

Pro-Wallace Party Wins Recognition

State Board Of Elections Officially Rules Candidates Can Be Placed On November Ballots; Study States Righters' Petitions

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—The State Board of Elections today officially recognized the pro-Wallace Progressive party of North Carolina. It ruled that names of Progressive party candidates would be placed on General Election ballots, provided they are furnished the board of elections by Sept. 1.

The board then began a study of petitions for legal recognition presented by the states' rights Democratic party.

The board voted to recognize the Progressive party after chairman Hubert E. Olive of Lexington had announced that the Progressive party had furnished petitions signed by 11,143 qualified voters and had thus complied with the law which requires petitions signed by 10,000 persons.

Dave Clark of Charlotte, co-chairman of the States Rights Democrats of North Carolina, told the board that his group had presented petitions signed by 18,661 qualified voters and had thus complied with the law.

The petitions of the States Rights party, however, were not checked by county election boards officials as required by the state elections board. The state board requires proof that the signers are registered voters who did not vote in primaries this year.

Clark told the board that "there is nothing in the law that says a man who votes in the primary is not a qualified petitioner."

The States Rights party presented petitions containing about 18,000 names shortly before a deadline at midnight last night. The Democrats' petitions had not been checked by county boards of elections to determine qualifications of the signers, however.

The party accompanied its petitions with a letter in which it offered to pay costs of mailing the petitions to county election boards and 10 cents per name for checking the petitions.

Mary Price of Greensboro, Progressive Party chairman, said that the Progressive Party petitions bore 25,008 names before they were checked by county election officials.

State law requires that to register a new party legally petitions bearing names of 10,000 voters must be presented 90 days prior to the general election, and the elections board ruled that only registered voters who did not vote in this year's primary would be eligible.

The board also ruled that new party petitions must be checked by county boards of elections to determine eligibility of the signers.

These rules were challenged by the Progressives who apparently had complied with them and by the States Rights who did not comply.

Says Italy Prepared To Join In European Union

Rome, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Italy is ready to take the lead in surrendering national sovereignty to bring about European union, Foreign Minister Count Carlo Sforza said today.

The bearded, 74-year-old statesman urged union now as the only cure for the continent's postwar economic and political ills and the sole hope for peace.

To bring it about and to do away with "archaic frontiers and archaic customs duties," he declared in an interview, this nation is ready to "accept curtailment of its political sovereignty, even in the most unexpected aspects."

He said there was but one condition: "That others do the same."

A long-time advocate of unity, Count Sforza had his hand strengthened last week when the Senate, in approving the European recovery program accord, urged their early development into effective union.

Only Communists and fellow-traveling Socialists demurred.

The question of National sovereignty has been and is one of the primary stumbling blocks in the way of a United Europe.

"To say that European countries ought to federate," the Italian Foreign Minister said, "is to say that

Accused Russian Spy Swears His Loyalty To U. S.

But Silvermaster Refuses To Answer As To Whether He Was Ever Communist

Washington, August 4.—(AP)—Nathan Gregory Silvermaster swore today he never was a spy for any foreign nation, but admitted that naval intelligence authorities once sought his removal from government service.

In the witness chair of the House Un-American Activities committee, Silvermaster also refused to answer questions as to whether he ever had been a Communist. His refusal was on grounds he might incriminate himself.

The committee members then put back on the stand Elizabeth T. Bentley, the former Communist who originally brought the charges of espionage against Silvermaster. She said again that he is the man she knew during the war who turned secret information over to her for relay to the Russians.

While he refused to answer questions about any affiliation with the Communists, Silvermaster read a statement saying he had been cleared after investigation by various agencies, including the chief of the U. S. secret service and Secretary of War Patterson.

He produced a copy of a letter which he said Patterson had written in his behalf.

And, he said, Lauchlin Currie had gone to see Patterson on his behalf, and that his boss, C. B. Baldwin, likewise had intervened.

That, he said, was after naval intelligence had said he should not be trusted. Silvermaster said that this "was unjustified, a smear letter."

Currie was an administrative assistant to the late President Roosevelt. His name came into the current hearings earlier. Miss Bentley said he had given information to the Communist "ring" but that she did not believe he was a Communist.

Baldwin is a former government official and is now the campaign manager for Henry A. Wallace, Progressive party presidential candidate.

Then Silvermaster refused to answer any questions about Communism. He stood on his constitutional rights, he said and refused "on the grounds any answer I would make might be self-incriminating."

Robert E. Stripling, committee investigator, had Miss Bentley, who was in the audience, stand up. He asked if Silvermaster knew her.

Silvermaster refused to say. His statement, however, had spoken of her.

A Well-Known Story

Communist Wartime Spy Ring Inside Government Is Startling Surprise Only To The Public; Government Officials Have Known Of It For Some Time; Background

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The startling story of the Communist-Russian wartime spy ring inside the government is new only to the public.

It's been known a good while to government officials, congressional committees, and the FBI. It is just breaking publicly now.

For example:

The FBI has investigated most of the people—maybe all—whose names have been mentioned in testimony before the House Un-American Activities Committee and a Senate investigating committee.

The House Un-American Activities Committee has questioned many of those people—behind closed doors.

And a number of those same people mentioned as taking part, knowingly or unknowingly, in the alleged spy ring have appeared before a grand jury investigating the ring.

But, so far as the public is concerned, the story began to break only last week.

