Soviet Offer Of Food For Berlin Fails To Impress

Only Handful In Western Sectors Take Advantage; City Gov't Assailed

Berlin, July 30.—(AP)—A Soviet offer to feed all Berlin drew little response from Germans in western sectors of the blockaded city today and the Russians loosed new attacks on the anti-Communist city government.

Informants in Moscow, meanwhile, said the chances are good that a big four session to thrash out the Berlin crisis may take place in Paris in September. If prospective talks between envoys of the western allies and Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov go off satisfactorily, the western Berlin press reported that in three days of registration only 3,000 western Berliners had solicited ration cards in the Soviet sector. The three western sectors have a population of more than 2,000,000 who are being fed through the British-American air lift.

U.S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith is back in Moscow after strategy talks in London and Berlin. It is believed Smith will take the leading role in the prospective talks with Molotov concerning the possibility of opening negotiations. Frank Roberts, private secretary to British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and former minister counselor at the British embassy in Moscow, arrived in the Russian capital yesterday with Smith. Sir Maurice Peterson, the British ambassador, is in Britain on sick leave.

Moscow, July 30.—(AP)—The U.S. embassy was informed today that Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov is out of town. The embassy had called the foreign office for an appointment with Molotov for Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith, who returned to the Soviet capital yesterday from consultations in Berlin and London on the situation in Germany.

The foreign office told the embassy that a deputy foreign minister, Valentin A. Zorin, was on duty. The western powers seek to talk with Molotov on the German crisis. The British-licensed German press service said Molotov is absent from Moscow "on a vacation" of undetermined duration.

Forego Attempt At Veto Powers In Danube Meet

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, July 30.—(AP)—The United States disclosed today its decision to forego any attempt to obtain veto powers in the 11-nation conference on control of Danube river shipping.

Ambassador Cavendish Cannon, chief U.S. delegate, told a news conference "we are going to be consistent" on that point, even though the western powers are outnumbered at the 11 conferring nations are in the Russian orbit.

Grand Jury Will Get Robert Daniel's Case

The case of Robert Daniel, Negro farm worker, accused in the fatal shooting of James Little and the wounding of Ed Powell on July 11, will be placed before the grand jury during the August term of criminal court, Coroner Griffin H. Rouse said today.

Argument On Poll Tax

The Issues Upon Which It Revolves; Past Actions In Lower House; Senate's Sure Death; Few Southerners Favor Poll Tax; Main Points, Pro And Con, On Issue

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—This is an ABC on the poll tax argument. That argument revolves around Negroes' states' rights, the U. S. constitution, and free elections. Seven Southern states have the tax: Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. And up in New England, New Hampshire and Massachusetts require it too.

In those states would be voters have to pay a poll tax—ranging from \$1 to several dollars—before they can vote.

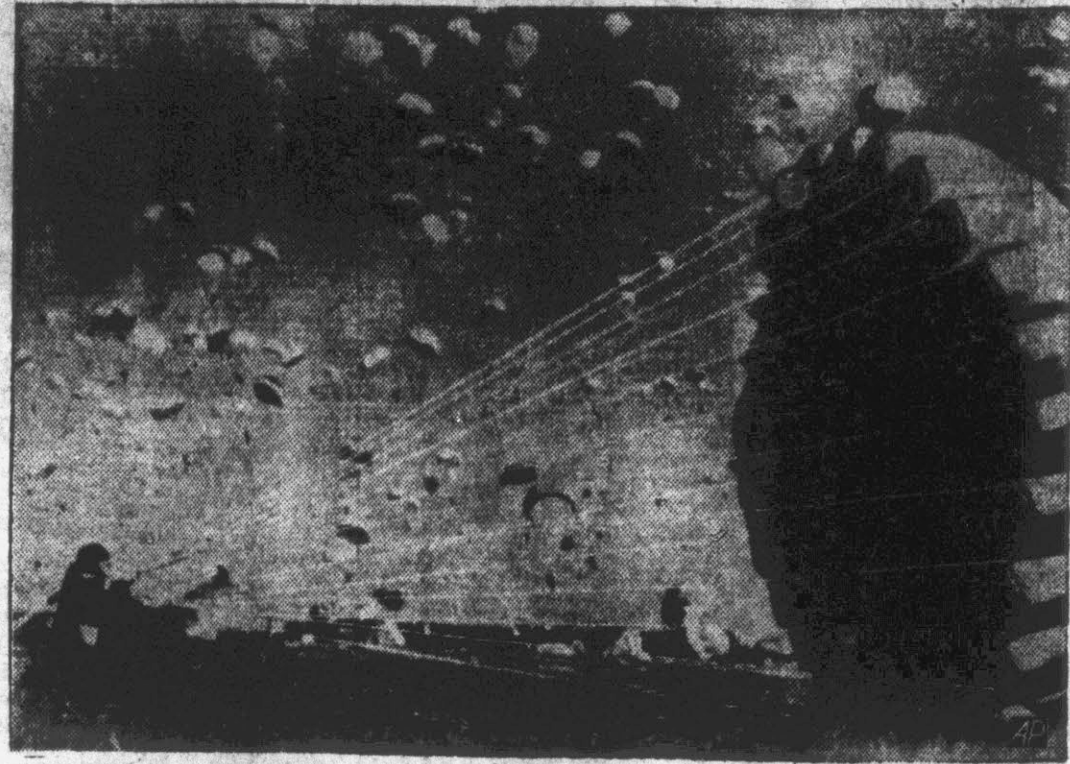
Bills to outlaw the tax have been passed repeatedly in the House, where there's a limit on debate and Southerners can't talk endlessly to block the will of the majority.

