going to be determined by economic factors.

Of course military power will play an important part, but that is based on economic well-being. As for ideology, man is given to thinking with his stomach. His ideological leanings are likely to be decisively influenced by the amount of food (plus a corresponding allotment of other necessities) available to his family.

That is the significance of the Marshall Plan, and it dominates the whole crisis. The task of the democracies is to hold the present "military front" through central Europe to give the Marshall Plan time to put Western Europe on its feet economically.

Actually the three major democracies in Germany—America, Britain and France—haven't anything like as great military strength in the field as has Russia. However, the potential striking-power which the democracies could develop is greater than that which the Soviet could produce in the same length of time.

The task of the democracies, therefore, is to hold along the so-called Stettin-Adriatic battle line

Bus Company To Improve Service In Greenville

Preparations for putting into effect improved local passenger bus service are continuing, according to James T. Keel, a member of Greenville Transit Company's newly created operating committee.

Consideration of schedule changes was begun following recommendations of traffic engineer Wortham W. Dibble of Columbia, S. C. In his report Dibble outlined the basis of a new schedule, which would provide more frequent service direct to the heart of Greenville shopping district.

Checks are being made at present Keel explained, to make certain that the proposed schedule could be maintained through the city during periods of heavy traffic. Locations have been selected for proposed new bus stops, and marker posts are being prepared, which will indicate at each stop the time at which the bus will leave.

"Meanwhile," Keel added, "an extensive overhaul program is being undertaken to put the buses in good mechanical condition for operating faster schedules."

As a part of another phase of preparation for changing the bus routes, detailed plans are being worked out for informing the public, in the areas covered by buses, of proposed changes before the changes are put into effect.

the possibility of a better home
starts in our own hearts. All this
would involve weed pulling. We are
interested in beautiful flowers,
great social advances, profound hu-
man triumph — but weed pulling
what a bore!

Boyle's Column

Philadelphia, July 26 (AP)—Henry
Wallace's Progressive Party will go
down in political history for at least
one thing—it has learned the se-
cret of the American treasury.

This secret is that a lot of little
people can fork over more dough
than a few big people.

The money that one reluctant mil-
lionaire will disgorge in a moment
of private appeal for the salvation
of the Democratic or Republican
party is strictly limited.

But when Hank Wallace's fund-
raiser hits the platform in front of
30,000 or more cheering partisans the
pocketbook appeal is unlimited.

This experienced front man, Wil-
liam Galimor, a ripe-mouthed, bald-
ing, radio voice of extreme uncti-
on, begins with a plea for \$1,000 con-
tributions to the Progressive party. He
ends his monetary plea on the pro-
gram by calling upon the ushers to
gather in all the stray silver.

Almae Temple McPherson or Fa-
ther Divine had the same approach.
They did it in the name of religion
and a heaven that had its pie in
the sky.

The Progressive party has changed
the appeal from religion to poli-
tics. It calls out the dollars from
the common people on a program
that offers the hope of pie here
and now.

By tapping the wallet of the or-
dinary man Henry Wallace has
caught up with the treasury—which
long has known that the working
man can pay more than the multi-
millionaire. There just happen to
be a darn sight more working men
in the world than there are multi-
millionaires.

Wallace himself has no direct con-
nection, physically, with such law-
dry considerations. He doesn't ap-
pear on the platform until the gilt
and the gelt has been collected and
delivered.

Then he comes out and talks about
issues instead of dollars. He says
that if he were president the present
political crisis with Russia over the
scarlet blockade of Berlin wouldn't
exist. He doesn't say why it wouldn't.
He just says it wouldn't.

He said nothing about the \$30,000,
including the federal amusement
tax, which his supporters paid to
hear him in Shible Park Saturday
night.

He said nothing, as he stood on a
boxing platform on second base
while agonized moon rose over the
right field fence. About the \$50,000
the crowd had pledged for the pur-
chase of radio time before he ar-
rived.

Wallace doesn't mention those
things—and probably Almae Temple
McPherson didn't either.

He just shook the famous forelock
out of his eyes, threw his head back
for the cheers in a manner romin-
escent but unequal to Franklin D.
Roosevelt and pitched again and
again verbally for the century of
the common man.

He talked of peace and plenty,
conciliation of Russia, and banged
the Wall Street scoundrels off the
backboard.

But politicians always have talked
of peace and plenty and hit the saw-
dust trail of accusation against Wall
Street.

What they will be amazed at Wal-
lace for is this—that he got thou-
sands of voters to pay money to hear
him make an election speech.

It will remain a thing of awe to
professional politicians that people
paid out their own hard cash to see
a man baptize his own party. This
was something new.

Maybe Congress would get a bet-
ter House by charging an admission
fee, too.

**Around Capitol
Square**

HABEAS — When John Baldwin
sued for a writ of habeas corpus to
get out of state hospital at Dix Hill
he put ideas into other heads. The
writ was denied in the Baldwin case,
he having failed to show sufficient
mental balance to justify his re-
lease. He had been moved from
death row at central prison some
years ago to the criminal insane
division at the hospital. Several
other hospital patients and prison-
ers have indicated purpose to seek
release through habeas corpus
procedure.