That was when Miss Elizabeth T. Bentley, self-confessed Soviet spy and former Communist party member, appeared before the Senate

SOS Signal

Paris, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Air France said today it has received reports that an S.O.S. has been picked up from its giant flying boat, missing since Sunday with 52 persons aboard.

The company said all it had was a bare report from one of the ships searching the South Atlantic—the French frigate Le Verrier—that it had heard the distress signal.

There were no further details. Ships and planes were rushed toward the spot where the signal was believed to have originated.

The missing plane carried 40 passengers and 12 crewmen.

State Counts 33 New Polio Cases

Total For Year Now 1,172; Deaths Reach 63 For Year

Raleigh, August 4.—(AP)—Thirty-three new cases of infantile paralysis were reported to the State Board of Health today. The total cases for the year amounted to 1,172.

An additional death was reported, bringing the total polio deaths for the state this year to 63.

Buncombe county reported five cases today. Guilford reported four, Rutherford three, and two cases each were reported by Durham, Harnett and New Hanover.

One case each was reported by Carteret, Catawba, Chatham, Cleveland, Craven, Gaston, Lincoln, Macon, Montgomery, Moore, Onslow, Pitt, Randolph, Surry and Wilkes.

Meanwhile, precautions against the disease remained in full force throughout the state. Cumberland county banned all gatherings of children under 16 and Fayetteville employed additional sanitary workers.

Buncombe county adopted rigid restrictions similar to those placed into effect in Asheville Sunday.

The county measures, effective last midnight, prohibit church services, indoor theater attendance and athletic contests.

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Long Distance Phone Operators Accept Contract

New York, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Long distance telephone workers in 41 states have voted approval of a new contract, eliminating earlier threats of a nationwide strike.

This was announced yesterday by J. J. Moran, president of the GTO American Union of Telephone Workers.

He said the vote was 9,043 to 1,810 in favor of the new contract negotiated last June with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

It provides no general wage increase, granting pay boosts only in scattered localities "to meet local conditions."

AFL President Says Filibuster Invited By GOP

New York, Aug. 4.—(AP)—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, has challenged Republican leaders "to deny that they deliberately instigated" the present senate filibuster.

Green, saying that GOP leaders of the 80th Congress were practicing "evil politics," said they had instigated the Southern Democrats' filibuster over poll tax legislation as "a political maneuver to block action on necessary legislation."

He told the state AFL convention that politics is the "only one possible reason for Congress' inaction now on taxation and housing bills."

He challenged Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) and other GOP leaders to deny that they were trying to "force adjournment of the special session without accomplishing a single constructive advance."

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Ban Segregation In Headquarters Demo Nat'l Body

McGrath Says Action Is Consistent With Policy Urged By Pres. Truman

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The Democratic National Committee has banned race segregation in its headquarters staff in a new bid for Negro support in the presidential election.

Confirming the change, National Chairman J. Howard McGrath told a reporter the committee "merely is being consistent" by putting into effect a policy urged by President Truman for government jobs and the armed forces.

McGrath said he expects to announce later the appointment of a Negro assistant to the chairman. He would not comment on reports that Rep. William L. Dawson of Illinois is slated for this post.

McGrath said the committee is abolishing its Negro division as such and distributing its Negro workers among other units. He said there will be no race discrimination in the hiring of stenographers, clerks and other employees.

The Republican National Committee maintains a Negro division with Val Washington of Chicago, former Illinois state official, as its head. William Murphy, GOP publicity director, said several Negroes are employed on the headquarters staff.

McGrath's move was looked on by some Dixie Democrats as a further sign that the administration is more interested in Negro support from the big vote states than it is in patching up the party row in the South.

Some of the Southerners are backing a presidential candidate of their own, Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina. Others have declared they won't vote for President Truman. Alabama and Mississippi electors have been formally instructed not to support him.

Most of the Southern states have refused to come across with money for the party war chest.

But in the face of all this, McGrath said he thinks things will work out in November.

"President Truman is not going to lose the electoral vote of any Southern state—wait and see," he said.

Cutbacks Climb In Textile Mills Of Two States

Providence, R.I., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Textile mill cutbacks to a four-day week mounted in Rhode Island and Massachusetts today.

The Berkshire Fine Spinning Associates, Inc., disclosed yesterday that it had placed 5300 workers in six Rhode Island and Massachusetts cotton textile plants on a four-day week because of lack of orders.

The Bourne Mills of Tiverton, R.I., put 800 workers on a four-day week three weeks ago and the Slaterville, R.I., Finishing Company, employing about 400, also is averaging four days a week.

Textile sources said three factors were affecting orders: world-wide import and export controls and the dollar exchange situation, southern competition, and a postwar movement of Japanese and Indian textile into American and world markets.

Beside the note, the apologetic thief left Jordan a gift—a box of cheese.

Superior Court To Be Held August 23

A civil term of Superior Court will be held here the week of August 23. A mixed term of civil and criminal court will be held the week of August 30. Judge J. Paul Friselle of Snow Hill, riding the Fifth Judicial Circuit the last half of this year, will preside.

An unusually heavy criminal docket will confront the Greene County jurist. Some important cases, including several of murder and manslaughter, are scheduled to be tried.

Will Enforce Law

"We've been lenient, perhaps too lenient," says C. T. Mallison, superintendent of the Greenville Street Department, "but the city law requires all homes to have a garbage can with a lid on it, and we're going to enforce it from now on."