For example, the House passed an anti-poll tax bill in 1945, 1946 and again in July, 1947.

But those House-passed bills have never been permitted to reach the voting stage in the Senate. There's no limit on debate there. And Southern senators have blocked the bills by filibustering—talking endlessly.

General To Join B-29s In Britain

Mounting U. S. Air Power Reflects East-West Strain

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—The steady build-up of American air power in Europe, reflecting the strain in western power relations with Russia, reached a new phase today.

A major general was ordered to England to take command of the 60 Superfortresses which flew there from this country two weeks ago. When the two wings of B-29s unobtrusively departed the United States, the highest ranking officer was a colonel.

Furthermore, when Maj. Gen. Leon W. Johnson takes over, his new assignment early next week will be to command the 15th Air Force, which amounts to the framework for an "air division," a unit designation widely used during World War II.

The Air Force now defines an air division as two or more wings. A wing is the operating formation of one or more groups of aircraft, with its own maintenance and service organizations. Customarily, a major general commands an air division.

Johnson will be over the overall direction of Lt. Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, commander of all United States air units in Europe. A wing of B-29s presently based in Germany is under LeMay's command.

Johnson up to now has been commander of the 15th Air Force, one of the two fleets of B-29s based in the United States. He will leave Sunday for England.

He knows that country and the continent like the back of his hand. Johnson served with the 8th Air Force in England when its thousands of bombers were sweeping deep into Germany and Nazi-occupied lands.

President Of Hungary Abdicates Under Pressure

Budapest, Hungary, July 30.—(AP)—President Zoltan Tildy abdicated today. The Communist-dominated government had accused his son-in-law, Minister to Egypt Victor Csoranyi, of espionage and treason.

Tildy, a Methodist minister, belongs to the Smallholder party,

which had an elected majority before the Communist coup in May of last year. He was the first president of post-war Hungary and retained that office after the coup.

Tildy, however, had been under Communist pressure for a year or more.

Csoranyi is under arrest. He resigned as minister to Egypt yesterday, about two weeks after his return from Cairo.

Zoltan Tildy, Methodist minister who became one of Hungary's leading statesmen, apparently has been a marked man ever since he became president of the Hungarian republic.

The evidence all has pointed to the likelihood that the Communists neither liked nor trusted him. Tildy led the militant, moderate conservative Smallholders' party to post-war victory, only to see it fall into obscurity under the weight of a Communist coup.

Tildy, now 59 years old, remained president only by Communist toleration. But he was president in title only. The Communists have been in firm control of the country since May, 1947, when, with the tactics now familiar, they announced they had uncovered a plot against the country. They forced the resignation of Premier Ferenc Nagy, head of the Smallholders, later brought about the dissolution of the Smallholder-dominated Parliament and, in the elections of August, 1947, gained complete control.

Work Out Plans Clear Currency

Paul Hoffman Announces System Is Recovery Milestone

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Economic cooperation administrator Paul G. Hoffman today announced a new plan of European currency clearance which he termed "a milestone in real cooperation among the European countries for economic recovery."

The system, designed to free the currency jam which obstructs intra-European trade and production, has been approved "in principle" by the United States and the Marshall Plan countries, Hoffman told a news conference. It is to be effective Oct. 1.

The plan was worked out in Paris during Hoffman's week-long visit to the headquarters of the organization of European economic cooperation (OEEC).

Hoffman said the plan provides for a "broader and more thorough clearance arrangement" handled by the Bank for International Settlements at Basel, Switzerland. For two years, clearance has been nearly paralyzed because of the unwillingness of some countries to accept more of the currency of "persistent creditor" nations.

It also provides for the funding of such "persistent debts" into long-term loans, with fixed schedules of repayment and the granting of additional credit by the better-off countries to the debtor powers.

Georgia-Florida Tobacco Sales Continue High

Valdosta, Ga., July 30.—(AP)—Full sales were observed on practically all markets in the Georgia-Florida flue cured tobacco belt yesterday, with a carryover large enough to assure good sales today, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has reported.

Comparatively steady prices and a heavy volume of sales characterized the marketing yesterday, the department said. Slight price changes were shown in some grades, but only to the extent of \$1 to \$2 per 100 pounds.

Decreased proportions of top lug grades and medium cutters slightly lowered the general quality of the leaf offered. Sales were comprised chiefly of low to fine lugs, low to good leaf, and cutters.

Gross sales for the season reached 43,720,491 pounds, for an average of \$52.39 per hundred pounds.

Earnings Fall As Hours Decreased

Raleigh, N. C., July 30.—(AP)—Weekly earnings of some 362,000 employees in North Carolina manufacturing industries dropped an average of one percent during June, the State department of labor reported today.

The reason for the decline, said C. H. Pritchard, department statistician, was a 1-3 percent decrease in hours worked. Hourly earnings showed a fractional increase, he reported.

Hold Sailor On Narcotic Charge

New York, July 30.—(AP)—A thin-faced 100-pound sailor alleged to have netted \$1,500,000 in three months by selling narcotics was arrested yesterday and taken into Brooklyn federal court.

The man, identified by federal officials as Lucien Ignaro, 45, a French seaman, was held in \$5,000 bail on charges of importing, possessing and conspiring to import pure heroin.

Israel Demands New Boundaries And Indemnities

Want Area Taken By Jewish Forces Outside Of Lines Set By UN

Tel Aviv, Israel, July 30.—(AP)—Israel demanded today new territories in Palestine—perhaps including Jerusalem—as a result of Jewish victories over Arab armies.

Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok served notice of the Jewish demands yesterday in an address before the Israeli state council. He said:

"The Arabs are responsible that the boundaries fixed by the United Nations no longer are practical and we must insist on changing them by adding territories and not by diminishing them."