INQUIRY — Ed Cannon, secretary
of the N. C. State Bar, received last
week a post card inquiry from a
hospital patient. The man wanted
the names and addresses of several
good attorneys "experienced in
habeas corpus and sanity hearings."
The inquiry has not been acknow-
ledged.

BUSE — Attaches of the parole
commission discussing this matter
cited several instances when the
right of habeas corpus had been ob-
viously abused. It is conceded that
this provision is one of the most
highly prized in the constitutional
declaration of rights. That fact
makes it more susceptible to abuse
than if it were of less vital im-
portance in the scheme of individ-
ual rights and freedom.

COMPENSATION — The 1947 gen-
eral assembly for the first time in
state history provided for compensa-
tion to persons wrongfully con-
victed and imprisoned for crime. It
was generally understood at the
time the bill was introduced it was
designed especially to take care of
one individual case, and sponsors
argued there would be relatively
few applications for relief filed un-
der the law. Payments are limited
to \$500 a year, with an overall maxi-
mum of \$5,000 for any one person.
State officials consider it a tribute
to the justice of North Carolina
courts that only six individuals, in-
volved in four separate cases, have
shown the right to benefit under the
law.

PAYMENTS — Compensation re-
commended by the parole commis-
sioner after public hearings and ap-
proved by the council of state for
payment has amounted so far to
\$9,832.12. Almost exactly half the
total, \$4,916.56, went to Hamp Ken-
dall of Caldwell county, for whom
it was generally understood the law
was enacted. Other beneficiaries
included Gus Colon Langley of Bun-
combe, \$972.80; John Wesley Benton
of Mecklenburg, \$115.30; Eddie Vic-
tor Fowler of Davidson, \$1,968.68;
Walter Scott Bridgman of David-
son, \$1,104.19, and Sylvan R. Pal-
mer of Davidson, \$1,104.19. (Ad-
dresses are counties in which con-
viction was obtained and sentence
imposed.)

PARDONED — Detail review of the
several cases is not a point. In each
instance the convicted person was
subsequently pardoned upon ade-
quate showing that he did not com-
mit the crime charged against him.
Compensation was based upon time
actually served in prison within the

Plans for the spraying campaign still are incomplete, Braden said, although tentative arrangements call for the program to get underway by Wednesday. Braden said he conferred Saturday with State Board of Health officials concerning the city's plans and will talk today with Donald F. Ashton, entomologist with the board.

The city-wide program is expected to require around 30 days for completion, Braden said. Current plans call for eight two-man crews to canvass the city with shoulder tanks containing the DDT solution. They will spray both the inside and outside of residences if the people wish and will pay particular attention to garbage cans and other potential breeding places for flies and other insects, the city manager said.

The program is expected to cost between \$5,000 and \$6,000.

Charlotte, July 26—(AP)—Out of a three-hour closed-door meeting of the Tri-State League has come an official statement denying a Charlotte newspaper sports writer's published story that he was told league games were thrown this year and last.

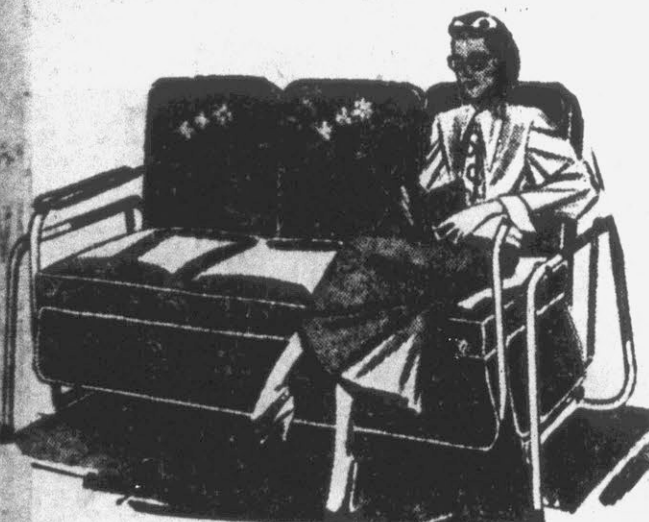

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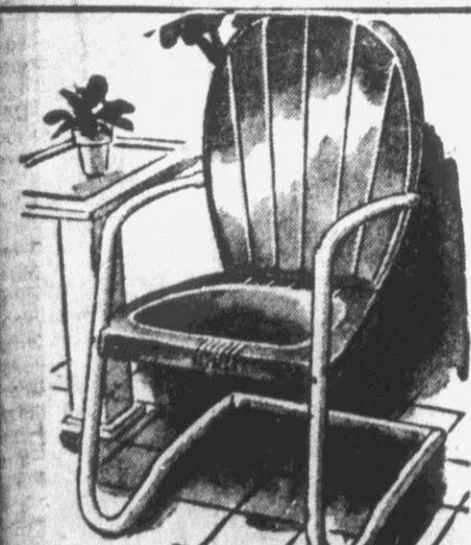