Republicans Launch Their Own Anti-Inflation Bill In Congress

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The Republicans formally proposed their own anti-inflation bill today amid prospects that it may reach the House for action tomorrow.

Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.), House Banking Committee chairman, said the measure calls for restoring installment buying controls through next March 15 and for moderate tightening of bank credits. These steps have been freely predicted previously by GOP leaders.

In the Republican drive to wind up the extra session of Congress next Tuesday, Wolcott said his committee may act upon the bill today, sending it to the House for consideration tomorrow.

The measure completely ignores President Truman's request for selective price-wage controls and rationing powers. Likewise, there is no mention of the President's proposed excess profits tax estimated to yield \$4,300,000,000.

Republican senators concentrated on bringing up some form of housing bill and on what to do about civil rights legislation—especially the anti-poll tax bill tied up by a Southern filibuster.

The 51 GOP senators were called together for a lengthy morning discussion of what legislation may be pushed in the session before adjournment.

One issue was a plan to concede the Southern Democrats a victory in blocking the poll tax measure. The GOP leaders would propose instead a constitutional amendment calling for elimination of poll tax payments as a requisite to voting in federal elections.

A group of House members headed by Rep. O'Toole (D-NY) petitioned Republican leaders not to allow Congress to adjourn without acting on cost-of-living and housing legislation.

They prepared identical letters to Speaker Martin and House Majority Leader Halleck (R-Ind.), saying there is a critical need for action now on both subjects.

O'Toole said "approximately 40 members" agreed to sign the letters before their delivery to the two GOP leaders.

As the GOP anti-inflation bill was brought out, Treasury Secretary Snyder appeared before the House banking group. Pleading for credit controls, Snyder said:

"Unfortunately, as a result both of the tax reduction bill (passed by Congress in the spring) and of the increased foreign aid and defense expenditures made necessary by the tense international situation, we no longer have a budget surplus at our disposal as a weapon for combating inflationary pressures."

Warns Bloodshed If Judge Remains

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Rep. Rivers (D-SC) told the house today "there will be bloodshed" unless Federal Judge Waring of South Carolina is removed.

Rep. Dorn (D-SC) has introduced a resolution asking Congress to investigate "the conduct in office" of Waring, Federal District Judge for Eastern South Carolina.

Rivers said in addressing the House:

"I am not complaining about his (Waring's) decision permitting Negroes to vote. I think anybody, whether he is a lawyer or not, could see that the Federal Courts were going to permit the Negroes to vote in South Carolina primaries. The Awright case was the signal for this. Personally I have felt for many years that we have had thousands of qualified Negroes in South Carolina who should be permitted to vote in our primaries. x x x

"But his clumsy handling of a delicate situation has hurt the cause of the Negro in South Carolina. This is unfortunate and I trust will not long obtain.

"Unless he is removed, there will be bloodshed. x x x

"I prophesy bloodshed because he is now in the process of exacting a pound of flesh from the white people of South Carolina because, through his own actions, he has been ostracized from their society. x x x

"I charge that Waring's decisions are so political he is hopeful for a promotion to the circuit court of appeals if by some curious twist, Light Horse Harry Truman should slip into the White House for another term."

Israeli Bombing Pilot, A Girl, Killed In Crash

Tel Aviv, Israel, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Zahara Levitov, pretty, 21-year-old American-educated girl bomber pilot with the Israeli air force, was killed yesterday in an air crash between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, Israeli officials announced.

Miss Levitov trained to fly as a hobby, at Bakersfield, Calif. She flew several bombing missions for the Israelis against the Arabs in the Palestine fighting.

The air force refused to list her actual missions or to say whether these included the bomber sorties against Arab capitals.

Approve Entry In Retirement Plan

Raleigh, N.C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Seven applications by local governmental units to participate in the local governmental employees retirement system were approved by the system's board of trustees at a meeting here yesterday.

The local units were the towns of New Bern, Lincolnton and Gastonia, the counties of Rowan, Wilson and Craven and the Elizabeth City Public Utilities Commission.

DICKINSON AVENUE WIDENED FOR INCREASING TRAFFIC

The street department has a crew of men at work on Dickinson Avenue, from the Coast Line railroad tracks to Paris Avenue, removing trees necessary for widening the thoroughfare for increasing vehicular traffic.

Divided Germany Races For First Constitution

Berlin, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Communists in eastern Germany raced to beat the west today in producing the nation's first post-war constitution. Both groups have set September target dates.

Berliners, meantime, voiced hope that this week's western power talks with Prime Minister Stalin in Moscow would result in an east-west compromise and early lifting of the Berlin blockade.

There was no official comment in Berlin on the Moscow negotiations, but it is known American and British occupation commanders are being kept advised of developments by Washington and London. Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, British commander, flies to London today for talks at the foreign office.

In the Soviet capital itself American diplomatic sources maintained silence on the negotiations. The lid also is on light in Washington, London and Paris.

At the moment, interest centered on the race to produce rival German governments.

The Communist-controlled People's Council, after discussing the draft for a "German Democratic Republic" yesterday, ordered its constitution committee to complete the document by the middle of September. It will then be laid before the Communist People's Congress for approval.

The constitutional assembly as proposed by the western powers is tentatively scheduled in western Germany for early September.

The constitution proposed by the People's Council will be drafted along traditional Communist lines, with representation in the two-house parliament not only for political parties but also for mass organizations such as trade unions, women's and youth organizations.