Shertok said Israel plans immediate steps to place Jerusalem under Jewish sovereignty. Israel, he added, has rejected Count Folke Bernadotte's plan to demilitarize the Holy City because it is provided for eventual Arab rule.

Earlier, a cabinet source said the Israeli government has told the U.N. mediator that it will discuss the demilitarization plan further if he publicly renounces his original plan to put the city under Arab rule.

Shertok also told the 37-member council that:

1. Israeli authorities will refuse to permit the return of any of the 300,000 Arab refugees to their Palestinian homes until their status has been considered as part of a minority question, including the states of Jews in Arab states.

2. Israel will demand "heavy indemnities" from the Arabs in peace negotiations for what he called "hundreds of millions of dollars lost by direct war expenses."

He reiterated previous appeals to the Arabs to negotiate directly Jewish-Arab differences as "co-partners of equal rights and sovereignty."

Mild Sentences For Farben Men

Thirteen Directors Convicted Of War Crimes; Dissent

Nuremberg, Germany, July 30.—(AP)—Thirteen directors of the I. G. Farben chemical trust were convicted of war crimes and sentenced today to serve jail terms ranging from 18 months to eight years.

One of the four American judges on the tribunal which tried the case promptly filed a dissent, contending that the decision of the majority was too lenient. He was Judge Paul M. Hebert of Baton Rouge, La., who declared that he felt 30 of the 23 defendants should have been convicted of mistreating slave labor. Only five actually were convicted on this count.

The penalties against the 13 men convicted were the mildest ever imposed in a war crimes trial in this war crimes capital of conquered Germany. They meant that actually only seven of the 24 Farben directors who went on trial 11 months ago will stay behind bars for any length of time. All were credited with time already served. One defendant was severed from the case because of illness.

They all were acquitted yesterday of the stiffest charge in the indictment—plotting and waging aggressive war.

Carl Krauch, chairman of the board of the once-great, billion-dollar firm, was sentenced to serve six years.

Senators Called For Hearings On Red Infiltration

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) called his Senate investigating subcommittee together today to begin public hearings on alleged Communist infiltration into government agencies.

Miss Elizabeth Bentley, who has been identified by senators as a "one time Communist espionage agent," was listed as a witness.

She has been testifying before closed sessions of the committee. She also was a witness before the New York Grand Jury which recently indicted 12 national Communist leaders.

Ferguson said the hearings are in connection with a Senate inquiry into loyalty of federal employees.

Talk Quarantine Of N.C. Children

Columbia, S. C., July 30.—(AP)—The State Board of Health will consider a proposal to quarantine North Carolina children visiting in this state, health officer Dr. Ben F. Wyman said today.

The suggestion was made here yesterday at a meeting of about 50 health officials and physicians to discuss the spread of poliomyelitis.

Truman Stresses Economic

Pool To Close

Due to the lack of attendance, presumably because of the current polio epidemic scare, the Greenville swimming pool will be closed until further notice, J. Ed Waldrop announced today.

Waldrop, chairman of the Greenville Parks and Pool Committee, stated that "it is deemed advisable to close the municipal swimming pool for the present."

"We hope that the polio epidemic will soon subside, and at a later date the pool can be reopened."

The pool will close down tonight (Friday) until further notice.

Only 27 Listed In Polio Report

Fewest Listed For One Day Since July 17; 1,064 Total

Raleigh, July 30.—(AP)—The State Board of Health today received its smallest one-day report of polio cases in two weeks. There were 27 new cases.

The number reported for the state during the year rose to 1,064 cases. All the cases reported today were of July onset. The month's total reached 649.

The 37 cases today were the fewest listed for one day since July 17, when 33 were reported.

Guilford County headed the new list, with six cases. Others were in: Buncombe, Catawba and Lincoln, two each; and Alexander, Cabernus, Columbus, Craven, Davidson, Forsyth, Halifax, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Mitchell, Moore, Randolph, Rockingham, Union and Vance, one each.

The attack rate in the epidemic is 29 cases per 100,000 of population, the state board said yesterday.

Reidsville, Jayces raised a \$10,000 check to Greensboro yesterday to help pay for the Central Carolina Convalescent Center now under construction. In Carthage, the Jayces there plan an auction sale tonight, the proceeds to go to the Greensboro project.

Plans were announced, following a day-long emergency session of National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis representatives at Greensboro, for another five-member epidemic aid team to arrive in Greensboro Sunday.

Truman Program Appears Doomed

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—The Taft-Hartley-Wagner long-range housing bill, embracing government low-rent housing and slums clearance, apparently was doomed today along with President Truman's price-control anti-inflation program.

Chairman Wolcott (R-Mich.) of the House Banking Committee told reporters he sees no chance for extra-session action on this legislation. Wolcott termed the federal low-rent housing and slums clearance features of the bill "Socialistic."

Asks Recheck Of Party Petition

Newton, N.C., July 30.—(AP)—Chairman D. Lee Setzer of the Catawba County Elections Board said today he had asked that a Progressive party petition be returned here for a recheck.

Setzer said he had received numerous complaints from persons who said they either did not sign the petition or signed after being approached under false pretenses.

Snyder Supports 'Freeze' Remedy On Bank Lending

Backs Truman In Urging Increases Of Bank Reserves As Inflation Brake

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Secretary of the treasury Snyder today urged a 10 percent increase in bank reserves to "freeze" possibly \$12,000,000,000 (B) in funds that banks have available for lending.

The proposal is part of President Truman's anti-inflation program. Snyder backed it in testimony to the Senate banking committee.

The treasury head also urged that Congress give the administration power to regulate installment buying.

Snyder has been accused by Mr. R. S. Eccles, a member of the Federal Reserve Board, of blocking board proposals last November for restrictions on bank lending.

Supporting such a move, Snyder told the Senators today:

1. "The expansion of bank credit, except in the fields of consumer and real estate financing, has not, in my opinion, been a major contributing force to present inflationary pressures."

2. "I have always believed that our chief reliance for the control of inflationary bank credit lies in the good judgment of the individual bankers in the 15,000 banks in the United States."

The treasury chief backed up the President's request for consumer credit (installment buying) controls without any qualification. He said: "I believe that it is urgent in the National welfare that consumer credit control legislation be enacted as soon as possible."

Total consumer credit, he said, reached "an all-time peak of \$13,800,000,000" at the end of May after increasing \$1,750,000,000 since consumer control powers expired last November 1.

The facts add up to a clear and disconcerting conclusion, the President said. "In spite of some favorable factors, we are in the very midst of gathering inflationary forces, which day by day are imposing additional hardships upon countless families x x x"

"But thus far we have shown a blind disregard of the danger that beset our path. Despite my repeated warnings and recommendations, we have not adopted adequate legislation for controlling inflation. x x x"

"It is no less important to take action to forestall a business collapse than it is to use government measures to overcome a depression once it has arrived."

"Our success in this effort is essential for the reconstruction of a peaceful world."

The economic council, headed by Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, came out more strongly than ever before for emergency controls. The council was created under the employment act of 1946 to steer the country away from recurrent booms and busts.

Voluntary efforts by individual companies and unions to check the wage-price spiral have "evaporated," the council said. Prices are advancing "on a broad front."

"It is therefore necessary that the government should have and use powers in the interest of economic stability."

Asks For Guardsmen To Quell Strike Disorders

Dayton, O., July 30.—(AP)—Mayor Louis Lohrey today asked Gov. Thomas J. Herbert to assign Ohio National guardsmen to the Mass-picketed Unilever Lens Co. plant after police chief Rudolph Wurster reported disorders were out of hand.

The request for troops came after police apparently had stopped turmoil at the plant where several hundred employees for the fifth consecutive day attempted to return to work.

Police broke up street fighting between pickets and non-strikers by exploding tear gas bombs. Heavy police squadrons again forced a path through the picket line and by 8 a. m. EST the company said 217 employees had entered the plant.

At least three pickets and another man who was not identified were taken to police station. No casualties were reported.

Pickets arrested included Herbert Hirschberg, 36, of Cleveland, who said he was director of organization for the United Electrical Workers (CIO) for Ohio and Kentucky.

Violence broke out today when some 3,000 persons gathered to form picket lines in defiance of a court order forbidding mass picketing. The skirmishing was short lived, but the situation remained tense after police broke up the street fighting.

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President's Mid-Year Report Accuses 'Blind Disregard' Of Quickening Inflation

By Republicans; Favorable Factors Are Told; Economic Council Cites Dangers

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—President Truman today accused the Republican Congress of a "blind disregard" of quickening inflation.

"Lasting prosperity is not assured," the Chief executive declared in calling anew for laws to "forestall a business collapse." Such a crash may come, he said, as a sudden climax to the leapfrog game of wage and price increases.

Mr. Truman, in his message today insisted:

"It is not too late for preventive measures, and we are not yet forced by the tragic consequences of depression to adopt measures which would interfere with our free economy far more than would any of all the measures I have proposed."

"I realize that the anti-inflationary program I have offered will impede some business plans, will curb some profit opportunities, and may limit some wage advances."

"It is of the very essence of a plan to counteract inflation that this be done. All groups will ultimately benefit when it is done."

In eight pages the President gave a glowing account of peacetime or all-time records achieved at mid-year in jobs, wages, production, trade—and prices.

The other 107 pages he sent to Capitol Hill comprised the report of his council of economic advisers. The three-member council backed up Mr. Truman's plea for more power, but did not endorse any particular form of regulation.

Using the council's data, Mr. Truman pointed to strong inflationary factors he said are entering the picture now. He listed these as including multi-billion dollar spending for defense and foreign aid, "third-round" wage boosts, and the "probable" wiping out of the federal surplus in the next year.

"The facts add up to a clear and disconcerting conclusion," the President said. "In spite of some favorable factors, we are in the very midst of gathering inflationary forces, which day by day are imposing additional hardships upon countless families x x x"

Six Educators From Other Schools Join Faculty In Summer Term Work

Teaching at East Carolina Teachers during the second term of the summer session are six men and women who are not members of the regular faculty.

Dr. Edgar M. Finck, supervising director of the Toms River, N. J., schools, is teaching courses in home school-community relationships, staff personal problems, and high school administration.

Also in the social studies department are two alumni of East Carolina, who completed work here for their master's degrees. They are Mildred Johnson, faculty member of the New Hanover High School of Wilmington and of Wilmington College, and Dorothy Hollar, teacher in the High Point high school.

E. R. Blakelee, principal of the Washington Casket Elementary school in Wilmington, and Oliver L. Shields, psychologist and special teacher in the Jefferson County, Ky. schools are offering courses in education and psychology during the second summer session.

Ask Extra Funds For Care Of TB

Wilson, N.C., July 30—(AP)—The North Carolina Advisory Budget Commission has a request for an additional \$1,000,000 for state tuberculosis sanatoria.

The request was made yesterday by Dr. H. S. Willis of McCain, general superintendent of the institutions. Dr. Willis also told the commission, which inspected the sanatorium here, that 650 beds were needed urgently for tubercular patients.