The Communist constitution will be drawn up to include all Germany. The Communists insist the People's Council represent all political viewpoints in Germany, although it is not recognized outside the Soviet zone and the Soviet sector of Berlin.

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Communist To Support Wallace

New York, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The general secretary of the Communist party in America says the rise of the new progressive party signals a "developing crisis within monopoly's two-party system."

Eugene Dennis told the party's national convention yesterday that the Communists will wage a campaign in support of Presidential Candidate Henry A. Wallace and the Progressive party.

The Communists will put up a "limited number" of candidates of their own, he said.

Hard-Boiled Attitude

Conference On Control Of Danube River Reflects Red Determination To Give Up Nothing Which Will Stop Expansion; Vishinsky, the "Cook" At Belgrade

While the western world is speculating on what degree of Russian cooperation (if any) may grow out of the Stalin parley, the Belgrade conference on control of the Danube river provides a mirror which reflects a hard-boiled Bolshevik determination to grant the democracies nothing which impedes Red expansion.

The mighty Danube is one of the world's strategic waterways. It is of the highest importance economically, politically, militarily and culturally, for it is the chief means of transport in that whole area of southeastern Europe. It rises in the Black Forest of southwest Germany and winds eastward for 1,750 miles, thus contacting eight countries before emptying into the Black Sea.

Prior to the war the Danube had been under international control which gave rights to both eastern and western powers. As a matter of fact, the Paris Agreement of 1921 providing for such control is still on the books, but the Russians and their satellites have assumed complete domination of the waterway charging that the western allies broke the pact.

So it is that we find the warring parties assembled in Belgrade to discuss a new "agreement" for Danubian control. Theoretically the conference is to reestablish free navigation, but practically the matter was virtually fixed in advance by the Communists. The Russians have presented a new agreement under which the Danubian countries have exclusive control of the water thoroughfare. Moreover, these states have a majority in the conference and can dictate what they wish. The line-up is America, Britain and France on the one side and on the other Russia, the Ukraine, Bulgaria, Romania, Yugoslavia, Hungary and Czechoslovakia. Germany isn't directly represented and Austria is permitted to sit only as an observer.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky sounded the keynote of the conference right at the start. He told the representatives of the western powers to accept decisions of the Communist-dominated parley or get out.

Yesterday Vishinsky got an answer from the chief British delegate

Paris' Secret Of Success Is In The Air

Now upon us is the month when the great dressmaking houses of Paris unveil to a breathless—and largely American—audience their fall and winter collections.

It is also the month for dragging out the old discussions about why America, which has such a big, competent and handsome dress industry, should pay any attention to Paris anyway.

What about all that talk during the war about how New York and points west were going to be self-sufficient hereafter? Paris, said the industry bravely, was going to be second-string stuff as far as clothing designing was concerned.

So here we are, some three years after the war and the fall and spring Paris openings are still important dates. They still lure buyers, fashion-writers. What's more, the proud American designers themselves run over for a look-see too.

There's a legitimate question in just why French clothes should be so important in the American fashion picture. They certainly are designed for European women—short, fullhipped, short-waisted and narrow shouldered women. That is not what we think of as the average figure of the all-American girl. Collection clothes are ones of great price, custom-made. The American dress industry is built around the ready-made, the mass-produced.

So, come, now. What's all this to-do about Paris clothes? With all due modesty, I think I know why Paris is, and will be for years to come the heart and soul of fashion. At least, my reasons satisfy me.

Parisians believe that there is a magic quality in the air of the city on the Seine that brings out the best of any creative person; artist, writer, dreamer or leader. Everybody does what they like to do better.

The French call this the "ambiance" of Paris, and it's a word that defies exact translation, but falls somewhere near "environment" and "atmosphere." They apply it to all sorts of things, explaining why Paris is Paris.

A perfume manufacturer was telling me once he was so happy that it was once again possible to compound and bottle his product in Paris. For a considerable period, his perfume had been made to be bottled in formulae in the United States, where considerable quantities were sold.

"What's the difference, if the material and proportions are exactly the same, whether it's made in Paris or New York?" I asked. He looked at me as though I had asked the world's silliest question.

"There is, in the neck of every bottle of perfume a small area which contains air," he replied gravely. "In that space there is now the air of Paris. It makes all the difference."

The French who believe in the miraculous quality in the air, are certain that it produces the finest clothes, wine, perfume on earth. They have, in their own fervor sold the world—including Americans—their faith.

American designers and dress manufacturers have succeeded in making the average American woman the best-dressed in the world. But American dress designers don't believe there's magic at home. New York, San Francisco, St. Louis—as far as the natives are concerned—have lots of things, but no ambiance.

Maybe as we get older, we'll develop something of our own that will give us needed self-confidence. But until we do, when Dior goes in for a new silhouette, there'll be repercussions from Maine to California. When Balenciaga drops a waist-line, there will be nervous reactions on Seventh avenue.

The effort to force meat prices down was promised support from 10,000 women in Dallas alone yesterday when the Dallas Federation of Women's Clubs asked its members to join the boycott.

Dallas Butcher Wallace Shanks protested plaintively: "Some people don't think of cutting down on other things, such as shoes, drinking and high-priced automobiles."

"Meat prices are high, what isn't?" In Miami, Fla., chain telephone calls were used in a campaign against meat prices.