Alabama Pledges Dixiecrat Votes

Birmingham, Ala., July 30—(AP)—Alabama's 11 electoral votes were pledged today to the states rights ticket of Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina and Gov. Fielding L. Wright of Mississippi.

This action represented the first formal support of the presidential slate chosen by rebellious Southerners at the Birmingham states rights conference in Birmingham July 17. Similar action is expected to be taken by the Mississippi Democratic party in a meeting Tuesday at Jackson, Miss.

Mississippi's elector nominees, like

Alabama's, already are pledged against casting the state's ballots for President Truman in the electoral college.

States rights leaders hope to snuff the Thurmond-Wright ticket in all states in the November general election.

Gov. Thurmond is scheduled to open his nation-wide campaign at a states rights rally at Houston, Tex., Aug. 11, when he will formally accept the presidential nomination.

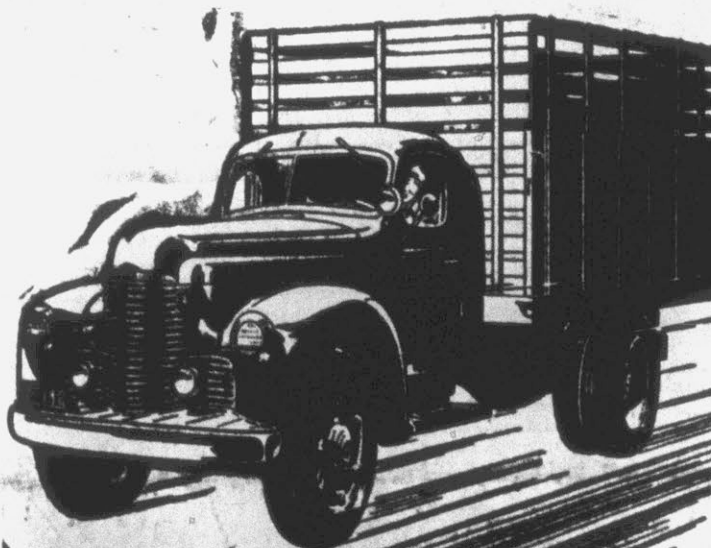

Explains Order To Armed Forces

Washington, July 30 — (AP) — President Truman insists that an eventual end to "Jim Crowism" in the armed forces will be his aim as long as he is commander-in-chief. He told a news conference yesterday that the "equality" order he issued Monday meant just that.

The subject came up when a reporter said Gen. Omar Bradley, Army chief of staff, had been quoted as saying he favors segregation among the lower echelons of the army. The newsmen asked whether that is consistent with Mr. Truman's "equality of treatment and opportunity" order.

The President said he had been informed by Secretary of the Army Royal that Bradley had made no such statement.

Then, to another question whether his order aims at an eventual end of segregation, Mr. Truman replied yes.

The day after Mr. Truman announced he was setting up a seven-man committee to put the non-segregation policy into effect, Bradley told a news conference at Ft. Knox, Kan.

"The Army is not out to make any social reforms. The Army will put men of different races in different companies. It will change that policy when the nation as a whole changes it."

Air Violations Again Brought Up By Russians

Berlin, July 30 — (AP) — The official Soviet organ Tagliche Rundschau today charged new violations of Russian air lanes by British and American planes. The paper said "urgent measures are necessary for the protection of Soviet planes against possible air catastrophes."

The Russians have been mentioning these "measures" ever since their ground blockade of Berlin five weeks ago forced the Americans and British to supply western Berlin by air. American officials believe the Russians may be preparing to announce the closing of one or two of the three air corridors linking Berlin with the British and American zones. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, American military governor, has stated that in the event of such a Russian move, the transport planes would continue to fly as before.

Coal Mine Blast Fatal For Two

Birmingham, Ala., July 30 — (AP) — Two miners were reported killed and at least 13 injured today in a blast at the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Co.'s big Edgewater coal mine.

A source at the company's main offices said unverified reports from the scene placed the death toll at two. A company spokesman said he was unable to confirm this immediately.

Drastic Actions Ordered Invoked

Asheville, N. C., July 30 — (AP) — As a precaution against further spread of polio, Asheville health authorities today ordered the closing of churches and motion picture theaters, discontinuance of athletic contests and civic club meetings effective Sunday at 1 a. m.

County health authorities did not adopt these drastic regulations for the rural areas of Buncombe county. They restricted public gatherings and movies to persons 16 years and under.

'Hoodlum Tactics' In Machine-Gun Holdup

Davenport, Ia., July 30 — (AP) — Five armed bandits held up 15 patrons of the Greek-American club today and escaped with approximately \$2,000 in cash and a quantity of jewelry.

Police said "typical hoodlum tactics" were used. The leader carried a machine gun and all wore masks.

MILK PRICES RISE
Charlotte, July 30 — (AP) — Numerous dairies notified Charlotte customers today that milk prices would be advanced one to two cents a quart effective Sunday.

probably will abolish their poll tax laws. But that's up to them. Further, money obtained from poll tax payments, although not a lot, helps pay for state expenses, like supporting schools.

If Congress can tell the states what to do on poll taxes, then the federal government can order the states around on other things.

All this so far covers the chief Southern arguments against an anti-poll tax law.

Here are some of the arguments of those who want Congress to wipe out the tax instead of waiting to see whether the states will do it in their own good time.

States can set up their own laws regulating city and state elections. But they have no right to charge a poll tax in a federal election when president, vice president and members of Congress are chosen.

Because members of Congress vote on laws affecting the whole country. So the majority in Congress, where Southerners are in a minority, have a right to wipe out any law interfering with voting in federal elections.

For that reason, an anti-poll tax law would be entirely constitutional since it would apply only to federal elections and not to city or state elections.