E. A. Daly of Biscayne Park called 32 friends by phone asking them not to buy meat for one week beginning Friday. He asked each friend to call at least five others, and so on, along the line of chain letters.

Mississippi Will Vote 'Dixiecrat'

Jackson, Miss., Aug. 4—(AP)—Mississippi's Democratic convention has reiterated its solid states' rights stand by pledging the state's nine electoral candidates to the Thurmond-Wright ticket.

State delegates, who reconvened here yesterday for a one day session, also voted approval of Mississippi's walkout at Philadelphia.

The state convention adopted resolutions which, briefly, would:

- Approve the Philadelphia walkout.
- Nominate Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina and Gov. Fielding L. Wright of Mississippi as candidates of the Mississippi Democratic party for president and vice president.
- Pledge the state's nine candidates for the Thurmond-Wright ticket.
- Call for a states' rights educational campaign in each county.
- Commission the nine electoral-candidates as delegates to another Birmingham convention on Oct. 1.
- Request all candidates for office on the state Democratic ticket to declare their support for states' rights plans.
- Call on Mississippi's congressional delegation and congressional candidates to declare how they would vote, if Congress should have to decide the presidential election.

Farms Hurt By Flooded River

Asheville, N.C., Aug. 4—(AP)—The French Broad River continued out of its banks today, causing con-

siderable damage to bean and corn crops in Henderson and Transylvania counties.

Considerable rain has fallen over the area for the past three days and is continuing today. Relief is expected by tomorrow.

The river, which originates above Roanoke, crested at 6.4 feet in Asheville, four-tenths of a foot over its banks.

Mr. Charles Peake, who accused the Russian of trying to dominate the conference through control of the eastern states. Declared the late Briton:

"I for one have no intention of being bullied or intimidated. The United Kingdom will not jump at the crack of Mr. Vishinsky's whip. Let me make that plain."

Later Peake quoted a remark by Vishinsky that the western powers have treated the Danubian states in the past as a cook treats potatoes in the kitchen. And Peake commented:

"A vivid and homely phrase but, I ask you, what is cook here?"

Vishinsky grinned, and pointed toward himself with his thumb.

That gesture by the Soviet foreign minister conveyed a volume of truth. He is the cook at Belgrade, and it is obvious that he intends to railroad through the new agreement of Danubian control unless Moscow unexpectedly orders a change of front.

Naturally one of the chief reasons why the western allies want to see an internationally free river is to prevent the Danubian states from being completely swallowed up by Russia. Moreover, a resumption of trade between eastern and western Europe is important to success of the Marshall plan.

However, Vishinsky won't likely give up the "Blue Danube" on any such basis. The Danube, by the way, isn't blue. It's brownish, from silt. It's the allied chances which look blue.

gate the story of spy rings working inside the government.

On July 21 it indicted 13 top Communist party leaders for conspiracy to overthrow the government. But that was something aside from its year-long investigation of spying by government employees.

At this point the two congressional committees decided to call Miss Bentley here to testify openly before them about the spy rings.

The chairman of the Un-American Activities Committee—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas, New Jersey Republican—said he decided to throw Miss Bentley's information wide open to the public because he doesn't think the New York grand jury will indict anyone anyway.

Thomas wants a special grand jury called together here in Washington to pick up the investigation. Within a week he may ask the attorney general to call the jury.

The Senate investigating committee, headed by Senator Ferguson, Michigan Republican, apparently also figured the New York grand jury investigation wasn't getting any place.

So it called Miss Bentley in and said it was doing so as part of its investigation of the government's program of checking on the loyalty of government workers.

The program was set up after all but one of those mentioned by Miss Bentley had left the government.

CHARGE NEGRO EMPLOYEE LARCENY OF FURNITURE

Police yesterday arrested Tom Adams, 32-year-old Negro employee of J. A. Collins and Son's Furniture Store, on Dickinson Avenue, on a charge of larceny of four chrome breakfast room chairs from the store. Georgia-Florida Prices Decline

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 4—(AP)—General declines, affecting nearly all groups and grades, marked yesterday's trading on the Georgia-Florida flue-cured tobacco markets.

The U. S. department of Agriculture said top quality lugs, selling previously at \$50-\$62 a hundred, dropped to \$56-\$61 and that medium and low quality cutters and good lemon leaf also showed losses.

The prices of some green leaf and lug grades, however, held firm yesterday. The volume continued heavy but deliveries were light.

Gross sales yesterday were 8,722, 842 pounds at an average of \$51.04. The season's total is now \$9,972,987 pounds at \$51.59 a hundred.

The USDA said the quality sold yesterday was lower than previous sales due to an increase in the proportion of common to medium leaf and nondescript. It said the percentage of better quality lugs and cutter grades was the smallest so far this year.

Paid Holidays In Industry Growing Trend In Nation

New York—(AP)—The trend toward paid holidays for production workers "is evidently continuing," according to a survey of 100 union contracts by the National Industrial Conference Board.

In 78 of 100 contracts analyzed, pay is provided on holidays even though no work is performed. In the remaining 22 contracts, time off on holidays without pay is specified.

The fact that more than three fourths of these recent agreements provide for paid holidays contrasts with holiday provisions studied in 1942, the analysis notes. "At that time," it says, "only a small number (approximately 15 percent) of the agreements analyzed contained provisions for holidays with pay."