But does a poll tax interfere in a federal election? Its enemies say it does. They argue:

By comparison with the rest of the country, where no and income in the South are low. For that reason paying even a small poll tax is a hardship on poor whites and the poorly paid Negroes. It actually prevents their voting because they can't afford the tax.

Before there can be any negotiations the Soviet must lift its food blockade of Berlin, exclamation point. Meantime the Western allies are going straight ahead with their plans for forming a German government for their three zones of occupation. The Soviet Union can join in with its zone—or it can stay out.

It has been reported, but not confirmed, that the three allies are prepared to negotiate other broader European questions with Moscow if and when the German question is ironed out. That would, of course, aim at settling the cold war in Europe.

It is possible that the Muscovites may decide to make some concessions in Berlin in order to ease a situation which is squeezing them as well as the Western allies. In any event I believe we can say this safely:

The best that might be got out of the Russians at this juncture would be a truce. The Bolsheviks are not ready for peace. But they may make a local truce to further their own interests, but they won't quit trying to sovietize the world. That's the uncomfortable truth.

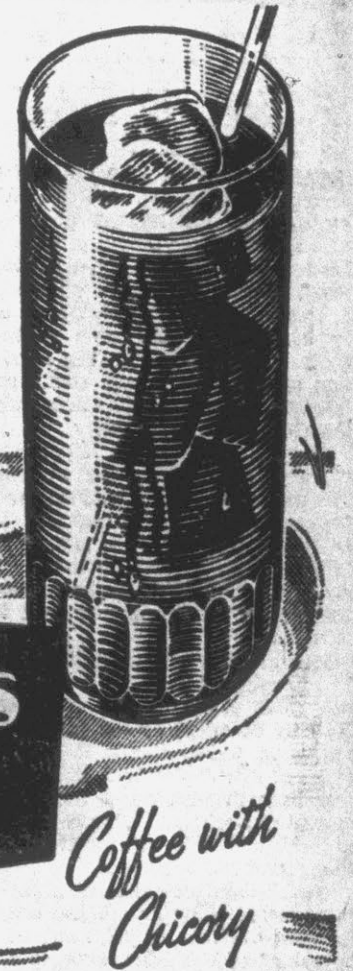

Strength FOR THE DAY

STANDING ON SOLID GROUND
John Bunyan, the seventeenth
century English Baptist preacher
who spent twelve years in prison
for his beliefs and who during this
time wrote Pilgrim's Progress, was
a great saint and a great man of
letters. His English style is un-
surpassed in simplicity. His hand-
ling of human problems shows an
insight into human life which only
the God-inspired possess.

One of his characters, Hopeful,
is pictured as crossing the Jordan.
The waters are cold to his heart and
the rapids so swift that they threaten
to sweep him off his feet. But
he holds back to those on the shore
and says, "Be of good cheer, bro-
thers, for I feel the bottom, and it
is sound."

Men in every age want to know
in his spiritual pilgrimage that he
has solid ground under his feet.
He may be swept by the torrential
waters of trouble. But if in the
midst of this Jordan torrent he can
feel beneath his feet the solid
ground of Christian truth, he knows
for certain that he can survive. But
the ground has to be solid.
Present-day theology is often any-
thing but solid ground. When critics
work overtime to point out the
"mistakes" of the Bible, and others
who should proclaim the faith scoff
at it, the average believer does not
get the impression of solid ground
beneath his feet.

Around Capitol Square

POWERS—Whether a state institu-
tion which is primarily for the
purpose of teaching blind and deaf
children should engage in farming
on the side; and whether the state
should go into the real estate and
merchandising business as adjunct
to operation of mental hospitals,
were two questions indirectly pre-
sented to the advisory budget com-
mission. At least the questions
were recognized as significant by
the two members of the commission
who visited the school for blind and
deaf at Raleigh and the Camp But-
ter hospital area. Previously made
conflicting engagements prevented
attendance of all members except
Clarence Stone and Kerr Craig
Barnes.

SCHOOL—The budgeters found
that problems of teaching blind and
deaf children are as much between
themselves as do methods of teach-
ing either from the ordinary public
schools. For instance, Superintendent
Robert Peeler reminded them that
the average first grade public
school child has a normal vocabu-
lary of several hundred words,
whereas the deaf child at first grade
age has none at all. So, one of the
main problems is to find teachers
properly trained for the special work
of teaching the deaf. Vocabulary
is not a problem for the blind, but
they must be taught the meaning of
things by touch. Unlike regular
schools, typewriters and musical
instruments constitute major re-
quirements. The school has some
55 pianos and several hundred type-
writers. Upkeep and replacement is
a big budget item.

PLANT—The school is divided in-
to white and colored sections. The
white school is solely for blind,
while the colored unit has both
blind and deaf. There are about
600 white and 150 colored children
enrolled. The plant represents a
budget book value of \$1,285,461, and
has a current appropriation of \$608,-
000, including student aid. It has
potted by fairly well on all budget
items except repairs, for which addi-
tional funds had to be obtained from
the contingency and emergency fund.

FARM—The school operates a
farm of about 100 acres at the Negro
unit four miles southeast of Ra-
leigh, mostly for corn and vege-
tables. A dairy herd of 40 cows
supplies milk for both schools and
effort is made to raise enough hog
meat. Question that must soon be
posed is whether to enlarge or aban-
don farming operations. Since pur-
pose of the institution is education
of children who are obviously not
qualified for farm work—in the first
place they couldn't do it, and in the
second farm work is most needed
during the summer vacation period.
Machinery and hired help adequate
to handle 100 acres can handle more
with little extra cost.

BUTTER—As much has been
written during the past two years
about the Camp Butte unit of the
state hospital system as about all
other state institutions combined—
and the half hasn't been told. It is
pretty well known by now that the
state acquired the hospital facilities
in 1928, when it was a private

WASHINGTON

Washington, Mrs. Blanche Noyes
figures she has been in the air en-
ough hours to have flown around the
world 66 times. She first soloed
in 1929.

The comely chief of the Civil Aeronautics
Administration's Air Marking
Division now is trying to make
it easier for other private flyers to
get around by setting up a system of
skyways with uniform markings
criss-crossing the country. Mrs. Noyes
says she believes the nation's 447,-
250 private fliers, of whom 75,000
are flying farmers, are entitled to
the same navigational aides as the
motorist who has route signs to guide
him.

A skyway, she explains, consists
of a specifically designed route be-
tween selected terminal points, 40
miles in width, with roads in villages
towns, cities, large ranch and farm
buildings and other prominent land
marks so marked that a pilot may
determine from normal flying eleva-
tion his exact location, direction
of flight, and distance and direction
to nearest landing field.

Mrs. Noyes, who joined the CAA
in 1936, says that by 1941 there were
30,000 air markers throughout the
United States. They were constructed
with federal funds by WPA under
the direction of CAA. During the
war some of these were obliterated
to foil possible air invaders. Those
remaining at the end of hostilities,
badly weathered and worn, were
mostly unreadable. In 1947 Congress
appropriated \$100,000 for reconstruc-
tion of the markers. This didn't go
far and no other funds were forth-
coming for 1948.

"Thus there are only about 3,500
air markers in the United States
today, out of the 100,000 needed,"
Mrs. Noyes says. "I fear that the
only way there will be an adequate
air marking system is with the aid

of federal funds. However, until
funds are appropriated we are do-
ing the best we can to encourage
civil groups, flying clubs, Boy Scouts
and others to construct air markers."

Mrs. Noyes' interest in aviation
began in 1928, when she met a re-
haired air pilot at a dinner party
for Charles A. Lindbergh in Pitts-
burgh. Mrs. Noyes was playing the
lead in the stage production "White
Cargo." The pilot, Dewey L. Noyes,
taught her to fly and married her.

In September 1929, she competed
in the first woman's air derby from
Santa Monica, Calif., to Cleveland,
Ohio. Her ship caught fire over the
desert. She landed, extinguished the
fire by throwing sand on it. In a
badly damaged ship, with half the
landing gear washed out, she took
off and landed in Pecos, Tex., on one
wheel, repaired her ship, continued
in the race to win fourth place. Am-
elia Earhart won third place.

In 1936 she was winner of the
Bendix Air Race from New York to
Los Angeles. She was flying a 420
horsepower single motored ship of
the same type in which her husband
had been killed six months before.
This was the first time this race
had been won by a woman. She set
a speed record in 1936 from east to
west—14 hours, 39 min. 54 sec.

Suggests Polio Caused by Rays Of Summer Sun

Durham, N. C., July 30 (AP)—A veteran Durham physician today had one answer as to the mysterious cause of infantile paralysis. His theory—it may be caused by rays from the scorching summer sun.

Writing in the Durham Morning Herald, Dr. William H. Boone said that unclad bodies offer perfect polio targets.

Polio, Dr. Boone wrote, is described as an infection disease "mainly because its symptoms behave like an infection."

"It is admitted that no specific bacteria has been demonstrated or proven to be the cause x x x another theory that has a semblance of truth is the virus theory. The claim is that a virus is a toxin produced by an infectious disease, chemical poisons, or the degeneration of body cells by attack of some agency producing (the) same. And it is claimed that virus has been injected into monkeys. This, however, does not alter the conclusion we made."

"My theory is that the sun rays x x x are the answer. It answers the virus and contradicts the bacterial idea. The destruction the sun rays produce on the endothelial cells and tissues would create a toxin or poison virus that could affect like tissue or cells in other x x x."

"To dress, or rather undress susceptible children, baring their heads and trunks to violent, penetrating rays is calculated to x x x produce inflammation of the endothelial cells that line the serous cavities, blood vessels and lymphatics. From this we get symptoms—the fever, the prostration, the toxic virus, the early muscular rigidity from the nerve irritation, and finally the destruction of the cells of the anterior horns of the spinal cord x x x."