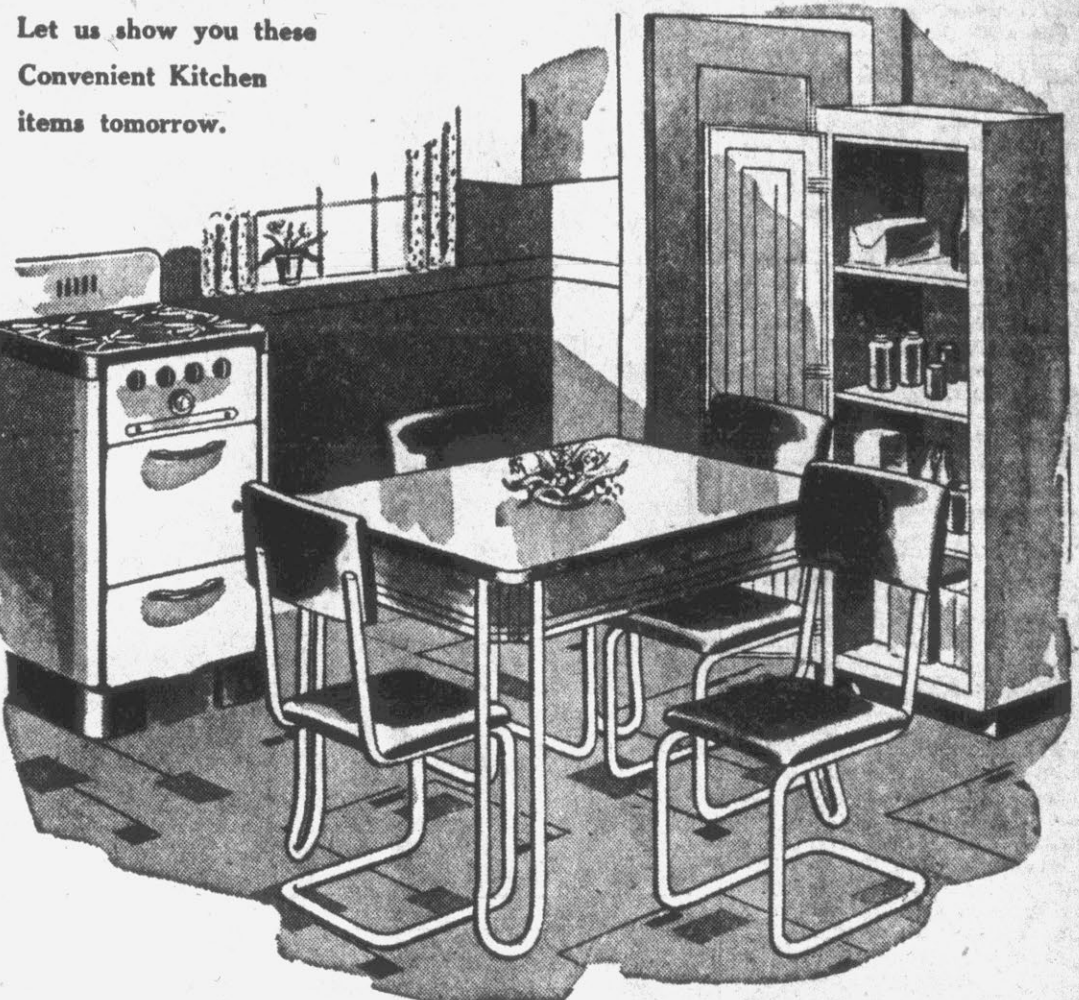

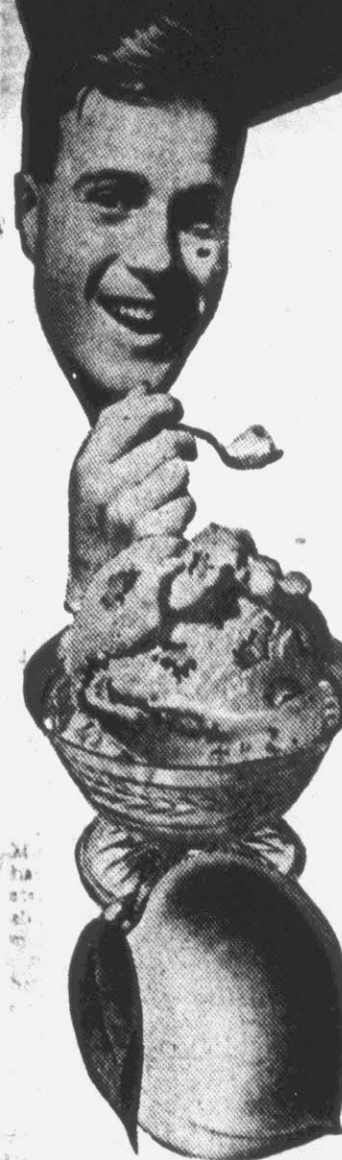

Social Security Number Needed

Every person who is planning to work in a tobacco warehouse or tobacco factory this season should check now to see if he has his social security account number card. This is important because every employee must show his social security card to his employer when he starts work according to a statement made today by M. H. Barney, manager of the Social Security Administration Field Office, located in the Post Office Building, Rocky Mount, N. C.

If a man or woman has never had a social security number and intends to work this tobacco season, he may obtain an original social security account number card by filling out an application blank and mailing it to the Social Security Administration, Rocky Mount, N. C. These application blanks may be obtained from your local Post Office, Employment Service office or from the field office of the Social Security Administration.

If a worker finds that he has lost his social security card, he should apply immediately for a duplicate card. A duplicate card is also obtained by filling out an application blank and sending it to the Rocky Mount office.

Every person who gets work in a tobacco warehouse or tobacco factory should have a social security card. "A social security card, Mr. Barney said, 'immediately establishes an insurance account with the United States government and opens the door to eventual benefits under the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance system.'"

New British Plane Is Ready For Unveiling

London—(AP)—The drapes will be taken off Britain's "New Look" aircraft, which is built of non-inflammable magnesium and has its propeller in the tail, at the Society of British Aircraft Constructors' flying display at Farnborough, Hampshire, in September. The plane, the Satellite, made by the Planet Aircraft Co. has a top speed estimated at 208 M.P.H. with a cruising speed of 180 M.P.H. Its range is 1,000 miles with a full load, or 2,450 miles—equivalent to an Atlantic crossing—with only the pilot.

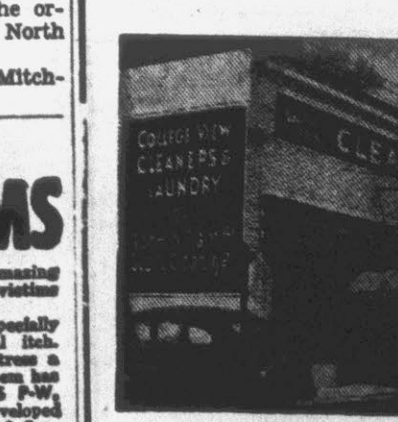

Locals Fall To New Bern's Five - Run Rally In Ninth

Another Former Ring Champ Dies

Van Nuys, Calif., Aug. 4—(AP)—Death has claimed another of the ring's old masters, Tommy Ryan, former welterweight and middleweight champion of the world.

Ryan, who graduated from lumber camp braves and fought through the turn-of-the-century area when bouts went as long as 76 rounds, died of a heart ailment yesterday.

He was 78. Ann, his wife of 50 years, was with him when the end came at their home here.

Ryan was born Joseph Youngs Jr., at Redwood, N. Y., March 31 1870, son of French glassblower. He left home early, changing his name to Tompkins Ryan, and headed for the Michigan lumber camps.

Soon he was fighting in Detroit, Chicago and other midwest cities. At the age of 21 he knocked out Danny Needham, welterweight title claimant, in the 76th round at Minneapolis, Feb. 16 1891. It was his longest bout.

Ryan caught up with the 147-pound championship on July 26, 1894, when he outpointed mysterious Billy Smith in 20 rounds at Minneapolis.

He lost the crown on March 2, 1896 when Kid McCoy knocked him out in 15 rounds at Maspeth, L. I. It was the only time, record books show, Ryan was ever stopped in a career of nearly 20 fights.

Guldahl Smashes Par To Get Lead In Tam O'Shanter

Chicago, Aug. 4—(AP)—A high-powered field in the \$50,000 All-American golf tourney today tried to catch up with an explosive comeback swinger, stoop-shouldered Ralph Guldahl, 1937-38 U.S. Open champion.

Guldahl ripped Tam O'Shanter's rolling greens apart yesterday with a 64—a record-breaking eight under par.

Thus mild-mannered Ralph, who tumbled from the headlines after winning the 1939 Masters' Open, held a two-stroke lead over runner-up Dick Metz of Arkansas City, Kan., in the rich 72-hole medal play test.

Metz with 33-33-66 was a stroke ahead of a brace of 67 shooters, Chandler Harper of Portsmouth, Va., and Elmer Reed of Atlanta, Ga. In all, 34 professional contenders and four amateurs, headed by Mike Solarik of Waukegan, Ill., with an impressive 68, shattered par 72 in the get-away round of the three-ringed Tam Fairways circus.

The game will be played at the home of the Western winner, Cleveland, has won the two previous crowns in the League. "Startin' a game is a lot easier than goin' in to try to save one," as drawn in the dressing room as Ed Klemm was finishing out the last two innings. Satch had departed for a pinch batter, but the Tribe finished ahead of Washington, 5 to 3. That left Cleveland in first by a couple of percentage points as Chicago knocked out Philadelphia.

The long, lean pitcher wasn't using much fancy stuff in his winning stint. He hadn't pitched a full game all year, but had taken part in eight of the Indians' contests for 18 innings, winning one and losing one. During that time he had given only two intentional walks.

There were 72,434 fans in the stadium—largest night crowd in the town's baseball history—when the ageless Negro went to the mound. But at the start, the famous Paige control was lacking. With one out in the first inning, he passed Al Kozar and Gil Coan in succession, and both scored when Ed Stewart lined a triple to left center.

After that old Satchmo settled down. He issued another pass in the third and a final one in the seventh, but he scattered a total of seven hits and had six strikeouts. He used his "hesitation" pitch to get the last one, Eddie Yost.

The blooper he used "just once. It's better to be a few runs ahead when you use that one," he said. "You can't tell what might happen."

Americans Lead High Diving For Olympic Honors

Olympic Pool, Wembley, England, Aug. 4—(AP)—Dr. Sammy Lee, 28-year-old American medical lieutenant from Pasadena, Calif., led the field today in the mens Olympic high dive championship after four of the eight dives.

Bruce Harlan of Ohio State University, the Olympic springboard champion, was second in point totals at the halfway point.