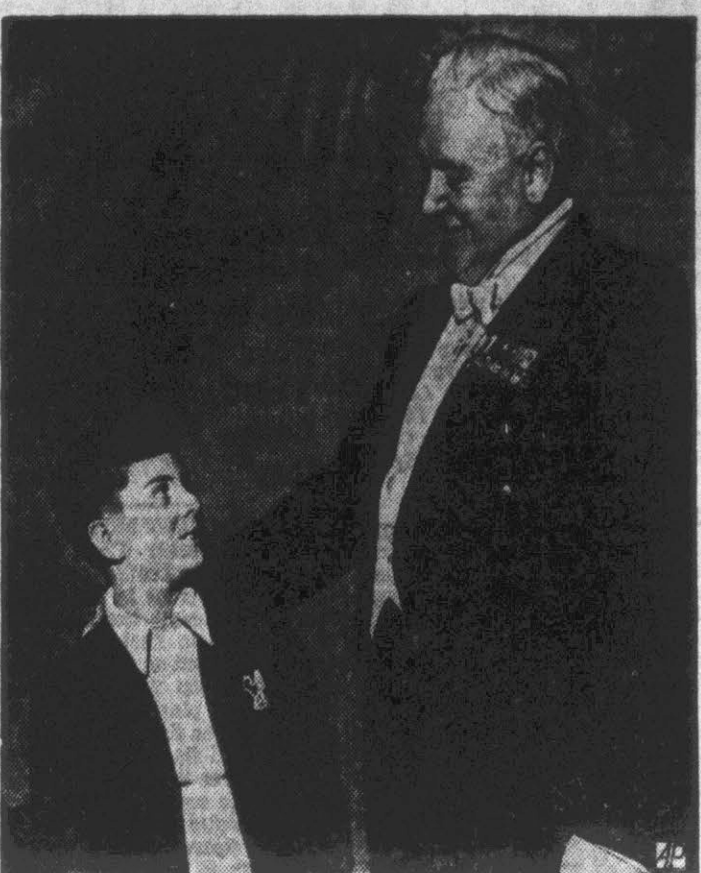

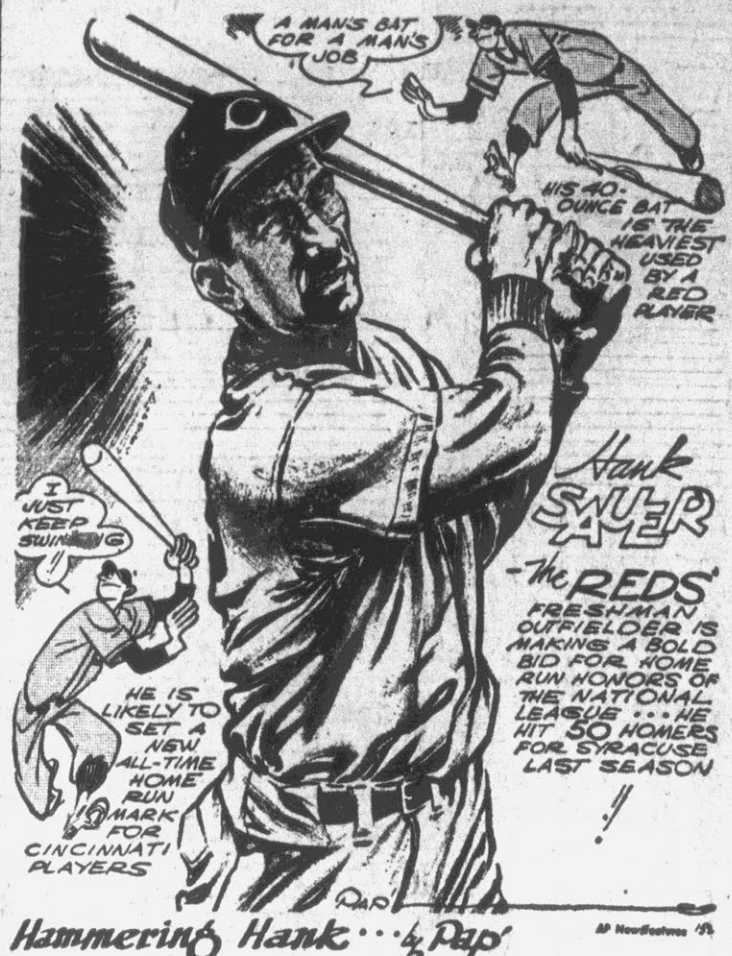

Pro Golfers Get Plenty Cash For Playing a Game

By HAROLD V. RATLIFF

Fort Worth, Tex.—(AP)—Golfers are making more money today than ever before but haven't reached the zenith by any means, says George Schreiner, chairman of the PGA tournament committee.

Schreiner heads the annual tour in which the pros play for hundreds of thousands of dollars. But the prize money represents only part of their earnings.

Here are sources of income for a top golfer:

1. He represents a club as its playing professional, receiving probably \$5,000 a year.
2. A sporting goods company designs golf clubs with his name on them. He receives a royalty on all sales. From this source he will get at least \$10,000 a year. This company will double his prize money in his tournament triumphs.
3. He will appear in exhibitions paying him \$500 each and will earn probably \$7,000 in a year doing that.
4. He will represent a sporting goods company for about \$5,000 a year.
5. Through his golfing prominence he will make business contacts that will be profitable. Byron Nelson, who is an official in an umbrella company, and Harold McSpadden and his interest in a fabrics concern are examples.
6. Endorsements of this and that product run from \$500 to \$10,000.

The sources do not include such things as an occasional motion picture, appearance money at tournaments and other items that add up.

Schreiner estimates that the big names of golf will realize a minimum of \$50,000 a year. "Of course, there are only five or six who do this well," he points out, "but even the lesser lights generally make good money. These fellows almost all represent equipment manufacturers averaging about \$4,000 a year in addition to what prize money they pick up. These companies don't always require a golfer to be a top winner in order to represent them. They think of the promotion, advertising and the good will he creates personally."

It is this matter of advertising that causes Schreiner to predict that golfers will make more money than they do now. "The possibilities are tremendous," the Ogden, Utah man declares. "Then, the game itself is growing by leaps and bounds. In 1940 there were 2,000,000 golfers in America; today there are between 4,500,000 and 5,000,000."

What does the golfer think? Ask Cary Middlecoff, the Memphis, Tenn., dentist who has been winning tournaments but wins sizable money. "You have to win a tournament now and then in order to get into the big money," he observes.

U.S. Golf Association said 636 already have entered. In the past almost half the entries have been received on the final weekend. This is it. The books close Monday.

Thirty-four qualifying meets will cut the field. These are set for Aug. 18 everywhere except Denver where the date is Aug. 17.

Starting today he has to run three 800s in three days of competition, take a day's rest and then compete in four 400s in two days. This is all on the assumption he reaches the finals—and Whitfield is not only confident he'll reach the showdown race, he thinks he's going to win both.