Miller Anderson, also of Ohio State, who was favored to win the tower diving event, was scratched from the competition at the last minute because of injuries he received Monday in a practice fall from the platform.

The high diving will be completed tomorrow. The Americans finished one-two-three in the springboard, with Harlan winning and Anderson gaining second.

Balloon-Chasing Revived By Swiss

Basel, Switzerland—(AP)—Swiss motorists have revived the pre-war sport of chasing free balloons.

The automobile club here recently staged such an event, known as a "balloon-foxhunt," at Olten, Switzerland. At the gasworks there the bag was filled with 2,000 cubic meters of gas, the basket took on an aerodynamic and four passengers, and 37 motorists engaged in a guessing and racing contest to be the first to reach the balloon when it landed. It came down four hours later, approximately 120 kilometers from the starting point. The chase could have continued except that an easterly wind was driving the bag toward the French frontier. At the frontier the "foxhunters" would have had to halt, and a Swiss balloon floating over French soil might have provoked diplomatic exchanges.

75,000 See Film

Los Angeles—(AP)—More than 75,000 Southern Californians have been shown "The Best in Football," a 25-minute sound and color movie prepared by the Los Angeles Rams of the All-American pro football Conference. Don Ameche, president of the Rams, narrates the film, which features the outstanding plays of the team's 1947 season.

U.S. Well On Way To Greatest Triumphs In Modern Olympics

Half-Way Mark Is Reached In Track And Field Games; Seven Championships Scored, And Five More Possible Winners

Olympic Stadium, Wembley, England, Aug. 4—(AP)—The Olympic track and field games passed their half way mark today with the United States well on the way to equaling or bettering its greatest triumphs in other modern Olympics.

At the end of four days of international competition, 14 individual champions had stood proudly at attention in the stadium, while their national anthems were played. Seven times it was the "Star Spangled Banner."

There remain ten more finals to be held before the track and field games end on Saturday. The United States seem assured of winning four and has a possible chance in a fifth. Thus far the American team has captured the following individual titles:

100, 200, and 400 meters, 400 meter hurdles, broad jump, pole vault and shot put.

It now appears likely to win the 400 and 1,600 meter relays, the decathlon and the 110 meter hurdles. The other events on the next four days of competition are the javelin, 400 meters, 3,000 meter steepchase, 1,500 meter run, 10,000 meter walk, and marathon. Only in the 400 meters and javelin do the Americans have any real hope of winning an individual title.

But 11 victories out of 24 would compare favorably with the record of other Olympic competitions. In 1936, 1924, and 1912 the United States won 12 first places.

No other nation is even remotely close to the United States in the matter of first places and in the track and field point score the Americans have 131 to runnerup Sweden's 44.

Sweden has two firsts and is favored to add the steepchase and 1,500 meters and possibly the javelin.

Hungary, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Australia and Italy each have one title.

The next few days should see two of the most famous stars of trackdom appear in their specialties. Herb McKenley of Jamaica, the former Illinois University runner, starts his quest this afternoon, or the 400 meter title. He already has set a new world record of 45.9 seconds in this event in the states and is deemed the top heavy favorite to win. He placed fourth in the 200 yesterday.

Today also marks the start of the 1,500 meter heats and the first appearance here of Lennart Strand, the temperamental Swede who shares the world mark of 3:43 with the great Gunder Haegg.

Chances of either McKenley or Strand setting new Olympic marks in their events would be excellent were it not for the condition of the track. Virtually all the athletes who competed yesterday reported the rains of the past days had made the track very slow.

First Cage Wins For Italy, Iran

London, Aug. 4—(AP)—Italy and Iran scored their first victories in the Olympic basketball preliminaries today.

Italy handed Great Britain its fourth straight setback, 49 to 28. Iran conquered Eire, also winless, 49 to 22.

None of these teams apparently has a chance of making the championship tournament, to be composed of the two leading teams from each of four groups, now engaged in a round robin. The favored United States team, with three straight triumphs, engages Egypt tonight.

Duquesne Coach Is Seeking Peace

Pittsburgh, Aug. 4—(AP)—Charles (Chick) Davies, a one-time steel slogger who built a national reputation as a college basketball coach, has gone back to the comparative peace and quiet of high school coaching.

Davies resigned yesterday after 21 years as cage mentor at Duquesne University to return to Homestead High school. He had coached there for three years during the war when Duquesne temporarily abandoned athletics.

"Intercollegiate basketball competition is making excessive demands on my emotional and physical energies," the balding 48-year-old coach said in his letter of resignation.

The rigors of travel and the banquet circuit were also cited by Davies as reasons for seeking more peaceful shores.

Duquesne officials who through the years of stress and strain had known the excitable mentor to "re-sign" more than once didn't take him too seriously at first. When they found he meant it, they said it was "not an easy decision" to accept the resignation.

They added it "happened so suddenly" they have no successor in mind as yet.

Davies was working under a five-year contract which had three more years to run.

He put the little "college on the bluff" in the spotlight with three national championships and four seasons with only seven defeats.

Swede Captures Big Pentathlon

London, Aug. 4—(AP)—Capt. W. O. G. Grut, of Sweden, finished eighth in the cross country run today to win the Olympic pentathlon with a record score of 16 points.

The versatile artillery captain already had finished first in three phases of the competition—riding, fencing and swimming—and fifth in the other—marksmanship.
